

Warfare Seen In Holy Land If Truce Fails

WASHINGTON, March 26. (AP) — President Truman tackled the problem of peace in Palestine on a wide diplomatic front today.

Officials predicted that if American efforts to arrange an Arab-Jewish truce are not successful, the Holy Land will become an embattled "no-man's land" when the British give up their mandate there May 15.

Wholesale bloodshed—what Mr. Truman himself called open warfare—is foreseen at that time unless decisive action is taken beforehand along two lines.

These were laid down by the President in a statement yesterday. He called for (1) the creation of a united nations' trusteeship to assume authority temporarily when the British leave, and (2) for a truce meanwhile to put an end to the killing.

Officials said that all the resources of diplomacy must be employed with the Jewish and Arab leaders directly, as well as with their representatives at the United Nations, to make the President's double-harness program effective.

Admittedly, these authorities said, prospects for success are not too bright. Initial reaction of both Jews and Arabs has been unfavorable in many respects to the negotiation of a truce.

In New York, Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, chairman of the American section of the Jewish agency for Palestine, said partition is the very least his people will accept in the way of a political settlement.

In Washington the Arab office issued a statement calling Mr. Truman's proposal "fantastic" and denouncing the President's news conference comment that he has not abandoned support for the partition idea.

Some of the President's advisers privately made plain that what the American government is now interested in, aside from getting peace in the Holy Land, is any kind of long-range political settlement both Jews and Arabs may be prevailed upon to accept.

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By those rights he meant the recommendations of partition voted last Nov. 29 by the United Nations general assembly.

In Lake Success, N. Y., Faris El Khoury of Syria, top Arab spokesman at the U. N., said he believed the Arabs would be ready to avoid any step to disturb the peace if the Jews would drop partition.

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ARAB GUNS GUARD CHRIST'S PATH TO CRUCIFIXION AS CROWDS PRAY

JERUSALEM, March 26. (AP) — Arab guns guarded the way of sorrows today — the path Christ is believed to have walked to his crucifixion.

Gun snouts poked out of battle positions in the old city as crowds stood in prayer at each station of Christ's journey to calvary.

Most of them were Christian Arabs, praying with the Arab prelate of Jerusalem, Msgr. Nmansour Jallad.

Europeans who entered the city through Jaffa gate where battle between Arabs and Jews has been deadly, did so under the watchful eyes of Arab sentries. They wanted to make sure none was Jewish.

The pilgrims of former years did not come to Jerusalem this Good Friday.

Old city guns, which have roared out almost constantly since the Jews and Arabs began fighting over the partitioning of Palestine last fall, were silent today. But tension remained in the air.

The annual procession started from the point where the Bible says Pontius Pilate delivered Christ to the mob and then washed his hands — a symbol he was quit of the case.

From this place robed priests led the crowd along the way of the cross — where Christ took up the cross, where he fell, where he met his mother — the long path to Calvary.

Jews celebrated Purim, commemorating their ancient liberation from the Persians.

But they did not forget today's strife.

In one synagogue a grim-faced member of Haganah, the Jewish militia, was given the place of honor next to the reader.

DRAFT NOT ENOUGH

Senators Advocate More Air Power

WASHINGTON, March 26. (AP) — Senate air power advocates insisted today the high command's own expansion program falls short of actual needs.

They declared that drafting men until a universal training program can be put into full operation is not enough to give this country the armed strength required to back up President Truman's halt-Russia policy.

Led by Senator Lodge (R-Mass.), himself a World War II veteran, the determined backers of a mightier Air Force showed little alarm over testimony that Russian submarines have been seen "off our shores."

Nor did they take specific issue with plans to draft at least 200,000 men between the ages of 19 and 26 for two-year terms with eventual registration of all men up to 45 years of age.

But the half-dozen or more senators gave every sign of an all-out fight to provide the Air Force with 70 combat groups.

The \$3,448,000,000 preparedness program outlined by the nation's military leaders yesterday contemplates no addition to the 55 groups now planned.

But Lodge, who sat in as a guest of the Senate Armed Services committee, noted in sharp questioning of the military chiefs that the original blueprint for this country's postwar air force contemplated 70 groups.

He demanded to know why this figure had been cut and particularly why it had not been restored in the light of tension with Russia.

Lodge drew admissions from Secretary of Army Symington and from Gen. Carl Spaatz, Air Force chief of staff, that they still regard the larger figure as necessary.

This brought secretary of Defense Forrestal back to the witness stand with the rejoinder that to add the 15 groups would boost the cost of the expansion program to \$18,000,000,000 for air power alone.

And both the Navy and ground forces then would have to be increased in proportion, he insisted.

Many Are Expected To View Dogwood

PALESTINE, March 26. (AP) — At least 20,000 flower lovers from throughout Texas and the Southwest are expected to converge on Palestine Easter Sunday to see Texas dogwood trails.

The free flower show opens officially Saturday but local backers of the trails expect a comparative small crowd of 500 or more visitors that day. The real throngs flock here each year on Sundays.

An extension of the dogwood-bordered trails route makes this year's greatest improvement in the ten-year-old trails event. New hill-top picnic sites from which visitors can see for miles are being prepared.

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Fire Destroys Six Odessa Businesses

Damage Set In Excess Of \$200,000

ODESSA, March 26. (Spl)

An early morning fire, fanned by stiff breezes, gnawed away most of one large building here today, destroying six businesses and inflicting damage estimated in excess of \$200,000.

A large building on the south side of Fifth street between Grant and Lee went up in flames before the fire department could bring the blaze under control at 2 a. m.

Two hours after the alarm was sounded.

Heaviest loss occurred in the Morris System food store, where the flames were first spotted. Stocks had been increased sharply for the Easter run, and meat valued at \$7,000 went up in the blaze.

Also consumed were a real estate agency, a bakery, a small drug store, a shoe shop and a beauty shop, all in the same building. The beauty shop, the corner firm, managed to have some of its equipment extracted before flames reached it.

A smaller building behind the large unit, which was destroyed, sustained some water and smoke damage. The Poe Paint store had some water in its place this morning, and smoke fumes were strong in the Tot Shop, but its stock had been evacuated.

Fire Marshal Oren L. Cregar blamed the lack of fire stops for the quick spread of the flames.

One man, booked for intoxication and discharging fire barricades, was picked up after he drove over a fire hose and headed for another. Officials said Friday that no cause for the fire had been fixed, although theories ranged from faulty electric motor wiring to smoking.

Members of the sheriff's office and the city police force were kept busy this morning running down clues on an outbreak of burglaries that occurred in widely separated sections of the city last night.

A vehicle belonging to G. F. Booth of Los Angeles, parked at 205 Gregg street, was entered and many valuables were reported missing, including a Marine shirt, lady's suit, coat, two blouses, man's suit, a black and white sweater with cap to match, mirror and jacket.

A Masonic lodge pin and chain, a \$60 diamond ring and other items were reported taken from a house at 705 Runnels street occupied by J. L. Milner.

A vehicle belonging to Ruth Davidson, parked at 115 Runnels, was rifled. Reported stolen were a yellow blouse, a maroon and white sweater with cap and muff to match.

SEoul, March 26. (AP) — South Korean political leaders today were invited to help establish a Soviet-sponsored government of Korea.

The Russians controlled radio at Pyongyang, headquarters of the Russian occupation in north Korea, invited leaders of rightist, leftist and middle-of-the-road parties to a conference April 14. The broadcast was repeated twice.

The United Nations has approved plans for an election May 9 in American administered South Korea. It wanted to conduct a nationwide election, to give Korea self-government. The Russians refused to let a U. N. commission even enter North Korea for preliminary discussions.

Scientist Develops New Magnetic Clutch

WASHINGTON, March 26. (AP) — A new magnetic clutch for automobiles and other machinery has been developed by a government engineer.

The National Bureau of Standards said today the clutch, invented by Jacob Rabinow of its technical staff, features "high efficiency, smooth operation, long life and simplicity of construction."

Rabinow's "magnetic fluid" clutch causes the first gear to turn in a fluid containing steel particles. They become magnetized and turn the second gear. The principle can be adapted to "no-shift" operation in automobiles, the bureau said.

Oklahoma Hit By Tornado

Thirteen Dead In New Disaster

OKLAHOMA CITY, March 26. (AP) — A hit and miss tornado bounced across central and eastern Oklahoma last night, leaving at least thirteen persons dead.

The storm hit mainly in farm communities, striking near Wetumka, 75 miles east of Oklahoma City, Eufaula, 40 miles east of Wetumka, Boynton, 20 miles south of Muskogee, Checotah, a few miles northeast of Eufaula, and Sallisaw, about 20 miles west of Fort Smith, Ark.

The state highway patrol said seven persons were killed near Wetumka, one near Eufaula, one at Lenna, a community near Checotah, and two at McClanahan mountain community, three miles north of Sallisaw.

The tornado first was reported at Tinker Field, Oklahoma City, about 6 p. m. Eighty four planes were destroyed or damaged there by the twister. It moved gradually eastward, finally hitting Sallisaw, near the Arkansas border about 11 p. m.

Listed as dead were:

Mrs. Woodrow Stringfellow and her three weeks old baby.

Mr. and Mrs. Bill Harris and three of their daughters, all killed near Wetumka.

Donald Shropshire, 17, Eufaula.

Ola Rogers, 34, and Commodore Rogers, 77, McClanahan mountain community, and one unidentified person at Lenna.

Mrs. Stringfellow and her baby were killed when their home about three miles south of Wetumka was flattened by the storm. Her husband suffered a broken shoulder and leg injuries and was taken to a Holdenville, Okla., hospital. The Stringfellow's six year old daughter was found soon after the storm in a nearby field. She was unhurt but her clothes had been torn off.

The five Harris victims were burned to death in a fire which followed the storm. Travis Watson, Wetumka postmaster, said a barn was blown into the Harris home near Wetumka and apparently a stove in the house overturned, setting the structure ablaze. Another daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harris suffered severe burns and was taken to a Holdenville hospital.

Wetumka has a population of about 2,700. Eufaula's population is about 2,300.

The search was continuing for additional storm victims.

The storm which struck Tinker Field was the second within a week to do major damage there.

New Cool Wave Approaches Texas

A new cool wave approached Texas today, but the Dallas weather bureau said the state probably would not feel the severe effects of the storm that has brought snow and cold to north central states.

A light freeze was forecast for the Panhandle tonight, with a temperature of from 25 to 28 at Amarillo. Lows ranging from the 40's to near 60 were predicted for the rest of the state.

Meanwhile, the state enjoyed another day of shirt-sleeve weather. Skies generally were clear in the West and rather cloudy in the South and East.

BOMB BURST IN AIR</

Small Business Is Due Some Tax Relief

While the public is conscious of tax cutting, due to passage of a bill by Congress and submission to the President, it is a good time to focus attention upon the needs of small business.

If there was ever a class of business which is constantly in a struggle to reinvest its earnings in increasing its stocks, improvement and capital structure in general, it is the smaller business.

Under existing laws, the first \$25,000 of earnings now ranges from 21 to 25 per cent; from \$25,000 to \$50,000 amounts to 53 per cent. Profits from \$50,000 up take a flat 38 per cent.

Obviously, concerns classed as small businesses would fall under the \$50,000 profits class. Most will come below the

\$25,000 level, and manifestly some relief ought to be given in this bracket. Then some semblance of logic should be applied to the \$25,000 to \$50,000 bracket to scale down that 53 per cent to a decent figure. It ought to be below the flat fee of profits above \$50,000.

Readjustment of this tax structure to permit businesses to keep more funds for re-investment—for developing its own expansion and risk capital—is proper because after all is said and done, the nation's economy is still predominantly comprised of small business. They affect more people directly than any other class of business. Thus, sensible tax relief to small business would be more relief close to the most people.

Demands Increase For U. N. Revision

Yesterday was the second anniversary of the first meeting of the United Nations security council in America, as you were reminded in this column Thursday by my colleague, Francis W. Carpenter, member of the AP staff at the headquarters of the peace organization.

It is not a day of unalloyed rejoicing and optimism, to speak euphemistically, for things have gone badly during these two years. Still, Carpenter tells us that while the U. N. is passing through perhaps its blackest days, no responsible leader or delegate shows any signs of throwing up his hands and quitting.

The old League of Nations failed in the main because it didn't do its duty. Some members continued to play power politics, and there were others like Japan and Italy which had ag-

gression in their plans and deliberately made war for conquest. Japan's invasion of Manchuria in 1931 established the precedent which inspired Mussolini and Hitler to follow suit, but the league temporized with the Japanese case and finally dismissed the matter by telling the Nipponese they were bad lads.

Our new U. N. also has aggression-minded members among its membership and has become a house divided against itself. We have the Russian communistic bloc on the one side and the democratic bloc on the other and the differences have become so great that the work of the organization has been largely brought to a standstill despite the fact that the majority lies with the democracies. The stalemate has been achieved by Russia's employment of the veto power in the security council which alone can take action to prevent or

punish aggression.

Because of this impossible situation there is increasing demand from many quarters for a revision of the U. N. charter, or, short of that, for the creation of a new organization comprising the entire democratic bloc. This bloc would, of course, include the newly formed western European union.

There are those who are afraid of such a step on the grounds that it would widen the breach between the two worlds. Well, that need no longer be a cause for hesitation, because the division already is complete. We have a communist world and a democratic world, and nothing is going to alter that. What we can do, however, is to strengthen the democratic bloc so that it will be able to withstand communist aggression—for that's where the aggression lies.

Gentry Is Baseball Encyclopaedia

Thirty-five Paris, Tex., businessmen who say their wives won't let them go to night baseball games, have organized a club.

It is called the Jack Gentry club.

Jack Gentry is a Negro porter in a Paris barber shop. Last year the 35 business men bought Gentry a season pass to the baseball games. He attended every one of them. On mornings after the game, the club members would wander into the barber shop and receive a full report on what happened from Gentry.

For the 48-year-old Gentry is a baseball expert with a sharp memory. He can reel off any statistic you might ask on the

Paris Rockets and he remembers things like the batting averages of Texas league and big league stars of days gone by.

If something comes up he doesn't know offhand, he has a library of sports facts right there at his shoeshine stand.

This year the 35 businessmen are buying Gentry another season pass.

"I'll get to see 74 home games," he told us last night. Gentry said he doesn't take notes on the games but added: "I don't forget things easy."

He played non-professional ball and has made a study of the game all his life. He is considered quite an authority—so much so that when an argument arises in the stands over an umpire's

decision, white folks sometimes walk over to the bleachers to see what Gentry thought about it.

"I just tell 'em what I think," he said.

Gentry has been married 25 years but doesn't have any trouble convincing his wife that he should attend night games. She doesn't care much for baseball but sees a game now and then.

Of the Gentry club members, whose wives put their foot down on night baseball, the shine boy said: "Too bad they is in that shape."

"Does your knowledge of baseball help you much?" we asked Gentry.

"It's fine for the shine business," he replied.

Problem Of Killing Innocent Man

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Would you kill one innocent man to save two men? Would you kill one man to save 100 men—or 1,000,000—who'd otherwise die?

Try the question on your friends. You can break up a party with it. It's getting an argument around here.

Suppose—just to illustrate the question—this happened: You're standing on a mountain ledge, near a volcano. There's a stranger standing on the volcano's slope. He's done no wrong.

Down in the valley is a city of 1,000,000 people. They're all strangers to you, too.

Suddenly a crack appears in the volcano. Boiling lava pours out. It will become a flood fast. Unless you can stop it, the lava will kill the 1,000,000 people in the valley. Although you're safe, they have no escape.

You can save them in only one way: by pushing that innocent stranger into the crevice. That will stop the lava flow. If you do it, he'll die for sure. You kill him by doing it. (You yourself can't jump into the crevice. You're too far away.)

You have a long pole. By reaching out with it, you can push the man into the lava. Will you do it?

Now right here answer the question in your own mind before you read any more of this story.

In this country we have a Constitution protecting the rights of every individual. It says no man shall be deprived of his life without a fair trial.

But suppose someone says at this point:

"Nothing is absolute, neither standards nor the Constitution nor any of its guarantees. The

Constitution has been set up for the benefit of all the people. But one man's life is not as important as the lives of 1,000,000. I believe in the greatest good for the greatest number."

Is that so? At what price the greatest good for the greatest number? Does that mean a majority of people, living in a society which has guaranteed the same rights to all people, have a right at some time to take away a minority's rights, crush the minority or even kill it?

If standards or Constitutional guarantees can be shifted or broken, then how can anyone feel safe at any time? Is that a peaceful society or chaos, with no man ever really safe?

Suppose 999,999 people were on the volcano's side and just one more than that number—or 1,000,000—in the valley below.

Would you push the 999,999 into certain death to save 1,000,000? Do you hesitate about that? Where do you draw the line between killing one man and 999,999 to save 1,000,000? If you could do that would you kill one man to save two?

Rutledge Calms MacArthur Bedlam

WASHINGTON—When benign Supreme Court justice Wiley Rutledge put on his dinner jacket for a Wisconsin university alumni banquet in Washington, recently, he didn't realize that before the evening was over he would find himself in the middle of a hot political row over Gen. Douglas MacArthur that almost broke up the dishes.

The fireworks started when Toastmaster George Worthington, president of Wisconsin's D. C. alumni chapter, suddenly veered from a nostalgic speech on his alma mater and began praising MacArthur. He extolled the brass-hatted presidential candidate as "that great, colorful American we all love so much...that great champion of democracy, who has done such an outstanding job in the Pacific."

Worthington had hardly finished when another Wisconsin alumnus in the rear of the banquet hall jumped up.

"I gave a resolution that the Washington chapter of the Wisconsin Alumni association shall never again be used as a political platform for any presidential candidate," he shouted.

There were several equally loud seconds and the meeting soon became a bedlam, with Worthington unable to restore order. Finally, scholarly Justice Rutledge, sitting next to the pro-MacArthur toastmaster, tried to restore order.

"This is most unfortunate," declared the jurist. He didn't explain whether he was referring to the MacArthur speech or the resolution condemning it. However, the resolution was finally tabled, amid boos. Whereupon, Worthington arose to "explain" his political comments, during which he again eulogized MacArthur and started a fresh outbreak.

One heckler shouted: "If you are so strong for MacArthur, please explain his conscription policies in Japan. Is that democracy?"

Several others joined the chorus and were ruled "out of order" by Rutledge. Senator Alexander Wiley of Wisconsin finally gave a soothing sermon on brotherly love, quoting at length from scripture.

ORDERS FROM MOSCOW? It looks as if Henry Wallace's third party is now acting on direct orders from Moscow.

When the confomform met in Warsaw last year, Comrade Zhdanov, the gentleman who brought direct instructions from the Kremlin, instructed the Comform to concentrate on wiping out all non-communist liberals. He described liberal socialists and labor leaders as the chief enemies of communism—because they had a greater appeal to the masses. The conservatives, Zhdanov said, were unwitting friends of communism because their reactionary policies played into communist hands.

For some time the communists have been religiously following this policy in Europe—which was why Nicolai Petkoff, Bulgarian peasant leader, was bumped off; also why 30,000 other Bulgarian socialists were executed.

But in recent months, this policy has dropped in the U. S. A.—with Henry Wallace's third party cracking the whip.

The Zhdanov policy apparently was behind the ultimatum recently served on two conscientious liberal members of Congress from California—Mrs. Helen Gahagan Douglas and Chet Holifield—that they must tow the Wallace 3rd-party line or face defeat. C. B. Beane, Baldwin, chief campaign manager for Wallace, notified these two able members of Congress that the jig was up politically unless they voted against the Marshall Plan and went down the line for other communist policies.

And since the Wallace third party can pull enough votes away from Douglas and Holifield to elect a republican, this ultimatum meant almost certain political death.

However, Mrs. Douglas and Holifield refused to be intimidated. Like Nicolai Petkoff, who was hanged in Bulgaria, they will probably be hanged politically by the Wallacettes. But they are not surrendering.

WIPING OUT PAPERS The same Zhdanov policy of wiping out non-communist liberals was followed recently when the newspaper guild refused to permit Clinton McKinnon, San Diego publisher, to take over the dying news-magazine PM. McKinnon wanted 90 days after he took over PM in which to try out PM reporters, with the privilege of firing any who didn't make the grade. But PM's guild unit, which is communist-dominated, decided it would rather see PM fold.

This is the second case where a liberal non-communist newspaper has been undermined by the guild—the other being the now defunct Philadelphia Record.

LABOR PROTESTS Organized labor did some loud protesting this week as the labor department's appropriation bill, mangled by Representative John Taber in the House, limped into the Senate Appropriations committee.

Both AFL and CIO spokesmen are demanding that the Senate reject Taber's meat-act "economy," which would destroy vital functions of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, eliminate veterans' re-employment activities and slash the labor department's over-all budget to \$12,498,200. This is virtually one-fourth less than the budget bureau says is needed for the next fiscal year.

For years the BLS reports on industrial production, earnings, employment, industrial accidents, home construction, etc., have proved highly valuable to management as well as labor in planning for the future. The Federal and state governments and congressional committees also have depended on bureau services for guidance in economic planning.

In fact, the Bureau of Labor Statistics is the only Federal agency turning out this factual information. Yet Taber cut the bureau's appropriation from \$5,389,000, approved by the budget director, to \$2,500,000 which means that much of this important work would have to be abandoned or greatly curtailed unless the Senate rules otherwise.

Taber, chairman of the House Appropriations committee, also wiped out the department's bureau of veterans' re-employment rights, which safeguards veterans' jobs guaranteed under the G. I. Bill of Rights.

Note—Referring to the \$4,073,000 being spent by the Bureau of Labor Statistics in the current fiscal year, Representative Mike Monroney of Oklahoma inquired during House debate: "Is not this factual information worth \$4,000,000 a year to a country whose two-hundred-billion-dollar economy in these troubled times must have some accurate gauge to know exactly what is going on?"

Mud On The Waters

My idea of an excellent way to prevent solution of a grave social and economic problem is advanced in a sheet of printed matter which has found its way here from the traditional political pepper patch listed on the map as New Orleans.

Some element of merit may be lurking in the basic thought behind the "movement" but if so, it is hopelessly camouflaged by a manner of presentation that appears closely related to Nazism. This is apparent in its caption proclaiming: "For White men and Women Everywhere" in heavy black type.

The avowed purpose is to gather sufficient following to promote a national political convention "below the Mason-Dixon line." Reference is made to such political leaders as Texas Gov. Beauford Jester, who, the writer declared, "founded the first warning that the South and good Democrats everywhere would not forever give blind obedience to renegade, false and Negro Democrats," and Gov. Fielding Wright and Senator James Eastland of Mississippi, who expressed fear that "we would soon be completely governed by a collection of 'Mongrels'."

It is doubtful that the three

gentlemen named feel that it is a desirable accomplishment to have their names linked with such propaganda. Not that they wouldn't be highly elated if a Democratic convention should be held "below the Mason-Dixon line," since most Southerners feel that we are given the run around all too often on such matters, and I heartily agree. But some statements in this "white paper" may be hard for even some of the most dyed-in-the-wool Southerners to swallow.

The clincher appears near the bottom of the page, where the writer exclaims, "If you are tired of the threat of the FEPC—sick of the Wallace, Hannegans, McGraths and Peppers—wary of CIO and the Reds who want to MARRY us into the WILLING ARMS of the Negro. You can now do something about it before it is too late!" If that refers to inter-racial marriages, it could be interpreted to mean that the writer believes that hosts of Southerners, Negroes and whites, are ready to rush together to the altar now and are prevented from doing so only by "Jim Crow" laws. If so, the general concept of racial relations in the South is exactly opposite actual conditions.—WACIL McNAIR.

Flashy Final Exams

WASHINGTON.—The flashy little man with the flashy big diamond threw open the door to one of the swankier dining rooms in a Washington hotel.

Here, in a setting usually reserved for fun, frivolity and foolishness, sat a group of determined looking men and women. Nearly all were wearing well-fitted diamonds.

Nearly all were peering through their dichroscopes, polariscopes, refractometers or diamondscopes.

The American gem society was holding its annual final exams. The first delegate I bumped into was Everett C. Hardy of Boston. He said the society has around 1,250 members, and that this examination always highlights its conventions.

"You'd never guess it," he said, "but there are some people who can't even tell a green tourmaline from an emerald."

"No!" I said, incredulous.

"Yes," said Hardy. "See that man there, the one looking through the dichroscope. He's trying to resolve an inclusion in

the stone. He's searching for a cleavage, a speck, a cloud, a color band, a—"

In other words, a flaw. Those using the other high-lutin' contraptions were on similar hunts, searching for clues that would help to identify the stones.

Is the examination tough? "Tough?" echoes H. Paul Juergens of Chicago. "Only 150 persons have passed our highest test and become a certified gemologist."

Juergens didn't want to offend anyone. But he said the oldtime jeweler—who poked a magnifying glass in one eye to diagnose a gem—made a lot of errors.

"He had to work without modern instruments," Juergens explained. "And he tended to identify everything by color."

"If it was red, it was a ruby. If it was colorless, it was quartz. Actually stones must be identified by mineral, not color." Jewelry used during this conversation, he said, was worth \$250,000. No, they weren't giving away any free samples.

It was on this disappointing note that I left.

I don't have any serious exception to take. Solitaire is seldom wrong.

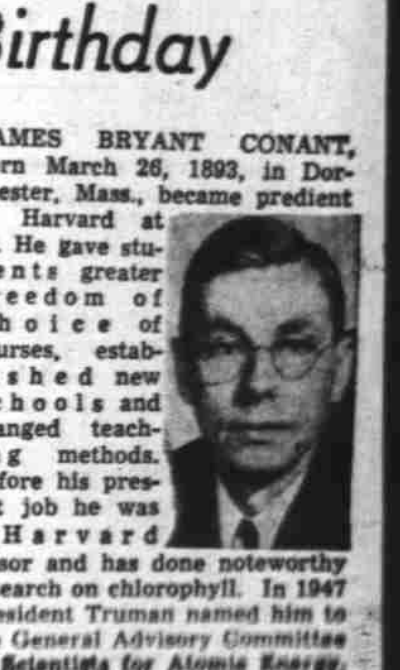

Probe Promised In U.S. War Surplus Sent To Russians

WASHINGTON, March 26. (P)—An early House investigation was promised today in the disappearance of U. S. war surplus "behind the iron curtain."

Chairman Ritzley (R-Okla.) of a House expenditures sub-committee, said disclosures of recent shipment of U. S. warplane engines to Russia and Poland emphasize the need for checking on the fate of vastly greater U. S. surpluses abroad.

"If the traders over there are as ambitious as some of ours have been, there's no telling how much may have been sold to Russia and

her satellites," he said. Meanwhile Congress received Administration assurances of a tighter screening of exports to Russia to sift out potential war materials.

Secretary of Defense Forrestal told the Senate armed services committee that he has ordered a foreign trade study and will have a policy statement soon.

And Chairman Shafer (R-Mich.) of a House Armed Services sub-committee said he had been assured by Secretary of Commerce Harriman that his department was clamping down on exports of potential war goods. The commerce department controls licenses for shipments abroad.

Ritzley's group expects a report on war surplus goods when the committee meets again early next week, or the week after.

Ritzley said he has asked the foreign liquidation commission for a full accounting of the distribution and present whereabouts of surplus U. S. war supplies which were sold to foreign countries.

"Some of those countries have since gone behind the iron curtain," he said. "Czechoslovakia is one of them. And the Czechs got a fabulous amount from us before the Russians moved in—something over a billion dollars, I believe."

Ritzley said committee investigators also are checking into:

1. The War Assets Administration's promise last November that some \$20,000,000 worth of lend-lease material originally earmarked for Russia would not go to the Soviets.

2. Reports that "a new batch of

U. S. airplanes and engines is being sold world-wide."

3. Indications that "a tremendous amount of scrap may have fallen into the wrong hands."

4. Activities of the Moore-McCormack steamship lines in shipping materials from this country to Russia.

In New York, Commodore Robert C. Lee, executive vice president of the shipping line said the firm had "the consent of the United States government to serve as shipping agent for Russian freight vessels."

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SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Story Of Eternal Life

The International Uniform Lesson on the above topic for March 28 is John 21:1-14; Colossians 3:1-4, 12-17; I John 5:11, 12.

IN THESE troubled times, when the Soviet Union is extending its rule over more and more formerly free nations, using suppressive measures to all who do not submit to its ideology, we are reminded again and again of the time of Jesus, when to confess to being a Christian was to invite persecution.

In the Holy Land, too, where the Lord lived, died and rose again, at this Easter time there is bitterness and strife, as the Jewish people battle for a homeland in the country that once was theirs.

After His resurrection, Jesus had appeared twice to His disciples. Now He appears to them again on the beach at the Sea of Tiberias (or Galilee). It happened in this wise: Simon, Peter, Thomas, Nathaniel, the two sons of Zebedee, and two other disciples, were together. Peter said he was going fishing, and so all said they would go too. They boarded a small fishing ship and fished all night, without catching a fish.

When morning came they were near the shore and saw a man on the beach. It was Jesus Christ, but they knew Him not. He called to them, "Children, have ye any meat?" or as we would say, "Have you caught anything?" They answered, No.

"And He said unto them, Cast the net on the right side of the ship, and ye shall find. They cast therefore and now they were not able to draw it for the multitude of fishes."

John, the beloved disciple, first recognized Jesus and said to Peter, "It is the Lord." When Simon Peter heard this he threw himself into the sea, presumably to swim or wade ashore to meet the Master. The others came in the little ship dragging the net with the fishes.

When they came to land they saw there was a fire on the beach and fish laid thereon, and bread. Jesus told them to bring the fish they had caught. Peter drew the net to land full of "great fishes," 153 of them, but even with so many the net had not broken.

Jesus said to them, "Come and dine," and none of the disciples dared ask Him, "Who art Thou?" knowing it was the Lord.

Jesus took bread and gave it to them, and also fish. And this was the third time the Risen Lord had shown Himself after His resurrection.

At first thought it might seem strange that Jesus should address these men, many of whom were older than He, as "Children," but it was a sweet, affectionate way of greeting those who had for so long been His constant companions.

After these appearances of Jesus, and after He had left them and gone to His Father, they preached His gospel everywhere, without fear and with great success. He had gone, but His spirit was with them, and they would one day share His glory. Whether death came to them by martyrdom or naturally, their future was sure and they were not afraid.

In his letter to the Colossians, Paul pleads with them to look up to things above, not down on things of the earth. "If ye then be risen

Gas Executive Says Companies Should Develop Butane Fields

GALVESTON, March 26. (P)—Butane and propane petroleum gas offer great opportunities to natural gas companies for public service and business expansion, a Texas gas company executive said here today.

Chester L. May, Dallas, vice-president of the Lone Star gas company, told the Southern Gas association convention that "probably no other home service business

ever has grown with the startling rapidity surrounding butane."

"This tremendous increase in the number of liquefied petroleum gas users is evidenced by the fact that during 1947 the amount of fuel used for domestic purposes was 32 per cent above the previous year and over 17 times the amount used in 1938," May said.

Other figures cited indicate that 4,500,000 homes were using propane or butane last year, the figure being equivalent to approximately one-fifth of all homes in the United States using gas.

May attributed the acute shortage of butane in recent months to inadequate storage capacities of facilities owned by users and distributors.

"Our experience shows the average residential user must have storage provided in an amount of 500 gallons to carry him through the winter months in order to prevent peak demands that cannot be met by refiners, transportation and delivery equipment," May said.

He observed, however, that "tens of thousands of tanks far too small for the average customer's needs have been installed in homes and then the homes completely saturated with gas appliances."

The Dallas executive said it would be a sound business investment as well as an act of public service for natural gas companies to undertake development of the propane and butane fields and "accept the responsibility for continuous and dependable service."

He recommended that rural areas on the fringes of populated areas be serviced with equipment that could be converted easily to natural gas following growth of nearby cities.

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Thirteen Teams Entered In Odessa Track Meet

Steers Shoot For 3 Records

Thirteen teams, including defending champion Amarillo, will compete in the fifth annual Sand Hills relays at Odessa Saturday.

Coach John Whinnery of the Amarillo team has notified Relay officials he is bringing 18 men to the Odessa show. The Sandies scored 40 1/2 points last year to nose out Odessa by 1-4 of a point for team honors.

Coach Mule Stockton of Big Spring plans to take about 20 boys to the show. The Longhorns appear especially strong in the distance races and the mile relay. They set new marks in the mile relay, the two-mile relay and the 880-yard run last week at Brady.

They are afforded an excellent chance at establishing new standards in the 880, mile relay and the mile run this time out.

Leon Lepard, the Steer's 880-yard ace, is running better than ever. If he equals his time of 2:03 in the Brady meet last week, he'll shatter the Odessa mark.

James Fannin appears to be a good bet in the mile run—he's bettered the record on one occasion while the Steer combination of R. H. Carter, Delmar Turner, Jim Bill Little and Leon Lepard is expected to set up a new standard in the mile relay.

Outside of that, Turner and Ike Robb may pick up a few points in the weights. Lepard is a 440-yard threat. Harold Berry will be competing in the pole vault. The same Lepard goes in the broad jump while Moe Madison will compete in the sprints.

Other teams entering the games are Lubbock, Crane, Odessa, Lubbock, Andrews, Midland, Seminole, McCamey, Pecos, Lamesa, Monahans and Kermit.

Meet officials expect at least half a dozen records to go by the boards.

The life expectancy of baseball managers in Texas is one year—or less.

Twenty-six of the 34 clubs which operated in five leagues last year are going to open the 1948 season under new management.

This wholesale turnover indicates baseball in Texas is going to follow a pattern cut in 1947. Then it was funnier, bigger and more profitable than ever before.

The Big State league paces the new deal. Seven of the eight teams will sport new pilots.

The Texas league has only one "new" manager. Three of the clubs just traded bosses.

The Class C West Texas-New Mexico league has five new managers, the Class C Lone Star has six, and the Class D Longhorn four. This does not count the two new teams added to the latter loop.

The Texas league switch sent Gus Mancuso from Tulsa to San Antonio; Jimmy Adair from San Antonio to Dallas by way of Savannah, Ga., and Al Vincent from Dallas to Tulsa. Chick Autry replaced Golden Holt at Beaumont.

Guy Sturdy, who started as Sherman-Denison's manager last year is going to pilot Henderson in the Lone Star league. Another ex-Big State pilot in this loop is Harry Davis at Marshall.

Greenville, under Davis, lost the pennant in a one-game playoff with Texarkana and bowed out of the Shughnessy playoff to Wichita Falls.

Wichita Falls is to be managed by Mark Carroll, who finished last season as manager at San Antonio.

Bill Atwood, who served briefly at Sherman-Denison last year, will be at Ballinger this season, replacing Buddy Hancken. Hancken jumps from the Longhorn league to Greenville.

Jess Landrum, Longview's starting manager in '47, is slated to manage Bryan in the Lone Star league this season.

Buck Fausett quit Albuquerque in the West Texas-New Mexico league to take over at Amarillo in the same loop.

Lloyd Rigby, manager of Paris last year, will be at Vernon in the Longhorn league this season.

Homer Peel, listed as business manager of Greenville at the opening of the '47 season, is down to manage Paris.

Hank Oana, Dallas pitcher and pinchhitter, replaces Beau Bell as manager of the Austin Pioneers in the Big State.

The veteran Babe Peebles is coming out of retirement to pilot Gainesville in the Class B loop.

Along with the shift in managers other changes have taken place in the Texas baseball picture.

The Waco Dons are now the Pirates and affiliated with Pittsburgh.

Austin, Lubbock and Odessa have hooked up with Dallas.

Paris has discarded the name Red Peppers for Rockets.

One of the few clubs which will have the same setup as last year is Midland in the Longhorn league. There's little chance it will change.

The business manager wouldn't fire the manager, because Harold Webb is her husband. He's also president of the club.

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STATEWIDE MOVE PLANNED

Deaf Expected To Lobby Change In School Control

(First of two stories—ED) ... AUSTIN, March 26.—Members of the next Legislature may find their most persistent lobbying group one which will be strangely silent: The organized deaf people of Texas.

Their purpose will be to renew their perennial battle for removal of the State School for the Deaf from the authority of the State Board of Control, and placed under the state department or education or state board of education.

However, the action planned for next winter promises to be more than just another phase in a continuing war. Led by the Texas Association for the Deaf, a statewide movement is being carefully planned. Heretofore, their efforts have been somewhat haphazard. While the deaf are divided into several factions as to how the school should be operated, there is unity on the objective of removing the school from the Board of Control. Concentrating on that objective, the TAD also will concentrate on the possibility of another executive veto. The 50th Legislature passed

their bill; the governor vetoed it. In the next session, legislators will be asked to pass the bill early in the session, in order that another veto might be reviewed by the legislature itself.

The TAD spokesman feel that Governor Jester has not adequately explained his veto of their bill. Last October, the governor said that he had been informed that the bill had been "engineered" by a "disgruntled employee who had been let out of the school." Presumably this reference could have been to W. R. Wright of Huntsville, former legislator and former superintendent of the school. Wright was employed by the TAD. He resigned his superintendency some time prior to his employment.

This possibility of a veto also is behind the decision of the TAD to put their campaign on a statewide basis between now and next January. This campaign is proposed to explain their problems and suggest their remedies. The TAD leaders say they do not want to make a political issue out of their campaign. But they assert that they are compelled to fight for their objectives.

Who are the deaf lobbyists? The Texas Association of the Deaf is the most active group. It is headed by Louis B. Orrill of Dallas, employed by a major oil company in a responsible capacity. Much of the work will be done by the Austin chapter which is headed by a linotype operator and former newspaper publisher, Bill Lucas. Lucas is also chairman of the state group's education committee.

This group comprises many of the former students of the school. The only other group of any consequence is the lately-formed Austin Parent-Teacher group. All Austin residents, many of them moved to Austin in order that their children might attend the only available state school.

There are obstacles to these parents taking an active part in the campaign. The local president, Henry G. Easley, says they have no desire to antagonize the school's administrators for fear of interference with their children's education. They also would be reluctant to speak for parents outside of Austin who are not members of the group.

In addition to these two organized groups, numerous individuals have become interested in the school as a result of the recent troubles which culminated in the board of control's investigation. In this category are some educators and social workers; some ministers; and a group of former teachers and other employees at the school.

The TAD nurses the hope that the state administration may not oppose their bill this time—the board of control has numerous other duties, and the Deaf School has brought it nothing but grief over a period of several years.

Fog Horn Clancy Gains Rodeo Fame

TULSA, Okla., March 27. (U)—Fog Horn Clancy has gained a degree of fame by shooting off his mouth. Since the turn of the century, he's been announcing, judging and recording rodeos all over the land. He goes back to the days when there were no public address systems and no self-respecting, full-lunged announcer would be caught with a megaphone.

Fog Horn acquired his name when his voice had to dominate the

other noises at New York's Madison Square Garden, Cheyenne, Pendleton, Dewey, Hutchinson and other big rodeos.

His biggest crowd addressed by voice, he says, was 86,000 at Sheephead Bay, N. Y. Another time he had to make himself heard by 30,000 scattered around half a mile track at Dewey, Okla.

"It was simple," says Clancy. "I made a careful study of what makes sound travel. Then I just take a big breath and let 'er go."

Here to help judge and keep statistics on a Livestock Exposition and Rodeo, Fog Horn at 65 is quieter now. The voice that once rattled windows, is subdued since he learned it was rough on loud speaker tubes.

His announcing is only part-time, most of it on little known bits of rodeo history, so that the press and spectators may have a better understanding of what's happening. "Like, for instance," he recalls, "the fact bulldogging was invented by a Texas cowboy named Bill Pickett, back in 1903. He would leap from his horse, grab a steer by the horns, then bite it on the lower lip—just like a bulldog—and hang on till the critter toppled."

Clancy—his real name is Frederick Melton but he doesn't even sign checks that way any more—has turned literary in recent years. He shyly acknowledges he wrote an encyclopedia history of rodeos. He is also founder of the Rodeo Fans of America and is its "corral foreman," equivalent of president. He publishes the annual "rodeo history and records" reference book.

"Folks may not realize it," he rumbles, "but the rodeo is the second biggest sport in America today. It draws more people than any other event in Madison Square Garden."

Clancy, a native of Phoenix, Ala., came west early in his life. He has been identified with the area ever since, although he now calls home a ranch in southern New

Urges Prayer, Preparedness Against War

AUSTIN, March 26. (U)—Preparedness and prayer to avert World War III are advised by Rep. Lyndon Johnson (D-Tex.).

In a statewide radio address last night the senior Texas member of the House Armed Services committee warned:

"Stalin is marching as Hitler marched—repeating chapter by chapter, verse by verse. Each day the iron curtain hides a larger portion of the world. If we continue to do nothing, one day we'll wake up in a world in which the western hemisphere is a lonely island, and all the rest of mankind behind the iron curtain."

Johnson, frequently mentioned as a possible candidate for the U. S. Senate, said "this is no time for hysteria, nor fright, nor politics. It is time to prepare to keep out of World War III."

He promised full support of the Marshall plan, the world's greatest air force, selective service, and universal military training as the recommended preparations to keep out of war.

"What happens to our country must be decided in homes across the nation, like yours and mine," he said. "There is a time to keep silence and a time to speak. The time for Americans to speak is here."

Johnson's radio time was donated as a non-political public service.
