Rangers Seize McDonald's Records

WASHINGTON By Ray Tucker

Duel—

Hugh Johnson cannot bear to quit the Washington scene where he thundered and glared as the curator of the Blue Eagle. He has made several moves to cut back into the national picture, though he denies it.

His latest was to ask support for appointment to the job of counsel in the A. T. and T. investigation. Friends thought it significant that he did not seek the post until Donald Richberg was favorably mentioned for it. Mr. Johnson privately accuses Richberg of stabbing him in the back when the two controlled NRA policies. On the night the headlines proposed Mr. Richberg for this important inquiry General Johnson got busy on his own behalf.

Mr. Roosevelt's private advisers have begged him to get rid of both men. Both are able in particular fields, but their rivalry breeds no good for any man they both serve. The New Deal suffers enough embarrassment from family feuds without perpetuating this duel on its doorstep, according to the President's long-headed friends.

Quarrel—

Secretary Ickes has quietly revised his movement to strip the Department of Agriculture of control of birds, forests, soil erosion and other conservation projects. The quarrel seemed settled long ago, but the relentless Mr. Ickes won't let up. He never does. Mr. Ickes is slowly pushing his bill to transfer the Forestry Service, the Biological Survey and the Soil Erosion Bureau from Agriculture to Interior. In a recent appearance before a Congressional committee he scoffed at certain agricultural activities. He declared that Secretary Wallace and his experts were taking in territory which belonged to him.

Secret reports of the testimony caused consternation at the Department of Agriculture. They hear that Mr. Ickes said their department should become only a "research department" whose chief function should be the distribution of information and seeds to farmers. What bothered the Wallaces most was that Mr. Ickes said the President favored his bill. A serious mixup is in the making.

Excessive—

Wallace's scouts insist that Mr. Ickes has mobilized his famed OGPU in this quarrel. They say they have discovered at least one instance where Louis Glavis used his agents to check up on anti-Ickes activities by the agricultural boys. There have been similar but unproved reports that the Secretary of the Interior keeps a sharp eye on some of his colleagues.

Mr. Wallace may give Mr. Ickes a harder battle than some of the more swash-buckling figures Harold has downed. The Secretary of (Continued On Page 5)

Department Being Probed By Committee

McDonald Says He Welcomes Action Of Rangers

AUSTIN (AP)—Texas rangers, acting under orders of a legislative investigating committee, Tuesday had charge of records of the state department of agriculture. J. E. McDonald, commissioner of agriculture, said Ranger Fred Holland came to his office Monday night, accompanied by Representative E. E. Hunter, Cleburne, and two representatives for the state auditor, and assumed charge of records.

McDonald, whose official conduct is under investigation by the house committee, said he welcomed action of the rangers, and that he had nothing to conceal and they might "stay until Christmas" if they wished.

TIENTSIN, (AP)—Japanese military officials announced tonight Sino-Japanese crisis in North China had "reached the stage of amicable negotiation, mainly through dismissal of General Yung Chen-Yuan, Governor of Chahar province Tuesday.

S. P. Trains On T-P Tracks

Six Southern Pacific trains are using the Texas and Pacific lines every day between Fort Worth and Sierra Blanca, due to a washout Thursday of a bridge on Devils River, half way between Del Rio and Comstock. Repairs of the bridge are to take from ten days to two weeks.

Passengers from El Paso to San Antonio by train have to go by way of Fort Worth. The Southern Pacific is sending two regular passenger trains and an average of four freight trains over the T. & P. lines. This will not affect the T. & P. schedule, although more trains than usual are using the lines.

A number of extra men are getting additional work as a result of the Southern Pacific trains using the T&P tracks. A conductor and engineer is placed on each train, to pilot them over the tracks.

New NRA Examines Labor Standards

WASHINGTON, (AP)—President Roosevelt Tuesday directed the new NRA to examine closely any changes occurring in labor standards or fair trade practices following abolition of codes.

He proposed this be done under supervision of an impartial committee including a representative of management, representative of labor and members designated by the department of commerce and labor.

The purpose is gathering and publication of reliable information and to counteract any propaganda from private sources which may be designed to promote special interests.

Joe Kuykendall, for seven years manager of the Radford Grocery company, wholesalers, in Big Spring, has tendered his resignation, effective June 18th. He has been succeeded by L. W. Beavers, for five years manager of the Brownwood house of the same company. Mr. Beavers has arrived in the city, and already assumed his new position. He will move his family here later.

Mr. Kuykendall, who has been identified with the Radford Grocery company for some ten or twelve years as manager of several branch houses, announced Tuesday that he had purchased the interest of C. A. Burrus in the Burrus grocery at Ninth and Main streets in this city. He will join with H. C. Burrus in the operation of this business.

Mr. Kuykendall said Tuesday he would be in Abilene for a few days on business before becoming actively identified with the grocery business here. He formerly was associated with Mc. Burrus in the grocery business at Slaton, Texas.

Federal Savings & Loan Ass'n Choose Officers Monday

Organization of the First Federal Savings & Loan association was completed here Monday when more than the needed \$5,000 capital stock was paid in.

Dr. M. H. Bennett was elected president of the new institution. Other officers included W. W. Inkman, vice-president; J. B. Collins, secretary-treasurer; T. J. Coffey, director-attorney; and W. B. Currie, director.

Monday afternoon \$5,200 had been paid in and the amount had swelled to approximately \$6,000 Tuesday morning.

Sum Strauss, field representative of the Federal Home Loan Bank board, Washington, assisted in the organization and presented a charter to the local association.

The federal government will take out stock in the ratio of \$3 to \$1 subscribed locally. The association is to be subject to same regulations as national banks.

Direction of the institution's affairs will be in the hands of local officers, headed by the directors chosen Monday. One director is named for a period of three years,

New Cabinet Is Formed In Mexico City

Calles Leaves Capitol By Plane For Sinaloa Ranch

MEXICO, D. F. (AP)—General Plutarco Elias Calles, "Iron man of Mexico," flew north into voluntary political retirement Tuesday, but judging from the crowd which gathered at the airport to see him off, he will have plenty of influential friends to aid him when and if he decides to return.

The former president flew to his Sinaloa ranch, leaving President Lázaro Cárdenas in power with a new cabinet appointed Monday night.

The cabinet is made up of personal friends of Cardenas and former President Porfirio Gil, head of the national revolutionary party. Gil was present to see Calles take off.

Sunken Graves Are Refilled

Several score graves which sank after a deluge swept the cemetery Thursday have been refilled through cooperation of the county commissioners court and the cemetery association.

Under the direction of Jim Winslow, commissioner of precinct No. 3, a county truck was put on Saturday afternoon and kept engaged until Tuesday noon hauling in fresh dirt to rebuild mounds.

The association hired men to do the labor in the cemetery.

Winslow took an active part in the repair work, personally supervising part of the hauling and dumping.

The association announced that as soon as spring rains had apparently ceased, it intended to instigate a general clean up campaign to rid the burying ground of a rank weed growth and refuse.

A two foot wall of water which raked the cemetery Thursday overturned many headstones, washed away surplus dirt on new mounds and caused many to sink.

Eleven Guards Held Hostage Under Ground

Convicts Hold Out Definitely Against Authorities To End Strike

LANSING, Mich. (AP)—Three hundred and eighty sullen convicts mutinied in the depths of the Lansing penitentiary coal mine here Tuesday, made hostages of eleven guards, and definitely held out against prison authorities who sought to end the strike.

The mutineers virtually cut off all communication with the surface.

Warden Lacey Simpson said he doubted if the convicts had firearms or weapons other than clubs, rocks and possibly a few knives. Fate of the unnamed guards was unknown, but prison officials expressed belief they would not be harmed seriously.

Included among the hostages was Mine Superintendent Robert Murray, who went down the shaft after the mutiny became known and attempted to negotiate with the miners. Hours after he was still missing.

LANSING, Mich. (AP)—Violence broke out in Lansing prison coal mine Tuesday when a group of convict miners attempted to capture a gun cache manned by five prison officials on the 720-foot level.

The convicts, part of a striking group which held the mine since early Tuesday, were repulsed with gas guns.

Attack on the cage came shortly after Superintendent Robert Murray returned after a four-hour parley with mutineers.

The gun cache, guarding the air shaft and telephone, was the only communication between the mine and the surface.

Naval Treaty Agreed Upon

Germany And Great Britain Reach Understanding As To Strength

LONDON, (AP)—Final agreement between Germany and Great Britain on all important points of a treaty to maintain Germany's navy at 35 per cent of British naval strength was officially announced Tuesday.

It was stated this ratio "should in general apply to each category. It was understood Germany would be allowed some latitude in building submarines, because of French and Italian undersea fleets, which are larger than British.

LONDON, (U.P.)—Lawson Little, 1934 champion, Bobby Jones as major demo of the world's amateur golfers, will need all his great skill and every one of his 22 clubs to win the British open at Muirfield, next objective in his phenomenal two-year control.

The 72-hole grind over Scotland's bleakest links on the fifth of Perth will find the California bomber opposed to the world's leading professional star, including Henry Cotton and Gene Sarazen, on a course that hitherto has proved far too tough for any amateur to disturb the ranks of the money players.

The last British open played at Muirfield, in 1925, was won by Walter Hagen with a four-round total of 292. He had a margin of six strokes over the runner-up, Johnny Farrell. Cyril Tolley won the amateur medal with a score of 312, or average of 75 strokes to the round.

The two men are not strangers, their paths having crossed years ago, but each man has learned enough of the other's style not to fall victim to the game's common pranks.

The Marvel, who speaks English better than the Illinois flash, although he hails from Africa, has emerged victorious in both his starts here and will be the favorite.

Felix's first and only start here was unimpressive, but he showed an ability to keep his shoulders off the mat and use his fists to the best advantage. Those same fists were the Marvel's only little trouble tonight if the referee does not make the rules too closely.

Bob Castle, who escaped from Kansas before the dust storm hit, but who evidently brought something worse along with him, will meet "Red" Michael in the semi-final. Castle was slated to meet the Marvel on last week's card but the rain probably saved him from the count.

Michael, a West Texas product, whose football prowess in Panama marked him for a wrestling find, has compiled a good record in neighboring cities, but is comparatively unknown here. The promoter lined him up against Castle several months ago but an injury forced him out and rain has stopped his appearances here the past two weeks.

Buddy Harrison, of Littlefield, Texas will make his initial appearance here by taking on SMU's Art Belcher in a special event. Belcher formerly was a Mustang instructor, and had the advantage of learning the tricks of the trade under Dutch Mantell.

Both acts are new to the Big Spring fans.

Floyd 'Arky' Vaughn Sets Batting Pace

Pirate Rates As Leading Short Fielder In National Loop

With close to a third of the National league schedule played, Floyd "Arky" Vaughn, Pittsburgh's great shortstop, is setting the pace in practically every batting statistic on record. In this, his fourth season in a Pirate uniform, he has established himself as the leading short fielder in the National league as well as a worthy successor to the mantle once worn by the great Honus Wagner in Pittsburgh.

The Pirates' youngster has improved in every department of play at short and this can be traced directly to the able coaching of the immortal Honus who as a member of the Pirate staff has worked hard to develop Vaughn's skill. Wagner's presence has been a short cut to the top for the 23-year-old star for if anyone knows all the answers when it comes to playing the short field properly, it should be old Honus himself.

Nature hasn't blessed Vaughn with the huge hands that smothered potential hits for Wagner but he has no kick coming for he tips the scales at 175 pounds and stands 5 feet 10 inches, just big enough to be fast and strong.

PEPPER GOES 23 GAMES
"Pepper" Martin's great batting drive has placed him up where he is getting close enough to threaten the lead Vaughn has in the batting averages. Over a stretch of five weeks, until Cy Blanton stopped his march recently, Martin had managed to hit safely in 23 games and boosted his mark up to .390, close to 75 points higher than his best mark in the last three seasons with the Cardinals.

Martin's spurs at the plate seems to indicate that he has completely recovered from the injuries which plagued him last season. Almost all of last season's scrappy Cardinal third baseman played on his nerve. From time to time Burgess Whitehead filled in at third while Pepper rested but when some added punch was needed at the plate Martin begged Manager Frisch to let him return to his post.

Martin was far from physically fit when the Cardinals made their mad dash down the home stretch to snatch the pennant from the hands of the fading Giants yet he played an important part in that successful drive.

IGNORED PAINFUL ELBOW

The painful, puffed elbow made every move in the field and at the plate agony but Martin would not listen to the advice of the trainer and Frisch who cautioned him that he might be jeopardizing his future. He insisted on playing and did a grand job of it.

"I don't know how in the world Pepper ever played through the world series with that elbow," Frisch said, "his arm was up like a balloon and I was afraid that he might injure himself to the extent that his playing days would be over. After the big series he had two bits of chipped bone removed from his left elbow."

An injury to the same elbow put Martin out of the game for a few days this season but he seems to have recovered from that completely, if one can judge by the way he has been hammering the ball to the far corners of the lot of late.

DUST STORMS IN OTHER LANDS

Spectacular dust storms, such as have been so frequent recently in this country, occur from time to time in many other parts of the world, says the United States Weather Bureau.

One of the most remarkable dustfalls in history resulted from a great storm which raged over the dry steppes of southern Ukraine in 1928, blowing up such dense clouds of dust that day was turned into night. Such events are known on the Russian steppes as "black storms." It is estimated that 15,400,000,000 tons of dirt was swept up from the soil. The great ad part of this was deposited within the Ukraine, but about 2,000,000 tons fell in Rumania and 1,000,000 tons in Poland.

In March 1901 heavy dust storms occurred in the deserts of southern Algeria. A cyclonic storm sucked up dust and deposited it over an area extending as far as 500 miles from the place of origin. Reports from hundreds of observers indicated that 1,800,000 tons of dust fell over Europe, one-third of which fell north of the Alps. On the African coast the deposit was estimated at 150,000,000 tons.

In 1902, a dust storm swept nearly the whole of Australia and the surrounding ocean as far away as New Zealand. At Melbourne, according to one account, "the dust was at times suffocatingly dense and the upper air was so loaded with it that the sun was rarely visible. At many inland towns the darkness produced almost equaled that of the blackest night, and in the houses nothing could be done without lamps or other means of lighting. Added to this were some phenomena of an even more terrifying character. At Bort and in some parts of the Riverina the storm was accompanied by a sort of globular lightning, and 'fireballs' were seen falling on the fields and roads."

Electrical displays in the form of brush discharges (St. Elmo's fire) are not uncommon in connection with our American dust storms.—U. S. Dept. of Agriculture.

HERE THERE IS NO SATURATION POINT.

The Insurance Field observes that it is occasionally said that life insurance has reached the saturation point. But statistics paint a different picture.

Life insurance policies have been purchased by about half the people of this country. Their investment in life insurance totals some \$22,000,000,000. Yet, vast as that figure is, the average individual policy outstanding is for only \$1670—and the average share of life insurance assets per policyholder amounts to only \$364. As

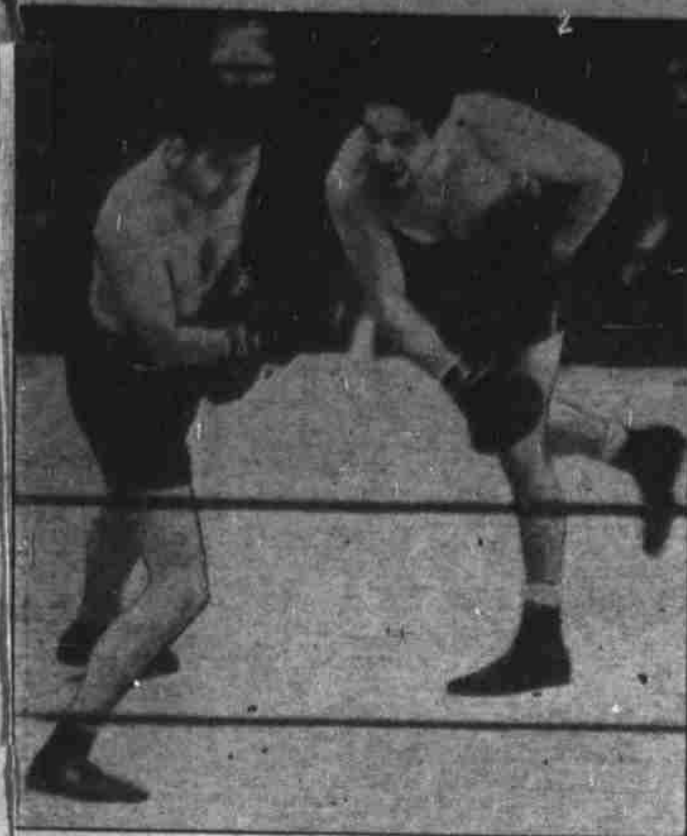

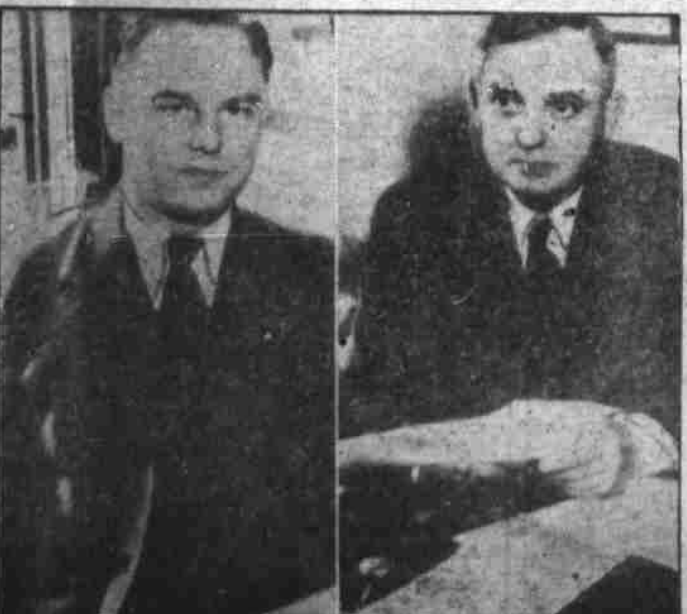

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TEXAS FARMERS FORGE AHEAD ON ADJUSTMENT PROGRAMS

COLLEGE STATION—Farmers of Texas are carrying on adjustment programs regardless of all wild rumors that the recent Supreme court decision endangers AAA and more than 70,000 new contracts signers have shown up this year in the various commodities, according to George E. Adams, assistant state agent of the Texas Extension Service.

Adams reported that he traveled through 26 counties last week, including the lower Rio Grande Valley and in all of them the farmers are going ahead with the programs. Confirming them in their confidence, Secretary Wallace issued the following statement a few days ago: "In cooperation with the leaders of congress, amendments to the Agricultural Adjustment Act are being perfected which are intended to bring the act's provisions in line with the Schechter case decision and also to safeguard the farmers' voluntary adjustment program on basic commodities."

"These voluntary adjustment programs were not in the path of the Schechter case decision, and in no event could there be any question that it wants to or not."

Vetoed—Reports are current in informed quarters that patronage grievances will be a bigger factor in 1936 political fortunes than is generally suspected. The senate vote to require its own confirmation of all federal appointees who get \$4000 and up is rated a significant star in the White House for its lack of consideration for senators' feelings in picking jobholders.

Nor is the discontent confined to the senate. The New York City Democracy is seething with irritation. Farley's leadership was accepted on the understanding that this would be rewarded. It hasn't been—and plenty of the boys are ready to tell FDR and Farley to go jump in the river. Jim hasn't said so—but some sources maintain it isn't his fault—that his efforts to carry out his bargain have been vetoed from above.

Cagy—Don't think that Cuba is back to normal because Mendetta announces an end of martial law, restoration of the constitution and an election this coming winter. That's just a gesture to keep the rebel elements quiet during the period of greatest economic stagnation. Sugar grinding is over until December. That means more people cut of jobs and revolution easier to incite unless its leaders have something to look forward to. Mendetta has cagily given them something to occupy their minds.

Sidelights—The Japanese government is up to date. It has a brain trust—the new Cabinet Inquiry commission. The British iron and steel business is doing better than at any time since the war.

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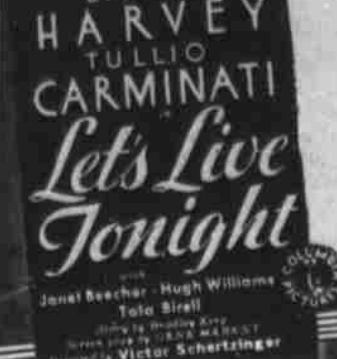

"Other provisions of the new act which are of public importance are those which—

(2) Establish a uniform method by which the Corporation may handle tax burdens represented by general and special tax levies, in all the states.

(3) Eliminate the provision under which the Corporation has taken over home mortgages or other liens held by institutions which were in liquidation, where the mortgagor was not necessarily in involuntary default.

(4) Provide that no person shall be allowed to act as appraiser for the Corporation if employed by any company holding a loan on the property or if interested in any way in the subject matter of the loan."

Legislation Affecting Home Owners' Loan Relief Of Home Loan Distress

WASHINGTON — The Federal Home Loan Bank Board today issued the following statement to make clear the public significance of those sections of the new home mortgage relief act signed recently by President Roosevelt, which affect the refinancing of distressed urban home mortgages by the Home Owners' Loan Corporation:

"The most important feature of this amending act, as far as the Home Owners' Loan Corporation is concerned, increases the authorized bond issue of the HOLC from \$2,000,000,000 to \$4,750,000,000 in order to provide for applications already filed, and for new applications which must be filed within 30 days after the new act takes effect, and for other purposes. New applications will be strictly confined to home owners who are clearly in distress and threatened with foreclosure, and must be filed by midnight, June 27th.

"This increase of \$1,750,000,000 in authorization of bonds issued by the HOLC is considered sufficient both to take care of the remaining eligible cases of home loan distress which are beyond the scope of earlier authorizations, and to provide \$300,000,000 for direct investment by the Federal Home Loan Board in private home-financing institutions, or in bonds, notes or debentures of the Federal Home Loan Banks, as authorized by another section of the Act.

"A second important amendment of the new measure emphasizes the criminal sections of earlier legislation by providing penalties for misrepresentation and other specific offenses on the part of persons dealing either with the Corporation or with home owners who have applied for Corporation loans.

"Another provision of this Act sets forth that, effective 90 days from enactment, no person shall be appointed or retained as a salaried officer, employee, agent or attorney in any regional or state office of the Home Owners' Loan Corporation who is at the same time an officer or director of any firm, corporation or association engaged in lending money on real estate. The same section prohibits the ap-

pointment or retention, by any state or district office of the Corporation, of any person who was not a bona fide resident of the state served by such office for at least one year immediately preceding the date of his appointment.

"Other provisions of the new act which are of public importance are those which—

(1) Broaden the powers of the Corporation to permit it to make loans on real estate on which there is more than one dwelling, serving not more than four families, provided that such real estate include property used wholly or in part by the owner as his own home or homestead, and have a total value not exceeding \$20,000.
