

House Votes Draft, With 60-Day Delay

City Schools Start A New Term Monday

Instructions On Registrations Given By H. S. Principal

It's a new year, as far as school-age youngsters of Big Spring are concerned, and Monday morning brings the start of another term of work for the local educational system.

Students have been called to meet in their respective classrooms at 9:30 a. m.—but not before, since faculty members will be in the first conference of the year, beginning at 7:30 a. m., and may be together for two hours, said Supt. W. C. Blankenship.

Classes are due to go immediately into a regular schedule of work following distribution of books.

Specific instructions for high school students came Saturday from Principal J. A. Coffey, who suggested that this information be

clipped from The Herald for use as a memorandum.

All high school students who were in Big Spring high last year are to report at 9:30 a. m. Monday to the same guidance teacher or room as last semester, with the following exceptions: those in room 303 report to 203; those in 203 report to 318; those in 109 last year report to 206; those in 119 report to 109; those in 206, 310 and 316 last year see the bulletin board for new assignments. Freshmen who were in the seventh grade last year report as follows: from 110 to 308; from 121 to 209; from 108 to 109; from 111 to 302; from 114 to 303; from 13 to 119; from 115 to 210.

Those who were in the sixth grade last year and are now in the seventh are to report in the balcony of the gymnasium at 9:30 for instructions as to registration.

Any new students in the high school who have not registered, Coffey said, will have to wait until Tuesday morning. The entire

Texas Demos Meet Monday

MINERAL WELLS, Sept. 7 (AP)—Texas democrats will head toward Mineral Wells tomorrow for their biennial chime of drafting a platform and reorganizing the state party machinery.

Advance indications were that the state convention would be reasonably harmonious—in sharp contrast to the one at Beaumont two years ago and the presidential nominating affair at Waco this spring.

Despite outward signs of harmony, one or more squabbles were considered possible on Willie McDonald's attitude of Agricul- ture Commissioner J. E. McDon- ald toward the presidential race, or platform declarations.

State Democratic Chairman E. B. Germany, who is slated for reelection, said in Dallas today that he anticipated no discord.

"I think it would be inadvisable," he said, "to insult those democrats who are considering voting against President Roose- velt. We should try to convert them and bring 'em back into the fold. We probably can convince some of the error of their ways between now and general election day."

McDonald has aroused the ire of a number of democrats because of his intimation that he might vote for Mr. Willkie.

Germany took the position, however, that democrats were honor bound to support McDonald in November because he was the victor in the primary.

The chairman pointed out further that McDonald has not yet said he will oppose the democratic national ticket.

MAN, WIFE, MOTHER AND BABY VICTIMS; MEXICAN CHARGED

ELDORADO, Sept. 7 (AP)—Emelio Benavides, 29, Mexican half breed ranch hand, was charged here tonight with the murder of Henry Calcoete, 31, his wife, Dardanelia Calcoete, 29, his daughter, Patsy Irene, 2, and his mother, Mrs. Emma Calcoete, 59, were discovered today after neighbors became alarmed at their absence.

Charges had not been filed in the murders of Calcoete's mother, his wife and his two year old daughter.

ELDORADO, Sept. 7 (AP)—Bullets from a 30-30 rifle wiped out the Henry Calcoete household of four near here Thursday. Bodies of Henry Calcoete, 31, his wife, Dardanelia Calcoete, 29, his daughter, Patsy Irene, 2, and his mother, Mrs. Emma Calcoete, 59, were discovered today after neighbors became alarmed at their absence.

Bodies of Calcoete and his mother were found at 1:15 p. m. today in the kitchen of their ranch home 10 miles north of here. His wife and baby were found in a pasture midway between the Calcoete home and Eldorado.

All were killed by shots from a rifle. Officers placed the time of the slayings as Thursday night.

Officers and a hastily formed posse are searching for a 29-year-old Mexican employed at the Calcoete place off and on for the last three years. Last Thursday he went to the Jeff Enochs place adjoining the Calcoete ranch to work. The Enochs family saw him last at about 6 p. m. Thursday. Mr. Enochs' 30-30 rifle is missing and in its place an old 30-30 rifle was found.

Officers surmised that Mr. Calcoete was slain by a shot through the window as he stood eating a watermelon. The back of his head was blown away. Sound of the shot evidently brought the elder Mrs. Calcoete into the kitchen. As she stooped to loosen her son's belt, the assailant went to the front door of the house. Police believe she turned at hearing the killer's noise and he fired, the bullet going through her head and shattering glassware in a cabinet across the room.

Officers believe the murderer then took Calcoete's wife and daughter, leaving in a pickup truck owned by the family. The truck was abandoned about two miles from the ranch. Mrs. Dardanelia Calcoete and her daughter were taken 90 yards from the road on the Early Cathey place where both were slain.

When the first bullet was fired, apparently the child was being held in the arms of her mother, the bullet penetrating Mrs. Calcoete's hand, the daughter's breast and entering the mother's breast the jaw, blowing off part of her face. Another shot was fired point blank at the girl's head as she lay on the ground.

Bodies of the last two were found by Cathey at 4 p. m. after the discovery at the ranch home. Only two guns known to be owned by Calcoete were a small calibre rifle and a shotgun. Both were untouched. However, officers found a new box of .38 calibre bullets belonging to Calcoete but no corresponding gun.

Three dogs kept at the place were unharmed.

The Calcoetes were last seen Thursday about 6 p. m. by Mr. and Mrs. Cathey. The Calcoetes said they were going to San Angelo—Friday, according to the Catheys. When the Catheys went after their mail Friday night, they honked, but getting no answer from the Calcoete home, which is about 200 yards from the highway, they thought the Calcoetes were still in San Angelo.

Bodies of Calcoete and his mother were found by his brother, F. B. Calcoete, who went to the house this afternoon to investigate their absence.

A recommendation that something be done about sanitary conditions at the Howard county jail, and a strong warning that pool halls will not be tolerated came in a special report of the grand jury for the current term of district court, made Friday evening to Judge Cecil Collins.

The grand jurors, in company of District Attorney Martelle McDonald, had visited the jail, and its formal report said that the jail should be made more sanitary for the inmates x x x new bedding should be obtained, and if at all possible more sunlight should be arranged.

Considerable money has been spent on the jail by the commissioners court in recent years, but admittedly much remains to be done to put the old quarters in satisfactory shape.

The jury's report as to pool halls said: "The matter has been brought to our attention that there is being contemplated by certain people the opening of what is known as a pool hall x x x operation of such is a clear violation of the law and all officers of the county are instructed to institute prosecution immediately if anyone attempts to open a pool hall."

A grand jury of a few years back ordered pool halls closed, and there has been little evidence of operation since.

The jury's special report was signed by L. W. Croft as foreman.

Here Are Two Versions Of Draft Bill

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7 (AP)—Here is a brief comparison of the compulsory military training bills passed by the house and senate:

The house would require registration of men from 21 to 44, inclusive, while the senate chose the 21 to 30, inclusive, age brackets. A maximum of 1,000,000 men could be liable for a year's military training under the house version; the senate fixed the limit at 900,000.

Unlike the senate, the house adopted a provision to authorize a 60-day further trial for the voluntary enlistment system. After 60 days, the draft machinery would be invoked to make up any shortages in a 400,000 quota of recruits.

The senate would authorize the government to condemn and take over plants needed for production of defense materials, the house voted to empower the war or navy department to take over and operate such plants on a rental basis.

Similar or identical provisions of the two versions:

The legislation would continue in effect until May, 1945; voluntary enlistments of men from 18 to 34, inclusive, would be encouraged.

Deferment of training would be granted men with dependents and some other special classes.

The trainees could be used anywhere in the western hemisphere, United States possessions and territories, including the Philippine Islands.

Base pay would be \$30 monthly after the first four months.

Upon completion of training, a conscripted man would be entitled to return to his former job — unless changed circumstances made it impossible for his employer to rehire him.

No men could be called to service until congress made appropriations for their training.

The men in service would be entitled to vote providing their states of residence had absentee voting laws.

Verdict for the defendants was entered in the district court records Saturday by Judge Cecil Collins in the damage suit of W. E. Allison and wife against Cunningham & Phillips. Jury in the case reached its decision through answering special issues and cleared the defendants of liability in finding that there was no negligence on the firm's part.

Compensation for alleged injuries had been sought on behalf of Mrs. Allison.

Before the court Saturday was the case of Joe Salazar against Mrs. Eugenia Liberty et al, a suit on breach of contract and for damages, based on an alleged farming agreement. Testimony occupied most of the day, and it was evening before attorneys' arguments could be heard and the case sent to the jury.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7 (AP)—The senate finance committee decided today to exempt corporation earnings up to eight per cent of invested capital from the proposed excess profits tax.

Chairman Harrison (D-Miss) said the change from the house bill was made in the interest of simplification. The house had voted to exempt profits up to seven per cent on the first \$500,000 of capital, and up to five per cent on additional capital.

Final committee action on the measure was deferred until next week in order to let defense commission experts and treasury authorities iron out a conflict over amortization provisions.

TRAIN GUNNED BY NAZI AIR RAIDERS

LONDON, Sept. 7 (AP)—Two Nazi air raiders were reported tonight to have machine-gunned an English train just after it had left a station on the southeast coast.

No injuries were reported immediately.

The engine crew was said to have shrouded the train under thick black smoke and to have kept it going.

Ex-Leaders of France Placed Under Arrest

VICHY, France, Sept. 7 (AP)—The three highest leaders of the old France—former Generalissimo Maurice Gustave Gamelin and former premiers Edouard Daladier and Paul Reynaud—were arrested today in the "war blame" cases.

They were placed in detention at Chateau Chazeron, near Chatelet Guyon. The specific accusations against them were not made known, nor was anything directly said as to their trial.

But the present government of Marshal Philippe Petain in its long preparations for a series of prosecutions against those it holds responsible for France's fall has charged that France was not prepared for war, that her then heads knew she was not and that they continued the struggle amid military blunders when it was obvious she could not win.

Daladier was premier when war was declared; Reynaud took over later and was in office until just before the surrender. Gamelin was head of the allied land forces until he was ousted in favor of General Maxime Weygand.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7 (AP)—The opponents of the Fish amendment on the other hand, sternly charged that some were backing it in an effort to "scuttle" the bill and others for the purpose of postponing the actual draft until after they have stood for reelection in November.

Jury Returns Indictments Against 24

Result of five days' work, with members closeted for long hours with District Attorney Martelle McDonald and County Attorney Joe Faucett, 24 felony indictments were reported by the grand jury to the district court Friday evening. The body was recessed by Judge Cecil Collins until September 25, when it will consider any other matters submitted.

The state's attorneys had a voluminous docket of complaints to carry before the investigating body. Of the 24 indictments returned, capias had been issued on 18 Saturday evening. Those whose names were released and the charges against them were:

R. M. Huff and W. S. Garnett, each charged with sale of securities without a license. The cases are an outgrowth of the receiver-ship proceedings instituted a few months ago against the Western & Southern Oil Corp.

Joe Gomez, aiding in an attempted escape from jail; Albert Moore, burglary; Robert Cleveland, chicken theft (two counts); Frank J. Skerjanc, forgery; J. C. McCoy, forgery; Everett Stack, forgery; J. H. Dickinson, forgery; Genaro Lopez, theft; Charley Tyler, burglary; Joe C. Moore, incest and rape; and Eutimio Orteda, rape.

Forgery charges are in the majority in other indictments reported, there being four such counts. Other indictments on which capias had not been issued were for willfully burning personal property, burglary (two), assault with intent to murder, driving while intoxicated, removal of mortgaged property, and sale of securities without a license.

Another order an investigation of these who have obtained foreign currency from the national bank at favorable exchange rates in the last five years.

The third ordered an investigation of all expenditures in the last ten years on armaments.

It was announced semi-officially that the portfolios of war, navy, armaments and interior had been vacated and would be taken over at least temporarily by Antonescu.

Among new orders flowing from the dictator's pen through the night was one abolishing the brilliant blue and yellow uniforms of Carol's party, which thousands of ministers and office holders for years have worn both at work and at play.

Ambassador posts were ordered abolished, with all diplomatic envoys henceforth to have the rank of ministers.

The government was reported to have yielded to Russian demands for payment of Bessarabian railway pension bonds, handing over \$250,000 in U. S. currency and English pounds at the frontier.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7 (AP)—Five house members were appointed tonight to confer with a senate group in an attempt to compromise differences between the conscription bills passed by the two branches of congress.

All but one of those named, Rep. Short (R-Mo), voted against the Fish amendment. The other members appointed by Speaker Mahoney were Chairman May (D-Ky), year-old, brown-haired miss, tonight was crowned the 1940 "Miss America" at the annual beauty pageant.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7 (AP)—The house passed the Burke-Wadsworth peace-time conscription bill tonight, but with a provision that the actual draft be deferred for 60 days to permit further trial of the voluntary enlistment system. The vote on final passage was 263 to 149.

A vote of 207 to 200 reaffirmed the earlier, tentative decision to defer the actual drafting of men. This provision is not contained in the senate bill and it, with other changes, raised the possibility of time-consuming delay in getting the two houses to agree on the final form on the measure.

The house measure would require all men between 21 and 44 inclusive to register and make them liable to the draft, while the senate bill fixed the age limits at 21 to 30 inclusive.

The bill will now go back to the senate with a request that the house amendments be approved. The senate will decline to do so, and each chamber will appoint representatives for the task of bringing the two bills into conformity.

Since the 60-day postponement provision was defeated in the senate by only two votes any effort by the conferees to drop it—the war department is opposed to the provision—would encounter intense opposition. Some were already suggesting a compromise formula which would involve retaining the house's sixty-day postponement and the senate's age limit figures.

Up to the last, the postponement amendment, whose author was Rep. Fish (R-NY) was a subject of deep controversy. Its supporters contended that since the war department actually planned to induct no conscripts into the army before the second week of November, the national defense program would in no way be delayed.

Provisions Differ From Senate Bill, Conference Due

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In any event, the amendment permits the war department to go ahead with the registration of those who are liable for service. In the meanwhile, it directs that the president issue an immediate call for volunteers, and if the total of such enlistments in 60 days is less than 400,000 permits the conscription of enough men to bring the total of recruits to that figure.

Thus, if the provision is retained finally and the bill is passed, all men within the age limits which are finally agreed upon will be required to register at a time and place to be designated. They will be classified as to physical condition, special skills, dependents and the like, and later the eligibles will be chosen by lot, for 12 months training for service anywhere within the western hemisphere, or in the Philippine Islands.

Until the Fish amendment both the house and senate had backed up to complicate the program the war department had planned to draft about 400,000 before Jan. 1, and another increment of the same size on April 1.

Its program provides that there are to be half yearly calls of the same size until upon the expiration of the act in 1945, the nation will have a trained army of 4,000,000 men, the number which Gen. George C. Marshall, the army chief of staff not long ago said was needed for the defense of the western hemisphere.

After a year's training, the conscripts are to be allocated to reserve components, liable to a call to duty for ten years thereafter.

The final day of debate brought several important decisions, including the adoption of an amendment empowering the president to "conscription industry" as it was frequently put in the discussion. This would apply to instances in which manufacturers hold out for unduly high prices and profits, on defense orders, or refuse to fill such orders before fulfilling private or foreign contracts. Then, the president may take over the plant or plants in question and operate them under lease. The government would be required to pay a "just price" for rental and materials.

War department officials have estimated that 12,000,000 men would be registered under the senate bill, and about 24,000,000 if the house age brackets were retained.

Rumanian Dictator Hits At Old Regime

BUCHAREST, Rumania, Sept. 7 (AP)—Rumania's new military dictator, General Ion Antonescu, took over four vital cabinet posts for himself tonight and issued sweeping decrees aimed at those who frame wealthy under ten years of the rule of the deposed King Carol.

One decree requires all men who since 1930 have been premiers, ministers or even minor cabinet members to submit to a full check on their wealth.

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Mattress Unit Due To Open This Week

A start this week on a mattress making project for Howard county appeared a certainty Saturday, with arrival of ticking to be used in the articles. The ticking had been long delayed, to hold up the program which will benefit more than 200 low-income families in the county.

The project is directed jointly through the AAA, which assisted in obtaining supplies through the government, and the state extension service, which will supervise the processing. Both cotton-surplus supply—and ticking are contributed by the government, while other needed materials and supplies are made available through local contribution.

Some 200 low income families have been certified for the project. Supplied the materials, members of these families will make the mattresses for their own use, with assistance of home demonstration club women. There will be a 25 cent charge for use of equipment.

Plans are to open the first mattress center by Tuesday, in one of the barracks buildings at the city park community center. When this unit is in operation, other centers will be opened at Conhoma and Gay Hill, where buildings are available, and at Garner, as soon as quarters can be obtained. Applicants in the Big Spring area will be notified by mail when to report, and members of the Fairview-Moore and Overton HD clubs will be on hand to give instruction.

MORE APPLICATIONS ARE SENT IN FOR PARITY PAYMENT

Additional applications for parity payments on the year's cotton crop had been transmitted to the state AAA office Saturday, it was said by M. Weaver, county AAA administrator. Those dispatched number about 450, or approximately half the county's total.

Some earlier applications already have cleared the state office, it was said, and there is a possibility that some checks may be returned here by the last of the month.

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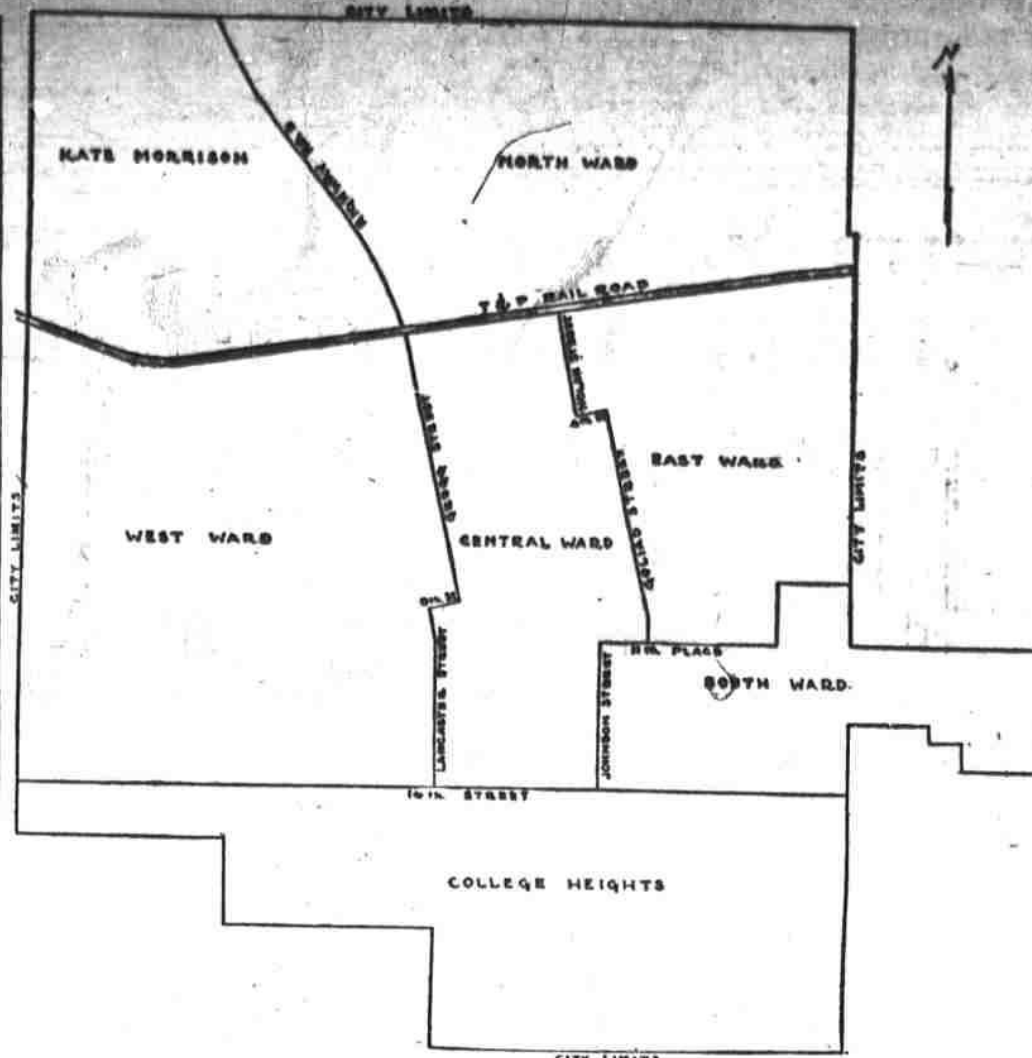

COUNTY SURVEY BEING MADE ON FREEZER LOCKER PROJECT

In progress over Howard county is a survey—undertaken by the Land Use Planning committee—which may determine future policies on the establishment of a freezer-locker plant here. The survey follows up a series of informational meetings conducted by extension service agents.

Committee members are to explain details of the freezer-locker plant to farm folk, and get their attitude on plans for establishment; whether each would subscribe \$30 for a full share in the plant; whether \$15; rent a locker for \$10 a year; or whether the project is of no appeal.

To put the project before agriculturalists, committee members are using a question-and-answer sheet prepared by County Agent O. P. Griffin. It contains the following information:

Q. What will it cost to build a freezer-locker plant for 300 families? A. Approximately \$9000.

Q. How much for each family? A. \$30.

Q. Will all of this have to be paid before the plant is built? A. No part of the money can be borrowed.

Q. How much would have to be paid in before the plant is built? A. To build a cooperative plant there must be at least 200 customers signed up and paying at least \$15.00 each toward building the plant before it is started and \$10.00 for the first year's locker rental when it is ready for their use.

Q. Will those who take stock to help build the plant continue to pay \$10.00 locker rental per year after the first year? A. No. Dividends on the stock will reduce the rentals to stockholders. It is estimated that a holder of \$30.00

stock will be out only \$6.00 a year for the locker rentals.

Q. What do locker rentals pay for? A. The \$6.00 to \$10.00 a year goes for your refrigeration and use of your locker.

Q. Is there an additional cost to the user of the freezer-locker? A. Yes. Meat must be cut, wrapped, and quick frozen before it is placed in your locker. Vegetables, if not blanched and packaged at home, must be prepared at the plant. These services in a cooperative plant can be had at cost. If the plant has all of its lockers, these services would be lower. These services range from 1.2 cent to 1.5 cents per pound for meat, depending on whether it is hamburger, and sausage, or steak and roasts. There is not much information available on processing vegetables, but most of that can be done at home.

Q. How long can frozen meat be kept? A. In the lockers it will keep as long as necessary. After it is taken home it can be kept 4 or 5 days in a refrigerator. Without any refrigeration frozen meat would spoil the same as any other fresh meat.

Q. Can pork be cured at any time of year? A. Yes, and if cured it will keep after removing from the plant about like home cured meat keeps.

SCHOOLS RECEIVE MORE STATE MONEY
Howard county rural schools Saturday received additional state aid, in the form of a one-dollar payment on the per capita apportionment for 1939-40. It was the last payment on that year, and represented a total of \$1,125.

All rural schools share in the fund distribution.

Interned Nazi Seaman Invited To Lockney

AMARILLO, Sept. 7. (AP)—Mayor R. E. Reed of Lockney announced the Lockney city government had invited the master of the Nazi ship Columbus to look into the possibility of interned the 450 seamen from the Scuttled ship at Lockney. "We haven't been able to contact the captain," said Mayor Reed, "but we passed a resolution offering to open negotiations. We have a large city hall and about three acres of land on which barracks could be built. The Germans' proposition would have to suit the Germans and the immigration service."

Mayor Reed said he would try again tomorrow morning to get in touch with the ship's master, Capt. Wilhelm Daehne, by telephone. The Welsh port of Cardiff is closer to Canada or the United States than any other English port.

Work Progresses On Denison Dam Despite Gov. Phillips' Suit

OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 7 (AP)—Declaring Gov. Leon C. Phillips' suit to stop the Denison dam "is not our onion to peel," contractors pressed ahead on the mammoth project today, with 725 workmen toiling in three eight-hours shifts daily.

"If there are any grounds for the suit, it isn't our affair," said H. A. Hamlin, assistant superintendent of construction for the Guy F. Atkinson Co., holder of an \$8,228,000 contract for the earthen dam. "We have no quarrel with the governor. We have a contract with the United States."

The suit was filed late yesterday in the Eastern United States district court at Muskogee. Although the governor asked a temporary injunction to halt construction immediately, no hearing was set.

WARDS OBSERVING 68TH YEAR IN FIELD OF MERCHANDISING

1872... A year of reconstruction, expansion, pioneering. Chicago was trying to recover from the disastrous fire of the year before, the "Old West" was the scene of numerous Indian wars, "Boss Rule" flourished in New York City, and "six-gun" rule in the Far West.

Two young men, A. Montgomery Ward and George R. Thorne, with very little capital but in possession of a big idea, founded in that year the world's first mail order house.

From a tiny rented room on North Clark street, in Chicago, they sent out their first "circular." Instead of the then accepted business attitude toward customers—"Let the Buyer Beware,"—these pioneering partners introduced "Satisfaction guaranteed or your money back." This "Golden Rule" of business quickly caught hold, as did the so-called wildcat scheme of selling by mail.

The response to their first catalog was much greater than Ward and Thorne ever dreamed. Their humble \$2,400 stock was quickly sold out, and the beginning of the mail order business proved to be the start of a great revolution in the merchandising practices of the time.

After a short while the small space could not accommodate all of their stocks, so they moved to larger quarters. The famous Tower building, a Chicago landmark on Michigan boulevard, was erected in 1899, and not long thereafter, the company began to build large branch mail order houses at strategic shipping centers. Today there are nine such branch houses, covering the country from coast to coast.

In 1928 Wards entered a new field of merchandising—the retail store. The idea of over-the-counter service originated with the opening of a "display store" in which the company merely intended to exhibit selected items from the catalog.

So insistent were customers that they be allowed to take merchandise with them that the firm decided to experiment with an actual retail store. The response to the "test stores" resulted in rapid ex-

Britain Looks To A Future Offensive

LONDON, Sept. 7. (AP)—Britain, in the thick of a back-to-the-wall fight against German air siege, has not forgotten that a victorious war means an offensive war.

Officers say the British army looks forward to "surely 750,000, perhaps a million" fully-equipped soldiers, supported by a powerful air force, for a 1941 campaign "somewhere in Europe."

Troops will be the spearhead of the offensive which the army, from recruits to red-tailed staff officers, firmly believe will "win the war."

These front fighters will be backed by a million more troops conscripted in the last year and already well into an intensive training which the officers declare is "as necessary for the modern soldier as for the airman or sailor."

They have confidence in the army's ability to "assimilate and improve" Germany's technique in the Polish, Flanders and French campaigns and in this nation's industrial ability to put an army in the field fully equipped for modern war.

Such equipment, they say, must include an air force attached to the army and acting under direction of the army commander-in-chief in the German manner.

SWITZERLAND WILL RECEIVE KING CAROL

BERN, Switzerland, Sept. 7. (AP)—Switzerland, whose sense of hospitality is frequently at odds with its anxiety to avoid complications, prepared a subdued welcome tonight for the fugitive ex-king Carol II of Rumania.

Federal authorities announced they had granted to the deposed monarch the privilege of a temporary stay in this country. They kept secret the place at which he will stop.

One report, which could not be confirmed officially, was that he would go to St. Moritz, where his brother, Prince Nicholas, has a villa.

Supt. Blankenship said ward school districts would be essentially unchanged from last year.

North ward area is that portion north of the T&P and east of highway 9; Kate Morrison district is north of the T&P and west of the highway; West ward includes the area south of the T&P and west of Gregg and Lancaster streets; Central ward area is bounded by the T&P, Gregg and Lancaster on the west, 16th street on the south, and Johnson, Goliad and Nolan on the east; East ward is between the T&P and 11th place, and east of Goliad and Nolan; South ward is east of Johnson and between 11th and 16th streets; College Heights school serves all the area south of 16th street.

There may be some changes to suit circumstances, Blankenship said. A sixth grade section of South ward may be transferred to Central and College Heights, because of the contemplated removal of an annex building off the South ward grounds. However, less than score of pupils will be affected.

Building repairs were completed for the opening of the new term, and school officials said Saturday that "everything is in readiness." There was no estimate as to the size of the year's enrollment as compared to last year, when 2,745 were enrolled in the opening day. There are 99 teachers in the system. Assignments will generally be the same as last year, but all are subject to change, the superintendent said.

Larger Factory Payrolls Due To Boost Business

NEW YORK, Sept. 7. (AP)—War-swollen factory payrolls have helped give autumn retail and wholesale business one of the best starts in many years, trade reports indicated today.

The population flow back to the cities since Labor Day brought with it a big wave of buying at the nation's retail counters, in textile, metal and other wholesale markets. Counting on further stimulus from mounting arms spending and expansion of payrolls in war industry, some trade observers forecast the greatest autumn demand for consumer goods and factory materials in a decade.

The U. S. defense outlay and British war purchases in this country, it was calculated, may boost the national income to about \$80,000,000,000 annually compared with an estimated current rate of about \$78,000,000,000.

Will Never Lead Country Into War, Willkie Declares

RUSHVILLE, Ind., Sept. 7. (AP)—Wendell L. Willkie, republican nominee for president, declared in a speech at an open air meeting here tonight that "I shall never lead this country into any European war and when I say that I mean it."

Willkie spoke to an audience gathered for showing of motion pictures made by the republican national committee. He said: "Henry Wallace, the democratic vice presidential nominee said recently that the republican party was the party of appeasement. That can mean two things."

"If he meant working out compromises with the dictators, then he was 100 per cent wrong."

"But if Mr. Wallace meant to say that the republican party is the party of peace, he spoke the truth because I shall never lead this country into any European war. And when I say that I mean it."

HOLLYWOOD, Sept. 7. (AP)—Screen actress Peggy Stewart, 18, and Donald Barry, 29, western film star, were married today at the Little Church of the Flowers in Hollywood.

TROTSKY'S ASSASSIN BELIEVED PRESENT AT EARLIER ATTACK

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 7. (AP)—

Mrs. Leon Trotsky said today she believed Frank Jackson, confessed assassin of her husband, was present at a previous attack on the Russian exile's home May 28. The fatal attack on Trotsky came Aug. 20.

Mrs. Trotsky testified before Judge Raul Carranza Y Trujillo. She said she based her belief on the fact that various persons heard a man in the May 24 attacking group speak Spanish with a French accent. Jackson has testified in French.

Twenty Mexicans were detained in the May 28 assault in which Trotsky escaped harm.

Jackson is in a closely-guarded cell at a precinct police station. Sylvia Ageloff of Brooklyn, N. Y., friend of Jackson charged as an accomplice in the assassination, was moved from the police station to a hospital of the federal district department, at request of relatives. They said she was suffering a nervous breakdown.

Just when the decision of the judge will come has not been announced. There is no jury system in Mexico for murder trials.

JOBLESS FUND UP TO 54 MILLIONS

AUSTIN, Sept. 7. (AP)—More than \$54,000,000 lies between approximately 1,000,000 Texas workers and destitution if they lose their jobs through no fault of their own.

Orville S. Carpenter, director of the Texas Unemployment Compensation commission, today predicted the fund would grow to \$60,000,000 by the end of the year.

The amount represents, roughly, the difference between payroll tax collections from 16,250 employers in the state, currently averaging \$1,800,000 a month, and claims paid \$900,000 monthly.

Says Nazis Back Group In Mexico

LAWTON, Okla., Sept. 7. (AP)—

Elliott Roosevelt, son of the president, charged tonight that the German government had financed "an organization known as the 1st militia" in Mexico consisting of 200,000 men.

"I say to you that any danger that confronts this country doesn't lie all the way across the ocean," the Texan told the sixth district convention of the Oklahoma League of Young Democrats.

The German government has "financed for many years the communist party in Mexico," Roosevelt asserted.

"And while Mexico tells us that they have an army of only 100-and-some-odd thousand men I can tell you, and I know it for a fact, that there is an army that was officered and trained by former revolutionaries from Spain and there are 7,000 of them in Mexico today."

"They have today an organization known as the Red Militia which consists of 200,000 men in addition to the regular Mexican army and that has been entirely financed and put through by the German government."

KALLIO IMPROVED

HELSINKI, Finland, Sept. 7. (AP)—(via Radio)—The Scandinavian Radio tonight broadcast a report that President Kyoosti Kallio, of Finland, was considerably improved tonight after being seriously ill for several days.

The United States senate sent which Henry Fountain Ashurst has occupied for 28 years—since statehood in 1912—and the state's lone seat in the house of representatives will be at stake when Arizona voters ballot Tuesday in party primaries.

Democrats and republicans also will select a full slate of nominees for 11 state offices, including that of governor.

Challenging these hotly-contested races for the limelight was a write-in campaign for democratic presidential electors which offered the possibility, however remote, of winning the nomination, thus threatening, in effect, to disenfranchise the democrats in the presidential election.

The situation arose through the failure of democrats to file nominating petitions for the three electors' posts, leaving the ticket without candidates or a pledge to President Roosevelt and Henry A. Wallace.

Convicts Linked In Abduction

MONTICELLO, Ark., Sept. 7. (AP)—

Two men believed to have been among the 36 convicts who escaped Labor Day from the state prison farm at Cummins, forced a cotton miller to drive them 30 miles into the country tonight.

Newt Simmons, the machinist, told officers that he was forced to stop his automobile near Hamburg, 30 miles south of here, because the highway was blocked by road machinery, and that the two men leaped from the car and disappeared into the undergrowth. Simmons declared that the two men both pointed pistols at him as he was seated in his car in Monticello.

cello and ordered him to "get going." After he had driven a short distance, Simmons said, the men gave him 50 cents and forced him to stop at a filling station and buy them cigarettes.

Sheriff's officers and state police began a hunt for the two men in the vicinity of Hamburg.

Only five of the convicts who participated in the Labor Day break from the state prison farm are unaccounted for.

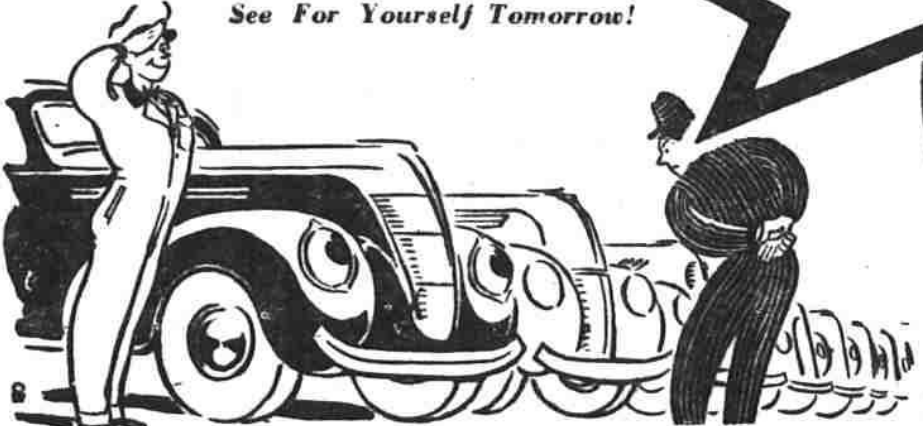

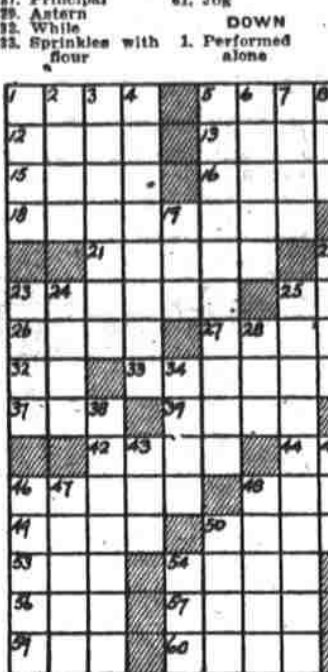

AN ANALYSIS OF THE WAR DEVELOPMENTS

By EDWARD S. BOMAN

While the next bombing raids go on, Adolf Hitler and Winston Churchill appear in agreement on the point that Great Britain must not rely too confidently on "General Winter" for defense against invasion after this month.

The prospect of months of uncertainty for England's shore defenders has been lost sight of in the widespread expectation that autumn's arrival would inevitably clip the wings of Germany's air power.

Fog and rain, for which the British Isles and the North sea are notorious in winter, promise to hamper bombers, but at the same time they might favor an attempt to land troops under some conditions.

Scouting patrols operate most boldly under a protective blanket of darkness, or fog, when the attacker enjoys the advantage of the initiative and surprise.

Mr. Churchill might have noted that the Nazis have made effective use of surprise and the initiative in Poland, Norway, the Lowlands and France. They have since given the world to understand that they have a lot of new tricks to use against England.

Churchill contented himself in his latest parliamentary review with the admonitory reminder that "winter with its storms, its fog and its darkness may alter the conditions but some of the conditions cut both ways."

Herr Hitler jeered in his sportsman speech that Germany's foe had relied successfully on General Revolution, General Hunger and now was turning to General Winter, while placing the chief dependence all the while on General Bluff. To meet them all the embattled Reich has General Action, he boasted.

From the muster he omitted another unreliable commander who was much in the news just a year ago. That was General Mud, who failed so fatefully to come to the aid of Poland.

Just as Herr Hitler was obviously speaking with propaganda at home and abroad in view, the chances are that his foe had something of the same purpose. Assuming that Britain bears up under the hammering of bombs until the arrival of equinoctial uncertainties two weeks or so hence, the three million men under arms in the British Isles must be kept on the alert for the sake of their morale as well as for England's safety.

Apparently the animal had been walking directly over the pipe when the explosion occurred. The force of pressure caused four additional curbs in the severed pipe and almost decapitated the coyote. The picture was obtained by flashlight by one of the workers and brought here by Neal Barnaby, who was in Alice shortly after the mishap.

TSES Farm Placements Are Due To Reach Last Year's Totals, With Prospects Of An Excellent Crop

After a survey of Howard and Dawson counties, S. G. Merritt, local manager of the Texas State Employment Service, announced that all indications point to a cotton year that was comparable to the bumper season of 1937. Merritt checked this section for the purpose of deciding the needs of farmers of this area in regard to workers. He states there is already a slight demand for cotton pickers on April cotton but there will not be a demand for a full quota until the latter part of September.

Last year the local service arranged 6800 placements in September, although these figures are not, because of the system of rotating farm workers, an accurate indication of the individuals employed in the cotton. This year the employment bureau expects to place as many or more cotton pickers in the surrounding territory.

"About one quarter of both Howard and Dawson counties should produce as much cotton as in 1937," Merritt declared. "All of the west half of Howard county and the southeast section of the Comanche area should have the best prospects," he added.

Taken as a whole, the county is in line to produce more cotton per acre than it did last year when 133 pounds per acre was the average. There are some districts that will fall below the amount set by the rest of the county. The Luther community has been hard hit by the lack of rain and will very likely produce less than usual. In Dawson county, the middle eastern portion has the worst prospects.

Last year, about seventy per cent of Howard county farmers made use of the local employment facilities to fill their picker needs. Placements were made for pickers as late as February.

The stock feed situation appeared to be very good in Howard county, according to the tentative survey made by Merritt. The area north of Big Spring is very strong in feed growth and there are indications that it will increase as time passes. Feed producers making use of trench silos are becoming more numerous. There will very likely be a lot of placements for maize heading, Merritt said.

ROSWELL, N. M., Sept. 7. (AP) Two youthful itinerants pleaded guilty late today to federal kidnaping charges and were held to federal court under \$10,000 bond for sentencing.

The pair, Clifford Stewart, 19, of Columbus, Ga., and James Moreland, 18, who gave his address only as Ohio, were charged with commandeering a taxicab in El Paso, Texas, and ordering Charles J. Gray, the driver, to take them to Roswell at pistol-point after first robbing him of \$11.

The kidnap law bars imposition of a death sentence if the victim is released unharmed, but a maximum penalty of life imprisonment is possible.

Fast Action Marks 'Boom Town,' With Top Stars Of Hollywood Performing Up To Par

One motion picture trade paper opined recently that there was an answer to Hollywood producers' complaints of "what's wrong with the movies?" The producers were speaking, of course, of declining patronage, loss of foreign income due to the war, etc.

The trade paper said the answer was a picture like "Boom Town." There, the paper continued, are combined all the elements to make a smash hit, and with pictures like it, producers and exhibitors alike may prosper.

The view may be correct. "Boom Town" opened at the Ritz theatre in Big Spring Friday and played to the biggest crowds in many a week. It continues through Monday, and chances are there will be plenty more customers, all satisfied that they have had their money's worth.

"Boom Town," as you know, has a potent cast, with such head-of-the-list players as Clark Gable, Spencer Tracy, Claudette Colbert and Hedy Lamarr. It has a particular appeal to Texas, since a good deal of the setting is in the Texas oil fields—a familiar locale—and since it treats with many things that Texans know about. It has, moreover, smashing action. It's a gusty, lusty opus from beginning to end, and one of the type enjoyed by the biggest percentage of people.

The big-name players perform on a level expected of them. The parts



of Big John McMaisters and Square John Sand were tailored to fit Gable and Tracy, and these two seem to derive real enjoyment out of meaty roles that permit them to be at ease while still being vigorous and active. Miss Colbert is delightfully lovely as the wife in the case, and Miss Lamarr is beau-

tiful to look at even if she doesn't quite keep pace with the other players. The supporting cast also is strong, with such players as Frank Morgan, Lionel Atwill, Chill Wells, Marion Martin and Minna Gombel.

The story cannot be told briefly, but is the tale of two pals who

meet in the roaring boom town of Burkburnett, Texas, battle together and then become partners in wildcatting, split up and become enemies, only to be reunited at a moment of climax when one of them must take a long gamble to send his friend away from a siren jack to his wife—the girl they both

love. Through the story speeds one piece of action after another. The two pals fight three hunky busters, bring in a water geyser, strike a gusher, battle a blazing well in an exciting sequence, do a hilarious scene in diving head-first into a sea of mud, and follow it up with a scene in long underwear with a gin bottle close at hand.

The scene in which the two pals fight it out with bare fists in a swanky New York office is probably a new top in cinematic rough and tumble. To provide some breathing spaces through all this action there are good comedy scenes with Morgan and Wells contributing ably, and romantic interludes with the two girls appearing in camera range.

Essentially, however, the picture belongs to Gable and Tracy, and they respond nobly. The background contrives realistically to bring back the days when oil booms were real oil booms in Texas, and the picture catches much of the excitement of high living that accompanied the booms. Boyce House, a Texas newspaperman, contributed to the script as a technical adviser, and saw to it that the real flavor of old Burkburnett and similar boom towns was mixed into the dish.

The whole thing is really something to see.

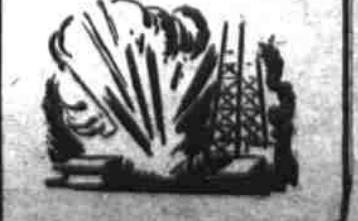

Chevrolet Men Prepare For New Model

DETROIT, Sept. 7 — Chevrolet dealers' service managers and mechanics from coast to coast have embarked on their yearly period of training in the servicing of the new year's models, to be shown to the public on Sept. 21. By mid-September, more than 25,000 service men will have been trained—in groups of 12—in factory practice and procedure as worked out for the new 1941 Chevrolets.

The first in a series of nearly 600 different schools was held here, under the supervision of Ed Hedner, national director of service, with central office service officials, Chevrolet's chief engineer and members of his staff, and the division's regional product representatives, in attendance. During the week of Sept. 3, these graduates, assisted by central office service officials, will conduct similar schools in the nine regions of the country, where service managers from the 45 zones will convene.

Following the regional schools, each zone service manager, aided by regional product representatives and central office staff members, will set up a school in his own area, beginning Sept. 9, for dealers' service managers. An enrollment of nearly 9,000 is expected. These men, in turn, will bring their own staffs up to date before new car announcement time, with the result that factory-approved service will be available to every Chevrolet owner immediately, after the purchase of his new 1941 model.

This year, Hedner said, attendance at each zone service school will be limited to 12 men, and as many as 30 schools will be held in some zones to handle the student volume. The limitation will make possible individual instruction, he said, with a resultant improvement in service practices.

Music Teachers Offer New Plan of Study

The Big Spring unit of Texas Music Teachers association in collaboration with the state department of education is offering state credit for applied music school. It has been announced that an applied music course is so designed as to correspond with the school study course from beginning of school to end of school course. No distinction is made between the child who intends to be a professional musician and those who do not. The object is to give each student a musical background which will enable him to continue with music as a hobby or for social enjoyment. It is suggested that the student complete three years to complete requirements for each level. Students must take private lessons of thirty minutes and one lesson, not less than forty minutes, each week for a total of 36 weeks per school year. Early report card for each student will be issued from the center to the teachers. 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Editorial

Another encouraging move toward better cooperating community enterprises has come with the decision of Big Spring's four service clubs to hold joint meetings at regular intervals, and to have representation at a "Round Table" which would head up various cooperative projects.

Chief idea of the combined effort is not to displace civic organizations now functioning, but to correlate efforts of each unit, seeing that there is no conflict of endeavor. Each club will know more about what the other club is doing, and thus be in a position to cooperate with it. It will also know better how to chart its own program of activity.

The Herald repeats its deep desire that this same principle be carried into the realm of charity and humanitarian work. We refer specifically to the organization of a "Community Chest" or similar centralized agency to handle all welfare and associated activities.

Some time ago, we urged that heads of various welfare associations meet with civic leaders and study the proposition of combining all

financial drives into one concerted effort. We still urge such a conference, and hold that one single campaign for funds will result to the mutual advantage of donors, beneficiary organization and all others.

The professional office or business house which operates on a budget would much prefer, it seems to us, to allot its entire welfare contribution for the year, pay it in a lump and avoid the repetitious appeals for assistance for this organization and that. If that one gift is made the final one, the donor can well afford to make it generous enough to meet the needs of the participating organizations. If his contribution is too large to be handled in one payment, the Community Chest—or call it what you will—might handle contributions in quarterly payments.

The Community Chest idea represents a correlation of the charity, welfare and educational contributions of a county, just as a "Round Table" represents a correlation of the civic enterprise of service clubs. If the one works, the other should. If one is attempted, certainly the other deserves consideration.

THE Shakkito Maru, her broken prow repaired after a collision with the fishing barge Olympic II believed to have cost eight lives, was released from libel late today and made preparations to sail for Japan.

Federal Judge Ben Harrison released the freighter after its owners, the N. Y. K. line, posted a \$203,000 bond to offset libel actions totaling \$787,500 filed by the barge owners, relatives of the dead and the owners of a radio broadcasting station that went down with the Olympic.

Lloyd Nix, an attorney for most of the claimants, asked that the bond be made higher because of "danger of war between United States and Japan."

"The United States is at peace with the world and the court cannot consider any danger of international conflict," Judge Harrison replied.

Only six of the approximately 150 bridges spanning the Mississippi river are at or below Memphis, Tenn., some 700 miles from the stream's mouth.

No. 5 Quartermaster Corps

When Napoleon stated that an army marches on its stomach he showed his understanding of the fact that an army is only as good as its quartermaster corps.

The quartermaster corps of the United States army supplies officers and men with food. But an army marches in many other ways besides "on its stomach." The quartermaster corps sees that the army marches in comfortable shoes and other equipment. It arranges for shelter. And often, in this day of mechanized transport, it provides train, motor and ship transport so that the army doesn't have to march at all.

Members of this supply service are, in fact, the business men of the army. Efficient performance of their duties leaves line troops free to prosecute various missions unhampered by problems of supply.

Thus the quartermaster corps offers training in the operation of one of the biggest businesses in the United States. Recruits may learn, under expert instructors, how to be clerks, cooks, warehousemen, bakers, plumbers, motor mechanics, saddlers, carpenters, cashiers, engineers, fire chiefs, tin smiths, horseshoers, bookkeepers, storekeepers and welders to mention a few of the many lines of training.

Specialists in such lines are eligible for extra pay of \$3 to \$30 per month over and above the base pay of a private. After three years of service in the quartermaster corps, an enlisted man of any grade or rating may take an examination for the grade of staff sergeant. Other promotions which may be later by examination are to the grades of technical sergeant and master sergeant. Approximately one out of every five quartermaster soldiers is a non-commissioned officer.

A career in the quartermaster corps has the double advantage of both job security and opportunity for advancement. Courses of instruction in special branches of the
