Weather in Texas was turbulent Tuesday. Much of the state was visited by rain, hail and wind during the day and night and tornadoes were spotted in several places Tuesday and again Wednesday morning.

Late Tuesday Dallas was hit by a tornado that tore a path of destruction more than 20 miles long. Hardest hit was Oak Cliff and West and Northwest Dallas where hundreds of homes were destroyed or damaged, industrial plants damaged and at least 10 lives lost. Hundreds more were injured.

The Dallas tornado struck about 4:20 p. m. during the rush hours and traffic jams were terrific.

The Loraine territory was hit by what some believed to be a small tornado about 10 p. m. Tuesday. The baby twister first destroyed a small house, blew away a hay stack and did other damage on the Marshall Bruce farm, then took a tool shed at the Junior Furrow farm and swirled on eastward to partly unroof the Earl Hallmark home then did considerable damage at the M. A. Dunnahoo home some two miles further southeast.

Many saw the twister as it swirled to the ground kicking up a mountain of dust as it traveled eastward.

Although not in the path of the small twister Loraine received 30 inch of rain that was accompanied by light hail and high wind.

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Yarborough Wins Senate Seat

Ralph Yarborough, Austin attorney and staunch Democrat, was elected to the United States Senate in the special election Tuesday to fill the unexpired term of Price Daniel who was elected Governor last fall.

Yarborough was away out in front with a lead on fifty or sixty thousand votes Wednesday morning. There were many votes yet to be tallied by Texas Election Bureau but the head of the bureau said the final outcome would not be changed.

Yarborough led a field of 19 Democrats and two Republicans to gain the Senate seat.

Only two other candidates, Martin Dies, conservative Democrat, and Thad Hutchison, Republican, were serious contenders for the place. Dies came out second and Hutchison third.

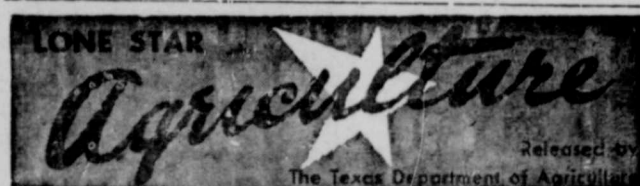

Texas has one of the few independent far magencies in the United States. That is, one of the very few whose leader and activities are responsible only to the people of Texas—not to a board, have a special interest group, or a higher government.

This is because the Texas Department of Agriculture, headed by a Commissioner elected by the people, works to promote all phases of agriculture relating to Texas and its citizens. And agriculture is still our most basic industry, affecting more Texans than any single phase of our economy.

A proposal has been introduced with the Texas Legislature to place the affairs of Texas agriculture into the hands of a board who would "select" a secretary as their head. This would likely take away the independence of the Texas Department of Agriculture and place it directly under

Questions and Answers

Q. I am planning to sell my house and let the buyer take over my GI loan, provided VA will release me from liability. Once I receive my liability release, would I automatically be entitled to another GI loan?

A. No. Obtaining a release from GI liability does not entitle you to another GI loan. The only veterans whose GI loan entitlement may be restored are those who must dispose of their property for certain compelling reasons such as condemnation by the Government or ill health.

Q. Is there any deadline for applying for disability compensation for a service-connected disability?

A. There is no deadline. You may apply at any time. However, if you file your application within one year following your discharge from service, the payments may be made retroactive to the day after your discharge, providing your disability was compensable at that time.

Q. I have a Korean GI term insurance policy. Will I get dividends on this policy?

A. No. Under the law, Korean GI insurance is non-participating; it does not pay dividends. However, your premiums are lower than the premiums for GI policies that do pay dividends. Q. I lost my sight in the Korean conflict, and I am planning to take vocational rehabilitation training. Will VA provide me with reader service?

A. Yes. Reader service may be provided if it is necessary for the successful pursuit of your vocational rehabilitation. The number of hours of service will depend on the amount of reading required in your course.

FCDA Urges 7-Day Emergency Food Supply for All Families

If the United States ever suffers a thermonuclear attack, one of the basic problems for America's millions would be food, and how to get enough of it.

In the so-called good old days the family pantry generally was loaded with food—ready for any emergency.

TODAY, THE FEDERAL Civil Defense Administration recommends that every family keep a minimum of a seven-day supply of food in the home for instant use in an emergency. This has become known as Grandma's Pantry.

To estimate how much food is needed for seven days, multiply the number of persons in the family by the amounts shown in the adjoining list for one person. A two-week supply would be more desirable. Foods listed are merely types recommended, not necessarily those which must be stocked. The items kept on hand should be those staple groceries that are used in your normal pattern of daily living. By following this plan rotation is no problem, as you replace the items used by shopping frequently.

Suggested Pantry

MILK: One package of powdered, nonfat, dry milk, and two 14-oz. cans of evaporated milk.

FRUITS: One 1 lb. 14 oz. can each of two varieties of canned fruits, and 1 lb. of dried fruits.

VEGETABLES: Six cans (approximately 1 lb. each) of vegetables.

CRACKERS-COOKIES: One box.

BEVERAGES: One small jar of instant coffee, one of instant tea, or soft drinks. Twelve bottles, whichever your family prefers.

SUPPLEMENTARY ITEMS: Sugar, salt, seasoning, candy (types that store well), chewing gum, and cigarettes and tobacco.

CAUTION: Store these items like Grandma did—in a dry, cool basement or storeroom within a temperature range of 35 to 50 degrees for best results. Check your "pantry" regularly, but at least monthly and rotate items regularly. Use within six months. Bottled water should be changed every six weeks.

enough not to deplete your supply to an appreciable extent.

IF YOUR CHILDREN are young, decrease the amounts by one-fourth. If the children are infants, canned baby foods should be substituted for some of the other canned foods. And don't forget—be sure to plan for old people or invalids.

Another word of caution: check your "pantry" at least monthly, and rotate items regularly. Bottled water, for instance, should be changed every six weeks.

Essential items for your stockroom should include two gallons of water in jugs or bottles for each person, and three gallons for each child under three years old. You should also maintain a supply of salt and sugar, matches, fuel, cooking utensils, a can opener, and tableware. You would also do well to have in your storage room a portable radio, flashlight, candles and holders, first-aid kit, blankets, pall and garbage container. On the lighter side, you might add a supply of games and toys for the children.
