A former Slaton trainmaster, L. M. Olson, has been named vice president and general manager of the Santa Fe's Gulf Lines at Galveston, Texas, effective July 1.

Olson was born in La Junta, Colo., in 1908, entered Santa Fe employ there as a stenographer in 1926, and has more than 29 years Santa Fe service to his credit.

He advanced to trainmaster at San Angelo, in 1940, and served in that position at Slaton; Wellington, Kansas; Clovis, N. M.; and El Paso, Tex., until his appointment as superintendent of the Pecos division at Clovis in 1945, and later that year, back to Slaton as Slaton Division superintendent.

In 1946, Olson was on special assignment in the vice president's office at Chicago, and was made superintendent at Emporia, Kansas, in 1947. On June 1, 1948, he was appointed assistant general manager of the Coast Lines at Los Angeles, Calif., and moved to La Junta in the same capacity in 1949 where he had jurisdiction of the northern district lines in Colorado and New Mexico.

Since 1953, Olson has been assistant to the operating vice president in Chicago.

In an area where everything green is man-made, Slaton is one of the few communities to have a garden spot, meaning of course the county park. Not only does Slaton have a park of which it can be proud, it has a park which daily grows more beautiful.

Improvements are being made each day, which will in time give Slaton a park to rival anything in any town of its size in West Texas.

When the Slaton township was founded by Santa Fe, the railroad set aside six city blocks as a recreational area for the townspeople.

A park was planned, grass and trees were planted and the park flourished until the drought years in 1945 and 1946 scorched and killed existing plant life.

In 1949 C. D. Willis took over the management of the east side of the park and as a result it today shows the work and planning which has gone into it. Under the supervision of County Commissioner George Green, according to Willis, "The east park is in better shape than its been in for several years."

Equipped with eight tables, five barbecue pits, two disposal pits and water hydrants throughout, the park has been the picnic spot for crowds of 300 or more on many weekends.

As Mr. Willis puts it, "We try to make it as convenient for the people as we possibly can."

Work was recently started to improve the west side of the park under the direction of a park committee composed of Mrs. Harry Stokes, Milton Davis, Otis Neill and Lee Vardy.

Before the completion of the present water well, the west park resembled a vacant lot covered with weeds, but now with a plentiful water supply, the park committee expects the west side to be ready for public use in the near future.

According to Lee Vardy, supt., of schools, credit for the improvement of the west side should go to Carl Lewis, park superintendent.

In the future the committee plans to construct a drinking fountain in the center of the west side, with an arbor to cover and shade it. To date the park has had 32 trees planted on it and with a well that can pump 30,000 gallons of water a day, the west side, it is hoped, will soon equal the east side in beauty.

Civic organizations are invited by the committee to donate funds or shrubs to the park, according to Neill and Vardy.

REP. BERRY REPORTED IN CRITICAL CONDITION

According to an Avalanche Journal report, State Rep. George S. Berry of Lubbock became unexpectedly worse in condition Tuesday afternoon in Seton Hospital, Austin, and was in critical condition Thursday morning, his office in Lubbock was notified.

Injured May 20 in an automobile accident, the state representative believed himself unharmed until he became ill two weeks later. Entering Seton Hospital June 3, he underwent surgery the following day. It was found he had a 3/4-inch perforation in the large intestine and general peritonitis had developed.

Since that time, he has improved, then suffered relapses several times.

HIGHWAY DANGERS

The National Council of State Garden Clubs is presently concerned with preserving scenic beauty along new highways. They have recommended "adequate zoning protection for highway corridors" to prevent excess commercialism and to preserve the scenery. The council's program would conserve natural resources and for the drivers who do take their time on the road, pleasant scenery, uncluttered with roadside signs and stands would offer relief from constant commercialism which seems to dog our days with relentless visual reminders.

Yet beneficial as such proposals are, they're of secondary importance to the fact that highways are a menace. Drivings has become such a dangerous, ugly business that no amount of beautiful scenery can lessen it. The roads are not so dangerous, nor are the cars. It is the driver that makes motoring a menace.

If drivers will hurtle along the highways so fast they are not aware of the scenery they pass, then what is more properly needed are retaining walls to catch their wild skids. It would be pleasant to dream of landscaped grounds, of rest from the persistent nagging of advertising, but the picture which seems to be developing is that of highway race tracks. Perhaps they will soon be built for speed and not for beauty, for tension and steering wheel gripping and not for motoring enjoyment. A tree would be as old fashioned and threatening at the side of such a highway as a plodding old Dobbin is nowadays on ours.

TELEVISION STUDY

The General Federation of Woman's Clubs recently conducted a television survey in which more than 500 women throughout the country participated. The survey was an evaluation of current television programs for children.

These women are doing the television industry a valuable service. By carefully analyzing programs in terms of their children's interests and aptitudes and in terms of the family environment, they are helping to give a clearer picture of what is being presented and what they would like to have presented. In addition to making the ladies themselves more aware of what their children are watching, the survey has offered television executives definite suggestions and indicated those areas in which the current programs are weak.

More of such surveys with an eye to the improvement of children's shows could be conducted by parent's groups as well as women's clubs in both small and large communities. Local channels could probably even better use the suggestions of people whom they serve directly than could the large national channels. A well organized club project of this nature and intent could make a fine contribution to television progress. Programs recommended by such a committee might act as a useful guide to other parents in the community.

Hot Rolls

- 1/2 cup sugar.
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 yeast cake or 1 1/2 pkgs. dry yeast
- 2 1/2 cups lukewarm water
- 1 tbs. salt
- 8 cups flour

Method: Cream shortening and sugar. Add 1/2 cup of water to the yeast making a paste, and add to the creamed mixture. Add remainder of water, salt, and 7 cups of flour. Knead the dough in the 8th cup of flour. Let rise to double size in a greased bowl. Make in rolls by pinching off the dough. (Do not use rolling pin) let rise again before baking.

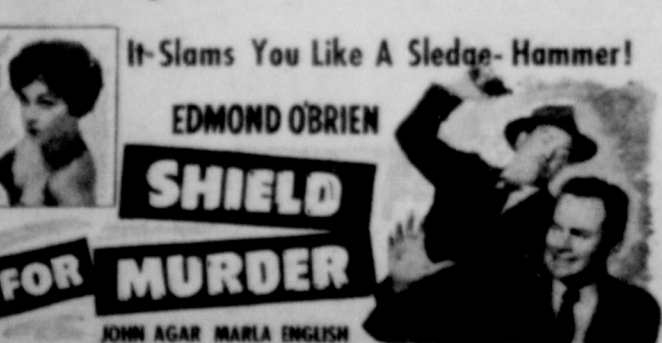

Gardening Hints For The Week

Transplant bearded IRISES when they have finished blooming, cutting the leaves back half way, shortening the roots and dividing the clumps into pieces with two and three shoots on each. Keep all garden IRISES well watered at this season.

Clip the tops of ALYSSUM, FORGET-ME-NOT, and HELIANTHEMUM plants when the flowers have faded, to insure a second bloom.

AUSTIN, Texas—Now that the legislature has adjourned — all eyes are turned to the next political campaign. It is anyone's guess who will be in the 1956 races, but many are guessing.

Hardly had the gavels of Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey and House Speaker Jim Lindsey sounded the end of the 54th legislative session, when one widely known political figure took the adjournment as the starting signal for the 1956 races. He is former Speaker of the House Reuben Senterfitt, of San Saba.

Senterfitt was the first announced candidate for Governor in 1954. But he withdrew when his father passed away, and Governor Allan Shivers announced for re-election. He took no sides in the bitterly contested campaign last year, nor in the presidential campaign of 1952.

Senterfitt's announced intention to run in 1956 set tongues wagging about other possible contenders for the Governorship. Mentioned were Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey of San Augustine; Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepherd of Gladewater; U. S. Senator Price Daniel of Liberty; Associate Justice of the Texas Supreme Court Will Wilson of Dallas; Commissioner of Agriculture John C. White of Wichita Falls; and State Senators Otis Lock of Lufkin, Jimmy Phillips of Angleton, and Jerry Sadler of Perville.

Labor publications have said that Ralph Yarborough of Austin will make a third attempt to land the job. He campaigned against Shivers in 1952 and 1954.

Others talked as "possibles" include Mrs. Oveta Culp Hobby of Houston, wife of Ex-Governor W. P. Hobby, and present Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare; Roy Hofheinz, mayor of Houston; Robert B. Anderson of Vernon, U. S. Secretary of Defense; and Coun-

ty Judge Jim Sewell of Corsicana.

Prospects appear strong that State Senator A. M. Aikin Jr. of Paris will run for lieutenant governor if Ramsey does not seek re-election. Probably in the running for that same office will be Sen. Searcy Bracewell of Houston.

Mentioned frequently as a candidate for Attorney General is House Speaker Jim Lindsey of Texarkana.

Capitol talk continues on the subject that Governor Shivers may step out of office before the end of his present term to accept a high federal appointment. This rumor cropped up again after Shivers' first assistant, Maurice Acers, was appointed by the Governor to serve on the Texas Employment Commission.

Should Shivers resign, Ramsey would become governor automatically. He then would have the inside track in the 1956 campaign.

Waggoner Carr of Lubbock, third term member of the House, emerged as the uncontested prospect for Speaker of the 55th Legislature. When the 54th session adjourned, Representative Carr held signed pledges of support from more than 100 members of the present legislature. No opponent had announced.

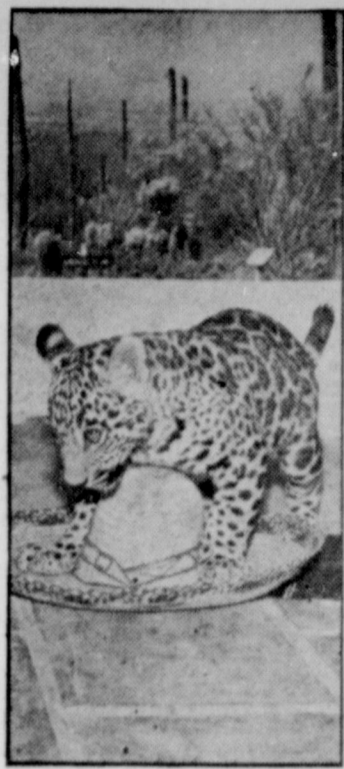
Sen. Neville Colson of Navasota, only woman in the Texas Senate, was elected President Pro Tem of the upper chamber for the period between sessions. This means that she will have an opportunity, under precedent, to sit in as acting Governor for a day. When this happens, she will become the second woman in Texas history to serve as chief executive.

Another bill permitted college faculty members to enter Federal Social Security coverage. Laws correcting and tightening up state regulation of insurance, increasing capital and surplus requirements on insurance companies, and subjecting insurance securities to state regulation, were termed probably the session's top achievements.

And the legislature left behind issues which promise to figure in state politics. It projected investigations into the future on the scandal-ridden veterans' land program.

It failed to pass the key measure of the administration's water program — the \$100,000,000

state aid to local projects.

It left untouched the issue of school desegregation.

The water bond measure was killed by the clock at sine die adjournment, in a bitter House squabble over the tax method to finance it.

But Governor Shivers said the legislature achieved 85 per cent of its task — "a good batting average."

It made notable progress, he said, in such fields as insurance reforms, hospital improvements, public welfare and health, safety, and necessary financing for highways, old age pensions, education and general operations.

"On the whole," said Shivers, "this has been one of the best and most constructive sessions of the legislature in recent history."

It handed him a new tax bill, raising \$28,500,000 a year for state operations and \$20,500,000 a year for highways.

Both the House and the Senate set up committees to continue the Veterans Land investigations. Investigating committees filed reports. The Senate committee said that Governor Shivers and Attorney General Shepperd, members

of the Veterans Land Board, had not been too punctual in attending board meetings. But it said evidence showed they had no part in the mishandling of the program.

Despite all the hullabaloo over Governor Shivers' appearance in California to make the commencement address at the University of Southern California, and threats to boycott the exercises, an overflow crowd of 14,000 attended.

The Texas Legislature had condemned California's "intolerance" and defended the Governor's record.

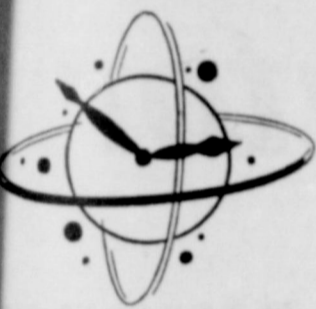

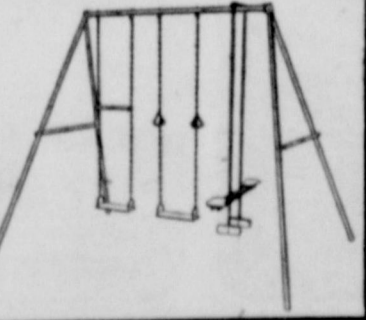

Seed For First Bale Cotton For 1955 Developed On Plains

The first bale of cotton to be produced in the United States this year was grown on a farm at Edinburg operated by Jerry Block and Will Wallace. It came from a 240 acre tract planted to a variety known as Paymaster 54-B, which was developed over a period of years at the Paymaster Farm at Aiken, Texas between Plainview and Lockney.

The bale weighed 547 pounds, graded one inch strict middling and will probably bring the highest ever paid in this country when it is auctioned off in Harlingen this week.

Mr. Block said the cotton was grown under "very trying conditions" on the dry land plot. It received no moisture from planting on January 23 until just before harvesting, and a 20-degree freeze on February 11 killed a third of it, which was up to a good underground stand at that time. Although the freeze lengthened the germination time to 22 days, the cotton was being harvested 109 days after it came up, a total maturity of 131 days.

Block said Wednesday that he and Wallace hadn't thought of trying for the first bale, and that the cotton had been open for several days before they decided to try for the honor.

Picking started Friday, June 3, and the bale was ginned at the Wallace Gin Co., in Edinburg on June 8. The seed cotton weighed 1641 pounds and the seed weight was 930 pounds, a turnout of over 55 per cent.

The Paymaster Farm, under direction of Dr. Harold Loden, has carried on extensive seed breeding since the purchase of the first 80 acres there in 1928 by Western Cottonoil Co. Dr. Loden says the first seed came from a variety called Kekchi, first brought to the U.S. from Guatemala by a government expedition searching for a boll-worm-resistant cotton. The seed first appeared on the Plains at Plainview, where it was called "Pepper Cotton". Paymaster bought some of the seed from the late Mr. Pepper in 1929, found it had many superior qualities and later bought his entire interest.

The "54" variety was released right after the war and was a direct descendant of Pepper Cotton. In 1951 a new breeding pro-

gram was begun, maintaining different lines which came from single plant selections out of No. 54. Each strain was thoroughly tested for yield, early maturity, turnout, etc., and the superior ones were massed together to produce Paymaster 54-B. This testing and massing goes on continuously, with the best strains going into 54-B.

Local Schools May Obtain Films

Local schools can now obtain the latest movies, slides and film strips on thousands of subjects without a huge outlay of money for materials. The methods are explained in an article by two Texas staff members in the June issue of Film and Audiovisual World magazine.

Horace Hartsell, associate professor of education, and Henry McCarty, director of the West Texas Cooperative Audiovisual Service, explain the basic structure of such an operation in their article "Cooperating for Greater Audio-Visual Services."

Factors necessary to make the operation successful, Hartsell and McCarty say, are: One—Does the area have good transportation facilities? Two—Does the area have a common socio-economic interest? Three—Is the area interested in a concentration of population? Four—Is there a higher-education institution located in the area?

Other factors which must be considered are: Five—Can the area provide an adequate, equitable sound financial structure? Six—Can the cooperative group provide a qualified A-V director? Seven—Does the area have regional professional organizations to assist in promotion of the program? Eight—Do the school administrators and educators in the area have a professional outlook and being equally concerned for the education of all the area's children?

What about the financial structure of such an organization? "Of the many patterns suggested and tested, the one found most sound was based on a fixed yearly payment for each school child in the school district. The determination of the financial structure should be made in terms of the local ability to pay and the job you want to do."

Under the West Texas A-V plan, schools have complete lists of all materials available in the A-V Service library at Texas Tech. Teachers look over these catalogs and decide which films, slides and film strips would aid them in teaching certain subjects or areas. The school orders the material. The West Texas Cooperative Audiovisual Service sends the material to the school for use on a certain day or days. When the teacher is finished with the material, it is sent back to the central library for circulation to other schools.

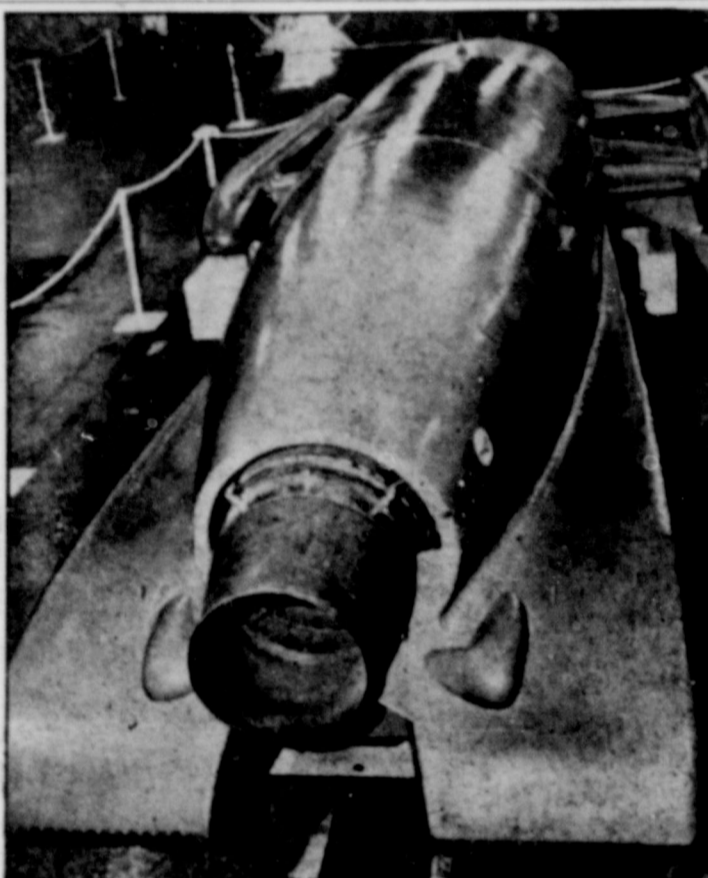

HINTS OFFERED FOR A SAFER VACATION

COLLEGE STATION, JUNE — Vacation motor travel is big business in the United States. Each year more and more vacationers take to the road, with the majority in private cars and the average car is driven 1,200 miles during the vacation. As motor travel booms, traffic accidents, especially in rural areas, also boom.

The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Committee offers a few suggestions which they feel, if followed, will take some of the boom out of accidents. Give the family car a thorough check-up before starting and watch for signs of trouble along the way. Don't block vision, say the experts, by improperly loading the car. Good vision is a must for safe driving.

Be prepared for emergency. A first aid kit, maps, permits, identification, a flashlight and a tool kit and maybe a few spare parts should be carried along.

With the driver rests much of the responsibility for a safe trip. His efficiency is greatly affected by fatigue. Plan the trip, urge the committee, to allow rest stops during the day and a good night's sleep each night. And don't try to drive and see the sights at the same time.

Ignorance of the law is only an excuse. Most states use standard traffic signal shapes. They are a constant guide to safe driving; know and obey them.

Traffic will be a problem during the vacation season in all parts of the country. Just don't get in a hurry and don't drive faster than conditions justify, says the committee. Be adaptable and fit your driving to the peculiarities and conditions that exist in the areas through which you may travel.

Finally, says the committee, take safety with you. It will bring you home in good shape and you can look forward to next year's trip.

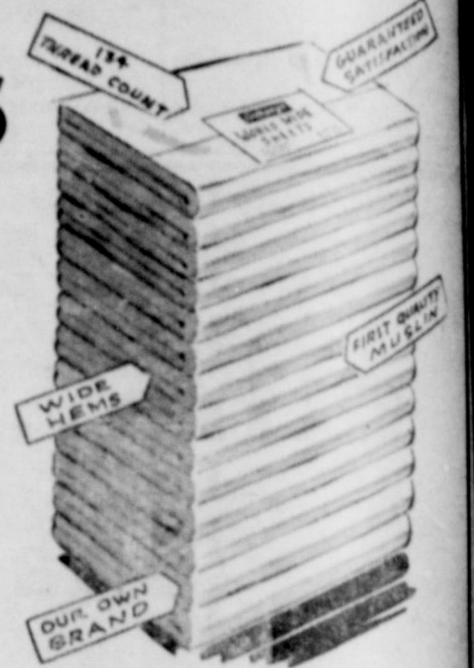
