## Hart & County Residents Attend Freedom Rally And Debate

Approximately 100 Castro County residents attended either or both the Freedom Rally held at the Lubbock Civic Center Theater at 4:00 p.m. and the Phyllis Schlafly-Karen DeCrow debate on the Equal Rights Amendment at the Lubbock Municipal Auditorium at 8:15 p.m., last Thursday, Jan. 18.

Among those attending from Hart were Mr. and Mrs. Harold Bob Bennett, April and Shea, Mr. and Mrs. Darryl McLain, Mr. and Mrs. Deryl Clevenger, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Shave, Mr. and Mrs. James Jackson, Mr. and Mrs. L.C. McLain, Mrs. W.T. King and Terri.

The Freedom Rally was coordinated by Mrs. Don Workman of Lubbock, who serves on the Governor's Commission on the Status of Women in Texas. Mrs. La Neil Wright, Ft. Worth, who serves with Mrs. Workman on this Commission, spoke on issues concerning women and families, today. She was followed by Rep. Clay Smothers of Dallas who received a standing ovation following his outspoken plea for a return to morality and his position for rescission of the Equal Rights Amendment in Texas. "Rep. Smothers appears to be a true American patriot who does not worry about his press image," says Mrs. L.C. McLain. He pleads for Americans to stop looking for handouts from the Federal government and begin looking for ways to return the government to a government "of the people, by the people, for the people."

Music was furnished by the L.C.C. Chorus and by Johnny Ray Watson of Lorenzo.

The debate between Mrs. Schlafly and Mrs. DeCrow thoroughly covered both sides of the ERA question. Mrs. Schlafly has been a leading opponent of the ERA. She is from Illinois and stated that the issue had been defeated by the

Illinois legislature on fourteen occasions. Mrs. DeCrow is an outspoken feminist and proponent of the ERA and she vowed that the time for ratification would be extended as long as it took for it to become the 27th Amendment to our Constitution.

There were approximately 1000 people attending the Freedom Rally, and an overflow crowd attended the debate. Mrs. Schlafly said that the Tech debate was the first time she had appeared on a college campus that was not 90 percent pro-ERA.

founded in the mid 50's by J.C. Hamby of Olton and, through the years, has provided wholesale and retail gasoline, oil and butane for persons in the Hart area.

Management of the wholesale and butane divisions of the business remains unchanged.

The firm has been the Phillips "66" jobber since its beginning. Extensive expansion, featuring car wash and key pump service was added in 1976.

## Castro Ninth In State In Barley Production

Castro and Moore counties tied for ninth place among the barley producing areas of the state this year, according to the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Total production in each of the counties was 36,000 bushels.

Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service records showed a 68.2 percent decrease from the 1977 crop, which hit 3.4 million bushels. The decline was primarily due to prolonged drought over the state.

"The crop got off to a good start, helped along by August, 1977, rains," commented Agriculture Commissioner Reagan Brown. "But rapid depletion of available moisture caused

stands to deteriorate shortly after the crop was up, and continuing drought conditions from October to May caused prospects to decline.

"Only 40,000 acres of barley were harvested this year," he continued, "even though 110,000 acres were planted. Yields were cut from 40 bushels per acre last year to only an average 27 bushels per acre."

The top 10 barley producing counties included Parmer, first; Hansford, second; Young, third; Deaf Smith, fourth; Pecos, fifth; Sherman, sixth; Randall, seventh; Wilbarger, eighth; Moore, ninth; and Castro, tenth.

officials because of his unique brand of humor.

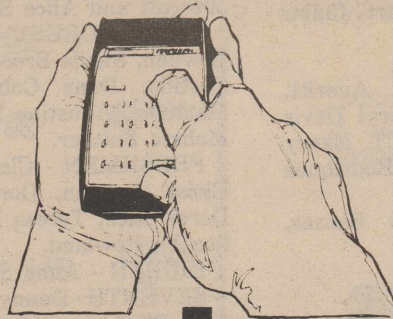

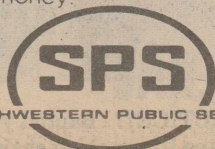

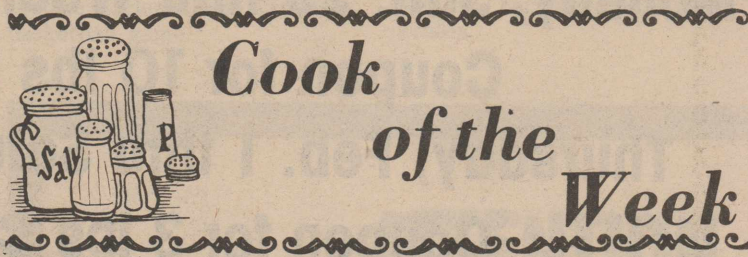

### BLACK CHERRY JELLO SALAD

1 pkg Black Cherry Jello  
1 can Eagle Brand milk  
1 flat can crushed pineapple  
1 small carton cottage cheese  
3/4 c chopped pecans

Dissolve Jello in one cup hot water, add 1/2 cup cold water. Add all ingredients and mix. Set in refrigerator until firm.

### LILLY'S SALAD

1 pkg Orange Jello  
1 c pineapple juice  
1 c sweet milk  
whipped cream or Dream Whip  
nuts  
coconut

Dissolve Jello in pineapple

juice which has been heated to boiling. Let cool, add milk. When barely set, fold in whipped cream or prepared Dream Whip. Fold in nuts and coconut according to taste.

### SOCK-IT-TO-ME CAKE

1 box yellow cake mix  
1 c sour cream  
1/2 c Crisco Oil  
1/4 c sugar  
1/4 c water  
4 eggs

Beat all ingredients for 2 mins. Pour 2/3 of batter into tube pan.

### Mix:

1 c chopped pecans  
2 T brown sugar  
2 t cinnamon

Sprinkle on top of batter in pan then add remaining batter. Bake at 375° for 45 mins or until done.

### POTATO REFRIGERATOR ROLLS

1 1/2 c water or potato water (lukewarm)  
2/3 c sugar  
1 1/2 t salt  
1 pkg dry yeast

Stir until dissolved and add: 2 eggs

2/3 c shortening  
1 c mashed (lukewarm) potatoes (instant if desired)  
7 to 7 1/2 c flour

Mix first with spoon then with hand (or use mixer).

Set in refrigerator 2 hrs before shaping.

## Promenaders Schedule Heart Fund Dance

The Castro County Unit of the American Heart Association will begin their "Heart Month" in February by helping with the Dimmitt Promenaders Fifth Annual "Heart Fund Dance" Feb. 3.

With equipment bought from funds acquired as the result of earlier Heart Fund Dances, the hospital personnel is now better trained in helping victims of heart attacks or strokes in a quicker and more accurate manner.

Monies brought in by The Promenaders, nearly \$3,500 in four years, has been used to buy three adult Resusi-Annies and one baby Resusi-Annie. These have been used in area CPR classes.

Now in Castro County, one person in ten is trained in CPR. Before this equipment was purchased, CPR training was limited to hospital and fire personnel or persons trained outside the county.

A part of the funds has also been used to purchase an Arythma-Annie which is a training tool for proper care of heart attack victims.

Blood pressure cups have also been bought with money donated from these dances. These are used each Saturday morning in free blood pressure clinics in the hospital lobby and in all surrounding area communities, where free clinics have been held periodically.

Support of the area merchants for the Promenaders' Dance each year is appreciated. There is also need for the people of the County to come and support the dance. Since the money is used directly for

the Castro County hospital and residents of the county, it may be your life that is saved from equipment or knowledge acquired from the equipment afforded by the Promenaders' "Heart Fund Dance."

The Promenaders' Heart Fund Dance will begin Feb. 3 in the Exposition Building, with round dancing beginning at 7 p.m. and the grand march at 8 p.m.

Come, help the Promenaders and Castro County unit of American Heart Association provide equipment and enjoy an evening of fun entertainment.

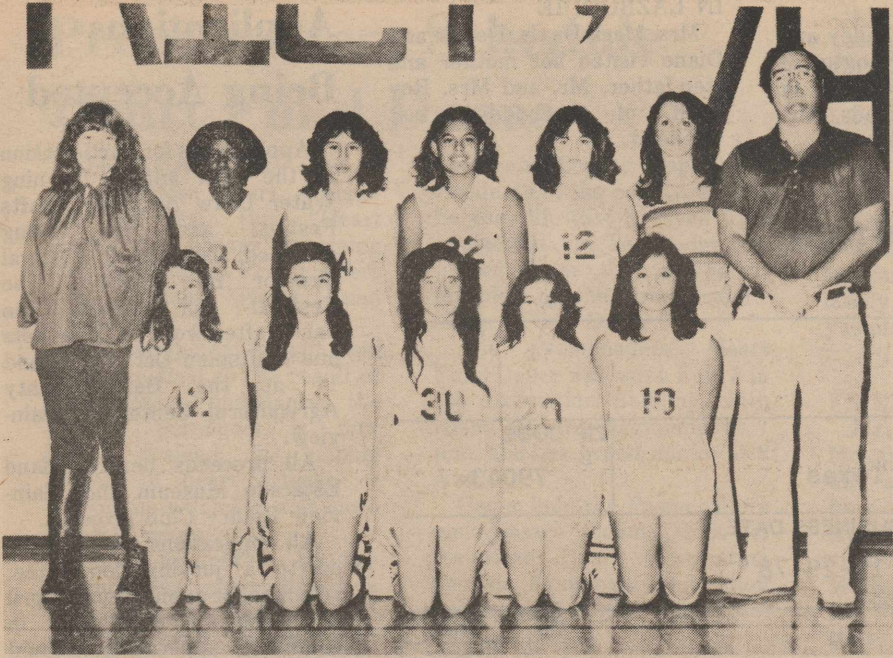

**County Ranks 6th In State**

Castro County was the seventh largest wheat producing area in the state this year, despite a 53.5 percent reduction in harvest in the county, the Texas Department of Agriculture has reported.

Total production was 1,630,000 bushels. Statewide production totaled 54 million bushels, down 54 percent from last year's 117.5 million-bushel crop.

"As with other grain crops this year, weather was an important factor in the production decline," commented Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown. "The lack of rainfall in most wheat-growing areas cut back both grain production and grazing."

"Other factors, however, were also involved. Participation in the federal set-aside program no doubt had some effect, as well as other decisions by some farmers to cut back their production this year. Total planted acreage dropped from 6.3 million acres last year to 5.7 million acres in 1978."

Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service records indicate a five-bushel-per-acre reduction in average yields due to the drought and insect problems, down to 20 bushels per acre.

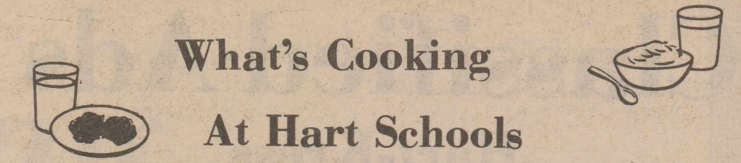

## ATTENTION All Corn Growers

The High Plains Farm Bargaining Association is now legally chartered to bargain for producers of food grade corn and other commodities in the State of Texas.

A committee has been in contact with purchasers of food grade corn [both white and yellow]. We continue to recommend that farmers not sign food contracts for \$5 and \$6 cwt as offered. We recommend that farmers thoroughly read, consider and understand all aspects that regard price, grade, variety, moisture, crackage, shrinkage and shrinkage percentage, hauling, long lines, field loss, extra spraying, lower yields before signing any contract. All of these things considered, we believe that the contract offered to date is less than the present market price.

Some consideration, we believe, should be given to other food grain contracts that are available.

The committee believes that anything less than \$6 for yellow food corn and \$7 for white food corn will be a loss for the grower considering inflation in costs of production. Plans are being made to consider ensilage contracts and high moisture corn contracts.

The cooperation by all corn growers and potential corn growers is vitally needed to support this bargaining effort. There may never be another opportunity like this one.

Cross Country Mixed Doubles Ski Relays, Marathon, Ski Club Kits Unveiled

A series of mixed doubles sprint relay races at the local, regional and national levels plus a cross country ski marathon championship coupled with an innovative ski club concept has been launched by Fleischmann's Margarine as part of its continuing sponsorship of the U.S. Nordic Ski Team.

### Value of a Dollar

Our own government admits that the value of its dollar has decreased regularly for many years.

Actually the prices of goods and services have not changed if you were to use 1964 dollars.

But, since our 1979 dollars are only worth one-fourth as much, it takes four times as many of them to do the same job.

I previously pointed out that if you bought a house in 1964 with dollars that were each worth a dollar, and then sold it for dollars that were only worth a quarter each, you would have to get four times as many of the cheaper dollars just to break even.

In other words, if you paid \$10,000 for a house in 1964 you would have to get \$40,000 now in order to break even.

And, even though you only broke even, the IRS would want to tax you on \$30,000 of "profit".

The silver coins that were in circulation in 1964 are still available. They are still legal tender. And they are still worth 1964 dollars.

By that I mean that four 1964 silver quarters are still worth a 1964 dollar, which I will call a "real" dollar. They are also worth more than four 1979 dollars. So if you sold your house for "real"

(1964) dollars you wouldn't make a profit and therefore should not have to pay any taxes.

Let's say you bought a house five or six years ago when the dollar was worth 50¢ and you paid \$20,000 for the house. It is now worth \$40,000, but today's dollars are only worth 25¢. So, again, you didn't make any real profit.

What if you sold your house for a mixture of cheap 25¢ dollars and valuable "real" dollars as defined above?

You could end up with \$20,000 face value and claim you made no profit.

If the IRS were to complain that you got some dollars that were worth more than a dollar, you could point out that the average value of all the dollars you got was the same as the value of the dollars you paid for the house.

The IRS might try to claim a taxable profit on the "real" dollars that were worth more than the dollars you paid for the house. So you would then claim a loss on the dollars that you got that were worth less than the dollars you paid.

If you didn't actually make a profit, why should you pay a tax on it?

But what would you do with the "real" dollars?

You might use them to buy your next house. The seller will take less for it when you show him the tax advantage involved.

But, don't worry. The demand for "real" dollars will continually increase as more and more people become aware of the debasement of our currency. ©1979 by Today's Logic, Inc.

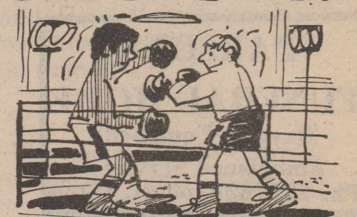

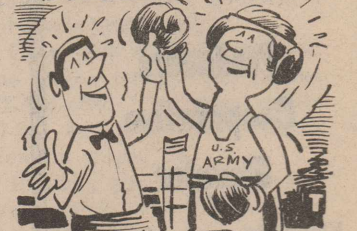
