W. R. 'Bill' Cayler Dies Tuesday Morning After Being Struck by Car on Main Street

Death struck suddenly on Perryton's Main street Tuesday morning, taking one of the city's most popular business men and sportsmen, W. R. "Bill" Cayler, who died some three hours after being struck by an automobile in front of the First National Bank. The accident occurred about 7:20 a. m., as Bill was crossing the street, enroute to a barber shop for his regular morning shave. He was about half way across the street when he was hit by a car driven by L. C. Case, Ochiltree county employee, who was on his way to work. The brakes on the Case automobile were defective, according to reports of investigating officers, and the overcast sky made the visibility somewhat reduced. Case was driving with his lights on. It was reported that Bill started across the street, saw the car approaching, dodged back, then dodged forward again, being struck by the car which had been turned in an attempt to avoid hitting him. He was thrown across the hood of the car and then to the pavement. The car traveled about 12 or 15 feet from the point of impact. The cause of death was a fractured skull, and he also suffered a badly broken leg where the bumper struck him. He was rushed to the Perryton hospital a few minutes after the accident occurred, but lived only three hours. Death came at approximately 10:30 o'clock Tuesday morning. He had lived in Perryton for the past 25 years and was very active in the civic life of the community. He was owner and operator of the Perryton Cleaners.

A World War II veteran, Tarbox served as a traffic control instructor while in the Navy, based at Pearl Harbor. He is the brother of Sheriff E. J. Tarbox of Lipscomb county.

Slow Rain Brings .54 Inch of Icy Moisture

A slow, drizzling rain started falling late Tuesday night and by 6 o'clock Wednesday evening had brought .54 inch of moisture, according to the official moisture gauge kept by Judge Jack Allen. The rain froze as it fell, covering houses, automobiles and all other outdoor objects with a sheet of ice. Streets were not icy, however, during the day. As the Herald went to press Wednesday night, a misting rain was still coming down.

Mrs. Morris of Blue Mound Dies Tuesday

Mrs. Andy Morris, age 63, died Tuesday morning at the Perryton Hospital after an illness of several weeks duration. Mrs. Morris had been in poor health for about a year, and took a turn for the worse last week. She had lived in the Blue Mound community with her husband for the past 45 years, where her family of five girls and three boys were reared. Mrs. Morris is survived by her husband.

This would not be news in most sections of the country, where the population is 100 per cent white, it is. The colored couple, Robert E. Bradford and Velma Mae Rogers, had their wedding arrangements made by a wedding catering firm in Wichita, which called down to Perryton to see if such arrangements could be made. A marriage license is granted in Texas without a waiting period, which was the main inducement toward coming to the Lone Star state for the ceremony, according to the participants.

Local Youth is Hurt in Wreck

Cornelius Anderson, age 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Anderson, suffered serious injuries Thursday night in a motorcycle accident about half way between Follett and Darrouzett. The youth was traveling alone on a borrowed motorcycle going from Follett to Darrouzett at an undetermined rate of speed when the machine overturned, throwing him to the pavement. He evidently landed on his head, as he suffered a brain concussion and multiple painful cuts and bruises about the head and shoulders. His brother, Junior Anderson, was behind Cornelius in a car and was the first to reach him after the accident. He was taken to Darrouzett for first aid, then rushed to the Perryton Hospital. He did not regain consciousness until Monday afternoon, and the hospital reports indicated that he was conscious only at short intervals.

A Capella Choir of NTSC to Give Program Saturday Night

North Texas State College's picturesque A Capella Choir, scheduled to appear in Perryton Dec. 6 in the high school auditorium at 8 p. m., has come to be identified by critics as one of the finest choral organizations in America since it was organized nine years ago. On the program for the Perryton concert will be religious hymns, Negro spirituals, and folk music, according to Frank McKinley, conductor of the choir. Divided into four parts, the program will begin with "Crucifixus," by Lotti; "Grant Unto Me the Joy of Thy Salvation," by Brahms; and "Come, Jesus, Come," by Bach. 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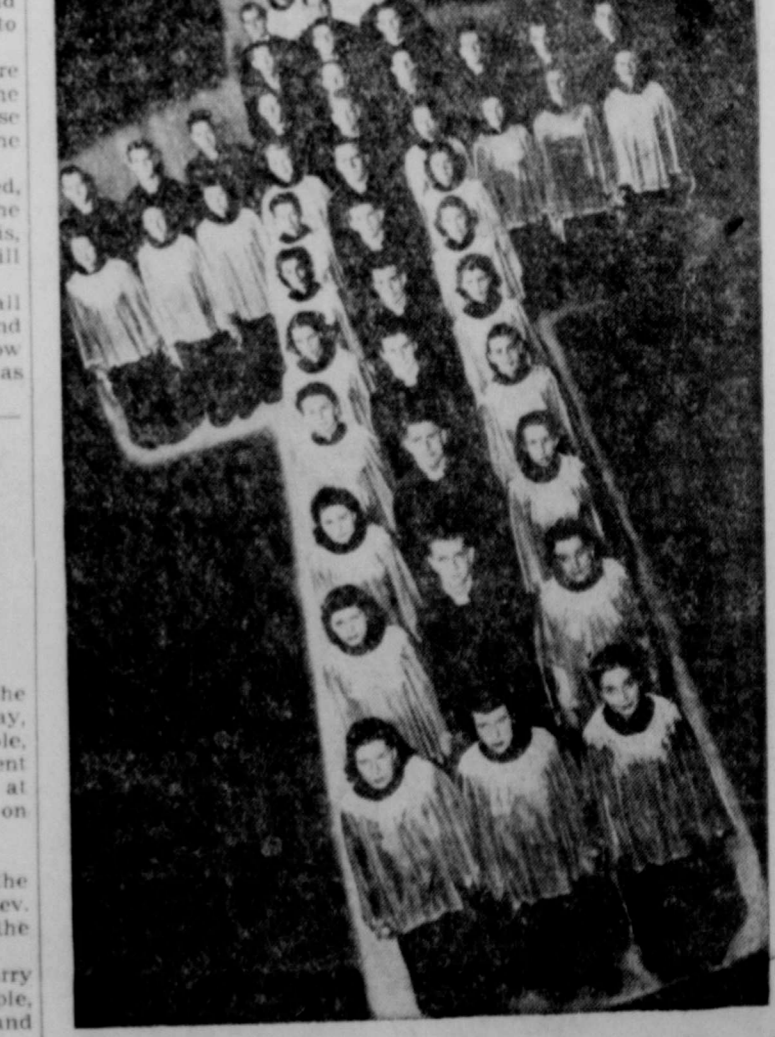

Final Services Held Friday for Geo. W. Cutter

Impressive last rites were held at the Methodist church on Friday, November 28, for George W. Cutter, pioneer resident of Ochiltree county, who passed away on Nov. 25.

Rev. Jim H. Sharpe was in charge of the services. Pallbearers were Chas. Kent, Vance Apple, Clarence Neufeld, W. H. Lance, Leroy Hartman and Lester Baumann.

With his passing, another vacant spot is left in the rapidly thinning ranks of this county's early settlers who, with their work and their vision, made these plains grow from an expanse of bare prairie to a rich land of wheat and cattle.

George Westley Cutter was born on January 27, 1875 in Ill. and came to this country as a lad of twelve years, in March, 1887, two years before Ochiltree county was organized. With his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Cutter, and his two brothers, Albert and Henry, he lived on a homestead located about three miles southwest of old Ochiltree.

He was married on January 27, 1901 to Miss Inez Woodbury, and to this union was born two children, Addison and Mabel.

In the early days of old Ochiltree, George served as a county commissioner and was active in the civic affairs of that new

town. He and his family moved to Perryton when the town was founded and with the exception of two years spent in Tulsa, Texas, have lived here since that time.

He was the first mail carrier over the Perryton-Canadian route, and made this daily trip for many years, traveling through all kinds of weather over the dirt road. He stopped carrying the mail over this route about ten years ago, after the highway was paved.

Survivors include his wife, a son, Rev. Addison Cutter of Wilson, Okla.; a daughter, Mrs. Mabel Smith of Waurika, Okla.; two brothers, Albert F. and Henry T. Cutter, both of Perryton, and one grand daughter, Madolyn Cutter, Wilson, Okla.

Interment was in the Ochiltree cemetery.

Elsewhere in the Herald this week appears the annual selection of the all-district football team for district 1-A. This selection was made by five of the six coaches in the district at a meeting held Monday night.

We were disappointed to find that the Rangers placed but three men on this first team as selected by the coaches. Last year, when Phillips won the district title, they had five men on the first team and three on the second team. This year, the Rangers have the only perfect record in region 1-A, and they have thoroughly outclassed all district opponents during the season. We can't imagine a team which has swept through five conference games, scoring not less than 31 points in any game, being held in such low esteem when it comes to picking out an all-district team.

It looks to us like the coaches did some "horse-trading" and put a representative from each school on this mythical team even though the player's actual performance during the season did not warrant it. We realize that a player looks better playing with a championship team than with a mediocre one, but the Rangers are loaded with talent this year, as the record shows and the players should be recognized.

To be placed on this all-district

team is an honor to the boys. They receive recognition and a gold football as a permanent trophy of their football prowess during high school days. To be denied a place on the team because of a desire to have adequate representation from every school in the district is unfair to those players who deserve mention.

If this writer were picking an all-district team with which he wanted to do battle for the district title, he would pick the Perryton Rangers to the last man, not wishing to trade off any of them. But it must be admitted that there are other players in this district whose individual performances have stood out this year, and in picking a mythical all-district team in the accepted manner, some of these players from other teams would have to replace some of the Rangers.

We'd pick a first all-district team like this:

Ends: Hummer, Perryton and Wright, Phillips.

Tackles: Weatherall, White Deer and Thurston, Perryton.

Guards: Stinson, Perryton and Hudson, Dumas.

Center: Seedig, Perryton.

Backs: Keith Flowers, Perryton; Vernon Flowers, Perryton; Powell, Perryton and McClellan, Phillips.

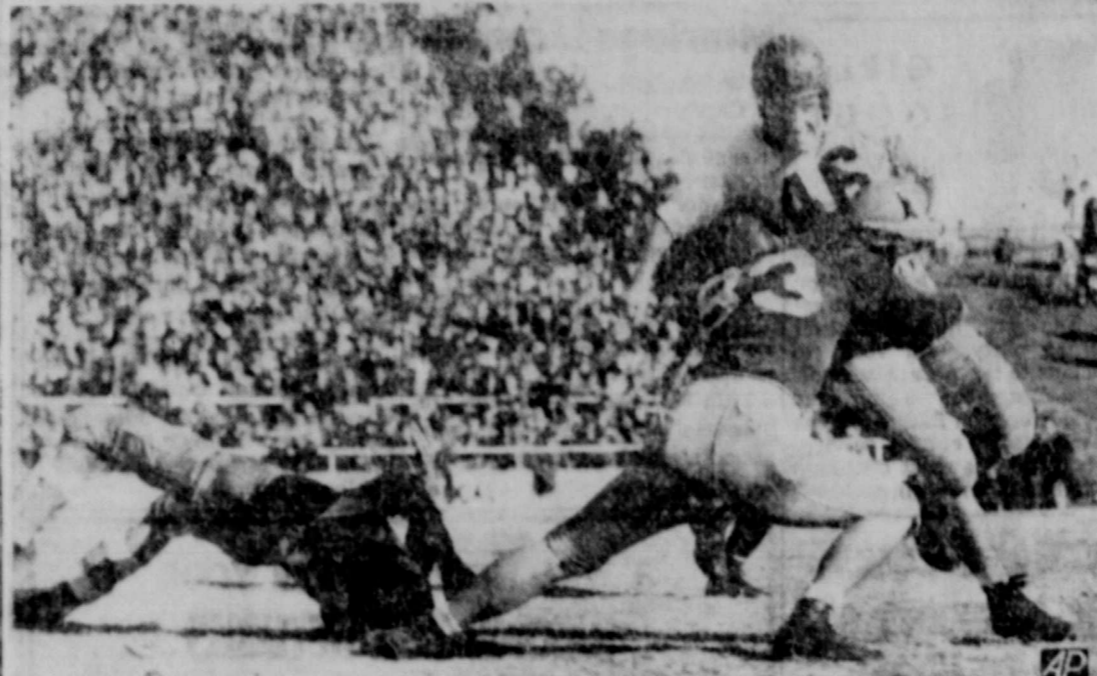
The second team would go like this:

This sort of a selection probably wouldn't meet with too much favor, since it gives Perryton 11 players on the first two teams, Phillips 5, White Deer 4, Dalhart 1, Dumas 1 and Canadian 0. This, to us, however, would be a fairly accurate reflection of the final district standings, which showed the top three Perryton, Phillips and White Deer standing way above the other three. It may not and probably will not be so next year, but it was this year.

Another thing that took place at the Dumas meeting while the coaches were picking their all-district teams was the meeting of the school superintendents to set up the new district 1-A for next year. Canadian and White Deer will not be in class A football next year because of insufficient enrollment. They will in all probability compete with Panhandle, Spearman, and Claude in class B. The new district 1-A will be composed of Perryton, Phillips, Dumas, Dalhart, Tulla, Hereford and Canyon.

Although some of the schools applied for admission in class A ranks, the superintendents voted down such requests, in accordance with the advice of the interscholastic League. We don't think this means Canadian, Panhandle, White Deer, etc., will be playing a much weaker brand of football, however. It was just a couple of seasons or so back that all of these teams were beating the ears off our Rangers. And the time could well come again when it will be their turn.

For the first time since 1939, a Perryton football game will be broadcast from Ranger Field when of one, but two stations take the air to give a play-by-play description of the bi-district clash with Canyon. 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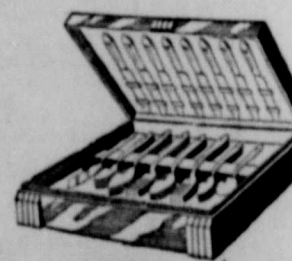

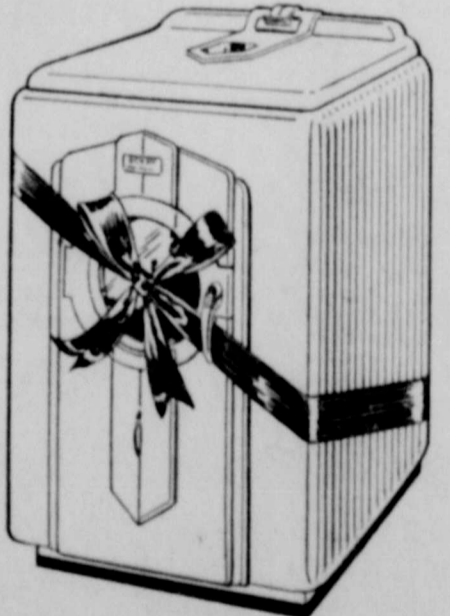

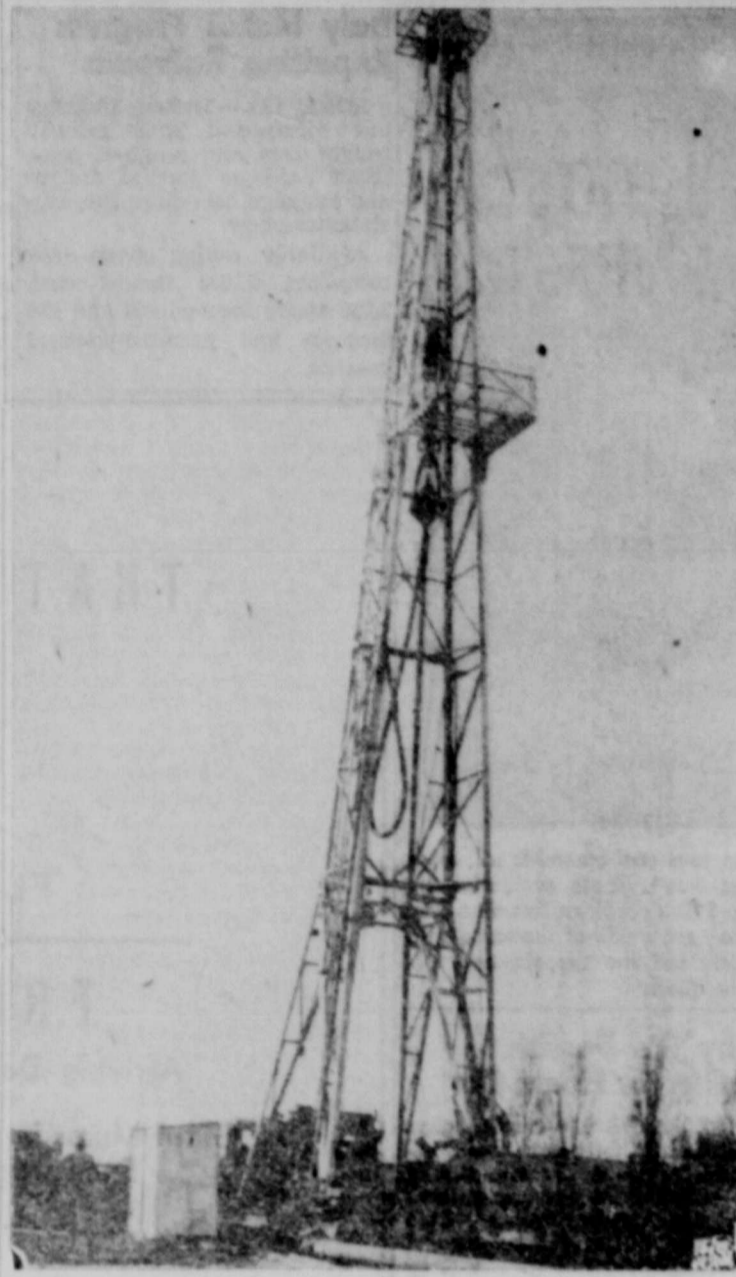

Informants said each piece of equipment is being mounted on heavy timber so it can be skidded easily across ice and snow.

DALLAS, Nov. 29 (Special)—Central offices for the expanding Texas Press Association will be located in the Baker Hotel in Dallas.

Announcement of the completion of arrangements for headquarters was made by Paul Fuikes, president of the TPA and publisher of the Wolfe City Sun.

Vernon T. Sanford, secretary-manager of the Oklahoma Press Association, who resigned effective December 1 to become manager of the Texas association, will open the Dallas office Monday.

TPA central offices will serve 696 daily and weekly newspapers in Texas.

'Met' Puts Masterpieces On Postage Stamps

NEW YORK (AP)—Art lovers and students throughout the U. S. will now be able to collect reproductions of the world's most famous masterpieces of art just as though they were collecting stamps, says the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City.

The museum has inaugurated "Metropolitan Miniatures" in the form of postage stamps which will be divided into sets of large perforated sheets of 24 color reproductions of paintings, sculpture, and other art objects.

The picture-stamps are 2 by 2½ inches in size. Some of the miniatures of the first set include The Calmady Children by Lawrence, View of Toledo by El Greco, Portrait of The Artist by Rembrandt, Edward VI by Holbein, George Washington by Stuart, The Thinker by Rodin, and Woman on Sofa by Degas.

LUBBOCK, Dec. 1—Texas Technological College crop judging team took first place in the National Inter-Collegiate Grain Judging contest in Kansas City, Mo., and a team member, James Walter Patrick, took high individual honors.

The Texas Tech team scored 4,917.2 points of a possible 5,430. Other teams in the contest were Oklahoma A. & M., Kansas State, Texas A. & M., Michigan State, South Dakota and Penn State.

Patrick, whose home is Quitman, made 1,700.2 of a possible 1,800 points to take first individual honors. He won first in identification and crop judging contests and third place in commercial grading.

Arthur Story of Dallas rated fifth individual in the contest by winning fourth in identification and crop judging and eleventh in commercial grading.

The other team member, John Lee of Rochester, took sixth individual honors after winning first place in commercial grading, eight in crop judging and last in identification.

The team, coached by Cecil Ayres, assistant professor of plant industry, will compete in the International Crop Judging contest in Chicago, Nov. 30.

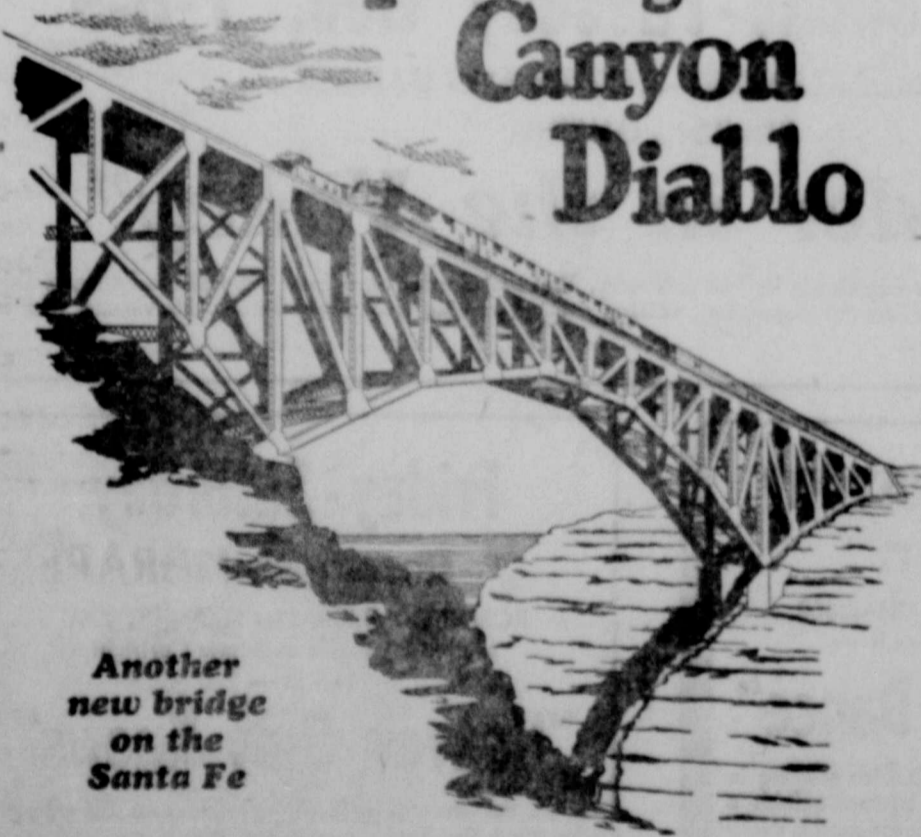

What Will the Dollar Buy?

It seems to be universally believed that the principal labor organizations will demand new and substantial wage increases early next year.

The steady rise in the cost of living may justify this. But, at the same time, the rank and file of labor as well as the union leaders should give serious thought to what continued wage boosts without any improvement in worker productivity will mean.

The worker's real interest is not merely in how many dollars his pay envelope contains. It is, instead, in how much food, clothing, housing and everything else those dollars will buy. In Germany, after the first war, labor received billions of marks a day. But those billions of marks wouldn't buy enough to keep a family alive. That is always the result of unbridled inflation.

One of the reasons for high commodity prices is that the wave of wage increases which followed the last war was not accompanied by more output per man. In many key industries, output has been below the 1941 level. In other words, the emphasis has been on more pay for less work. That is a suicidal doctrine, and carried to the ultimate conclusion will cause complete deterioration of the purchasing power of the dollar and economic chaos on a grand scale.

A few top labor leaders have emphasized these facts lately, and have told their memberships that greater production is essential if the living standards of the country are to be protected. If all comes back to the fact that we can't get something for nothing—we must pay for everything in one fashion or another. Labor, like any other group, must earn its keep.

BABSON DISCUSSES RURAL BUYING

BARBON PARK, Mass., Nov. 25—Farmers have always been wise spenders. Until recent years necessity, as much as long-headedness, tightened the gnarled hand that held the purse strings. Prosperity today rules in most communities and everyone should buy with caution.

Suggestions to Farmers

First, I suggest contracting for a good supply of fertilizers and insecticides—enough at least for next season's requirements. Purchase of needed machinery of all kinds also should prove a good investment, despite the relatively high cost. New equipment should more than compensate for its cost through savings on high labor charges and expensive repairs to old and nearly worn out machines. The well-mechanized farm, factory or store is the dividend producer.

I also advise laying in a good supply of canned goods and dried fruits, such as prunes and raisins. Such foodstuffs will supplement the regular diet and will come in handy in the event of a crop failure next year. Money spent on a deep freeze unit should prove worth its weight in gold. A year's supply of shoes and clothing also is a good bet. So see your local merchants at once. Your winter's supply of fuel should be purchased, or contracted for, immediately, if you have not already done so. The railroad car shortage may result in delayed deliveries of those and other items, and their prices are likely to go higher rather than lower.

For Livestock and Dairy Farmers

The suggestions in the preceding paragraphs apply also to livestock and dairy farmers. But there is more in the picture than that. This year's short corn crop has raised serious problems for both groups. Should, for instance, stocker and feeder cattle be purchased now? Should the 1948 spring pig crop be culled at increased? I believe that the 1948 outlook for both groups is favorable. Sticking now to livestock, I see no reason why purchases of

stocker and feeder cattle on breaks should not prove profitable, provided your supply of feedstuffs is assured. Moreover, I should have no hesitation, on the same basis, in producing a good crop of spring pigs next year. Prices of cattle and hogs should hold at relatively high levels during 1948.

The record baby crops of recent years, with production still in high gear, plus prospects of continued large adult consumption of fluid milk and manufactured dairy products, point to another profitable year for the dairy farmer. Under the circumstances, it seems to me that money spent for replacement purchases of milk cows and heifers would be well spent. Especially will this be true should weather in 1948 be normal, and feed crops larger than this year.

What About Building Repairs?

Many readers are much concerned about building repairs. They have the necessary money, but hesitate to take action because of high-priced labor and material. I suggest making only necessary repairs at this time. Prices of building materials, especially lumber, are at or near their postwar peak and much is of inferior quality. The next broad move will be downward. Major repairs, as well as new construction, should be postponed until you can get more for your money.

Nevertheless, there are a few items in the construction category that should be purchased

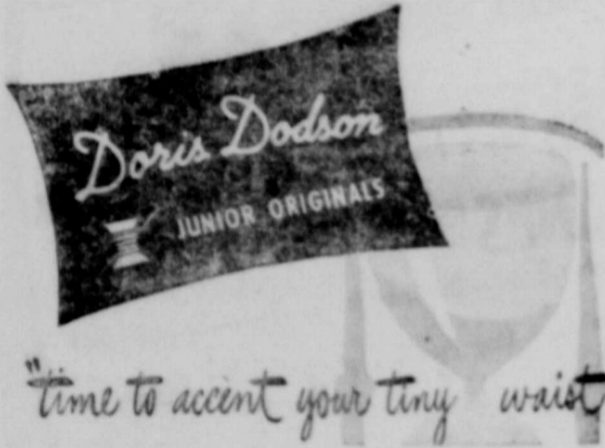

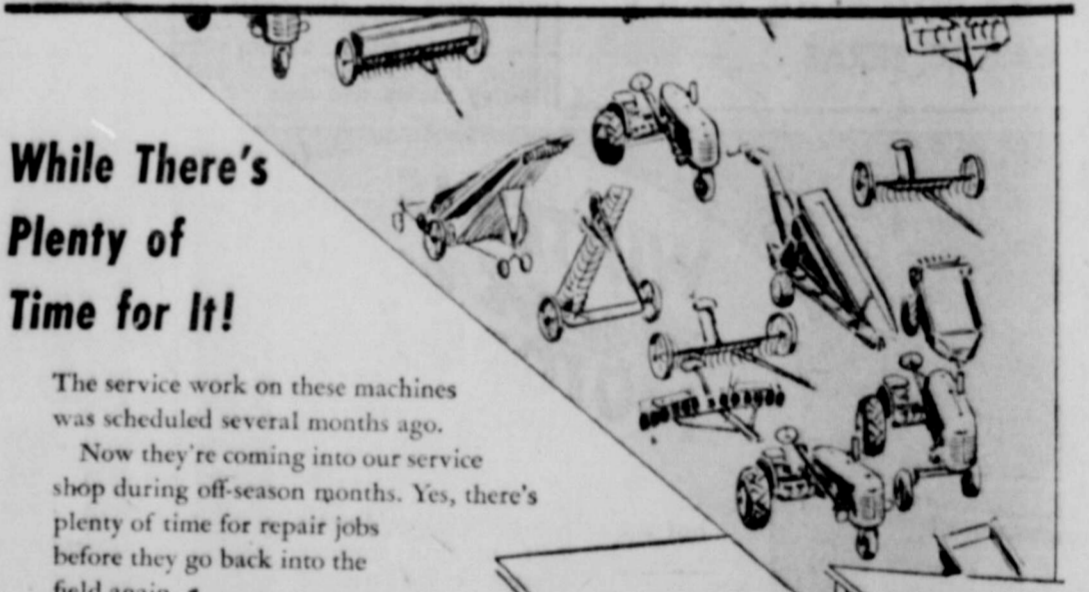

Veterans' NEWS

Nearly half of the veterans financing the purchase of homes with the aid of GI loans are buying newly built houses at an average selling price of \$8,200 each the Veterans Administration reports.

Analysis of GI home loan figures for the period over a four-month period (May through Aug. of this year) shows that over 45 per cent of the loans made were on new construction, and that the remainder were on homes previously occupied, for which the sales price averaged \$6,675.

With a current average of 48,000 veterans monthly using their loan guarantees rights for home purchase, this means that about 22,000 new homes per month are being sold to veterans under the program.

Since the first GI loan was made late in 1944, over 971,000 veterans had received VA guaranteed home loans as of the end of Oct. The total value of their anteemed home loans as of the end home purchases exceeds \$5,610,000,000.

Only a month remains in which most National Service Life Insurance policies that have lapsed may be reinstated without necessity of taking a physical examination, the Veterans Administration said.

After the deadline date of December 31, 1947, policies that have lapsed more than three months cannot be reinstated without the veteran proving his insurability by a complete physical examination.

At the present time, and until the end of the year, a veteran may reinstate term insurance in most cases by simply signing a statement to the effect that his health is as good as it was at the time of lapse. Then, by payment of two monthly premiums, his insurance can be reinstated.

Veteran Forum

Q. If I am receiving retirement pay, will I be permitted to get the full amount of subsistence allowance while I am attending school or while I am in job training under the GI Bill?

A. Retirement pay is not considered income from productive labor and need not be included in your estimate of earnings filed with Veterans Administration; therefore, it is not a bar to receipt of full subsistence allowance.

Q. Will Veterans Administration increase the \$13.80 I get for my 10 percent World War II service-connected disability in event I marry?

A. No. Your compensation is based on the degree of disability. No additional compensation is payable for dependents.

Q. I am an ex-WAC with an honorable discharge and contemplating marriage to a non-veteran. Will the marriage cause me to lose any of my rights to benefits under the GI Bill?

A. No.

Q. May I be furnished a wheel-chair by Veterans Administration?

A. VA will furnish you a wheel-chair if you have a service-connected disability requiring the use of a wheel-chair, or if a wheel-chair is required for use at home upon your discharge from a period of hospital treatment or domiciliary care.

VA Offices Will Close Saturdays

Veterans administration contact offices will no longer be open for business on Saturdays after the thirteenth of December according to an announcement by Robert W. Sisson, Manager, West Texas VA region.

VA contact offices in this region are located at Borger, Amarillo, Childress, Lubbock, Abilene, San Angelo, Big Spring, Odessa, and El Paso.

Veterans and their dependents are invited to contact the office any day from Monday through Friday between the hours of 8:00 a. m. to 4:45 p. m.

"It is deeply regretted that it has become necessary to close the VA contact offices on Saturdays, but under Civil Service regulations our work-week has been limited to 40 hours," Sisson said.

Exams Replace Caste in Germany

WIESBADEN (AP)—Caste barriers in the German civil service are on their way out, reports Richard C. Simonson, chief of the military government civil service branch in Hesse.

He says modern methods of competitive examinations are being introduced to eliminate the old-style automatic preference given to members of upper social groups.

It is not Gosselt's idea that the president be elected by a straight popular vote, with no regard for state lines. He points out that such a system would of necessity force adoption of a federal standard of qualification for voters, a right which is vested with the states. "Georgia has an 18-year voting age," Gosselt reminded the subcommittee. "Other states would have to lower their voting age to 18 to be on a parity with Georgia. Then again, it would aggravate sectional matters. "For example, if people in New York built up 15,000,000 votes, we would have to pile up 4,000,000 or 5,000,000 down in Texas or they would be outvoting us. We would be accusing them of voting their dogs and cats and dead grandmothers and they would be accusing us of the same thing." That, he continued, is why the present electoral voting strength based on congressional repre-

ceived only 42 percent of the popular vote of the nation, yet received 82 percent of the electoral vote.

In the very first election in the history of the nation, in 1796, three electors who were supposed to vote for Thomas Jefferson voted instead for John Adams. As a result, Adams received 71 electoral votes to 68 for Jefferson.

The popular vote in Texas in the 1944 election: Roosevelt, 821,605; Dewey, 191,425; Thomas (Socialist), 594; Watson (Prohibitionist), 1,017; all other candidates combined, 135, 689.

Under the Gossett plan, Roosevelt would have received 71.4 percent of Texas' 23 votes, Dewey 16.6.

That would have meant 16.4 votes for Roosevelt, 3.8 votes for Dewey, and the remaining 2.8 of the state's 23 votes going to the other candidates.

Scots Plan Exhibit Of Produce in U. S.

EDINBURGH (AP)—The Scottish Council of Development and Industry is preparing to hold an exhibition of Scottish goods in the United States.

Thomas Johnston, chairman of the Scottish Tourist Board, who was asked to investigate the possibilities of staging such an exhibition during his visit to the U. S., has reported that the British Ambassador, Lord Inverchapel, and representatives of many of the Scottish Associations in the United States were "all very friendly towards the idea."

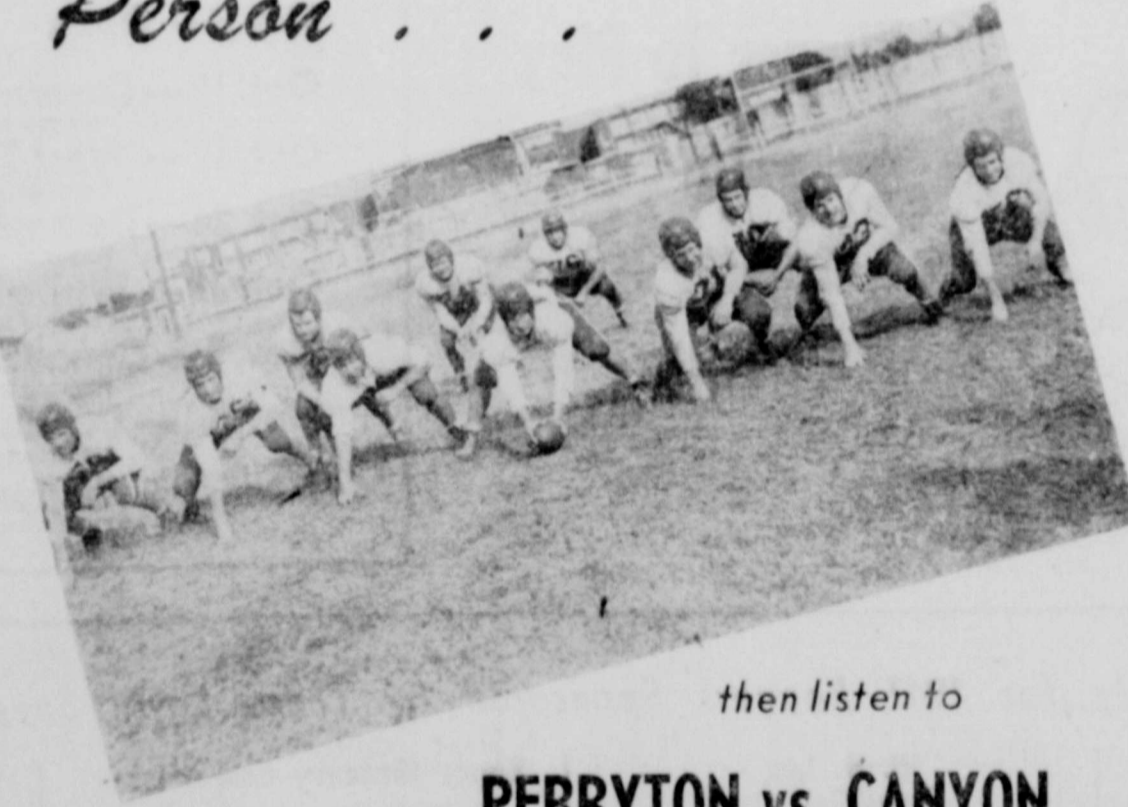

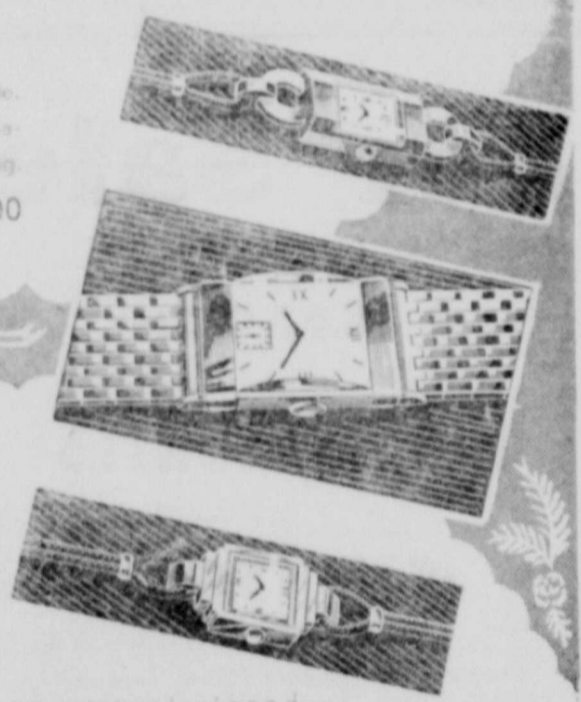

Texas 4-H'ers Win Chicago Trips

SUPERIOR records of achievement in 4-H Clothing, Garden, Girls' Record and Tractor Maintenance have won 1947 state championship honors for four Lone Star State club members. Each receives an all expense trip to the 26th National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, Nov. 30-Dec. 4. The winners, who were selected by the state club office, and brief outlines of their records follow:

Louis Muniza, 15, of Wharton, is the state winner in the 1947 4-H Tractor Maintenance awards program. His Chicago Congress trip is provided by Stanolind Oil and Gas Company. He has been a 4-H'er for four years. His record shows that he has instructed other 4-H club members in lessons on tractor maintenance. Louis has found that a tractor with proper care and operation results in greater efficiency, more dependability and lower costs. He uses his tractor in the work on his father's farm and in carrying out his corn and cotton projects.

Helen Kolaja, 17, of Damon, is the state's top 4-H homemaker in 1947. Her achievements during seven years in club work as shown in the National 4-H Girls' Record activity include preparing and serving 600 meals, sewing, making over 37 mending 36 garments, and canning 2,517 jars of foods. Helen also made 45 home improvement articles. In five years of gardening she raised enough vegetables and fruits to can 2,917 pints valued at \$769.25, and store, 23,514 pounds of vegetables for home use. She helps with milking, butter churning, cheese making and keeps a record of the stock. Helen has made 126 exhibits and was named grand champion exhibitor at Houston Youth Fair last year, winning a \$100.00 scholarship. Helen has won many awards, including \$261.25 in prize money. Her estimated total

income from all her 4-H projects is \$3,964.33. Her Chicago trip award is provided by Montgomery Ward.

Ella Keith, 15, of Whiteface, a club member for seven years, was named state winner in the 1947 National 4-H Clothing Achievement activity for having the top ranking record of sewing, making over or mending 179 garments for herself and other members of the family. She also made rag rugs, quilt tops, curtains, dish towels, pot holders and many other things for the home. Ella made a scrapbook of costume history going back to 2000 B.C. She has won many awards, including \$94.30 in cash prizes and has been junior leader of her club for four years. Her Chicago trip award was provided by the Educational Bureau of the Spool Cotton Co.

Henry Schacht, 17, of Lockney, is the state winner in the 1947 4-H Garden Activity in which Alis Chalmers provides the awards. His record shows that during eight years of club work he raised 2 1/2 acres of garden, from which 251 bushels of vegetables were produced. His garden exhibits won many placings, including \$50.00 in cash prizes. Henry sold \$1,089.11 worth of his garden vegetables after his family requirements had been met. He served his club as junior leader for three years and is now a freshman at the Texas Technological College.

All of these activities are conducted under the direction of the Extension Service of the State Agricultural College and USDA cooperating.

Austria Gets \$18,000,000 Aid

VIENNA (AP)—Goods and services valued at more than \$18,000,000 have been donated outright to the Austrian population by American voluntary welfare and relief agencies since the end of the war, says a report to headquarters in Austria.

The report pointed out that the entire amount consisted of voluntary contributions, represents in no way a debt to be paid, has been distributed throughout the four occupied zones on a basis of need without regard to zonal boundaries and has no connection with the Austro-German aid

agreement which is operated by the United States government from government funds.

The supplies donated include more than 24,000 metric tons of food, more than 13,000 metric tons of clothing and more than 310,000 metric tons of medical supplies.

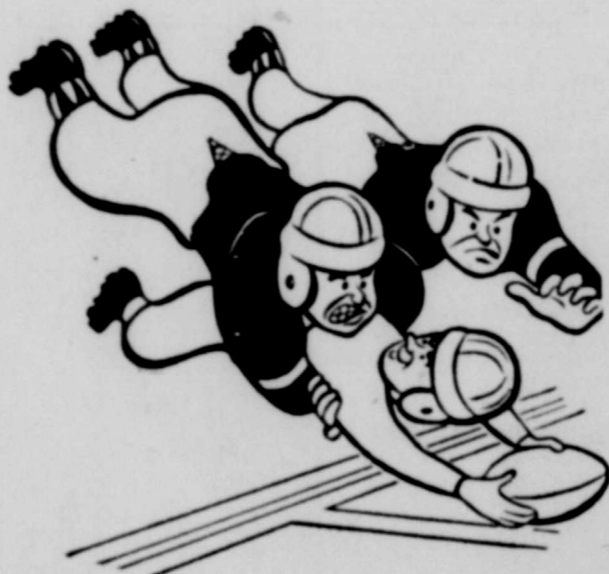
