A musical program, "Jesus, the Giver of Life," is set Sunday night at the First Baptist Church, with both the Sanctuary and Carol Choirs singing, under the direction of Lee Russell.

Soloists for the program include Miss Marinell Shoekey, Sue Watson and Lee Russell. A trio, composed of Mrs. W. A. Lewis, Pete Miller and Johnnie King, will also sing.

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Easter is a Time Of Joy and Hope

Easter—"The Sunday of Joy"—when churches are sweet with white lilies and echoing with music, and hearts are throbbing with new hope—is the celebration of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. The Easter service is the most elaborate of the church year. Special music and the finest of all sacred music is that written for use in the Easter and Passion-Week services.

Easter takes its name from an Anglo-Saxon goddess, Eostre or Ostera, who represented spring. Anglo-Saxon tribes held a festival in honor of Eostre every April. Easter also contains survivals of the Passover feast of the Jews, observed in memory of the coming out of Egypt.

Easter has been celebrated as a festival since very early days of the Christian church. The church council at Nicea, in Asia Minor (325 A.D.), decided that Easter should be celebrated the first Sunday after the first full moon after the Vernal Equinox (March 21).

The message of Easter eggs is the symbol of life from death. From time immemorial eggs have been used to represent the new birth of the springtime. So, just as the dead winter gives away to the spring, the lifeless looking egg produces the chick.

When the early Christian adopted egg giving, they were decorated primarily in red, to symbolize the blood of Christ. Later the fresh colors of spring were added.

Good Friday, with its sad memories of the crucifixion, is past, and the thrill of the age-old message, "The Lord is Risen," fills every heart with gladness. So it is that we join spring and bedeck ourselves in lovely colors to celebrate Easter, a day full of new hope and faith with the assurance of life everlasting.

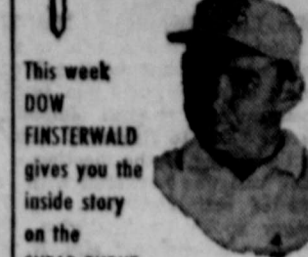

Pecan Bulletin Is Available

"Pecan Diseases and Insects and Their Control" is the title of a bulletin released by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at College Station.
It is pointed out in the bulletin that the many destructive insects and diseases must be controlled for successful pecan production. The grower must also understand the nature and habits of the various disease and insect pests that threaten his crop and use certain cultural practices which help reduce damage from these sources.
This 19-page publication can be a big help in gaining this understanding. It contains discussions of diseases of leaves, nuts and roots, nonparasitic plants on the limbs and bark, insects attacking the nuts, insects attacking the foliage and other related topics. It is available free of charge from local county agents of the Agricultural Information Office, College Station. Ask for MP-313.

Hopes were high for thousands of Jackie Burke fans when he stepped up to the first tee at the Miami Country Club for his 18-hole match with Sam Snead. Sad to say, Jack pushed his tee shot into the trees, cartoned his second off of another tree to go out of bounds, and ended up with a triple bogie giving Sam a 3-stroke lead. . . and with the kind of golf Sam has been playing, this is fatal!
If there was any hope left in the breast of "Fighting" Jack Burke, it was really dampened on the 6th. Burke hit a beautiful drive 250 yards straight down the fairway, and then placed his second about 6-feet from the pin for almost a certain birdie. In the meanwhile, Slamming Sam poked his drive about 270, leaving himself 60 yards away from the pin.
