

STOLEN PASS GIVES ANTELOPES EDGE

Elkins Leads Abernathy Over Mules

MULESHOE (Special) — Abernathy's Billy Elkins grabbed a Muleshoe pass from the air on the Mules' 15-yard line, ran 14-yards to the one and two plays later put the Antelopes on the scoreboard with 2:37 left to go in the game and a six-point edge, 6-0.

And that's all it took. Elkins also attempted to kick the extra points but the try was wide and no good.

The Mules amassed 87 yards in the air and held the visitors to 79. Abernathy's split-end Clark Riley suffered a leg injury during the contest and the Antelopes were without the services of quarterback Jerry Fuller for the entire second half.

Muleshoe is now winless in two attempts and the Antelopes are undefeated for two games.

First New Deal Bale Delivered

NEW DEAL (sp.) — Dale Coppedge, who farms about one mile west of here, delivered the first bale of 1968-crop cotton to the New Deal Co-Op Gin Friday, a day earlier than first bale of 1967.

The 535-pound bale was ginned at 12:10 p. m. from 2,360 pounds of seed cotton. Coppedge, who had the bale hand pulled received a \$100 bonus and free ginning and bagging and ties. The cotton was planted April 30. It stapled 1 1/16th-inch and graded middling light spotted at the U. S. Department of Agriculture's classing office at Lubbock. The micronaire was 4.1. A separate laboratory analysis showed the cotton with a fiber strength of 89,000 pounds per square inch.

Area GI Gets Flying Cross

The second award of the Distinguished Flying Cross was received recently by Army Warrant Officer James E. Burnett, son of Mrs. Louise Burnett of Abernathy.

Presented in ceremonies near Da Nang, Vietnam, the award was for heroism last Feb. 12 while WO Burnett was serving as aircraft commander on an armed helicopter escorting resupply boats near Hue.

While engaged in the mission, the lead aircraft came under heavy enemy ground fire, sustaining three damaging hits.

According to the citation WO Burnett "was quick to spot the source of the enemy fire, rolled in on the hostile position with accurate suppressive fire which allowed the lead aircraft to withdraw without further damage."

WO Burnett is a member of the 1st Aviation Brigade's 282nd Assault Helicopter Company. He entered the Army in February 1966 and was last assigned at the U.S. Army Aviation School, Ft. Rucker, Ala.

The officer is a 1961 graduate of Abernathy High School. His wife, Lucrecia, also lives in Abernathy.

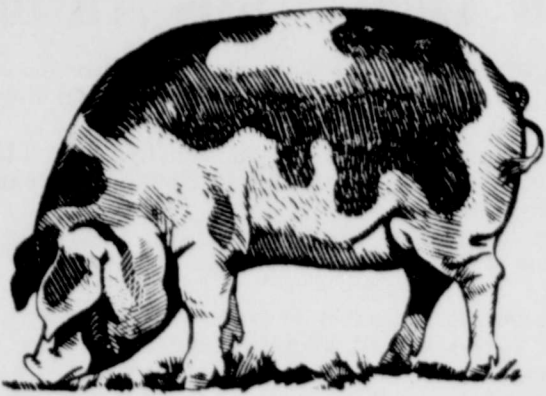

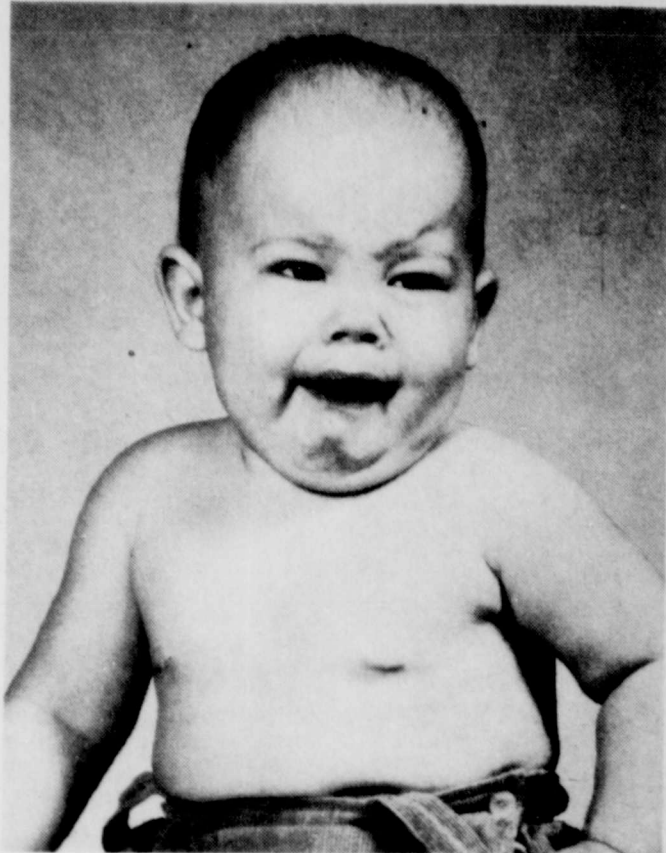

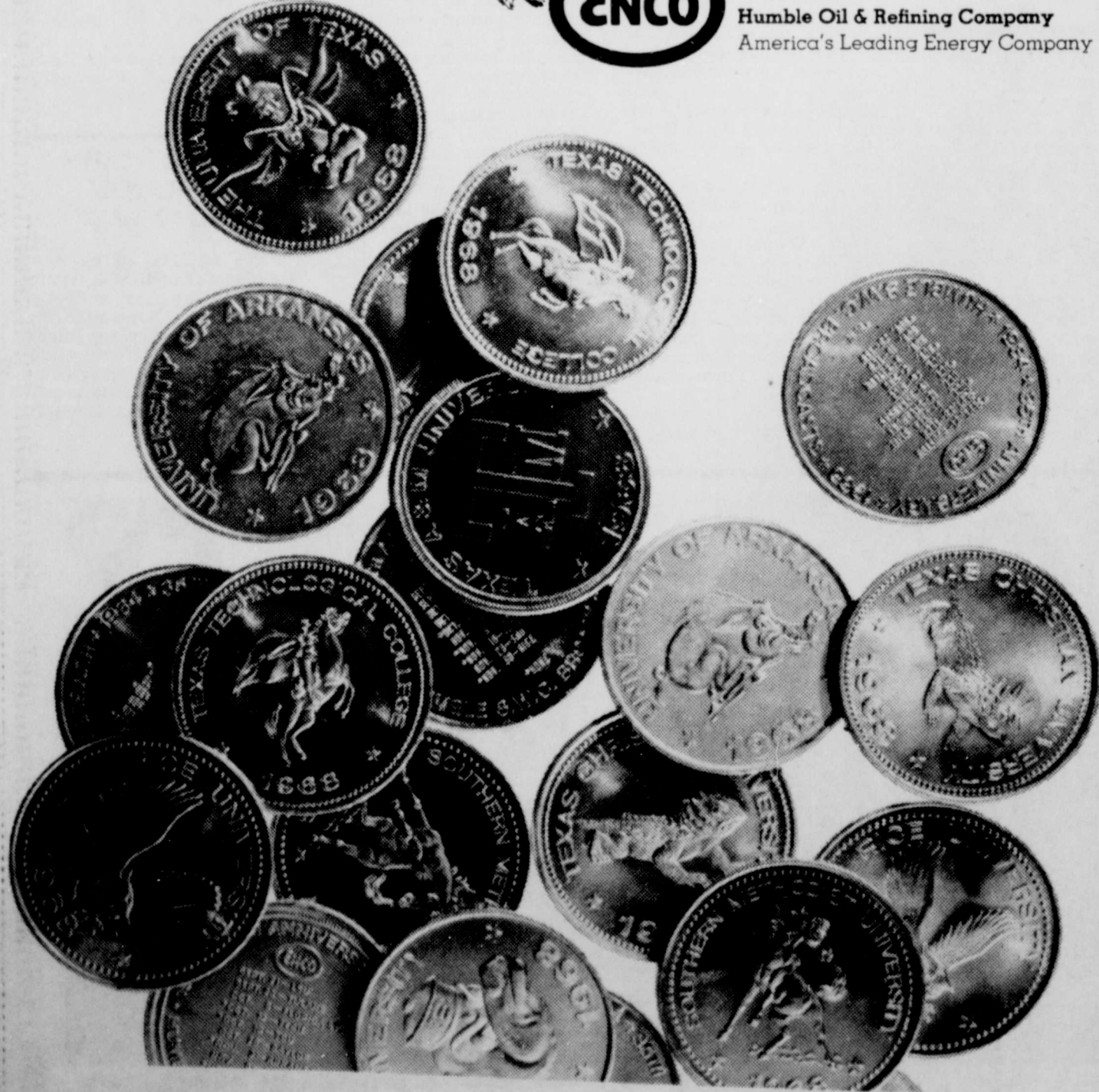

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Abernathy Is Hale Site Of Cotton Meet

A series of meetings on cotton defoliation and harvesting for maximum efficiency and quality preservation will be held throughout the South Plains, ending on Oct. 10.

The meetings are being sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, according to Billy C. Gunter, district agricultural agent. Featured speakers will be Extension subject-matter specialists.

Dr. Robert Metzger, area agronomist, will speak at each of the total of 20 meetings while Beverly Reeves, cotton ginning and mechanization specialist, and Fred Elliot, cotton specialist, will speak at meetings slated from Sept. 30 through Oct. 4. Metzger is officed at the Texas A & M University Agricultural Center north of Lubbock while Reeves and Elliot are headquartered at College Station.

Correct Timing
Proper use of harvest aid chemicals will be discussed at each meeting with special emphasis on correct timing of application, says Gunter. Timing is important with respect to maturity of cotton and weather conditions. Other topics to be covered will include proper harvesting techniques for maximum preservation of lint and seed quality.

Quality preservation is a vital step in the overall cotton production picture so proper harvesting of the crop is most important, emphasizes Gunter.

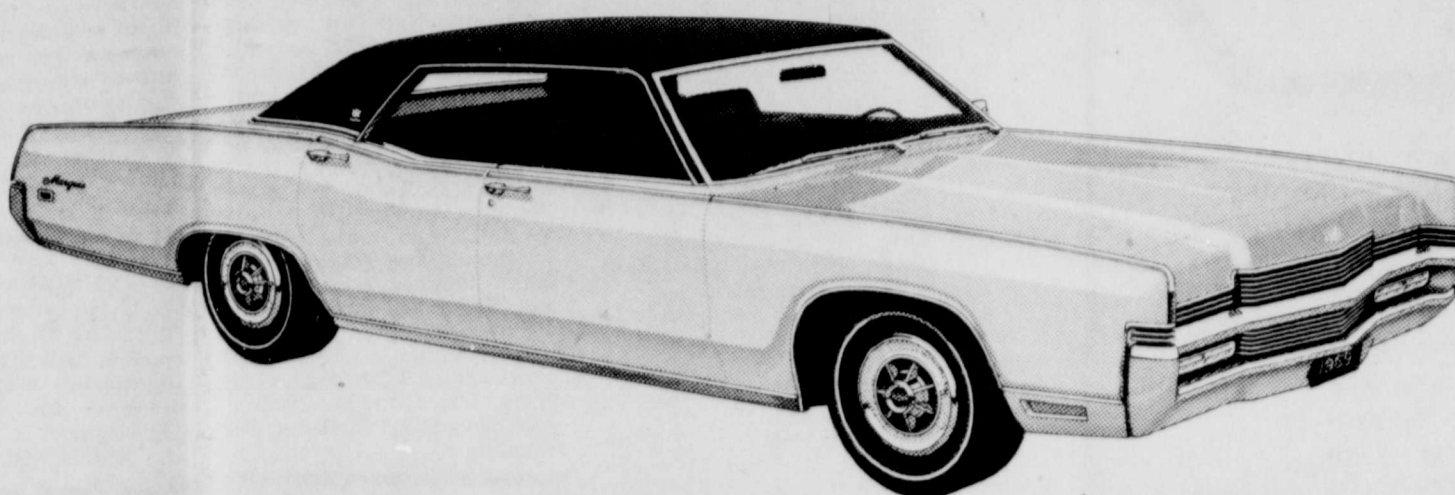

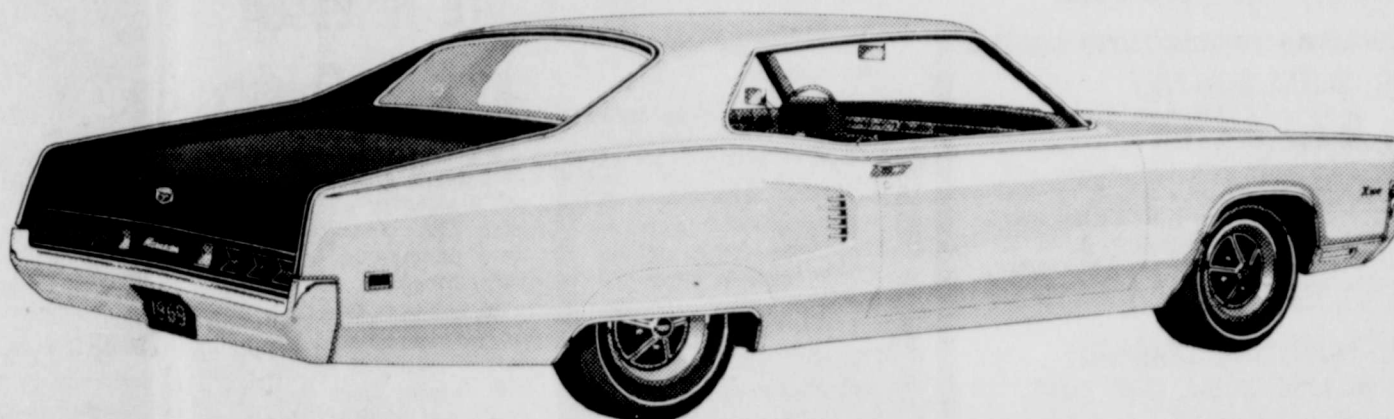

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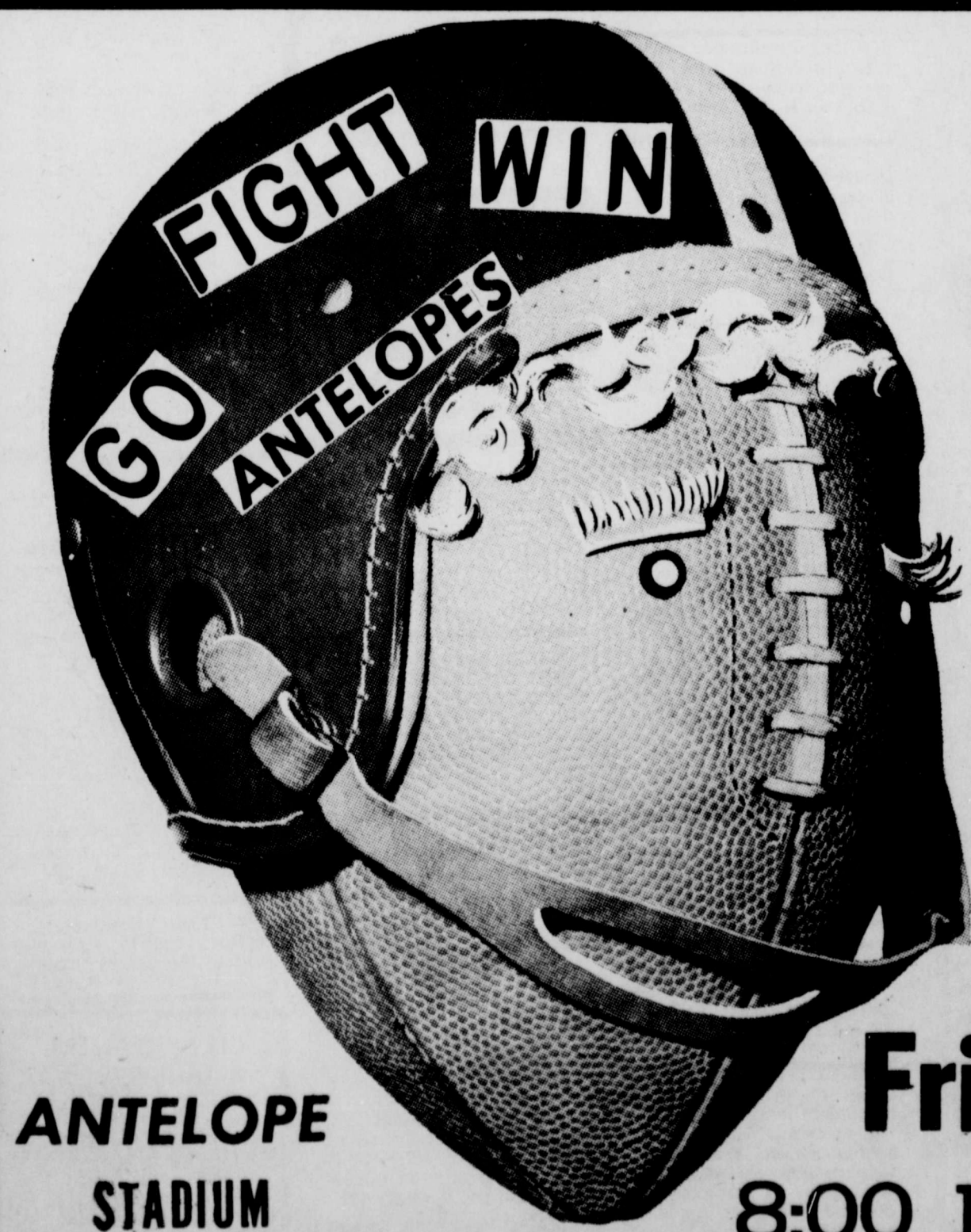
