MEAT CUTTING AND CANNING DEMONSTRATION AT B. L. BARNES PLACE TUESDAY

A meat cutting and canning demonstration will be conducted at the B. L. Barnes place on Tuesday, February 2, according to County Agent G. R. Sheets who is in charge of the all day affair. Farmers and their wives are invited to attend the demonstration.

Mr. Sheets will have charge of the meat cutting demonstration and for this purpose a hog and beef will be butchered. Possibly other county agents from adjoining counties will assist Mr. Sheets in the demonstration.

The ladies will be especially interested in the meat canning demonstration which is to be conducted by Mrs. Gladys Weaver, Canadian, home demonstration agent of Hemphill county. In this work, Mrs. Weaver will use tin cans instead of the usual glass jars.

The McMillen Parent-Teacher association will serve lunch on the grounds and everyone is cordially invited to attend the all-day demonstration. The Barnes place is located fifteen miles south and five west of Perryton, on the Spearman-Canadian highway, one mile north of the McMillen school house.

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HERALD IS FOURTEEN YEARS OLD THIS WEEK

The Ochiltree County Herald is fourteen years old today! With this issue the publication starts on its fifteenth year of service to the people of this community. Volume 15, Number 1.

Starting back in old Ochiltree, before Perryton was ever heard of, the Herald was the successor of several former newspaper ventures. The publication was moved to Perryton in the fall of 1919 by the Brazell brothers, when the townsites was opened. In the fall of 1920, the plant was entirely destroyed by fire and with it all of the back issues and files.

In April 1931, the Stewart Printing company took over the publication, the firm being composed of Paul F. Stewart and Van W. Stewart. The interests of Paul Stewart were purchased in October 1931 by the present owner and publisher under whose charge the publication has been issued ever since.

And so with fourteen years of service behind it, the Herald opens a new chapter in the development of the North Plains country with this first issue of the fifteenth volume.

Life Saving Medal

Guymon Man Wins Recognition of His Heroic Work in Saving Life of Companion

In recognition of his heroic action in saving the life of an asphyxiation victim early last year, Mr. Clifford Foreman, plant opera-

tor, for the Oklahoma Electric and Water company, Guymon, Okla., was awarded the "President's Medal", by the National Safety council, recently.

Foreman, on February 18, 1931, successfully resuscitated Clayton Hoffman of Guymon after the latter had apparently succumbed to the noxious effect of gas fumes from a leaky heater. The victim was revived by Foreman after forty-five minutes application of the prone pressure method of artificial respiration.

The "President's Medal" is conferred by the National Safety Council as a fitting recognition for those who restore life in cases of electrical shock, gas asphyxiation, drowning and other causes of suspended respiration. Since May 1928, when this method of recognition was inaugurated, 322 medals and ten bars have been awarded.

The Foreman presentation was made before Panhandle division employees of the power company, who, with company officials and Guymon civic leaders, gathered in honor of the occasion.

A JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL

As our system of school has a junior high school for the first time, there are perhaps many questions that have been raised as to the organizations of this division of our schools. I am glad to try to answer some of them in this article.

The junior high school is made up of the pupils of grades six, seven and eight. This includes the last two years of the regular elementary school and the first year of the regular four year high school. All of the work is fully departmentalized and pupils will be required to pass in each subject just as they do in the senior high school.

There will be no regular promotions in the junior high school. However, when pupils have finished their work they will be given a diploma from the junior high school. There will be no more seventh grade graduation exercises. This will come one year later at the end of the Junior high school work. There will be no regular graduation for the junior high school pupils this year because they had a graduation exercise last year in the seventh grade. Beginning next year there will be the regular junior high school graduation exercises.

It is much more satisfactory to have these three grades separated in one organization of their own. They are just entering the early years of adolescence and their interests are mutual. The great gap existing between the old elementary school and high school was a very discouraging factor in education. The methods of instruction and subject matter differs so much that elimination of pupils from school was a frequent occurrence. These things have almost been done away with entirely by the junior high schools. Pupils like the arrangement as well as the teachers.

Classes can have their own group officers, their sponsors and activities. The class spirit is developed accordingly.

Much better school work is possible. This means economy in human welfare and in the finances of the district due to a partial elimination of failures in school.

ALASKAN HEARD BY STUDENTS

On Friday, January 22, at 9:45 a. m., Earle P. Hammond, Fairbanks, Alaska, entertained the student body of the Perryton schools with an illustrated lecture on "Alaska". The entertainment was of real educational value to both teachers and students. The fact that a person from Alaska is so rarely met in this part of the country and that there is a vast difference between the United States and Alaska made the program very interesting.

Mr. Hammond, who is a native of Nebraska, has had much experience in the North. He was affiliated with Captain Wilkins in 1926 and 1927. He established and maintained Capt. Wilkin's base camp at Pt. Barrow, Alaska. He was with Amundsen salvaging the ill-fated dirigible "Norge" at Teller, Alaska. He has made two trips to the exile district of Siberia, and has also spent some time in Northern Canada.

During his lecture the speaker told of the vast difference in South-eastern Alaska and Northern Alaska. He discussed at length the habits and customs of the people and animals of the Arctic regions. In connection with this, he showed the tools, furs, and clothing of the Alaskan natives.

He spoke of the modes of travel in Alaska, telling of the dog teams and sleds, and their part in travel. The airplane, according to the visitor, is the most practical means of transportation in Alaska.

Not of little interest was what the speaker said concerning conditions in Alaska. The government encourages agriculture there by exempting from taxes all automobiles and trucks that are used for agricultural purposes.

Mr. Hammond spoke of Alaska as the land of opportunity for young men who were not afraid of cold weather and a little work. He stated that there is not a dozen men out of employment in that territory at this time.

One feature of the entertainment was the presence of a live reindeer and of sled dogs on the stage.

After the lecture, Mr. Hammond took the school queens, Tommie Lea Hogland, Dessie Fisher, Anna Lee Riley and Nellie Coffee riding up and down the street in front of the school buildings on a sled pulled by a dog team. Unfortunately, Juanita Morgan, senior queen, who recently underwent an operation for appendicitis, was confined to the hospital at that time and could not be present to enjoy the rides.

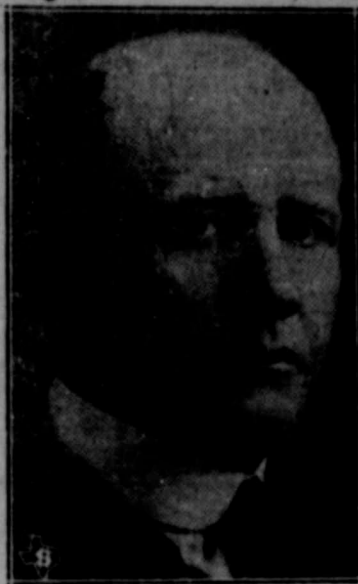

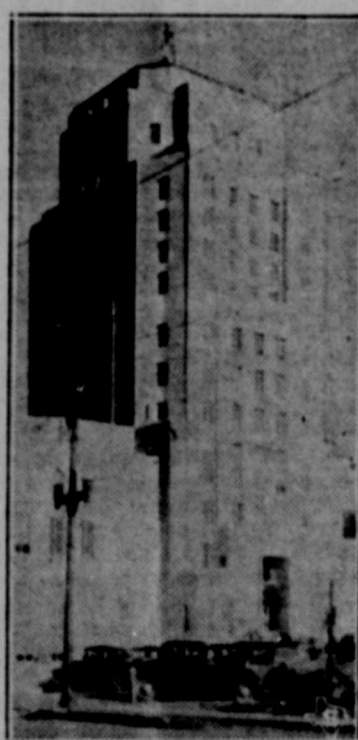

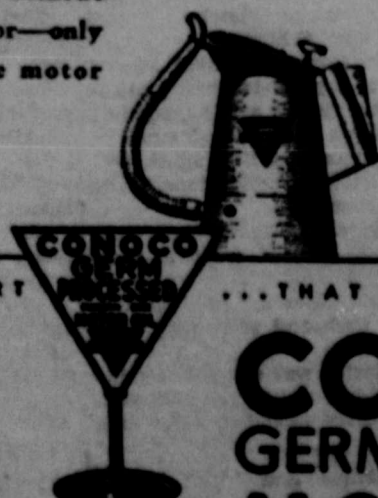

agencies between producer and consumer exact high charges for their services, little may be left for the farmer.

While the number of cents per pound received by all these agencies, combined for their services at any given time are difficult to determine, the relative change from one time to another can be estimated rather accurately from the monthly reports of prices farmers receive for hogs, as compiled by the United States department of agriculture, and retail prices of pork chops, bacon, hams and lard, as gathered by the department of labor.

Taking 1913 prices as 100, the index of hog prices to farmers in November, 1931, was only 58, or 42 percent below the pre-war period. But the index of the costs and charges collected by the agencies between producer and consumer was 201, or double the pre-war amount. It has declined somewhat in recent months.

While the use of definite figures derived from this calculation may be open to question, the Farmer-Stockman points out that it appears as though the average retail price of hog products, including lard, in the 51 leading cities would be at least 15 cents a pound even if farmers were to give their hogs away!

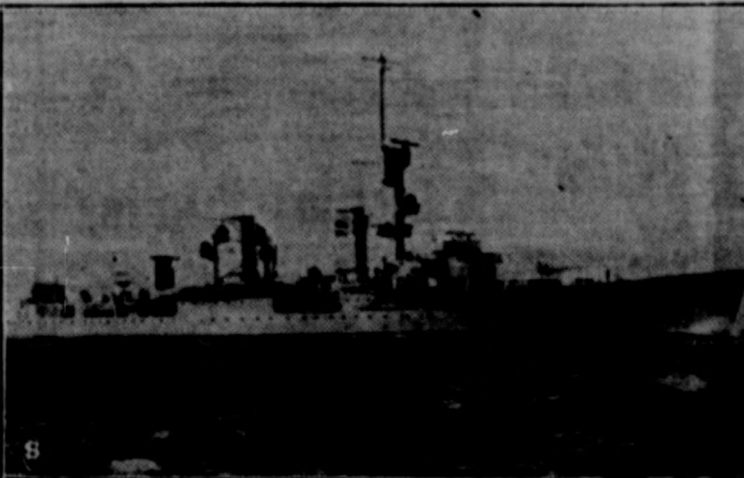


New Porto Rican Governor and Family

ON TEXAS FARMS
By W. H. Darrow, Exten-
sion Service Editor

The gradual spread of alfalfa has
been noted in Matagorda county by
the county agent who reports that
three farmers who sowed the crop
last year at a cost of \$4.50 per
acre for feed, obtained one and a
half to three tons of hay per acre,
worth \$10.00 per ton in the field.

J. M. Peterson in Dawson county
is a dairy herd demonstrator who
financed the growing of an 800-
acre crop last year without aid from
the bank, by milking fifteen cows
fed on home grown feed. They made
a gross return of \$1,530.

There were 25,000 acres sowed to
Nortex oats in Brown county last
year, all the progeny of 100 bushels
introduced by the county agent from
the Denton Experiment Sub-station
two years ago.

Spraying for San Jose scale, cur-
culio and brown rot last winter and
spring, seven Newton county orchard
demonstrators produced seventy per
cent more No. 1 fruit than from un-
sprayed trees, and received fifty
cents more per bushel for their
fruit, the county agent reports.

Over \$20,000 worth more food in
the pantries of 135 women in Mon-
tague county, more appropriate
clothing at less cost in 103 families,
and 83 farms home living room
made over, are the features of home
demonstration work there in 1931.

CHAIN, GROUP AND BRANCH BANKING

Bankers' Commission Describes Differences Among Various Kinds of Multi-Office Banks.

THE Economic Policy Commission of the American Bankers Association has made the following statement on various types of banking systems operating through more than one office:

"We find that there are recognized in the banking world three types of multiple banking organizations, namely, chain bank systems, group bank systems and branch bank systems. They are alike solely in respect to the fact that each embraces under some form of common control or influence two or more banking places, but here the similarity stops since there are essential differences in organization and administration, especially as between branch banking and the chain and group forms.

"Chain banking is recognized as probably the least definite form of multiple banking organization. Generally speaking, this term refers to merely a string of individual separately chartered banks owned or controlled through stock holdings by one or more common individuals, sometimes without public knowledge of the common ownership. Frequently the controlled banks are not administered as a coherent whole under the guidance of a central, publicly known head office, but rather each bank is run as a separate unit bank in accord with the wishes of the dominant interest. In some cases, however, there is a central, publicly known control with a head office that formally supervises the operations of all the banks controlled, and this is perhaps the more desirable arrangement. It lacks, however, the definite legal responsibility that a corporate head organization would have. Bank banks in a chain system operate under its own capital and there is ordinarily no binding relation among members of the

Group Responsibility

"Group banking, on the other hand, is a system in which, while the member banks are separately chartered and operate as individual units with their own capital, control is exercised through a publicly known corporate organization under the direction of a responsible head office. It openly holds stock control of the member banks and is morally and legally responsible as the chief stockholder for their administration and the statutory share of their liabilities. An essential feature is the fact that an organization of this kind is publicly known, which creates a large degree of responsiveness to public opinion. This is true because anything of an undesirable nature developing in one member of the group would create public distrust of the whole group. Therefore its sense of self-preservation as a group, if nothing else, tends to make it enforce standards of conduct throughout the members of the group and to assume responsibilities for them beyond what mere legal responsibility would bring about.

"Branch banking is completely distinct from the two foregoing forms of multiple organization in that it does not consist of a string, chain or group of independent banks, for there is only one chartered bank in a branch organization and the extensions from it are all in the form of sub-offices without separate capital or corporate existence. For everything that is done through these offices the bank itself is just as responsible legally and in every other sense of the word as though it were done over its own counters in its head office."

Bankers Help

In a report on banker-farmer work, H. Lane Young, Chairman Agricultural Commission, American Bankers Association, shows that during the past year there were 409 meetings reported in 25 states, with a total attendance of 35,578. County key bankers numbering 2,541 were appointed in 39 states. Thirty-four states reported an expenditure by banks of \$105,536 for developing better agricultural practices.

Special banker-farmer activities engaged in by banks in 27 states numbered 8,493, while 7,149 projects or farm programs were carried on by rural people through the influence of bankers.

For three years the Agricultural Commission has given special recognition to the state reporting the highest record of accomplishments and this year Georgia achieved first place with its banker-farmer agricultural program. Representatives of the Georgia State College and officials of the Georgia Bankers Association developed the methods and policies which made it possible for Georgia to carry out an effective program which emphasized "direct credit from banks for producing crops on the live-at-home basis."

TRUST BANKING SPREADING FAST

Government Official Shows That This Type of Financial Service is Enlarging Its Field.

SPECTACULAR growth of trust service in the banking field is noted in the national banking system, Aubrey R. Carter, in charge of Trust department supervision in the office of Comptroller of the Currency, Washington, D. C., brings out in an article in the American Bankers Association Journal.

"At the close of the 1930 fiscal year there were 2,472 national banks with trust powers," he says. "Their banking resources aggregated \$23,529,100,000, which represented 34 per cent of the number of banks and 89 per cent of the total banking resources of the 7,252 national banks. Trust departments had been established by 1,829 of these banks which were administering 79,900 individual trusts with trust assets aggregating \$4,473,000,000, and in addition were administering 11,500 corporate trusts and acting as trustees for outstanding note and bond issues aggregating \$11,505,700,000.

crease during a four-year period of 446, or 22 per cent, in the number of national banks authorized to exercise trust powers; an increase of 725, or 66 per cent, in the number of banks actively administering trusts; an increase of 65,370, or 250 per cent, in the number of trusts being administered; an increase of \$3,500,000,000, or 355 per cent, in the volume of individual trust assets under administration, and an increase of \$9,340,000,000, or 379 per cent, in the volume of bond issues outstanding for which these institutions were acting as trustees.

These facts, he concludes, are "a striking testimonial of the growing public recognition of the desirability of the corporate fiduciary in the settlement of estates and the administration of trusts."

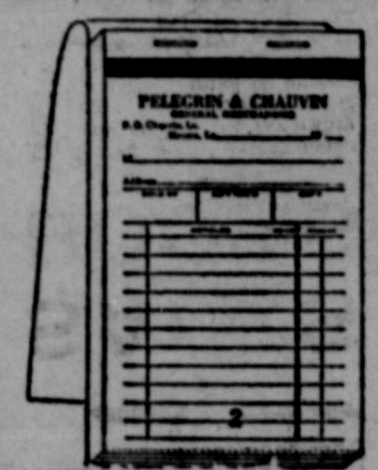
