Of Women's Clubs Is
Held Here Last Week

Eighty women attended the annual encampment and dress contest held July first and second at the high school auditorium. During the first day, the women enjoyed talks made by A. G. Bearden, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, greetings by Mrs. E. J. Yates and music and songs by Mrs. Weldon Lindsey and Mrs. N. H. Price. Mrs. J. L. Morris talked in the afternoon giving the highlights of the Conference of Associated Rural Women of the World held in Washington, D. C.

On the second day of the encampment, the dress contest was conducted. Ten demonstrators told the story of their wardrobe work and 40 women exhibited dresses that were made by foundation patterns. Some of the following comments on foundation patterns heard were: "I would not take fifty dollars for my pattern and do without it because I cannot get a commercial pattern to fit me." "My foundation pattern has taught me how to get better fitting dresses and lines that are becoming to my figure." "My foundation pattern has saved me a lot of money because I did not have to buy a pattern every time I wanted a dress and I have had more dresses."

Mrs. G. E. Towns, demonstrator in Key Home Demonstration club won first place in the contest for demonstrators and will be sent to A & M Short Course by the county home demonstration council. She reported that her club is 100 percent in having good fitting patterns from which 135 garments have been made by them. Mrs. Brandon of the Shumake club won first place as cooper. Mrs. J. B. Speck, also of the Shumake club, second place; and Mrs. Shaffer, of the Midway club and Mrs. Sullivan of the Welch club, tied for third place. There was a marked improvement in the fit, becomingness and style of the dresses over the contest held last year.

The county home demonstration council wishes to express its appreciation to all those who contributed to the interest of the program and the success of the encampment.

Mr. and Mrs. Cain left Lamesa Saturday morning for Wichita Falls, where the bodies of Mr. Spoonst and son were shipped. Funeral services were held in Wichita Falls, Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock.

Colorado-to-Gulf
Highway To Open

Amarillo, Texas.—(Special)—Hope, dating back more than a decade, will become a reality on Tuesday, July 14, when an all-weather highway will be opened to traffic from Denver, Colorado south to the Texas Gulf. To celebrate those dreams come true, Amarillo will be the scene of a gigantic highway rally attended by officials and boosters of the Colorado-to-Gulf Highway Association and good roads enthusiasts on connecting routes.

Governors Johnson of Colorado, Allred of Texas, and Tingley of New Mexico have been invited to join in the fete. Harry Hines, Chairman of the Texas Highway Commission, has accepted an invitation to address the opening session.

Shows Increase

The gross receipts of the local Post Office for the three months period ending June 30, 1936, were \$4,784.42, an increase of more than 9 per cent over the same period last year and more than for any other year since the peak year of 1929. Beginning Sunday afternoon and continuing intermittently throughout Sunday night, Monday and Tuesday morning, a proverbial "Million Dollar Rain" visited Lamesa and the entire area of Dawson county. And we might add the entire south plains and east to Red River, south to the Rio Grande have reported rains of various degrees.

The total rain recorded by the government gauge in the city of Lamesa, recorded by Mrs. Juanita Paulk, was 1.43 inch. Reports from some of the communities give the rainfall to be as much as four inches while some report not more than an inch. However all report sufficient moisture to make the crop prospect one of the most encouraging that Dawson county has had in several years.

One of the fortunate things that has helped the producers of this territory this year is the fact that while sufficient rainfall has fallen on practically all of the county, none of it has been hard driving rains which necessitated replanting. Also the absence of hail in damaging quantities has been very noticeable. Too, the sandstorms this spring ceased before any of the crops were up enough to be damaged by being blown out as has happened in this country on more than one occasion. All in all, the farmers are at the present time almost universally blessed in Dawson county with ideal weather conditions for a bumper crop.

EMPLOYMENT SHOWS INCREASE

Employment and payrolls in Texas during June showed a slight gain over the preceding month and a substantial increase over the corresponding month last year. The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports. The number of workers increased 5 per cent over June, 1935 and pay rolls rose nearly 15 per cent. The increase over May was about 1 per cent for both the number of employees and the total pay rolls.

Cities whose records for the month were better than the State average during the two comparable periods were Amarillo, Denison, Galveston, Houston, Laredo, San Antonio, Waco, and Wichita Falls.

Industries showing an increase above the average for the state were retail trade, petroleum refining, electric railway car shops, and hotels.

MEASURES TAKEN FOR
SCREW WORM CONTROL

The screw worm fly and its damage
has been known to ranchmen and
farmers of Texas since 1843. At the
present time the United States De-
partment of Agriculture, Bureau of En-
tomology and Plant Quarantine, Div-
ision of Screw Worm Control, in co-
operation with the Extension Service
and Agricultural Experiment Station
of the Texas Agricultural and Me-
chanical College, and the State De-
partment of Agriculture, is conducting
a campaign to combat the screw worm
fly.

In general the purpose of this cam-
paign is to convey to livestock raisers
that information concerning the screw
worm fly which has been made avail-

able by research workers. This is in-
formation which has been found to be
practical and economical in treating
screw worm cases and in controlling
the screw worm fly.

District Screw Worm Supervisors are
in the field and are ready to assist
headquarters at Gail, Texas.

Mr. Clayton will hold meetings and
give demonstrations regarding screw
worm control, at scheduled places in
the above counties.

You can get in touch with your
district supervisor through your local
county agricultural agent.

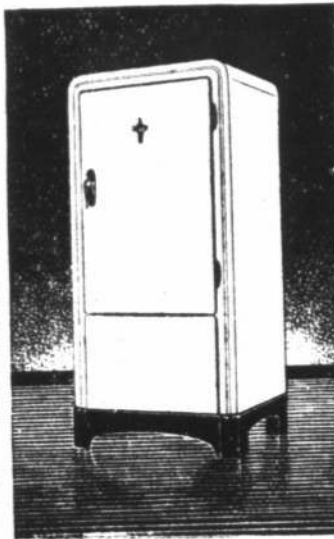

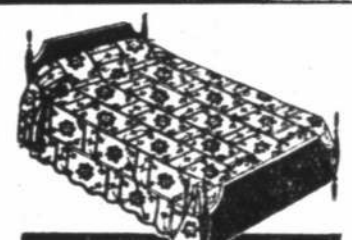

FARM LAND LOANS RATE OF 3 1/2% EXTENDED A YEAR

The emergency 3 1/2 percent interest rate on Federal Land Bank loans will remain in effect for another year, according to Albert S. Goss, Land Bank Commissioner.

Mr. Goss said: "Action of Congress approved June 25 continues for one year the temporary Federal Land Bank interest rate of 3 1/2 percent which otherwise would have expired on June 30. The rate will be effective for all interest payable in the year beginning July 1, 1936, on nearly \$2,000,000,000 of Federal Land Bank loans made thru National Farm Loan Associations.

"Farmers who obtain loans now at the 4 percent contract rate will get the benefit of the 3 1/2 percent for all interest installments payable in the one year period ending June 30, 1937, and after that date will pay 4 percent for the entire duration of their loans."

BUTTERMILK BISCUITS

3 cups flour; 6 tablespoonfuls shortening; 1 1/2 cups buttermilk; 1/2 teaspoon soda; 3 teaspoons baking powder; 1 teaspoon salt.

Sift flour, baking powder, soda and salt together. Cut in shortening with edge of knife, then add milk to make stiff dough. Toss on well floured dough board, roll out 1/2 inch thick, cut out and place in well greased pan. Brush top with melted butter and bake in hot oven 450 degrees F. until golden brown.

DROP BISCUITS

3 cups flour; 1 teaspoon salt; 1 teaspoon sugar; 3 teaspoon baking powder; 4 teaspoon melted shortening; sweetmilk.

Sift flour, salt, baking powder and sugar together twice. Add melted shortening to milk, then add flour mixture. Beat thoroughly. Drop from spoon into buttered pan; bake in a hot oven until a golden brown. Serve while hot.

Eradicate Rats To Curb Typhus

Austin, Texas—Typhus fever or "14-Day Fever" continues to make its appearance in various counties in Texas. Like typhoid, most of the cases occur in the hot months of summer and early fall, according to records of the State Health Department.

"The symptoms of typhus fever are similar to those of typhoid fever, except the course of typhus fever is generally two weeks while typhoid fever may extend over many weeks," said Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer.

"Although there are two types of typhus fever, it is the endemic type, (known as Brill's Disease) which presents itself in Texas.

"The onset of typhus fever is usually sudden and accompanied by chills, fever, headache, and general body pains. Nausea and vomiting may be present. Headache is an outstanding symptom and often persists to such a degree that it does not readily yield to drugs or local applications.

"The fever rises rapidly, often reaching a maximum of 105 degrees in the fifth to eighth day, and generally declining about the tenth to fourteenth day. A reddish mottling of the skin
