Although the major portion of our territory where it has been dry has received some moisture the past three days there are still a few spots that have been barely touched.

Showers started late Monday and have fallen in varying amounts through Wednesday morning. Amounts have varied from less than an inch to three or more inches. So far as we have been able to learn, no hail of consequence or damaging winds have visited any part of our territory.

As has been the case all the year, the north part of our territory got the heaviest showers during the recent rains. Crops north of town were up and growing while many fields to the south had no crops up and where they were up lack of moisture was preventing growth.

This territory is fortunate to have water for irrigation. There are thousands of acres under irrigation here which insures a fair crop for the territory regardless of rain.

Clouds were still around Wednesday and look promising for more rain.

The official rain gage here in town recorded 1.25 inches up to 7 a. m. Wednesday. It was reported by J. W. King, volunteer weather observer.

The month of May was dry. In fact every month since last October had been abnormally dry. Only 2.15 inches of rain had been recorded here from the first of January through May.

Thursday Morning—An inch and a quarter rain here in town Wednesday night up to 1 a. m. Thursday brought the three-day June total to 2.50 inches for the best soaking the ground has had for months. Here there was a wind or hail, just a steady downpour for about three hours.

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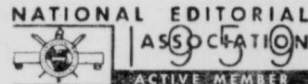

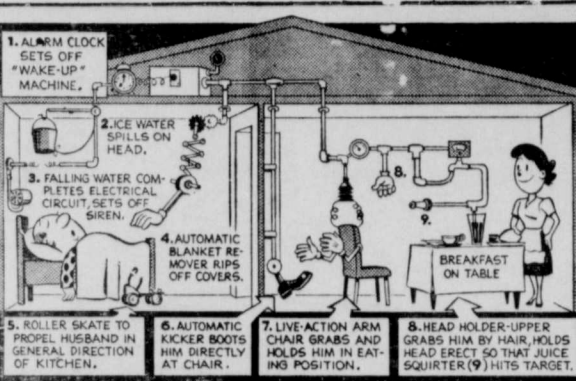

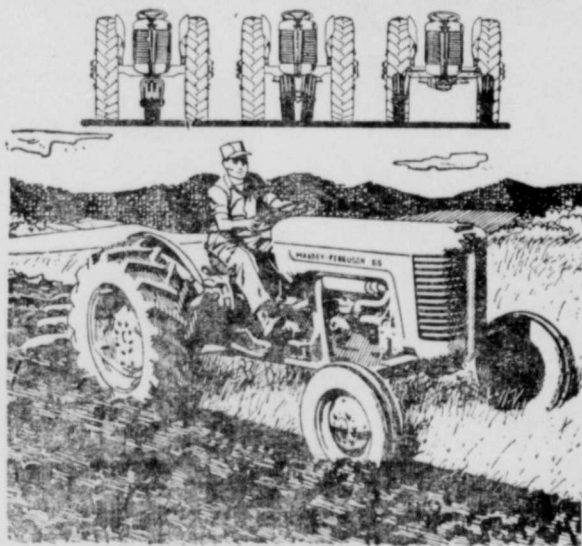
The human body is so constructed that for maximum health it requires, fairly even intervals, of food at regular intervals. You can't make up for the lack of a good breakfast.

Veterans News

Q. Is there a deadline for filing a claim for disability compensation with VA?

A. There is no deadline. A veteran may apply any time. However, an eligible veteran applying within a year from the date of his release from service may have his payments back-dated to the day following his release from service. A veteran who applies after he has been out of service one year may be paid only from the date his application was filed.

Q. Can a disabled Korea veteran getting military retired pay receive vocational rehabilitation training from VA?

A. Yes. Receipt of military retired pay does not affect the eligibility of a Korea veteran with a service-connected disability to take vocational rehabilitation training. He must, however, need the training to overcome his handicap; his discharge must have been under conditions other than dishonorable; and his disability must be such as would entitle him to VA compensation if he were not receiving military retired pay.

Q. A neighbor of ours, who is on VA's pension rolls, is entitled to an additional amount of money because he is so helpless he needs constant aid and attention. Will he receive his additional allowance even though his mother provides the aid?

A. Yes. He may receive additional allowance even though a member of his family provides the necessary services. It is not necessary for him to hire an outside attendant in order to qualify for the payments.

Q. It rained so much last month that I did not receive any flight training in the course I am taking under the Korean GI Bill. Will I still get paid my GI allowance for that month?

A. You will not receive any allowance. Under the law, allowances may not be paid for any month during which GI flight trainees receive no instruction.

The 1959 Water Supply
The ground water supply outlook this year is "poor in the South and Southwest" and "fair to good in the North," according to U. S. water survey crews.

This rather dim outlook contrasts sharply with last year's generally abundant water supplies in Texas and other western states. It also recalls some vaguely disturbing reminders of the earlier 7-year trend during the bad drought years in Texas.

Snow survey supervisors report, however, that carryover storage from the high 1957 and 1958 runoff, will provide supplemental and late-season underground water where the snowpack is normal. The carryover will also tend to alleviate any

disasterous shortage during the 1959 season where the snowpack is low.

The forecast virtually eliminates any damaging high stream flows resulting from snow melt. With average of less snow accumulated in the mountains at the April 1 measuring time, the prospects for spring floods are very slight in the southwest.

Commenting on the irrigation water outlook, D. A. Williams, administrator of the Soil Conservation service had this advice: "Farmers and ranchers in areas faced with deficient water supplies should seek expert help and advice in planning their water programs. The soil conservation district agents can also offer aid in planning cropping and grazing patterns to fit area soil and available water supply."

The seasonal forecast covered 16 states and British Columbia. Of particular interest to Texas was the Rio Grande sector report which read, in part:

"Water outlook is poor in both Colorado and New Mexico with the April 1 snowpack near a record minimum. Mountain soils are dry. An above-normal carryover storage provides good prospects for New Mexico's Tucuman and Carlsbad projects but only a minimum inflow is in sight to add to Elephant Butte reservoir's near-average storage."

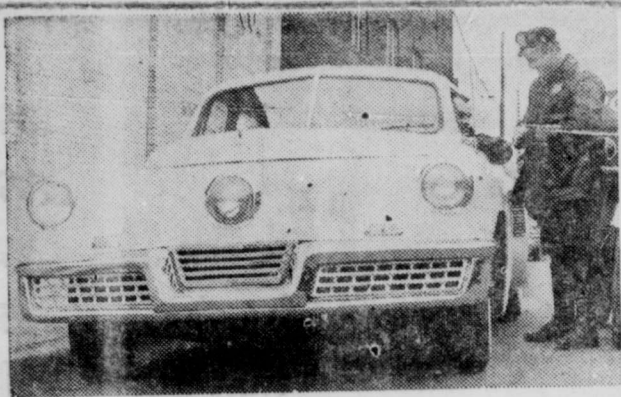

Choice A Cotton May Be Sold Locally

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced April 21 that Choice (A) upland cotton purchased by the Commodity Credit Corporation under its 1959 crop price support operations will be offered for sale by approved local sales agencies as well as by the New Orleans Commodity Stabilization Service Commodity Office.

To be approved as a local sales agency, an agency must have had recent experience in merchandising cotton and must have entered into a Cotton Sales Agency Agreement with CCC.

The cotton will be sold by the local sales agency at the highest price offered but in no event at less than 110 per cent of the Choice (B) support price plus carrying charges. The carrying charges will begin at 10 points in October 1959 and will increase 15 points per month through July 1960.

The quality assigned to the cotton by a Board of Cotton Examiners at the time CCC purchases the cotton will be used in determining the minimum acceptable sales prices for local sales. The 110 per cent of the Choice (B) support price will be applied to the particular quality and storage location of the cotton being offered. Final settlement for the cotton will be based on this same classification and the weights shown on the warehouse receipts.

The schedule of carrying charges (in points per pound) which will be added to determine minimum acceptable prices for the cotton offered is as follows: August and September, none; October, 10; November, 25; December, 40; January, 55; February, 70; March, 85; April, 100; May, 115; June, 130; and July, 145.

Details of the sales program through local sales agencies, and of the sales agency agreement, the sales agencies will be required to sign, are now being developed. Copies of these—Announcement CNA and the Cotton Sales Agency Agreement—will be released and made available to interested persons through the New Orleans Commodity Stabilization Service Commodity Office, 120 Marais St., New Orleans 16, La.

Cotton from 1958 and prior crops as well as any Choice (A) cotton taken into the CCC inventory and offered by catalogue will be made available for sale through the New Orleans CSS Commodity Office. Any of this cotton sold for unrestricted domestic use during the marketing year beginning August 1, 1959, will be at not less than the market price as determined by CCC or 110 per cent of the Choice (B) support price plus carrying charges, whichever is higher.
