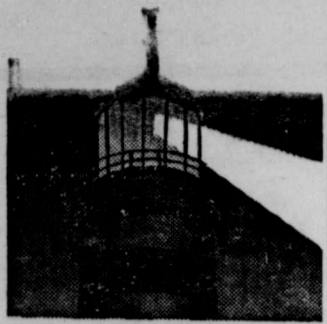




On The BEAM

A program has been started in Mitchell County the purpose of which is to better inform the people of the county of what to do that they may prepare for survival in case of any emergency such as radio active fallout and many other protective measures.

With Russia setting off high velocity nuclear bombs at frequent intervals makes it more imperative that the people know how to protect themselves should the fallout become dangerous. Of course Russia says they have fired the last bomb on this test series but we never know when they may decide to start another series of tests.

According to County Judge Elmer Martin the county organization will contain the following committees:

1. Administration Service: County Judge and Mayors of the three cities in the county.
2. Training, Education and Public Information: to educate people to their responsibilities and what is expected of them.
3. Fallout Protection Committee: How to build fallout shelters, what to supply them with, etc.

4. Warning and Communication Service: the most important service. The State receives warning from Colorado Springs, Colorado, and from Austin is sent to 21 warning points throughout the state, then to local sheriff's office, police department and highway patrol.

5. Manpower Service: Getting and maintaining personnel.

6. Transportation Service: Buses, trains, taxis, etc.

7. Legal Service: County or City attorney.

8. Fire and Rescue Service.

9. Engineering Service: Public utilities and public works of the cities and county.

10. Health and Emergency Service: City or county health officer can be in charge of this, or some doctor who will be responsible for preparing the public both educationally and through training, and to get inventory of all services available, such as supplies, ambulances, etc.

11. Religious Affairs Service: Use of churches for emergency stations.

We hope it will never be necessary for any of these committees to function in an emergency but it is wise for all of us to be prepared at any time. We should learn all we can about what to do and what preparations to make in advance for such an emergency.

HEATING EQUIPMENT CHECK RECOMMENDED

Heating equipment should be checked now to help assure maximum comfort and safety during the coming winter months.

This reminder came today from Lone Star Gas Company Manager Mr. R. J. Porter, who urged that heating equipment be checked before cold weather sets in. Mr. Porter suggested these safety precautions:

1. Have heating equipment and vent pipes inspected for safe and economical operation. If adjustments are required, call a qualified serviceman.

2. Be sure that your heating equipment has a source of fresh air. See that the gas burns with a bright blue flame.

3. Use only metal connectors approved by the American Gas Association. Do not use rubber hose.

4. Keep clothing, furniture, curtains, and other combustible materials away from heating equipment.

"By taking these simple yet essential precautions," Mr. Porter said, "homeowners will eliminate possible accident hazards and will make their homes comfortable for the winter season."

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Mitchell County commissioners met with Nolan County Commissioners' Court Monday to discuss irrigation survey matters of the two counties.

The western third of Nolan County has between 100 and 200 wells that are good water wells for spray irrigation.

Mitchell County's entire area is considered for investigation as possible irrigation territory.

Leaders in Mitchell County have obtained a \$23,000 irrigation survey grant from the State Board of Water Engineers.

This will survey the entire county and since the same water sand apparently starts at Roscoe, north and south, and runs into the Mitchell County fields it is proposed that Nolan County share in the survey.

The state will pay \$16,000 and Mitchell County \$7,000. Mitchell County proposes to pay \$4,000 and ask interested land owners to put up \$3,000 in escrow.

It has been suggested that Nolan County put up \$1,000.

The survey would not be released until it is completed in 1964 to avoid any speculation in water knowledge. The water reservoir, places where water is available, the longevity of water advisability of drilling more irrigation wells and other matters will be studied out by the water engineers.

So many oil tests, seismograph test, etc., have been made that much information northwest of Sweetwater is reported to have had more than 40 seismograph tests with one of them finally coming up with a 30-gallon-per-minute water well producing good water.
