DYNAMITE EXPLOSION ROCKS WINK

GANG WARFARE TACTICS SEEN AFTER BLAST

IS BELIEVED ECHO OF RECENT CLEAN-UP DRIVE THERE

WINK, TEX., Aug. 27.—Gang warfare tactics were introduced to this western oil boom town today when a garage, the largest building in Wink, was damaged by a blast.

The explosion tore away a large corner of the structure but did little damage to several automobiles stored in the building. A man asleep in the rear was uninjured.

Police said half a box of dynamite had been used, after finding 300 feet of burned fuse. The garage was owned by two men under indictment at Pecos for operating gambling halls and a liquor ring at Wink.

Raging Cow Crushes Beaumont Dairy Man

BEAUMONT, Aug. 27.—Attacked by an infuriated cow while he was attempting to milk the animal, G. M. Harrell, employee of a local dairy, was in a hospital today with a crushed chest and injured arm.

Harrell became entangled in a rope and was unable to make his escape when he was charged by the cow.

LEGIONNAIRES HOLD SESSION

'BUDDIES' FROM TWO STATES GATHER IN TEXARKANA

TEXARKANA, Aug. 27.—American legionnaires of Texas and Arkansas met in joint session here today to the accompaniment of patriotic songs and speeches pledged allegiance in promoting the growth of the legion and its allied organizations.

Called to order at 10 o'clock by Dan Sparlock of Shreveport, La., national vice commander, the first meeting continued past the noon hour with addresses by such notables as Gov. Dan Moody of Texas, United States Senator Morris Sheppard of Texas, Walter D. Hood and John G. Pipkin, state commanders of Texas and Arkansas, respectively.

The speaker theater, where the joint session was held, was packed to capacity by delegates from the Bear and Lone Star states.

Scattered through the audience were the dapper uniforms of a dozen bands and bugle corps from the two states. One of the biggest hits of the convention opening was the appearance of the girls' drum corps from Fort Smith, Ark., attired in fifty white jackets and skirts. The girls blocked traffic as they passed through the streets to the convention hall.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Aug. 27.—After a battle with a young man who attempted to kidnap her as she stepped from a street car near her home, Miss Selma Carbe, was cared for by physicians at her home today.

AUTOISTS ARE VICTIMS WHEN CREEK FLOODS

MOTORISTS DROWN AS CLOUDBURST MAKES RAGING TORRENT

ELLENVILLE, N. Y., Aug. 27.—The neighboring village of Napanoch and other places were isolated today because a Sunday cloudburst of an hour's duration converted Roundout Creek into a surging river which leaped its banks and spread over an area twenty miles long and seven miles wide.

Two motorists were drowned as the waters swept across the highway.

Three persons were reported to have been drowned at Accord when they attempted to ford Mombaccus Creek in an automobile.

Twenty-six boys, ranging in age from six to 12 years, in Camp Henry on an island at Rondale, were marooned. Fire departments from surrounding villages and cities made several attempts to rescue them. Two boys were brought to safety, but attempts to reach the others proved futile.

Three hundred persons at the Lackawack Country club, near Napanoch, were driven to high ground by the rising waters.

Barns and other outbuildings were swept from their foundations and deposited upon meadow lands. Homes, hogs, cattle and poultry were carried down stream.

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ASSASSINATION QUIZ REACHES SIX IN GOTHAM

WARRANT OF ARREST ISSUED MONDAY FOR MEXICAN SEXTET

NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—United States Commissioner O'Neill issued warrants today for the arrest of six Mexicans believed to be in New York who are wanted in connection with the assassination of President Obregon of Mexico and other crimes.

The defendants named in the warrants are: Joaquin Navarro Vercera, 34; Manuel Trejo Morales, 21; Oswaldo Ribbes Ochoa, 24; Jose A. Jimenez, 35; Enrique N. Zepeda, 35, and Aniceto Ortega, age not given.

Girl Killed When Auto Hits Bridge

DALLAS, Tex., Aug. 27.—Miss Eugenie Wayne Pennal, 18, was killed instantly this morning when her automobile struck a railing of a bridge near here. She was thrown from the car and her head hit a heavy piece of the railing.

Police reported that the driver of the car, was not hurt. He is being held on an approaching car blinded him and he did not see the narrow passage.

Miss Pennal had lived in Dallas for the last eight months, coming here from a home in Missouri.

Her body will be sent to her home for burial.

Business District Of Caddo Menaced

BRECKENRIDGE, Tex., Aug. 27.—The business section of Caddo, 12 miles east of here, was threatened for a time today by destruction from a fire which started in a brick school building.

Though hampered by lack of water, firemen from Breckenridge and Ranger, who answered the alarm put out the blaze.

Estimated loss on the structure is about \$5,000.

Record Turkey Crop Seen In Hale County

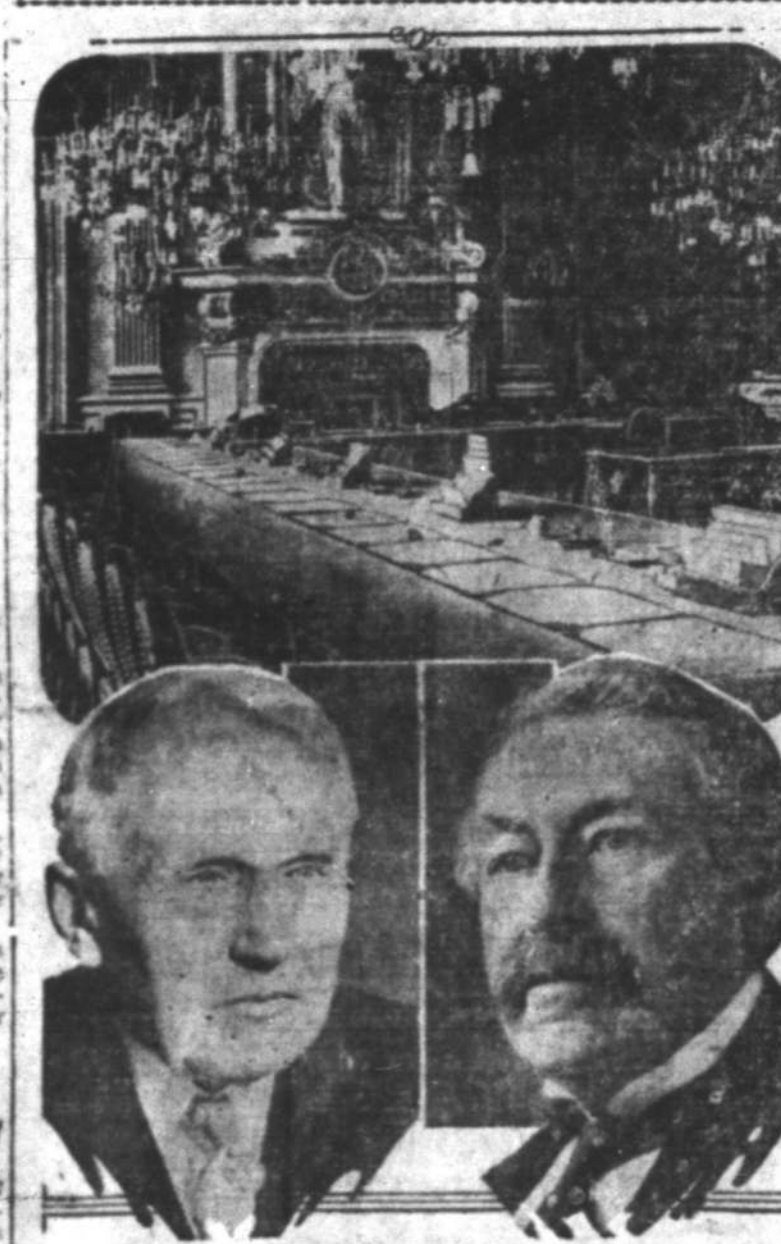

Fifteen Nations Sign Kellogg Pact In New Movement for World Peace

DEFICIT OF NEAR HUNDRED MILLION LOOMS FOR TREASURY INSTEAD OF LARGE SURPLUS AS ANTICIPATED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—President Coolidge's hope for a balanced budget on June 30, 1929, apparently faces disappointment, and the government, for the first time since the war, formally is forecasting a deficit in the treasury.

As set forth in the annual report of Director Lord of the budget, the figure on the red letter side of the ledger is expected to be \$94,179,346 for the fiscal year 1929.

The reason for the deficit, which, if materialized, will displace a once-expected surplus of more than \$252,000,000, are given by government estimators as greater outlays of money due to expanded activities of bureaus, and a prospective decrease in revenue.

The trend toward fulfillment of one side of the situation—decrease in revenue—was attested to last night, in a report of the internal revenue bureau, made public at the same time Director Lord predicted the deficit. This report disclosed that tax collections in the fiscal year ending June 30, 1928, were less by \$75,147,502 than in the preceding year.

Shearing Of Texas' Goat Flocks Starts

SAN ANGELO, Tex., Aug. 27.—Shearing of some 2,750,000 Angora goats has started in West Texas and a clip of about 7,000,000 is predicted by Texas raisers. Texas goat-raising is concentrated in western and northern and eastern buyers. J. E. Thurman of Rock Springs, owner of one of the largest goat-herds in the state, says the industry for the past two years has been the leading money maker in this section.

STATESMEN SEE ERA OF BETTER RELATIONS IN NEW TREATY

PARIS, Aug. 27.—The Kellogg-Briand renunciation of war treaty was signed this afternoon by the plenipotentiaries of fifteen nations.

Dr. Gustav Stresemann, German foreign minister, was the first to sign the historic document, attaching his signature at 3:45 p. m. (9:45 a. m., eastern standard time.)

Secretary of State Kellogg was the second to sign the treaty and Foreign Minister Benes of Czechoslovakia affixed the fifteenth and final signature at 3:55 p. m.

By the pact the fifteen countries renounced war "as an instrument of national policy."

With its signing all the peoples of the world were invited to join in a great effort to achieve permanent universal peace. Soviet Russia being asked to take part through the French government.

German First to Sign

Significantly Dr. Stresemann, first German foreign minister officially received in Paris since the war of 1870, was the first to sign under the alphabetical rule applied to names of the signatory countries. The United States was considered as being called America.

In order to make Secretary Kellogg the second signer, Foreign Minister Benes of Belgium was third and Foreign Minister Briand, whose message to the American people through the Associated Press many months ago was the origin of the pact which Secretary Kellogg developed and expanded, came fourth.

When Foreign Minister Briand had finished an address of welcome and the pact had been read, both were translated into English. This took 45 minutes and then the French foreign minister after a

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COUNTY CANDIDATES CINCH PLACES; CONNALLY LEAD IS BOOSTED TO 55,716 MARGIN

(By Associated Press)

DALLAS, Aug. 27.—Congressman Tom Connally was leading his opponent, Earle B. Mayfield, for the Democratic nomination for United States senate by 55,716 votes, latest returns received today by the Texas Election Bureau disclosed.

Reports from 219 out of 253 counties in the state, including 85 complete and 21 counties where no primaries were held, gave Connally 292,677 and Mayfield 236,961.

Further returns failed to cut the lead of E. M. N. Moore, seeking renomination for another term as state superintendent of public instruction, over W. P. Garner of Nacogdoches. Marr's total vote was 229,143 as compared with 217,103 for his opponent.

For land commissioner, J. T. Robison, veteran commissioner of the general land office, was assured of his renomination through mounting totals today. Robison had polled 317,067 and Odis Terrell of Austin, his opponent, 179,362 votes.

Should any candidate carry the remainder of the votes, no material change would be made in the standings. According to Frank E. Wheelock, county democratic chairman, the reports from the three remaining boxes, which include DeWitt, Foster and Carlisle, probably will not be heard from until next Saturday. The reports were turned in this morning to the county chairman but will not be opened until the meeting of the county executive committee Saturday.

Reports from the three additional boxes this morning increased Wade Hardy's lead over H. L. Johnston in the sheriff's race beyond the 1,000 mark. Returns from 29 of the 23 county precincts show Hardy 2,750 and Johnston 1,750.

Lead of Robert H. Bean in the county judge's race was decreased by about twenty-five votes in this morning's returns, but still remains more than 300 votes in the lead, insuring victory to make the result of the remaining votes. The vote now stands Bean 2,582 and George W. Foster, 2,070.

In the county tax assessor's race A. B. Ellis increased his lead over the present incumbent, R. C. Burns.

BUD JOHNSTON TO AID HARDY IN EVERY WAY

SHERIFF ASKS PEOPLE TO GIVE SUCCESSOR THEIR SUPPORT

Declaring that he is not only willing but that he is anxious to give every aid possible to his successor, Wade Hardy, Sheriff H. L. (Bud) Johnston, defeated Saturday in his campaign for a fourth term, announced today that the citizens of the county would find him ready to carry out their wishes, as expressed through the ballot box, in the future as in the past.

"When Wade Hardy goes into office it is my sincere hope and wish that the good people of the county will give him their greatest co-operation," Sheriff Johnston told the Journal. "Further than that I hope that when they hear criticisms of the peace officers—and there are criticisms made of all officers no matter who they are—that they will lock into their ears behind those criticisms before repeating them or believing them."

Scores Lawless Element

"Criticisms based upon rumors and the rumors themselves, often are nothing more or less than attacks upon law enforcement officers, originating with the lawless element seeking to get public opinion on its side rather than with the officers who are trying only to perform their duty. These rumors react to the benefit of those advancing them and when accepted by the public make the duties of the officer all the harder."

"I have nothing but friendship and good wishes for Mr. Hardy," the sheriff said, "and I believe, along with the majority of the county's citizenship, that he will make a good sheriff."

Sheriff Johnston said that he would remain in the office until January 1, completing his sixth year. He has not decided upon what he will do after that.

Two Attempts Made On Life of Vice Crusade Leader

AKRON, O., Aug. 27.—An intensive round-up of all known members of Akron's underworld was underway today because of the assassination attempt in three days on the life of Kyle Ross, vice crusade councilman who engaged in a gun duel with gangsters after his home had been set afire last night.

Ross, recently appointed by the city council to investigate crime conditions, was fired on as he stood in the kitchen door of his home after being awakened by his wife who had heard an intruder coming up the basement stairs. The bullet shattered one of the door panels.

The councilman twitched on floor lights installed in his back yard when his life was first threatened, ran outside and exchanged shots with his assailant. A neighbor, Ed Hardesty, awakened by the firing seized a gun and shot from his bedroom window at a second man who had appeared near the Ross home. Both attackers then fled. None of the bullets took effect.

In the meantime, the basement of the Ross home had become a shambles of flames. Firemen quickly extinguished the blaze and found that all of the cellar walls had been sprayed with gasoline.

Police revealed yesterday that on Friday night an attempt was made to blow up Ross' home. The incident had been kept secret that a speedier investigation might be made. Officers said his home had been filled with natural gas and the electric current switched off, evidently in the idea that the councilman, finding his home dark would light matches. The plot failed, however, when a friend accompanying Ross home grabbed his arm just as he was about to light a match and called his attention to the odor of gas.

FOUR WESTERN CLUBS START FIGHTING AMONG SELVES

With the National League's fifth interseasonal series virtually over, the four Western contenders now can begin cutting each other's throats while the New York Giants, wrathful over their recent beatings at Cincinnati and Pittsburgh, seek to visit their vengeance on the more helpless East.

It is no secret that John McGraw hopes to win the pennant just by these means. While the Reds, Pirates, Cardinals and Cubs are having it out west of the Alleghenies, McGraw hopes to get the Giants into first place, a strategic spot from which to view the third and final western invasion of the east, beginning September 14.

Giants Start Poorly
But John didn't start out very well yesterday. The Giants were outgamed by Brooklyn, 4 to 3, Bissette picking the tenth inning as the spot for his 20th home run of the season.

Before young Carl Hubbell in a moment of weakness, grooved the ball for Miesel Del, the Giants did the best they could to present the game to the Reds, Cohen and moments extremely inopportune for Mr. Hubbell, who saw a well-pitched seven-hit game get away from him.

The defeat was all the more costly for McGraw in that the St. Louis Cardinals again trimmed the Phillies, 6 to 1, and lengthened their league lead to three and a half games over the Giants and the Chicago Cubs.

Cubs Down Braves Again
The Cubs, defeating the Boston Braves, 6 to 3, for the fourth straight time, moved up to a tie with the Giants in games won and lost, although they are no better than third in percentage. This apparent contradiction lies in the fact that the Cubs have played more games and lost more than the Giants. With Kiki Cuyler and Woody English leading the offense, the Cubs battered Kent Greenfield for 13 hits while Hal Carlson was holding the Braves to five.

Finishing its hold on fourth place rather insecure, Cincinnati downed Pittsburgh, 6 to 3, and put two full games between themselves and the 1927 pennant winners.

Branson was the whole show as Washington defeated Cleveland, 5 to 1, in the only American League engagement of the day. The Senators' left hander, one of the few consistent pitchers Harris has right now, allowed only five hits and struck out seven men.

YOU CAN'T BEAT CONNIE MACK WHEN IT COMES TO ORIGINAL LINE-UP, IS THE WAY BILLY EVANS SUMS IT UP

When Connie Mack signed the two veteran stars, Ty Cobb and Tris Speaker, to Philadelphia contracts last winter, the baseball public didn't quite get his angle. It was the belief of fandom that these two players had passed the peak of their game, that neither would help the Athletics. Pressed for his reason, Mack replied:

"The Yankees have won two pennants in a row largely through power. Conceded to be the greatest aggregation of hitting in the majors, they have literally slugged their way to the top, even though their pitching and defense at times faltered badly. I am inclined to think that power, a bating punch, is the most important asset in baseball, and I intend to fight the Yankees with their own fire."

I realize that both Cobb and Speaker have a slow-up on the field, that neither is a speed demon on the bases but I feel both of them can still hit the ball. Through out their career their batting feats have stood out and I feel that both still pack a punch at the bat that can be of great help to the Athletics in trying to floor the Yankees at their own game."

There are few smarter men in baseball than Connie Mack and it was reasonable to suppose that regardless of whether the two veteran stars had slowed up, that they would still pack the punch at the bat. Unfortunately, these two master batsmen have disappointed to a certain extent. Cobb boasts an average of .330, but injuries have kept him from being in the lineup as a regular. Speaker, on the other hand, has had the same loss in his famous career. Things have broken badly for him and he has hit in hard luck from the very start of the year.

The infield combination of the Athletics is at present made up of catcher Jimmie Fox at first base, Joe Boley at short and Max Bishop at second, the regular guardians of those two positions, with Pitcher Orvill playing first base. The reason—Felix and Orvill are 350 batters, much higher than the other players eligible for the two positions. While Mack realizes that possibly neither Fox nor Orvill rate with the other players in the field, he sticks to the theory that they can win far more games with their bats than they can lose in the field. It will be interesting to see if Mack's theory that power is now a baseball asset is proved true, by the result of the American League race.

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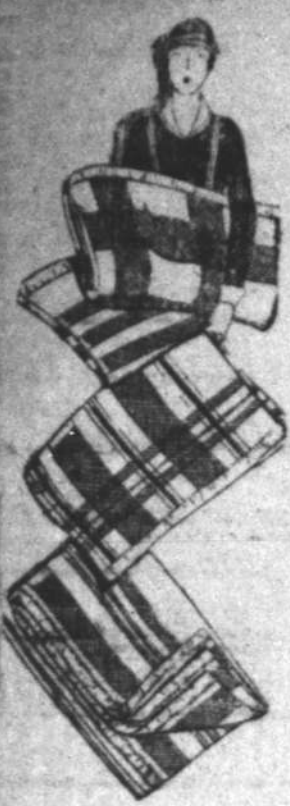

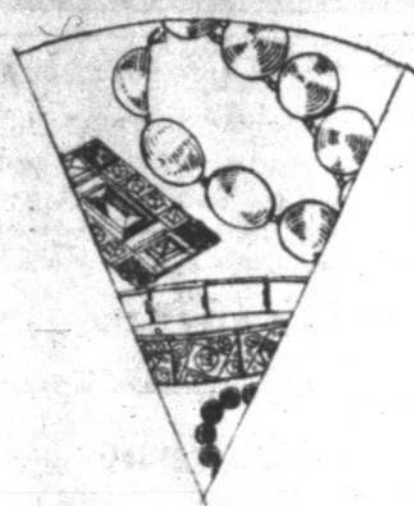

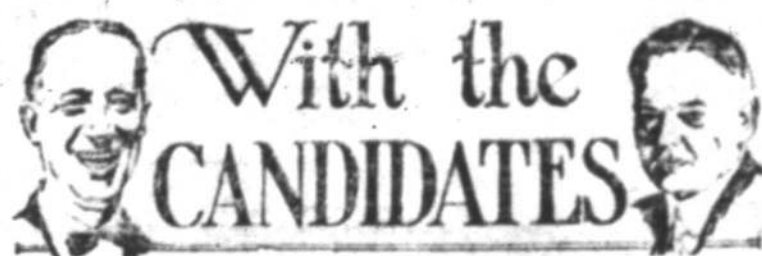

SMITH ENDS REST AND PREPARES FOR WEEK OF ACTIVITY

SPRING LAKE, N. J., Aug. 27.—Refreshed after a round of activities that have kept him occupied almost continuously since his notification Governor Smith ends his week-end rest at this seacoast resort today to turn again to the more serious phases of his campaign for the presidency.

With members of his family who have been enjoying the social functions and swimming while he received state political leaders and friends here, the democratic presidential nominee intends to return by automobile late in the day to New York for further conferences on his speaking itinerary.

Arriving in New York, he expects to resume conferences he began there Thursday night and Friday and probably arrive at some conclusion as to how far he will go and the approximate number of speeches he will make during the campaign.

On Wednesday and Thursday he has non-political engagements at Syracuse.

Wednesday evening he will attend the annual "Farmers Dinner" given by Jerome D. Barnum, publisher of the Syracuse Post-Standard, and the next day he will go to the state fair. No political speeches are planned at either affair but at the latter he may make a brief talk on state matters.

The nominee put in his last day at Spring Lake taking things easy. First he went to church with Mrs. Smith, and large numbers who had missed seeing him as a result of the great crowds which turned out for the political rally at Seagirt Saturday were turned away from the cathedral when they tried to squeeze their way in.

HOOVER MAPS OUT PROGRAM FOR REST OF HIS CAMPAIGN

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—Refreshed after a two-day's rest at his home here, Herbert Hoover today turned his attention to mapping out his program for the remainder of the campaign.

The republican presidential nominee decided to give first attention to the East, and in order to inform himself fully as to the situation there he has invited a number of his friends to call on him at his new headquarters which are to be set up here.

He now has under consideration a visit to both New York, home state of his democratic opponent, and Massachusetts, but his eastern itinerary will not be decided upon until after he has conferred fully with those in charge of his campaign program.

The republican candidate's view is that he should defer further speech-making for two weeks or more, and then begin an intensive drive which would carry him into the border states and the South as well as the East. He also probably will make a trip to Chicago before beginning his final swing across the continent at the close of the campaign.

In working out details of his itinerary Hoover will seek advice of Dr. Hubert Work, chairman of the republican national committee, Representative Walter Reuther of Minnesota, who has charge of the national speakers' bureau; Representative John Q. Tilson, of Connecticut, director of the eastern speakers' bureau, and James W. Good, of Iowa, western campaign manager.

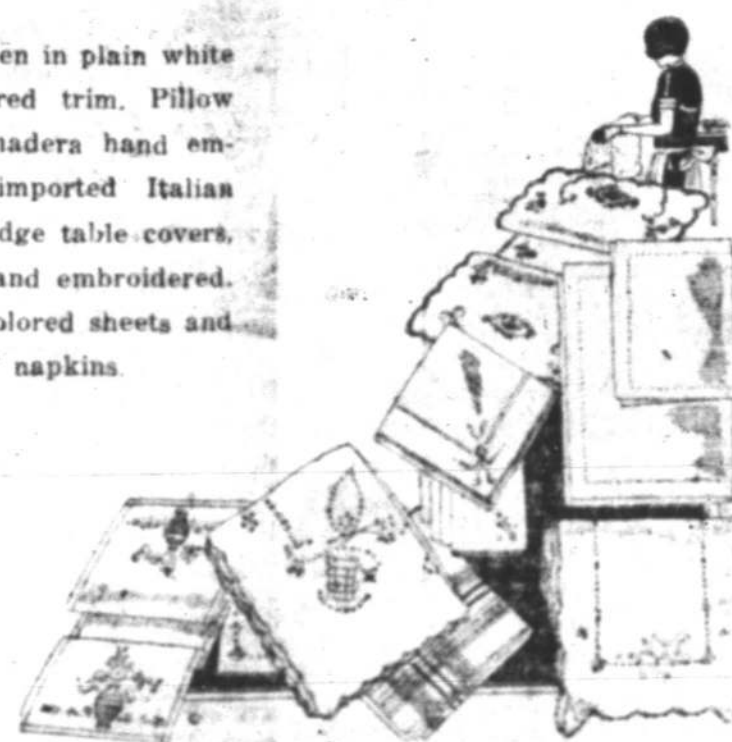

A downtown Chicago bombing was just outside the Loop and within a block of the Hotel Sherman, many of whose guests were aroused by the report. The building bombed is used as an employment agency on the second floor, while on the street floor it is occupied by a saloon.

A negro porter, West Carpenter, was the only person in the place when the explosion occurred. He

was not hurt. He could give police little information concerning a possible motive.

Learning To Be An Air Pilot

Hand Held Out From Speeding Car Forms
Basic Principle Of Aviation

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the third of a series of articles in which Captain Malcolm J. Buchanan, writer for The Journal and NEA Service, explains the use of the airplane and how to operate it. Buchanan was a pilot with the U. S. Army Air Corps on the Western front during the World War and is now on the editorial staff of the Ft. Worth (Tex.) Press.

By Capt. Malcolm Buchanan

Why an airplane flies—or the theory of flight—is one of the most interesting of modern studies, principally because it is difficult to conceive of a thing which weighs several tons overcoming gravity and lifting several hundred pounds in addition to its own weight.

The air has a definite atmospheric weight and the plane is designed to take care of this weight. For example, when you hold your hand outside a moving automobile your hand is forced back in the direction opposite the line of travel. It is the weight of the air that is felt on the hand.

A plane flies because of dynamic reaction of the atmosphere against wing surfaces. The commonplace kite is one of the best illustrations. In still air it will not fly unless towed, but on a windy day a kite will ascend to great height. Its tail must be such that it will hold the surface of the kite at a constant angle of contact to the air's line of travel.

Changing The Angles
Airplane wings are designed to act in the same manner. A wing surface can be made to lift more by increasing the angle of inclination up to a certain point where the drift overcomes the lift and is neutralized.

The wing of the airplane, like that of the kite, has a lift that is measured in pounds per square foot. It is caused by the surface being pulled or pushed through the air, and the speed at which any given surface travels determines the lift per square foot. When a surface is doubled its lift is doubled, approximately. This condition varies, however, as there is a drift that puts an added strain on the surface.

Thus the designer is forced to make the wing heavier, though all added weight cuts down efficiency. The monoplane is perhaps the most desirable construction because it does away with all wire and strut bracing necessary in building multiple wings.

The weight-carrying or transport planes, having a large wing surface and do so travel at great speed. As wings are set at the maximum angle to lift at low speeds.

In the speed planes the design is reversed. They are given barely enough wing spread to lift the craft off the ground, and a small angle to the horizontal.

Rudder And Ailerons
Control of the craft is accomplished by ailerons, one on each wing tip; the rudder on the tail; and the elevator, also on the tail. The air acts on these surfaces as water on the rudder of a motorboat. They are traveling through the air at a good speed and are attached to the plane in the line of travel by hinges or pivots.

Any movement of the control surfaces causes the air to exert pressure on the surface and force it back to normal position. In case this surface is held out of the line of flight the plane is forced to change its course.

The ailerons control the rolling or lateral position of the craft. In land traffic we are banking roads that automobiles may make turns without lessening speed. The controls of the airplane make it possible to bank on the air highway without skidding.

Ball boats have a keel surface which keeps them upright and to the course. The rudder—which is vertical—is the movable part of the plane's keel surface and serves the same purpose. When wind strikes the plane from either side this keel surface causes the craft to turn into the wind, acting in the same capacity as the old-fashioned weathercock.

The elevator causes the airplane to nose up or down in the same manner from right to left. The rudder and elevator exchange duties when the craft is flying on its side, as in a steep banked turn.

Lift And Drag
The imaginary line which ex-

tends from the center of the propeller hub through the tail (looking at the plane from the side) is called the center of thrust. The craft is designed to have another imaginary line representing the center of drift to run parallel to the center of thrust, but just above it. It is this drift that causes the plane, when the power is applied to nose up; and to nose down when the power is cut off.

There are two imaginary lines that are drawn from the ground through the top and when the plane is in normal flying position—tail up—the center of gravity is just ahead of the center of lift. Thus when the power is cut off the gravity line changes and the nose end—heavy with the motor—tips down. These four lines, if properly considered, make the plane take what is called a natural gliding angle in case of motor failure or other trouble.

The plane of today is as fool-proof as any other similar piece of machinery. If its various parts are in condition it will fly practically alone once in the air, but an accredited pilot must be familiar with the parts of his plane in addition to knowing the different functions of the parts.

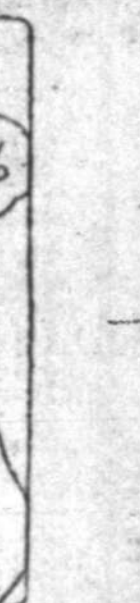

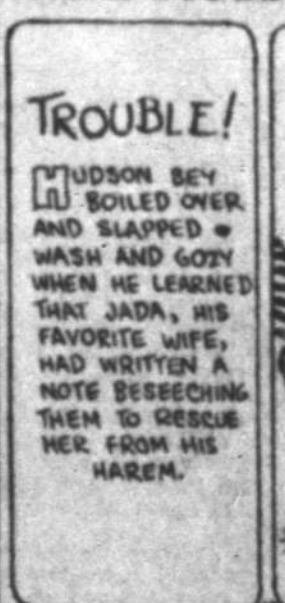

This is the third attempt to discover oil in the same hole the first one being drilled by the Kingsland Oil company of Amarillo, which drilled to 3,200 feet and disposed of its interests to the King Oil company, of Lubbock, which with local contributions, carried the hole to 4,000 feet and disposed of its holdings. The present company, which is said to be a subsidiary of the Standard of Kentucky, is now drilling. Renewal of operations by the present company has caused considerable leasing activity and one major company is undertaking to block several thousand acres within a few miles of the present test.
