I first met Tom Harkey over an electric telephone spanning 2,000+ miles when I was still living in Seattle, Washington and when he had just arrived in Loraine, Texas to be the new superintendent.

Frankly, he took me by storm and suddenly I realized I had been hired to teach in the smallest school system I had ever been involved in--Loraine.

But when I arrived in Loraine in July and met Tom Harkey, I had the feeling I was not relating to a small town school man (not that there is anything wrong with a small town school man). I felt that Tom Harkey was a man on the way up and I just hoped I could hang around long enough to see what he could do with the problems that seemingly beset the Loraine schools in recent years.

I remarked to Dr. Terry one night at a football game that I wondered how long Loraine could keep a man like Tom Harkey because "he is a man on the way up". Dr. Terry replied that he had rather have a man on the way up be with us for a while than a man on the way down.

My wife and I used to compare notes at the first of school and say to one another that "we hoped that Tom Harkey was for real and not just a figment of our imagination".

I kept suspecting that Superintendent Harkey was for real, but being a "Doubting Thomas" by tradition and by trade, I felt it important that I withhold judgment until he had "proved himself".

But after the first touchdown Friday night in Jaybird town, I decided that my judgment was not really needed. After the touchdown referred to, Gary Minton came back to the sideline jumping up and down several feet high as often as his legs could accomplish the feat. Running toward him was one Tom Harkey who reached out his hand to congratulate David, but ending up having a genuine expression of mutual admiration for the student and there they were (student and superintendent) beating each other on the back as they experienced the sheer joy of being out in front of the "mighty" Jaybirds.

I could say a lot more about Tom Harkey but most of you already know as much about him as I do. But I can't withhold editorial judgment about him any longer. Tom Harkey is for real--as a superintendent, as a football fan, as a preacher of love and understanding, as an educator, as a friend to students and adults of the community and certainly as a family man whose family contributes much to his chosen community.

Loraine New District Champ

The Loraine Bulldogs went to Jayton to win a football game and to sew up the District title. By half time, the Bulldogs' goal line stand having been successful, Loraine fans (who probably outnumbered the Jayton fans) felt victory was a strong possibility.

The possibility grew stronger throughout the second half until in the waning minutes of the game, Superintendent Tom Harkey pulled the District Trophy out of a box and gave it to proud Head Coach Guthrie who held it out for the defensive team to see. The Bulldogs were so proud of the newly-won trophy that they smeared the next Jaybird play for a huge loss and worried very little when the referees stepped off a healthy penalty against the Bulldogs for something or other--the game was in the bag--the trophy was a reality--they knew their name would soon be engraved on the metal plate and 15 years from that moment they could point with pride to a trophy and tell their kids that they helped win it (an indirect quote from a statement made by Coach Guthrie at the Friday afternoon pep rally).

There were lots of heroes Friday night--Coach Guthrie, Coach Lamkin, Quarterback Minton, Mike Jones, the offensive line, the whole defensive team, Robert Darnell and the blockers who made the passing game a reality by their rushing plays keeping the Jaybirds honest.

The Managers of the team helped out by serving the Bulldog in many ways; the cheerleaders never gave up their cheering ways even after the game seemed safe toward the end; the band played more than they have at any other game; the fans (young and old) gave out with complete support; there is no end to the number of heroes Friday night in Jayton.

The first Bulldog score came in the first quarter as Minton threw a pass to Mike Jones and the pass-catcher knew what to do as he ran along the sideline and easily outran the opposition in chalking up the first Bulldog score. David Minton added the extra point; and the west side of Jaybird Field went absolutely mad as Superintendent Harkey and Quarterback Minton practically killed one another as they became emotional about the turn of events.

In the second quarter, Minton and Jones once again connected with a pass that covered the greater part of the football field. The try for extra point failed, but the Bulldogs led 13-0 and the game was won by then.

But the Jaybirds came very close to scoring in the latter part of the first half. The Bulldog Defense held inside the five yard line and finally the half was over and the Jaybird pride had been wounded so badly, they didn't really get off the ground the rest of the night.

In the third quarter, Minton passed to Jones again, but Mike was shy of making the touchdown. So, Minton plunged over for the TD and then passed again to Jones for the extra two points that made the score 21-0. Jayton finally made a score (6 points) but it was too late and too little--Loraine High School Bulldogs had already cinched the District championship.

The Texas Legislative Council directs the activities of a staff whose duties include the investigation of departments, agencies and officers of the state to study their functions and problems, the conducting of studies for the use of the legislative branch, the gathering of information for use by the Legislature and the reporting, to the Legislature, of its recommendations accompanied with such drafts of legislation as it deems proper.

These five Senators will join ten members of the House who have been appointed by the Speaker.

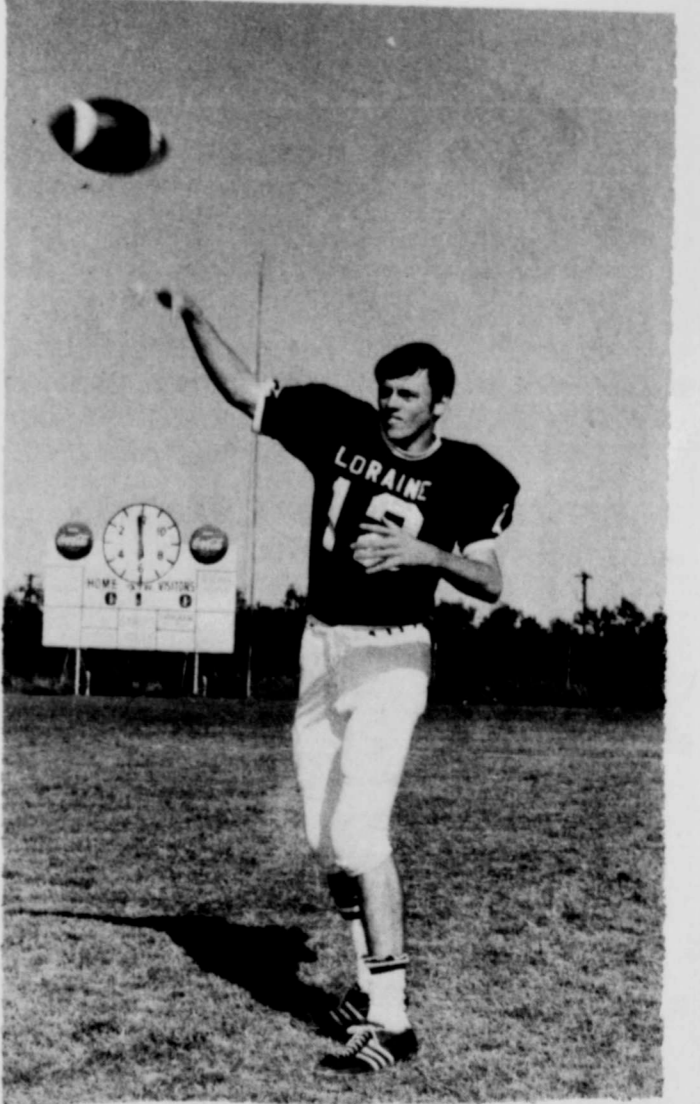
Loraine will become practically deserted Saturday night as buses and cars take the populace down to watch the mighty Bulldogs.

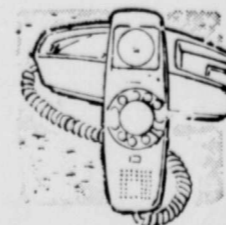

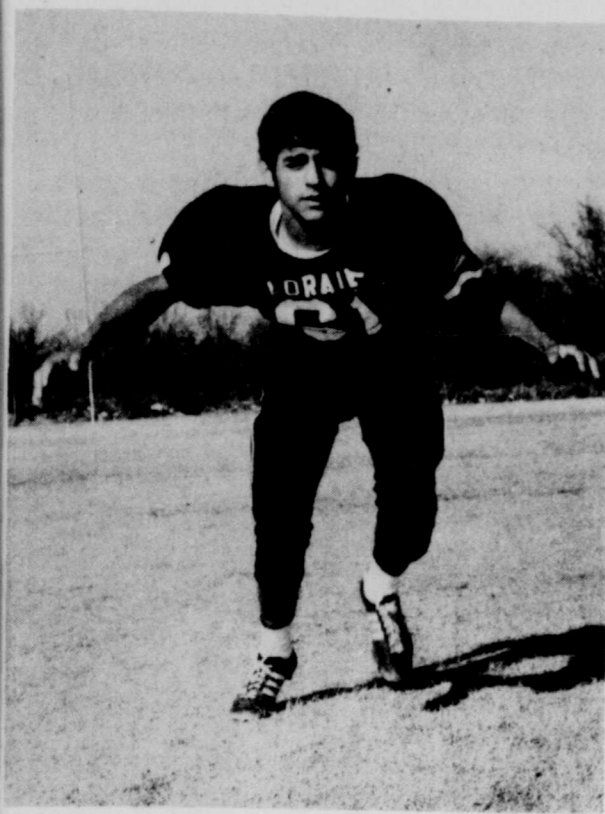

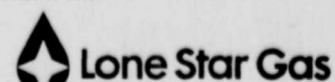
