C-City In 'Finals' For Bilingual Grant

School Plan 1 of 67 In Nation Considered By HEW

Colorado Independent School District is one of 67 nationwide in final consideration for a new federal financed bilingual education program for 1970-71 school year.

Only 13 independent school districts in Texas have been advanced to the final consideration. And Colorado City is the only district from the upper two-thirds of the state.

Colorado City's inclusion in the top 57 of all the nation was announced Saturday in Wash-

ington, D. C., by Senator John G. Tower.

The new program, financed by Department of Health, Education and Welfare, has been championed and pushed by Senator Ralph Yarborough.

Colorado City's proposed program, submitted last October by Supt. James G. McMath, would range from \$55,000 to \$64,000 annually over a five-year period to meet the lan-

guage needs of one-third of the school district's children who will be five years of age for the 1970-71 school year.

It is designed specifically for this one-third who come from homes in which Spanish is the dominant language and whose performance in schools is affected by lack of contact with English language.

Final selection for the school

districts to share in the Health, Education and Welfare grants for a bilingual program beginning next fall will be made in June in Washington.

Twelve other Texas school districts included with Colorado City are Alice, Corpus Christi, Del Valle (Travis County), Edinburg, El Paso, Galveston, Kingsville, Orange Grove (Jimmie Wells), Port Isabel, San Antonio, Alamo,

Heights, North Side and South Side.

Colorado City submitted its application for the new program, tested last year with pilot programs and now being expanded on a limited scale, through Texas Education Agency and U. S. Office of Education in Washington, D. C.

Education Service Center in Abilene is supporting only Colorado City's application as a pioneer

for this entire West Texas region.

E. P. Baker Jr., bilingual education expert with the Service Center, has consulted with McMath, Assistant Supt. Lloyd McKee and other school administrators in formulating the local plan.

Also in contact with the district administrators has been Senator Yarborough and Albar A. Pena, director of Bilingual Evaluations Program Branch, Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

Recent school survey revealed that 60 per cent of this district's Mexican-American children live in homes where only Spanish is spoken. A parent advisory group of Mexican-Americans emphasizes that this is a "major detriment" to their children's success in school.

Colorado City's proposed bilingual program would deal specifically with this group at the kindergarten level, then follow through with additional bilingual help in subsequent grades.

Funds sought under Title VII, Elementary & Secondary Education Act of 1965, is for \$55,000 for the first year (1970-71), \$62,000 for second year, \$64,000 for third, \$62,000 for fourth and \$60,000 for fifth year.

For the 50 to 56 children to be taught in the initial year, beginning next fall, this would amount to \$917 per child.

Right now, there are no pre-school programs for Spanish speaking youngsters in the Colorado City area.

Emergency

Special Lighting Studied

Firemen and county officials are putting their heads together in an effort to secure high-power light and generator for night emergencies.

Pat McKenney and Dale Martin, Colorado City Volunteer Fire Department, accompanied County Judge Elmer Martin and Precinct 1 Commissioner Marcus Vest to Lubbock Thursday to check government surplus equipment.

It is likely that Commissioners Court will begin the paperwork to purchase Mitchell County as a Civil Defense unit.

With Civil Defense certification by Department of Public Safety, the county will become eligible for purchases of surplus equipment at Texas Government Surplus. Then, the county can request the lighting equipment and have priority when the equipment becomes available.

Absentees Off

Only 3 Votes In City, School

If absentee balloting is a gauge, then Colorado City's school board and City Council elections are not No. 1 on the interest list.

Not a single absentee ballot had been cast at the weekend in the election that will elect two trustees for 3-year terms on Colorado Independent School District board.

City Council's five-candidate race for three 2-year positions wasn't creating a landslide either.

When City Hall closed at 5 p.m. Friday for the weekend, only 3 ballots were in the absentee box.

Deadlines for casting absentee ballots are almost here, too.

For the April 4 school board election next Saturday, final

day for absentees is Tuesday, March 31.

Absentee voters in the City April 4 election have a couple of days more--through Thursday, April 2.

Three candidates are in the field for school board places. Two of these are incumbents: A. K. Macarley Jr., farmer, and Ed Thrift, retail store owner.

Third candidate is Willis Taylor, insurance agent.

With five candidates contesting each other, the City Council election has been expected to create more interest than usual. However, the three absentee votes cast do not reflect this.

Only one incumbent is among the five. He is Eddie Piland, Pharmacist.

The other four candidates are entering the City Hall political picture for the first time and include Trevlyn Kelley, banker, Abel Alvarez, cotton compress employee; Buck May, service station owner, and J. D. Dockrey, auto dealer.

Despite the low number of absentee voters, Mitchell County has a better-than-average voter registration for a non-presidential election year.

County Tax Assessor-Collector Montie Hardegree registered 3,220 voters for 1970. That is 94.12 per cent of the quota assigned to Mitchell County by State Democratic Executive Committee.

True, Mitchell ranks only 35th in its category designated by the state committee, but the total is higher than in recent years.

Bracy Speed Beats Lethridge In 100

Coach Dell Riley finally pulled his track team out of the wind and rain for a bus trip back home Saturday night from Andrews.

But not before Speeding Stan Bracy and Big Carl Devorce had won their specialties.

Bracy, the junior sprinter, set a new AA record for the 100-yard dash at the Mustang Relays with 9.6 qualifying time when the sun was shining and

a wind pushing him along in the afternoon.

In the windy cold and rain Saturday night he could manage no better than 10.2, but it was enough for first place and triumph in his first showdown with Estacado High's District 3-AAA kingpin Jesse Lethridge.

Bracy and Lethridge had the best qualifying times in the 220 Saturday afternoon with 23 seconds flat in their heats. But

Coach Riley "scratched" Bracy in the finals because of the severe weather and Lethridge was third behind Seminole's Hall who managed a 23.5.

Devorce tossed the shotput for 54 feet 7 inches to win his No. 1 event, but the throw was off his longest distance of this season. His 128 feet in the discus was good for only sixth place with Wayne Roberts of Seminole No. 1 with 146 feet 2 inches.

Devorce's fellow junior, Tommy Boyd, earned a sixth place in the shot with 49 feet 5 inches.

Colorado City's sprint relay was running a good second in the finals when Randy Riley, who has been hobbled by a pulled hamstring muscle since the season's opening meet, pulled up lame. This was the first time C-City had put together its top sprint relay foursome and its 44.6 into the

wind was second fastest qualifying time and nipped Dunbar.

Without qualifiers in the 444 or 880, Coach Riley withdrew his mile and mile relay entries when weather ruled out decent competition at night.

Next weekend Coach Riley will take his track team to Seminole Relays for their final action before District 3-AAA meet in Lubbock.

To Enclose Offices

Bank Remodeling Starts April 10

A remodeling project will begin April 10 in City National Bank remodeling the bank's offices area loan department and providing other improvements.

Major portion of the remodeling will be to provide separate, private office areas for each of the bank's four vice presidents.

These officers now have open-type office areas on the bank's north side of the lobby.

With the remodeling, first major program of improve-

ments at the bank since the modern banking facility was completed in May 1960, the individual office areas will be enclosed in glass.

Executive Vice-President Gus Chesney will move into the northeast corner of the area, occupying enclosed office now the bank's conference room.

The other three vice-presidents, Wayne Shawn, George Womack and Trevlyn Kelley will be in the new enclosed area at the bank's north window area.

Reception area will be provided in the lobby area of the bank and a wall of planters will divide the officers area-loan department from the main lobby.

Additional office space also will be constructed in the main

floor's southwest corner in the vault area.

This will be designed to improve customer service and to offer additional convenience for those conducting their banking business.

With the remodeling will come new drapes throughout the bank, in the officers-loan area and also in the second floor area.

New carpeting also will be added in the officers area and in the office of City National President Charles C. Thompson. This will be in a Coronado gold theme.

Paneling in the remodeled office area will be Walnut, same as utilized throughout the bank now.

Contractor for the improvements will be Colorado City's Virgil Stone.

Denton Campaign

First State Candidate Here

James G. Denton, candidate for Texas Supreme Court in the May 2 Democratic Primary, is the first state candidate to visit Colorado City this political season.

He was here for a brief visit with lawyers and a quick turn through the business area.

Judge Denton, currently Chief Justice of Seventh Court of Civil Appeals, Amarillo, is a candidate for the associate justice spot being vacated by retirement of Associate Justice Robert W. Hamilton.

He was the lead choice of lawyers in the three man race, according to the recent State Bar poll. His opponents are Matt Davis of Bowie County and Hawthorne Phillips of Travis County.

Although the Seventh Appeals Court is headquartered in Amarillo, Judge Denton has his home in Lubbock.

His campaign approach here mainly was to cite his experience and integrity as a judge.

The Bonham native has held his present Chief Justice post since October 1959 when he was appointed by Governor Price

Denton. Since that time he has twice been re-elected.

His first judgeship came in March, 1950, when he became the first judge of the County Court at Law in Lubbock. In 1952 he was elected judge of the 99th District Court in Lubbock County. He served in that position until October 1959 when he accepted his present post.

Denton, born on May 27, 1917, has received widespread support in his campaign from attorneys and laymen alike. Prominent lawyers in all parts of the state have united to spearhead local and regional activities in Denton's behalf. Leading businessmen and executives from all fields have announced their support.

Denton is a 1938 graduate of Texas Tech in Lubbock. He received his law training at the University of Texas. He served in the Navy on minesweepers in both the Atlantic and Pacific during World War II.

He has been active at both community and state levels, serving where needed. Denton has served as vice chairman of the Judicial Section of the State Bar of Texas. He served as

district chairman of the Boy Scouts of America. He is a former chairman of the Amarillo Chapter of the American Red Cross, and currently serves on the Midwestern Advisory Council to the American Red Cross and the Salvation Army Board.

Denton is married and the father of five children. He is a member of Kiwanis International and the First Baptist Church of Amarillo.

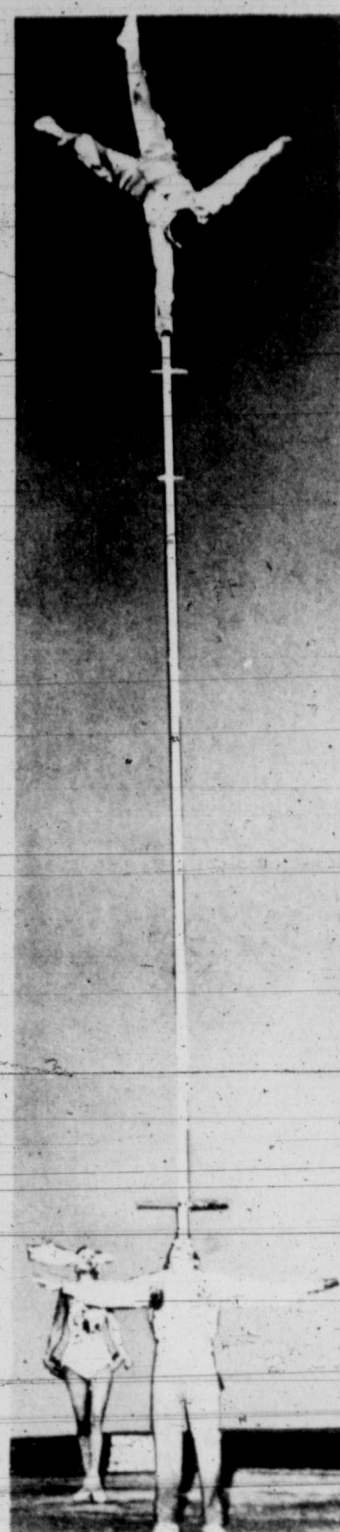

Final Seal Appeal

A last minute appeal for Easter Seal support was issued Saturday by George Womack, Easter Seal representative in Mitchell County.

The Easter Seal Appeal, which provides funds for treatment and services for 20,378 physically handicapped children and adults in Texas, closed today (Sunday).

"This the final opportunity for citizens of our community to participate in this campaign," Womack said.

The appeal is for Texas Easter Seal Society, which must expand its program already aiding more than 20,000 persons.

"Many persons physically handicapped are aged, without services that would increase the productivity of their lives," Womack emphasized.

With increased growth of Easter Seal Society, more and more people will be helped, he added.

The Society conducts a continuing program to seek out the disabled who are going without services, to see that they receive the help they need. As Easter Seal Representative, Womack is the person to contact for services from the Easter Seal Society.

Twenty-one treatment centers in Texas are supported with help from the Texas Easter Seal Society. At each center crippled children and adults are treated, regardless of their ability to pay. Physical, occupational and speech therapy are offered to help the handicapped overcome their disabilities. A complete referral program to ensure equal rehabilitation services to every person in Texas is provided in the Easter Seal Society's services," he added.

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Self Culture Club Studies Club Laws, Teenage Ethics

A study of parliamentary usage and teenage code of ethics was featured during a March 20 meeting of Self Culture in the home of Mrs. A. A. Herrington.

Mrs. Earl Brown and Mrs. Lester Watson presented the program.

Mrs. Brown, reading a report prepared by Mrs. L. B. Elliott, conducted a quiz about parliamentary procedure including questions about the power of club president, amended motions, ballot votes, revision of by-laws and correction of club minutes.

"Teenage Code of Ethics" was topic for Mrs. Watson's talk to club members.

She quoted Socrates as saying, "Our youth now love luxury. They have bad manners, contempt for authority, disrespect for older people, children nowadays are tyrants. They no longer rise when their elders enter the room. They contradict their parents, chatter before company, gobble their food and tyrannize their teachers."

Mrs. Watson advised that Socrates spoke the words in 400 B. C.

Hope of our future lies in our boys and girls, the speaker related. Young people need the proper guidance to develop into useful, effective citizens.

Mrs. Watson expressed opin-

ions on needs of teenagers and young adults.

"Many parents approach the question of children and money in the same spirit," club members heard. "They give their boys and girls a sum of money and expect them to learn through spending."

"They worry endlessly about precisely how much to give and the method by which to give it," she continued, "when the important thing is to show them and teach them how to handle it."

She warned that drunkenness is an immediate threat to young people's happiness, future prospects and even life. Then she explained that adolescents must be taught the consequence of diminished judgment and awareness of the irresponsible behavior which it can bring about.

"The protest that we as adults should be most deeply alarmed about is the one of escape."

Mrs. Watson described the lack of trouble among Chinese-American juveniles in China Town. Social scientists' study discovered a high degree of respect, harmony and integration between youth and family. Discord between parents is unusual; children are never left alone, training in orderliness and respect for property begins early.

"A free people in a very real sense are a disciplined people."

"They have a strong sense of values and the ability to formulate and pass judgement on worthwhile goals. They have the strength to stand alone because they have confidence in their own resources."

"The free man is a disciplined man no less in life than in sport or study," Mrs. Watson remarked in concluding thoughts. "Far from being a burden or a cause of unhappiness, discipline is actually the

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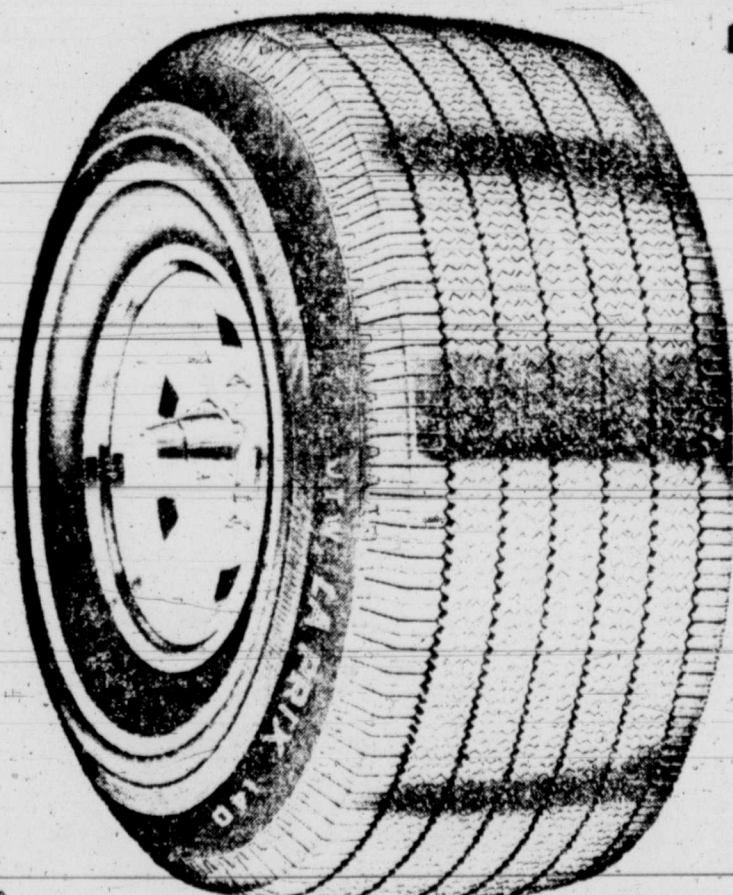

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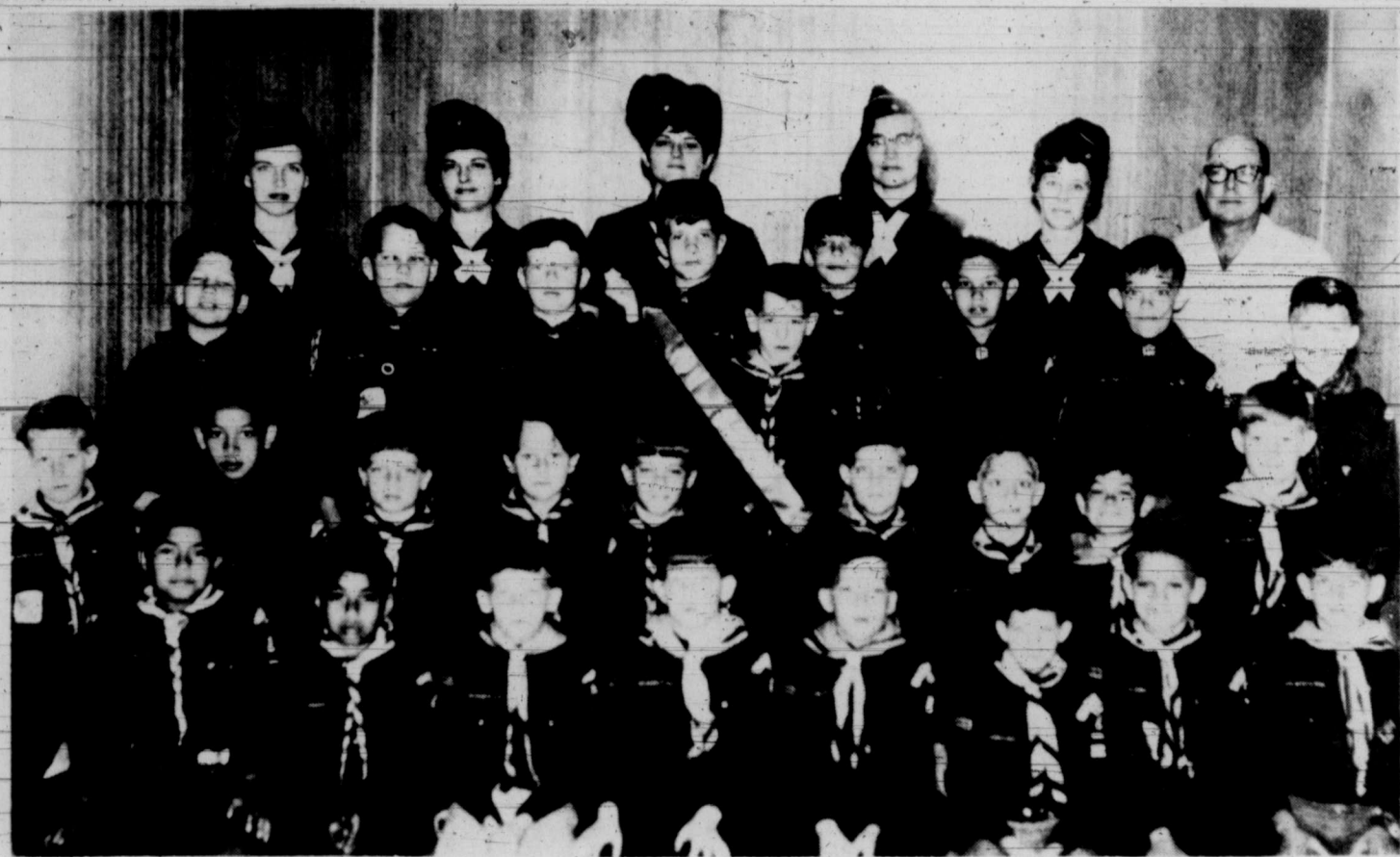

Burleson Points To Record For Election

Congressman Omar Burleson has formally announced his candidacy for re-election to Congress, subject to the Democratic Primary May 2 and the General Election in November.

The 17th Congressional District, which he represents, is composed of 31 counties, including Mitchell and covering approximately 30,000 square miles. Within this area live about 440,000 people.

"During my tenure of office I have followed two guiding principles," Burleson said.

"First, to know the views of my constituents and reflect their sentiments to the greatest degree possible in my actions in the Halls of Congress.

"Second, to inform and advise as closely as I can on those issues which affect our District, our State and our Nation."

Burleson termed his approach to government as one of "common sense," gained through the years of public service. "I have tried to see that the people's tax money is spent as wisely and as judiciously as you would have spent it had you been in my place," he said.

"The record will show that a greater part of the time I have found myself in the minority in opposing the vast spending programs of doubtful value which have been put into effect in recent years. In every Session of the Congress the record will show my votes for expenditures below that recommended by the Executive Department and far less than actually appropriated by the Congress, except in the field of National Defense," Burleson said. He continued, "Without meaning to appear boastful, if the Congress had followed those of us who have voted consistently over the years for fiscal responsibility, our financial affairs would not be in the shape they are today."

"In areas providing for the defense of our Country, I have always supported those things to make and keep our Nation stronger than any other in the world," he said.

"I have been discerning in separating those activities which the Federal Government was not designed to do, from those which are truly its responsibility," he said.

Burleson stated that activities of State and local governments, in accordance with the Constitution, should not be infringed and encroached upon by the Federal Government.

"The Federal Government does have specific missions," he said. "He gave as examples the conservation of our natural resources, the defense of the Country and its general welfare."

"At the same time," he said, "the Federal Government can not and should not try to take care of everything from Washington, either foreign or domestic. The Federal Government has grown to colossal proportions and centralized power in Washington has increased," Burleson pointed out. "To this, I am opposed and my record is clear in this respect."

Burleson is among the senior

members of the U. S. House of Representatives in point of service. He was elected to the 80th Congress from the 17th District and has been re-elected to each succeeding Congress. He is a member of the Ways and Means Committee, considered to be the most powerful and prestigious in the House.

Burleson is a former County Attorney and County Judge of Jones County. He was appointed an FBI Agent, and served in a number of assignments over the U. S. He resigned from the FBI to join the Navy in World War II, and saw duty in both the Atlantic and the Pacific.

Burleson ended his formal announcement by saying, "Although not having opposition in this year's election, it is my hope to visit my constituency as opportunity affords. The Congress being in session at this time and expected to be long after the Primary Election, there will be little time to leave duties in Washington. I expect, however, to get back home at short intervals to do the best I can in seeing my friends and to make new ones. I believe it is incumbent upon a Congressman to know people and that they know him, to have the best representation. This is fundamental to our system."
