U. S. Army And Refugee Work

WASHINGTON, May 16.—The old army game of peacetime preparedness is saving innumerable refugees from death by drowning or exposure in the great Mississippi flood area.

The army has thrown in everything from steamboats and generals to tent pegs and mess cooks. Its donations of supplies run into the millions. Its officers in flood sections have constantly been reporting conditions and need for supplies to their commanding generals at the War Department.

Army engineers were the first into action as the water rose to menacing proportions. All along the Mississippi the War Department has district engineers with tug, steamers, barges and dredges. These craft were the first called upon for river transportation and for the vital work of rescuing refugees from levees and other points of danger. Army engineers are charged with supervision of levees and they know their stuff.

Barge Line Also Helps The Inland Waterways Corporation is also on the job. It is directly under the War Department and General T. O. Ashburn, operating 137 boats on the lower Mississippi.

The fourth and seventh corps areas have been denied of tents, for which the Red Cross relied entirely on the army. Some 25,000 tents have been sent to refugee camps—enough to accommodate something like 200,000 persons.

For the first time since the war, tent factories are resuming production at the Philadelphia quarter-master's depot so that the army's own men and the summer training camp students may have shelter. The army has given its equipment steadily and never expects to see it again.

Along with the tents went proportionate supplies of plates, cups, stoves, blankets, raincoats, sandbags, vaccine and rolling stretchers. The Philadelphia depot staff has been working night and day. The reserve and supply depots at Chicago, St. Louis, New Orleans, San Antonio, and other points are also busy.

It has been found that the health and physical vitality of the mother previous to the birth of the child is one of the most important factors in determining how long the infant lives after birth. Indeed, if the mother dies during the birth of the child or shortly after, that child is under a considerable handicap.

Six in every ten babies whose mothers died within one month after the birth of the child also died before the end of the first year. Infants whose mothers were known to have tuberculosis had a mortality of two and one-half times that among other infants, and over one-third of the babies born to mothers who were reported to have had convulsions as a complication of pregnancy died during the first year of life.

The interval since a preceding birth is an important factor in infant mortality, since it has been found that the mortality is much higher when the space between the birth of infants is less than two years. A lack of proper spacing of births appears to affect unquestionably the infant mortality rate.

Babies who were born prematurely were found to have a mortality six times as high as that of babies born when due. Almost half of these babies died during the first month. The death rate for twins and triplets is nearly three and one-half times that of children born singly.

## YANKS POUND 6-1 WIN OVER THE TIGERS

(By Associated Press) DETROIT, May 16.—After rain had caused a postponement of the first two games of the series, the Yankees pounded three Detroit pitchers for a six to one victory today. DAILY MARKETS

COTTON CLOSES STEADY: NEW YORK, May 16 (AP)—After selling off to 15.43 early today, contracts for July deliveries rallied to 15.62 in the cotton market and closed at 15.57, compared with 15.53 at the close Saturday. The general market closed steady at advances of 4 to 9 points.

The market opened barely steady at a decline of 7 to 9 points under liquidation, southern and local selling apparently inspired by reports of favorable weather in the south over Sunday. The trade evidently found no fresh bullish factor in the flood news and the decline soon extended to 15.25 for May and 15.75 for October, or about 19 to 22 points below Saturday's close. Buying was attributed to both domestic and foreign trade account on the setback, however, while offerings tapered off after early selling orders had been absorbed, and the mid-day market found up.

May advanced to 15.43, and October to 15.97, net advances of about 7 to 10 points on the more active positions. This bulge evidently attracted a renewal of realising or short selling, but last prices were only slightly off from the best.

Private cables from Liverpool in Liverpool had been absorbed by trade cabling with London and continental buying, and also reported a fair business in cotton cloths was pending for India.

Exports today 25,253 bales, making 16,075,758 bales so far this season. Post receipts 11,748 U. S. Post stocks 1,251,447.

COTTON REACTIONARY: NEW ORLEANS, May 16 (AP)—Cotton was only moderately active today and although the price trend was reactionary in the early trading, the market rallied moderately later. The weather appeared to be the dominating influence and at the start the market was said to expect policy news from the Interior pool cables. This decline was attributed to the fact that the weather had been favorable over the past week-end. Near mid session the market rallied 18 to 19 points above the lows on the forecast for showers in the western belt where it is believed moisture would be harmful and the unfavorable cold weather over the eastern belt. During the afternoon the market was quiet and prices eased off a few points from the lows. The close was steady at a net advance of 5 to 7 points.

The opening losses were increased during the first hour, July trading down to 18.41, October to 15.71 and December 15.57. Near mid session covering due to the rainy forecast carried all months to the high points of the day, with July at 15.80, October 15.99, or 9 points above the previous close.

In the late trading the market developed little change and prices eased off a point or two from the top, closing near the day's high points. Exports for the day totalled 25,192 bales.

COTTON GOODS BETTER: NEW YORK, May 16 (AP)—Business in finished cotton goods showed improvement at the opening of the week, chiefly in increased orders by mail. Yarns were firmer but owing to the volume of tinged yarns offered, prices showed much irregularity. Raw silk was firm and quite active at Yokohama. Silk goods were in moderate demand, Durings were unchanged.

COTTON OIL FIRM: NEW YORK, May 16 (AP)—Cottonseed oil was firm today, due to light offerings and moderate covering and commission house buying in response to the steadiness of lint and cotton. Final prices were 8 to 18 points net above an active session. Sales 4,500 barrels, prime grade 7.25; prime sunned 7.00; spot 2.00. May closed 5.00; July 5.16; September 5.53; October 5.65; December 5.85.

WOOL HOLDINGS LOWER: BOSTON, May 16 (AP)—According to official quarterly wool stocks report, holdings of wool by Boston dealers on March 31 were smaller than a year ago. The total stock reported as of March 31 was 42,800,000 pounds, compared with 47,000,000 pounds on March 31 last year. The total stock reported on December 31, 1925, amounted to 51,000,000 pounds, as compared with 51,000,000 on December 31, 1925.
