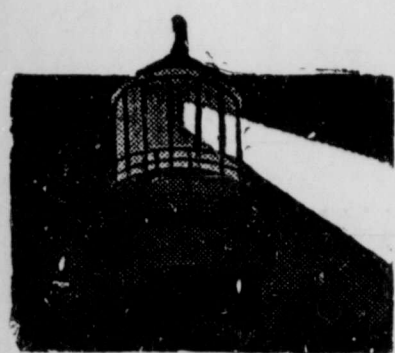

Residents of Precinct 4, Loraine, Mitchell County may expect before very long that the hospital district in the other three precincts of the county will present to the voters of this precinct a plan for the precinct to join the Hospital District.

Since the closing of Johnson Hospital here by Medicare the subject has already been broached and we may expect that a campaign will be waged for this precinct to come into the Hospital District.

There are many arguments why, in the opinion of this columnist, the Loraine precinct should remain out of the Hospital District at this time for some time to come. The first reason is that the Johnson Hospital may be able to open again and offer its services to the people of this area. The second reason is that the hospital now serving the Hospital District is old, some of it even older than the Johnson Hospital, and does not come up to the specifications as laid down by Medicare. In the opinion of this columnist if the Hospital District continues to operate a hospital (taking into consideration the problem of registered nurses) it will be necessary to build a new building at a whopping big cost of course.

My advice to Loraine residents is to stay out of the Hospital District until time that the hospital district can prove that it is able to continue medical services to medicare patients. I think it would be wise on the part of Loraine residents to leave the hospital district as it is until the hospital district can prove it will be able to maintain service to medicare patients for a long period of time and there is no longer any hope whatsoever that Congress will pass some amendments that will permit Johnson Hospital and hundreds of others to reopen and again offer medical assistance to all patients, young and old.

There is no reason to give up. Lets keep fighting to make Congress see that the closing of hospitals is not the answer to the problem of better medical service.

CATFISH FARMING GAINING INTEREST IN MITCHELL CO.

"Catfish farming is gaining interest in the Mitchell County Area," according to John L. Kazda Soil Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service in Colorado City. Several landowners have requested information from the SCS.

The SCS has bulletins on Catfish farming along with the services of SCS Biologist James Henson of San Angelo.

According to Henson the first essential in the establishment of a fish farming operation is a ready supply of good quality water. It takes at least 25 gallons per minute of water to maintain a surface acre of water. Well water is an excellent source of water due to its purity and being free from undesirable fish or fish eggs.

"Additional attention must be given to the pH, total hardness and oxygen content of the water," Henson said. The desirable pH range is between 6.5 and 8.5. The minimum oxygen level for catfish ponds is 3 parts per million. A lower level may kill the fish.

A second essential is proper pond construction. In this area deep water is not necessary for catfish farming. Ponds should

be constructed to be about 3 feet deep on the shallow end to about 7 feet deep at the deep end. A drain must be provided that will drain the pond in a few hours. The berms of the earthen dam should be wide enough to facilitate the operation of necessary equipment and the side slopes should be 3 to 1.

The stocking rates used in a catfish farming operation depend on the size of fish desired at the end of the growing season. Fingerlings stocked at 1500 per surface acre of water will average slightly over one pound and at 2000 per acre, slightly under one pound in a 210 day growing season. The growing season is regulated by water temperature. When water temperature remains below 60.0 F. catfish feed sparingly.

Pond management during the year includes maintaining the water quality, controlling predacious insects, weeds, diseases and parasites.

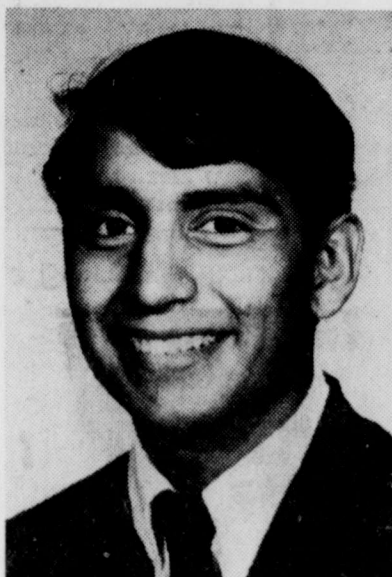

TAX MAN SAM SEZ:

The 1969 Tax Reform Act contained a change that can be important to many taxpayers. Under the old law you could decrease your withholding tax for the following year if your itemized deductions for the past year ran high enough to create a very large refund. However, under the new law you can now decrease your withholding during the year before you pay a lot of withholding tax that you don't owe. A good example of what can happen was brought out by the tornado and storm victims in West Texas. Many of these taxpayers are eligible to immediately reduce the amount of tax withheld from pay, since their itemized deductions for the 1970 tax year will include a casualty loss amounting to several thousand dollars. Of course the itemized deduction provision of the law is not limited to casualty losses, but also applies to all types of itemized deductions. If your itemized deductions have increased by a very large amount you can obtain a new Form W-4 and a Form W-4 Schedule A from your payroll office to get an immediate increase in pay instead of a refund check next April.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR32)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

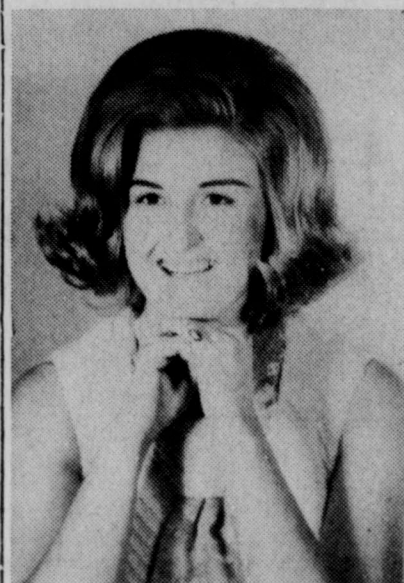
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 51. The homestead, not in a town or city, shall consist of not more than two hundred acres of land, which may be in one or more parcels, with the improvements thereon; the homestead in a city, town or village, shall consist of lot, or lots, not to exceed in value Ten Thousand Dollars, at the time of their designation as the homestead, without reference to the value of any improvements thereon; provided, that the same shall be used for the purposes of a home, or as a place to exercise the calling or business of the head of a family; provided also, that any temporary renting of the homestead shall not change the character of the same, when no other homestead has been acquired." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment increasing the value of the homestead which is exempt from forced sale."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR15)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 1-d, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 1-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops rather than upon the value of such lands and the crop growing thereon." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
General Election Nov. 3, 1970
NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR15)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-b, Subsection (a), Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "(a) The State Building Commission is created and succeeds to the powers and duties heretofore vested in the agency of the same name by this Constitution and to the powers and duties the Legislature has vested or may vest in the Commission. Its membership shall consist of three Texas citizens appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The term of each member shall be six years except in the first appointments to the Commission the Governor shall appoint one member for two years, one for four years, one for six years, and thereafter one member biennially. The Governor shall biennially designate one member as Chairman. Vacancies in the Commission shall be filled by appointment by the Governor for the unexpired term. The provisions of this paragraph shall be self-enacting." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment reconstituting the State Building Commission as a three-member appointive commission."

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TEXAS BLOODBATH PREDICTED BY TSA

AUSTIN—July 22:—“Texas is headed for a bloodbath of unbelievable proportions on her streets and highways in the year 1980,” Lloyd F. Palmer, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association, said today.

Palmer, releasing a projection of current traffic crash trends into the next decade, said, “In the year 1980, more than 5,300 Texans will lose their lives and 330,000 others will be wounded in traffic crashes. The economic loss from these needless accidents will probably top \$2.3 billion.”

“These predictions need not come true if the right action is taken during the next 12 months. Any delay beyond that time can make these forecasts horrible realities. It took Texas 30 years to get into the shape she is in today, and instant improvement is impossible. We must start corrective action today if the 1980 bloodbath is to be avoided,” warned Palmer.

“At present there are 7 million vehicles licensed in Texas. Texas Highway Department projections show that by 1980, there will be 11.9 million vehicles on the roads of our state,” said Palmer.

“With that many vehicles on the roads,” Palmer emphasized, “it is easy to comprehend the potential reality of the Association's projections.”

The president of the statewide safety organization, George Perry, a Dallas attorney, called on every Texan to take a good look at the predictions.

“TSA is not ‘Crying Wolf’; the predictions are on the conservative side,” said Perry. He outlined a list of positive actions which can turn the tide from death to life.

Among the priority issues Perry emphasized was the removal of the problem drinker from the state's highways as recently stressed by Governor Smith at a meeting of his traffic safety committee of which Perry is a member.

The state safety leader pointed to a Texas study which showed more than 50 per cent of the fatal crashes studied involved intoxicated drivers.

“The Breath Test law passed by the last session of the legislature,” said Perry, “was a beginning in the right direction, but more must now be done. As recommended by medical and safety experts, Texas needs a law stating that a person with .10 per cent alcohol in his blood is intoxicated.”

“To really know the extent of the alcohol problem, tests for alcohol concentration should be made on the bodies of all drivers and adult pedestrians who

die within four hours of a traffic crash,” Perry also said such tests should be given to surviving drivers in accidents fatal to others. “Then we would have scientific foundations for our crash prevention programs.”

“The Texas Safety Association is also increasingly concerned about those persons who use drugs that impair reactions and drive,” he said.

Perry said that these persons must be identified and be kept off the highways because of the dangers they present themselves and to others.

The TSA president also said that education was important to cutting the bloodbath predictions. He said more moves must be made to issue that every driver in Texas is properly trained.

“High School Driver Education now reaches about 68 per cent of the eligible students in Texas,” said Perry.

“It should be made available to every student. And education should not stop in high school. Adult driver re-education programs should also be instituted,” according to the safety leader.

“Enforcement is another of the keys to solving our traffic tragedy,” Perry stated. He said that consideration should be given to the establishment of a system of traffic courts under a state court administrator. He also called on all courts hearing traffic cases to voluntarily adopt the “Model Rules Governing Procedure in Traffic Cases.” Perry also said that municipal courts and justice of the peace courts should become courts of record when hearing traffic cases.

“The Texas Highway Patrol,” said Perry, “is 1,308 men beneath the strength needed to provide effective enforcement right now. This means that each man has to patrol an average of 120 miles. This is too much, but when 1980 comes around it will be impossible; for there will be an average of 9,900 vehicles on each

120 miles of highway.

Perry said that the Department of Public Safety needs to be supported in its efforts to add at least 200 men per year until proper strength is achieved.

“The Courts and the people of this state must be willing to say to any person who habitually violates traffic laws, ‘unless drive at all,’ said Perry.

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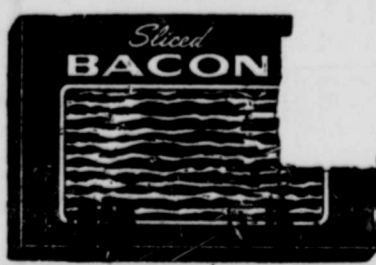
