Floyd Officials Take Office Here

Office Personnel Unchanged
For Coming Year As
Oaths Are Made

Floyd county commissioners court met into session New Years Day with its principal task the swearing in of county officials and the approval of those officials bonds.

County Clerk A. B. Clark took the job of "swearing in" and County Judge G. C. Tubbs was his first victim. Judge Tubbs then returned the compliment by swearing in County Clerk Clark.

Two new commissioners took the oath of office. They were Henry Roberson of Lockney, Precinct 2, and B. E. Cypert, Precinct 3. The remaining commissioners who took the oath are A. S. Cummings, Precinct 1, and H. J. Nelson, Precinct 4.

Geo. B. Marshall was sworn in as county assessor and collector of taxes. He had formerly been district clerk, holding that office three years. Milton Sims, a newcomer to the county's official family, is now in the office of district clerk.

Returning officials who took the oath of office were Alton B. Chapman, district judge; John A. Hamilton, district attorney; Mrs. O. M. Conway, county treasurer; Fred N. Clark, sheriff; John Stapleton, county attorney.

W. D. Newell, county surveyor; Clarence Guffee, county superintendent of schools; W. L. Finley, publisher, Precincts 1 and 4; B. P. Woody, justice of the peace, Precincts 1 and 4; Frank Perkins, justice of the peace, Precincts 2 and 3.

Mrs. Ethel Graham was sworn in as deputy assessor and collector of taxes and H. B. Alexander, Lockney, Walter Hollums, and Miss Ann Sims were sworn in as deputies to Fred Clark, sheriff. Miss Emma Louise Smith will be deputy clerk.

Tom W. Deen, representative-elect, will take his oath of office in Austin when the legislature meets January 14.

\$29,440 in Building Permits Issued in City For 1940

Building permits for Floydada reached the \$29,440 mark in 1940, according to records kept in the City Hall.

R. L. Glenn had the honor of receiving the first permit, which allowed him to add a private office in a local business house. W. R. Sims received the first permit to construct a new building. The permit was for a \$3,600 structure. The Floydada county ACA office building was issued the largest permit. It totaled \$9,845 and is considered one of the most modern buildings on the plains.

A total of 10 permits were issued for new buildings, and two permits were issued for building repairs and alterations. A number of new homes have been constructed, and according to the permits, all were over \$3,000 structures.

Floydada Has 165 Fireless Days To Set New Record

New Fire Truck Unused
Although Three
Months Old

Floydada has enjoyed 165 fireless days, according to Verne Elliott, chief of the Floydada Fire department, up to Monday of this week. Monday afternoon the department answered an alarm from the Farmers Co-op company in north Floydada but when the truck arrived the flames had been extinguished.

Chief Elliott said that the alarm "wouldn't count" against the record because the department was not required to use chemicals or hose to bring the flames under control. Actually the "fire" developed in a gin stand and the alarm was turned in as a precaution.

This record may be considered remarkable in that it was set at the most unfavorable time of the year. Ordinarily the late spring, fall and early winter is the "fire season" in most localities. It is this season that defective chimneys, stoves, and wiring contribute their bit to fire toll, especially do gins and cotton yards contribute their part, in spite of elaborate precautions, to the fire department's job.

The new fire truck bought by the city last October has yet to get its baptism of fire. The only water pumped has been in practice.

Politics, Rains, Storms Agriculture Hold On To Spotlight

A review of the year 1940 discloses that it has contributed many pages to the history of Floyd county.

It will be remembered by the pioneer as the fiftieth anniversary of the county; by farm women as the year their everyday tasks were made lighter through the aid of rural electricity; the farmer with the enlargement of the farm programs, the new agricultural building and the irrigation schools.

Politically, the year has been of intense interest. The national question, "Would our President run for the third term?" his nomination and later victory over his opponent. Loyal local aspirants to office were headline news in the spring and summer. Some were elected and others were second best in the race.

Early in the year the new Soil Conservation office was established in Floydada bringing to the farm folk visions of happy homes and at the same time establishing prestige in the life of the ordinary farmer.

January 13 the Lockney cagers were victorious in a basketball game played with the Floydada team with a score of 48 to 24.

Floydada's new city light and power plant and their formal opening and service to local patrons was celebrated January 18. The date also marks the West Texas Gas company's lowered rates.

Lanell Shirley will be remembered as the "Smile Girl" of the year. Governor W. Lee O'Daniel and Mrs. O'Daniel and their son Pat made a personal visit to Floydada, guests of Floydada's prominent citizen and representative-elect Tom W. Deen and Mrs. Deen.

Defense Set-Up Started
The National Conservation machinery was set in motion in September. Then followed the draft registration in which 1350 young men of the county registered for service subject to call. Many of the youths are now in training in various camps over the nation.

County Gets Good Rains
In the early part of November the rains came. Rather belated, the reports say, however a slow steady drizzle of rain that lasted until the entire county was soaked. A general rain that showed on the rain gauge at two inches. Many other showers followed that brought new crops.

Floydada Has Basketball League

Odell Winter Will Be
League Commissioner
And Referee

Floydada Basketball league will play Monday night at Andrews Ward school, it was announced at a meeting Wednesday night at which managers were present. Curley Wilkinson will manage the Piggy-Wiggly quintet, Carthel the Phillips 66 five, Coach W. V. Hale the Floydada High school teams, and Dr. D. H. Pitts represented the Home Defense units outfit.

Coach Odell Winter will act as general peace maker, referee, and any other duties that are required will fall to his lot. An official score keeper will be named, and the championship will be determined on a double round robin playoff. Individual awards of 10 gold basketballs will be given the league winners.

It is also planned that an "all star" team will be formed from the outstanding players to meet outside competition from Lubbock or nearby towns.

A large number of former hoop artists call Floydada and the nearby territory home and managers of the teams are anxious to contact former players and get their playing rosters completed. Some of the sponsors have had teams working out for the past several days in anticipation of forming a league.

Managers agreed to play double headers twice weekly, Monday and Thursday nights, in a triple round robin. Games are due to begin at 7:30 o'clock.

Admission has been set at 5 and 10 cents, or a "family" price of 25 cents where there are three or more members in a family. The money raised will go toward buying the gold basketball and meeting other expenses of the league. The school has agreed to furnish the gym.

Each team is limited to ten players, but a manager is allowed to add three men as the season progresses. A player may not change teams after the season begins and remain eligible to play, unless his manager gives him a full "release" and communicates with Coach Winter and the official statistician.

League play will begin Monday night with Piggy-Wiggly meeting Phillips 66, and Home Guard meeting the high school Phillips 66 defeated the high schoolers Tuesday night in a "non-league" affair by a decisive margin.

"Curley" Wilkinson has already indicated that his boys figure they have the championship sewed up, especially with "Wimpy" Thomas looping them in. "Wimpy" relates the time he "used to play for T. C. U." and if he plays as good a game as he "talks", he is another Hank Luisetti.

Flu Epidemic Hits Southwest; Floyd County Suffers

Floyd county as well as most of the state has come under the dark shadow of an influenza epidemic that is taking a toll in wasted time and ailing bodies as person after person is sent to bed from a day to a week to recuperate.

Business houses in Floydada have had employees missing as they were confined to their homes with the disease. In some cases the attacks amounted to little more than a cold accompanied by an "achy feeling" while in many others the cases verged upon pneumonia.

Doctors say that although the epidemic seems general the cases on the average are mild and outside of inconvenience, lost time, and a few days in bed none of them have proven serious.

According to the daily press reports, the epidemic seems to be general over the entire Southwest.

Volunteers to Fill January Draft Quota

Five Lockney, Five
Floydada Boys In
Leave Jan. 21

Floyd county's draft quota will again be filled by volunteers. It was announced here today by O. P. Rutledge, secretary of the Floyd county draft board.

Three second call is for 11 men from Floyd, and they are to report for induction on January 21. Three of the boys are "non-registrants". That is they are under 21 years of age and were not required to register last October.

The eleven men are Paul Teuton, Lockney; Fred Warren, Floydada; Herman Gilliland, South Plains; Thomas Fawver, Floydada; William Dowdy, Floydada; Eldon Burgett, Floydada; Hal Thomas, Lockney; Thomas Clark, Lockney; Frank Terry, Lockney, and Gavin Marr, Lockney.

Rutledge said the board mailed out questionnaires down through order number 400 and have classified approximately 350 men, among whom 40 were classed as 1-A.

A date for the third call has not been set but it is expected to fall sometime in early February. The local board must send two placements at that time to fill the quota for two replacements which were turned down in the first call.

A number of registrants are interested in volunteering, the secretary said, and getting their year of service started early in the year so that they might come out early in 1942 and thus not waste two years.

Three calls are expected in February but official announcement has been made to date on dates or the number of men from this board that will be called in each.

Soil Conservation Advisory Member To Be Named Tuesday Night

A member for Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Floyd county of the advisory committee of the Floyd County Soil Conservation district will be chosen on Tuesday night of next week, January 7, it was announced this week by Commissioner H. J. Nelson.

The meeting will be held at Baker school house, Mr. Nelson said, and will open at 7:30 o'clock.

This member of the advisory committee will serve for a period of two years.

DR. HOUGHTON ORDERED TO BED FOR 2 WEEKS REST

Dr. W. M. Houghton, long active in medical practice here is taking doctor's orders this week. He is at home for a rest of an indefinite period following a check-up on his physical condition just before the holidays began.

He will complete a two weeks rest period when another check-up will be made before he resumes active practice, it was said.

Briscoe County Passes \$160,000 Issue For Two Highway Jobs

Road bonds carried and lost in various counties over the state, according to reports here this week. Floyd county recently turned thumbs down on a \$300,000 issue.

Returns Monday indicated that Floyd's neighbor county, Hale, had also turned against a bond issue of \$400,000 by a vote of 728 against, and 369 for, with 14 of 19 precincts reported. Fifty miles of lateral roads were to be constructed.

However Briscoe county ignored the opinions voiced by counties to the west and south and voted strongly in favor of a \$160,000 bond issue for the completion of Highway 87 to the Swisher county line and 207 to the Floyd county line. Voting was held last Saturday.

Floyd county rejected a proposed bond issue of \$365,000 by a vote of 169 for and 172 against. Baylor county recently voted heavily in favor of a \$425,000 road bond issue.

Donley county rejected a \$565,000 road bond issue on Saturday. The vote was 523 against and 46 for, with three small boxes unreported.

Uvalde county citizens voted 10 to 1 for a \$160,000 road bond issue.

Collingsworth county taxpayers approved a \$500,000 road bond issue Monday by a vote of 586 for, and 120 against. One voting box is unreported. Collingsworth has for a number of years been one of the most progressive counties in the state.

Eldorado reports that a \$350,000 road bond issue carried there with a vote of 287 for, and 7 against.

EDITORIALS

WHAT HAS 1941 FOR US?

Well, nobody knows—for, sure. Possibly war on a foreign soil for one thing. Defense with the Nazi twist. Certainly higher taxes. Single soda skeets will fill out income tax returns and prove they don't owe, if they can. So will single stenographers, clerical workers, many shop workers and others. All are going to learn that taxes is not a thing for somebody away off yonder to pay, some wealthy fellow that ought to have to pay more than he does. Then hogs, they'll see a higher price. It has been decreed. Hog men have touched the button and told the higher ups a thing or two. Weaner pigs went up a dollar a head in December. They'll go up more. And higher prices for all things mechanical. Anything of steel will get dearer. A government which is convinced that we must arm to the teeth is going to make the manufacturers quit making some of the things they now produce and put their skilled men on government contracts. Some wage earners will be making a lot more all the year. Others will find their incomes stretched further and further to get around a budget that is harder and harder to meet. Plains people will spend their income a little further ahead of getting it than they already are and some are now six months to a year ahead. All except that smart five per cent who wonder how their fool neighbors can get that way so thoughtlessly. WPA and relief clients will continue to eat better apples, oranges, et cetera than taxpayers can buy in Floydada. The legislature will have the awfullest bear fight in history of Texas legislation, the "gimmies" having the long stick. And Floyd county will have some moisture in February that will make the wheat go into the early spring looking good to better, the row crop land will work up better than in several years, while the grass man will be blessed with a better spring range than he has seen in moons.

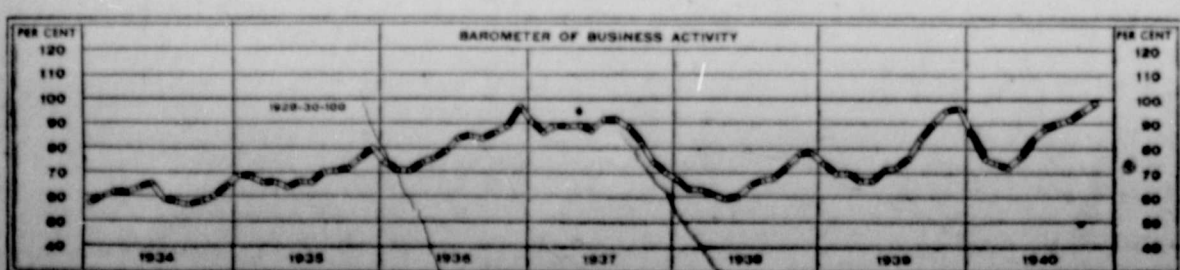
Always easy to tell somebody what they ought to do and what might happen. Farmers with a bit of time on their hands now can save their fences and get out from their homes a week earlier in February if they will destroy the Russian thistles along their fence rows the very first possible minute. We know that right now the weeds will hardly burn, but every day of delay is chance. Russian thistles which thrived the past year in many sections of the county are hardly seen in other sections. Each bush has ten or twenty thousand seed and will spread over on the neighbors like nobody's business, even if there are few high windy days and no snows to bog down the lanes with accumulated moisture, and tear down fences.

Who is making money? A few are, happily be it said. Others are not. Among there are no high windy days and no snows lishments like in Floydada—and all the Floydadas—and in recent months have been added some of the big corporations in the country. They are not telling. They are keeping a stiff upper lip. But they do not see their way out yet, smart as they are. Some have made up their minds to lose what money they have to lose during the next few years, holding their operations to the "must" program only.

The highest point in Texas is the tip of Guadalupe Peak in Culberson county. It is 8,500 feet above sea level. Highest town in Texas is Fort Davis, in Jeff Davis county, with 5,000 foot elevation.

It is one of the happy things about life that we believe in the good fortune which we may have and refuse to see the ill fortune. Everybody sympathizes with England in her fight against that model of good government and modesty, Mr. Hitler, and will believe all the news favorable to England. How would you like to know that Germany had more good first line planes over two years ago than England will have at the end of 1941 if both England and the United States are left alone to manufacture to their capacity? Why Mr. Hitler delays his blitzkrieg on England is only to be wondered at. Colonel Lindbergh, well-despised of most all Americans, has tried to tell the folks. They revile him instead of listening to his advice to get ready to do business with a Hitler-dominated Europe. Lindbergh, it must be remembered, is the son of a congressman, who as late as 1918, was voting a solitary "no." The only way that Mr. Lindbergh can be wrong is for the United States to spend more money and energy than any of us have ever before dreamed about.

Which brings us around to the fact that the money is going to be spent. Very definitely there are to be millions and billions of debts added. And Floyd county could have had a hundred or two hundred miles of highways out of the mess if the better minds had not said no. History will be repeated. In the Old South it was definitely believed that tariff for revenue only was sound—and it was. But they had tariff that made the north rich and the south poor. The objectors, when they arrived at their goal, had their traditions, their principles, and the right to gloat over how their parents had "made it through" under adversity. Pennsylvania, New York, Illinois, Ohio, and the New England states had the money, the colleges, the technical knowledge and every other kind of preferred treatment that government could confer. In Texas all the big centers will get their "military roads" just like they have been wanting. Floydada and Lockney and other Floyd county communities will have what the little boy shot at—with one exception—the bill to help pay just the same.

What will the state legislature do with the "must" problems on its calendar? We can think of a few—more than will get attention. Truck load limit change, tax laws to pay the debts created by the Social Security laws, the state's overdraft of more than 20 million, laws to protect human life and traffic on the highways, to list a few in addition to the regular budgetary and routine affairs of the commonwealth. Then there is to be a determined fight over prohibitory measures as to liquor. This fight may not come to light but it will be there definitely. As to taxes one may take it for granted the men chosen to do the paying will not take it sitting down, while on the other hand governor and all have their minds made up there must be more taxes raised. The possibility is there will be a sales tax, believe it or not.

Down at the cantonments the carpenters and other workers are drawing \$10 to \$15 a day to build houses for the army to furnish acceptable places of abode for its \$21-a-month men to learn to fight the modern way to protect the homes of its \$10 to \$15-a-day workmen.

There is always room at the top, because many of those who get there go to sleep and roll off.

My trip to see my son in Memphis Tennessee was a nice Christmas gift. Although a year loss of being together had to be crowded into the space of three days, we were pretty well satisfied. I knew we would miss the flowers and green trees but we found other flowers and green trees all along our road. The flowers of Christmas delighted our eyes.

Towns were dressed in pine boughs and wreaths of spiced cedar, colored lights burned clear and bright. Yellow blossoms of light shone from country homes, nestling amidst tall trees. Santa Claus lugged a huge pack in every town.

We missed the singing of the summer birds, but we heard the carols of Christmas, sweet and clear on the cool frosty air. Across Texas we sped to the beautiful town of Sherman, then into Oklahoma across the muddy Old Red. From timber to prairie from town to village across the Arkansas River, through pine forests covered with dense fogs to Little Rock. A look at the stately Capitol then past the mysterious cypress swamps that have a beauty all their own.

The rice plantations rolled past, we crossed the White River, that got on such a rampage last winter. We found no toll to pay on the St. Francis, or was it the White? Our hearts began to tighten, we were getting close to the Mississippi River and our son and his family.

We found them happy in their little home under the tall, tall oak trees that had seen the coming of the white man to the rich river bottoms. We walked and scuffed the leaves with pure delight. And on the Christmas dinner we had together. No turkey and dressing was ever better, no pie and plum pudding ever sweeter, for love was there.

The goodbye we must hurriedly skip for you know how that always is when loved ones part. We came back by Hot Springs, and of course we went up on the mountain. At my insistence the others went up on the elevator, some two hundred feet in the air, while Joe and I stayed on the ground. They came down with ears almost frozen, but had had a fine view of the beautiful valley and blue lakes cuddled in the green pine hills.

At Fulton, Arkansas it began to rain, a weepy, slippery rain. The country along the highway was a soft gray blur. About nine we drove up to the home of Paul's Uncle Alfred Wheeler near Paris, Texas, and we found a warm welcome from the cold north wind that was howling around the corners of the cozy farm home. Mr. Wheeler's daughter and husband Mr. and Mrs. Bill Strother and little daughter, Deloris with the pretty midnight black hair, also welcomed us and provided a good warm supper.

We were warmed by a hot fire constantly fed with good sticks of wood. Ate hot biscuits cooked in the big range oven. For sixty five years this has been a home, a place where people have liked to come. As I rubbed my hand over the smooth walnut wood of the old bureau bought some sixty five years ago. I thought of the good men and women who had lived in that house, bought the staunch furniture that would last, established integrity, hospitality, fair-dealing and peace in the neighborhood in which they lived.

The beautiful bureau with the handles of carved leaves the tall slender vase, the old cherished dishes are still loved and I am sure the men and women who look down from the glass frames are content to see the old traditions and material things still loved and cared for. Long we remember our pleasant stay there.

But the journey had to come to a stop, as all journeys do, and we are at home, but our minds are still travelling back and forth to Tennessee.

Christmas at the hospital for the Colored Children: I went with my son over to the colored children's Christmas tree. Old Santa was seated by the glowing tree. In marched the children singing, "Silent Night." My heart beat faster. What a wonderful thing for a Country and City to do! Caring for the poor and sick and remembering to give them a happy Christmas. "Holy Night."

One after another at the motion of the kind colored nurses, the bobbed black heads said something about Christmas. "All is dark, save hearts to do for the poor. See the light." The light in men's hearts to do for the poor. See the Eastern Wise Men bring gifts. Yes, men still bring gifts to the Lord, for were not many piled under the tree for the underprivileged? Still the voices sang, "With the angels let us sing," and then they sang a song praising their good doctors and kind nurses. When they reached Dr. Spikes, the tears ran from my eyes and only stopped at the pleasure shining on dusky faces as each fondled a doll, a truck or some toy. "Christ, the Savior is Born."

It took some time to see the Christmas cards that had come in my absence and in today's mail came a box fresh maple candy from Mrs. Josephine Stanton of West Chesterfield, Massachusetts. If you want to know just how good it is, I will

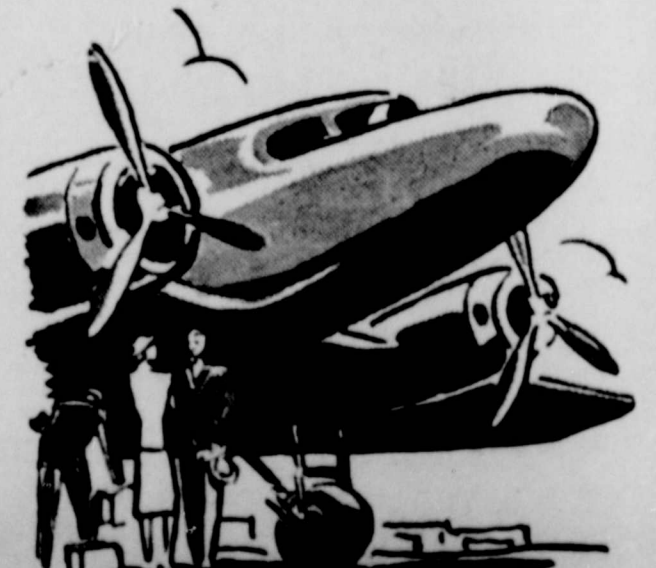

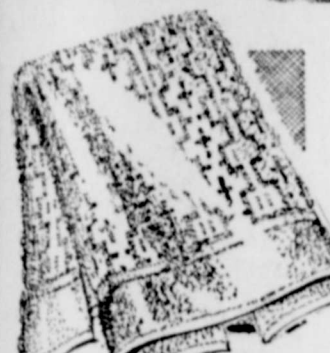

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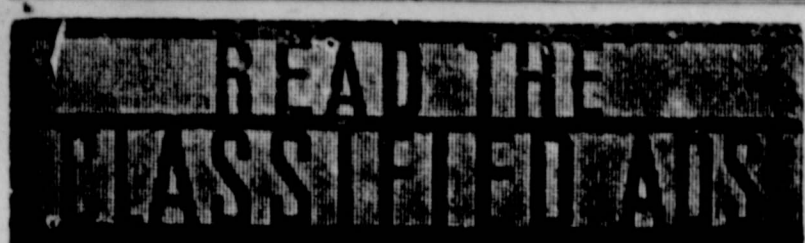

Mr. Camp gives an award to the student who acquires most points for such things as attendance, private lessons, practice hours, and being on time.

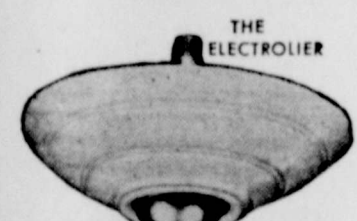

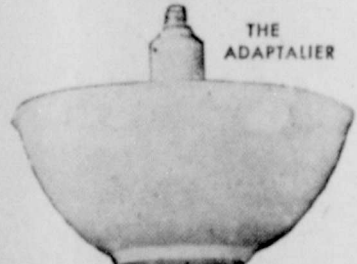

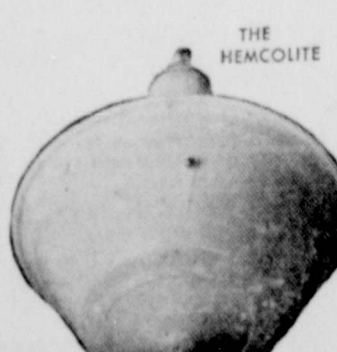

Aggies Carve On Chickens In Projects

Poultry diseases and parasites was the main topic of discussion last week in the second year Ag. classes at Floydada High School.

A post mortem examination of two birds was made. The students were looking for the diseases: roup, coccidiosis, pox, limberneck, T. B., paralysis, sore head, bronchitis, blackhead, cholera, and typhoid, and the parasites, flit ticks, lice, mites, fleas, and the different varieties of worms which are crop, eye, tape, round, screw, gizzard, gape, and cecal.

In the first hen that was examined they found: round worms, which had caused paralysis, lice and scaly leg mites. The second hen they found had a bad case of roup, lice and scaly leg mites.

Last week the students learned the proper method of making a post mortem examination and were taught the correct procedure in de-braining and sticking and picking a hen. The various parts of the anatomy of the hens were studied.

Glen A. Lindsey Highway Accident Victim Last Week

Former County Agent of
Floyd County Killed
Near Houston

Dr. Glen A. Lindsey, 38, county agriculture agent for Floyd county for two years until November 1, 1935, was fatally injured on the outskirts of Houston in a highway accident Tuesday night of last week at 7 o'clock, and the remains were sent to Fort Worth the following day, where interment was made Friday.

His car, rising over a hill near Houston, struck a truck in the same direction as his own car while he was blinded by the lights of a car passing in the opposite direction, according to the belief of officials who investigated the wreck. Lindsey died within a short time. He was within some three miles of home for which place he was enroute to spend the holidays. He was employed with the Commodity Credit corporation, Houston and had made his home there for the past two years.

He had no children, his wife, his father and several brother and sisters surviving him.

G. D. Allen, of Lockney, was in Fort Worth visiting relatives during Christmas and served as one of the pallbearers at the funeral and burial.

He had known the Lindsey family a number of years. Interment was made in Dido cemetery near Fort Worth.

A native of North Texas, Dr. Lindsey had served as county agent of Floyd county and later spent two years in soil conservation work at Channing before taking work with the Commodity Credit corporation, a federal lending agency connected with the Federal Land Bank.

life and added moisture to the New Year's wheat crop, sufficient for many weeks to come.

Thumbs Down On Road Bond
The weather, in the form of a blessing that it was to the rain brought a different aspect to the favorable outcome of the road bond election that was held in the county on November 14. Bad weather and icy roads prevented the balloting of many votes. With a possible 3000 qualified voters in the county, only 752 exercised the right with a result of 445 for and 307 against the voting of the bonds.

Wednesday, February 7, the Boy Scouts ruled the city and county for a day. An afternoon mail dispatch was offered Floydada patrons by forming a star route to Plainview that went into effect February 29.

Severe Storm Recorded
A blizzard that will be remembered, as was the storm of 1936, raged over the Plains area on February 22, the anniversary of our country George Washington. With Floyd county in full wake of the blast, highways were blocked, stranded motorists and freak accidents furnished news for days. Schoolchildren were housed in Floydada homes until roads could be opened sufficiently for the school buses to travel.

The Meadow Lake golf course was operated south of town on March 7. In August a new musical organization was born, the Floyd County Home Demonstration chorus. Twenty-eight public-spirited women comprise the chorus.

Ten Floyd county farms are being used as an experiment for the Water Facilities program in this area of the plains.

Few Marriages Reported
Public records show sixty-seven marriages in the county during 1940. The sale of 2496 cars, 338 commercial trucks, 531 farm trucks and 856 transfers on used cars were made during the closing year. A census count, begun in March, combined the county until the final count of 10,655 residents were enumerated of whom 2726 are recorded as living in Floydada.

Diversified Farm Product
During the year spud growing definitely established itself as a place in diversified farming program of the county.

The previous edition of The Floyd County Hesperian carried 120 messages from the younger generation of the county. These messages in the form of letters to Santa Claus will be read and re-read year after year as a memento of their childish faith. Today, a New Year is being recorded. The future of the county, state and nation is its secret. With eager expectation and with faith renewed, we await its development.
