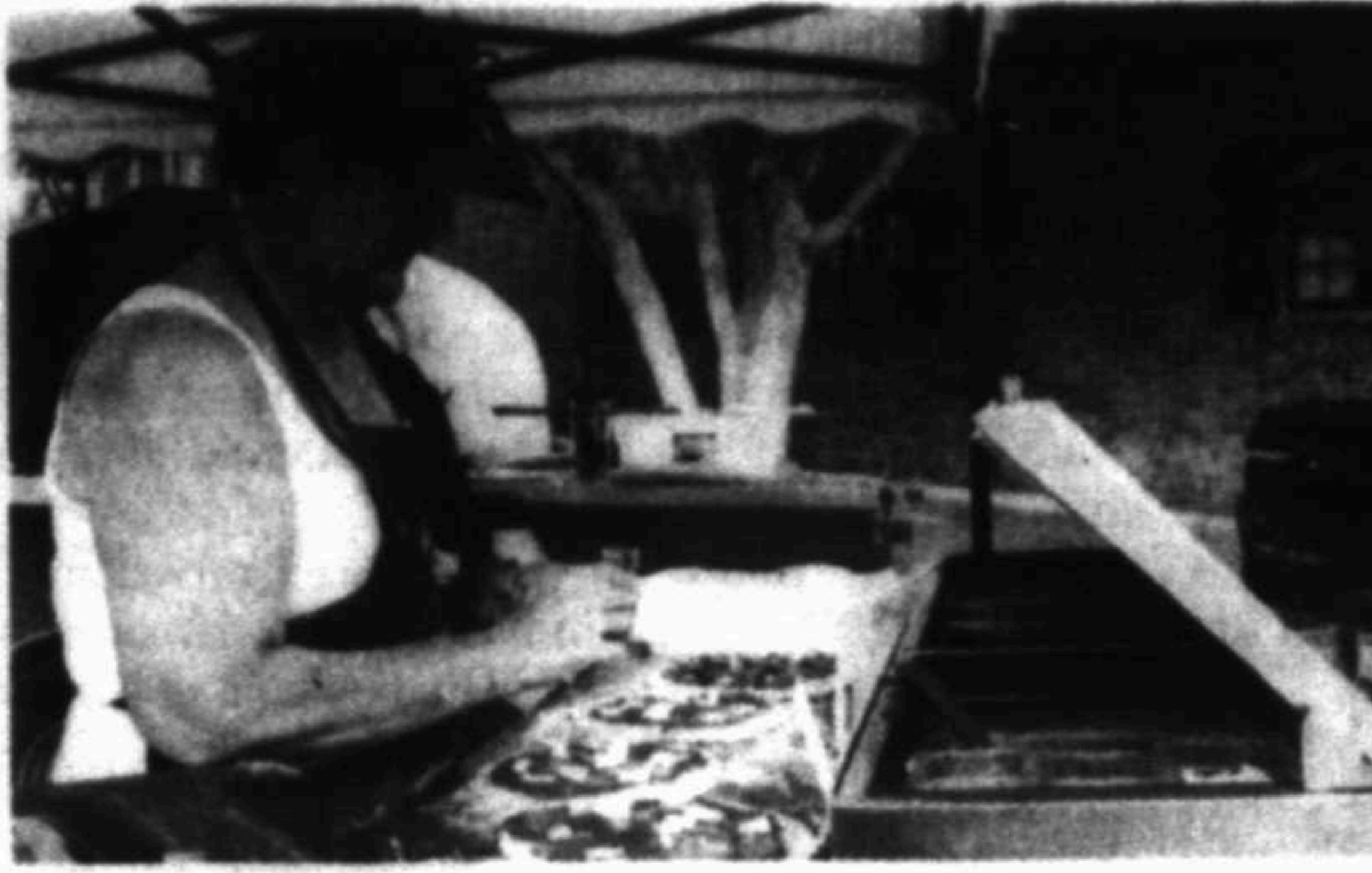

Region plans for future of freight mobility

Stakeholders discuss maintenance, capacity and funding issues for Midland-Odessa area

Local highways and railroads could befall the same fate as the housing market if changes aren't made to freight infrastructure, a top regional transportation planning official said Wednesday.

The region learned the hard way when rapid growth led to a shortage of housing, said Cameron Walker, executive director of the Midland Odessa Transportation Organization Metropolitan Planning Organization. He said the same holds true for infrastructure, specifically freight, during a Texas Department of Transportation listening session for the state's first Freight

Mobility Plan.

"Texas is a gold mine of economic activity. It's not going to be a system of fantastic roadways and rail lines that collect dust," said Walker, calling for better maintenance and increased capacity of key transportation corridors. "If you're going to roll the dice, roll them big."

TxDOT invited local stakeholders to the table Wednesday to discuss highway, rail, air, maritime, border and ports-of-entry capacity issues and opportunities.

The first comprehensive multimodal freight plan is currently on its second round of listening sessions as recommendations and a final report are drafted over the next five months.

Most participants focused on the safety of Midland-Odessa highways, asking for authorities to crack down on unlicensed or uneducated drivers and enforce weight restrictions.

Midland County Precinct 2 Commissioner Robin Donnelly voiced his concerns about tractor-trailer traffic backing up on Interstate 20, creating dangerous and sometimes deadly conditions for drivers.

"You've got a 1960s-design rural interstate, and you've got a 75 mile-per-hour (speed limit)," he said. "We're just all holding our breathe until it happens."

Donnelly also asked TxDOT — represented that day by the consulting, engi-

neering and construction firm CDM Smith — to address the safety issues of at-grade railroad crossings, such as the one at Fairgrounds at Business 20.

"That's a horrible crossing," he said. "It's a high-center problem. Heavy-loaded 80,000-pound trucks get hung up because (the road) drops off there."

Still, additional railroad capacity is needed in a region "locked in" by east-west rail corridors, said Buddy Sipes, chairman of the La Entrada al Pacifico Rural Rail Transportation District.

With trains often carrying hydraulic fracturing sand and bulk construction

Investment joins Energy Towers team

At Tuesday's special City Council meeting, real estate investors World Class Capital Group made its presence in the Midland market known by introducing its role in the development of Energy Towers at City Center.

The Austin-based firm will co-develop the \$300-plus million Energy Towers project alongside Energy Related Properties and Wexford Capital. In turn, World Class Capital will have co-ownership of Energy Towers.

ERP partner Wendell "Scooter" Brown said the ownership split of Energy Towers is private information but noted that ERP will not take the lead in the development.

World Class Capital came onboard the Energy Towers team two months ago, about the same time when ERP announced that the project has shifted from one large high-rise building to two smaller buildings. During this time-frame, project contractor Turner Construction asked World Class Capital to join the Energy Towers team, said Greg Williams, vice president of development

for World Class Capital.

Williams introduced the firm as a business that invests \$400 million into projects each year. Real estate acquisitions make up between 70 percent and 80 percent of what it does, he added.

The firm owns and operates office buildings, retail centers, apartments, dorms, hotels, marinas, self-storage centers and warehouses that total 6 million square-feet in 12 states, according to its website.

Midland woman killed in Ward County crash

A Midland woman died and two others, including a 4-month-old girl, were injured early Tuesday after a one-vehicle crash in Ward County, according to the Department of Public Safety.

Norma Alvarez, 49, was pronounced dead at about 3:46 a.m. at Medical Center Hospital after she was ejected during a rollover crash.

The vehicle's driver, a 25-year-old Midland woman, and a 4-month-old girl were transported to a Ward County Hospital for treatment.

The crash occurred while the driver was traveling eastbound on Interstate 20, about 1 mile west of Wickett. The driver said she struck a large item, possibly a rock in the road, and lost control of the vehicle. The vehicle rolled into the median, and Alvarez, who was not wearing a seat belt, was ejected, according to DPS.

The current condition of the two injured people was not provided by DPS.

Ruling could turn US into major oil exporter

NEW YORK — Companies are taking advantage of new ways to export oil from the U.S. despite government restrictions, and in the process helping the U.S. become an ever bigger exporter of petroleum on the world stage.

The Obama Administration has opened the door to more exports — without changing policy — by allowing some light oils to be defined as petroleum products like gasoline or diesel, which are not subject to export restrictions.

Although U.S. production has boomed in recent years, the nation still consumes far more crude oil than it produces and remains heavily dependent on imports. But the crude being produced by U.S. drillers in recent years includes types of oils that don't have a big market here. This has the oil industry and some politicians calling for an end to crude export

States confront worries about fracturing, quakes

AZLE — Earthquakes used to be unheard of on the vast stretches of prairie that unfold across Texas, Kansas and Oklahoma.

But in recent years, temblors have become commonplace. Oklahoma recorded nearly 150 of them between January and the start of May. Most were too weak to cause serious damage or endanger lives. Yet they've rattled nerves and raised suspicions that the shaking might be connected to the oil and gas drilling method known as

hydraulic fracturing, especially the wells in which the industry disposes of its wastewater.

Now after years of being harangued by anxious residents, governments in all three states are finally confronting the issue, reviewing scientific data, holding public discussions and considering new regulations.

The latest example comes Thursday in Edmond, Oklahoma, where hundreds of people are expected to turn out for a town hall meeting that will

in New York from natural causes.

"The best way to honor him is to put on one of his movies," he said. "Put on 'Baby Doll' or 'Magnificent Seven.' Those live forever."

Wallach and his wife, Anne Jackson, were a formidable duo

SAN ANTONIO Phil Collins to donate artifacts to Alamo

Singer Phil Collins has been cleaning his home in Switzerland, and Texas history is about to benefit.

Collins is scheduled to visit the Alamo today to announce that he is donating his collection of artifacts from the Alamo to the former mission and Texas revolutionary fort.

The 63-year-old singer-drummer wants to find places for some of his material legacy and wants to keep his Alamo collection together, said Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson.

"We're both at an age where we're starting to think, 'What do you do with your stuff?'" He just has a lot more important stuff than I do," Patterson told the San Antonio Express-News.

Some of the artifacts could be placed on display at the Alamo within a year, Patterson said.

The Texas General Land Office manages the downtown San Antonio shrine to Texas independence, and Collins is said to have the world's largest private collection of Texas Revolution artifacts, Patterson said.

The General Land Office is developing plans for an Alamo visitors' center to provide more space to exhibit artifacts about the fort and the 1836 battle that made it famous.

Collins has said he owns "hundreds" of cannonballs, documents and other artifacts from the Alamo, with his most prized item being a receipt signed by Alamo commander William Barret Travis for 32 head of cattle used to feed the Alamo defenders.

Collins' interest began when he was a 5-year-old English lad who saw actor Fess Parker portray Davy Crockett in a 1950s Disney

miniseries. Collins has said he has passed on his appreciation for Alamo lore to his five children.

Park ranger beaten after interrupting assault

A law enforcement officer will need reconstructive surgery for facial and head injuries suffered when he interrupted a sexual assault at a Houston-area park and the attacker turned on him.

Fort Bend County sheriff's officials said Wednesday that Conrad Wiltmer, a Houston park ranger, was conducting a property check when he discovered a woman being assaulted.

Authorities say the assailant, identified as 25-year-old Migueal Velasquez of Houston, was armed with a steel pipe early Monday morning when he attacked Wiltmer. Velasquez allegedly fled the park but was later found by police.

Charges against Velasquez include sexual assault and aggravated assault of a public servant. He's being held at the Fort Bend County jail on a \$750,000 bond.

'Bullet train' cleared for environmental review

Federal rail regulators have cleared the proposed Dallas-to-Houston "bullet train" project for an environmental review.

The Federal Railroad Administration published a "notice of intent" in the Federal Register on Wednesday for an environmental impact statement on the Texas Central High-Speed Rail Corridor.

The move opens a 90-day window for public

meetings and comments on what the study should include. It also means the project has cleared an initial hurdle in its journey toward construction.

Backers say construction could begin as soon as 2016 and trains could start rolling by 2021, carrying passengers between Houston and Dallas in about 90 minutes. The private Texas Central High Speed Railway has given no cost estimates on the proposed 240-mile route.

Texan allegedly played video games as son drowns

A West Texas father has been charged after his 2-year-old son drowned in an outdoor pool while the man allegedly played video games.

Jones County jail records show 20-year-old Austin Garrett of Anson was being held Wednesday on a charge of abandoning-endangering a child. Anson police on Tuesday announced the arrest of Garrett, whose bond was set at \$75,000.

Police in Anson, about 20 miles northwest of Abilene, on June 4 responded to a call about a possible drowning in an above-ground pool at a home. Emergency personnel were not able to revive Brendyn Garrett.

Police say the father purposely left the toddler outside while playing a video game with a relative.

2 killed in home robbery attempt

A suspected armed robber and a resident have died after being shot during a break-in at a San Antonio apartment.

San Antonio police say nobody has been arrested in the exchange of gunfire early Wednesday that left two men dead. At least one suspect fled.

A police statement says two men were home when several men forced their way into the apartment during a robbery.

Police say one resident was in a main room with the suspects. The other resident, who had a shotgun, was in a rear of the apartment. Police say a shootout began when the intruders confronted the armed resident.

Police did not immediately say which resident died, who killed him or further details on the fatally shot intruder.

Environmental concern raised over Texas billboards

A plan to allow billboards up to 65 feet tall along some Texas highways raised environmental concerns during a public hearing on updating sign regulations enacted in the

1980s.

The Texas Department of Transportation has proposed the change, supported by advertising companies, as part of an overhaul of billboard rules, the Austin American-Statesman reported.

The Texas Transportation Commission heard public testimony Tuesday, with written comments accepted through July 14. The panel is expected to decide by August on whether to adjust the current 42.5-foot height restriction.

"People who agree on little else are unanimous that we don't need more billboards or taller billboards," said Katherine Romans, who manages landowner outreach for the Hill Country Alliance, a group devoted to protecting natural resources.

The higher limit is necessary because the speed of travel has increased and highways have expanded, said Billy Reagan, president of Reagan Outdoor Advertising, which controls hundreds of billboards in Texas.

Former UTPB provost tapped for UT Brownsville leadership

University of Texas of the Permian Basin former Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs William R. Fannin will lead the University of Texas at Brownsville as president ad interim for the 2014-15 academic year, University of Texas System Chancellor Francisco G. Cigarroa announced Wednesday.

The move is a part of Brownwood-Pan American campus merger to form the new University of Texas Rio Grande Valley, which is set to open in August 2015.

Fannin served as UTPB provost from 1996 until last month. Daniel J. Heimmermann, provost and vice president of Academic Affairs at Mississippi University for Women, assumed the position on June 9.

Fannin's interim role will begin in August and will conclude shortly after the new UTRGV achieves accreditation from the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. At this point, Brownwood and Pan American will be abolished, according to the UT release.

Fannin and Pan American president ad interim, Havidan Rodriguez, current Pan American provost and vice president of Academic Affairs, will work closely with the UTRGV transition team to "bring the best of what exists on each campus today into the planning for UTRGV," according to the release.

Current Brownwood President Juliet Garcia and Pan American President Robert Nelson will be "fully engaged in their new roles with the UT System by this fall," according to the release.

MPD: Photographer shoots man with pistol

A Michigan man taking glamour photos at Club 25 was arrested Sunday after he put down the camera and picked up pistol, shooting a man in the hip, according to court documents.

Kimanthi L. Qualls, 39, was held on a \$100,000 bond for a second-degree felony charge of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon. He posted bond and was released Tuesday.

Midland police officers responded to a shots-fired call Sunday near Washington Park at Club 25, 210 S. Lee St.

The alleged victim told detectives at Midland Memorial Hospital that he was waiting in the southeast parking lot of Club 25 waiting for an order of food when Qualls approached a crowd nearby and told them to move "so his girl's car could leave."

Qualls, whose nickname is "Zone," had a verbal confrontation with a man and re-entered the club. He then came outside with a pistol and began to shoot into the crowd. The alleged victim said Qualls was

include the state agency that regulates oil and gas drilling and the Oklahoma Geological Survey.

States with historically few earthquakes are trying to reconcile the scientific data with the interests of their citizens and the oil and gas industry.

"This is all about managing risks," said Oklahoma Corporation Commission spokesman Matt Skinner. "It's a little more complicated than that because, of course, we're managing perceived risks. There's been no definitive answers, but we're not waiting for one. We have to go with what the data suggests."

Regulators from each state met for the first time in March in Oklahoma City to exchange information on the quakes and discuss toughening standards on the lightly regulated business of fracturing wastewater disposal.

In Texas, residents from Azle, a town northwest of Fort Worth that has endured hundreds of small quakes, went to the state Capitol earlier this year to demand action by the Railroad Commission. The commission hired the first-ever state seismologist, and lawmakers formed the House Subcommittee on Seismic Activity.

After Kansas recorded 56 earthquakes between last October and April, the governor appointed a three-member task force to address the issue.

Seismologists already know that hydraulic fracturing — which involves blasting water, sand and chemicals deep

A man was found with a gunshot wound and was transported in serious condition to Midland Memorial Hospital.

Witnesses at the scene said they saw two males get into a white Nissan Altima and flee the scene.

The driver of that vehicle contacted police June 19 and identified Mosley and Diaz, who goes by the nickname "Paydro."

Investigators learned that Diaz had fled Midland after the shooting, while Mosley was located at his job. Mosley told police he was wearing a hoodie and a mask at the time of the shooting and that Diaz wore a ski mask and gloves, according to the arrest affidavit.

Mosley said he and Diaz made a plan to rob the man who was shot, as he was a known drug dealer. When the man did not give them any money, Diaz shot him in the leg, according to the affidavit.

into underground rock formations to free oil and gas — can cause microquakes that are rarely strong enough to register on monitoring equipment.

Fracturing also generates vast amounts of wastewater. The water is discarded by pumping it into injection wells, which send the waste thousands of feet underground. No one knows for certain exactly what happens to the liquids after that. Scientists wonder whether they could trigger quakes by increasing underground pressures and lubricating faults.

Another concern is whether injection well operators could be pumping either too much water into the ground or pumping it at exceedingly high pressures.

ExxonMobil subsidiary XTO Energy has pumped an average 281,000 gallons — about 94 tanker truckloads — of wastewater into its Azle wells nearly every day for more than two years, according to data published by the Railroad Commission earlier this month.

In recent weeks, nighttime shaking in Oklahoma City has been strong enough to wake residents. The state experienced 145 quakes of 3.0 magnitude or greater between January and May 2, 2014, according to the Oklahoma Geological Survey.

That compares with an average of two such quakes from 1978 to 2008.

Oklahoma Gov. Mary Fallin approved new testing and monitoring rules for injection wells that require well operators to collect daily information on well volume and pressure, instead of monthly. The rules take effect in September, Skinner said.

If convicted, the Diaz and Mosley each face five to 99 years in prison for the robbery charges.

Midlanders to go 'on the air' during annual Field Day

Midland ham radio operators will take to the airwaves this weekend during a 24-hour emergency preparedness exercise.

Midland Amateur Radio Club members logged nearly 2,000 contacts during last year's Field Day, which starts at noon Saturday at Beal Park.

"The exercise is basically to get the radios and operate them in a remote location — like you would if you had an emergency or natural disaster where normal modes of communications for emergency response were overloaded or failed completely," said club member David Overton, call sign KF5WDJ.

Ham radio operators often serve as first-responders because they can send messages without phones or Internet connections from remote locations, according to the American Radio Relay League, which also runs a contest during the exercise.

"The fastest way to turn a crisis into a total disaster is to lose communications," said ARRL public relations manager Allen Pitts in a prepared statement. "From the tsunami in Japan to tornadoes in Missouri, ham radio provided reliable communication networks in the first critical hours of the events."

More than 700,000 people in the U.S. and 2.5 million people worldwide have ham radio licenses, according to the league. The local club — which has about 100 members — offers resources for Midlanders interested in getting involved, Overton said.

World Class Capital President and CEO Nate Paul one of its "14 to watch in 2014," for his most recent purchases in downtown Austin, including an acre of land next to the luxurious Four Seasons Hotel and 1.3 acres of land next to residential skyscraper The Austonian. The ABJ in January dubbed the two plots of land "prime development opportunities."

World Class Capital's real estate development division makes up the remaining portion of its operations. Williams said the company is very selective when choosing which projects to develop.

"We own everything that we buy," Williams said. "We have not gone into a sale mode in seven years. We are long-term investors."

Its latest selection, Energy Towers, marks World Class Capital's first venture into the Midland-Odessa market. When District 3 Councilwoman Sharla Hotchkiss asked Williams why the company wants to come to Midland, Williams said it's a good opportunity.

"We think that it's not just about oil and gas," Williams said. "We think there's some potential beyond that. We like downtowns, we like hotels, and we think it works."

Other current projects by World Class Capital include the 34-story, 850,000 square-foot KPMG Centre in Dallas, which the company acquired in March. World Class Capital plans to invest \$34 million into the skyscraper and bring in three Southern California companies that could add about 1,400 jobs to downtown Dallas, Williams said.

World Class Capital is also working on developing 120 acres in Round Rock into a \$750 million mixed-use development, Williams said. In February, the company bought the former Cypress Semiconductor campus in Round Rock with plans to transform the property into retail, housing, office and industrial space, according to the Austin American-Statesman.

Though no longer the 53-story skyscraper that would have dwarfed all other downtown Midland

materials, Sipes estimates that about 95 percent of rail freight passing through the Midland-Odessa distribution center benefits the oil and gas industry.

For the past decade, his district has advocated for a north-south rail line running from Seagraves, through Midland-Odessa to McCamey to meet a South Orient Railroad and Texas Pacifico line.

Making that connection would allow cotton, sulfur and mineral industries in West Texas to send goods to Mexico through Presidio, Sipes said.

But with rail line construction costing between \$1.5 million to \$2.7 million per mile depending on the class, he said the 120-some-mile project would carry a hefty price tag.

"We're hoping in the next biennium budget of the legislature that there's money for rail expansion — particularly in this area — which is needed so desperately," said Sipes, also

restrictions, which were adopted after the 1973 Arab oil embargo.

Economists generally agree that lifting the restrictions would benefit the U.S. economy, but the ban remains a touchy political subject because of the fear — unfounded, most analysts say — that lifting the ban on exports will raise gasoline prices for U.S. drivers or compromise U.S. energy security. Most experts believe the restrictions will not be overturned this year because of the coming midterm elections.

In the meantime, companies have searched for ways to reach overseas

buyers. Oil companies are increasingly exporting crude to Canada with special licenses from the Commerce Department. Other types of light oils known by names such as "diluent" and "condensate" are — or will soon be — finding their way overseas too.

"Add it all up and you get to 1.1 million barrels of potential exports of crude out of the U.S. without changing the law, without changing the system," said Ed Morse, head of commodities research at Citigroup.

That would make the U.S. a major oil exporter and add to its growing volume of fuel exports.

buildings, Energy Towers is still planned to be a multi-use development. Updated plans indicate the 22-story building, located to the west, would have office space, parking, retail and an underground movie theater. The 20-story building, located to the east, is slated to include hotel space, convention space, and two underground floors of parking.

Mayor Jerry Morales called for Tuesday's special meeting as a way to get the Energy Towers development team to publicly update the council on the project's progress. The project is a private-public partnership, as the council previously voted for an up-to-\$50 million incentive package, funded by a combination of three taxes generated by the development itself. The council also previously approved a \$10 million site improvement incentive deal between developers and the Midland Development Corp.

City Council was originally going to vote Tuesday on continuing or ceasing all its agreements with ERP thus far but deferred to the July 8 City Council meeting because two council members were not present.

If the council chooses to continue its ERP agreements, then both sides will proceed to work on a developer's agreement, which is the formal, final document that combines all previous agreements with possible changes into one. At that point, the city is expected to give the former Midland County Courthouse property to developers so that demolition and construction may begin.

In his speech to introduce World Class Capital, apologize to the council for a lack of updates and assure the council that development is still progressing, Williams also talked about the company's plans for downtown Midland.

"It's really important to set precedence, to say, 'This is what the future is going to be, this is what it's going to look like, and if you're going to develop in downtown Midland, you have to meet these standards,'" Williams said, adding that the standards need to be a community vision.

asking private companies to form sponsorships. After laying their issues and recommendations on the table, participants offered thoughts on how to pay for it all. But their concerns echoed those of the past: West Texas rarely gets the goods.

After committing \$500 million to big city projects, Sipes said state money rarely trickles down to rural district infrastructure projects with smaller \$10-30 million price tags.

But Donnelly said a dollar spent in West Texas goes a lot further than in bigger cities. "The way this thing's financed, we're going to the population centers and not where the economic development is," he said. "When you start looking at the money, we're a colony out here."

buyers. Oil companies are increasingly exporting crude to Canada with special licenses from the Commerce Department.

Other types of light oils known by names such as "diluent" and "condensate" are — or will soon be — finding their way overseas too.

"Add it all up and you get to 1.1 million barrels of potential exports of crude out of the U.S. without changing the law, without changing the system," said Ed Morse, head of commodities research at Citigroup.

That would make the U.S. a major oil exporter and add to its growing volume of fuel exports.

Mississippi votes its appetite in GOP Senate race

■ A tea party loss shows how far it and the country's appetite for frugal government have to go

Chris McDaniel, 41, the flawed paladin of the tea party persuasion who in Mississippi's Republican Senate primary failed to wrest the nomination from the faltering hands of six-term incumbent Thad Cochran, 76, came into politics after a stint in talk radio. There practitioners do not live by the axiom that you don't have to explain something you never said, and McDaniel had some explaining to do about some of his more colorful broadcast opinions and phrases, which may have given a number of voters pause about whether he is quite senatorial, whatever that means nowadays.

Also, Democrats and independents who had not voted in the Democrat's primary could vote in the Republican's. They probably care more than Republicans like to admit that they themselves care about legislative pork, of which Cochran has served up heaping amounts during his 33 years on the Appropriations Committee. This bright red state has the nation's lowest per capita income, the highest federal funding as a percent of revenue, and a surplus of cognitive dissonance between its professed conservatism and its actual enjoyment of the benefits

Mississippi's conservatives understand the bargain they have struck. One resident of a town not named for the tea party spirit, Olive Branch, told The New York Times she suspected Cochran engaged in costly logrolling: "There's no telling what kinds of liberal things he had to vote for to get those kinds of things for Mississippi — what kind of trading he had to do."

Give tea partiers their due by acknowledging the virtue that makes them scary to their cultured despisers. The tea party's critics consider its politics not properly focused on the material things appropriations buy.

Ten years ago, a talented polemicist of the left, Thomas Frank, wrote a lively lament, "What's the Matter with Kansas?" His book's title replicated the title of a scalding 1896 editorial in The Emporia Gazette by that paper's famous editor William Allen White, who believed that popu-

list hostility to sophisticates and wealth-creators was impoverishing Kansas.

In 2004, Frank, a Kansas native, argued that Kansans vote against the Democratic Party because they misunderstand "their fundamental interests." Rather than lining up for largess from liberalism's government cornucopia, they are distracted by cultural concerns. Instead of seeking concrete benefits, they vote about abstractions, such as constitutionalism, limited government and cultural conservatism.

So, what's the matter with the tea party, according to those who think there is much the matter with it? It is insufficiently materialistic. Hence its reluctance to be bought by the appropriator. And what's the matter with Mississippi? The fact — the state has waited a long time for this to be said — that it is so much like the rest of the nation.

The best thing about Mississippi's recent moment in the national spotlight is how normal the state seems. It is, like the nation, defined by its ambivalence, its uneasy conscience, about its appetite for what Washington dispenses. Mississippi today is burning with embarrassment, but not, at long last, embarrassment about race.

Its Republican primary occurred three days after the 50th anniversary of the disappearance and murder of three civil rights workers — Michael Schwerner,

Andrew Goodman and James Chaney — near the town of Philadelphia in Neshoba County. Today, Philadelphia's mayor is an African-American, and Mississippi, which is 37 percent African-American, has more African-American elected officials than any other state.

Mississippi has not elected a Democratic senator since 1982, when it gave a sixth full term to John Stennis, who was first elected to fill a vacancy created by an incumbent's death in 1947. Which means no Mississippian has become a freshmen Democratic senator since Harry Truman was president. So, the tea party's low-risk insurrection hardly threatened a Republican Senate seat.

McDaniel's defeat, like many the tea party has experienced this primary season, brings that feisty faction face to face with a melancholy fact: Americans' devotion to frugal government is frequently avowed but rarely inhibiting. If the nation's trajectory is to be changed, this will not be done as abruptly as tea partiers wish, and will not be done without their continued wholesome agitation. They must take to heart the truth Thomas Jefferson told in 1790 to a congressional candidate. Jefferson said that "the ground of liberty is to be gained by inches, that we must be contented to secure what we can get from time to time, and eternally press forward for what is yet to get."

Hard to celebrate the anniversary of democracy's bad night

Sometimes, time affords a fresh perspective not available at the time of an event. A year after the Wendy Davis filibuster that sparked unprecedented Texas Senate mayhem is not one of those times.

Though I sided with the screamers in opposing the abortion restriction bill, I noted at the time that they were way out of line. I still believe so. The process remains more important than anything it produces, and what happened that night was a perversion of the process.

Regardless, Texas Democrats are marking the anniversary as if they were heroes. Included is a group called Fight Back Texas, which is encouraging supporters to "Dust Off Your Orange," the official color of protest last June, to mark the anniversary.

"Last summer, extremist lawmakers ignored the voices of thousands of protesters — and instead pushed an anti-woman, anti-abortion bill into law," Fight Back Texas recently tweeted.

Is that what happened? Or was it that a group of senators stuck to what they believed and what they believed their constituents believed in the face of taunts from screamers who interrupted a duly-constituted legislative body made up of duly-elected legislators. Even with the perspective of time, I'm pretty sure that's what happened.

In addition to siding with protesters in opposing the bill, I agree with them that Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst made questionable parliamentary rulings against Davis. But such rulings should not be subject to thumbs up or thumbs down by a screaming horde. This ain't Rome.

"The filibuster was just the beginning — our voices will continue to be heard," says Fight Back Texas.

Good. And just as filibuster night was the wrong time for those voices to be heard, this is the right time as Davis runs for governor and Dems are filled with optimism sure to be heard at their state convention in Dallas this weekend. Best wishes to them in their effort to make this something of a two-party state, which would be good for us.

The Davis campaign planned "filibuster anniversary" parties across the state Wednesday night. "One year ago, Wendy Davis launched a nearly 13-hour filibuster and stood up for the rights of Texas women," says the invitation. "It was an act of courage and strength that brought together women and men across the state."

I'm not a filibuster fan. It's a loser's tactic utilized by senators who don't have the votes to do what they want done or stop what they don't want done. It's also an unfair tactic, not equally available to all legislators regardless of age or physical condition.

The big anniversary celebration was planned for Wednesday evening at the Palmer Events Center. Davis, lieutenant governor candidate state Sen. Leticia Van de Putte and "other special guests" were scheduled to be on hand. Tickets ranged from \$20 for general admission to \$1,000 for hosts, who also got into a "VIP pre-program reception" and "photoline with Senator Davis."

I'm not sure it's an anniversary to be proud of, but I am in favor of (almost) anything that gets folks involved at the right time. The right time is when we pick our leaders and legislators, not by screaming as they do the leading and legislating they were elected to do.

Last June's screamers already have had an impact at the ballot box, albeit perhaps not one they wanted. In defeating Dewhurst in the GOP lite gov primary, challenger state Sen. Dan Patrick of Houston often reminded voters that Dewhurst lost control of the Senate chamber on filibuster night, which he indeed did.

Van de Putte has a long-shot chance of beating Patrick in November. Failing that, the legacy of last year's Democratic screamers could include a new GOP lieutenant governor they'll like even less than the old GOP lieutenant governor.

What's Obama's handicap? Golf

■ The president's decision to hit the links has turned into a political double bogey

I On June 14, Sunni rebels threatened Baghdad after seizing much of Iraq — and President Obama fearlessly played a round at the Sunnyside Golf Course in Rancho Mirage, Calif.

The next day, the militants posted pictures of their mass execution of Shiite members of Iraq's security forces — and Obama boldly teed off again, at Oracle founder Larry Ellison's Rancho Mirage estate.

These split-screen scenes were reminiscent of the weekend in March when Russia was about to annex Crimea. Obama played golf both Saturday and Sunday at Key Largo, Fla.'s Ocean Reef resort with former NBA star Alonzo Mourning and former NFL player Ahmad Rashad.

It's enough to make one wish the president would take up a different pastime — say, stamp collecting.

Yes, a president needs down time. And, yes, he can run the country whether he's in a sand trap or the Situation Room. But Obama's golf habit needlessly hands his critics a gimme.

Former vice president Dick Cheney, writing in the Wall Street Journal with his daughter Liz, complained: "Terrorists take control of more territory and resources than ever before in history, and he goes golfing." House Intelligence Committee Chairman Mike Rogers gave a TV interview asking Obama to "please come back from the golf course" and find an Iraq solution.

Is golf really so important that Obama is willing to handicap his political standing? Evidently so. On Tuesday evening, Obama hosted Tiger Woods, Phil Mickelson, Davis Love III, Ernie Els and other pro golfers in the East Room of the White House at a reception for the 2013 Presidents Cup players. "Last year was the second time I've been honorary chairman of the Presidents Cup. The United States won both times. I'm just saying," Obama joked.

I was one of the many who had fun with George W. Bush's classic tee shot in 2002: "I call upon all nations to do everything they can to stop these terrorist killers. Thank you. Now watch this drive." But as The Washington Post's Colby Itkowitz noted, Bush hung up his spikes after the Iraq invasion. (He busied himself with other leisure pursuits, such as clearing brush.) CBS News' Mark Knoller, the unofficial statistician of presidential activities, reports that Bush played golf only 24 times while in the White House; Obama is up to 177 and now

has a round-a-week habit.

The image problem isn't from leisure activity per se but the type of leisure activity. A majority of Americans now believes that Obama doesn't understand their problems, and images of him playing golf — perceived, fairly or not, as a rich man's game — confirms this out-of-touch reputation.

This is similar to the problem that dogged Mitt Romney, and now Hillary Clinton. The Post's Philip Rucker this week noted that influential Democrats are concerned that her "rarefied, cloistered lifestyle could jeopardize the Democratic Party's historic edge with the middle class." Images of Obama lining up his putt undermine his attempts to play the populist, which he has done this year on unemployment insurance, the minimum wage and income-inequality.

The game has driven another wedge between the president and White House reporters who, during their turns on pool duty, chronicle with envy his weekly outings with friends and aides.

"Beautiful day for hitting the links," the Washington Examiner's Susan Crabtree wrote from Fort Belvoir. "Unfortunately pool is headed to the base rec center for the duration."

"Looked like a nice place to play golf," wrote the Houston Chronicle's Kevin Diaz from the "exclusive" Robert Trent Jones Golf Club in Gainesville, Va., "at least from the maintenance shed where pool spent the day."

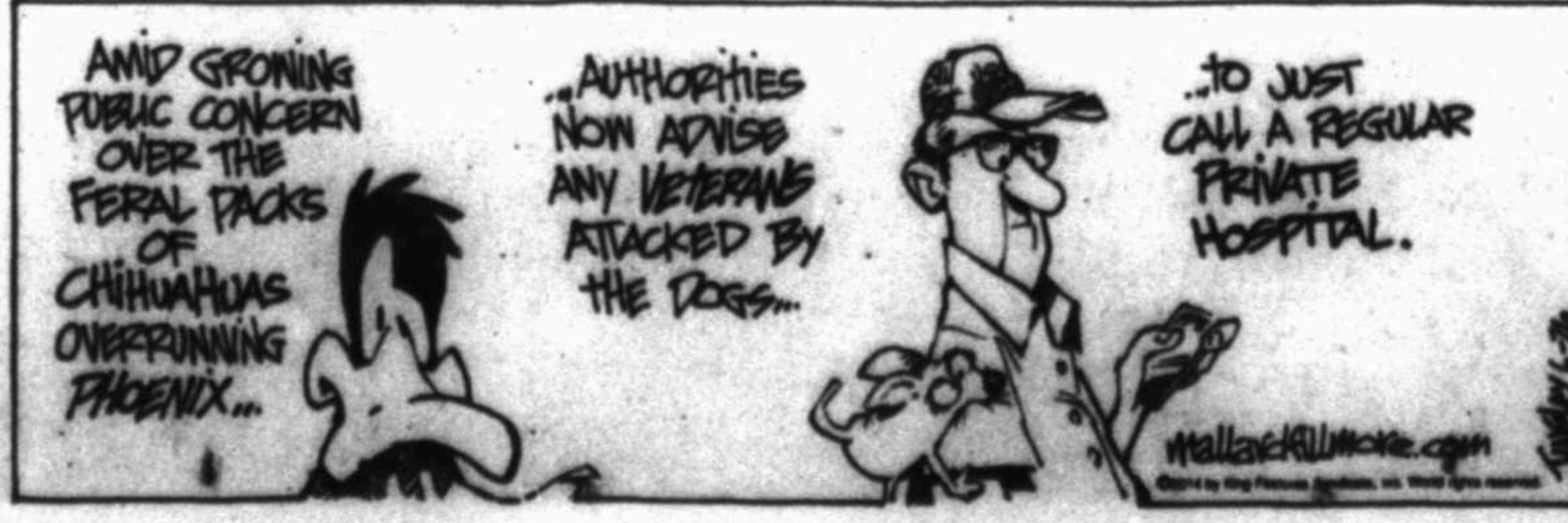
Obama has replaced basketball with golf as his "go-to sport," in part to avoid injury, Politico reports. At a White House event on sports concussions last month, the president spoke of the therapeutic benefits of his time on the links: "When I need to relax and clear my head, I turn to sports, whether it's a pick-up basketball game ... or more sedate pastimes like golf, or watching 'SportsCenter.'"

Democrats probably wish, for the sake of appearance, that Obama would devote more time to ESPN and less to golf. But if the optics of manicured greens and country clubs worry Democrats, they should consider themselves lucky he didn't take up polo.

House to vote on Obama lawsuit

WASHINGTON — The House will vote next month on legislation authorizing a campaign-season lawsuit accusing President Barack Obama of failing to carry out the laws passed by Congress, Speaker John Boehner announced Wednesday.

In a memo distributed to House members, Boehner, R-Ohio, accused Obama of "aggressive unilateralism" and said if left unchecked, it would give the president "king-like authority at the expense of the American people and their elected legislators."

White House press secretary Josh Earnest dismissed any suggestion that the president has failed to act within the law in issuing executive orders or taking other actions. "We feel completely confident that the president was operating within his authority as the president of the United States to take these steps on behalf of the American people," he told reporters.

Whatever the outcome of the suit in the courts, Boehner's announcement guarantees creation of yet another political struggle between Republicans and Obama and his Democratic allies in a campaign already full of them.

"On matters ranging from health care and energy to foreign policy and education, President Obama has repeatedly run an end-around" on the public and Congress, the speaker wrote. He accused him of "ignoring some statutes completely, selectively enforcing others and at times, creating laws of his own."

At a news conference, Boehner strongly brushed aside a question of whether impeachment proceedings could result from the suit.

In his memo, he stopped short of accusing the president of violating his oath of office. Instead, he said Obama was "straining the boundaries of the solemn oath he took on Inauguration Day."

WASHINGTON 'Get a warrant' to search cellphones, Justices say

In an emphatic defense of privacy in the digital age, a unanimous Supreme Court ruled Wednesday that police generally cannot search the cellphones of people they arrest without first getting search warrants.

Cellphones are unlike anything else police may find on someone they arrest, Chief Justice John Roberts wrote for the court. They are "not just another technological convenience," he said, but ubiquitous, increasingly powerful computers that contain vast quantities of personal, sensitive information.

"With all they contain and all they may reveal, they hold for many Americans the privacies of life," Roberts declared. So the message to police about what they should do before rummaging through a cellphone's contents following an arrest is simple: "Get a warrant."

The chief justice acknowledged that barring searches would affect law enforcement, but he said: "Privacy comes at a cost."

By ruling as it did, the court chose not to extend earlier decisions from the 1970s — when cellphone technology was not yet available — that allow police to empty a suspect's pockets and examine whatever they find to ensure officers' safety and prevent the destruction of evidence.

The Obama administration and the state of California, defending cellphone searches, said the phones should have no greater protection from a search than anything else police find. But the defendants in the current cases, backed by civil libertarians, librarians and news media groups, argued that cellphones, es-

pecially smartphones, can store troves of sensitive personal information.

"By recognizing that the digital revolution has transformed our expectations of privacy, today's decision is itself revolutionary and will help to protect the privacy rights of all Americans," said American Civil Liberties Union legal director Steven Shapiro.

Under the Constitution's Fourth Amendment, police generally need a warrant before they can conduct a search. The warrant itself must be based on "probable cause," evidence that a crime has been committed.

In the cases decided Wednesday, one defendant carried a smartphone, while the other carried an older flip phone. The police looked through both without first getting search warrants.

Roberts said there's no comparison between cellphones and packages of cigarettes and other items that were at issue in the earlier cases.

A ride on horseback and a flight to the moon both "are ways of getting from point A to point B, but little else justifies lumping them together," he said.

Authorities concerned about the destruction of evidence can take steps to prevent the remote erasure of a phone's contents or the activation of encryption, Roberts said. The police still may seize the cellphone and turn it off or remove its battery. If they think that turning it off could trigger encryption when the phone is turned back on, police can leave the phone on and place it in a special Faraday bag that isolates the phone from radio waves, he said.

WASHINGTON Justices rule for broadcasters in fight with Aereo

The Supreme Court ruled Wednesday that a

startup Internet company has to pay broadcasters when it takes television programs from the airwaves and allows subscribers to watch them on smartphones and other portable devices.

The justices said by a 6-3 vote that Aereo Inc. is violating the broadcasters' copyrights by taking the signals for free. The ruling preserves the ability of the television networks to collect huge fees from cable and satellite systems that transmit their programming.

Had services such as Aereo been allowed to operate without paying for the programming, more people might have ditched their cable services, meaning broadcasters would have been able to charge less for the right to transmit their programs.

Aereo looks a lot like a cable system, Justice Stephen Breyer wrote for

the court in rejecting the company's attempts to distinguish itself from cable and satellite TV. "Aereo's system is, for all practical purposes, identical to a cable system," he said.

Aereo is available in New York, Boston, Houston and Atlanta among 11 metropolitan areas and uses thousands of dime-sized antennas to capture television signals and transmit them to subscribers who pay as little as \$8 a month for the service. Because each subscriber is temporarily assigned a dime-sized, individual antenna, Aereo had made the case that it wasn't like a cable company and wasn't doing anything customers couldn't do on their own at home.

Breyer seemed to suggest the company was too-cute-by-half as he announced the opinion.

He laid out the company's argument that its tiny

antennas don't really transmit to the public and then said, "Hmmm," followed by a long pause. Then he added: "Well, we think that this argument makes too fine a point."

Company executives and prominent investor Barry Diller have said their business model would not survive a loss at the Supreme Court.

Aereo chief executive Chet Kanojia called the decision "a massive setback for the American consumer" and said the company would continue to fight, without being specific.

"We've said all along that we worked diligently to create a technology that complies with the law, but today's decision clearly states that how the technology works does not matter. This sends a chilling message to the technology industry," Kanojia said in a statement.

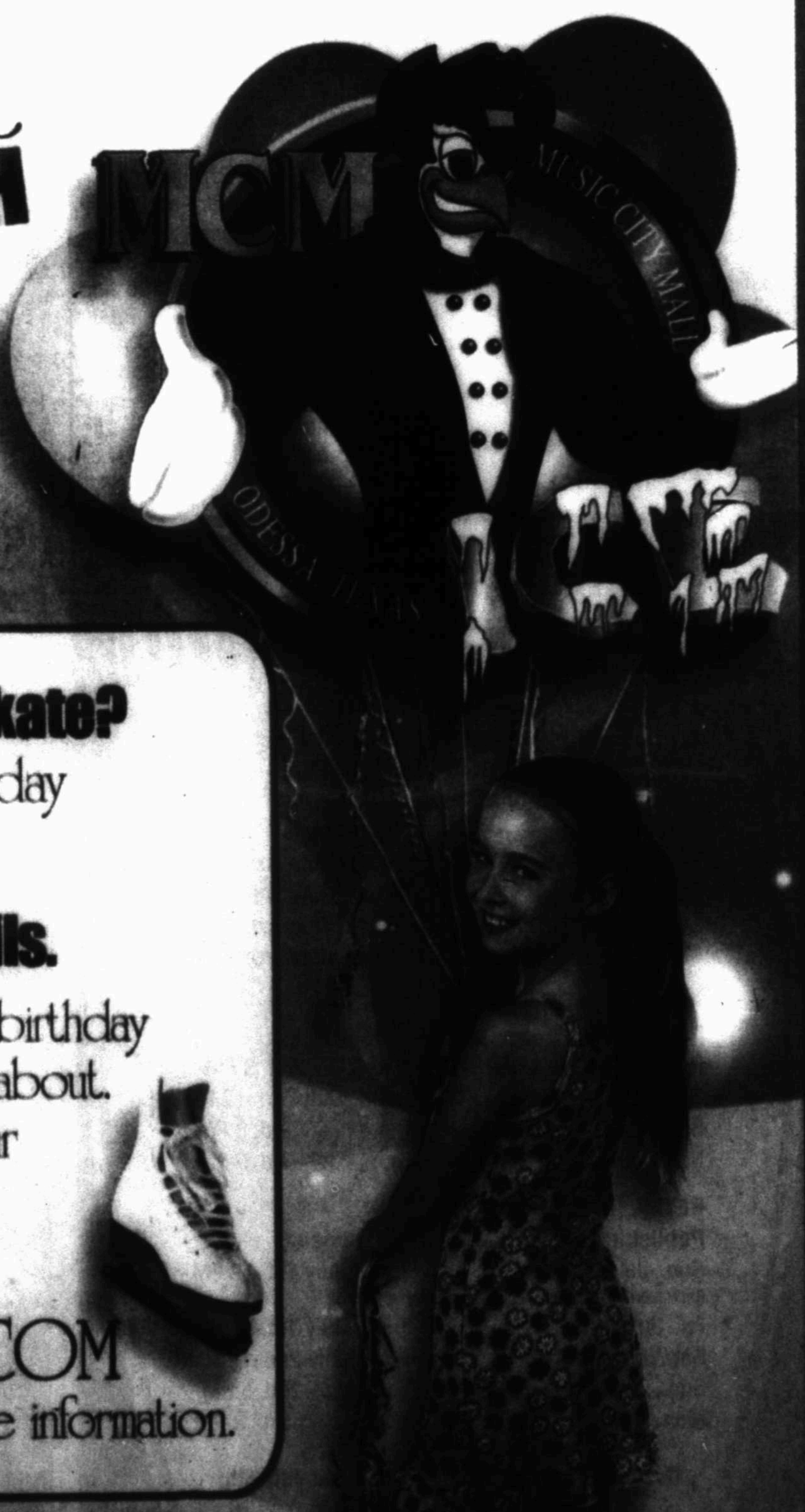

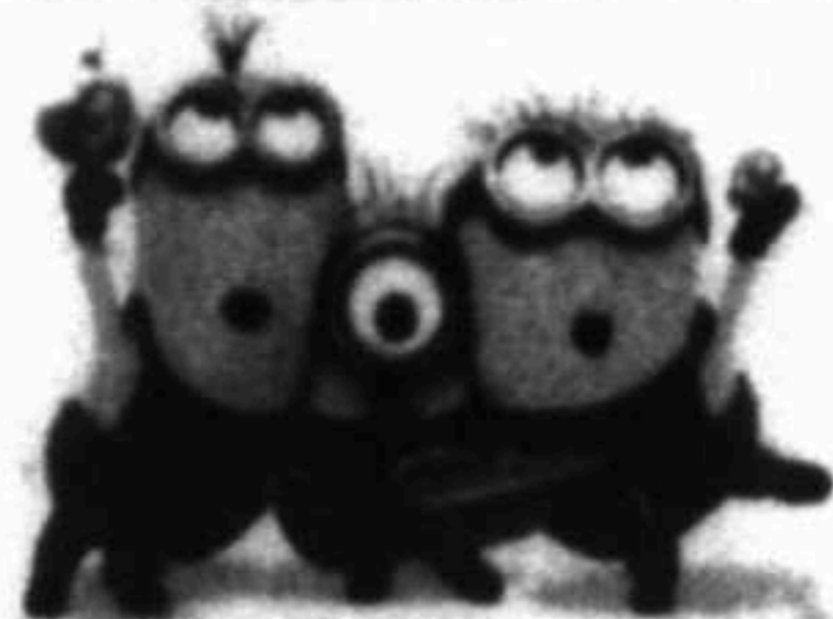

FIRED UP AND DELICIOUS Midland's mobile eats: Cane d'Oro pizza

THE STORY

Editor's note: The recent City Council revision on the mobile vendor ordinance allowing food trucks to remain longer at a single location is good news for the burgeoning scene in Midland. While food trucks have become a viable part of the restaurant scene in bigger cities, vendors here have grown to signify that Midlanders are open to the notion of grabbing lunch or dinner from a truck sometimes. In our series of profiling local vendors, we look at the menus, prices and locations of these food trucks.

Teri Kilani opened Cane d'Oro in September 2013 and has grown to be one of the more popular mobile vendors in Midland. The traveling wood-fired pizza oven all stemmed from having one in her own backyard. "My son Jordan had built one and I always loved to entertain. So we made individual pizzas when people would come over," she said. After 19 years selling Yellow Pages Classified, the company was sold, and Kilani didn't quite feel a fit with her new company. Just three years from her retirement benefits kick-

ing in, she walked away. And with no experience other than having parties and making pizzas for her friends, she set out to turn that into her job.

"I always thought it would be cool to be in catering. I love parties and visiting with people but I never really knew what to do," she said.

But it all worked out. She purchased an oven-on-wheels in Colorado, came up with the name Cane d'Oro (kon-ay dor-oh), which translates into "golden

After 20 years of performing in Summer Mummers, Michael Fields was certain he wouldn't partake this year — but then reality set in.

"Oh, I say it every year that I'm not going to do it and I think 'Am I too old?' every year. 'Do I look crazy up there? Am I the only one struggling to get off the couch after a show?' and then something happens and there I am. It's like Cher's farewell concert. I've been quitting for the last five years," he said, laughing.

For the past two years, Fields has served over Summer Mummers as the president. Previously, he's served as vice president, treasurer and member at large. Regardless of titles though, for him, Summer Mummers is family.

"We may not talk throughout the rest of the year, but once we all come together for this, it is like being with my family again and that's why I get right back into it," he said.

But his job doesn't start and end with a Mummers season. The gig is year-round with months of preparation.

"We'll start within a month after the close and start talking directors and choreographers and then get into script submissions and readings and setting up advertisers," he said.

And when show time rolls around as it did this year on June 6 at the Yucca Theater, Fields and the board were there overseeing the opening night and making sure the famous popcorn is ready to go.

In some ways, the popcorn is the most important part of the job, being that it's the primary moneymaker for Mummers and ultimately Midland Community Theatre.

"We spend about \$16,000 on popcorn and we'll easily make \$60,000-70,000 from it by the end of the run," he said.

While he's overseeing the operations part behind the scene, Fields also does his part onstage with his now signature Olio act, the male strippers.

"This is my fourth year doing that and it's mostly Misti Ray's choreography, but we're not Magic Mike," he said. "The whole joke is that these guys are your neighbors next door ripping off their clothes."

Before his tenure as the current cosmetol-

ogy program chair at Midland College. Fields cut hair for 25 years. He pitched the cosmetology program to the college, and 10 years later, he now heads the curriculum, oversees the staff and maintains the budget. The program has 75-80 students in its year-round schedule and boasts a 98 percent pass rate.

Fields doesn't have a trick to maintaining such a full schedule unless it's "drinking a lot of Cokes" as he admitted. Instead it's passion. Although he did theater in high school and college, he didn't discover dancing until 33 when he took a class. Dancing isn't just his passion, it's his pastime.

"I act, I sing, but there's a special feeling when dancing. I grew up in the '60s and you

Mickey Gilley recalls those 'Urban Cowboy' days

In many ways, Mickey Gilley is one of the pioneers for today's country artists. He navigated a huge country music career with 17 No. 1 hits that sometimes crossed over into pop and adult contemporary music. He opened several venues with his name attached. And he dabbled with acting in movies and television.

But the 1980 movie "Urban Cowboy" was one of Gilley's career highlights.

The movie featured his original Pasadena club Gilley's and brought the honky tonk into the mainstream as made his cover of "Stand By Me" a multi-radio format monster.

Gilley recalls those days with contemporary Johnny Lee at the Wagner Noel today during the Urban Cowboy Reunion Tour. Lee was also featured on the soundtrack with his smash single "Lookin' For Love."

Gilley spoke about the ups and downs of owning Gilley's and revisiting the Urban Cowboy legacy.

MRT: Welcome back to Texas. Is it true that you'll be reopening the original Pasadena location where all the Urban Cowboy lore started?

Gilley: Yeah I'm trying to redo Pasadena. My business partner, Sherwood Cryer, died and even though we fought at the end, he was responsible for what it became. And without him I might never have had a hit.

MRT: What happened between you two?

Gilley: He didn't treat me like I thought he should, but at the same time, he was like a father to me. I ended up suing him and even had to divorce myself

dog" after her retriever, and set out.

And business is good. "We're doing two or three events a day and it was so busy last week, I couldn't see straight. Business has picked up and is just really great," she said.

THE FOOD

Cane d'Oro's pizza is impressive on all sides.

The crust is homemade and made 24 hours in advance for a cold rise. Kilani crushes San Marzano tomatoes for the sauce. She uses chunks of fresh mozzarella for the base and tops it off with a mixture of shredded provolone and fontina cheeses. The mushrooms and onions are sautéed in butter and olive oil.

The garlic sticks (formerly knots) are made with the same dough brushed with butter and topped with shaved parmesan.

THE MENU

"For the most part, I stick to a certain menu," Kilani said.

Pizzas include pepperoni, cheese, sausage and veggie. At times, she'll also feature specialty pizzas.

"Our popular one is the West Texas Cheesesteak where I use a cheese sauce instead of tomato, add hatch green chilies, the meat and onions and top with the shredded cheese mixture," she said. "And for Fiesta night at the lawn concert, we had a pizza with olive oil on the crust, mozzarella, the chilies, garlic and chicken. And

Kilani added that she always carries bacon should someone request it.

At the Farmer's Market, Cane d'Oro serves its Omelet Pizza with butter, mozzarella, bacon or sausage, mushrooms and onions topped with the cheese mixture and a drizzle of egg.

Dessert Pizzas featured at catering events include The Godfather, a pizza crust with cinnamon, sugar and streusel topped with a cream sauce, or a s'mores pizza with chocolate, graham crackers and marshmallows. Both feature

butter, of course.

Kilani offers cinnamon sticks as dessert at her mobile station.

from him. In hindsight, I probably wouldn't have taken it that far, and I still admire the fact that he was responsible for both me and the club.

MRT: Where are you now with it?
Gilley: The guy fronting it built Billy Bob's in Fort Worth and evolved that club into what it is now. We're still figuring the size of what would be best, but we'll for sure have the bull.

MRT: That would be your fifth location after Dallas, Durant, Pocola and the new Las Vegas club. Now you see other country singers with their own venues like Toby Keith's I Love This Bar & Grill and Pat Green's The Rustic.
Gilley: And now I'm trying to keep up with Toby! I actually opened mine before I made it big and it was just a small venue. There was an article on the mechanical bull in Esquire, and I thought he was making fun. But then the movie came out because of that and it dawned on me that it was the "Saturday Night Fever" of country music. It gave the industry a huge boost and I never dreamed Gilley's would become what it did.

MRT: You also decided give your career a reboot of sorts.
Gilley: It took me 17 years to have my first hit with "Roomful of Roses." Did you know Kenny Rogers played bass on that? I knew that other artists had singles on other stations so I purposely covered "Stand By Me" because people knew it. And it caught on and made it into the top 40.

MRT: You were everywhere from the radio charts

to television. How was that for you?

Gilley: It was a phenomenal situation, but it's fleeting. I remember once I was playing the main showroom at a venue when Billy Ray Cyrus played the smaller room. Then he broke out with "Achy Breaky Heart." Heck, even Elvis got rejected at the Grand Ol' Opry so I knew I couldn't look at the things always the same.

MRT: The show is part "Urban Cowboy," part memory lane?

Gilley: We'll do some of my stuff throughout the years and show those clips of me on shows like "Dukes of Hazzard," "Hee Haw," "Fantasy Island" and the movie. I was even on "American Pickers," so I can say I've lived long enough to make the History Channel! The fans have given me my No. 1 hits so I want do those in the show. I've had a great ride in my career.

MRT: Country music now gets flak for its focus on drinking and misogynistic views toward women. In your heyday, this wasn't so. How do you respond to country's evolution?

Gilley: This business is tough, and some of the things now are not my favorite. I mean, I love Toby's "Red Solo Cup" and what would music be without drinking and fighting? But at the same time, you see some great talent like on "American Idol" or something and they don't win and you wonder why compared to who's out there now.

MRT: You come from a stellar family with both Jerry Lee Lewis and Jimmy Swaggart as your cousins.

Gilley: It was quite an experience growing up with them. I played Jerry's music starting out and it got me noticed but that was rock 'n' roll and I was more country. But I always like to say that I'm still the youngest and best looking.

MRT: There have been movies about Johnny Cash, Ray Charles and Loretta Lynn. Who would play you in a movie?

Gilley: Oh, man, I'd have to think about that. I don't know, but hopefully it would be someone who would represent what I'm all about and that's the passion I still have for the music.

NFL to remove cap on concussion damages

The NFL agreed Wednesday to remove a \$675 million cap on damages from thousands of concussion-related claims after a federal judge questioned whether there would be enough money to cover as many as 20,000 retired players.

A revised settlement agreement filed in federal court in Philadelphia also eliminated a provision that barred anyone who gets concussion damages from the NFL from suing the NCAA or other amateur football leagues.

In January, U.S. District Judge Anita Brody had denied preliminary approval of the deal because she worried the money could run out sooner than expected. The settlement is designed to last at least 65 years and cover retired players who

develop Lou Gehrig's disease, dementia or other neurological problems believed to be caused by concussions suffered during their pro careers.

"Some of the players were concerned and asking questions about whether they could be in a deal if they weren't sure there'd be money there for them 40 years from now if they get sick, God forbid. ... That's what drove these changes," said plaintiffs' lawyers Christopher Seeger.

More than 4,500 former players have filed suit, some accusing the league of fraud for its handling of concussions. They include former Dallas Cowboys running back Tony Dorsett and Super Bowl-winning Chicago Bears quarterback Jim McMahon, who suffers from dementia.

The original settlement included \$675 million for compensatory claims for players with neurological symptoms, \$75 mil-

lion for baseline testing and \$10 million for medical research and education. The NFL would also pay an additional \$112 million to the players' lawyers, for a total payout of more than \$870 million.

The revised settlement eliminates the cap on overall damage claims but retains a payout formula for individual retirees that considers their age and illness. A young retiree with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis, or Lou Gehrig's disease, would receive \$5 million, a 50-year-old with Alzheimer's disease would get \$1.6 million, and an 80-year-old with early dementia would get \$25,000.

Even with the cap removed, both sides said they believe the NFL will spend no more than about \$675 million on damage claims by ex-players.

Brody will decide later whether to accept the new settlement terms. She still

has to rule on a petition by a group of seven players who say the settlement pays them nothing for symptoms ranging from headaches to personality changes.

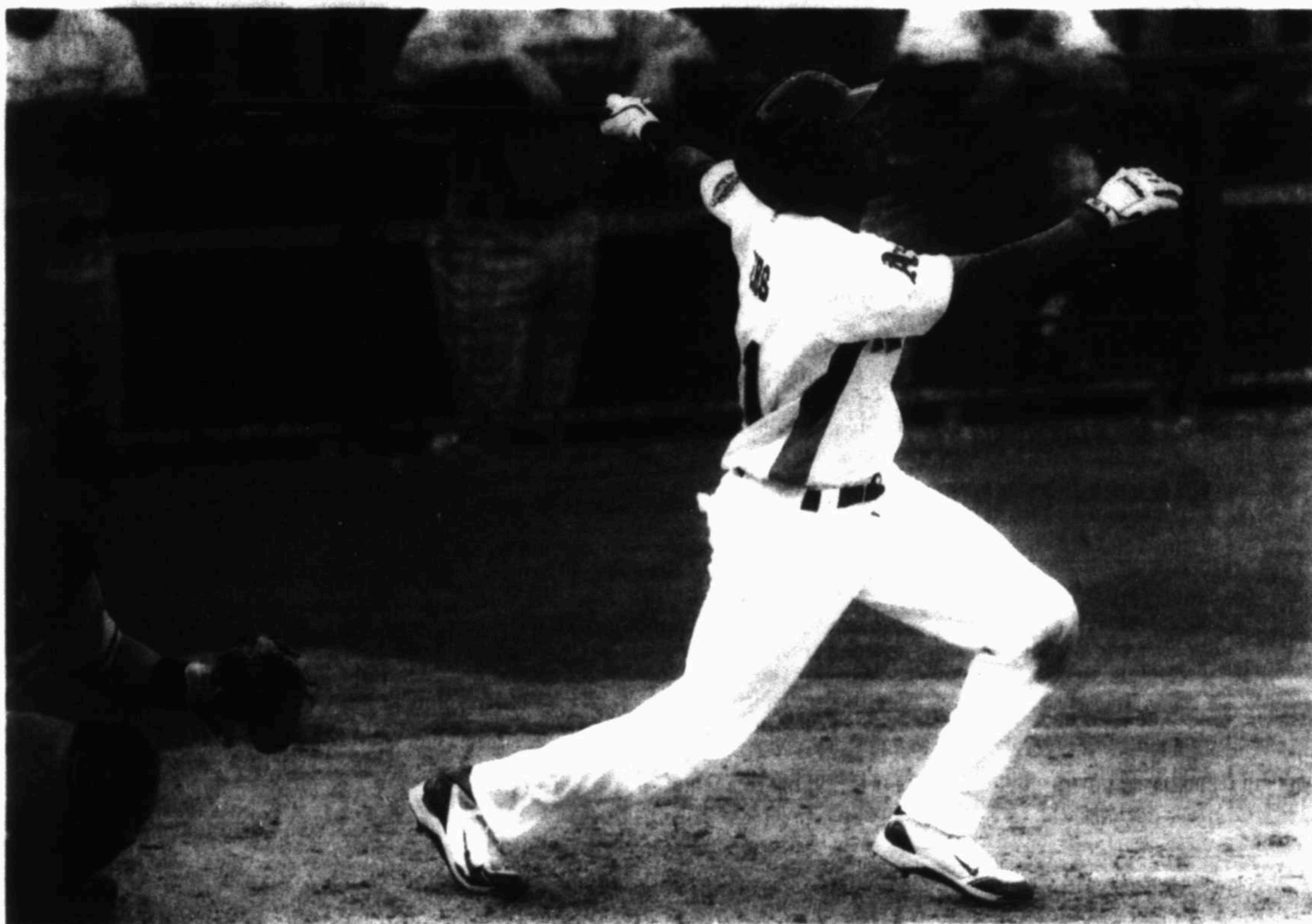
Critics of the deal have also said the league, with annual revenues approaching \$10 billion, was getting off lightly. Lawyers for the plaintiffs said the settlement avoids the risk of a protracted legal battle.

Seeger said any ex-player who opts out of the settlement and pursues litigation on his own would have to overcome a stiff NFL defense. The NFL has a range of legal arguments at its disposal, and a player would have to prove that his illness was caused by a concussion suffered during his pro career, he said.

"Continuing to litigate against the NFL is a long and uncertain road that can take

Myers makes strong return to Midland

It's been a while since D'Arby Myers had played in Midland, but on Wednesday night it looked like he hadn't really left.

Myers scored the game's first run against Northwest Arkansas in the third inning and then had an RBI single in a seven-run eighth to help the RockHounds to an 8-0 victory against the Naturals at Security Bank Ballpark.

"It's great, I missed these guys," Myers said after Wednesday's game. "I'm back with the boys."

Myers spent much of this season injured after breaking his left wrist on April 15. After an extensive rehab assignment in Arizona, Myers resumed playing with the Oakland A's Arizona Rookie League team in Phoenix last

week and played in three games.

He returned to Midland on Tuesday, and was inserted in Wednesday's lineup, hitting eighth and playing left field against the Naturals.

Myers was 1-for-3 with an RBI, stolen base, a walk, and scored two runs. He showed off his speed in the third when manager Aaron Nieckula sent him from second on a single by Billy Burns to the shallow part of left field for the game's first run.

Nieckula said he knew right away he was going to send Myers on the single in the third, and Myers knew as well.

"We are very aggressive, especially with my speed and Billy's speed," Myers said. "Anytime that we can score with our speed, we go after it. It's especially tough being an outfielder with guys that

can run because they've got to come up cleanly and come up and make the throw."

Myers returned to Double-A Midland this year and he was expecting to be part of a speedy top part of the RockHounds' order with Burns and Addison Russell. Both Russell and Myers were injured early in season, but now both players are back in Midland, giving Nieckula plenty of options to be aggressive on the base paths.

"It's good to have (Myers) back because he brings a lot of excitement to the game," Nieckula said. "He's got a knack for putting the barrel on the ball. He's got some speed, he's aggressive and he's a good player."

Woods raises the energy level on PGA Tour

BETHESDA, Md. — Nobody has fielded more questions about Tiger Woods over his career than Ernie Els, at times to the point that it exasperates him.

Wednesday wasn't one of those days.

Els hit his tee shot to start his pro-am round at the Quicken Loans National, and without prompting said, "It's good to have him back, man."

This from a guy who has finished runner-up to Woods more often than any other player, including three straight tournaments they played in 2000 by a combined 28 shots.

Then again, the Big Easy has known Woods longer than any other player. They were together in the clubhouse at Royal Lytham & St. Annes in 1996 when Woods sought his advice on whether to turn pro. Els understands

what he brings to the game.

"This will get interesting now," Els said before heading down the fairway. "He's got records he's chasing. I saw him from a distance and his swing looks good. I wish I were playing with him so I can see where he is."

That's a question that won't be answered until Thursday, when Woods returns after a three-month hiatus from back pain and caused him to have surgery March 31. His opening round at Congressional will be his first competition in 109 days, and Woods really hasn't been competitive this year in the four tournaments he played.

He started Wednesday with a pro-am round that was not inspiring except that he showed no indication of pain or any other physical setback. He started by hitting a tee shot on the par-3 10th hole off the bank and into the water. His drive off the 11th hole went right into the hazard.

But it was just a pro-am round, which doesn't mean much. Woods once had beautiful control of his golf ball during a practice round Wednesday at Winged Foot during the 2006 U.S. Open, and he went on to miss the cut for the first time

in a major.

"I hit some loose shots today, but I also hit some really good ones," Woods said. "Back feels great, which is a really good sign."

And he had plenty of occasions to gouge the ball out of rough that is thicker than usual for Congressional, including a 5-wood on the par-4 17th that came out low and hot and ran up to the green, stopping 4 feet past the hole.

Master Gunnery Sgt. Anthony Russell was chosen to be the military caddie on that hole, and Woods asked him to knock in the birdie putt. It might have been easier except for one small problem.

"I'm left-handed," said Russell, who retires after 28½ years of active duty on Monday.

He missed the putt. Beyond the shots, the return of Woods was noticeable by the energy at the tournament. Ticket sales more than doubled on Friday when Woods announced he was ready to return to competition, particularly at a tournament that benefits his

Americans say stamina high after Manaus trip

RECIFE, Brazil — If there's such thing as a Manaus hangover, U.S. players insist they will be no part of it.

One less day to recover than Germany? No big deal.

The Americans are going into the biggest match most have ever played looking to break one streak and start another.

England, Italy, Cameroon and Croatia all lost their next game after playing in the heat and humidity of the Amazon rainforest capital of Manaus. The Americans, who allowed a 95th-minute goal in a 2-2 draw with Portugal on Sunday, may not be able to afford a loss when they play three-time champion Germany in their Group G finale Thursday with a berth in the knockout round on the line.

If they can advance, it would be the first time the U.S. has reached the next phase in consecutive World Cups.

"I don't think it's really bothering us right now," midfielder Kyle Beckerman said Wednesday before his team's final training for the match. "It's the biggest game of all of our lives. Any fatigue in our legs will be erased. We don't see the short rest as being a harm to us at all."

Moments after the disappointing finish against Cristiano Ronaldo and Portugal, coach Jurgen Klinsmann pointed out how Germany had an extra day to prepare.

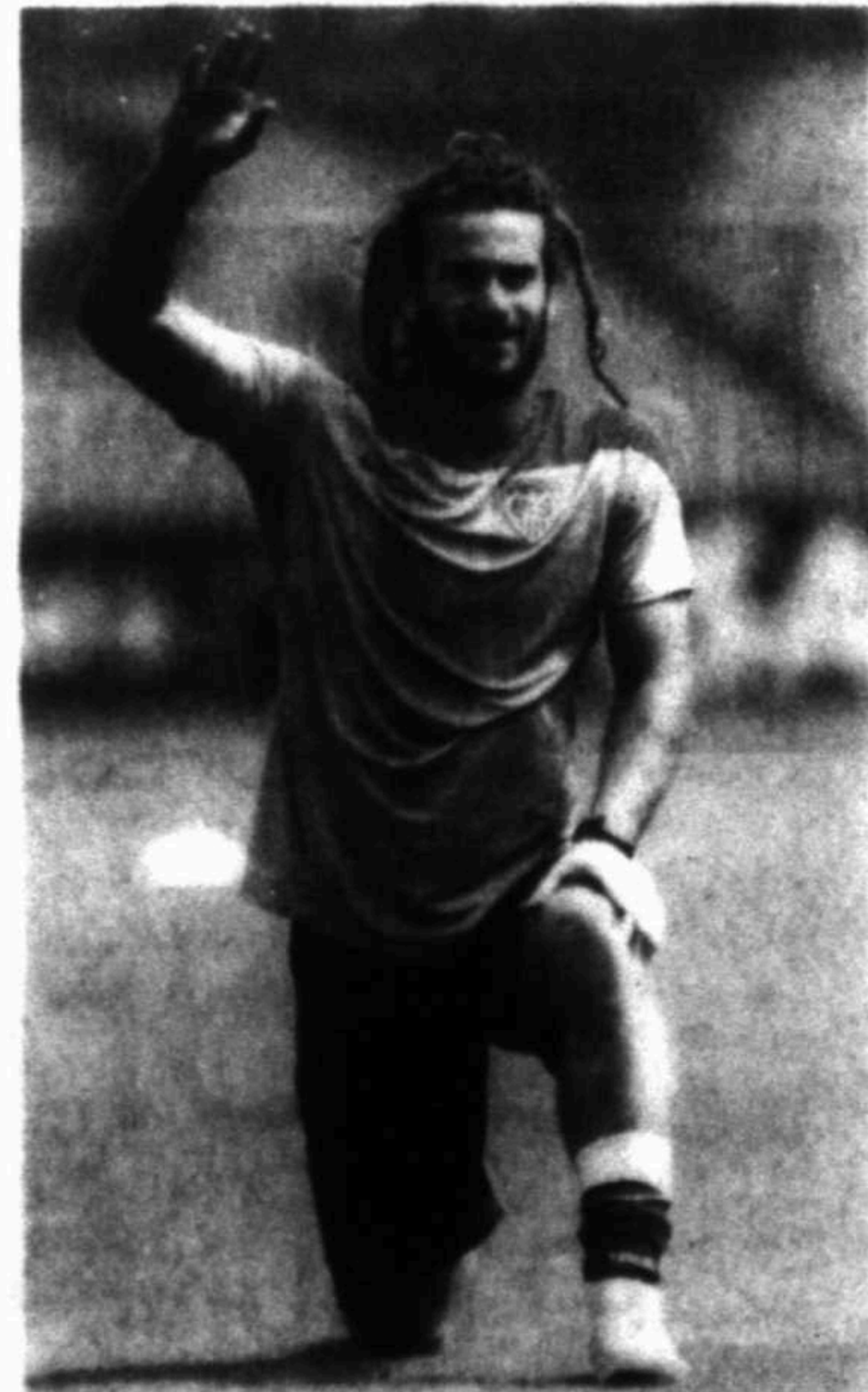
Klinsmann's native country, which he led to the 1990 World Cup championship as a player and coached to the 2006 semifinals on home soil, played to a 2-2 draw with Ghana in Fortaleza on Saturday.

"We played in the Amazon. They played in the very kind of locations where they didn't have to travel much," Klinsmann said shortly after Sunday's stunning result. "Everything was done for the big favorites to go and move on. We've got to do it the tough way, but we're going to do it the tough way."

And there's pressure on the second-ranked Germans. They're a favorite to win the tournament and are trying to become the first European team to win a World Cup played in the Americas.

"We knew before the World Cup that conditions in South America are different and that it's hot," German midfielder Mesut Ozil said. "But we have prepared ourselves and saw when playing against Ghana in the second half that we were controlling the match. ... If we consider the last two matches, we could say we

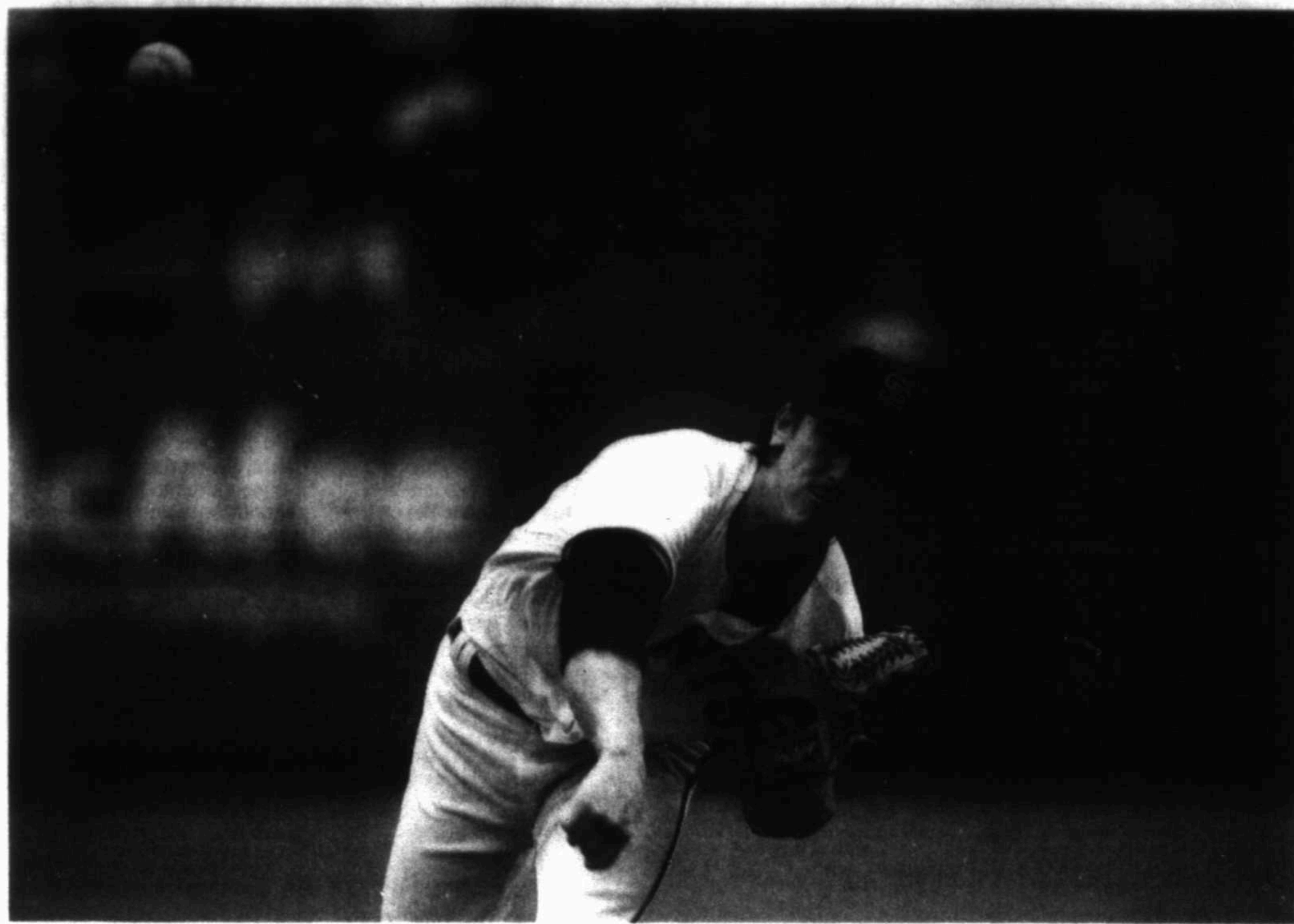

Uruguay defends Suarez as FIFA scrambles

RIO DE JANEIRO — As the world was judging Uruguay's Luis Suarez for biting a player in the World Cup, his teammates, coaches and fans in his soccer-crazy country defended the star, blaming the foreign media, his Italian opponents and uneven treatment.

World Cup organizers scrambled Wednesday quickly decided on a punishment before Uruguay plays Colombia Saturday in the round of 16.

"We have to resolve it either today or tomorrow," FIFA disciplinary panel member Martin Hong told reporters Wednesday. "It's our duty to see justice done."

A day after he tangled with defender Giorgio Chiellini, Suarez was coping well, according to the Uruguay football federation president.

"Luis is fine. He's been through 1001 battles," Wilmar Valdez told the online site Tenfield.com. "We all know who Luis is and that's why we have to defend him."

The bite — just before Uruguay scored the clinching goal to eliminate the four-time champion Italians — will now test FIFA president Sepp Blatter's often-stated commitment to "fair play, discipline, respect."

Blatter, who was in the crowd for the Uruguay-Italy match at Natal, has pledged a zero tolerance for the darker side of the game.

Many are questioning where that leaves a player like Suarez, who has a history of disciplinary problems including separate bans of seven and 10 matches for biting opponents in the Netherlands and England.

Valdez said Uruguay officials were sent a video of the incident by FIFA, and would respond with footage showing Suarez a striker for Liverpool and last season's player of the year in England's Premier League — as a victim of

Italian aggression. "When he falls, several substitutes insult him on the ground and some members of Italy's staff even came out of the bench to try to hit him," Valdez said, suggesting FIFA could investigate Italy.

Uruguay also will cite Brazil star Neymar getting only a yellow card in a clash with a Croatia player, Valdez said.

Uruguay federation board member Alejandro Balbi, who is Suarez's lawyer, blamed European media reporting.

"This happened because there have been campaigns launched by the media in England and Italy," Balbi told Uruguayan radio Sport 890.

Suarez's teammate Diego Lugano agreed.

"The British media has a vendetta against Suarez, and everyone knows that," he said. "It's obvious the vendetta sells newspapers in England, otherwise you wouldn't be here. Uruguay and Italy played yesterday. On Saturday Uruguay plays Colombia. I don't know why there's a British journalist asking about Suarez."

Lugano said he had seen "much more violent plays" than the bite at the World Cup.

"It was a normal taunt in football, and the world press ends up talking about something totally trivial," he said.

FIFA's case against Suarez — announced early Wednesday — will be managed by a Swiss lawyer, Claudio Sulser, chairman of the FIFA disciplinary committee. A former international forward himself, Sulser has worked for four years at FIFA, first as head of its ethics court.

Sulser can choose to judge the offense within the scale of typical red-card incidents: A three-match ban may then be appropriate, banishing Suarez at least until the World Cup final should Uruguay advance that far.

The maximum penalty would be a ban of 24 international matches.

FIFA can also choose to ban Suarez for up to two years. That would cover club and international games and would ruin a widely speculated transfer to Barcelona or Real Madrid.

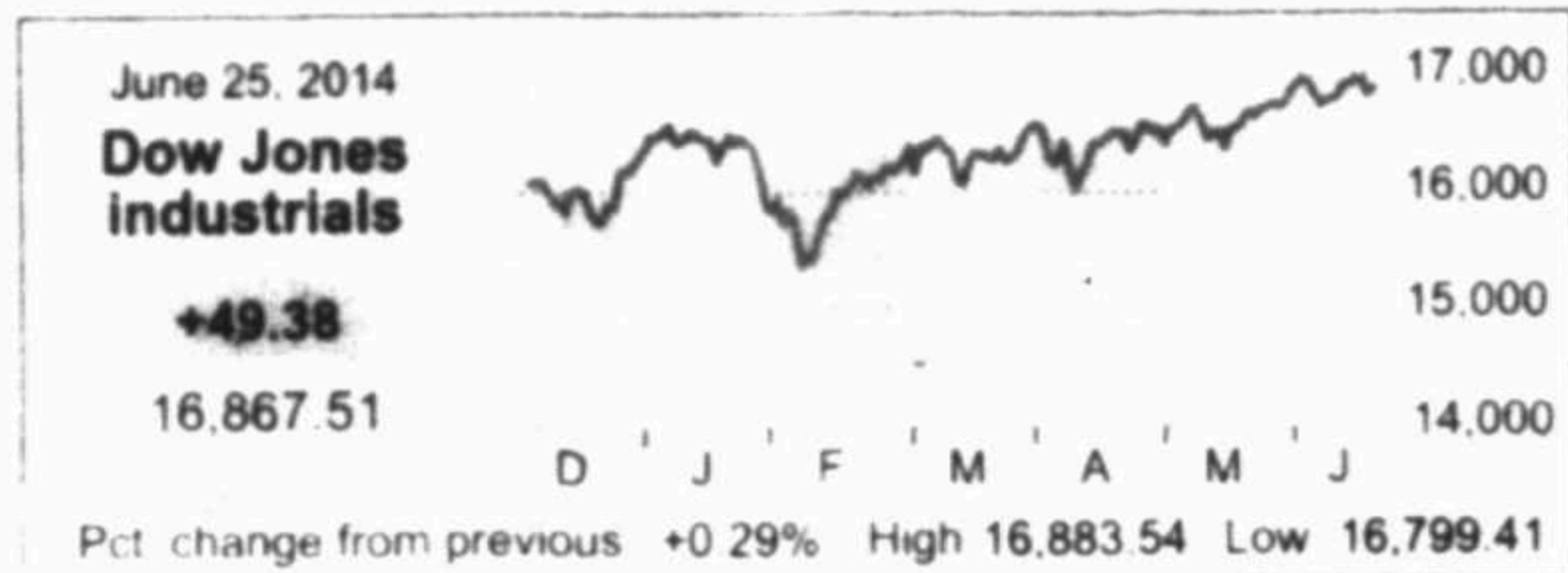

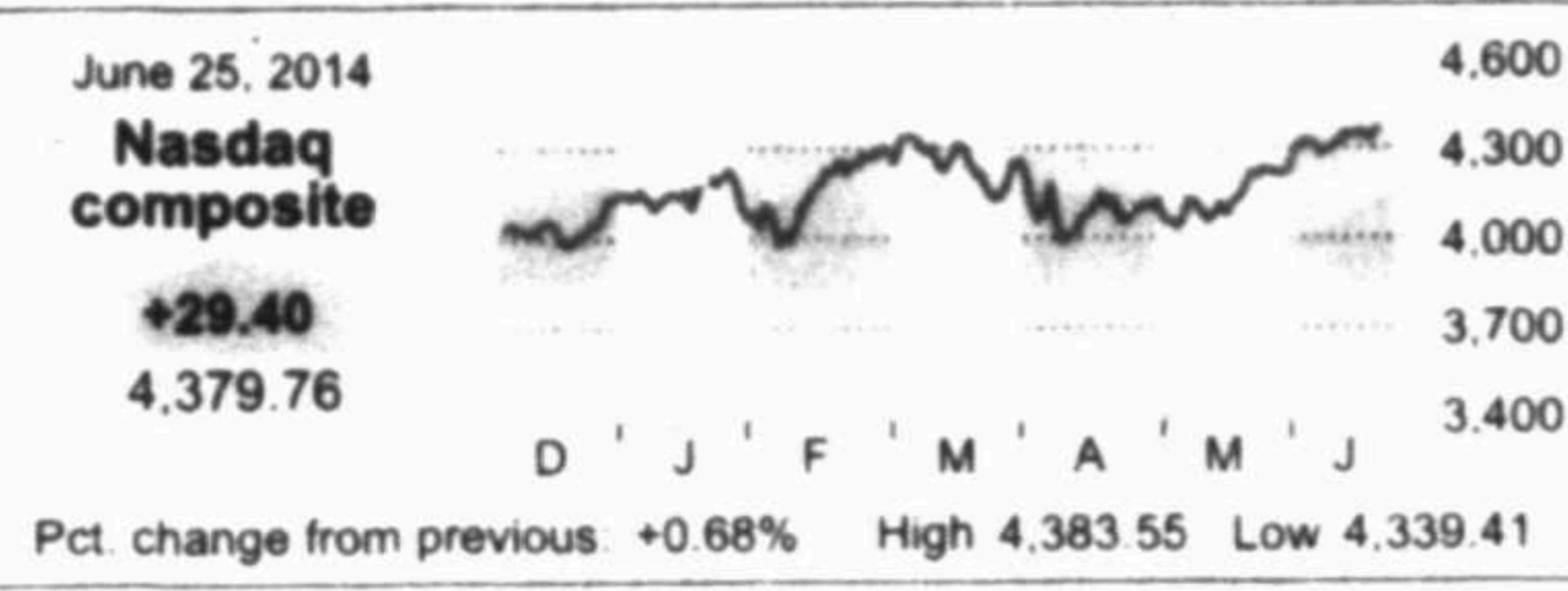

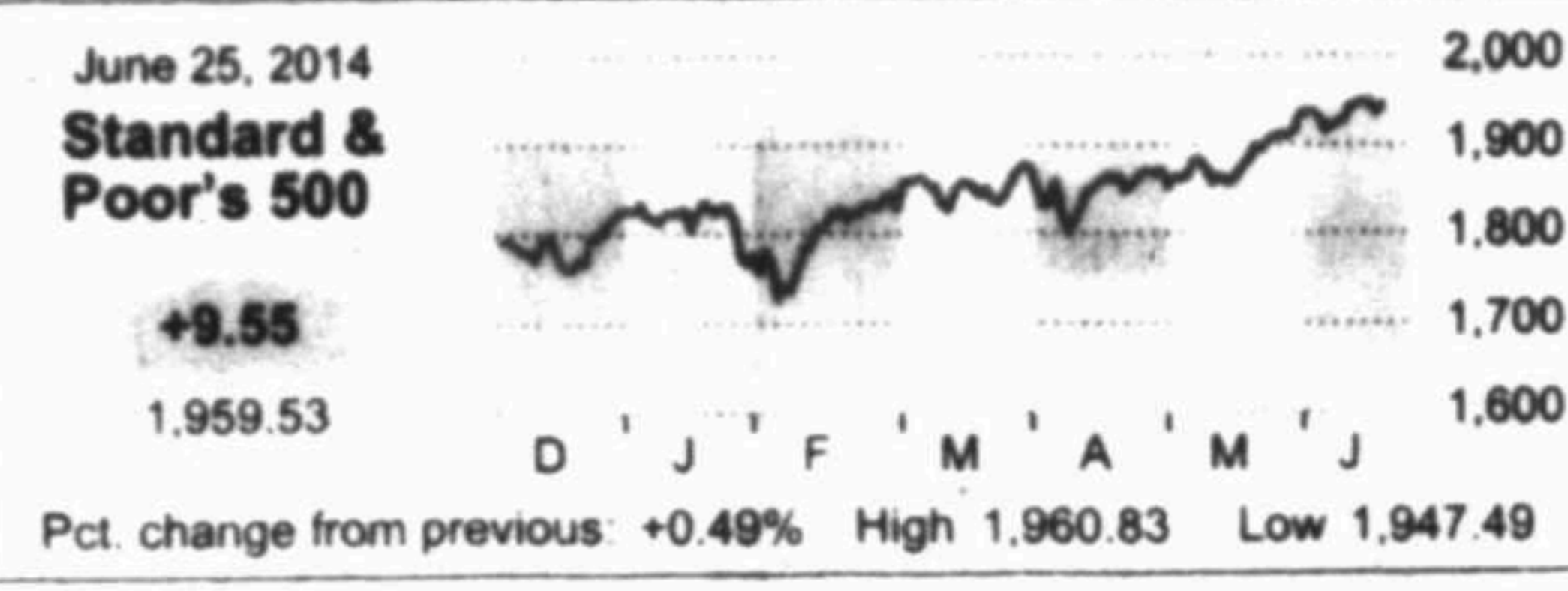

US economy shrank at 2.9 percent rate in Q1

WASHINGTON — The U.S. economy shrank at a steep annual rate of 2.9 percent in the January-March quarter as a harsh winter contributed to the biggest contraction since the depths of the recession five years ago.

But the setback is widely thought to be temporary, with growth rebounding solidly since spring.

The first-quarter contraction reported Wednesday by the government was even more severe than the 1 percent annual decline it had estimated a month ago. Much of the downward revision reflected an unexpectedly sharp drop in health care spending. Another factor was a bigger trade deficit than earlier estimated.

Though such a sharp economic decline would typically stoke fears of another recession, analysts see it as a short-lived result of winter storms that shut factories, disrupted shipping and kept Americans away from shopping malls and auto dealerships. Many expect growth to reach a robust annual rate of 3.5 percent or better this quarter.

"Despite the awful start to the year, the U.S. economy is nowhere close to a recession," said Sal Guatieri, senior economist at BMO Capital Markets.

Guatieri thinks growth is rebounding at a 3.8 percent annual rate in the current quarter and will average a solid 3 percent rate in the second half of the year.

Other analysts noted that several likely temporary factors slowed the economy last quarter — from businesses reducing their pace of restocking to companies pausing their purchases of equipment. Also, a wider trade deficit cut 1.5 percentage points from growth. Housing construction slumped.

Those negative forces will likely turn positive this quarter, analysts said. The economy is getting a lift from an improving job market, which has added more than 200,000 jobs each month over the past four months.

"We had one-time hits from the weather, business inventories and trade in the first quarter," said Gus Faucher, senior economist at PNC Financial. "Things are looking much better for the rest of this year. Job gains are allowing households to increase their spending, with higher stock prices and home values also helping."

Stock investors appeared unfazed by the plunge in economic activity last quarter. The Dow Jones industrial average was up about 30 points in late-afternoon trading.

Last quarter's 2.9 percent annual decline, as measured by the gross domestic product, followed a 2.6 percent gain in the fourth quarter. It was the weakest showing since the economy shrank at a 5.4 percent annual rate in the first quarter of 2009 in the midst of the Great Recession.

Two-thirds of Wednesday's downward revision in overall activity reflected weaker spending on health care. Instead of growing at a 1 percent rate in the first quarter, health care spending actually fell at a 0.2 percent annual rate, the government estimated. It was the first quarterly drop in health care spending since 2011.

Analysts said the government was too optimistic about the boost the new health care law would give to spending in the first quarter. The harsh winter likely caused some people to delay elective surgeries and doctor visits. Analysts predicted that health care spending would rebound as people who have gained health insurance begin using their coverage.

Most analysts expect the economy to keep expanding at a healthy annual rate of around 3 percent in the second half of this year.

Reports on consumer spending, manufacturing and business investment have shown a solid rebound. Orders for big-ticket manufactured goods excluding military hardware and for core capital goods, a proxy for business investment, rose strongly in May, a report Wednesday showed.

Analysts said solid hiring, growth in manufacturing and surging auto sales are contributing to a stronger economy. A stumbling housing recovery has been a concern. But even there, recent data on home sales and construction have been encouraging.

"The larger contraction in GDP in the first quarter is not a sign that the US is suffering from a fundamental slowdown," said Paul Dales, senior U.S. economist at Capital Economics.

If economists are correct that annual growth will reach around 3 percent in the second half of the year, it would be a sharp improvement from the 2 percent annual pace of the first five years of this subpar economic recovery.

"We should have a much better second half this year and a much better 2015 than 2014," said Mark Zandi, chief economist at Moody's Analytics.

Zandi said he's forecasting growth of 3.5 percent to 4 percent in 2015. If he's correct, that would be the strongest year since the economy grew 3.8 percent in 2004.

"In past recoveries, we have always gotten a year of very strong growth," Zandi said. "I think we will get that in 2015," helped by a long-awaited improvement in wage growth.

Of course, the optimistic projections could prove too rosy. Analysts see risks to their forecasts, primarily the possibility that tensions in the Middle East could cause oil prices to surge given the deteriorating crisis in Iraq.

Surging energy prices have preceded earlier economic slowdowns, including the most recent recession.

Oil prices rise

The price of crude oil rose Wednesday as news that the U.S. government is selectively allowing exports of certain light oils offset an unexpected increase in the nation's supply of oil.

Benchmark U.S. crude for August delivery rose 47 cents to \$106.50 per barrel on the New York Mercantile Exchange. Brent crude, used to price international oils, dropped 46 cents to \$114 a barrel in London.

In other energy futures trading on the Nymex:

- Wholesale gasoline fell 3 cents to \$3.09 a gallon.
- Natural gas rose 2 cents to \$4.55 per 1,000 cubic feet.
- Heating oil fell 1 cent to \$3.03 a gallon.

Other metals traded higher Wednesday. Silver for July rose 7 cents to \$21.12 an ounce. Copper for July rose 2 cents to \$3.17 a pound.

Platinum for July rose \$1.30 to \$1,473.20 an ounce, while palladium for September rose \$2.85 to \$833.25 an ounce.

To find out the size of your heart, make a fist with one hand. This is about the size of your heart.

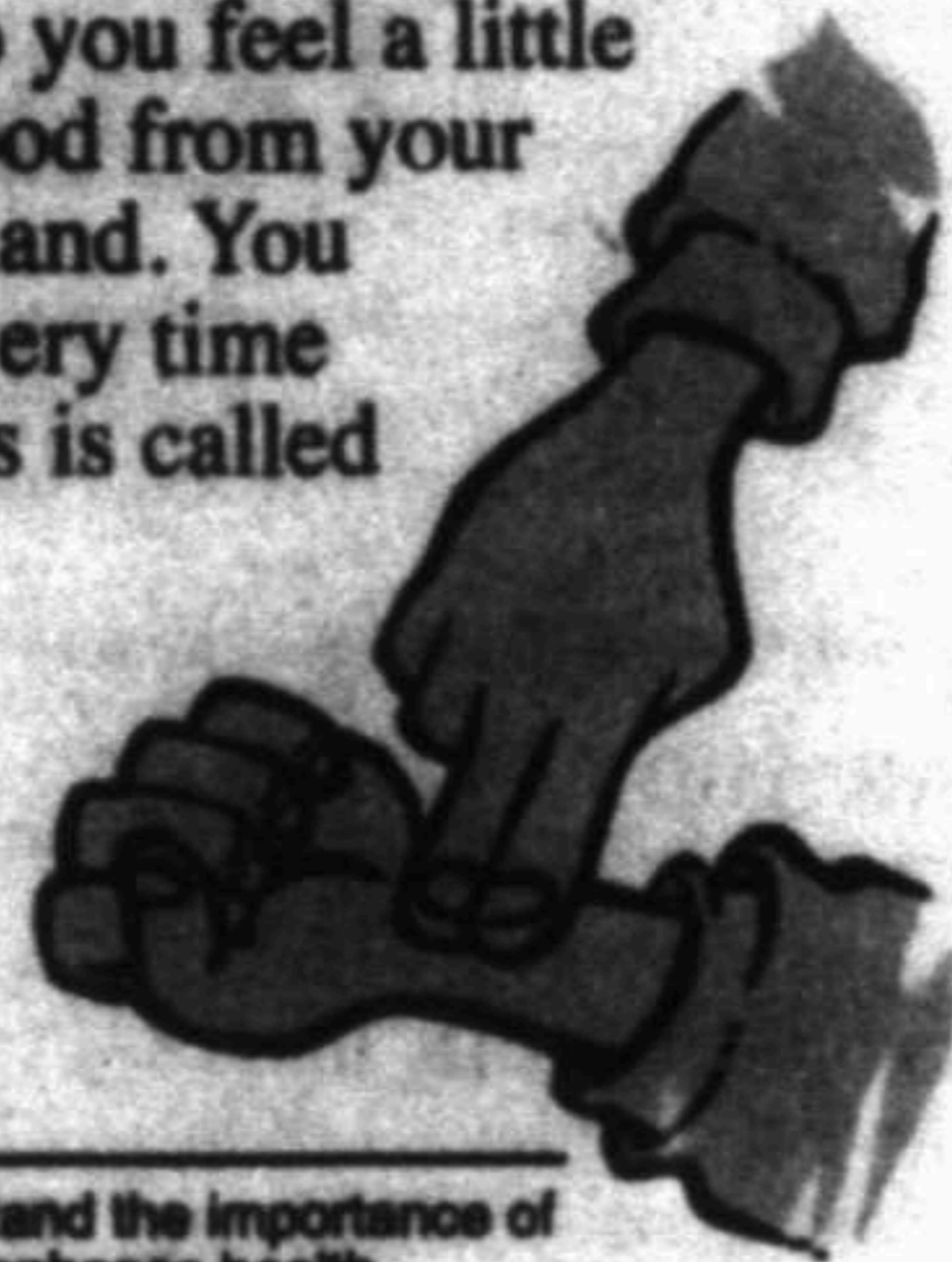
