Enforcement Of City Ordinance Is the Only Way

The following article was written for the Daily Press by a Cisco man, at the suggestion of members of the Cisco fire department:

One of these days, at long last, the Cisco fire boys will be the first to get to a fire!

When that happens the department is going to hold a celebration. It will probably be when everybody else has gone to a bathing revue, or a murder, or something more exciting. But at any rate it will represent success in the hardest, the longest, the most exasperating effort that the department is making—the effort to do its duty!

If you would see how thin the veneer of civilization is, just hang around the fire department one of these dry, hot days until the fire alarm rings. In a twinkling, in a breath, the street is scurrying with a mob of curious. The volunteer fire boys, running to their stations, will have to dodge half a dozen cars milling about and waiting for one of the trucks to point the direction. Someone shouts the street and number where the fire is located and, zip!—off takes the whole mob of insanity, like a jet job on a speed test. In a second the lane to the fire is choked with cars! The fire trucks, straining to get to the blaze before it is too late have to throttle down, pick their way cautiously through the excited traffic, and sometimes stop entirely—completely baffled, blocked off from doing their duty!

For instance: Tuesday afternoon at 6 o'clock a barn burned on the Base Line road three-fourths of a mile east of D avenue. From D avenue to the scene of the fire—three-quarters of a mile—cars were parked two and three deep—drawn to the fire because

in most cases their drivers were quivering with excitement to see a neighbor's property destroyed for the thrill of it! (That's true, whether the spectator will admit it or not! He can't do a bit of good—all he can do, is watch and get in the way. He accomplishes the latter with magnificent efficiency.) In the case of the burning barn Tuesday evening there was no chance at all for the trucks to leave the blaze, and if there had been another fire, at least an hour would have elapsed before they could have gone to it, for the swarm of cars and spectators so cluttered up the scene that it was next to impossible for a goat cart to maneuver.

Caught in that jam were numbers of cars of volunteer fire boys who were trying to do the job they volunteer to do and get no pay for—a job of community service.

It is not the first time such a thing has happened. When the Moseley Broom Factory burned more than a year ago the same condition occurred. Cars of spectators had to be pushed out of the way so that the trucks could get to the fire plugs to make hose connections!

What a disgrace! The fire boys are plenty burned up about this state of things. Suppose, Mr. or Miss Thrill-seeker, they say, it is your property that is furnishing the entertainment for this crowd? That would put a different light on the subject, wouldn't it? Some day it may be!

The above instances are simply illustrative. Almost any fire alarm, particularly those which occur after work hours, will furnish examples of a mental holiday as serious as these—perhaps more so. The department is concerned with the fact that unless this practice is stopped, loss not only of houses, but of cars and perhaps lives, may occur!

What the fire boys ask is that every person in Cisco who has no duty to perform in connection with fire fighting, make and keep a resolution to let the fire department have the right-of-way and plenty of room to do its work at the scene of a blaze.

The proper course for traffic, when the alarm rings, is to: pull out of the street to the curb and wait!

That is the required course—the course that is rigidly enforced in some cities.

There are ordinances to control this situation, but no one wishes to deal harshly with people who ought to show better sense. All the boys want is a chance to do their duty. They don't get paid for it, they are performing a vital public service without recompense. Should it be necessary to wait until some public tragedy bludgeons the city with the fact of a terrible necessity before we learn to STAY OUT OF THE WAY OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT?

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SENATORS' POCKETBOOKS.

Senator Wayne Morse of Oregon has a good idea. He would require every senator to file a public statement of his income, tax returns and dealings in securities and commodities. He has in mind not only the May case, but the frequent charges that legislators have private businesses which are affected by proposed laws, and that nevertheless they do not hesitate to vote on them. Some Senators recently passed several bills

who should have refrained from voting on certain bills because their pocketbooks were directly affected.

This is an old evil. Many tariff laws contained steel, sugar, wool and cotton clauses which directly benefited certain senators. Had a century ago Senator Matthew S. Quay of Pennsylvania openly admitted to speculation in sugar while the sugar tariff was up in Congress.

Publicity such as Senator Morse suggests would diminish the likelihood of senators voting in favor of their own pocketbooks.

PUBLIC MEN'S PAPERS.

The letters and papers of William Allen White, the late Kansas newspaper editor and friend of many public men, have been left to the Library of Congress. This is a praiseworthy custom followed by many presidents and officials for the use of future historians.

Conspicuous as an exception in recent years are the private papers of President Harding. Mrs. Harding destroyed these meticulously. It is doing the performance a serious disservice not only to the nation but to her husband's memory. Whenever her intention, she assumed suspicion that the papers would have revealed something discreditable.

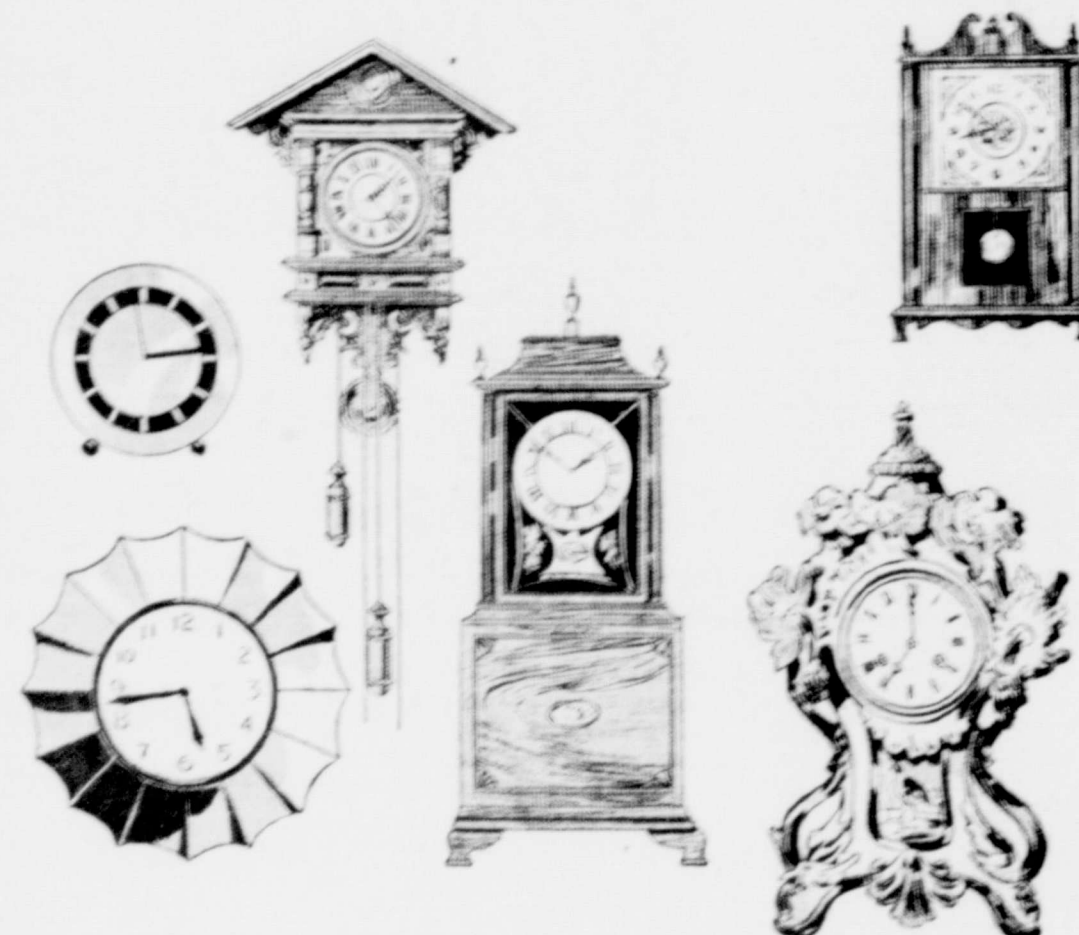
