Lion Officers To Be Installed Tuesday

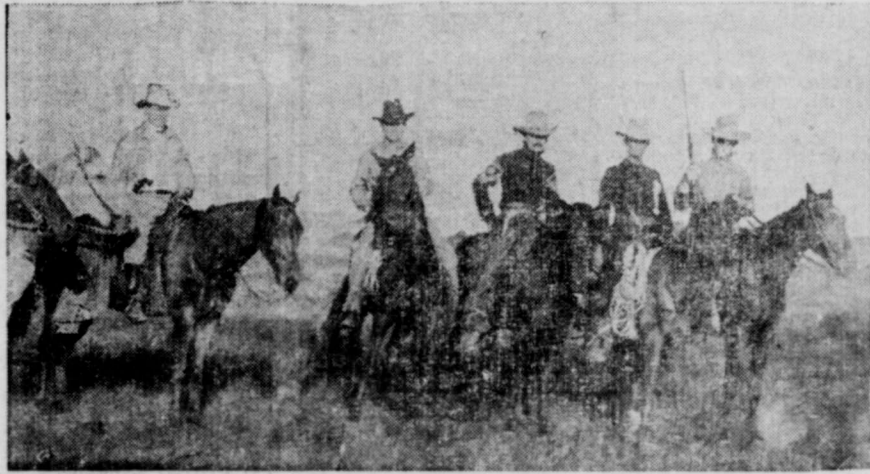
Officers for the new year for the Loraine Lions Club will be installed at the regular meeting of the club at noon June 26.

S. A. Walker, 96 Buried Here Sunday

Sgt. Earl McCoy Dies In Auto Crash In Iowa Thursday

M. Sgt. Earl McCoy, 36, was killed Thursday at 2:30 a. m., June 14, in an automobile crash near Davenport, Iowa.

Sgt. McCoy and his wife, the former Georgia Coley, and their seven year old daughter, Nora, arrived in Loraine on June 1, and Mrs. McCoy and daughter remained for a visit with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Willie Coley, when Sgt. McCoy left Monday afternoon for Scott Field, St. Louis, Missouri, where he was to enter the hospital for surgery on his hand. After doctors there decided to have the surgery at a later date, Sgt. McCoy left for his base at Bemidji, Minnesota. The accident occurred when the McCoy car and another car were involved in a collision. One of the two occupants of the other car was also killed and the other seriously injured. Details of the accident are not known.

Sgt. McCoy was born February 21, 1920, at Rowden, Texas, and had lived in the Loraine community several years and married Miss Georgia Coley here on February 18, 1942. He had served in the U. S. Air Force 14 years. During this time he spent 26 months assignment on Guam and 30 months in Japan. Mrs. Coley and the daughter had spent 13 months with him on Guam and 22 months in Japan while he was stationed there.

They returned to the States in July, 1955, and have been stationed at the Minneapolis base since, where he expected to be stationed for three years and had bought a home there.

Funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church at 4 p. m. Wednesday with the pastor, Rev. Bobbie Rine, officiating assisted by Chaplain W. H. Baker from Webb Air Force Base, Big Spring.

A military service was conducted by personnel from the Big Spring base. Interment was in the Loraine Cemetery under direction of Kiker and Son.

Seven Steps To Insect Control

Texas farmers may be living in the modern era, but many of his problems are as old as history.

And about this time each year, the farmer starts his ageless battle with a familiar enemy—crop pests.

Fortunately, the chemical industry can furnish effective implements in this unending war. But their real utility is no better than the way they are used.

Chemical control of insects—and weeds—can be a boon or a bust, depending upon methods and time of application. Just as irrigation can be wasteful or beneficial, so can crop spraying or dusting.

It will be to the farmer's advantage to follow an organized method of crop treatment for the best insect control. The best plan will be to contact your county agent and study the seven-step program as set up by the Texas Extension Service.

Much effectiveness of spraying or dusting is nullified by poor timing. Treatment on a "guess basis" often catches harmful insects in the pupa stage when insecticides and pesticides have little or no effect. It may also

do away with some of the useful type insects.

The seven-step program varies over the state but each area of Texas has a definite plan set up according to local climatic and insect conditions. This type of spraying assures the farmer of getting the most benefit out of money spent for insect control.

Although most insect infestations are expected to be approximately "normal" this year, one pest stands out as a threat in near plague proportions—the grasshopper. This spring the state and federal governments are carrying out an all-out fight against hoppers on range lands of the panhandle and West Texas. But cultivated land is the farmer's own battlefield. Quick control of this pest can save many thousands of dollars in crops this year.

A word of caution about chemical preparation! Although the chemical industry has taken every precaution to make them safe as possible, some of them can be harmful if misused.

Read and study the manufacturers' recommended measures of use. They are printed on every container—and are meant to be followed.

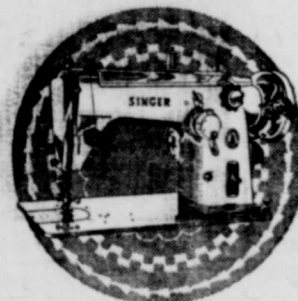

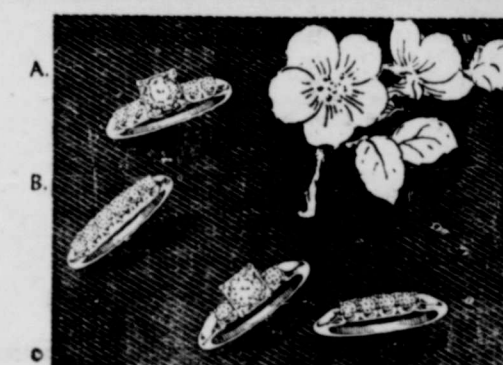

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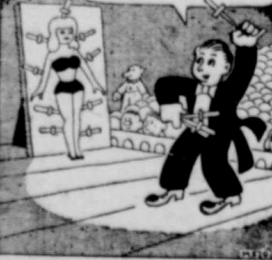

Farmers Will Soon Get Refund Of Federal Gasoline Tax

Farmers will soon be able to obtain a refund of the federal excise tax on gasoline which is used on a farm for farming purposes under a new law. Present federal tax rate is 2 cents a gallon.

Mr. A. E. Fogle, Jr., administrative officer in charge of the Abilene office, announced today that under the new law first refund payments will be made after June 30 on gasoline purchased and used during the first six months of 1956. Thereafter, refunds will be made for a one-year period from July 1 to June 30.

To get his refund, a farmer will have to file his claim after June 30 and before October 1. Claims are to be made on Form 240 and are to be filed with the United States District Office of Internal Revenue for the farmer's district. Forms will be available after June 1 at Internal Revenue offices, county agricultural agents, and at some banks and post offices.

Refunds will be limited to the federal tax on gasoline which is used by a farmer for farming purposes, in carrying on a trade or business, on a farm located in the United States. A farmer may also request a refund of the tax on any gasoline which is used on his farm by a custom operator or a neighbor in connection with cultivating the soil or raising or harvesting any agricultural or horticultural commodity.

Mr. Fogle explains that gasoline shall be considered used for farming purposes if it is used: (1) By the farmer or any other person in connection with cultivating the soil, or raising or harvesting any agricultural or horticultural commodity, including the raising of livestock, poultry, etc., on the farmer's own farm. (2) By the farmer in the operation, management, conservation, improvement, or maintenance of his farm or its tools or equipment. (3) By the farmer in handling, drying, packing, grading, or storing any agricultural or horticultural commodity in its unmanufactured state, but only if the farmer produced more than one-half of the commodity which he so treated during the period for which the claim is filed. (4) By the farmer in connection with the planting, cultivating, caring for, or cutting of trees, or the preparation (other than sawing into lumber, chipping, or other milling) of trees for market, but only if the planting, etc., is incidental to his farming operations.

No refunds of tax are allowed on gasoline used off the farm, such as gasoline used on public roads or highways in transporting family members or workmen, equipment, livestock, crops, feed, etc. Also, no refunds are allowed for tax on gasoline used in processing, packing, freezing, or canning operations.

Farmers are also given special relief from the federal excise tax on diesel fuel and special motor fuels used on a farm for farming purposes.

"Farmers who expect to file claims should keep sufficient records to enable the Internal Revenue Service to verify the accuracy of the amount claimed," Mr. Fogle cautioned.

Farmers Urged To Watch For Pests

W. L. Owen, Jr., Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and F. M. Fuller, Jr., Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Co-operation with Plant Pest Control Branch, U.S.D.A., report: Light to occasional heavy rain fell over the area during the past week. Where rains were heavy, insect infestations were often reduced to a marked degree. Since thrips continued to move into cotton fields in large numbers, infestations often built up rapidly following the heavy rains.

Thrips continued to be the major problem in most locations. Infestations ranged from light on scattered late planted cotton, to medium or heavy in most other fields. Damage was generally easily detected by very small and deformed leaves, many of which had irregular holes. Where cotton had reached the stage of squaring, the presence of tiny dead squares and an excessive number of small leaves also indicated thrip damage. Thrips were generally present in large numbers. Such damage indicated a need for immediate control in many untreated fields.

Where good insecticide applications were made, thrips have been satisfactorily controlled. In some cases where the insects have continued to migrate to cotton fields in large numbers, the interval between treatments has been shortened to five or six days. Poor control has usually been the result of improper application. Good applications will be secured when spray nozzles are operated only high enough above plants to secure complete coverage. This distance has been found to be six to eight inches above the plants. Cone type nozzles should be used with only one nozzle to each row. Sprays should be applied at sixty pounds pressure.

Fleahoppers were reported in light infestations on early planted cotton. The insects were not found in sufficient numbers to require control. Occasional light infestations of spider mites were found in parts of a few fields in Lubbock and Terry Counties. Aphids also appeared in light infestations in occasional fields. Grasshoppers were reported from Lamb County and in heavy infestations in Northwest Mitchell County.

Information contained in the Cotton Insect Situation release has been compiled from reports received from county agents, vocational agricultural teachers, personnel of Texas A & M. College System, various branches of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Commercial Cotton Inspectors, Chemical Companies and others.

Speed Demons Cause Accidents

"Arrive Alive—Slow Down and Live!"

That's the slogan of the current speed control program which the Texas Safety Ass'n., the Department of Public Safety and the National Safety Council are sponsoring this month in cooperation with the "Slow Down and Live" program of the National Conference of State Safety Coordinators. It's also a pretty good maxim for any motorist to live by.

In commenting on the program, E. C. McFadden of Dallas, Vice President of Employers Casualty Company and President of the Texas Safety Association, stressed the necessity of impressing the average driver with the importance of setting his speed to suit the prevailing conditions.

"Much has been said about the speed demon's role in the traffic accident toll, and rightly so," McFadden said. "But too many people lose sight of the fact that many drivers invite accidents by driving at speeds too fast for conditions, even though these speeds are far below what is thought of as 'burning up the road.'"

McFadden said the average driver should check constantly to see that his speed is safe for conditions of weather, traffic, road, the mechanical condition of his car and his own physical and mental condition at the time.

"Much of the dangerous haste that involves ordinary drivers in traffic accidents comes from the too-prevalent habit of not allowing enough time for the daily schedule," he said. "Trying to make up a few minutes in traffic can be deadly."

He pointed out that the driver who is obsessed with making time will not slow down for heavy traffic, slippery or rough roads, reduced visibility, fatigue or other physical disability. Moreover, his preoccupation with the time element impairs his judgment.

"My advice to drivers is to allow enough time to make the journey without pressure," McFadden said. "If you do happen to get a late start, don't try to make up time on the way. It's better to get there late than not at all!"

Questions and Answers

Q. I interrupted my Korean GI schooling to return to active military service. I expect to be in uniform more than a year. Will I be allowed to resume my education after I get out, even though my cut-off date for starting GI training will have passed?

A. Yes. Veterans who suspend Korean GI training for more than 12 months, because of military service, will be permitted to continue training after their discharge. Ordinarily, a veteran who suspends for more than 12 months must prove to VA that the suspension was due to reasons beyond his control.

Q. I entered the armed forces under the 1955 Reserve Forces Act. Will I be covered by the Servicemen's Indemnity while I am in service?

A. Yes. You will be automatically covered against death in service for \$10,000. This free indemnity will continue for 50 days after you are released from service.

Q. Does the Public Law 16 training program for disabled World War 2 veterans end for all veterans on July 25, 1955? Or are there exceptions?

A. There are certain exceptions. Veterans will be allowed up to an additional four years to complete their training, if they were unable to start in time because of their disability; if they were late in establishing service connection, or if they were late in obtaining a corrected discharge that would make them eligible.

Q. Can a veteran receive GI training under the Korean GI Bill while he is in uniform?

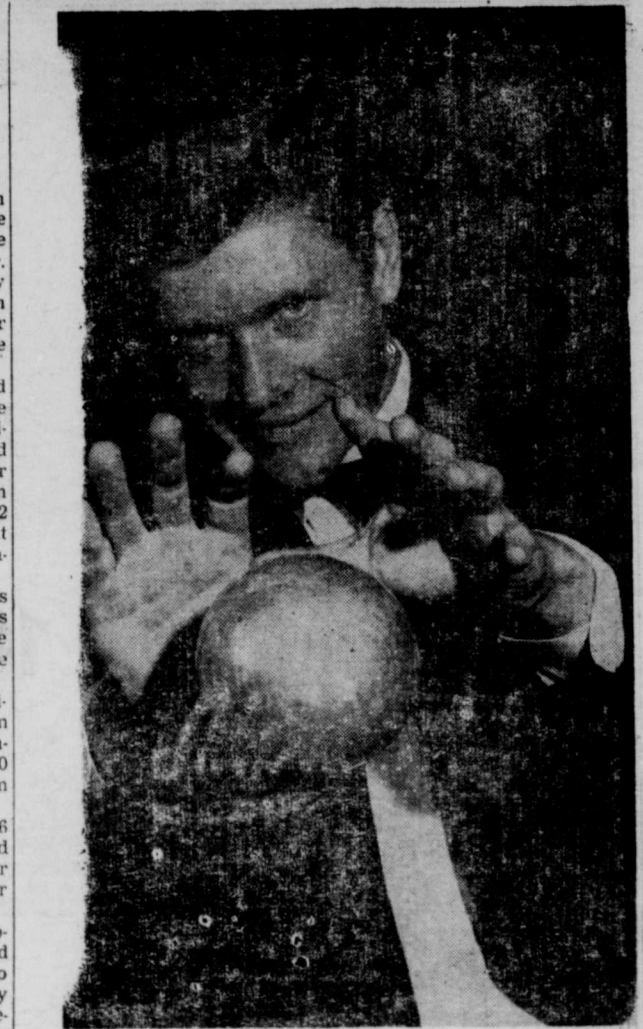
A. Under the law, he may not receive Korean GI Bill training while in uniform, even though he might meet all the qualifications as to discharge and length and time of service.

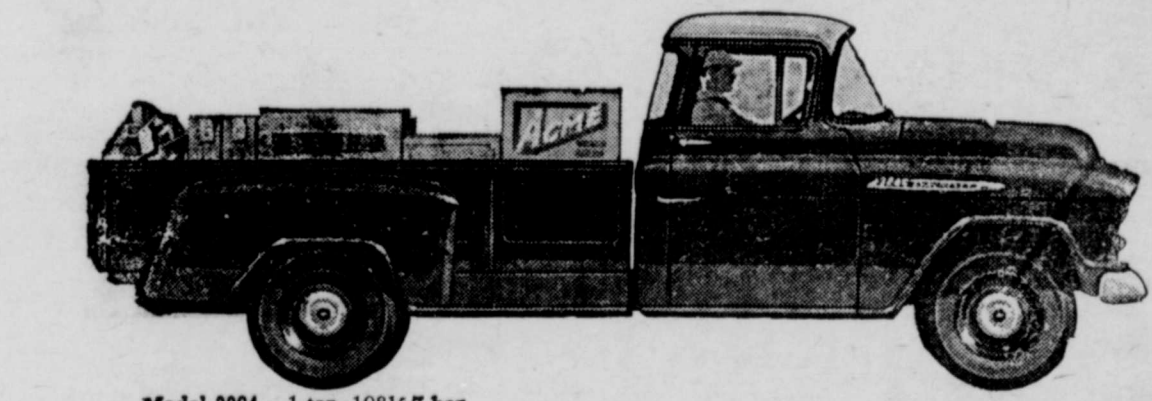

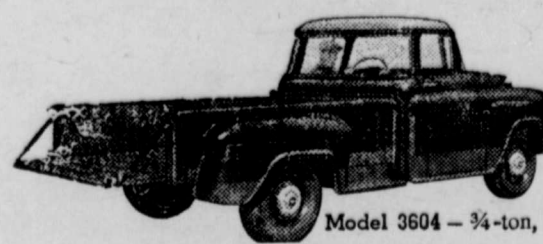
