Coaches Praise Local Athletes

Local coaches outlined their objectives and heaped praise on Tahoka school athletes in talks before the Rotary Club last Thursday.

A.J. Viertel, new athletic director and head football coach declared Tahoka has the "cleanest, finest young men on the football squad that I have ever been associated with."

The coach said the boys have a good attitude, and he hopes to instill in them principles of good citizenship.

He hopes to help them build confidence in self, each other, the system, and the team, and to believe deep in their hearts they can win.

Coach Viertel asked fans for their support, encouragement to the boys, and give both players and coaches benefit of the doubt in case of errors instead of being critical.

Al McMillan, head basketball coach, echoed the head coach's sentiments, and declared he will use the full court press. There will be five boys' teams playing 70 games, including varsity, junior varsity, ninth, eighth, and seventh grades.

Cecil Robinson, girls coach, said his girls will operate under the full court press, run and shoot. Although weak in depth and size, the A squad will have quickness and ability. There are 39 girls out for the varsity squad, including three seniors, and 12 each from the junior, sophomore and freshman classes.

Ronnie Fawls and Jerry Windham are the assistant coaches. J.D. Atwell was in charge of the program.

The park north of Tahoka, and those at Cuero, Mt. Pleasant and Newton were the other finalists.

Judging was supposed to have been based largely on the basis of the most done to preserve and enhance the beauty of the roadside parks. The other four finalist parks were in natural settings built around trees and a natural landscape, while Lynn County's roadside park has been developed "from scratch" on the "bald prairie" under most adverse conditions such as water shortage, drought, and sandstorms.

Bulldogs Lose Conference Opener To Frenship, 19-8

The tough Tahoka Bulldogs lost their conference opener to Frenship in a heartbreaker last Friday night. The Bulldogs, not outplayed, but overpowered, played a brilliant game against the Frenship gridgers.

The Bulldogs held Frenship on the first series of downs after kickoff. The Bulldogs then took the ball on their own 38 and marched 62 yards in 9 plays for a 6-pointer with Larry Durham and Robert Montemayor carrying for 21. Cliff Gardner, Tahoka quarterback, then faded back and threw a pass to end Gene Walker for a 34 yard pass play to the 7 yard line of the Tigers. The Bulldogs then scored a scoring pass for 6 points to Roger Miller for the TD. Larry Durham bucked the center of the Tiger Line for 2 pts. giving the Bulldogs a 8-0 lead at the end of the first stanza.

The Tigers were not to be denied a score in the 2nd period as they marched 50 yards for a score. On two running plays and two pass plays the Tigers quarterback Kim Morris threw a 28 yard scoring pass to end Tom Durham. Halfback Clyde Strong failed to make the PAT on a running play.

Reggie Stark then put Frenship in the hole with a 54 yard quick kick, leaving the Bulldogs with a 2 point edge at halftime.

Neither team was able to score in the third quarter but two Frenship drives were stopped by heads-up fumble recoveries by Danny Martinez and Billy Jolly.

Early in the fourth period, Frenship marched 71 yards for

a touchdown with rugged Joe Rogans and Roy Cuellar carrying most of the way. After 12 plays, halfback Rick Holder, taking a pitch out went around right end 14 yards to score. Again the run for conversion failed for the Tigers putting out front of the Bulldogs 12-8.

Later in the fourth, Tahoka made a goal line stand after Strong intercepted a Tahoka pass on Tahoka's 40 and ran the ball to the Bulldog 7. Four plays and two yards later the Bulldogs took over on their 5. Montemayor then ran the ball out to the Tahoka 24, but the blue team then lost the ball

due to incomplete passes with 1 minute 27 seconds left on the scoreboard clock. As time was running out the Tigers scored again when Strong ran around his left end for a six-pointer. The Tigers kicked the PAT to wind up the game with a 19-8 conference win.

The Bulldogs will go against Denver City this week at Denver City. Denver City won their first game of the season last week in their conference opener by defeating Slaton 8-0. The Mustangs lost their first three

outings to Brownfield, Seminole and Jal, while the Bulldogs won their first two outings against Stanton and Crosbyton and lost the last two to Olton and Frenship.

National 4-H Club Week Is This Week

"We Care." That's what more than 3 million boys and girls across the nation will be saying during National 4-H Club Week, October 4-10.

Who are they? About 394 live right here in Lynn County and approximately 90,000 are Texans, reports County Agent Bill Griffin.

The 9 to 19 year-old youths do more than just talk about caring. They show their interest and concern by working on community and county projects of many kinds. They take advantage of the opportunities which membership in 4-H provides for them and then do their best in carrying out assigned responsibilities.

4-H Club members have long been engaged in programs aimed at making their homes and communities better places in which to live. The county agent said their projects help them learn-by-doing, including combatting poverty, malnutrition and the pollution of our environment.

The county agent noted that 4-H'ers are enrolled in educational programs the youth phase of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, which aim to give members basic training not only in their projects but in leadership and citizenship responsibilities as well. Membership in 4-H is not limited to rural boys and girls.

In fact, noted Griffin, a sizeable percentage of the Nation's total enrollment is made up of boys and girls who live in urban areas, many from the heart of our major cities. New project programs are being constantly added in order to interest youth who do not have the space nor facilities to carry out farm related projects. Griffin said. Electronics, automotive, wood working, science, dog care and training, bicycling, money management, clothing health and nutrition are among the many projects open to urban boys and girls.

Full details on what 4-H is all about and its training programs are available from the county Extension office, Griffin said. In fact, he added, any of the local agents would be happy to discuss 4-H programs with interested youth and their parents.

Warnings concerning fatty acid in 1969 growing season were stated by Ronnie Nettles manager of Farmers coop gin at the Farmers Coop annual meeting and has been publicized by the agriculture department in many publications. Fatty acid deteriorates the germination in the cottonseed.

State And County Tax Payment Period Begins

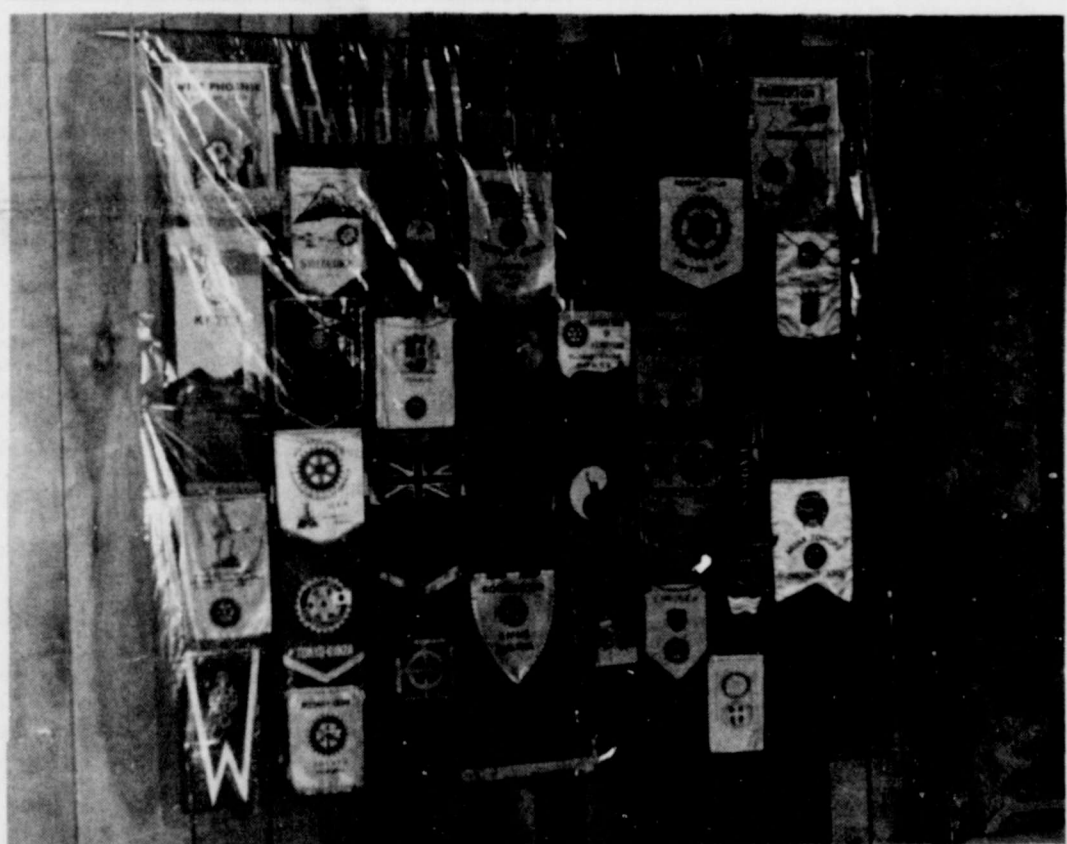

Registered Nurse Shortage Hurts Small Town Hospitals

Registered nursing shortage was discussed at a meeting held in Lubbock Wednesday, September 30, 1970. Don Clanton,

Administrator of the new Lynn County Hospital, attended the meeting. Also present at the meeting were several state representatives including E.L. Short of Tahoka; Delwin Jones, Elmer Tarbox and Mac McAllister all of Lubbock; and Dick Cory of Victoria. Administrators from small hospitals in the South Plains region were also in attendance. Mr. Roy Ayers, Texas Hospital Association met with the group.

Mr. Dick Cory, state representative from Victoria, reported that many state representatives and senators were very concerned about the shortage of registered nurses in small hospitals all over the state. The Health Careers Program of Texas has told us that Texas is 10,000 R.N.'s short and that we are gaining 1250 a year. In order for a hospital to comply with Medicare standards, that hospital must have 42 R.N.s on its payroll. Our U.S. Senators both have a bill before the Senate which, if passed, would exclude hospitals under 50 beds from this regulation.

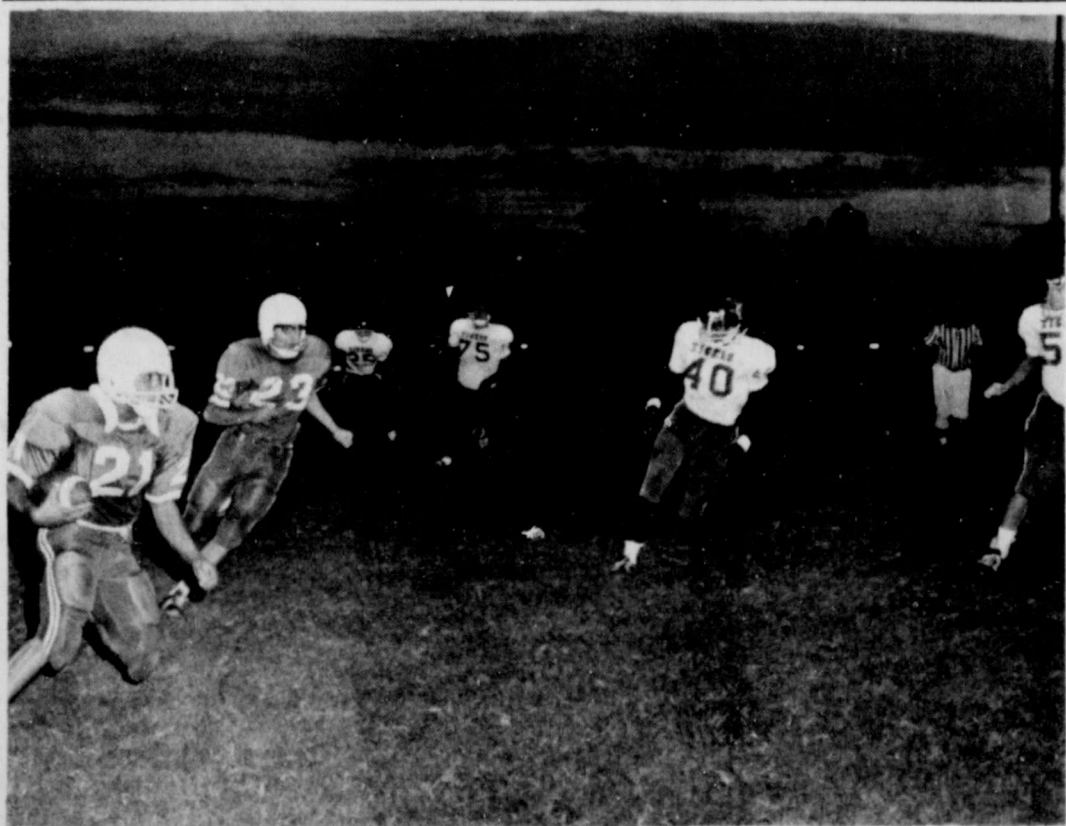
The two bills were introduced late and probably will not be acted upon in this session of Congress. A temporary measure is to try to get the Social Security Administration (Medicare) to change their regulation concerning registered nurses. This would not mean that medical care received in small hospital would be substandard. The problem facing most small hospitals is that R.N.'s generally want to live in large cities rather than smaller rural cities.

Don Clanton and several other interested citizens have already written Senator John Tower and Ralph Yarborough and Representative George Mahon. All citizens are urged to write these men expressing their support for this change in medicare regulation.

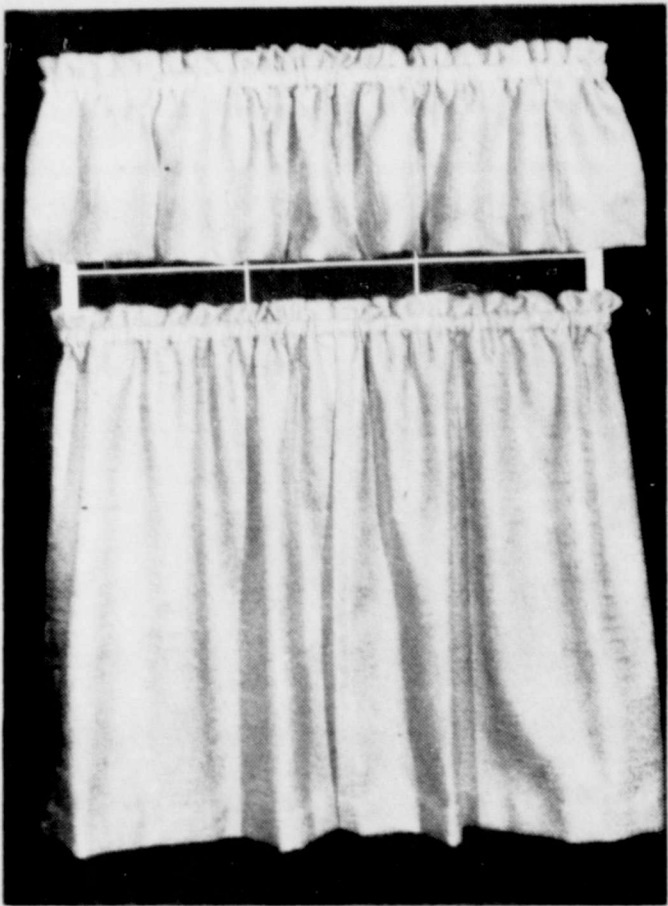

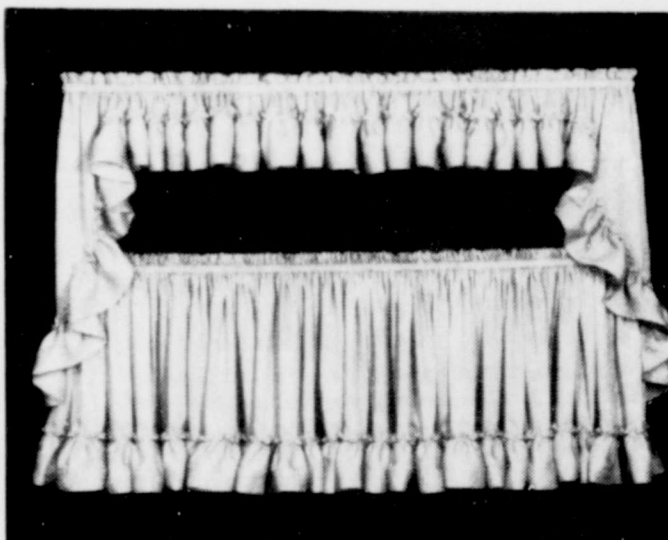
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Grassland News

**Linda Huffaker,

Says....**

Crushed patents, a favorite fabric for rain garments and sportswear, requires special techniques for sewing advises Linda Huffaker county home demonstration agent.

A pattern with few seams makes it easier to manipulate the vinyl-type fabric. Raglan or kimono sleeves are easiest but some of the crushed patents are soft and pliable enough to sew set-in sleeves.

The pattern should be altered to fit before the garment is cut. Seams cannot be let out without damage to the fabric.

When fastening the pattern to the fabric, place pins in seam allowances only or tape the pattern to the fabric. Cut with sharp shears.

Mark darts, seamlines and other construction details with chalk or a pencil on the wrong side of the fabric. Use a grease pencil when making markings on the right side. These can easily be wiped off.

A medium-sized machine needle and 10 to 12 stitches per inch

are satisfactory for top stitching on crushed patents. A piece of tissue paper placed between the shiny or right side of the fabric and the feed-dog of the machine prevents damage to the fabric when stitching. The tissue paper can easily be torn away when stitching is completed.

Finger press seams and darts, unless the label on the bolt or roll of crushed patents states that the fabric can be pressed with steam or a warm iron. Both zippers and buttonholes

can be used on crushed patents. The centered application makes a flat zipper closing.

Hems can be top stitched or slip stitched in place to the backing of the fabric.

Follow the fabric manufacturer's care recommendations for cleaning. Some vinyl-like fabrics can be hand washed, while others need to be wiped clean with a damp cloth. If linings are used in the garment, they should require the same care as the outer fabrics.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK
Crescent apple snacks
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1 large apple peeled and cored
1 can (8 oz.) refrigerator quick crescent dinner rolls
Oil

Heat oil to 360 degrees. Combine sugar and cinnamon. Slice apple into 16 pieces. Separate crescent dough into 8 triangles; cut in half. Place 1 apple slice on each triangle. Roll up; start at shortest side of triangle and roll to opposite point, completely covering apple, sealing all edges well. In fry pan or large sauce pan, fry in 2 or 3 inches hot oil about 2 to 3 minutes until deep golden brown. Drain on paper towel. While still warm, roll in cinnamon sugar mixture.

A.S.C.S. NEWS

The following press release was issued in Washington October 2 at 1:30 p.m. and was just received by Bertice P. Askew, Chairman of the Lynn County ASC Committee.

A mail referendum on 1971 crop wheat marketing quotas will be conducted October 12-15, Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin announced today. In the absence of the new legislation for the 1971 wheat crop, current law requires that the referendum be held. However, a second congressional resolution like one initiated July 24, 1970, could result in a further postponement of the referendum. This congressional action could take place at any time prior to the start of a referendum on October 12.

Individual allotment notices will be mailed to about 1.6 million persons holding an interest in established farm wheat allotments.

Signed ballots need to be mailed or delivered to the county offices by October 15, 1970. Preliminary results of the referendum will be compiled and announced by USDA on or shortly after October 20.

Secretary Hardin announced April 14, 1970, a national wheat marketing quota of 1,210 million bushels and a national allotment of 43.5 million acres.

A two-thirds or more "yes" vote for marketing quotas would bring a domestic marketing certificate, valued at \$1.39 per

bushel, the total price support on that portion of the crop would be \$2.54 per bushel -- percent of parity as of July 1970. Domestic certificates would be issued subject to parity.

If the referendum fails to carry, the price-support rate would be mandatory at percent of July 1971 parity. This would be \$1.41 per bushel based on current parity. Only only would be available to producers remaining within the 1971 allotment acreages.

Program details necessary for producer participation in a mail referendum on marketing quotas were announced July 1970. The referendum, originally scheduled for July 27-31, was postponed July 24 by a congressional resolution.

The resolution provided that the referendum could be postponed not later than October 15, 30 days after Congress adjourned, which ever was earlier.

Spraying operations in the High Plains Diapause Boll Weevil Control Program this year have gone "exceptionally well" and weevil populations in the control zone have been greatly reduced, according to Ed Dean, Field Service Director of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., the organization responsible for the program.

Four applications of ultra low volume Malathion, a chemical with almost non-existent toxicity to anything but insects, have now been completed. The first three went on at seven day intervals and were followed by another application 12 days later, Dean Reports. Spraying will continue on the 12 day schedule until frost where necessary.

Spraying began September 1 this year and spray planes covered 108,000 acres of weevil infested cotton in less than five days. Weevil migration from outside the control zone into previously weevil free cotton brought the spray area for the second and third applications up to 136,000 and 145,000 acres, respectively. Total acreage sprayed in the fourth application has not been calculated, but the estimate runs to 175,000 or 180,000 acres.

The fourth dose of insecticide took in around 20,000 to 30,000 additional acres in Briscoe, Motley and Hall Counties on the North end of the control zone where earlier weevil populations had been too low to justify spraying. Also included in the most recent spraying were 14,000 to 15,000 acres where weevils have been found in Southwest Dawson, Northwest Martin, South Gaines and South Andrews Counties.

"We have had better weather for spraying this year than any year since the program began in 1964," Dean stated, "and performance on the part of spray contractors has never been better."

The first three rapid-fire shots at the weevil are designed to break his reproductive cycle. Later applications are to kill remaining weevils before they can go into hibernations for the winter.

Dean notes that 175,000 or 180,000 acres in all probability will be the peak size of this year's control zone. Acreage to be sprayed in the fifth and sixth applications will begin to decline as cotton in some fields will be reaching the stage at which it no longer provides a food supply for the pests. The overall objective of the program is to keep weevils from going into hibernation and coming out the following spring to attack crops. And weevils cannot achieve the fat, dormant "diapause" condition necessary to overwinter without an adequate food supply.

As of this writing the farm bill that has been kicked around in Washington for the past 18 months or so is still lodged, if not stuck, in a Senate-House Conference Committee.

Circumstances surrounding efforts of Conferees to reach a compromise acceptable to the body of the House, the body of the Senate and the Administration are more than a little complicated. And there is no evidence that a quick or easy solution to the complications will be found soon.

Conferees from the two Houses of Congress, left alone and without having to consider Administration views, could probably reach agreement with little delay. But, when the Conference report goes to the floor of the House and Senate for approval, the Administration will be swinging a big stick. So their views of necessity are an integral part of Conference deliberations.

The big reason for the difficulty in meeting Administration standards in Conference can be summed up in a single word - money. In effect USDA and Republican leadership, particularly in the House, have said they would oppose anything which promises to cost more than the House version. And indications are that opposition from that quarter would send the farm bill from the floor of the House back to Conference Committee. Not only would such an eventuality cloud the possibility of passing a farm bill this year, it would greatly enhance the possibility of a \$20,000 per person limitation of payments going through on the Agricultural Appropriations Bill.

Observers now think it possible, but not too probable, that the Conference Committee can finish its work by Friday, October 2.

Tuesday, September 29 will be a big day in Lubbock for High Plains Cotton producers, allied businessmen and their ladies.

Scruggs, "Action Editor" of Progressive Farmer Magazine, is expected to issue a stern challenge to High Plains cotton people. Title of his address will be "Run With The Ball - Or Get Out Of The Game."

Scruggs will be followed on the program by J. Dukes Wooters, newly appointed executive vice president and general manager of Cotton Producers Institute, who will speak on "The Forward Look For Cotton." CPI is the national organization carrying out a \$10 million a year, producer financed program of consumer and technical research and market development for cotton.

Wooters came to CPI in June of this year from the top echelon merchandising staff of Readers Digest, and since that time has stimulated considerable new thinking within the industry. PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson said "Coming as he does from outside the cotton industry, Mr. Wooters has some refreshing and encouraging ideas about cotton product development and merchandising, and it will be well worth our time to get better acquainted with those ideas."

The PCG Board will meet immediately after adjournment of the membership meeting to elect officers for the 1970-71 year. Current officers are Donnell Echols of Lamesa, President; Ray Joe Riley of Hart, vice president, and Paul Bennett of Littlefield, secretary-treasurer. All are eligible for reelection.

The luncheon for the ladies at the Student Union Building will feature a three part program. Mrs. Mada Johnston, internationally known textiles author and lecturer, will give a presentation titled "Methods of Applying Design to Cotton Fabrics." Miss Lawanna Walker, Home Economist with the National Cotton Council, will do a fabric fashion bit called "Fall In With Cotton." And a foods demonstration, emphasizing the utilization of cottonseed flour in food for human consumption, will be given by Mrs. Margarette Hardin, Instructor and Research Associate with the Foods and Nutrition Department at Texas Tech.

Congressmen Investigating Mail Service

The 16th District's Congressman, Richard C. White of El Paso, announced this week that the Post Office and Civil Service Committee of the U. S. House of Representatives is conducting an investigation of mail service in Texas.

Congressman White was joined by Congressman Graham Purcell of Wichita Falls in calling for the investigation. Purcell is the only other Texas congressman on the committee.

"We want to see whether the economics achieved justify the decrease in service. We want to know whether the poor service noted in our state is general throughout the nation, or whether it is being imposed upon our area as a test to determine how much poor service the public will accept."

To get the answers, staff members of the Post Office and Civil Service Committee are visiting several parts of Texas this week, including Regional Headquarters of the Post Office Department in Dallas.

They will visit the 16th District, and will be in El Paso Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, October 1, 2 and 3. Residents of the 16th District who would like to confer with them are invited to call Rep. White's El Paso office. Interviews will be held October 2nd in his office in the U. S. Courthouse.

In announcing the investigation, Rep. White said: "I would like to make it clear that this is not in any sense an investigation of the Postmasters in my District and the way they conduct their offices. Each irregularity noted thus far is based upon directives received from the higher echelons of the Postal System and imposed upon post offices in our District. I personally know the Postmasters in my District want to offer the best service possible to the public."

The congressman listed the irregularities that have already been found in West Texas mail service:

"Although it may have been carefully zip-coded to various parts of West Texas, first class mail from San Francisco was all being sent to Fort Worth for distribution through the State. Arriving in Fort Worth on Saturday, the mail encountered a short staff, reduced to save premium week-end pay. Eventually it was routed back more than 600 miles to El Paso. Immigration Service employees, who had for years received their checks from San Francisco on Monday, were receiving them on Wednesday and sometimes Thursday - mailed from San Francisco the previous Friday. In order to get three day service from San Francisco to El Paso, the Immigration Service had to send all its paychecks airmail. Two years ago the total time required for delivery was one day."

"Now, at many post offices, first class mail is not processed at night - only air mail and special delivery. Resulting from such practices, are four day service to El Paso from Austin, and three day service from Tucson to El Paso. This is the same service the Butterfield Overland Mail offered in 1853."

"More than two years ago, the Post Office Department proudly announced that more than 90 percent of all first class mail ever, though not designated air-mail, was being delivered within 24 hours. Last year service plummeted."

"The Post Office and Civil Service Committee especially insisted on good mail service in our rural areas, even though such service might operate at a loss."

Bride With a "Past"

When Ernest asked Jane to marry him, she lost no time in saying yes. Furthermore, she took pains to tell him what a loyal and devoted wife she would be. But she left out one small detail: she was already expecting a child by another man.

Not long after the wedding, Ernest became aware of his wife's condition. Understandably indignant, he hurried to court to demand an annulment on grounds of fraud.

However, Jane was not willing to give him up. "I told him no lies," she pointed out in her own defense. "Ernest just never asked questions



about my past. Surely a girl is not required to confess everything she ever did wrong."

Nevertheless, the court ruled that Ernest was indeed entitled to an annulment.

"The first purpose of matrimony," said the court, "is procreation. A woman, to be marriageable, must be able to bear children to her husband, and a representation to this effect is implied in the very nature of the (marriage) contract."

True, the law does overlook a certain amount of "deceptive arts" in matters of romance. It recognizes that each party will naturally try to put his best foot forward. But an annulment will be granted if the deception involves something truly basic to the marriage relationship, as in the case of Ernest and Jane.

Suppose the child that is expected is the husband's, not some other man's. Could he still get an annulment, merely because his bride did not tell him the facts before the wedding?

The courts have said no. They note that her deception does him no great harm, because he would be legally responsible for the child anyhow.

What if the situation is just the opposite? That is, the girl is not expecting a child at all but tells the man that she is—and that he is the father.

In this situation too, most courts have refused to grant an annulment. As one court put it, the husband should not expect the law to rescue him from a predicament made possible by his own premarital misconduct. He had, said the court, "created his own dilemma."

Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

State Health Department's new and unique Drug Abuse Program promises statewide health services that are not now available in dealing with the dope menace.

Program was outlined by a Health Department official at a recent hearing of the House Committee to Study Psychiatric Problems of Youth.

It will be carried out in three steps, offering laboratory services, clinics and an over-view of health factors in the drug area.

Initial action calls for setting up facilities next year in Nueces, Bexar, El Paso, Bowie Webb and Lubbock Counties (serving 1.7 million people). Beginning in 1972, the program will be established statewide. Cost may be three to five million dollars for the second year.

period, \$1.2 million for the initial pilot program.

Laboratory services will provide surveillance of drug-abuse patients and detect those needing treatment. Department proposes urine tests of patients to determine if illicit drugs still are being used.

Second stage calls for state wide clinics, especially for the median age 19 group, and informational workshops mostly conducted in schools.

Continual study will use computers to correlate facts from the viewpoint of health personnel who deal with the problem daily.

Department believes the program will fill these three basic needs not presently available, and without which little chance exists for success in drug abuse control.

COURTS SPEAK -- State supreme Court, following the Fourth Court of Civil Appeals, rejected the plea of La Raza Unida party for mandamus directing that its 15 local candidates be placed on the November 3 ballot in Dimmitt, LaSalle and Zavala Counties. Party already has won a place on the ballot in Hidalgo County and will go to federal court to continue its appeal in the other three.

Austindistrict judge refused to lift restrictions against the Alcoholic Beverage Commission's enforcing the stringent guest rule covering private bottle clubs pending clubs' appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Landowners who oppose building a new University of Texas branch at Odessa filed notice of appeal after District Judge Herman Jones of Austin threw out their suit on September 17.

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin sued General Motors, Ford and Chrysler, claiming they conspired to fix prices and eliminate competition in bids on vehicle purchases for governmental units in Texas.

Martin turned an additional 13,744 to the state in anti-trust recovery from the Brass Mill Tube and Pipe case. Recovery now totals \$111,345.

POLLUTION BOOK RELEASED Attorney General Martin released copies of an 188-page booklet on the principal pollution laws of Texas, for the guidance of local governments.

Booklet contains regulations governing water, air, oil and solid waste pollution, together with "how to do it" suggestions for preparing a pollution suit and exchanging information with state agencies.

Martin said he hopes the publication will provide closer cooperation between local units of government, the attorney general's office, the Texas Water Quality Board and the Texas Air Control Board.

DRAFT PRIORITY SET -- Men whose draft lottery numbers were called by local draft boards in 1970, but who were not ordered for induction, will be the top priority group for calls in the first quarter of 1971.

State Selective Service issued the announcement, as did the White House and national draft headquarters.

First quarter draft calls will go to the carry-overs. If calls do not require all of them, they will be placed in a lower priority. Those whose numbers have not been reached all during the year will be placed in the lower priority group on January 1.

National Selective Service chief said that exposure is limited in keeping with the "12 month draft vulnerability policy."

NEW JOBS AND AWARDS -- Gov. Preston Smith appointed William R. Shaver of Lubbock as district judge of the 140th Judicial District, succeeding Judge Robert H. Bean who resigned.

Burt L. Risley, Texas executive director of the Commission for the Blind, was sworn in as president of the National Council of State Agencies for the Blind.

Harry Bresler, chief of claims for the state comptroller, was named the handicapped state employee of the year.

Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr. will represent Gov-

ernor Smith at the first international trade seminar in Mexico City, November 2-10. PWC ROW RAGES -- Chairman Pearce Johnson of the Parks and Wildlife Commission blasted the PWC staff for taking major steps without Commission approval.

Johnson said the department's \$39 million budget recommendations went to the Legislature

without Commission approval last year...and the same thing happened again this year.

Chairman also said that plans for the proposed \$3 million water exchange pass at Mustang

Island near Corpus Christi were changed without consulting the Commission.

"As long as the staff usurps the powers of the Commission,"

said Johnson at an open meeting in the capitol, "I won't be responsible (as chairman)." SMITH HITS REPAIR COSTS -- Governor Smith called for legislative study of "excessive" auto repair charges.

He said he supports the Democratic platform planks on insurance which include regulation of holding companies, requiring mandatory pooling for fire and windstorm protection in areas subject to catastrophe, and consideration of investment income in fixing the auto insurance rate base.

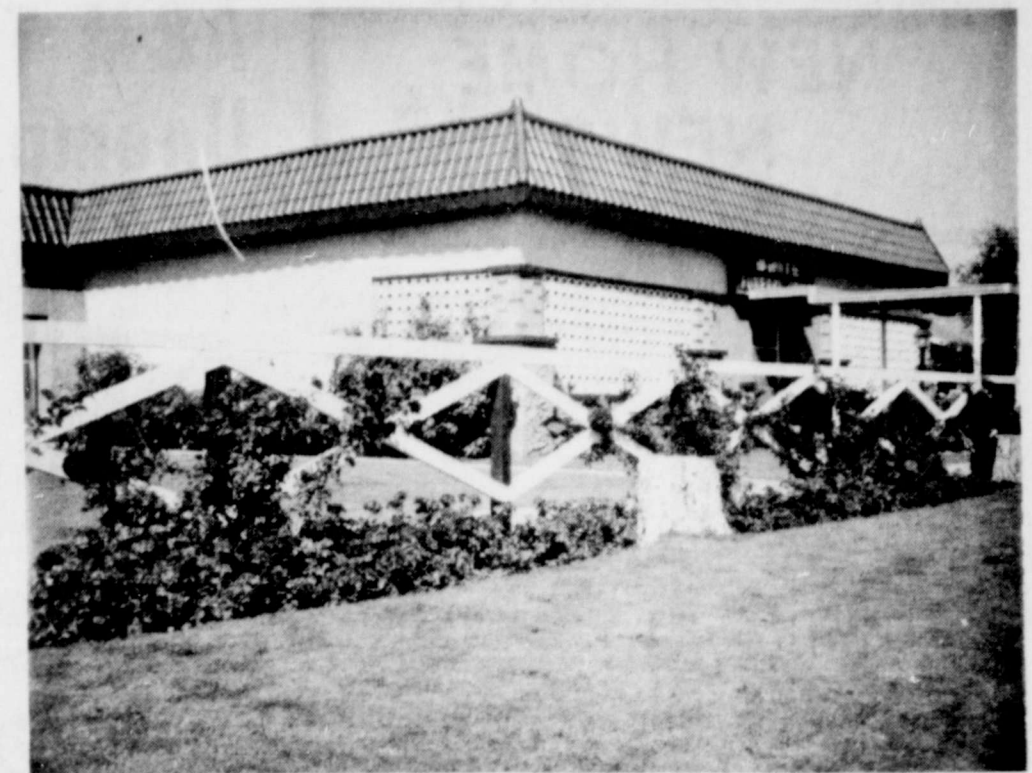
"The public cannot be long protected by regulated insurance rates, if there is no regulation direct or indirect of automobile rates," added the governor.

He also announced his support of group auto insurance coverage.

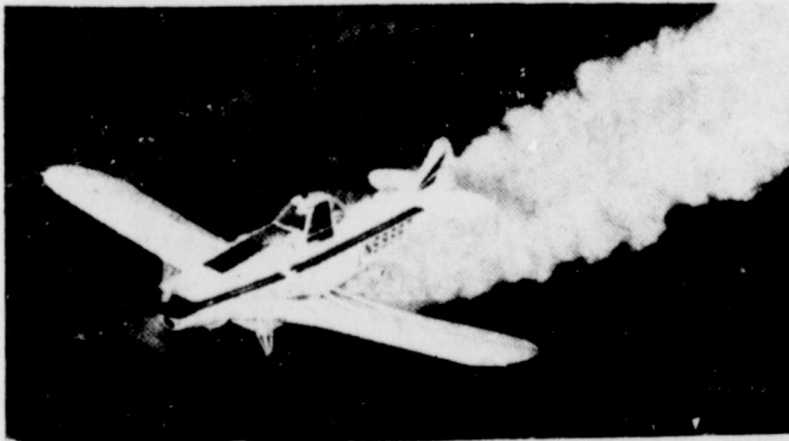

A&M To Collect Data On Effect Of Extending Unemployment Insurance To Farm Workers

College Station, Oct. 8 ... Texas A&M University will start a statewide survey in early October to collect data on the effect of extending federal unemployment insurance coverage to farm workers.

The Texas project is part of a national study. Twelve grant universities, of which Texas A&M is one, will conduct the program.

A&M's Agricultural Economics and Rural Sociology Department will direct the survey

in Texas through the Agricultural Experiment Station and the Agricultural Extension Service.

Dr. David C. Ruesink of the Agricultural Economics and Rural Sociology Department said Unemployment Insurance legislation passed in August established a research program to study the impact of extending coverage to excluded groups farm labor in particular.

The Unemployment Insurance legislation passed during this session extended coverage to nearly 5 million workers, bringing the total number of jobs covered by federal and state unemployment insurance laws to more than 65 million. There are now more than a million farm workers in the U.S. who are not protected by unemployment insurance.

Ruesink, who is directing the Texas project, said the state survey will gather information on farm labor use and the farm work force that is needed. Additional Extension educational and research programs will be established as a result of what is learned.

It also will study the impact of current and proposed labor legislation affecting agricultural workers and employers. He emphasized that Texas A&M is neutral on the program and is cooperating with the study at the direction of the Department of Labor. Questionnaire answers will be held in strict confidence. Farm workers and employers contacted by the survey will be selected at random.

Data collected will be computer-processed and will become available to farm organization leaders and other interested groups as they develop programs which involve farm workers.

Why Should I Cooperate?

The information to be collected in this survey is badly needed to help keep Texas' agricultural economy strong and competitive. This affects employers' profits and workers' jobs. The only way this information can be obtained is through such a survey. The need for this survey has been strongly supported by an Advisory Committee of agricultural leaders and government officials who will be advising the researchers on the analysis of survey results.

What is the Purpose of the Survey?

This survey is being conducted to gather information needed to evaluate the impact of current and proposed labor legislation affecting agricultural workers and employers.

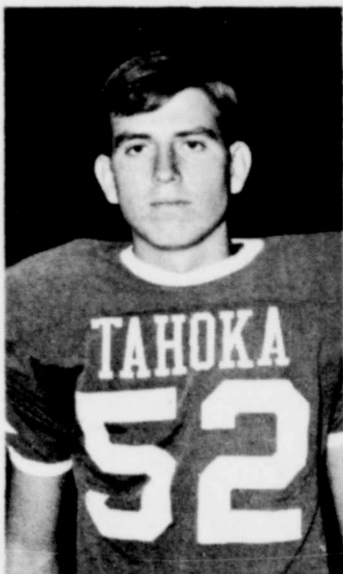
Who Is Conducting the Survey?

The Department of Agricultural Economics and Rural Sociology (Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas Agricultural Extension Service) at Texas A&M University.

Mail questionnaires will be sent to about 3,000 Texas farmers selected at random. As a follow-up 3,000 Texas farm workers will be interviewed. It is anticipated by County Agent Bill Griffin that 43 farm workers will be interviewed in Lynn County.

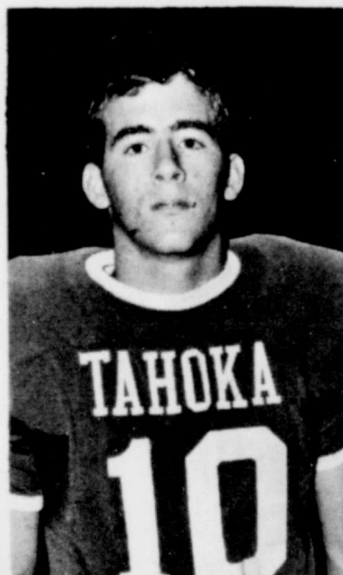

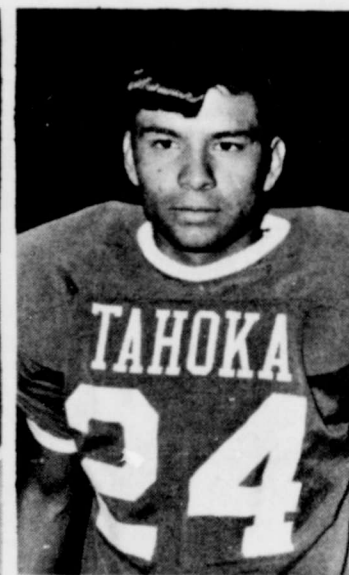

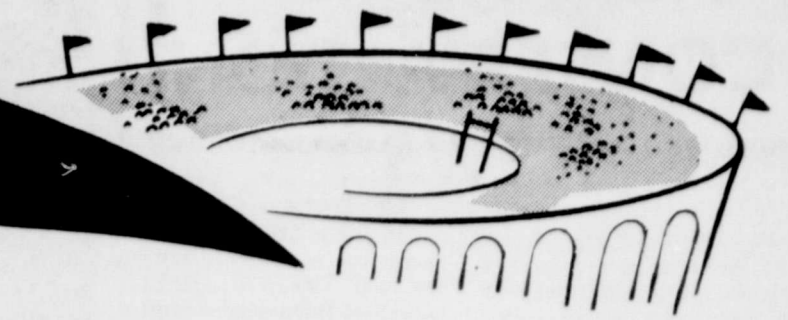

SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

As the population grows the agricultural industry must cloth and feed more people. With our population having reached well over 200 million persons and our square feet of land per person decreasing at a rate faster than ever before we must take better care of our resources. Kenneth Grand, administrator of the Soil Conservation Service, recently said to employees, "We must help more Americans, both urban and rural, to make use of the right land for the right purpose." The increased growth of cities, the building of more highways, and expansion of industrial interest gobles up more and more agricultural land each year.

This is land that will never come back into agricultural production. For example for every mile of four lane highway built new it takes out at least 65 acres of agricultural land out of production.

I am not worried a great deal over this dilemma that America faces. Some people really get upset and wound real tight over this. I am concerned because it is taking so long for Americans to realize this situation. However, I believe in the future of agriculture because they have responded in the past and the things we now enjoy have come to us through improved agriculture. America today owes a great deal to agricultural industry. She feeds and clothes herself for the smallest percent of her income ever and it cost less to feed and cloth your less to feed and cloth yourself in America than anywhere else in the world. This has come about because the farmer has improved his production and produced it more efficiently. He has received little reward for these advancements but America has been rewarded lavishly.

The only way to combat the problem of decreasing square feet per person is to utilize

every bit of the land to its proper use and make maximum use of it. We at the Soil Conservation Service are called upon by individuals, groups, organizations and units of government to assist in land use practices. Many people realizing that we have a great many specialists and that we are in the business of offering this service to people all over the Nation call on us for help. In some locations today we help as many urban people as rural people. We do not own any land nor do we manage any land, therefore, we at the soil conservation service as a Federal Agency do not regulate or control any land use. We do recommend and suggest based on experience, proven research and known principle.

Bill Griffin, County Agent, Says....

Misuse, mishandling and improper storage of herbicides and other agricultural chemicals is resulting in the death of many farm animals.

Dr. John C. Reagor, toxicologist for the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory, reports that arsenic based chemicals have become the leading cause of death in cases he has investigated.

"In one case, a can of arsenic had fallen from a shelf onto the dirt floor of a hay barn," Dr. Reagor said. "Moisture had rusted a hole in the can and had spread the arsenic over most of the floor of the barn, and whenever bales from the bottom row were used, animals would die."

"In this case, there was extreme difficulty in locating the source of poisoning, since only a few bales of the hay 'hot' with arsenic were fed."

Dr. Reagor also warned against using barrels for feed troughs or storage that had previously been used as containers for arsenic base agricultural chemicals.

"You can burn them wash them, and everything else, but the arsenic may still remain in the metal of the barrels in sufficient quantities to kill almost any animal," he said. "You are just asking for trouble when using these barrels."

Dr. Reagor urged the poisoning of all areas in which animals are housed or pastured or where feed is stored.

"All agricultural chemicals, potentially dangerous to all farm animals and small children, should be gathered up and buried in an area where leaching into farm and community water supplies will not occur," he said.

Cunningham In A&M Glee Club

College Station - Texas A&M University's famed Singing Cadets have announced the return of Michael S. Cunningham of Tahoka to the selective, 65-voice ranks of the all-male glee club for 1970-71.

Cunningham is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Cunningham, North First, Tahoka and is a sophomore physical education major at Texas A&M. The Singing Cadets have sung throughout the Southwest since 1894 to become one of the outstanding glee clubs in the nation. The group directed by Robert L. Boone is scheduled to sing 20 performances this fall, including two national conventions in Houston.

They will appear Dec. 5 as the official glee club for the seventh straight year at the Miss Teenage America Pageant in Fort Worth. *Measles --- You Can Be Protected

There are two kinds of measles. Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association, reports that the kind of measles protect is known as rubella, "common measles," or the "seven-day" or "10-day" measles, or the "red" measles. In rubella, there is a pronounced, long-lasting rash, usually associated with symptoms of illness for three or four days before the rash appears, such as fever and coughing. The other kind of measles, rubella, is known as "German measles" or "three-day" measles. Rubella's rash is less pronounced, and there are few pre-rash symptoms. However, if a woman contracts rubella during the first three months of pregnancy, it can affect the fetus and result in birth defects. An effective and safe vaccine is now available for rubella or red measles. It produces only a few minor reactions, but in return provides almost complete protection which may last a lifetime. If all children between ages of 1 to 9 who have not already had measles or a dose of live virus measles vaccine could be vaccinated from the United States, vaccine can be administered by your doctor in his office or during measles vaccination campaigns. The vaccine against German measles is not yet ready for general use. An effective one appears to have been developed but research must still solve the problem of making it in sufficient quantity to meet present needs. It should be available in another year or two.

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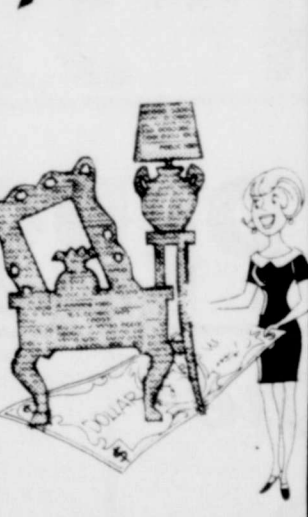
