Citizens Urged To Contribute To Purchase of Artificial Limb

A group of local citizens have launched a campaign to make Christmas a joyous affair for a Ranger elementary school teacher.

The teacher is Miss Johnnie Young, a lifetime resident of Ranger, and first and second grade teacher at the Young elementary school.

Well-known to the youngsters of the Young school and to hundreds of other Ranger residents who have attended the school as students of her's, Miss Young lost her leg just above the knee while she was in the third grade.

Since she has been forced to wear a wooden limb.

Mrs. Joe Harper, who is heading the campaign, is asking for donations from Ranger citizens to purchase a new artificial limb for Miss Young. She said that next week the second grade students of Miss Young will go to each house in Ranger and ask for donations.

Mrs. Harper said that a meeting has been scheduled for later this week to divide the town into sections and the school children into teams to work the town.

Persons who are interested in donating to the fund may send their donations to the Ranger Times office. Checks may be made out to the Miss Johnnie Young Fund.

Mrs. Harper said that a donation plate would be placed in the Commercial State Bank for the convenience of bank customers who wish to contribute to the worthy cause. Plates will also be placed in the public schools.

The artificial limb that Miss Young now has, according to Mrs. Harper, is completely worn out. It is a wooden limb and Mrs. Harper hopes that through the donations, enough money will be raised to purchase a plastic leg.

Santa Claus Letters Swamp Editor's Desk

The following letters were written by the second grade students at Hodges Oak Park grade school.

School Holidays Begin Dec. 20

All schools in Ranger from the elementary level through high school and college will dismiss for the Christmas holiday December 20, according to an announcement from public school and college officials.

Classes at all Ranger public schools will be dismissed at 4 p.m. December 20 and will not be resumed until 8 a.m. January 2. G. B. Rush, city school superintendent, said that all schools would dismiss at the same time.

Ranger College students will dismiss on December 20, and, according to Dr. Price Ashton, president of the college, will not resume classes until January 6 at 8 a.m.

It is estimated that the leg will cost about \$400. It will be purchased from the Hedgecock Artificial Limb Company of Dallas.

Most local citizens remember that it was Miss Young's grandfather, Joe Young, who donated the land for the school she is now teaching at. Her grandfather came to Ranger from Tennessee in February, 1896. He settled at the Crossroads community.

Later, Mr. Young moved into Ranger and went into the feed and grocery business.

Where Young school is located was previously a large cotton field. When the oil boom came, Young leased the land to different companies. And in 1919, he donated the land to the city for the Young school.

M. H. Hagaman was acting mayor of Ranger at the time. A one-story wood frame building was constructed as the school. Miss Young attended school there.

And, it was in her third year there that she sprained her ankle. Miss Young sprained her ankle at her home and her mother and father took her to the doctor to be treated. After returning home from the treatment, the pain grew worse and she was taken to the hospital.

She remained in the hospital several weeks until the doctors told her parents that the leg had to be amputated. After the amputation, she moved around on crutches until she could be fitted with an artificial limb.

In 1952 she underwent brain surgery at Baylor Hospital in Dallas but despite all of the handicaps, she has continued to teach school.

A graduate of Ranger high school, today she plays the piano for both the morning and evening services at the Eastside Baptist Church.

Prior to teaching at Ranger she taught school at Wiles Canyon and Crossroads.

A Plea For Sanity

The rash of holiday automobile accidents focuses added attention on one of the nation's foremost problems. Barring nothing short of a miracle during the next twelve months, a startling number of Americans will sacrifice their lives in the madcap extravaganza of death swirling like dervishes in an orgy across the streets and highways.

Caught in the tragic undertone, many innocent motorists will be included with the insane drivers killed in the fray. And this ironic twist intensifies the tragedy; the innocent die because of the mistakes of the guilty.

What can be done to stop the slaughter? Numerous suggestions and plans, ranging from the practical to the impossible have been advanced. On the impossible side, the suggestion has been made that automobile manufacturers reduce the speed of vehicles.

But speed alone is not the cause of accidents; slow drivers have died almost as rapidly as the fast ones. Moreover, an extra burst of speed used wisely can often avert a collision.

On the more practical side, the suggestion has been made that citizens' traffic committees, authorized to enforce the laws, be pressed into service to augment understaffed law enforcement agencies. The suggestion, however, is predicated on the assumption that the public would volunteer its services, which frequently are reluctantly given at all.

In the final analysis, then, safe driving rests with the individual. Thus, the individual should resolve to practice the elementary, but essential rules necessary for survival on the streets and highways.

Until he does, the death toll, which puts that of war and disease to shame, will continue to soar. And the life he does not save may be his own.

Arlington State's Rebels, 1957 champions and eastern representative in the Junior Rose Bowl classic, dominated the first team. The Rebels placed six men on the first team and six on the second eleven. Three Rebels received honorable mention.

Kanner-up, Cameron State of Lawton, Okla., placed two men on the first list as did fourth-place Tarleton State, with San Angelo College landing the remaining spot.

The only unanimous choice in balloting was Arlington's Shelby "Rock" Hudson, 215-pound right tackle.

Kalinec, a 220-pound sophomore who ended his football career for the Rangers, pulled in one first team vote. Kalinec is from Granger, Texas.

Wynman, a freshman guard, was a starter for the Rangers during the past season. The 215-pounder is from Austin, Texas and has another year to play for the Rangers. He received honorable mention.

Only other lad to gain a spot in the selections was Boynton. A 170-pound freshman, he started at the halfback slot during the 1957 season. He is from Quanah, and has one year remaining with the Rangers.

Tom Hestand, head football coach of the Rangers, commented that he was well pleased with the showing made by the boys this year.

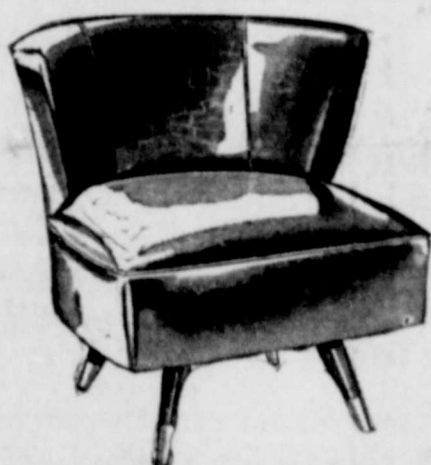

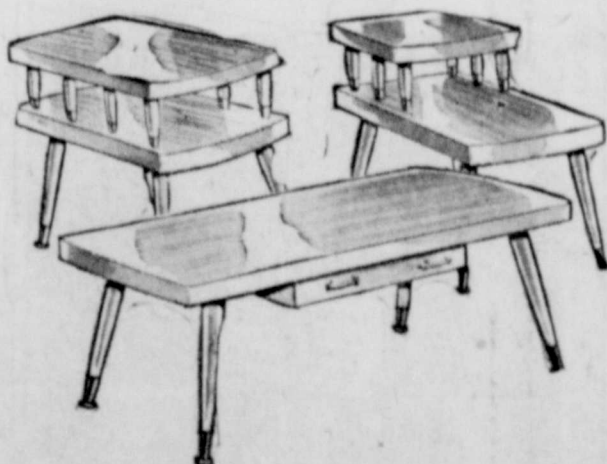
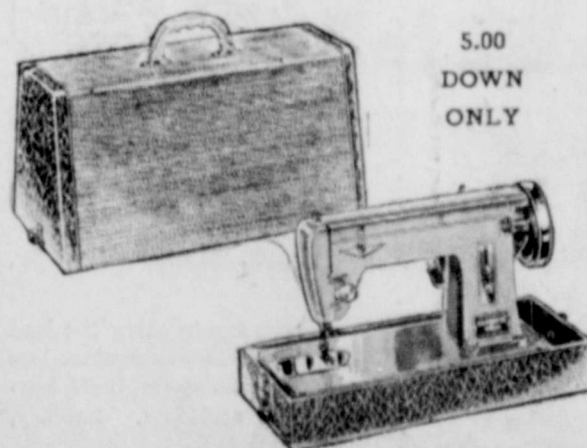

marketing quotas into effect.In Texas, farmers in all 247 pro-
ducing counties voted 36,943 to
5,672 for continuing marketing
quotas and acreage allotments on
upland cotton. That would mean
a favorable vote of about 86.7
percent.Under the quota system, farm-
ers may market only that portion
of their 1958 production which is
grown on acreage allotted. They
are thus eligible for price support
loans at a level between 75 and
80 percent of parity. Without
quotas, the support level drops to

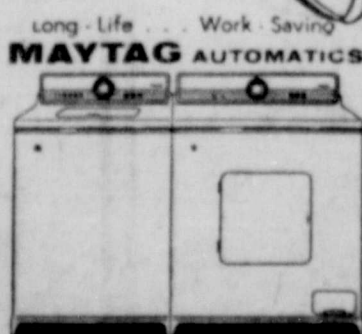
