A: Apparently the Ambulance Board was trying to get some of the problems resolved before reporting back to governmental sponsors. One Board member told *The Record* that "a lot of changes and improvement had been made during the past two months." However, the sponsors still were not being informed. He indicated that a "Letter to the Editor" from the Board would be forthcoming to explain the situation.

Persistent questions about the ambulance service that have arisen for more than six months, prompted *The Record* to reveal the audit information in the "Ambulance Needs Treatment" editorial in the March 6 issue.

Grass fire rages near Westbrook

Late Friday afternoon, firemen were still trying to get a huge grass fire under control, which broke out around noon near Westbrook.

The fire was located between Conway Road and Westbrook on the southside of IH 20. Three units from Colorado City, 2 from Westbrook, 2 from Loraine, 1 or 2 from Coahoma and 1 from Snyder along with all available firemen were fighting the blaze, according to Fire Marshall Billy Ray Williamson.

He said by late Friday, no structures, tank batteries, etc. had been damaged by the fire which was spreading fast behind strong winds.

Two of the Colorado units were still in the Albany area fighting a mammoth grass fire there.

Also Friday afternoon a small blaze broke out in Colorado City, but firemen were able to extinguish it promptly with the remaining reserve truck.

Local units help fight huge fire in Shackelford

Local firemen joined fire fighters from throughout the "Big County" area Tuesday night in their attempts to control a gigantic grass fire that has burned out of control and scorched hundreds of thousands of acres in Shackelford and adjacent counties northeast of Abilene.

Two firefighting units from Colorado City, two from Loraine, and one from Westbrook, along with about 15 firemen left around 10 a.m. Thursday night for the fire area.

They were still at the scene Friday morning, and other local firemen were being called to relieve the firefighters.

However, when the large grass fire broke out in the Westbrook area around noon, the local Departments were trying to make contact with their units, calling them back.

Shooting suspect turns himself in to Sheriff

A suspect in the shooting incident at Western Motel on East Highway 80 last Sunday night, turned himself in to Mitchell County Sheriff's Office Tuesday.

A charge of attempted murder has been filed against Thomas Rivas Castillo, 43, who is accused of firing his many as five gunshots into a room at the motel about 10:15 p.m. last Sunday then fleeing the scene. An occupant of the room, John Rivera, was reported to have been wounded from the shots. Castillo, a Colorado City resident, was released from the County Jail Thursday under \$10,000 bond.

Bridgford files for school board

Billy Bruce Bridgford, president of CISD Board of Trustees, filed his candidacy for re-election Friday.

Others who have filed, thus far, for the two School Board posts to be filled are incumbent Kathy Bassham and Sara Ortiz. Four persons who have filed for three City Council posts are Rex Thackerson, Bill Glass, Bob Reily and Howard Nelson.

No one has filed as yet for three places on the Mitchell County Hospital Board.

All three elections are due to be held May 7. Filing deadline is 5 p.m. Wednesday, March 23.

Anna Staats awarded B&PW district honor

Anna Staats of Colorado City Business and Professional Women's Club, Inc. was selected BPW District Seven Woman of the Year at the Spring Conference in Abilene Saturday, March 5.

District Seven includes Colorado City, Abilene, San Angelo and Stamford.

City, County get first tax rebate from 1/2-cent levy

Colorado City and Mitchell County have received their first rebates from the half-percent local option sales tax collected in January.

Mitchell County received \$9,241.07 from the tax which will go to offset property taxes. With the added half-percent levy, the Colorado City tax rebate jumped to \$22,306.44 from \$13,945.72 for January a year ago, a 59.95% gain. The City rebate also includes the long-standing 1% sale tax levied by the City. The added half-percent will also go to reduce property taxes.

Total payments received by the City in 1988 have amounted to \$74,094.71, a 20.15% increase over the \$61,667.40 that had been received for the same period in 1987.

The City of Loraine did not

receive any rebate from the January sales, and the City's rebate for the year remains at \$1,425.15, up 4% over the \$1,370.35 at this time last year.

The City of Westbrook received a \$1,178.80 rebate from January sales, an increase of 127.13% over the \$519.00 that was received last January. Thus far for the year, Westbrook has received \$3,690.98, up 62.28% over the same period last year.

Total amount received by the three cities in Mitchell County was \$23,485.24.

Neither Westbrook or Loraine has added the optional half-

Candidates gear up for runoff election

As the dust settled from the big "Super Tuesday" primaries, two local democratic races remain to be determined in a runoff election April 12, with the four candidates already gearing up their campaigns.

Incumbent Sheriff Wendell Bryant, who led the four-man slate with 1,014 votes said, "I am very please with the number of votes cast for me and for the support received in the March 8 primary election. I plan to work harder and talk to as many people as possible before the April 12 runoff to persuade others to vote for me. With your help and support, I hope to continue serving you as Sheriff of Mitchell County for the next four years."

Vince Arias, who made the runoff by garnering 609 votes, said, "this being the first time I have run for public office and being a relatively new resident, I was very pleased to make the runoff and want to thank everyone who voted and supported me."

"I feel that from the votes cast in the Sheriff's race, that the citizens of Mitchell County are interested in a change for the better in local law enforcement, particularly in the areas of drug and alcohol abuse, communications with the department and more protection and service. I think I have a good chance in the runoff, See ELECTIONS, Page 2

From fatal shooting incident

Cases filed to seize \$42,276 cash, pickup

As reported in a late bulletin in the last issue of *The Record* Sheriff Wendell Bryant revealed that \$42,276 in cash had been found in the 1982 Chevrolet Pickup, in which a Kansas man was found shot to death, February 7 at IH 20 rest stop just east of Loraine.

Sheriff Bryant revealed the amount of money found, when suits for seizure and forfeiture were filed in 32nd District Court late Tuesday, alleging that both the money and the pickup were used for drug related purposes.

The cases, filed by Pete Sheridan, a Sweetwater attorney, are styled "The State of Texas vs 1982 Chevrolet Pickup" and "The State of Texas vs \$42,276". The Sheriff requested permission from Mitchell County Commissioners' Court Monday to hire Sheridan to handle the cases. Sheriff Bryant explained to the Court that the cases had to be filed by 5 p.m. the

next day to meet a 30-day deadline, to claim the money and the vehicle for his Department.

He indicated at the time that County Attorney Clay Strange was out of town, and that if handled by the District Attorney's office, they would claim half.

Although not liking the spur of the moment decision, the Court authorized Sheriff Bryant to hire Sheridan to file the cases by the deadline but to have the County Attorney handle the case from there on.

County Attorney Strange told *The Record* he had not been approached any time during the previous 30 days about the possibility of filing "seizure and forfeiture" suits, nor had he been given any indication of the amount of money involved or that it might be drug related. "It was unfortunate that I was out of town on the last day of the deadline, See SEIZURE, Page 2

Larry Hale, front-runner in the Commissioner Precinct 3 race with 204 votes, said, "I'm am very happy with the outcome of the election. The citizens of Precinct #3 had a difficult choice to make with seven good men running for the office. We had a positive, clean campaign in which the issues were the main concern."

"I'm optimistic about the April 12th runoff and I am going to get out and try my best to talk to every person I can to let them know where I stand on the issues such as, economic growth, budgeting, raising taxes and the welfare of our senior citizens."

"I want to thank all the voters who went to the polls, and ask for your additional vote and support on April 12.

Roy Lee Beach, who made the commissioner runoff with 157 votes in Precinct #3 said, "I feel very grateful to be in the runoff election for the office of Commissioner Prec. 3 and appreciate the votes and support I received."

"I ask the voters of Prec. 3 to examine each candidate carefully, personal financial records, personal background, employment records, etc. If you have any questions please let me know, for I am vitally interested in the future of this County."

"Your vote and support in the appreciated."

"There will be only a 4-day period for casting votes by absentee ballot in the runoff election. Absentee voting opens on April 5 and will close at 5 p.m. on April 8. Any voter may vote in the respective runoff elections, without reason or excuse, under new state laws."

Only those people who voted in the Democratic primary, or registered voters who did not vote, may cast a ballot in the runoff. Those who voted in the Republican primary cannot vote in the Democratic runoff.

With 2,355 voters going to the polls, 49% of the 4,798 registered voters, Mitchell County followed the trend for state-wide candidates and the 16-southern state trend in the presidential races.

Mitchell County favored Michael Dukakis and Al Gore as the front two runners in the Democratic nominations; and Republicans joined the landslide win by George Bush, with Pat Robertson as a distant runnerup.

In the contested state and district races on the Democratic ballots incumbent Sen. Lloyd Benson, overwhelmed San Antonio's Joe Sullivan by capturing more than 80% of the vote. Jim

Nugent avoided a runoff to gain re-nomination for Railroad Commissioner over opponents Jerry Langdon and John Thomas Henderson.

In the Supreme Court races, Justice Ted Robertson nosed out John Humphreys for Chief Justice; Lloyd Doggett easily won Place 1 over Marsha Anthony; Bill Kilgarlin gained a slim lead over Carol Haberman for Place 2; and Justice Raul Gonzalez defeated Art Vega for Place 3.

For Presiding Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, Mike McCormick outdistanced opponent Ron Chapman.

In the local 11th District, appointed incumbent Bud Arnot of Abilene defeated challenger, George H. Hansard of Lamesa by a wide-margin.

On the Republican side, Houston businessman Wes Gilbreath advanced to an April 12 runoff against U. S. Rep. Beau Boulter by securing 36.6 percent to Boulter's 30 percent of the vote, for the right to face Sen. Lloyd Benson.

Ed Emmitt and P. S. "Sam" Ervin will meet in a Republican runoff to decide who will face incumbent Democrat Jim Nugent for Railroad Commissioner.

Houston appeals judge Paul Murphy defeated Dallas lawyer George Barbary for a shot at Democrat Lloyd Doggett. Republican appeals judge Nathan Hecht of Dallas, is heading for a runoff against Houston attorney Ronald Block or appeals judge D. Camille Dunn as result of a very close race.

Both the Republican's referendum on making English the official language; and the Democrat's proposition to keep electing judges were passed by overwhelming margins, throughout the state.

The great secret, Eliza, is not having bad manners or good manners or any other particular sort of manners, but having the same manner for all human souls: in short, behaving as if you were in heaven, where there are no third-class carriages, and one soul is as good as another.

George Bernard Shaw - *Pygmalion, Act V*
A movie came to town called, "Stars in My Crown" while I was growing up.

I don't remember much about it, except that it was about a minister's family and that we went to see it because we always saw any movie whose subject matter concerned my dad's profession - just as my kids see all the movies whose subject matter is journalism.

You figure a plumber's kid would go see movies about plumber's families and doctors kids would go see movies about hero doctors. It's always nice to be the center of attention.

At any rate, the title of the movie "Stars in My Crown" seems to dispute George Bernard Shaw's character who believes there are no third-class carriages in heaven. If there aren't, a lot of people are going to have trouble adjusting. They're looking for a good neighborhood in the afterlife and they don't intend to share it with common rif-raff who may, or may not, have earned more than a single star for their crowns. Not when the ex-attorney's got 33.

Something within the human species insists on finding a place of superiority. Even in heaven. Once the level is attained by too many souls, it'll be an ordinary place again and a lot of souls will want to move on to something better.

You can drive through any city and see homes that used to be a part of the local aristocracy - houses that have decayed, along with the streets and the political clout of the neighborhoods.

The people who lived there are either dead, or they've moved on to neighborhoods with "better" schools, churches and social clubs. That usually means less minority intermingling, a sort of unspoken return to segregation.

A lot of people don't mind seeing the have-nots improve their lifestyles, just as long as that lifestyle remains distinctively less attractive than their own. If the advantages and opportunities are the same, everybody winds up about the same. It becomes harder all the time to tell who's better than who. The only sensible way to maintain an aristocracy, then, is by keeping the masses pushed down.

Everything is relevant. A person from a third-world country might think an American ghetto is a nice, comfortable neighborhood. For awhile, anyway.

In time, the visitor will have time to look around and see just how plush, plush can be. With that recognition comes renewed resentment.

Think about your most affluent friends for a minute. They probably enjoy having a nicer house, more cars and better horses than you've got. But what really galls them, is the rancher down the road, the one who's mansion is twice as large as their's is, and whose horses have won some of the biggest purses in the country at racing tracks. And the person with all of that is burning inside because his best friend has been elected governor twice while he was defeated for a state senate seat.

The way the human species has been programmed, especially in this country, it's almost impossible to find contentment. Unless, of course, you walk out on the rat race and stop trying to keep up with the Joneses.

I've known a lot of contented people who have done just that, but everyone else seems to think they're peculiar, un-American, or simply scared of the competition. They could be right in some instances. On the other hand, you have to go by the kind of happiness and contentment they present to the rest of us.

I was thinking this morning about all of the people who work out regularly and have beautiful, or at least, perfect, bodies. I've struggled with that myself. I'd love to have a beautiful body. On the other hand, I'd be miserable if I had to work that hard to keep it looking perfect, and I'm not just talking about exercise. I'd hate to work that hard at eating all the right foods and never having any of the fun that bad foods provide.

I have a strong suspicion that People with beautiful bodies aren't happy, they just look better being miserable than the rest of us.

All of this can be an excuse, not wanting to compete with the elite of society. Then again, maybe it's the prize really doesn't seem worth the effort.

You figure if there was no perception of third-rate carriages, i.e. third world countries, i.e. third-world neighborhoods, and third-rate people, there'd probably be no wars or rioting in the streets. The human ego would be permanently incarcerated in a safe place.

Then again, we wouldn't be human at all. We'd be in heaven - our egos buried in coffins back home, wondering why we'd spent so much time worrying about our own neighborhoods instead of just making everybody's the same and being done with it.

GED changes announced

Substantial changes in GED tests have been made this year and persons wishing to take the test may want to do so before May 20 when the changes take affect.

The 1988 tests are longer than current tests and may require changes in test scheduling at local testing centers. Test 1, Writing Skills, is a two-hour tests which includes a writing sample (essay). The score on Writing Skills Part I (multiple choice) and Part II (essay) will be combined and reported to students as one score. Students who fail the Writing Skills test must retest on the entire test.

The last date that current GED tests may be administered is May 20. No testing will occur in Texas from May 21 through June 5, and the first date that the 1988 tests

may be administered in June 6.

Students who have passed part of the GED tests before June 6 will not be required to re-take them using the revised tests. Students who have failed any part of the GED tests before June 6 will re-test using the 1988 GED tests.

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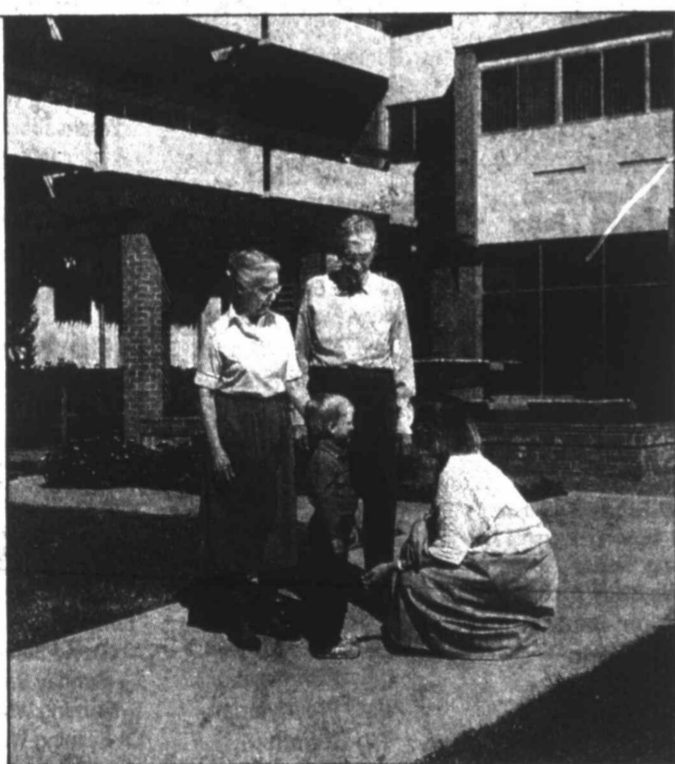

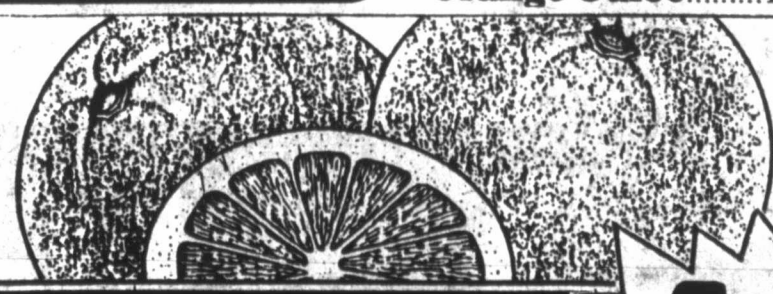

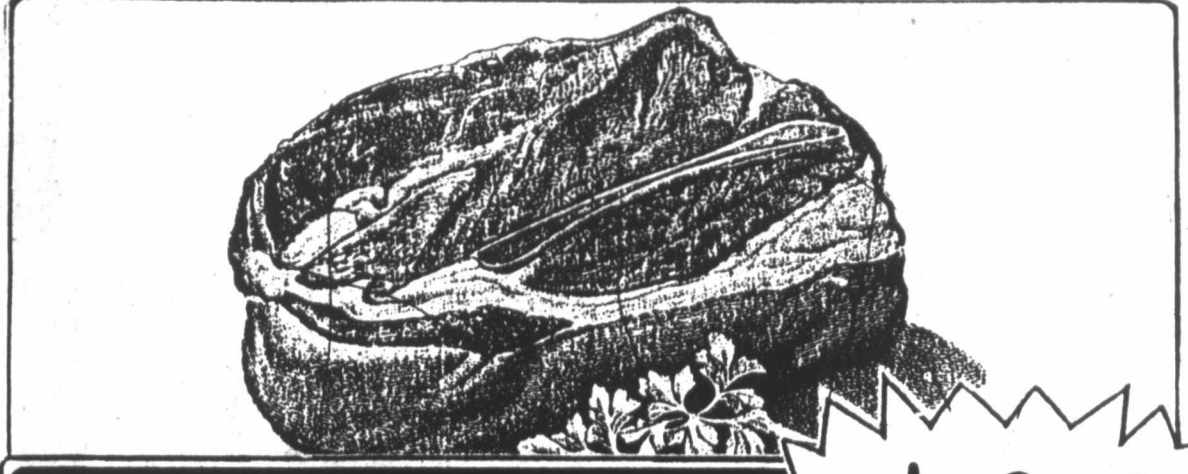

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Home Economics FOCUS

Recently I've received a great deal of information and a number of questions from people who are concerned about their health and nutrition. Aging brings about a unique set of problems. It's easy to believe we're doing the right things because there has been such an awareness of health for people of all ages. The Extension nutrition specialists are putting a major thrust into research in four primary areas: fat, fiber, sugar and sodium. Please read on to find out some of the dietary problems unique to senior citizens, and if you need more information or would like to discuss some suggestions for improving your diet, please call me at the Mitchell County Extension Office, 728-3111.

Good Eating Habits When You're Older

If you're one of those older folks who thinks teenagers eat too many fast foods and sweets, take a closer look at your own diet.

Many in the over 65-age group also have some bad eating habits which can affect their nutrition and health. Answer these questions and see if you fit in this group.

Are you salting your food more and more? We often get into the habit of heavily salting food to compensate for the loss of taste with age. This can worsen any pre-existing hypertension. It's better to learn how to use more herbs and spices for flavor.

Have you started eating mostly soft foods? When you restrict your diets to easy-to-chew foods, it becomes difficult to get adequate amounts of needed nutrients. Typically, poor teeth and gums make the soft foods seem more attractive. But good dental care and well-fitting dentures may help the older you enjoy crisp foods again.

The softer, high-carbohydrate foods preferred by many elderly can also lead to an increased incidence of constipation since they contain little fiber. Adding cooked whole grain cereals to a "soft" diet will greatly increase its fiber content and help this problem.

Are you skipping meals because you're depressed, it seems like too much trouble to cook, or you're just not hungry? It doesn't have to be this way! Try trading off with a friend to cook and eat at each other's homes.

Maybe your church or a senior citizens' center has a noon meal where you can eat in pleasant company. Or you may qualify for a "Meals-On-Wheels" program, where a friendly visitor will bring you a meal each day.

Keeping up good eating habits is a part of keeping up your health.

Q. When do you spray for grubworms?

A. Grubworms are best controlled in July and August. July is the best time. The June bug is the adult form of the grubworm (scarabidae). She lays her eggs in the latter part of June in the topsoil and small grubworms emerge in July. Be sure to water your lawn thoroughly before treatment to loosen the soil and allow the pesticide to penetrate deeper.

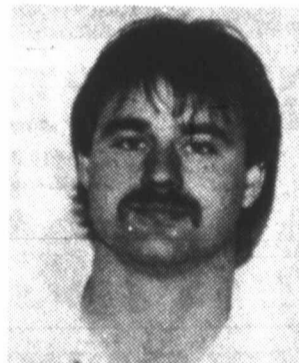

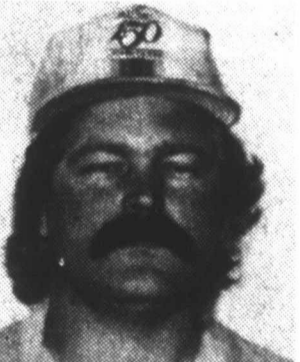
