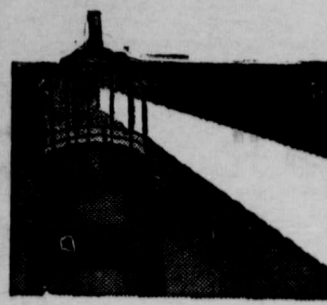




On The BEAM

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National P.T.A. Sets Goal: Over 12,000,000 Members

step into school, the P.T.A. offers a ready-made meeting place where parents and teachers work together for the child's academic and social development. The Kenosha, Wisconsin, Council of P.T.A.'s, for example, sponsored a summer-long elementary school clinic for children who had difficulty in reading.

—Youngsters who have special problems get attention in another phase of the National Congress program. Language barriers are being breached for Puerto Rican children attending school in Camden, New Jersey, because local P.T.A.'s sparked a move to hire a Spanish instructor who works with these children in their daily English classes.

—The more members we enroll," Mrs. Parker points out, "the more opportunities the National Congress will have to work for the well-being of all the nation's children."

—Teen-agers are helped, too, by P.T.A. programs designed to spur their development into responsible citizens. In Evanston,

September 30 May Be An Important Date For Parents

September 30 may be an important date for you if you are dependent on a working son or daughter who died at some time after 1939.

Before August, 1958, many parents who inquired about their eligibility for social security survivor's payments were told that they could not qualify because the son or daughter was survived by a widow, widower or child. Now a 1958 change in the law makes benefits payable to dependent parents as well as to other survivors.

If you are at retirement age and if you were being supported by your son or daughter at the time he or she died, you should

inquire at your social security office before September 30 to get all of the benefits due you.

September 30 is an important date because if applications are not filed with the social security office by that date, some back payments may be lost.

Surviving parents, who are not yet of retirement age, should also get in touch with their social security offices before too much time has passed. Proof of support must be furnished within two years of August 1958 or within two years of the son or daughter's death, whichever is later.

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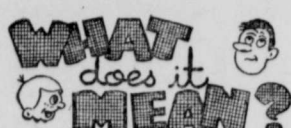

Questions and Answers

Q. I am nineteen years old, the son of a veteran who died as a result of injuries received in World War Two. I am thinking of taking War Orphans training under the War Orphans Education Act. But am wondering if my mother still being alive would mean I am not eligible. Will you please tell me?

A. The fact that your mother is living has no bearing on your eligibility for War Orphans training. You would be considered a War Orphan for purposes of this act, since your veteran-father died as a result of war service. Q. I named the beneficiaries of my GI insurance policy some time ago, but never did specify the method of payment. If I should die while the method of payment is still undesignated, how would the insurance money be paid out?

A. It would be paid in 36 equal installments. However, your first beneficiary would have the right to choose payments under any other installment plan available. Q. Can a World War One veteran with less than 90 days' service ever be eligible for a VA pension?

A. If the veteran had been discharged sooner, for a service-connected disability, that would be possible, yes. He could be eligible for pension.

Q. I am a War Orphan, eligible for training under the VA War Orphan's program. Is this only a college program, or could I take a vocational course? I quit high school of my own accord in my senior year.

A. You would be eligible for specialized vocational or trade school training, if you prefer. College training is only one type of training provided.

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Story Of Mrs. J. G. Bruce Told By Comanche Chief

The following was taken from the Comanche Chief, newspaper of Comanche, Texas, former

home of Mrs. J. G. Bruce of Loraine, Mrs. J. I. Thomas shared the article with us and we in turn share it with you. The story reads—

Mrs. J. G. Bruce, the former Miss Pearl Boyd, formerly of Sidney, a graduate of Comanche High School, who now resides in Loraine, can be placed in the niches of a former Comanchean now residing elsewhere, who has made an outstanding record in life.

Miss Pearl attended Comanche High School when Miss O. Cunningham and Minnie Cunningham Klingman were in their prime and were recognized as among the outstanding teachers of this section. She contributes the inspiration she received from these two great teachers as a great contributing factor to her success as a teacher and youth leader.

A share of the credit also goes to the late Mrs. Larry Kittle who organized the first farm girls' club work in Comanche County. Miss Pearl was one of Mrs. Kittle's outstanding club directors, and coached Katie Helm who won first club prize in the county and went all the way to the State meet, winning first place.

Later Miss Boyd coached another State winner, Virginia Hall who won first place in declamation in the county and regional meets to qualify for the State Interscholastic League meet at Austin, where she took first place. Virginia is now Mrs. Arlie Carver.

Miss Pearl taught for 28 years in the schools of Comanche County and always was regarded as one of the better teachers. She was one of those unfortunate teachers who retired just at the wrong time to get the benefit of any teaching annuity as did many other good teachers who rendered great service for years towards the advancement of education in Texas. Several years ago Miss Pearl married John Gilbert Bruce, who claimed Comanche County as his home and was recognized as a good citizen. He passed away last year.

Although Miss Pearl does not draw an annuity, she has her "jewels" in the pupils she trained who have made outstanding success, such as County Commissioner Oral O. Morris, Precinct No. 1; Miss Mable Hall, distinguished primary teacher at Sidney; Mrs. Otis Cox, former teacher of English and journalism at Comanche now filling a similar position at Sidney at her own choice so that she might be near her home; also Eargle Parker, the popular family man and service station expert with Dudley Bros.

Miss Pearl says she personally has no gripe because she is not eligible for an annuity, but she wonders if the Legislature, which worked so long and hard on bills, and is being asked to come back for a fourth session to give the present teachers a raise, might not remember the left-out teachers who are now in their declining years; and at least give them part of this new money to take care of the teachers who worked for more than a quarter of a century at salaries too low to mention.

Doubtless there are hundreds of other deserving teachers like Miss Pearl, who are penalized just because they were born a little too soon, or quit teaching a little too quick.

LONE STAR Agriculture

Released by
The Texas Department of Agriculture

The home gardener wants a single chemical which will control any pest which attacks his flowers, fruits or vegetables.

To supply this market the pesticide manufacturer has prepared general purpose mixtures containing several insecticides and fungicides designed to combat a number of pests on many different plants.

These complex mixtures are retailed in small packages and differ from pesticides sold to commercial growers in that they may be left open and used repeatedly over a considerable period of time.

Malathion is one of the most common constituents of garden pesticides. It combines the unique properties of high toxicity toward a number of different insects with a relatively high degree of safety towards warm-blooded animals. Malathion decomposes upon the plant surface to yield nontoxic residues within a few days. This desirable property in a residue introduces difficulties with the unused malathion remaining in the package.

Pure malathion is a pale yellow liquid sealed in glass ampoules to prevent its decomposition by atmospheric moisture. For effective use it must be diluted either by dissolving into a spray liquid.

Although two thirds of the deficient malathion samples examined in some test cases were dusts, emulsifiable spray concentrates also decompose in storage. The rate of loss has not been too serious the first year, but older samples have deteriorated more rapidly.

Aerosol formulations have been outstanding in quality. This is the only type of package in which admission of atmospheric moisture is prevented by vapor-proof walls and internal pressure on the closure. Although aerosols are still rather expensive, new developments in packaging are under way and many improvements may be expected.

The American Can Company reports that it will soon be making aerosol containers of extruded aluminum tubing. Plastic and metal foil packages for both dust and liquids.

What can the consumer do to make an on-the-job garden pesticides? He can help himself a great deal by selecting fresh packages from a reputable retailer, and then storing them tightly closed in a dry cool place.

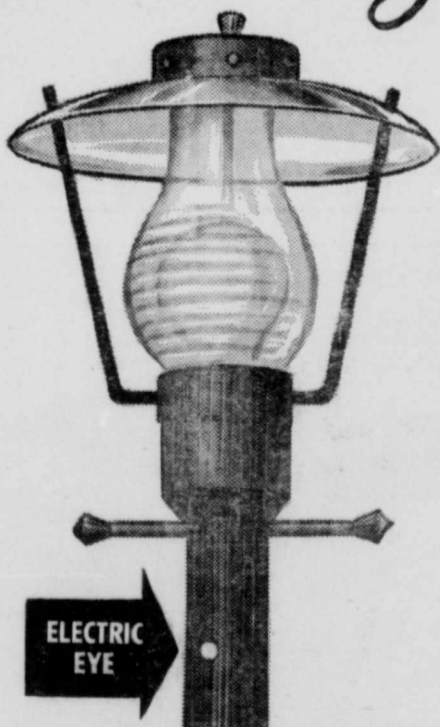

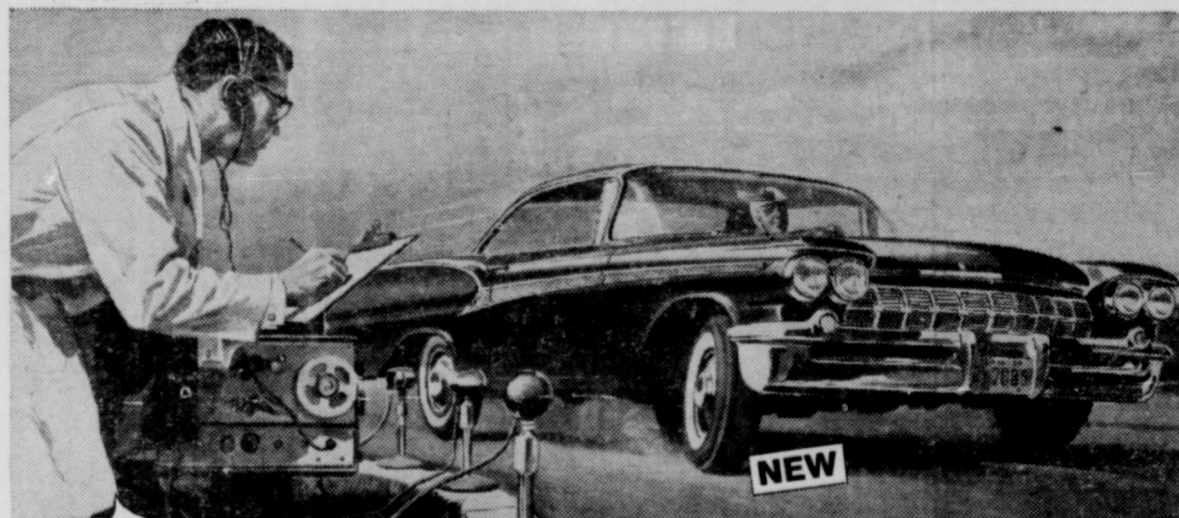

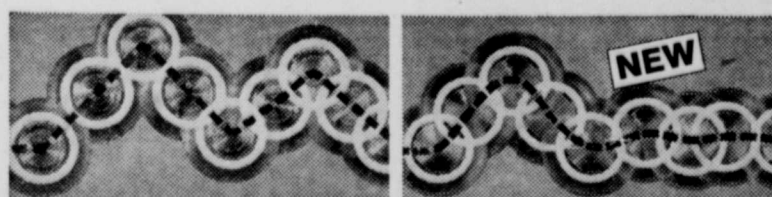

Transporting Children Safely By Bus Depends On Everybody Abiding By Law

Texas' largest transportation system is now in full swing. The State's fleet of more than 8,000 school buses. Furthermore, for the next nine months, these buses will carry the bulk of nearly 2,000,000 pupils to and from school each week day.

It is truly a Texas-size task to transport all these pupils. It is an even greater task to transport them safely. No one will deny the school bus driver has a tremendous responsibility.

But, says the Texas Safety Association, motorists are also charged with the safety of our school bus riding pupils. The State law is very precise on this point and reads as follows:

Sec. 104. Overtaking and Passing School Bus:

A. The driver of a vehicle upon a highway outside of the limits of any incorporated city or town upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus, which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging any school children shall stop the vehicle immediately before passing the school bus, but may then proceed past such school bus at a speed which is prudent, not exceeding ten miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children.

B. Every bus used for the transportation of school children shall bear upon the front and rear thereon a plainly visible sign containing the words "school bus" in letters not less than eight inches in height.

C. The driver of a vehicle upon a highway with separate roadway need not stop upon meeting or passing a school bus which is on a different roadway or when upon a controlled-access highway and the school bus is stopped in a loading zone which is a part of or adjacent to such highway and where pedestrians are not permitted to cross the roadway.

New Publication On Cotton Root Rot

College Station, Sept. 17 One of the most destructive cotton diseases in Texas is cotton root rot. It is not unusual for over 50 percent of plants in a cotton field to be killed by the disease in certain areas. On an average, the percent yield reduction in cotton is approximately equal to half the percentage of plants killed. In some wet years, the disease reduces the potential average yield by 25 percent in the Blackland Prairie.

Dr. L. S. Bird, associate professor of plant pathology, Texas A & M, says that many years of research have found six practices a farmer can use to reduce root rot losses. They are: deep-plow badly infested areas, grow resistant crops in rotation, turn under large tonnage of organic matter, produce early cotton, fertilize properly, and avoid excessive planting rates.

A combination of these practices carried on for a number of years is necessary for best results, Bird says. Where recommended practices have been carried out over a period of years, root rot damage was reduced from 75 percent to 5 percent or less. Combinations of practices to use vary in different areas of the state, he adds.

Cotton root rot occurs over all of Texas except the Panhandle and High Plains. It also occurs in Mexico, New Mexico, Arizona, California, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Nevada, Utah and Louisiana. It is prevalent in highly fertile, calcareous, alkaline soils. The disease flourishes with moderate moisture and is suppressed under very dry or very wet conditions. It is also unable to survive where the lowest temperatures are 10 degrees below zero.

Bird and extension specialists Harlan Smith and Fred Elliott are authors of a new publication released by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service titled "Root Rot Losses of Cotton Can Be Reduced." This publication is available from local county agents or the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas. Ask for MP-361.

COTTON DEFOLIATION

College Station, Sept. 15—The success or failure of mechanical harvesting of cotton is dependent upon the defoliation in favorable weather enables a producer to harvest just as high quality cotton as by hand pulling.

Arsenic acid and penta are the commonly used defoliants and both have their advantages and limitations. Arsenic acid is applied at the rate of 1½ to 2 quarts per acre mixed in about 8 gallons of water. This material is toxic to man and animals and is very corrosive. For these reasons, precautions must be taken to protect the applicators and the equipment. Cost of this material runs about \$1.75 per acre.

The recommended rate for penta is 2 quarts in 7 to 8 gallons of diesel or kerosene per acre. It is non-poisonous and has no corrosive action. However, Elliott adds, it is caustic and may cause burning around the nose, ears and lips of the operator. Since it is mixed with diesel or kerosene, the cost goes up to about \$3.00 per acre.

The addition of 2,4-D to the defoliate aids in the control of regrowth, in the event of rain between defoliation and harvest. The addition of one pint of 2,4-D per acre costs about \$.75. It is good only to control regrowth, and should not be used where the seed will be saved for planting purposes. Those who do use 2,4-D should do so only if they are thoroughly familiar with the material. Once 2,4-D is used in a machine, cautions Elliott, it cannot be washed out.

Amino triazole will also check regrowth and is recommended in the defoliation leaflet L-145, "Cotton Defoliation Guide," which is available at the county agent's office.

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IN THIS NUCLEAR AGE

CD's a Vital Part of Farm Safety

Civil and Defense Mobilization Director Leo A. Hoegh in a Farm Safety Week statement urges farmers to accept Rural Civil Defense as a vital part of farm safety in this nuclear age.

Mr. Hoegh pointed out that fallout from nuclear attack on key military, metropolitan and industrial centers could cover hundreds of thousands of square miles of the United States.

"EVERY FARM family, no matter how remote it may be from a target," he said, "should build a family fallout shelter and stock it properly. This means providing a two-week supply of food and water, a battery radio, a first-aid kit, flashlights, bed-

ding and other items that would be essential to your survival."

Mr. Hoegh said Farm Safety Week, July 19-25, serves to remind farmers of the need to recognize and support the objectives of the Farm Division of the National Safety Council.

He said: "This nation cannot survive and recover from attack without its farmers. Rural America has always carried a heavy burden in times of national emergency. In this nuclear age, it is more important than ever before."

Mr. Hoegh pointed out that fallout is one menace of thermonuclear attack against which

simple protective measures can be taken.

"It need not kill," he said. "It is up to you to take action. Nobody can do it for you, any more than they can ship you a packaged civil defense from a factory."

"SURVIVAL WILL always be a personal thing. What you know and do will determine whether you—and your family—will live to help the nation survive."

Director Hoegh said free plans and designs for various shelters can be obtained by writing to OCDM Rural Civil Defense, Battle Creek, Mich.

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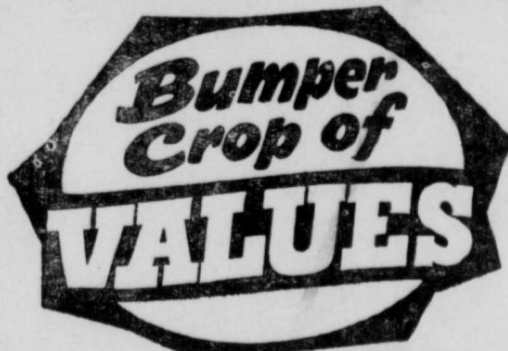
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
