For sewer, demolition work

City to apply for block grant

The Colorado City Council met briefly Tuesday night to discuss an application for another community Block Development Grant. After a discussion with Gary Smith of Abilene, the city's grant specialist, the council authorized Smith to submit an ap-

plication for sewer collection work and demolition work in two areas. The Council had been interested in asking for money to build elevated storage in the northwest part of town. Smith said that he had determined that the inclusion of such a bid would weak-

en the city's request for money, because it would benefit too many people. The elevated storage would benefit the minority poor but would also benefit hundreds of middle class citizens.

The request, as finally made, would benefit ab-

out 100 residents of Colorado City who do not have sewer available to them. These are mostly indigent or minorities, which are the target for block grants. If the city should get the \$500,000 it is asking for, this would be about \$5,000 per person benefited.

The areas which were selected as suitable include the area south of US 80 along the Colorado River, also south of the river on the south side and part of the south side. An additional area is the East Hill and south of the east

hill, all areas which do not presently have sewer service.

The council also approved specifications for a new garbage truck and approved specifications for a new landfill trench to be 250 feet by fifty feet by 20 feet deep.

City employee overcome by gas

Tip Chaney, 18, city employee, was overcome by methane gas about 5:40 p.m., Wednesday but was released from Root Memorial Hospital at noon, Thursday, apparently in good condition.

Chaney was part of a city crew that had gone to Gas and Grub to check out a sewer stoppage between the manhole at the West edge of Gas and Grub and the main sewer line over on College Avenue.

"I had pried the top off the manhole with a pick," Chaney said, "and I accidentally dropped the pick into the hole. I could see it and I went down the inside ladder to get it and I passed out. I came to about four hours later in the hospital."

Chaney had passed out and dropped into the sludge at the bottom of the hole. The fire department was called and as soon as volunteer fireman Gary Redwine, 31, arrived on the scene, ("Maybe a minute," he says) he had a rope tied under his arms and was carrying another rope.

Dove season to open

Thursday, September 1 marks the opening of dove season in Mitchell County, and this year the county hunting territory is divided into two zones, according to Game Warden Ronnie Aston.

Interstate 20 will be the boundary line for the zones. North of I-20 is known as the Panhandle Zone and the season begins September 1 and continues until November 9. South of I-20 is known as the Central Zone and dove season begins Sept. 1 and lasts until October 30, said Aston.

There is no license required for residents hunting in their own county, but an \$8 license is required if hunters hunt in another county. For \$12 a hunting and fishing license can be purchased. Licenses can be purchased at the Mitchell County Courthouse or at any local sporting goods store.

Hunters can start hunting 30 minutes before sun up and continue

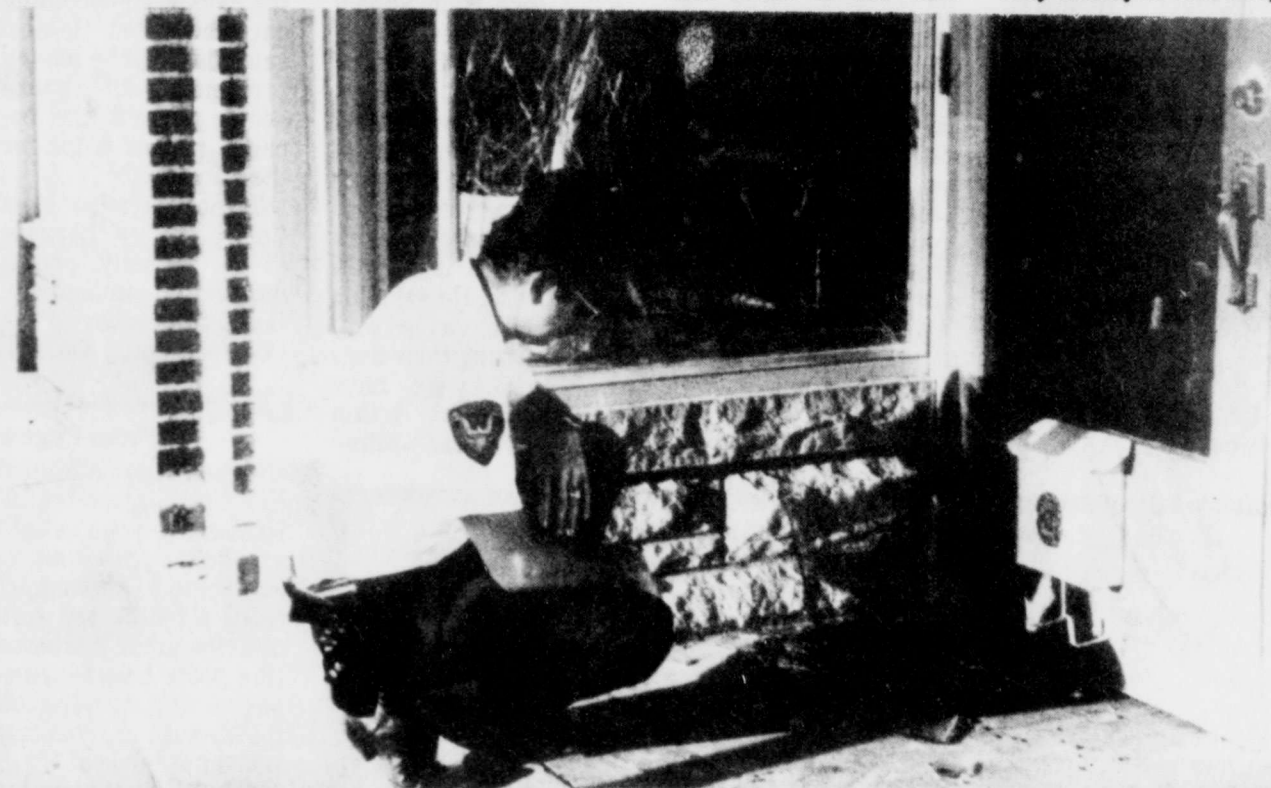
Tammen appeal dismissed

School enrollment on rise

The Colorado City and Westbrook Public School systems have an increase in enrollment this year as compared to last year at the beginning of school and the Loraine Public School system's enrollment is slightly down from last year.

So far this year there are 186 students enrolled in grades kindergarten to 12th at Westbrook. This is an increase of 10 students from last year, according to Westbrook school personnel.

Loraine school principal Al Pulcher said that attendance in Loraine has dropped slightly from the last school year. Last year 279 students attended grades kindergarten through 12th. So far this year 271

students are enrolled in classes this semester.

At Colorado City there is a 9.6 increase in student enrollment for 1983-84, according to superintendent Charlie Uselton.

Thirty-two students enrolled Tuesday, bringing the total enrollment of the four schools in Colorado City to 1,436. This compares to 1,390 enrolled last year at this time. Uselton stated that this is the highest enrollment in the school system in the last four years. "People are out of town or still on vacation, so we might have even more enroll later on," stated Uselton.

The individual breakdown on each school's enrollment is shown: Kelley Elementary (gr-

ades kindergarten through second) 347 students enrolled as compared to 345 last year. Hutchinson Elementary (grade third through fifth) have 341 students as compared to 334 last year.

Other school figures

include Colorado Middle School (grades sixth through eighth) has 378 students enrolled, as compared to 339 last year. Colorado High School (grades ninth through 12th) has 370 students as compared to 372 enrolled students last year.

Subscription drive continues one week

The CHS Band will continue their RECORD subscription drive for one more week.

This drive helps the band raise money for school projects and is their major money making project.

This year marks the 22nd consecutive year that the band has sold subscriptions. By doing so, the band raises money for educational trips, equipment and the annual band banquet.

A commission is given to the band for each subscription sold.

Twenty-thousand dollars has been collected over the past 22 years of the annual drive.

The cost for subscriptions are \$12.50 in county; \$15 for Texas subscriptions; \$17.50 out of state and \$10 for college students.

Juvenile confession clears three crimes

Police Chief Ed Wheat revealed Thursday that a juvenile Hispanic youth, called in for questioning about burglarizing an automobile, had confessed to two other crimes, including arson and vandalism.

The youth told police that he had burglarized an automobile belonging to Janie Campos on August 10th. The car was parked at 701 E. 4th and the youth took a purse from it. The purse contained money, a check book and pictures.

He said that on October 14th, 1982, he had burned a garage at 338

Locust. The garage contained a car which burned along with the garage. The adjoining house caught fire and part of the house was burned also.

On October 11th, 1982 he said that he had entered the Colorado Middle School and had committed acts of vandalism.

Chief Wheat said that the young man had been turned over to juvenile authorities for their attention. Juvenile authorities, Wheat said, are County Judge Bill Carter and County Attorney Dan Barber.

Sheep & goat field day set

The Texas A&M Research and Extension Center will hold its annual Sheep and Goat Field Day, September 1 at the Center located north of San Angelo on Highway 87. Registration for the field day which is open to the public will begin at 9:30 a.m.

The morning program will begin at 10 a.m. under the direction of Ken Cook, Extension District 7 Director. First on the program will be Dr. Carl Menzies, Center Director. Menzies is set to extend a welcome to participants

and to recognize the Hill and Winters families for their continued support of animal production research being carried out on their respective properties. Both ranches are presently being operated under lease agreement by Texas A&M University. The 8,400 acre Winters ranch is located in McCulloch County and the 3,500 acre Hill Ranch is located in Edwards County. Both ranches are involved in animal production work involving cattle, sheep and goats.

Following the welcome, Dr. Robert Kupe-

lian, National Directors of the IR-4 Project at Rutgers University, New Jersey, will present the current situation on new drug approval for the sheep and goat industry. The IR-4 Project is a national agricultural program that was initiated in 1963 to coordinate efforts of the agricultural community in obtaining minor and specialty use pesticide registrations. Through the years it has

been quite successful in this regard and has recently expanded its scope to include the area of minor use drugs for animals. The project is administered by the New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station at Rutgers University.

The morning session will conclude with an update of the current activities of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association given by Bill Sims, Executive Secretary.

SHRIMP SCAMPI
Large shrimp, peeled and deveined

Lemon juice
Salad oil
Dried, minced onion
Garlic powder
Salt, pepper

Combine equal amounts of lemon juice and salad oil in amount to cover shrimp. Mixture may be more lemon juice than oil if desired. Add seasonings and shrimp. Cover and refrigerate for at least two hours, longer is better. Broil on barbeque grill or in oven until shrimp is opaque. Serve with melted butter to dip shrimp into.

SUGARED PEANUTS
Roast 4 cups raw peanuts in slow oven until done.

Combine: 1 c. sugar

1/2 c. water
1 t. cinnamon
1 1/2 t. vanilla

Cook to 236 degrees or firm ball. Pour over peanuts. Toss and coat nuts well. Spread on waxed paper to cool. Break apart when cooled.

PEANUT BUTTER CANDY

1 1/2 boxes powdered sugar (6-7 cups)
3 c. peanut butter
2 sticks margarine,

softened
1-12 oz. pkg. chocolate chips

1/4 lb. paraffin
Mix sugar, margarine and peanut butter until creamy. Shape into small patties. Chill. Melt chocolate chips and paraffin over boiling water or in microwave. Dip patties in chocolate mixture. Place on waxed paper to cool. Or place each patty in paper baking cup.

Dearen to coach at Sul Ross University

Former Colorado City resident Larry Dearen, son of Mrs. Virginia Dearen and the late Toby Dearen, has accepted an assistant coaching position at Sul Ross State University in Alpine.

Coach Dearen's duties will be assistant football coach, coaching offensive ends and running backs, and on defense coaching the secondary. In the spring, his duties will be directing the conditioning and weight lifting program, coaching track and field and recruiting for the 1984

season. In the classroom, he will be teaching physical education classes during the fall and he will be an instructor in one of the education departments during the spring.

Dearen comes to Sul Ross from Kress High School where he coached four years. His first coaching assignment was at Motley County. The Colorado City native graduated from Colorado High School in 1972 where he was a tri-sport letterman, lettering in football, basketball and track.

After graduation, he attended Texas Tech University where he majored in physical education and obtained his degree in 1976, and is currently working on his Master's Degree. During his coaching career, he has coached on four district championship football teams, and in track he has coached five district championships, two regional championships and one second place finish in state.

He also compiled an 80-30 record in basketball. In addition to that, Dearen has been selected as a Texas All Star Track Coach and has received numerous national achievement awards. For the past two summers, Dearen has been selected by officials to attend a graduate tour in other countries—this year he went to Russia.

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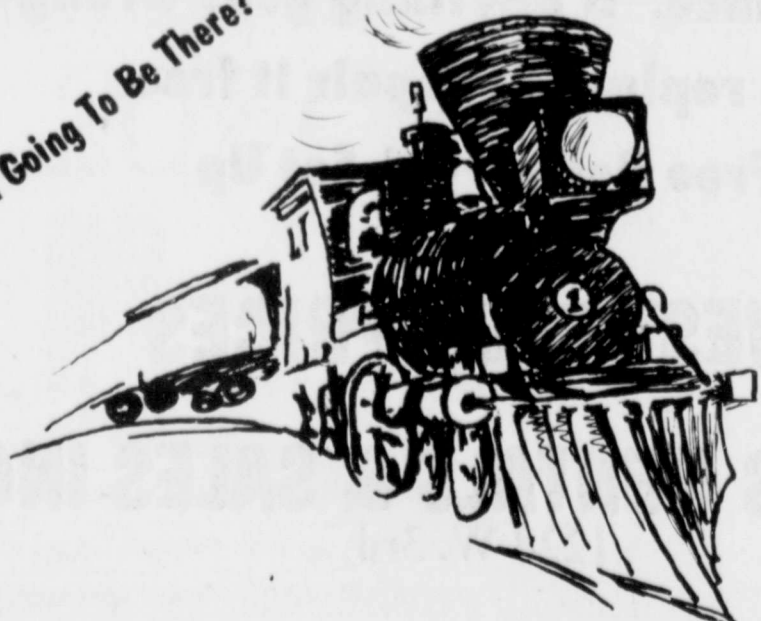

Low-interest housing bonds available Aug. 29

About \$217 million in low-interest housing bonds will be released to a host of state lending institutions later this week and could be available to first-time home buyers in Texas by Monday.

Right now it is now known where Mitchell County residents will have to report to make mortgage applications, said Housing Authority Director Vivian Rudick, but more than likely it will be in a surrounding larger city. For example, Big Spring residents will take their applications to Midland and Odessa.

The Texas Housing Agency approved the issuance of the bonds

Wednesday. The program is designed to help low and moderate income families purchase homes.

In addition to first time home buyers, persons who have not owned a home in three years are eligible under the mortgage program, according to Earline Jewett, the agency's executive administrator.

The interest on the bonds was set at 10.9 percent, the lowest yet offered in the three year history of the Texas Housing Agency. This compares with a rate of 11.2

percent in 1980 and an interest rate of 13.39 percent set in 1982.

A spokesman for the Texas Real Estate Research Venter at Texas A&M University said the bond money could fund about 4,340 mortgages, based on an average sales price of \$50,000.

To be eligible for the state-backed loan program, single borrowers must have an adjusted gross income of \$33,000 or less during 1982. Family incomes must not have exceeded \$42,000 for eligibility.

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Marians's Memos

I tried my hand at gardening this year... had pretty good luck... except for those nematodes! So, I ran across some material on treating nematodes and thought I'd share these ideas with you.

Nematodes in the vegetable garden can have a substantial effect on the production of vegetables such as green beans, okra, squash, cucumbers, tomatoes and many others. The standard recommendation has been to use resistant varieties, rotation, cereal rye as a winter cover crop and apply Vapam as a soil drench. Vapam is watered down to a depth of 6-8

inches. This is an expensive treatment and must be applied three weeks prior to planting. Vapam must also be applied when the soil temperature is between 50 and 85 degrees F. In the summer, the soil temperature is seldom below 85 degrees. When Vapam is applied at a temperature above 85 degrees, the pesticide

forms a gas at too fast a rate and the nematodes are not exposed to a lethal concentration of the nematicide. The period between spring and fall is an excellent time to reduce the nematode population by taking advantage of Mother Nature, and getting away with it. Don't gripe about that summer heat and dry conditions; use it to help in the control of nematodes.

Nematodes are animals that require water to survive. By removing the water and exposing them to high soil temperatures, they can be controlled with a minimum of financial ex-

pense. The month of August is an excellent time to till the soil and expose the nematodes to the drying effect of sunlight. The more times the soil is tilled or spaded, the more effective the treatment. Do not apply water during this time.

Another version of this is known as solarization. Solarization is a technique in which the soil is covered with clear plastic and left for a period of six-eight weeks. The plastic is tightly sealed around the edges of the area to be treated. This allows for extreme temperatures to be obtained beneath the plastic. The advantage of solarization is that it not only is reported to control nematodes but also many weed seed, soil fungi, and certain soil insects.

Student brochures were placed in the Loraine and Colorado City schools on Wednesday, August 24, by auxiliary members Dorothy Clark and Ann Ingram.

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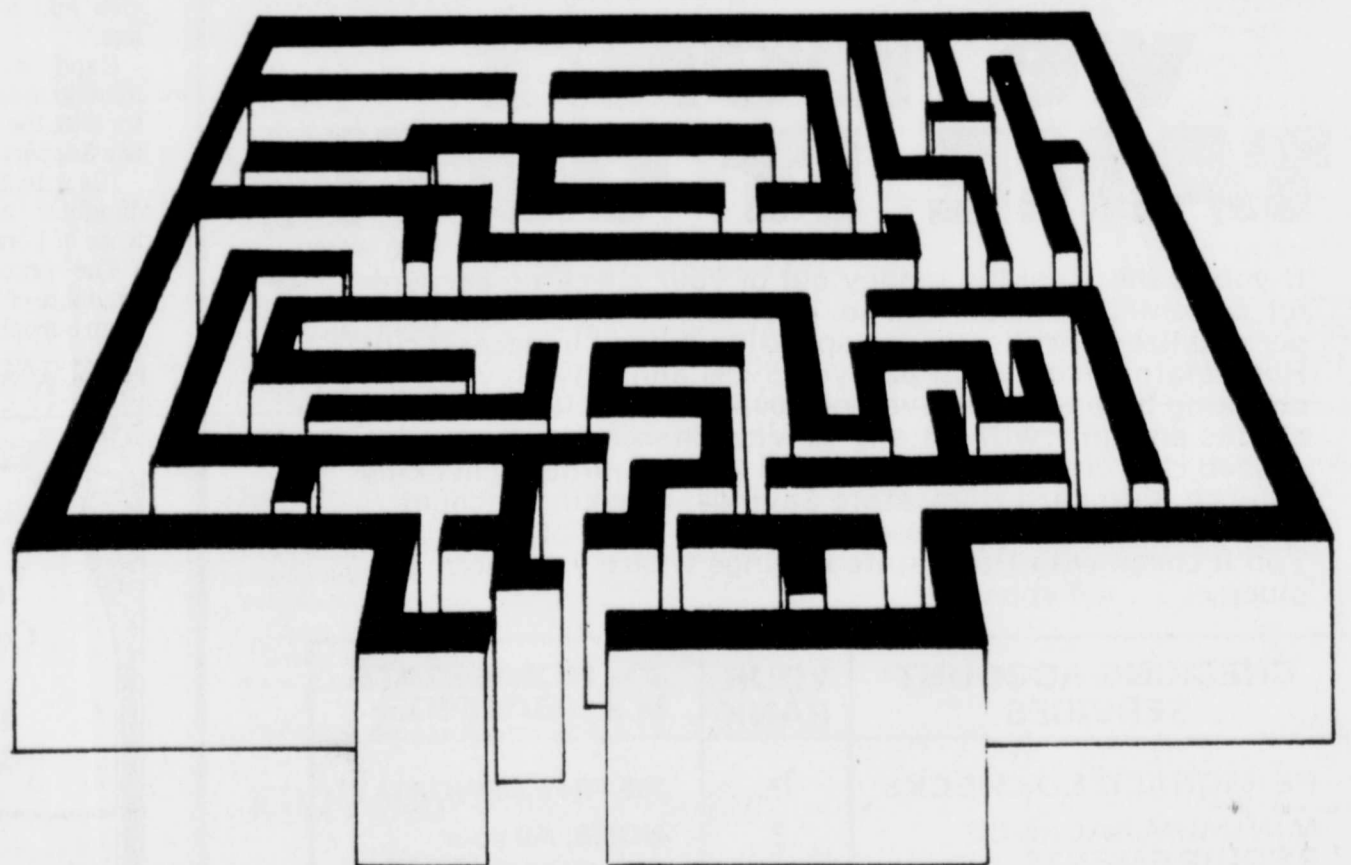

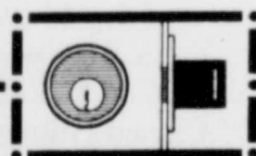

RATIOS
A ratio is defined as the comparison of two similar things. Erik is 20 years old. Nathan is 10 years old. The ratio of Erik to Nathan is written either of these two ways:
a) Erik or 20 or 2
b) Nathan 10
c) Erik:Nathan or 20:10 or 2:1

A proportion is the comparison of two equal ratios. Proportion is usually written in this form: 1:2 as 8:16 and is read "1 is to 2 as 8 is to 16". When solving the proportion, it would be written this way:
$$\frac{1}{2} = \frac{8}{16}$$

Some proportions will have an unknown for which you must solve. Remember this rule: **THE OUTSIDE VALUES MULTIPLIED EQUAL THE INSIDE VALUES MULTIPLIED.**
For example: 25 is to 3 as 100 is to x.
THINK: 25 and x are the outside values. 3 and 100 are the inside values.
a) $\frac{25}{3} = \frac{100}{x}$
b) $25 \times x = 3 \times 100$
c) $25x = 300$
d) $x = \frac{300}{25}$
