Three Wrecks Reported On Slick Highway

Three wrecks in less than a half hour were reported on U.S. 87 after ice-coated the highway early Tuesday. All were one-vehicle accidents, and although four persons were treated from two of the wrecks, no serious injuries resulted.

Around 7:45 a.m. about 5 miles north of Tahoka a 1992 Mazda Miata driven by Michael Borke, 42, of Lubbock skidded and overturned. He was not injured, according to Dept. of Public Safety officers who investigated all three accidents.

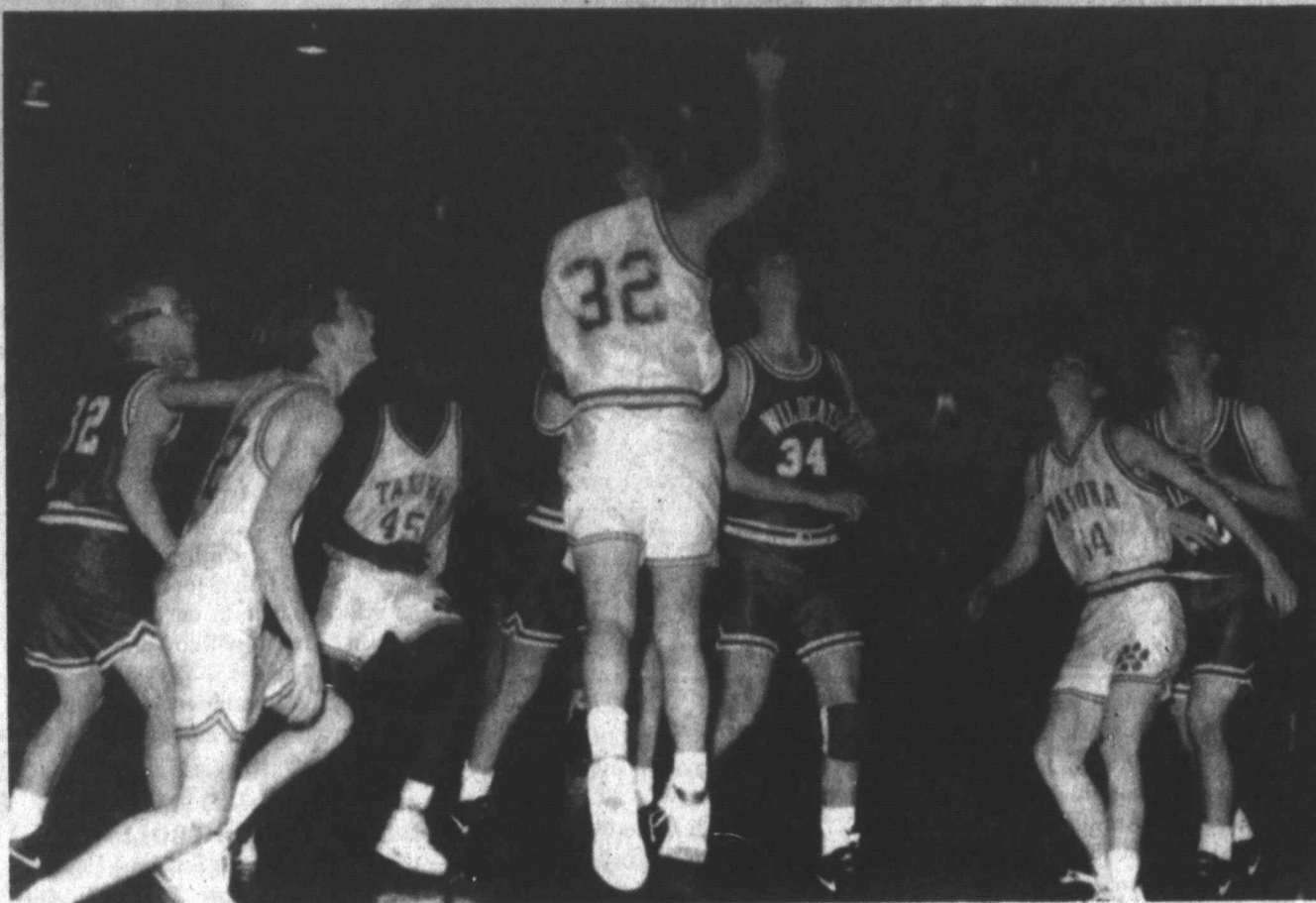
Five minutes later, about 3 miles north of Tahoka, a 1982 Ford pickup driven by Samuel Villagrana, 40, of Lamesa, skidded and overturned into the median. Five persons were in this vehicle, and three were treated at Lynn County Hospital and then released.

At 8:15 a.m. two miles south of Tahoka, a 1989 Ford Probe driven by Samantha Wene, 21, slid off the road and struck a concrete drain abutment, but did not overturn. She was treated at Lynn County Hospital for a shoulder injury and released.

A burglary at Bartley Grain and Fertilizer building Friday night resulted in the arrest of a suspect by Tahoka Police officers and sheriff's officers working together on the case. According to the sheriff's department, a hearing is to be held to seek revocation of the probation of a 26-year-old Tahoka man who had been convicted on a previous charge of burglary.

A four-row John Deere shredder was reported stolen between Wednesday and Monday near the north county line on the farm of Jimmy Smith. The shredder was valued at approximately \$7,000.

In jail during the week were 10 persons, on the following charges: criminal non-support, possession of a controlled substance (amphetamine) plus possession of marijuana under two ounces plus possession of nar-

cotics paraphernalia, application to revoke probation on charges on criminal mischief, burglary of a building, driving while intoxicated, DWI second offense, DWI second plus no drivers license and no insurance, DWI third offense plus no liability insurance.

193,760 Bales Ginned In Lynn

A total of 193,760 bales have been ginned in Lynn County from the recent cotton season, according to Lynn County Agent Wade Shackelford, who said the turnout of cotton averaged about .80 of a bale per acre this year. He said more definite figures on cotton and grain production would be available following a meeting between county agriculture officials within the next several days.

Grain was planted on some farms this year after early losses of cotton crops, but the cotton output was better than had been earlier expected.

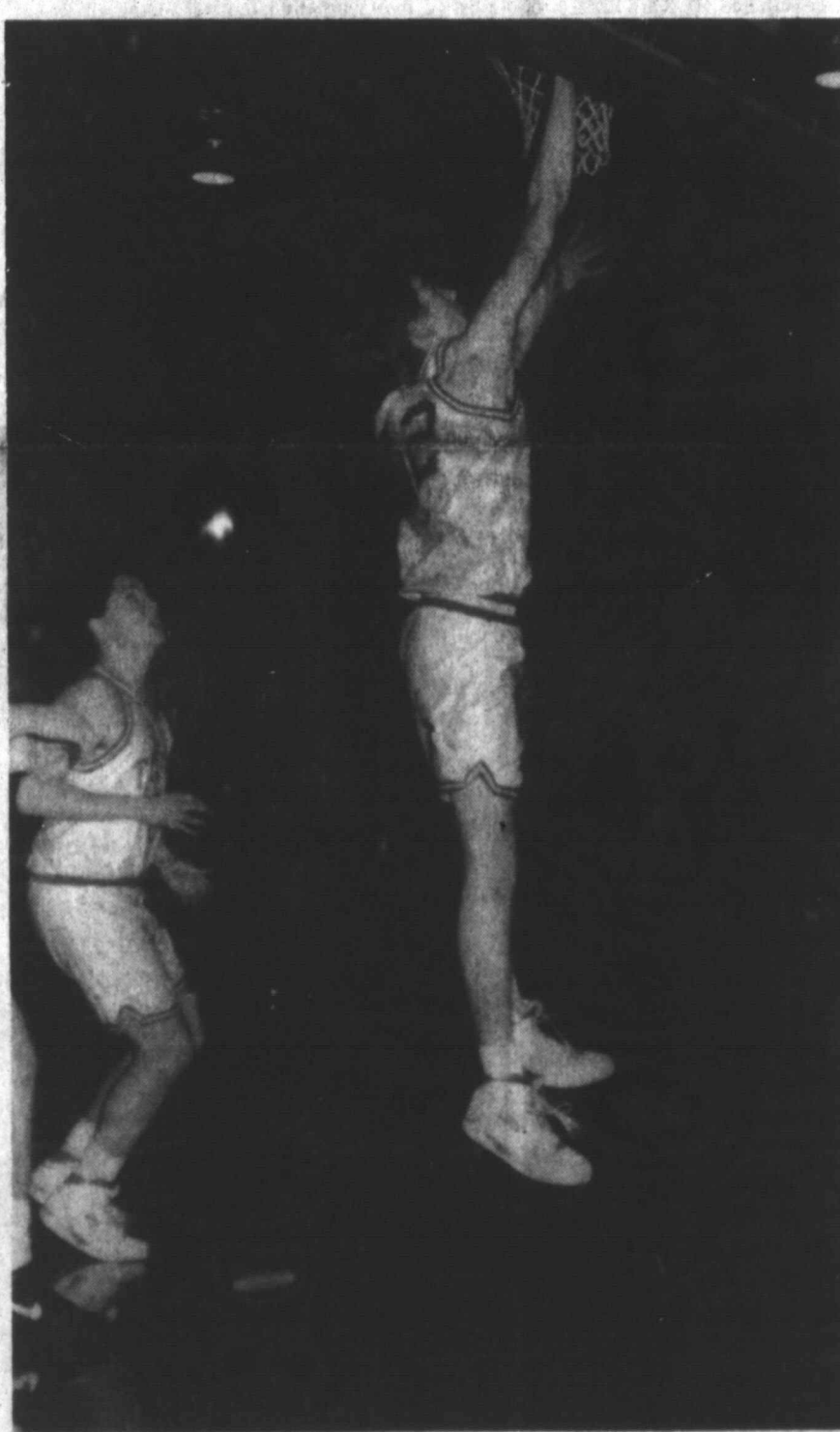

Sales Tax Checks For Month Sent

The state comptroller's office has delivered \$98.7 million in January sales tax rebates to 955 Texas cities and 109 counties, a 3.7 percent increase over their payment of one year ago.

This month's sales tax payments include taxes collected on November sales and reported to the comptroller in December by businesses filing monthly tax returns.

O'Donnell received \$1092, compared to \$916 for the same period last year. Tahoka showed a whopping increase to \$10,408 from last year's figure of \$2455. And Wilson collected \$1857 compared to no collections in the same period last year.

TISD Trustees Hire New Personnel; Review TAAS Test Score Results

A high school English teacher, secretary and elementary teaching assistant were hired by Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees at their regular meeting last Thursday evening. Trustees also reviewed TAAS test score results, approved a substitute teacher list, and amended the budget to allow funds for the single member district project.

Mrs. Lisa Ruiz Ramirez of Lubbock was employed by the district to teach high school English for the remainder of the school year, following the resignation of Mrs. Barbara Foster. Sarah Marez Gutierrez of Tahoka was employed as a secretary/clerk in the high school counselor's office, and Jackie Green of Tahoka was hired as an elementary teaching assistant.

Mrs. Sherri McCord, high school counselor, reviewed TAAS (Texas Assessment of Academic Skills) test score results from grades 3, 7, and 11, noting that the test scores had improved somewhat and that test scores in grade 7 were the best the district had shown for that grade level. The test was given in September. New state mandates changing the testing date and grade levels require the district to give the TAAS test to grades 4, 8 and 10 in May beginning this year.

In other business, trustees voted unanimously to amend the budget by \$5,000 to cover the cost of the single member district project, including demographer fees and legal costs. Trustees voted last month to initiate

procedures changing the way trustees are elected to the school board from an at-large method to single member districts. Trustees and an advisory council, composed of nine parent/community members, will meet tonight (Thursday) at 7:30 p.m. to discuss the procedure with demographer Dr. Mark Turnbough. The new election process, however, will not affect this year's school board election, but should be in place for the 1994 school trustee election.

A list of four substitute teachers was approved by the board, including Linda Tillman, Cheryl Krey, Chrystal Bradsher and James Brookshire.

Bookkeeper Mrs. Loretta Tekell reported an account balance in all funds of \$1,288,637.83, and Superintendent Dr. Duane Carter reported a first semester ADA (average daily attendance) of 695 in the district, up considerably from an ADA count of 676 for the district at this time last year.

After some discussion between trustees and the superintendent, Dr. Carter also agreed to prepare a job description/salary schedule for district secretarial employees for the board's consideration.

Present at the four-hour meeting were all board members: Myrtle White, Greg Henley, Juanell Jones, Delbert McCleskey, Brad Hammonds, Dan Lee Stone, and Mike Huffaker; and school personnel: Dr. Carter, Molly Helmlinger, Mrs. Tekell, Minnie Lou Ash, Charles Cate, and Mrs. McCord.

WISD Administrators Serving On Area Steering Committee

Nancy Templeton, W.I.S.D. superintendent, and Bob Williams, Wilson High School Principal, are serving as members of the South Plains Tech Prep Consortium steering committee. The South Plains Tech Prep Consortium is a partnership between area school districts, South Plains College, Texas Tech University, business and industry, the Private Industry Council, and the South Plains Quality Work Force.

The purpose of the South Plains Tech Prep Consortium is to provide leadership and a mechanism for members and partner organizations to build a quality work force and foster economic prosperity in the South Plains region of Texas through cooperative effort. The South Plains Tech Prep Consortium will implement Tech Prep/Associate Degree curricula in the South Plains region. The Consortium will also comply with the Tech Prep High School and Associate of Applied Science Degree Guidelines required by the Texas Education Agency, the Texas

Higher Education Coordinating Board, and the Texas Dept. of Commerce.

The steering committee will be the chief decision-making committee of the consortium. Mrs. Templeton attended the first meeting of the steering committee in Levelland at South Plains College on Jan. 4, 1993.

The next meeting of the South Plains Tech Prep Consortium Steering Committee will be held on Feb. 1 in Lubbock.

FARMWORKERS ADVISED NOT TO FILE RETURNS WITH 1099s

Farmworkers have been advised by the Texas Rural Legal Aid not to file income tax returns with the 1099-MISC forms commonly received from farm employers who issue them instead of W-2 forms because they consider the farmworkers as independent contractors.

The legal aid group claims that most farmworkers would get a refund if W-2 forms are filed, but would pay taxes if 1099s are used.

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St. John Lutheran Church, Wilson To Celebrate 75th Anniversary

Tuesday, January, 26, 1993 marks the 75th anniversary of St. John Lutheran Church in Wilson. The congregation will celebrate this anniversary on Sunday, Jan. 24 with worship services, guest speakers, a noon meal, and an afternoon festival worship service and fellowship time.

The celebration will begin at 9:30 a.m. with coffee and doughnuts, and Sunday School classes. Rev. Rodney Maeker, a son of the congregation, will preach at the morning worship with Holy Communion, beginning at 10:45 a.m. A noon meal will follow the morning worship service, and a Festival Worship Service will begin at 2 p.m. when pastors and guests will share greetings, with a reception and fellowship time to follow.

CHURCH HISTORY

Seventy-five years ago, on January 26, 1918, the Rev. Roland Schluter formally organized a small group of worshippers into a congregation. Records indicate seven charter-member families of this first Lutheran congregation in Lynn County. This group included Anton Ahrens, August Nieman, J.H. Sander, Henry Hillen, Charles Lichey, Fritz Nieman and Emil Nieman as well as their respective families. This congregation became affiliated with the First Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Texas.

In June of 1918, Rev. Schluter left the area and Pastor A.L.E. Webers served both the Lockney parish and the Wilson-Slaton parish.

Rev. Weber died on Dec. 7, 1918, and then in July of 1919, Rev. A.B. Weiss came to the area, and he served the area from Amarillo to Post. Pastor Weiss began serving the Wilson church. Since he had such a large area of service, and since St. John had no house of worship, services were held only twice a month, in various locations.

The situation changed little for several years until January of 1925, when an agreement was reached with the Methodist Church to use their building twice a month. Also in June of 1925, Pastor Weiss received some help in the fact that Pastor John Flierl, who was a foreign missionary on furlough from New Guinea, began to help serve the congregations in the Lockney, Wilson, and Slaton parishes.

In the early part of 1926, the Wilson congregation agreed to purchase the old Community Church which had become property of the Baptist Church. Following weeks of redecorating and repairing the building, on March 7, 1926, the building was dedicated with Rev. W. Flierl of Buckholts, Texas conducting the services. Rev. W. Flierl was the brother of Rev. John Flierl who was missionary-pastor at St. Johns at this time.

Rev. Carl N. Roth was ordained and installed as St. Johns first resident pastor on Sept. 19, 1926.

The final major event of 1926 was the inauguration of the English language into the service. Up until Oct. 24, 1926, all services had been held in German, but on this date, the congregation held their first English language service, and would continue the once-a-month use of the English language until 1938.

The Ladies-Aid Society of St. Johns Lutheran Church was organized on Feb. 20, 1927 with 14 charter members: Mrs. Hulda Ahrens, Mrs. Annie Ehlers, Mrs. Lenora Kahlich, Mrs. Katie Mueller, Mrs. Ida Nieman, Mrs. Dorothy Nessel, Mrs. Elsie Shambeck, Mrs. Freida Schaffner, Melanie Mueller, Hulda Nieman, Elise Nieman, Pauline Hagens, Ida Nessel, and Matilda Hillen. In November 1928, the Society decided to make a major investment in the church property. The church building did not have electrical service, and all the lighting was provided by carbide lights with the fuel tank in the cellar behind the church. The ladies decided to electrify the building and they spent the sum of \$68.52 to do this.

St. Johns did not have a parsonage for the pastor to live in, so Pastor Roth had been rooming in various locations. His first room was in the West house which was a large two-story house located across from the school, probably about where the family of Donald Klaus now lives. After Pastor Roth had lived in the room for several weeks, he heard the story that the room he lived in was supposedly haunted since the prior resident had died under mysterious circumstances in the room. Pastor Roth lived in this location for about one year. He then moved into a spare bedroom of the home of Louis Mueller. In 1928, the congregation purchased property behind the church for \$105. Pastor Roth then drew the plans for the house. When the congregation met to approve the plans, one member said "Pastor, you are yet alone, and want so big a house." So Pastor Roth said "Then let us cut and make it a bit smaller." Pastor Roth then redrew the plans, cutting four feet from the length and two feet from the width. This building was then built, along with a garage. A well was dug, and a windmill was erected as well. The total cash outlay for this project was \$2,400.

On Nov. 25, 1929, the parsonage was dedicated, and at the same time, a new reed organ was purchased for the church. The congregation then had 155 members and 75 communicants. The Ladies-Aid Society showed 20 members and Sunday School enrollment was 50.

These were the depression years, and St. Johns and its members went through hard times, along with the rest of the nation. However, the Wilson parish consisting of congregations in

Wilson, Lamesa, Southland, O'Donnell, and Portales, NM, continued to grow in membership, and were financially able to hold their own. Between 1932 and 1935, various district and boundary realignments left the Wilson parish a two congregation parish with congregations at Wilson and Southland. This final alignment took place in July of 1935. With the Wilson parish now a two point parish, both congregations were able to have clergy-led services every Sunday. In 1934, Pastor Roth moved to St. John Lutheran at Winters.

On May 17, 1934, the Luther League which had been meeting informally for several years was chartered with 17 members.

On June 17, 1934, Rev. E. Herber, from Lockney, was installed as pastor of the Wilson parish which consisted of congregations in Wilson, Southland, and Lamesa.

In 1938, the congregation agreed to reverse the language situation and went to a schedule of three English language services and one German language service per month.

Also in 1938, the congregation started a fund for a new building to be erected on the original site. Most of the lumber from the old building was reused and the new building was completed at an approximate cost of \$5,700. Most of the labor was donated by the members.

On March 17, 1940, two services were held to dedicate the new building. Dedication rites were read by Rev. E. Herber, and he was assisted by Revs. C.N. Roth, F.T. Sager and Theo Sager. It was about this time when the congregation decided to conduct all of its services in the English language.

On Feb. 1, 1942, the 25th anniversary service was held.

In June 1946, Pastor Herber moved to Thrall, Texas. Pastor Herber had served Wilson for 12 years.

Rev. Ernst C. Poehlmann was installed as St. Johns next pastor in November 1946. Rev. Poehlmann stayed as pastor until May of 1948.

In 1948, the Ladies-Aid Society became affiliated with the Women's Missionary Federation of the American Lutheran Church. The society's name was changed to the Women's Missionary Society of St. Johns Lutheran Church.

In July/August 1948, the Southland congregation was added to the Slaton

parish, and St. Johns declared itself an independent congregation. Candidate C.C. Ehler of Wartburg Seminary in Iowa was called to serve as intern. With his coming, attendance and membership began to grow again.

The congregation elected to participate in a stewardship program in the fall of 1949, called Christian Rural Overseas Program or C.R.O.P. This program was designed to send raw cotton to the needy all over the world. St. Johns led all congregations in Texas with more than \$2,000 worth of cotton being contributed by St. Johns' members.

On March 10, 1950, the congregation celebrated the 10th anniversary of the dedication of the new building by dedicating a new Baldwin electric organ. The congregation raised the \$3,000 to purchase the organ in just two weeks. This organ replaced the one which had been bought in 1929.

In August, 1950, student, Leslie W. Huebner was installed as pastor when Pastor C.C. Ehler returned to the seminary. Pastor Clarence C. Ehler was installed as pastor on July 1, 1951. The current heating system was installed in the church in November 1951.

During the latter part of 1949, and the early part of 1950, St. Johns participated in a program sponsored by the Lutheran Resettlement Service of the National Lutheran Council of the Lutheran World Federation. This program was designed to help displaced East-European families to relocate to the United States. These families would be provided with a job and a place to live until they were able to assimilate into American society.

There were approximately eight families who came to the South Plains and the Wilson/St. Johns area. Edmund Maeker and his family sponsored two of these families. Valdemars Grinberg, his wife, Parsla, and their three children, Juris (George), Maruta, and Anda, arrived in June 1950, from Latvia. They

became a part of the community until they left in the summer of 1953, and moved to Nebraska. Oscar and Erna Bock and their daughter, Hilda, came to Edmund's from Germany, and they stayed until the spring of 1952, when they left to wind up in California.

Roland Stegemoeller and family hosted Alfred and Martha Hoehn and their three daughters, Anna, Vera, and Lauri (Larkin) from Germany. They stayed until they left and settled in New York.

J.L. Hyde of Wilson sponsored a Mr. Kiesel who was a blacksmith. Walter Savell sponsored a family named Samelkavich who went to Washington State, and a family named Klepher lived at Roposville, but attended church at St. Johns until they moved to Ohio. Two other families came from Germany and only stayed a few months with their hosts. John and Emma Heigle and daughter, Maritann, stayed with the Wilbert Wuensche family and a family named Stumph were guests of the Herman Wuensche family.

Several of these matchings of families have turned into life-long friendships with reunions occurring as often as time permits.

During this same time, partially due to the interest of Juris Grinberg, the brotherhood began to sponsor a Boy Scout troop.

Pastor Ehler resigned in January 1954, and Pastor Malcolm E. Hoffman was installed as pastor on July 11, 1954.

On Oct. 2, 1956, ground was broken for a new educational building and in March 1957, the educational building was dedicated at an approximate cost of \$12,000.

On May 24, 1957, several St. Johns members suffered losses to their homes when a tornado roared through the area. Some of those who suffered losses were Walter and Emma Maeker and Leonard and Juanel Brieger.

In December of 1957, Pastor Hoffman resigned and left. In July 1958, Pastor J.P. Burnett came to Wilson.

In May of 1960, several small Lutheran groups affiliated themselves with the ALC and due to this, the boundaries of the old Texas District were changed and the Southern District of the ALC was created and St. Johns became a member of this district.

In February of 1960, the congregation voted to remodel the chancel area of the church building, upon recommendation of the building committee. Pastor J.P. Burnett resigned in January 1962.

In March of 1961, a new ALC constitution was drafted and adopted. At this time, the name of the congregation

was set to be St. John Lutheran Church. This settled the question concerning if there was an "S" on the end of the word John.

In May of 1962, Pastor John Onda accepted a call to St. John.

On Nov. 6, 1966, Pastor Fred Hamilton accepted the call to St. John. He resigned in January 1969, and Pastor Leo Widdell was called in March.

Sept. 7, 1969, marked an event which has happened only one time in the history of St. John Lutheran Church. On this date, Pastor Rodney Maeker was ordained as a minister of the Holy Gospel. This was the first and only time that one of St. John's members has been ordained to the ministry.

In October 1970, Pastor Widdell resigned and Louis Balderach was called in January 1971.

Pastor Louis Balderach resigned in August 1974, and St. John was without a pastor for almost a year. In August 1975, Bob Zacharias accepted the call to St. John.

During the time of vacancy, before Pastor Zacharias arrived, the parsonage was remodeled and enlarged with the addition of a bedroom and a bathroom.

In 1977 a plan for finishing the sanctuary remodeling which had begun in 1960 was implemented.

In August, 1983, Pastor Zacharias resigned and in September, 1983, Pastor Rueckwald was engaged as interim pastor.

Pastor Greg Pietz accepted a call to St. John Lutheran Church in April, 1984.

In 1988, St. John became a part of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

Pastor Pietz resigned in June 1988, and Pastor Tom Dietzel became the interim pastor for almost a full year. The year of 1989 saw major repairs

on all three church-owned buildings.

In May 1989, a program called "Young at Heart" was started. This program, while aimed at Senior Citizens, provides a time of fellowship, fun, and food for anyone who cares to attend the monthly meetings. A second outreach ministry, commonly referred to as Snackmeal Sack, was started in March 1990. In this program, a meal is packaged for handing out to those in need. Most of these snacks are distributed through the Neighborhood House and through the local Department of Public Safety.

In July 1989, St. John filled its pastoral vacancy by calling Walter Kamrath.

In August 1991, Pastor Kamrath resigned and David Mumford was engaged as interim pastor. Pastor Mumford was ordained in November 1991, and immediately accepted a call to St. John as pastor.

Several of St. John's long term members who had contributed to St. John's ministry were honored in 1991-92. Two ladies who had seen after the church and the parish hall retired. Gertrude Gindorf and Elvera Traweck each received a large-print Bible and a third large-print Bible was presented the congregation in their honor. St. John's has three ladies who have served the congregation as organists and pianists for many years. They are Onita Steinhauer, Wanda Stegemoeller, and Mary Francis Wilke.

St. John Lutheran Church has had 18 pastors in its 75 years. 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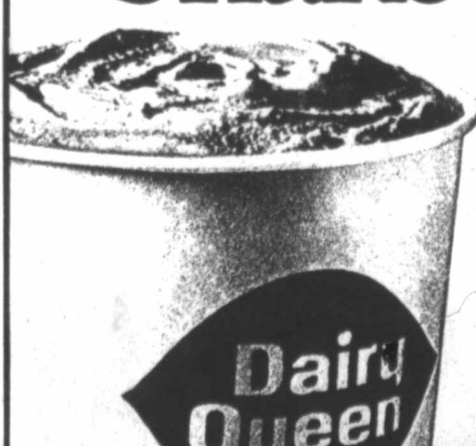


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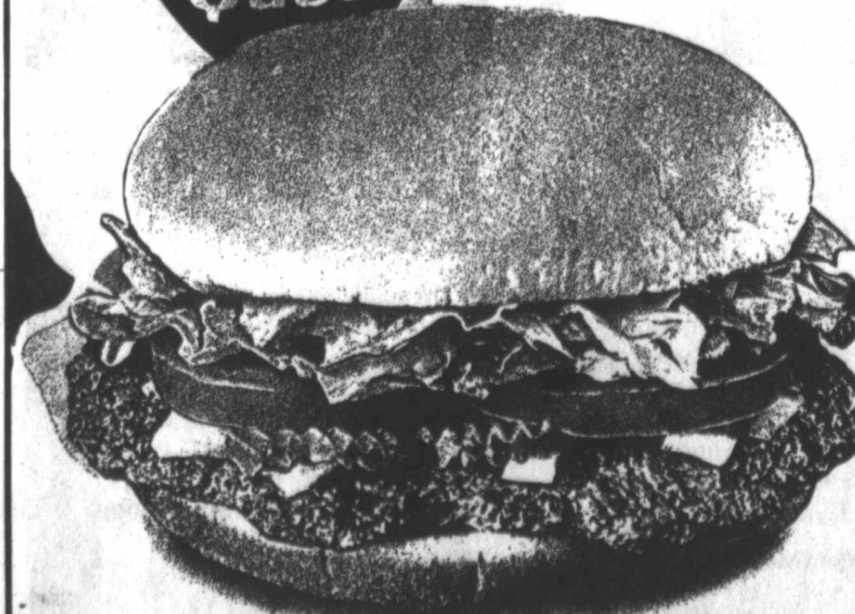

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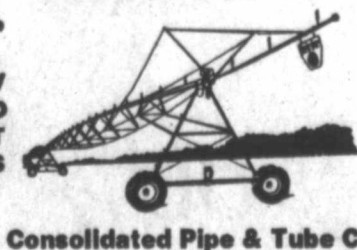
