## Committee Reports In Favor Establishment of Day Care Center

### Easter Seal Appeal To Start Feb. 23

The 1970 Easter Seal Appeal will open in Aransas County on Monday, Feb. 23, according to Henry Patton, who serves as Easter Seal representative for the county. Patton said that Easter Seal Appeal letters would begin arriving at homes in the county about March 1. As Easter Seal representative, he is the local contact to request rehabilitation services from the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and adults in Texas. These services include physical and occupational therapy, speech and hearing program and special information services to help solve the many problems faced by the families of handicapped children and adults. Last year 20,378 handicapped people received help from the Texas Society, Patton explained. But the costs of providing expert professional care are rising, and more money than ever will be needed, he said.

### Live Oak PTA Book Exhibit

Live Oak Elementary PTA is sponsoring a book exhibit from March 2 through March 13. The purpose of the exhibit is to finish more books for the ever-growing library. The books on exhibit will be the 1970 collection of books just received from the publishers.

## Man Takes Car And Apologizes

Sheriff Bob Hewes reported that while Charles Harley Walters of Fulton was returning from Houston Sunday night he stopped to aid a "distressed motorist." Walters gave the man a ride and after traveling about four miles toward Rockport the man pulled a gun on Walters and made him pull his vehicle to the side of the road, Hewes said.

Walters told Hewes that the man was very polite and apologized for taking his car and also let Walters have his clothing out of the car. Walters, after being let out on the road, hurried to Stobbs Grocery on Highway 35, north of Rockport and called the Sheriff's Department.

Two units were dispatched: one, Deputy Sheriff Charles Cosby went to Stobbs to contact Walters; the other, Sheriff Hewes and Deputy Joe Williams hurried north on Highway 35 to see if they could catch up with the car.

All law enforcement agencies north and west of Rockport were put on the alert for the stolen vehicle and just 29 minutes after the armed robbery had been reported to the Sheriff's office Patrolman Thielan of the Port Lavaca Police Department had in custody George Chisholm of Aransas Pass.

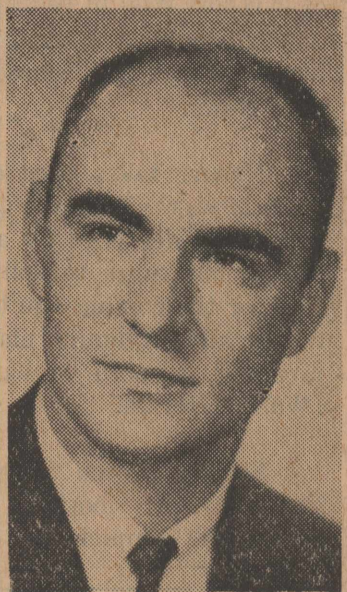
Sheriff Hewes and Deputy Williams proceeded to Port Lavaca and brought Chisholm back to the county jail where bond was set at \$5,000 by Justice of the Peace Lawrence Miller for robbery by firearms.

While checking on the pistol used in the robbery, Hewes said he learned the pistol had been stolen earlier Sunday from a private residence in Aransas Pass, also a credit card in a name other than that of Chisholm was in his possession and a call to Corpus Christi brought word from Omaha, Neb. that the man who owned the card had skipped out on approximately \$6,000 in unpaid bills. Chisholm is in the County Jail at this time unable to make bond.

## County Orders Voting Machines

Aransas County has ordered 40 briefcase-size voting machines which will be installed in the polling places and ready for use in the May 2 Democratic primary election.

The voting machines are compact devices, 18 by 22 by 3 1/2 inches, and called Steek-Vot-A-Makers. To use one, the voter employs a stylus to punch a ballot card. The decision to purchase 40 Steek-Vot-A-Makers was made at a Commissioners Court meeting on a split vote. Commissioners Raymond Owens and Mrs. Lu-dene Wofford voted in favor of the purchase, Commissioners W. B. Allen and Mrs. Wanda Sparks voted against buying and County Judge John D. Wendell broke the tie by voting in favor of the purchase.

To purchase the Steek-Vot-A-Makers, the county has authorized the issuance on Mar. 9, 1970, of general fund time warrants in payment of the machines not to exceed \$8,000, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed 5% per annum and maturing serially with the maximum date of Mar. 9, 1971.

Judge Wendell said the purchase provides not only obtaining the Steek-Vot-A-Makers but also gives the county the right to lease the equipment to the city, Navigation District, (continued on page 8)

### Local Man Dies In Accident

A Rockport man was killed and three other persons injured Sunday when their car went out of control and rolled over on Farm Road 881 about 11 miles west of Rockport.

Sherman Carter, 53, was pronounced dead at the scene about 1:45 p.m. He was a passenger in a car driven by Willie Roy Simmons, 29, of Rockport.

Simmons was admitted to Lyman-Roberts Hospital in Aransas Pass where he was reported in fair condition with a neck injury. Other injured passengers in the car were Algie Lee Simmons, 30, of Rockport and Mrs. Betty Jo Simmons, 18, also of Rockport. Both were treated for injuries at the Aransas Pass hospital and released.

Investigating highway patrolmen reported the car was going east on Farm Road 881 when a tire blew out on the car and it went out of control on a curve. The car rolled over two times and landed on its side, according to patrolmen. Funeral services for Carter were scheduled to be held in Mexia, Texas.

### Schools Surveying Age Groups, 1 to 14

The Aransas County school system is conducting a survey to learn the number of children in all age brackets between ages of 1 and 14. It is very important that every child in the school district be counted. The results of this survey will be used in making a five-year comprehensive education plan.

On Monday survey forms were sent home with students who are enrolled in the public kindergartens, the elementary schools, and the junior high school. Parents are requested to fill out one form per family, listing all the children in the family between the ages of one and 14. Parents are asked to list the names and ages of their children as they appear on the birth certificate.

Any parent who has a child the age of 14 and who has not completed a survey form is asked to go to Fulton Elementary, Rockport Elementary or Live Elementary, and register your child or children. This registration is to be completed by Tuesday, Feb. 24.

The Albatross won local and area fame by playing with Steppenwolf at a recent concert. The dance will be from 8:30 p.m. to midnight and a big turnout is expected.

Santa Fe International Corp. plans to phase out the Gulf of Mexico operations of its Rockport-based subsidiary, Caspary-Wendell, Inc.

The subsidiary operates a fleet of supply and utility boats serving the petroleum industry.

Ed L. Shannon, Jr., Santa Fe International president, said the parent company is accelerating the transfer of the fleet to foreign operations.

It is transferring only the larger vessels which are more suitable for foreign operations. The company plans to put 11 of the Caspary-Wendell fleet on the block. This is being done as those boats operating under contracts complete their work.

An apparent slowdown in Gulf of Mexico offshore petroleum operations figured in the decision to phase out Caspary-Wendell's operations along the Gulf Coast.

The firm has a staff of 10 at Rockport, headed by Delo Caspary, president of the subsidiary and a director of the parent corporation.

The Rockport office will be closed as will one at Morgan City, La.

In time, Shannon said, management of Caspary-Wendell will be transferred from Rockport to Santa Fe Springs, Cal., the home base of the parent company.

Caspary-Wendell has 27 boats in its fleet.

Seven of them are working abroad and one is servicing Santa Fe's Blue Water No. 2 drilling platform off the California coast. Another, the tug Lead Horse, is in service between the Gulf Coast and Nigeria, on Africa's west coast.

There are 18 boats in service in the Gulf of Mexico. Shannon said his company's "greatest strengths are in its foreign operations and our interests will best be served by deploying Caspary-Wendell's most suitable vessels to these areas."—Houston Chronicle.

Chief E. D. Taylor and Patrolmen Tommy Ochoa and Thomas Vannoy have completed a six-week police school conducted in Aransas Pass by law enforcement authorities from Texas A&M University. The three men received certificates signifying that they had received instruction in all phases of law enforcement including firearms, criminal investigation, patrolling, laws enforcement, court procedures, handling juveniles, field investigation, first aid and defense tactics.

### CONTINUE 20% FIRE INSURANCE REDUCTION

The Insurance Commission announced in Austin that a 20 per cent credit has been granted on fire insurance rates

in the Rockport area. This will go into effect March 1. Credited for this saving is the protection provided by the local fire department.

### COUNTY OFFICIALS' SALARIES RAISED

The county attorney, county commissioners and county judge automatically received an increase in salary under the provisions of Article 2350 RCS Texas civil statutes.

This will raise the county attorney's salary from \$87.50 to \$110 per month; county judge from \$225 to \$250; and commissioners from \$1,500 to \$1,800 per year.

Under the statute, county officials' salaries are raised when a valuation of \$6,000,000 in the county is reached. Another raise will come when the valuation reaches \$9,000,000.

With a terrible urgency, about four million persons in this country wait for science to solve the riddle of why human cells go wild and kill the host that nurtures them.

These four million include the loved ones—the families—as well as the one million Americans who at this instant suffer from a disease that may kill at least two-thirds of them. The other one-third will survive because some of the answers are known and medical science was summoned in time to save them.

For those suffering from cancer there is a constant question: "Will research find the answers in time to save my life?"

It's not an unfair question. When you look about and see the immensity of science today with its computers, gathering limitless facts about market trends and product potentials; about the tensil strength of wings to carry jets at speeds faster than sound; to compute the course of missiles to the moon and projectiles between continents; or even to improve the taste of toothpaste.

These loved ones might think it is fair indeed to ask if the billions spent by research to find these answers to a better life are matched by billions more to find answers to preserve a life.

In truth, of course, only a tiny fraction of the

nation's research expenditure is spent on cancer.

The fact is that cancer will not be controlled until the public demands, yes, insists on it.

As a past President of the American Cancer Society put it, "Until a more ringing cry is raised by those affected by cancer, progress in the direction of research will not occur."

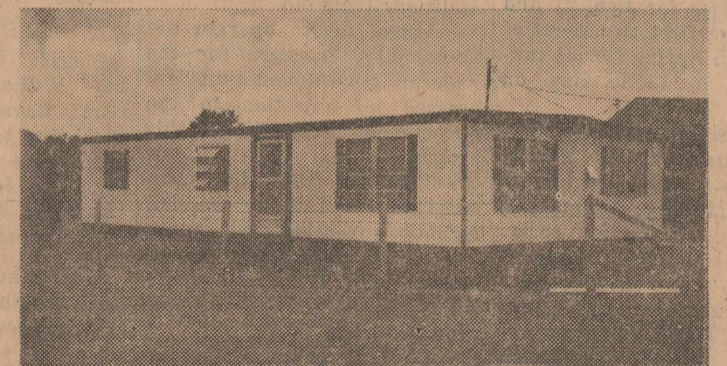

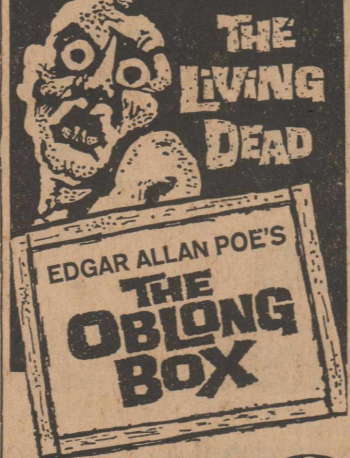

**Uncle Sam's Selective Service**

Editor's note: Below are questions now being asked at draft boards. The answers are by Col. Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service Director, 209 W. Ninth Street, Austin, Texas 78701. He will welcome your questions.

Q—My son was sentenced to 10 years in the penitentiary when he was 17 years of age. Consequently he has not registered for the draft. Upon release he will be more than 26, with a criminal record. Will he have to register?

A—Yes. He's required to register the date he leaves the institution.

Q—I'm presently in class I-A. I'm opposed to war, but would like to volunteer for induction if I could be assigned to non-combatant duty. May I?

A—Not while you're I-A. The only way you may be assigned to non-combatant duty is for your board to determine that you're a conscientious objector available for non-combatant military services only. If the board gives you the I-A-O classification, you may volunteer for induction and be assigned to a non-combatant unit.

Q—Who is authorized to classify men under the draft law?

A—Local boards and appeal boards are authorized to classify; however, the Director of Selective Service, not withstanding any other provisions of the classification rules and principles, may direct the classification or reclassification of any man without regard to his eligibility for a particular classification.

### Taxpayers Ask IRS

This column of questions and answers on Federal tax matters is provided by the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q) I used Schedule T to figure out my tax. Do I have to send it in with my 1040?

A) Most taxpayers do not have to send in the Schedule T with their tax returns. However, if you are subject to self-employment tax, or claim retirement income credit, investment credit or foreign tax credit, you will have to file Schedule T with your return.

Q—What is the filing deadline for farmers who did not send in an estimated tax return?

A) Under the Tax Reform Act of 1969, farmers now have until March 1 to file their return and avoid penalties for not making estimated tax declarations. This gives farmers two weeks more than they previously had to gather their records and prepare their return.

Since March 1 is a Sunday this year, farmers have until March 2 to file. Farmers

what they cost as a charitable contribution on my tax return?

A) Unless you contributed an additional amount to your church over and above what the cards ordinarily cost, no deduction may be taken.

The rule in this case is that charitable deductions are allowed when the amount of the purchase price exceeds the fair market value of the item received in exchange. Compare the cost of the cards to that of other cards of a similar nature to see if you have a contribution deduction.

Q) When you inherit stock and then sell it, do you have to pay tax on the proceeds?

A) Your cost basis for the stock is its value at the date of death of the decedent from whom you inherited it. If you receive more than this basis on a sale, the gain is reported as a capital gain. If you receive less, the loss is reported as a capital loss.

Q) Where can I get a copy of the form needed to claim moving expenses?

A) This form may be obtained from your local IRS office. Ask for Form 3903.

Q) I'm paying back a loan I took to cover the costs of my

daughter's college education. Is this deductible?

A) You may deduct the interest portion of your loan payments if you itemize deductions. If you are not sure how much of your loan payment represents interest check with the bank or other institution that made the loan. They should be able to tell you.

Q) What is the maximum Social Security tax for 1969? I think I paid too much since I held two jobs last year.

A) If you worked for two or more employers and more than \$374.40 was withheld from your wages last year for Social Security taxes, then the excess can be claimed as a credit on line 20 of your income tax return. In cases where a person has only one employer during the year and more than \$374.40 was withheld for Social Security taxes, the excess cannot be claimed as a credit on the return. The over collection with the employer must adjust the overcollection with the employer.

A W-2 form from each employer must be attached to your tax return.

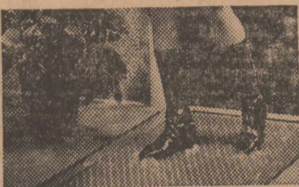

### The Draft and Random Selection

A Message from Col. Morris S. Schwartz, State Director of Selective Service, 209 West Ninth Street, Austin, Texas 78701.

January 1970  
Now that men are chosen for the armed forces by random selection sequence, just how does a draft board pick out the men who will go when it gets a call?

At the time it selects the men to fill the quota, it cannot call any man who is deferred.

The board must fill its quota from among its men classified in I-A or I-A-O who have been examined and found acceptable, and to whom it has mailed a Statement of Acceptability (Department of Defense Form 62) at least 21 days before the named date of induction. If a I-A or I-A-O man is delinquent (named by the board as failing or neglecting to perform some duty required of him by the draft law), or has volunteered, he may be selected whether or not he's been examined, and regardless of whether the "Statement of Acceptability" has been mailed.

A board, when it gets a quota to fill, currently does it this way:

First, if it has any delinquents 19 years old or older, it orders them, with the oldest being selected first. Boards usually don't have delinquents available, as men, with very few exceptions, abide by the law. Second it orders any volunteers under age 26 in the sequence they have volunteered.

At this point, the board checks to see if it has any men subject to random selection whose random sequence numbers have been reached who would have been ordered for induction earlier except for authorized delays caused by appeals, physical examinations, or other reasons. If it has men like these who are acceptable, and the delays are concluded, it must order them following the volunteers, even though the year in which they otherwise would have been ordered has ended, and even though, in cases of extended liability, they have been ordered has ended, even though in cases of extended liability, they have reached age 26.

Now the board comes to its third category of men, who may be ordered by random sequence number without any delays. It is from this third category that the board generally will select most of its men. In calendar year 1970, non-volunteers born from 1944 through 1950 are subject to selection in the order of their random sequence numbers, which were established in December, 1969 by a national drawing of the 366 possible birthdates.

These non volunteers, called the 1970 Selection Group, constitute Category 3 for 1970. In calendar year 1971, nonvolunteers born in 1951, along with other year groups being placed in I-A or I-A-O, will become the First Priority Selection Group. Random sequence numbers, based on another national drawing of birthdates late in the year 1970, will be assigned to those born in 1951. The members of the 1970 group whose random sequence numbers were not reached in 1970 will become a lower priority group in 1971, and it together with the First Priority Selection Group, will constitute Category 3. In 1972 and succeeding years, the process will be repeated, each lower priority group becoming successively lower and less subject to selection.

Any man in any group who receives a deferment or exemption, and who later is reclassified I-A or I-A-O, must be reassigned to the group in which he would have been, had he not been deferred or exempted. Within each group in Category 3, there is a subgroup of men who have wives they married on or before August 26, 1965, with whom they live. They must not be selected until all other men of the group, of which their subgroup is a part, are selected.

If all men in Category 3 are exhausted, which is not likely under normal demands, those in Category 4 can be selected next, in the order of their dates of birth, oldest first. These are nonvolunteers who became 19 during a calendar year, but who are not yet 20. These are men who have no random sequence numbers because no drawing of birthdates has been held yet to establish the numbers for them.

When a man in Category 3 reaches his 26th birthday with-

out being selected by random sequence number, he goes into Category 5. If the demands for manpower are so high that the draft board runs out of men in Category 4, it will select these men and all other nonvolunteers who have reached 26 but not 35 during that calendar year, doing so in the order of these men's dates of birth, youngest first. The board has a final category of manpower, No. 6. If it exhausts the first five, it can order the nonvolunteers of Category 6, who are age 18 1/2 but not yet 19, in the order of their birthdates, oldest first.

The order in which the birthdates, one following the other, are drawn each year determines the order in which men of the first priority will be selected and ordered the next year, along with others previously assigned a number. Each board assigns numbers to its men in accord with this national sequence. A particular board may not have men with birthdays on every day; if not it goes to the next number. The alphabet is randomized in a drawing along with the birthdates each year in case a board has two or more men with the same birthday and is required to order one but not all of them to fill a call. Their sequence of induction will be determined by the first letter of their names, both last and first.

A man gets one, and only one, random sequence number. However, his year of first priority for selection will be the year in which he's classified I-A or I-A-O. The sequence in which a man's birthday is drawn means nothing until he's classified I-A or I-A-O. Let's suppose a man is born Nov. 9, 1950, is in college in 1970. His birthday was the 80th drawn in 1969, but this is not applied until he graduates in 1971. Meantime, the next drawing has been held in 1970, and suppose Sept. 11 is the 80th drawn. A man is born on that date in 1951, not attending college, would also have random sequence No. 80, the same as the student whose different birthday was drawn a year earlier. If both were in the same board, they would be selected on the same call. If only one were needed, the random alphabet would determine the one.

A man deferred for college most of the year has no advantage over one in I-A throughout the year. The key is whether the random sequence number has been reached in each case. If the student's number has been reached when he gets I-A late in the year, he'll be inducted as soon as procedures are concluded, even though the year has ended.

Any man whose birthday is drawn early can join Reserve units any time before his induction order is issued and he can enlist in any active service at any time up to the date of induction.

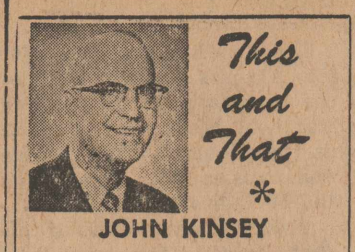

### Auto Inspection Deadline Apr. 15

AUSTIN—With the State's April 15 motor vehicle inspection deadline approximately 90 days away, large numbers of Texas motorists have yet to take their vehicles in for the mandatory annual safety inspection.

Col. Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, urges all motorists whose vehicles have not been inspected to visit an inspection station as soon as possible. "Those getting the inspection now will avoid long lines which are certain to develop at many stations as the April 15 deadline draws near," he said.

The DPS director noted that Texas adopted an annual inspection program on Sept. 1, 1969. All vehicles inspected since that date have had the sticker placed on the left side of the windshield with a large number tab inserted to show the month of expiration.

For example, vehicles inspected in September have the number nine displayed and will require reinspection before Sept. 30, 1970. Those inspected in October have the number 10 and must be reinspected before Oct. 31, 1970. Vehicles which are inspected in January will bear the number one and reinspection will be required before Jan. 31, 1971.

All vehicles which currently have a sticker on the right side of the windshield have not been reinspected in compliance with the new law, and their owners have only until April 15 to visit an approved inspection station.

The Steck Division, from whom the devices are being purchased, will send a representative here to appear before civic groups and at various announced places to demonstrate the use of the Vot-A-Maker.

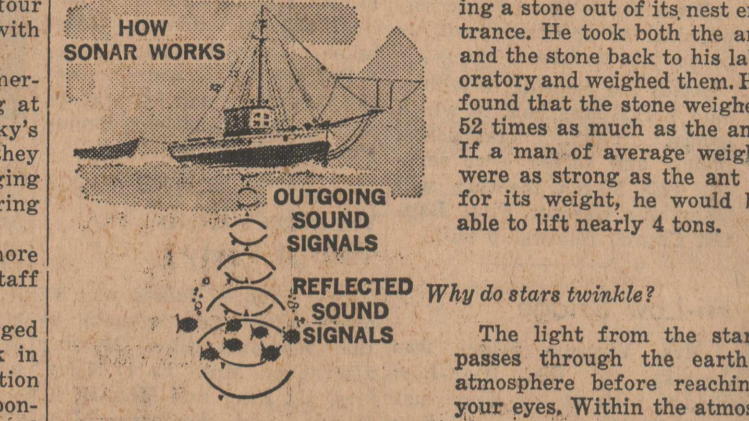

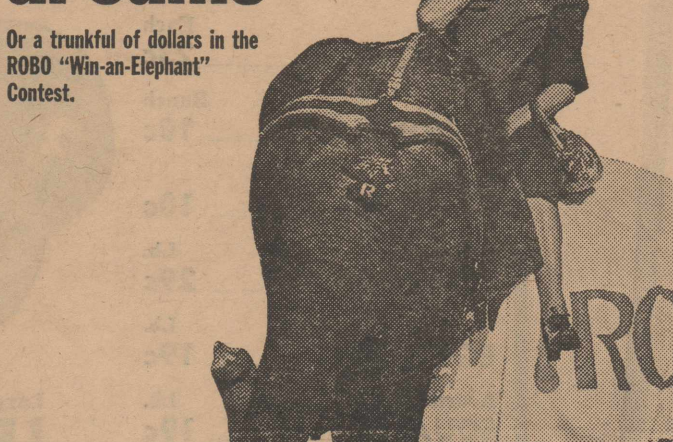

Do's and Don'ts For Obtaining 1970 Vehicle Registration

AUSTIN—The Texas Highway Department today reminded motorists of some DOs and DON'Ts for obtaining 1970 motor vehicle registrations.

The Motor Vehicle Registration Division of the Department has initiated a new computerized registration system this year.

In the past motorists have had to take their previous year's registration and auto title to the county tax collector's office or substation to obtain new license plates.

This year motorists were mailed a three-part computer-oriented registration form about Jan. 1.

If a motorist wishes to renew his registration by mail he should mail the three-part form to his county tax collector, with his check for the registration fee plus one extra dollar to cover postage and handling. Some county tax collectors will accept only money orders or cashier's checks.

If a motorist wishes to renew his registration in person he should take the three-part registration form to his county tax collector's office or substation with his check or money order.

Mail orders will be accepted only until March 1, allowing 30 days for delivery. Registrations will be made in person through midnight April 1, deadline for obtaining new auto license plates.

The Highway Department's

list of DOs and DON'Ts for all motorists:

DON'T throw away your three part registration application; it may be used both for mail and in-person vehicle registration.

DON'T write on, mar or otherwise mutilate the three-part form. However, DO show your correct address in accord with instructions on the form if the address on the form is incorrect.

DON'T separate the three parts of the form; DO take to your county tax collector or mail it in one piece.

DON'T send your application to the Highway Department Motor Vehicle Division in Austin; DO send it to your county tax collector and DO enclose the amount of your registration fee and an extra dollar if ordering by mail.

DO send your application before March 1 if ordering by mail; no mail applications will be processed after March 1.

If you did not receive a three-part registration form in the mail, or if you have lost it, DO take last year's motor

vehicle registration and your car title to your county tax collector's office or branch station.

Your vehicle registration will be processed as before and you'll receive a time-saving computerized form next year.

Remember, you will save time at your county tax collector's office if you use the computerized form. There is no extra charge if you obtain your license plates in person.
