State Capital News

An Austin district court decision invalidating the 1971 House of Representatives redistricting act handed state attorneys and legislative leaders a mountain of unanswered questions.

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin is in the process of appealing to the Texas Supreme Court the lower court's decision that the bill's "splitting" of 29 counties into separate districts is unconstitutional. Martin said the appeal is in line with a long-standing policy of his office to advocate the validity of a legislative act until the state's highest court rules on it.

Many high-placed state attorneys feel that if the Supreme Court upholds the August 2 district court finding, the chore of re-doing the job will fall to a five-member Constitutional Board (composed of lieutenant governor, House speaker, attorney general, land commissioner and comptroller). Constitution says the Board will reapportion when the Legislature fails to do so in the first regular session after publication of each U.S. decennial census.

Lawyers hope the High Court will provide guidelines, however, for they are confronted with these questions:

* Board is directed to meet within 90 days after the Legislature adjourns and to come up with a redistricting bill within 60 more days. What happens if there is no final Supreme Court ruling by this constitutional deadline?

* Since the House tried to redistrict and its act was knocked out, would reapportionment then be expected in a special session of the Legislature? Constitution says the Board will reapportion if the Legislature fails to act, but the Lei

fails to act, but the Legislature did "act" in the case of the House plan, only to have a district court declare its work invalid. No Senate reapportionment bill was passed by the Legislature, so that job automatically falls to the Board.

* Since the 1970 census (on which lawmakers base their reapportionment) was published while the 1971 Legislature was meeting, could redistricting really wait until 1973 when the 63rd Legislature convenes?

AGOPINIONS - Attorney General Martin held that a new law requiring certain county officials to report to the county money they receive from operating private business on public property is unconstitutional.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

* Use of automated machines for check cashing at banking houses would not violate Texas laws against branch banking.

* Motor vehicle tax of rental is due at the time of payment of rental charges. Legislature didn't authorize credit on reimbursement for motor vehicle tax paid on original purchase price, when status of vehicle is changed from lease to rental unit.

* Bill conferring additional jurisdiction on county court of Orange County is constitutional.

SOME AUTO INSURANCE COSTS CUT - State Insurance Board ordered a 50% reduction in premiums of standard property damage auto liability policy where \$250 deductible is accepted.

Board further directed a 12% cut in basic bodily injury premiums for \$250 deductible coverage, up to \$500 per accident.

New deductibles authorized by the Legislature this year go into effect August 30. New rates take effect Sept. 1. A statewide increase in liability rates of 2.3% already has been recommended with old deductibles. Basic liability coverage is \$10,000 per person for bodily injury, up to \$20,000 for several victims of one accident and \$5,000 for property damage. A company can pay the amount of the total claim and collect the deductible later from the policyholder.

HIGHWAY FUND HEARING ASKED - Gov. Preston Smith seeks a formal hearing before the U.S. Transportation Department to prevent a threatened cut in federal highway aid for 1973.

Failure to the 62nd Legislature to enact legislation to comply with the 1965 highway beautification act (billboard advertising controls and junk yard screening) will bring a cut in federal allocation, Transportation Secretary John A. Volpe has warned.

Absence of such legislation means a 10% federal aid reduction for highway construction.

Smith wrote Volpe that evidence can be offered by Texas to warrant a stay of final determination. He asked a formal hearing to present the state appeal.

SCHOOL APPEAL WATCHED - Federal appeal of an Austin U.S. district court decision upholding limited business to achieve racial balance in public schools met sharp criticism and is being closely watched by other school districts with similar problems to those of the capital city.

Only alternative to the moderate plan, maintained Austin school officials, is forced busing on an even larger scale.

President Nixon's statements on the subject, in effect condoning the eleven-hour appeal though he opposes busing, were hit by U.S. Sen. John Tower and other Texas Republicans as inappropriate and displaying a lack of understanding.

APPOINTMENTS - Governor Smith named 12 to the Developmental Disabilities Planning and Advisory Council to develop a long-range plan for aiding mentally retarded, cerebral palsied and epileptic.

Dr. George Woolfolk of Prairie View A&M College was named vice chairman of the American Revolution Bicentennial Commission, succeeding John Steen of San Antonio.

Gov. appointed to the Texas Cosmology Commission Frank Joseph of Harlingen, Mrs. La Vonne Dannel, of Pasadena, Richard C. Ingram of Dallas, Harold G. Grace of Austin, Herby Cohen of Longview, and James A. McMullen III of Fort Worth.

PROBE DELAYED - Travis County grand jury investigation of profits by state officials in Nat'l Bankers Life Insurance Co. stock has been delayed until Aug. 17.

Frank W. Sharp, former head of NBL and Sharpstown State Bank has been called to testify at that time. Jury couldn't find Joseph Novotny, former Sharpstown president.

John Oorilo, former NBL president, told newsmen he came up with the idea for two controversial bank deposit insurance bills in 1969, and there was no connection between the stock deals and passage of legislation.

SHORT SHORTS - Dr. James H. Perry of Baton Rouge, La., is new executive director of Southwest Educational Development Laboratory here.

Program to vaccinate all horses against Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis in a six-state area will end Aug. 15.

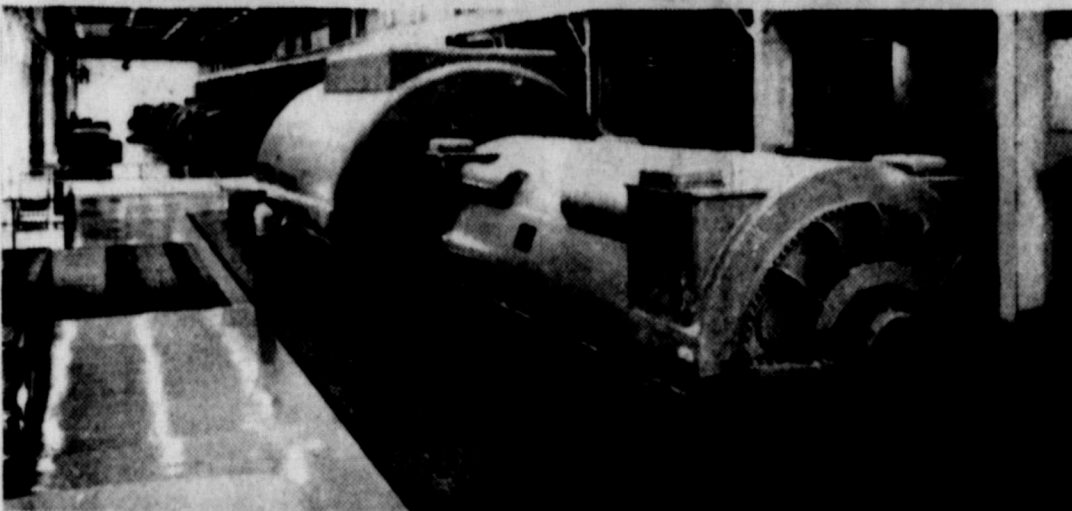

SOUTHWESTERN PUBLIC SERVICE COMPANY CELEBRATES 50TH ANNIVERSARY



The first turbine-generator on Southwestern Public Service Company's system, pictured left, had a capacity of 300 kilowatts and was installed at Roswell, New Mexico. As Southwestern celebrates its 50th anniversary this year, it has nearly 2,000,000 kilowatts of generating capacity and the turbine room floor at Plant X, near Earth, Texas, pictured above, is nearly as long as two football fields and houses four turbine-generators with a combined capacity of 487,500 kilowatts.

How does a company decide when it is going to celebrate its 50th anniversary year?

In the case of Southwestern Public Service Company, the decision was made late last year by the simple means of impressing the corporate seal on a piece of plain white paper. When the resulting impression read, "Incorporated, 1921", 1971 became the electric company's golden anniversary year.

Up until that decision making moment, five different years could make some kind of a case for being the birth year, with one of them going all the way back to 1894. The others were 1904, 1925, and 1942, and the winner, 1921.

1921 won the battle because, in addition to being the year that came up on the seal, it was also the year of organization of the company which, 4 years later, took on the name of Southwestern Public Service Company.

The 1921 company which became today's Southwestern, was the Roswell Public Service Company. Among its incorporators was H. I. Dow, well-known New Mexico pioneer and a director and general counsel for Southwestern Public Service Company until his death in 1969.

The name change to Southwestern Public Service Company came in 1925, which was also the year that expansion began with the purchase of electric systems in Artesia and Carlsbad.

1925 was also the year the company first began operations in Texas, with the purchase of the electric systems in Amarillo, Pampa and Panhandle. The region was then, basically, a cluster of small towns, each of which had its own inadequate, and usually antiquated, electric supply. There were few, if any interconnections, with other communities or electric systems. Most of the towns were only large enough to be served by a single circuit, and if something happened the whole town was out of power until it was repaired.

This was an era which also brought some communities electric service for the first time. In late 1926, for example, Southwestern built a transmission line from Amarillo to Pampa and brought electric service to White Deer, Texas, for the first time - on Christmas eve.

There was still considerable fragmentation insofar as electric service was concerned and parts of seven companies, each of them a subsidiary of at least one holding company, were serving throughout the area.

It was apparent, then, that the electric service needs of the area could be met even more efficiently and economically if it were served by a single, independent, operating company, devoid of holding company ties, locally managed and immediately responsive to area needs.

In short, the region, which had fairly common agricultural and business bonds, lent itself to integration. In the electrical sense of the word.

The Public Utility Holding Company Act of 1935 and cooperation between government and business made this integration possible.

The holding company subsidiaries which had been serving the region were merged into a single entity, Southwestern Public Service Company, an independent, integrated operating company. It was the first such company, incidentally, to result from the application of the Holding Company Act.

Thus it was, as the area embarked on the most rapid period of its growth - immediately following World War II, it was served by a single electric supplier prepared to meet the electric service needs that growth brought on.

Southwestern serves a 45,000 square mile area which starts in the southwest corner of Kansas, crosses the Oklahoma and Texas Panhandles, moves down into the South Plains of the Lone Star state and then moves westward to include the Pecos Valley and Clovis-Portales regions of New Mexico.

There haven't been any power shortages in this area in the past and the folks at Southwestern don't envision any in the future. To make their vision

In an executive session following the open part of the meeting, the board accepted the resignation of Carl A. Dwyer as high school principal. Hunt then was hired, and Mrs. Vestal Bailey was hired as a cafeteria worker. All other action came in the open meeting.

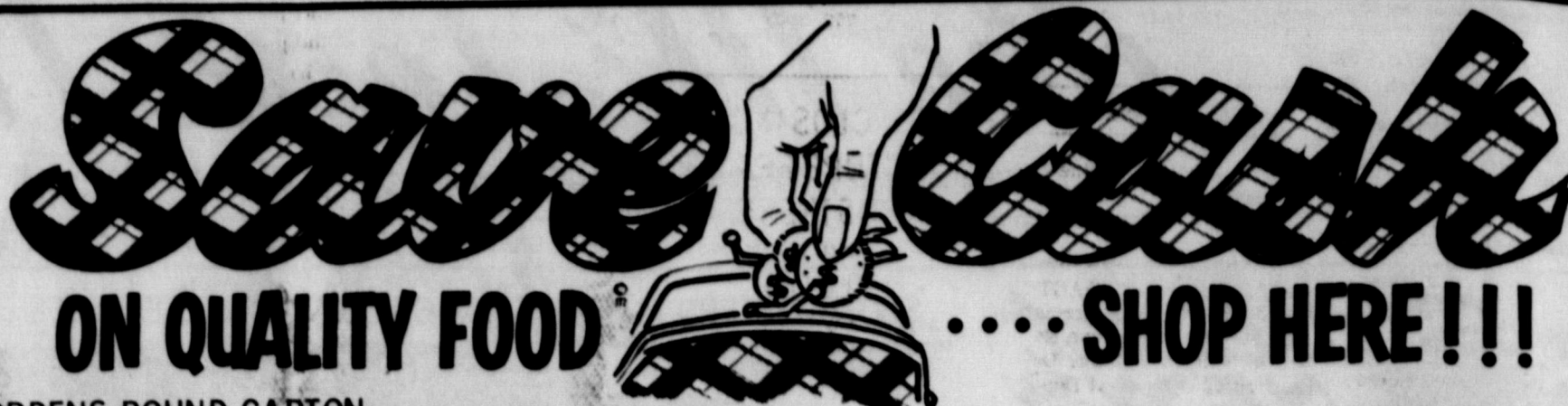

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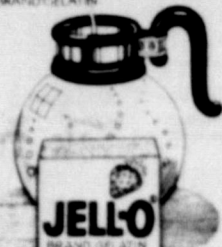

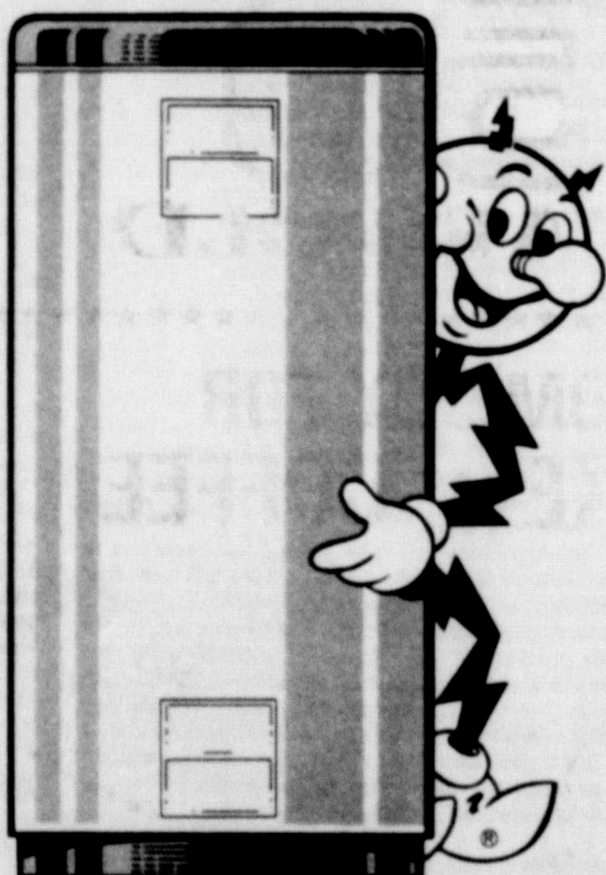

 is the first known case in the
 Western Hemisphere. It is a
 highly contagious disease caused
 by an exceptionally stable virus.
 The mortality rate is very high
 and lesions resemble those of
 acute Hog Cholera. However,
 the virus is immuno-
 logically distinct from that of
 Hog Cholera, and animals im-
 mune to Hog Cholera are fully
 susceptible to African Swine
 Fever.

Natural infection is produc-
 ed by direct contact with in-
 fected animals, exposure to
 infected premises and inges-
 tion of contaminated food and
 water. Uncooked or improperly
 cooked garbage also serves as
 a source of the virus.

Domestic and wild swine are
 the only animals known to be
 susceptible to African Swine
 Fever. Unsuccessful attempts
 have been made to infect as
 many as 10 different species of
 animals including, cattle,
 sheep, horses, dogs, cats, doves
 and mice. Man is not suscep-
 tible to the disease.

There is no vaccination pro-
 gram for control of African
 Swine Fever. Numerous at-
 tempts to develop a useful vaccine
 against the disease have failed.
 Its eradication, should it in-
 vade the borders of the U.S.,
 would be based on a seek out,
 destroy and quarantine program
 similar to that currently being
 used to eradicate Hog Cholera.

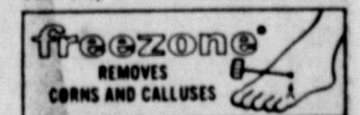

AFRICAN SWINE FEVER
Much in the news about this topic. We hope you will read the special feature in this issue of the McLean News.

WEATHER
Almost every area of the county as well as the Panhandle had received effective showers within the last three weeks. Last Saturday I returned home from a trip to the mountains of Colorado. From Red River, New Mexico. All the way to Pampa I saw nothing but green grass. I saw a few cattle. A lot of people have grass fever. This explains why the sudden price rise. Today (Tuesday) the dressed beef market was dull. The market was quoted as being fifty cents lower. This is to be expected following a slow and steady rise for the past few weeks. There is a shortage of heavier finished cattle but the demand slowed. Weather conditions in the Panhandle will have its usual important affect on the market of stocker calves. We can get very close to having wheat pasture and still miss it by one rain. I've heard a lot of Plains farmers say they plan to plant wheat the last week in August if moisture is available. A good effective rain in mid September could bring us one of the best wheat pasture seasons we have ever had. There is a rather large acreage of summer fallowed land due to dry conditions in early spring.

I'm a born optimist - Better days are ahead.
The cotton crop looks good in spite of earlier day weather, we still have plenty of time to make a good crop. We are due one. A bloom by late August will make a boll by November.

The milo crop has had some beautiful weather the past 3 weeks. Cool August and September weather usually produces an abundant crop of milo. The irrigated milo looks the best I've ever seen. Most irrigation farmers started earlier this year and depended less on rainfall. These efforts have paid off.

CATTLE MARKETING PROGRAM
Today (Tuesday) I visited with Roy Custer, area representative of Farm Bureau and Charles Albritton, Mgr. Livestock Marketing Association, Farm Bureau, Little Rock, Arkansas. They were in the Panhandle in the interest of establishing a marketing program on stocker calves from that area. They are basing their program on trying to get the producer in Arkansas market price for their calves. The advantage to the producer in that area is that he could avoid an auction sale commission fee of around four dollars per head.

The advantage to the producer in this area according to Albritton is that fresh calves will be received. They hope to load calves the day they come in. This way the producers in this area will receive the calves within 24 hours after they leave the producer in Arkansas. I think they have a chance to be successful if they will reach these two objectives. This will be a split of the benefit of direct marketing between the producer of that area and this area. Anyone interested may contact either me or Jack Osborne, President of Gray County Farm Bureau, Jack lives in Pampa.
