Stanton Voters Approve Bond Proposals Saturday

New High School Building Assured For Stanton Independent School District

Stanton voters turned out 356 strong Saturday and approved \$340,000 in school bonds and adopted a new school financing law.

Four propositions on the ballot were approved by margins of nearly two to one.

Issuance of the bonds was endorsed by a vote of 228 to 128, adoption of Senate Bill 116 was by vote of 228 to 125, a maintenance tax rate ceiling of \$1.50 was approved 227 to 125 and voters

New City Garbage Rates Announced

At a recent city council meeting aldermen elected to purchase a garbage truck and employ a driver to work directly out of city hall.

On a motion made by S. W. Wheeler and seconded by June Graham, the city fathers voted to purchase a new truck on a bid basis.

The rate for trash and garbage service was set at \$1 per month for residences and \$1.50 per month for business houses, beginning on April 1.

No exception in the application and billing of the above rates will be made.

Mayor Wheeler and the four aldermen stated that the purpose of operating the truck out of city hall was to give the best of service at a minimum cost. If the truck fails to pick up garbage a call to city hall will get you the service you need.

Every four years in presidential election years, the Democratic Party in Texas holds a series of precinct, county and state conventions for these principal purposes: (1) To select the delegates to the National Democratic Convention; (2) To designate the man and woman to represent Texas on the National Democratic Committee; (3) To select presidential electors.

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Martin Farmers Playing Part In Irrigation

Martin County farmers are playing a part in putting Texas farm lands under irrigation to the tune of 6,200,000 acres. This is an estimate that has been made of the Texas land under irrigation last year. The figures were obtained by R. V. Thurmond, irrigation specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension service, from the county agents of the state and was completed in September 1955.

Thurmond received reports from 238 counties which showed that 5,667,000 acres were irrigated by gravity and just over 350,000 acres by sprinkler system. Total farms using supplemental irrigation numbered 39,213. Wells, 42,674 of them, supplied the water for 4,940,000 acres.

As to crops and pastures receiving the water, Thurmond said almost two million acres of grain sorghums and only a slightly less acreage of cotton were irrigated to lead all other crops by a wide margin. More than half a million acres of vegetables and just under a half million acres of rice were also irrigated. Pastures, temporary and perennial, total more than 250,000 acres followed by alfalfa, orchards (mostly citrus), and a long listing of other crops.

The total estimated cropland harvested in Texas in 1955 was 24.9 million acres. A comparison of the total harvested acreage and that receiving supplemental irrigation brings into sharp focus the importance that water is playing in the agricultural production of the state, said Thurmond. The continuing widespread drought over the state has played a major role in expanding irrigation along with efforts of producers to boost yields to beat the cost-price squeeze.

Elimination Of Rabbits A Good Thing

Whether there could be any likelihood that a jackrabbit could carry and spread the maddening disease, rabies, nevertheless the fact remains that some 20,000 jackrabbits were destroyed during the recent rabbit hunt on the Glasscock County ranches of Bernard Houston, Grady Cross, Edmund Tom and others, their elimination doomed the prospect of any spread of the disease coming from that number of rabbits.

The fox that ranges over the ranch lands has been charged with spreading rabies. It is reported that these animals are many to be found in Martin and Glasscock counties. In the recent rabbit hunt no mention was made of the fox killed. They are almost as wanted prey for extermination as the rabbit. They are the conveyor and the spread of the dreaded disease, hydrophobia.

The latest incident charged to the fox is that several rabid foxes have been seen on the ranch of a Marfa ranchman, where recently a 4-H calf being fed had died of rabies. The Presidio County Commissioners declared a state of "emergency did exist" in the outbreak of wildlife in that county.

The county health officer entered the picture to take charge of the fight to control the spread of the disease. The immediate steps to be taken were three set up by the county health officer:

1. Drastic and immediate reduction of wildlife population with emphasis on fox.
2. Immediate vaccination of dogs in the county.
3. Control of stray dogs.

Five Presidio counties are taking anti-rabies shots following the death of the calf fed as a 4-H project.

A representative of the Texas Health Department, Austin, met with Presidio County Commissioners to help outline a control plan. Marfa city officials have ordered all dogs vaccinated, and those not having taken the shots will be picked up and destroyed.

Dr. Rich, speaking as a veterinarian of the Texas Health Department, said the rabies shots are good for a year but "if I had my child to consider, I would have my dog shot every six months."

Presidio and Brewster County ranchmen report having killed fox that appeared rabid.

Quite a number of fox have been reported seen and killed in Martin County, but none so far have appeared to be infected with rabies.

Impressions

Geographical facts, which are quite contrary to established notions, are brought to light by a careful examination of the map. Relative locations of certain points are often found to be quite different from the general impression concerning them.

From Detroit to Canada the traveler moves southward. New York lies to the west of some cities on the Pacific Coast of South America.

Santa Barbara, by reason of its location, sees the sun both rise and set in the Pacific.

Through the Panama Canal from the Pacific to the Atlantic the direction traveled is not east, but northwest; from the Atlantic to the Pacific, not west, but southeast.

When he comes up to you in person and grabs your hand, you don't have much chance to really study him, by the time you get a good look at him he's already moved on to the next hand, but when he's talking on television, you don't have much else to do except watch him pretty close, as there aren't over four or five politicians in the world who can read a speech and hold your attention longer than two or three minutes. Half the time you figure somebody else wrote his speech, and the other half, you figure he wrote it himself, and neither method is guaranteed to build confidence. When it comes to elections, about all science has achieved is the ability to tell you today who won yesterday without waiting a week or so.

'Obedience' Is Key To Conversion

The history of religion shows many instances of sudden conversion. Often some tragic experience or danger enables a man to see for the first time the condition of his own soul. It may be likened to the view one attains when he suddenly ascends the crest of a hill and sees for the first time his real environment spread out before him.

It is doubtful, however, even allowing for the reality of a sudden experience, whether the whole story of conversion is confined to the apparent moment of change.

Oftentimes, either consciously or subconsciously, the man who is suddenly converted has been undergoing some preparation for the change.

One wonders, for instance, whether Saul, when he stood holding the garments of those who stoned Stephen, would have been entirely unmoved when he saw the martyr speaking words of forgiveness in his dying moments.

Could Saul have helped being impressed by the spiritual superiority of a man who could thus rise above his enemies?

We cannot know all that went on in the mind and heart of Saul before his conversion. But we do know that his conversion was complete and that the Saul who was intense in persecution became the Paul who was equally on fire with zeal for the truth.

Perhaps the most important thing in conversion is best expressed in words from a chapter in Acts—"I was not disobedient unto the heavenly vision." This is the secret of real conversion. Many men have heavenly visions, but it is only those who are obedient who find the way of the highest faith and life.

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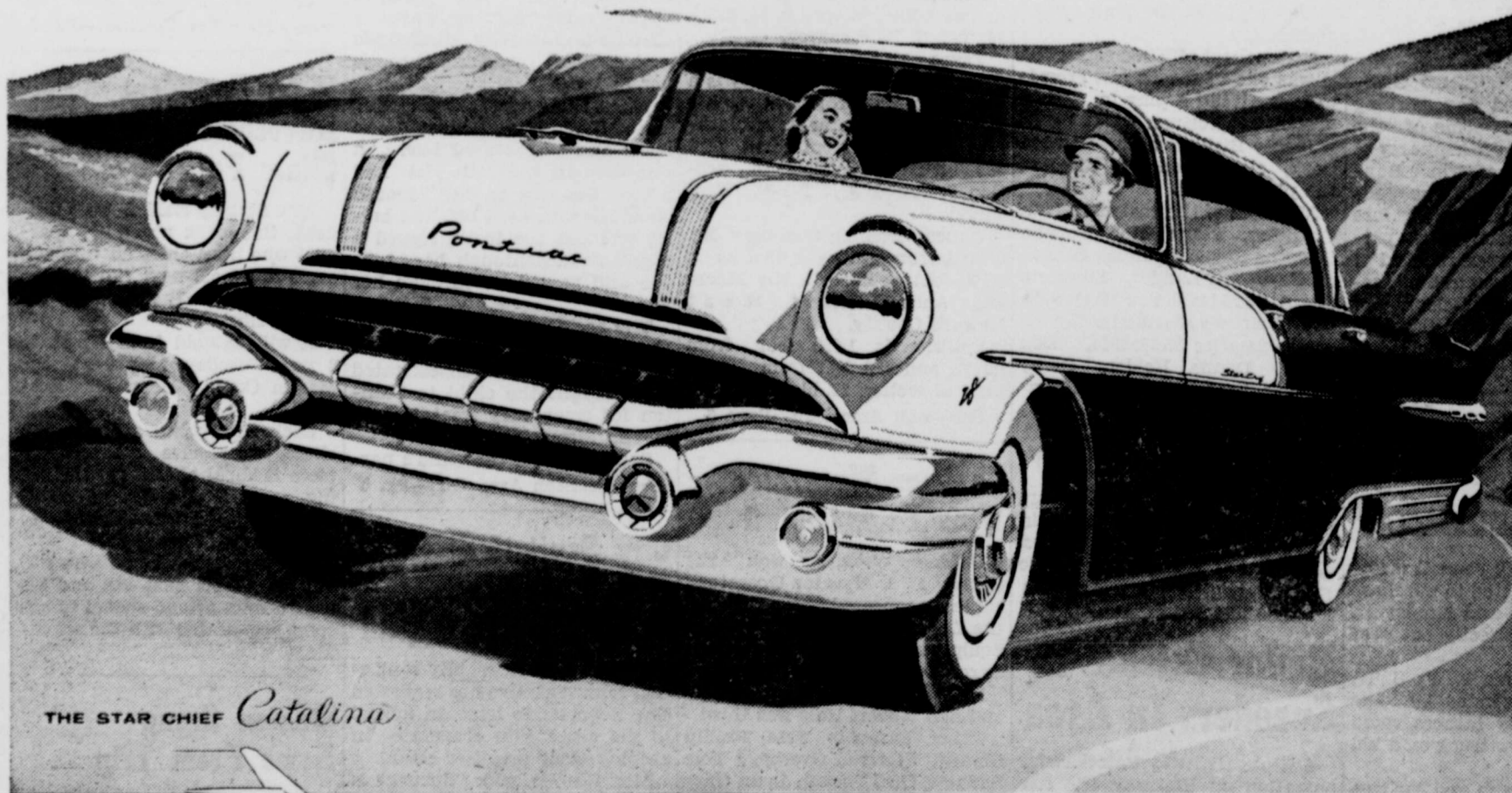

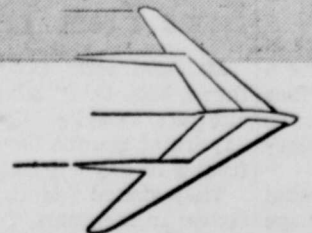

CURRY HOLDEN

Tech Instructor Author Of Book

Monday, April 30, has been set as the release date for a new and compelling novel written by Curry Holden, director of the Texas Tech Museum.

"Hill of the Rooster," a story of love, hate and violence of the proud Yaqui Indians, will go on the book store counters all over the nation, and Henry Holt & Co., publishers, are very optimistic about the book's success.

Curry Holden became interested in the mountain families in 1933 when he learned their story from a Border Patrolman, Ivan Williams, then stationed in Arizona. He later visited them in the raw, rugged Bacatete Mountains of Sonora and came to know the villagers of Torim "as well as our own cousins and uncles."

"I learned of their conflicts, their defeats, and their victories; their grievances, their aspirations, and their determination to keep their integrity. Theirs is an exciting story, I felt compelled to tell it," said Holden.

Basically, Holden's book deals with the clash of two ethnic groups, the Yaquis who had lived in the mountains for more than 400 years, and the Mexicans who sought to conquer and dispossess them.

Writers and reviewers all over the nation have hailed the book and its sympathetic treatment by the author.

George T. Eggleston, editor of the Readers Digest, New York, said, "It is a book one can be proud to publish, and should get top reviews."

"It is like a Homeric tragedy where the gods look down and watch the pawns move," said dramatic producer Robert Willey of New York. "It is tense with hovering conflict, the characters victims of their own civilizations, one resisting to the utmost encirclement by the other. The book is rich in its background, stark in its simplicity, and poignant in its emotions. No thoughtful person can read it without being deeply stirred."

U. S. Civil Service Exams Announced

Holden has made many trips to the Yaqui country and has corresponded with and interviewed many of the characters used in his book. His visits resulted in another book, "Studies of the Yaqui Indians."

Born in Limestone County, Texas, Holden moved to Colorado City at the age of two. He attended public school in Rotan, earned three degrees from the University of Texas, and taught history at McMurry College for five years. Since 1929 he has been professor of history and anthropology at Texas Tech, and for five years, 1945-50 was dean of the Tech Graduate School. He has been Director of The Museum since 1936.

Social Security Provides Old-Age, Survivor Insurance

Do people take the required action to protect their rights under old-age and survivors insurance? As a general rule they do; however, there are still some persons who lose benefits by not taking prompt action, Jack Calvert, district manager of the Odessa social security office, declared today.

More than 10,000 persons ask for social security benefits every day and during the month of January 1956 the 8 million mark was reached in the number of people now receiving these payments. None of these persons would be receiving social security payments if they had not asked about benefits at their social security office, Calvert said.

During the period April to June 1955 a monthly average of 82,000 persons asked to have their accounts frozen to protect their social security benefits during a period of disability. The freeze provision protects their right to benefits and the amount of their monthly benefit when they reach age 65, or their family's benefits in case of their death.

How about you? Have you taken the required action to protect your rights under social security? Here are some suggestions Calvert pointed out.

1. If you have worked at least 5 years under social security, including at least 1 1/2 years out of the 3 years just before your disability began, but have been totally disabled for work for more than six months, ask to have your account frozen to protect your social security benefits.

2. If a worker in your family dies, ask if survivors benefits are payable.

3. When you are 65, ask about your benefit rights.

4. When you are 72, ask about your benefits, which are payable

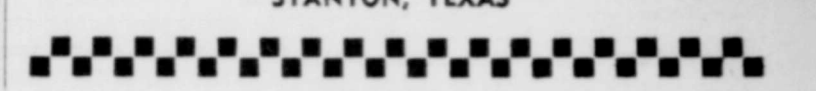

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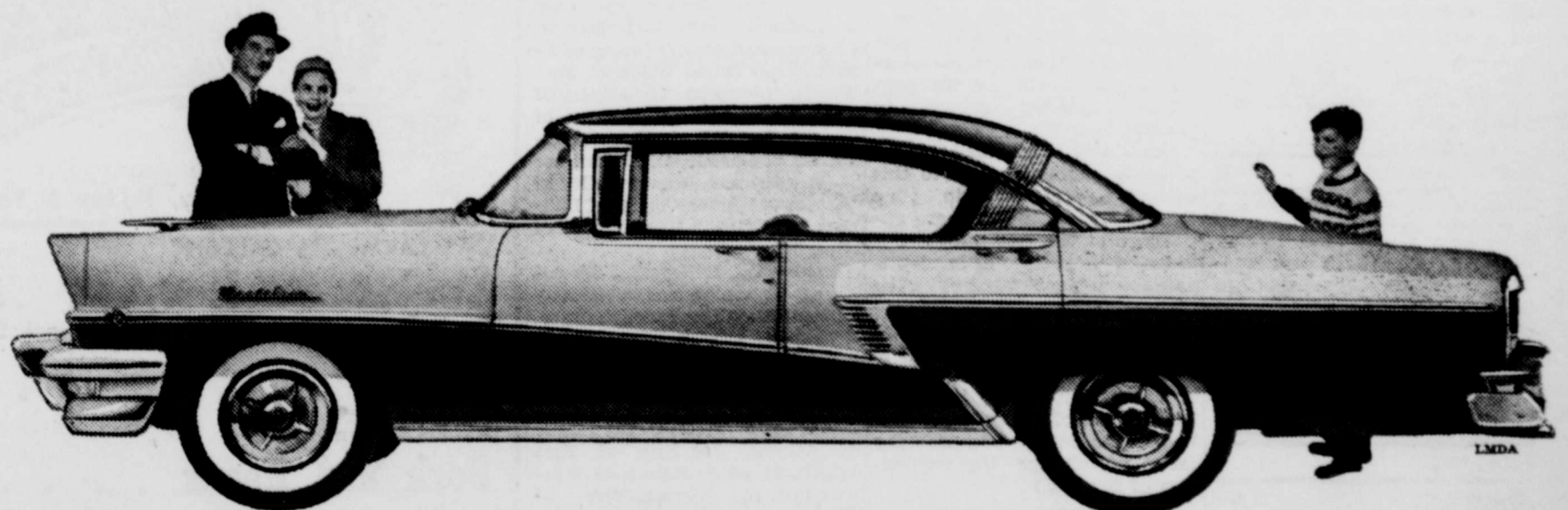

To cubes of beef chuck, add water, tomato puree, bay leaf, celery, 1 teaspoon salt, and 1/4 teaspoon pepper and simmer 2 hours. Make small meat balls of ground beef, eggs, parsley flakes, bread crumbs, onion, 2 teaspoons salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. Roll in flour. Fry in deep hot fat (360° F.) until browned. Heat rice in shortening until very hot. Remove beef chuck from liquid after it is cooked and cook rice in this broth, adding water if needed.

Line large greased casserole with half of rice. Put meat balls on rice. Pour mixture of beef chuck, mushrooms, frozen peas which have been separated but not cooked, cheese, eggs, and olives. Top with remaining rice. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) for 45 minutes 12 to 15 servings.

FINDERS KEEPERS?

"Finders keepers, losers weepers." Is this old rhyme true or false? Lawyers say it is not always strictly accurate under the law. It is sometimes rather difficult to define the rights of a finder in court.

There are some rather fine distinctions and exceptions to the "finders keepers" maxim that have plagued the courts — and finders — for generations. In the first place, the finder is not entitled to keep the property unless the original owner is not known and cannot be located. Neither may he keep it unless the object is truly "lost," and not merely "misplaced."

In general, property is legally "lost" when parted with involuntarily — through accident, neglect, forgetfulness or any other unintentional circumstance. Property is not lost in the legal sense when voluntarily left by the owner, intending to pick it up later — even though he fails to do so. Such property is "misplaced."

Thus, if one loses a watch on the street by having the clasp break, not knowing where or when it was dropped, it is legally "lost." The same is true of a fountain pen falling through a hole in one's pocket unobserved. In such cases, the finder owns what he has found against all but the true owner.

On the other hand, a package left on the seat of a bus is "misplaced" rather than lost. In one southern state, a pocketbook left in a barbershop by a customer was held to have been "left," not "lost." The barber was arrested and convicted of larceny when he spent the money that was in it.

Under the law the finder of either lost or misplaced property should make a "reasonable effort" to find the real owner.

When articles are left on a train or bus, in a public hotel room, or even when dropped on a shop floor, under circumstances indicating that the true owner will later return to claim them, such items are not considered lost. The proper custodian to hold them for the owner's return would be the proprietor or other person in charge.

Remaining unclaimed, the property sometimes goes to this custodian, sometimes to the finder. The distinction here appears to be whether the place it is found is private or semi-private, or a place used by the general public.

Highlights and Sidelights FROM Your State CAPITOL

AUSTIN, Tex.—Harmony may yet come to the Democratic party in Texas.

But it will come only if Gov. Allan Shivers, Sen. Lyndon Johnson, and Speaker Sam Rayburn get together—as they did when they named Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey national committeeman.

A backer of Senator Johnson as Texas' favorite son candidate for President suggests that the Senator seek only the favorite-son role and not attempt also to be chairman of the delegation.

Both Shivers and Johnson have been recommended as chairman—each by a different faction—Shivers by the conservatives, Johnson by the liberals.

Mrs. H. H. Weinert of Seguin is the "dove of peace" in the present controversy. She is Texas' Democratic National Committeewoman.

She predicts that the state convention will end up with two delegations to the national convention unless Shivers, Rayburn and Johnson get together soon.

Meanwhile a full-fledged campaign is under way by Johnson boosters, for his nomination as Texas' favorite son candidate for President. Prominent Texans aligned with the movement include Speaker Rayburn, former Vice President John Nance Garner, former Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson, and former Congressman Lloyd Bentsen, Jr.

Shivers, who likes Johnson in the favorite son role, but not as head of the delegation, predicts that his conservative group will win out in the May 5 precinct, May 8 county, and May 22 state conventions. Liberals say that, should this happen, they will send a contesting delegation to Chicago in August.

Newcomers Due In Legislature
New faces can be expected when the 55th Legislature convenes next January.

Some 66 races—55 in the House and 11 in the Senate—already are underway over the state. More filings are expected before the May 7 deadline.

Some political observers predict an unusually large turnover in both houses.

Of the 16 senators whose terms are expiring, two will not be candidates. They are Warren McDonald of Tyler and Gus J. Strauss of Hallettsville. Another vacancy was created by the death of Sen. Wayne Wagonseller of Bowie.

Of those running, only five do not have opponents. They are Sens. Neville Colson of Navasota, Jarrard Secrest of Temple, George Moffett of Chillicothe, Frank Owen, III, of El Paso and William S. Fly of Victoria.

Hot contests for the remaining seats already have developed in some areas. Senators facing campaigns are Doyle Willis of Fort Worth, Johnnie B. Rogers of Austin, William H. Shireman of Corpus Christi, Abraham Kazen, Jr. of Laredo, O. E. Latimer of San Antonio, Rogers Kelley of Edinburg, Kilmer Corbin of Lubbock, and Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo.

Hazlewood, Kelley and Secrest have not announced definitely whether they will make the race.

In the House, 26 members have said they will not seek re-election. Five of these are running for the senate instead. They are Bill Wood of Tyler, Grady Hogue of Athens, Joe Pyle of Fort Worth, Floyd Bradshaw of Weatherford and Carroll Cobb of Lubbock.

Twenty-eight other House members have one or more announced opponents. One new member will come in to replace George S. Berry of Lubbock, now deceased.

Additional Referendums Asked

Texas Citizens Councils want a July primary referendum on school integration and mixed marriages.

Petitions asking the Democratic Executive Committee to place these questions on the ballot are being circulated in 30 cities. These would be in addition to the interposition referendum proposed by Governor Shivers.

"We're going for interposition too," said Ross Carlton, head of the pro-segregation organization, "but we think more direct action is needed."

Water Group Formed

Six major Texas farm groups have joined forces to form the Texas Agricultural Water Committee: Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, Texas Farm Bureau, Association of Texas Soil Conservation Districts, Texas State Grange, and Texas Farmers Union.

Farm groups generally opposed the water program presented during the last legislature and were credited with contributing to its defeat. One purpose of the new organization is to work for the passage of water legislation.

Historic Tour Planned
Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas historical societies have joined hands to sponsor a six-day tour that will relive the frontier days.

Start of the tour will be at the Alamo in San Antonio. Texas stops include Austin, Waco, Hillsboro, Cleburne, Cresson, Weatherford and Fort Worth.

The May 1-6 program will include dinners and dances and Red River bridge ceremonies, with historical groups along the way actively participating.

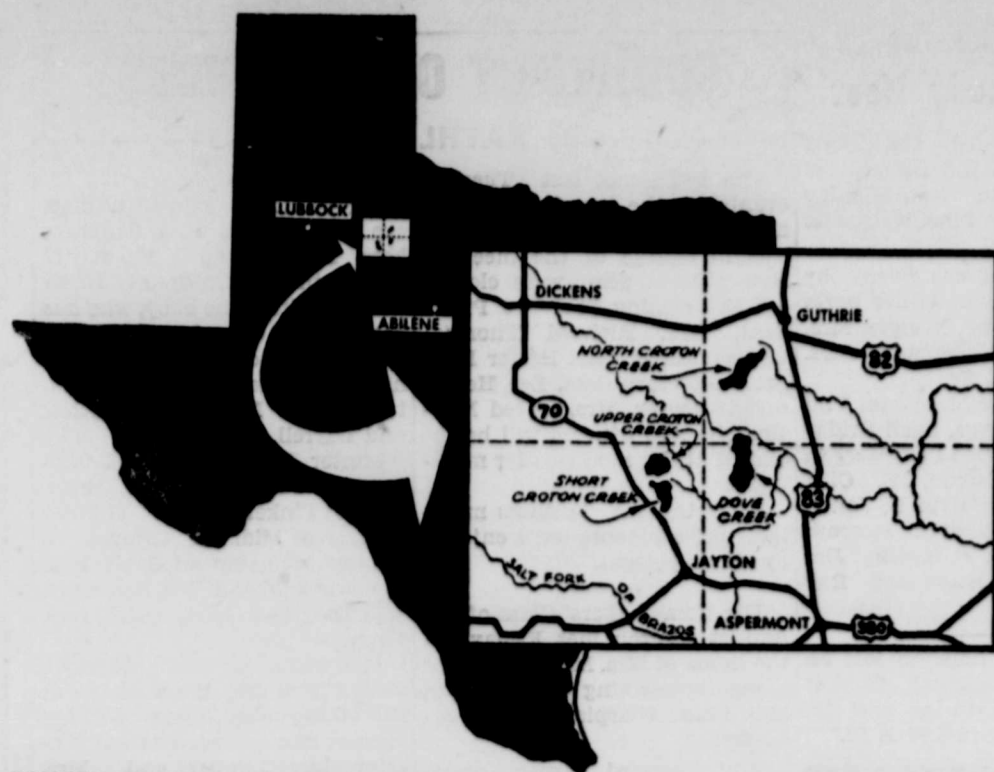

Salt Pollution Control Program For Brazos River

A long-range program for control of salt pollution in the Brazos River has just been announced by the Brazos River Authority, the state agency which is working for conservation of the river's water. Improvement of the salt-pollution situation will be important to farmers, industry and municipalities in the decades ahead.

The campaign for a plan to eliminate much of the salt from Brazos water was undertaken many years ago by Lewis Mims of Houston, first president of the Brazos River Authority (1929 to 1941). Mr. Mims' persistent efforts to get a salt-control program going finally resulted in a study, recently completed, of the sources of salt pollution. As a result, engineers have been able to work out a plan for holding back much of the salt that now flows downstream. Details of the projected program have been announced by Herbert S. Hilburn, of Plainview, president of the B. R. A.

The Authority now has information, the result of a two-year study, which pinpoints the area north of Jayton, Texas, near the corners of Kent, Stonewall and

King counties, as the source of more than 40 per cent of all the salt in the Brazos River. Jayton is about halfway between Lubbock and Stamford.

The study, contracted by the Brazos River Authority with the Texas A&M Research Foundation, was made by Dr. Horace B. Blank, a professor, in the college's Department of Geology. It began in August, 1954, and the various findings are being further developed by the Brazos River Authority engineers and staff in collaboration with the U. S. Geological Survey and the State Board of Water Engineers.

A series of expeditions up the tributary known as the Salt Fork of the Brazos, from a point five miles south of Benjamin to the caprock near Crosbyton and the Double Mountain Fork tributary to the eastern edge of the High Plains in central Garza County, uncovered three salt flats on the Salt Fork in the area north of Jayton as the major sources of pollution.

The principal source, which contributes 30 per cent of the lower-river salt, is the Dove Creek Salt Flat. This 400-acre flat is in reality a widening of

an intermittent stream surrounded by high bluffs. Here seeps and springs flow pure brine, the subterranean source of which is found in shales and clays underlying the thick gypsum beds of the Peacock formation in these counties.

The brine is surfaced by artesian pressure in quantities that slightly exceed the evaporation rate, and then flows slowly into the Brazos.

In the two other flats, the Upper Croton Creek Flat and the Short Croton Creek Flat, the artesian pressure is less than the evaporation rate and the brine leaves deposits of almost pure salt. In some cases, it is pure enough for table use. These deposits are quickly dissolved during a heavy rain and are washed downstream. The distance they are carried depends on how heavy the water runs off during showers, and as a result, the salt has been redeposited in varying quantities up and down the entire tributary.

Tests made at the mouths of other tributaries in the same area indicate minor salt contributions.

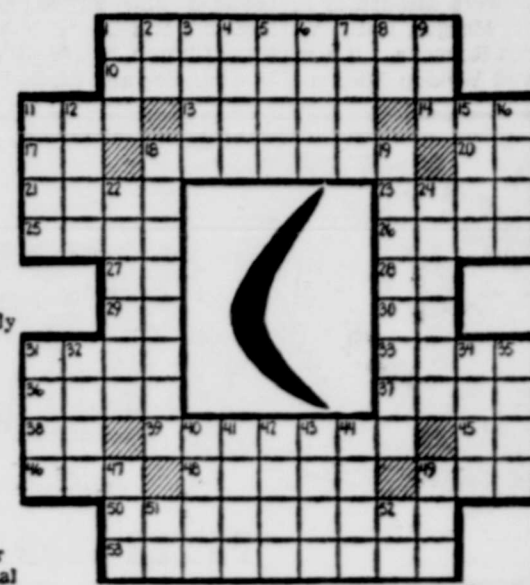
