POSTMASTER BOUGHT JOB, SOLONS HEAR

POSITION AT MEMPHIS, WAS PURCHASED IS CHARGE

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—The statement that he could prove the Memphis, Tenn., postmaster had been purchased was made today by Walker L. Wellford, president of the Memphis Hoover non-partisan club, before a senate committee investigating the appointment of Edward V. Sheely, acting postmaster. Wellford asked time to prepare a case against Sheely, indicating telephone testimony was being prepared. In reply to Senator McKellar, democratic Tennessee, as to the witness he expected to have testify and the character of the evidence to be presented Wellford said he did not like to divulge these facts, declaring that the proceedings depended partly on secrecy for their effect.

TERRACING GIVEN BOOST IN COUNTY

Lubbock county's terracing program took a giant forward stride yesterday when the county commissioners court authorized the employment of a terracing expert to aid in the program. D. F. Eaton, Lubbock county agent, announced this morning. As soon as he is employed, the new helper will aid Mr. Eaton for the next three months in the terracing activities. According to Mr. Eaton, twenty-five or thirty calls for terracing have already been received, and in his opinion there are few farms in the county which do not need some terracing to prevent the land from eroding. He said it was necessary for this work to be done in the near future as many farmers wished to begin plowing.

Famous Pilot Is Killed In Smash-Up

MORGANTOWN, W. Va., Feb. 1.—A career that embodied plotting the world was through air circuits, stunting to air mail flying came to an abrupt end on the mountain today with the death of Eugene Cecil, 35, Cleveland-Pittsburgh mail plane pilot. Cecil, it is thought, became lost in the fog hanging over Carnegie, Pa., and mistook the Monongahela river for the Ohio river, causing him to fly southward towards West Virginia instead of northward to his home port, Bettis Field, McKeesport.

LINDY TO OPEN NEW AIR LINE

LEAVES FOR FLORIDA; NEW ROUTE WILL START MONDAY

CURTIS FIELD, N. Y., Feb. 1.—Colonel Charles Lindbergh hopped off at 6:45 a. m. today for Florida where he will fly next Monday to open a new air mail route to the Panama Canal Zone. Lindbergh will take off at 6 a. m. Monday from the Pan-American Airways Terminal after landing at Havana for fuel his schedule calls for, over night. The next day he will stop at Belize, British Honduras, to refuel, and then fly to Managua, Nicaragua, where he will spend the night and complete the journey the third day with stops at Puntarenas, Costa Rica, and David, Panama, on his way to Cristobal where he will be due at about 4 p. m.

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HEAD-ON TRAIN COLLISION KILLS SIX

FREIGHT AND FAST EXPRESS SMASH TODAY

FLAMES BURST OUT OF WRECKAGE; CAUSE OF MIX UNKNOWN

HENDERSON, Ky., Feb. 1.—Five members of two train crews and an employee of the American Express company, all of Louisville, Ky., were reported killed eight miles from here today when train No. 146 on the Louisville, Henderson & St. Louis Railroad crashed head-on into a freight. The men killed were buried in the wreckage and only one body had been recovered.

The dead: W. B. Bush, Louisville, engineer of the passenger. Clyde Hall, Louisville, fireman of the passenger. J. A. Bell, Louisville, baggage man on the passenger train. John P. Harder, Louisville, engineer of the freight. Hewitt B. Maysey, Louisville, fireman of the freight. Milton I. Buckley, Louisville, brakeman of the freight. The wreck occurred about 3:35 a. m. Passengers who were awake when the crash occurred said the train seemed to be going slowly. There was a sudden grinding of brakes, they said, and then the impact. Both engines were demolished and one baggage car was smashed. The wreckage burst into flames immediately after the crash. Wrecking crews from here and from Louisville were dispatched to the scene and officials of the road from Louisville also were on their way here.

"Race Horse Bill" Brings Close Vote

AUSTIN, Feb. 1. (AP)—The so-called "race horse bill" moved the house to its closest vote of the session today, when it refused to recommit it to the committee on agriculture, after the committee on state affairs had voted it out with the recommendation that it pass last night. The vote on the motion made by Representative Holder of Dallas was 58 to 57. Opponents of the bill contend that it would legalize horse racing in Texas by permitting the making of books by fair associations.

(AP)—Ten persons were injured and nearly 100 passengers were shaken badly when seven pullmans and a baggage car attached to the Sioux fall No. 11 of the Milwaukee road were derailed near Mazomanie last night. P. F. Eubank, Northampton, Ohio, a salesman, and Manly S. Sandler, Chicago, negro porter, are in a hospital, having been brought here aboard a relief train today.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT PROGRAM CALLS FOR \$45,000,000 ANNUAL BUDGET

AUSTIN, Feb. 1.—The state highway department needs \$45,000,000 inclusive of federal and county aid, per year with which to carry on its construction program during the next biennium, Gibb Gilchrist, state engineer, told members of the house committee on revenue and taxation last night. The committee has before it several bills fixing the registration fees and the gas tax for the next two years. Gilchrist said that licenses, weight fees and the gasoline tax should be fixed so as to raise \$35,000,000 annually in revenue. He estimated that federal aid would amount to \$4,500,000 and county aid \$5,500,000 each of the next two years.

LUBBOCK WAS NINTH CITY IN CONSTRUCTION

STATISTICS SHOW THIS TOWN SURPASSED AMARILLO

After setting a building record of almost three and a half million dollars last year, Lubbock apparently is on the trail of even higher totals for 1929. During the month of January, 66 permits were granted for a total of \$261,728, an increase of about \$27,000 over the corresponding month of 1928, and about \$150,000 more than January 1927. According to figures from a national survey, received today by City Secretary W. H. Rogers, Lubbock placed ninth in Texas building last year. This total does not include the \$275,000 Chemistry building of Tech College, which would place this city seventh in the state. The survey further reveals that Texas placed ninth in the entire nation, being surpassed only by New York, Illinois, California, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Michigan, New Jersey and Massachusetts. In the state building, Lubbock was led by Houston, San Antonio, Port Worth, Dallas, Corpus Christi, San Angelo, Beaumont and Austin. Lubbock led Amarillo, Texas surpassed Wisconsin, Indiana, Connecticut and many other states, while Lubbock led such cities as Amarillo, Galveston, El Paso, and others.

SLEET BLANKETS LUBBOCK REGION

FIRST FALL OF YEAR ACCOMPANIES DROP IN THERMOMETER

Carried on the wings of a chilling norther, the first sleet of the year blanketed Lubbock and surrounding territory this morning, driving the thermometer to the low mark of twenty-one degrees around which it hovered most of the morning. All roads, especially pavement, were made treacherously slick this morning as the packed frozen sleet completely covered them. Sleet was reported general over this entire section today extending in every direction from Lubbock. The temperature began a steady decline yesterday afternoon, reaching the twenty-one mark at 7 o'clock this morning. At 1 o'clock this afternoon the thermometer stood at twenty-eight degrees. The official prediction for tomorrow is slightly warmer and possible additional moisture. According to the gauge at the state experiment station east of the city, the sleet entailed a moisture of about .05. January's total precipitation was .43, an increase of .12 over the average for that month.

SWEETWATER, Feb. 1. (AP)—As temperatures hovered around the 18-degree mark today, Sweetwater was under a coat of ice and sleet, which started falling at 5 a. m.

LAW VIOLATORS PAY \$1500 HERE

Lubbock law violators paid almost \$1,500 into the coffers of the city during the month of January, according to a statement turned into the city offices by the police department this morning. The statement revealed that 138 fines had been paid since the first of the year for an exact total of \$1,420. Almost half of this amount was paid on charges of drunkenness, thirty-seven fines, most of which were of \$15 each, being paid on this offense. Fifteen of the fines were for disturbing the peace, seventeen for vagrancy, and the others for gaming, and various traffic violations.

SORDID PICTURE OF TEXAS PRISONS IS PORTRAYED TO LEGISLATURE MEMBERS

AUSTIN, Feb. 1.—Members of legislature yesterday looked upon a sordid picture of the Texas penitentiary system, painted by members of the state prison commission who appeared before a joint session to give a report on conditions behind the walls at Huntsville and upon eleven farms. W. M. Odell of Fort Worth, in the absence of Col. R. H. Baker of Houston, who is ill, made the principal address. His remarks were supplemented by Dr. A. C. Scott of Temple and Rabbi Henry Cohen of Galveston. Governor Dan Moody also made a brief talk. The Huntsville plant is a minor unit of the present system, with only 817 of the 4,570 persons doing penal servitude, confined behind the walls there. The prison board was "astonished," Odell said, to find upon a recent visit to the farms that some of the worst type criminals "had been turned loose upon these lands," which offer many opportunities of escape. Facilities Lacking "The board decided by unanimous vote that these men should not be placed upon the farms but we found it was physically impossible to keep all the dangerous criminals behind the walls because of the lack of facilities," Odell said. He pleaded for removal of the removal of the main walls at Huntsville.

LOVE SLAYERS PAY LIVES IN MURDER CASE

EXECUTION COMES FEW MINUTES AFTER NOON TODAY

FRANKLIN, La., Feb. 1.—Mrs. Ada Bonner Leboeuf and Dr. Thomas E. Dreher were hanged in quick succession in the parish jail here today for the murder of James Leboeuf, the woman's husband. The woman led the way to the gallows accompanied by Father J. J. Rousseau, of the local Church of Assumption. The man followed with his spiritual adviser, Rev. J. A. McCormack, Methodist minister beside him. Mrs. Leboeuf walked on the trap at 12:04. Cut down at 12:16. "Oh mother, my God," moaned Ada, "isn't this a terrible thing. She struggled before the drop. She began praying behind Father J. J. Rousseau, Catholic priest, in the voice of a young girl. "Out there! Out there," she cried as a surprised child as the sheriff begged her to come out. The hangman sat on a bench beside the trap waiting. Blindfolded, the woman walked out on the trap dressed in a plain pink slip dress. She cried: "My mother, my mother, oh my God. Isn't this a terrible thing. This is murder itself. That rope is too tight around my neck. Yes it is, Mr. Mariel (the sheriff). Oh, My God, My God." She struggled. The black cloth was placed over her head. Her hands were tied.

Father Rousseau administered the extreme prayer as she hanged on the rope, which slipped to one side showing her blindfolded face. The man and woman awoke after a drug-induced sleep. A negro nurse sat in the cell throughout the night with Mrs. Leboeuf while two men on death watch stood vigil outside the cells of each.

Mrs. Leboeuf was given only communion by Father J. J. Rousseau, pastor of the Church of Assumption of Franklin. She was then given a cup of coffee. "She was calmer and more collected than at any time since her sentence. Dr. Dreher received Rev. J. A. McCormack, pastor of the Franklin Methodist church. He was also quiet and calm. He returned a book to a friend with a notation on the fly leaf, saying he would "wait for him in heaven." The book was entitled "To Die With Jesus." "I enjoyed every word of the book," the notation said. "I will wait in heaven for you. I will be with Jesus."

At 9 a. m. Eugene Dreher, nephew of Dr. Dreher, visited the jail and received instructions for closing his uncle's business affairs. Ted Dreher, son of Dr. Dreher, was in West Texas. His father called for him several times. Mrs. Leboeuf asked for her 72 year old mother, but she sent word (Turn to Page 8, Column 6, Please)

MUST REPORT ON NEFF NOMINATION

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—The senate interstate commerce committee today faced the task of preparing a report on the nomination of Pat M. Neff to the United States Board of Mediation, after hearing testimony for and against the former Texas governor.

SPORTS GARB FOR WINTER REMAINS THE SAME

PARIS, Feb. 1.—He who would ever attempt to change anything in the composition of what is known as winter sports clothes would be taking a very risky step. These are clothes that have survived many decades of variations in women's attire for the good reason that they eminently suitable for the use made of them. Those people who at different times have attempted to ignore the recognized theme have found themselves covered with ridicule.

In the first place it is inadmissible that anyone should see the need of placing any trimming on a costume that not only requires none but would prove to be considerably hampered by it. The perfect skiing outfit in my opinion is that which allows a woman perfect freedom of movement and also enables her to cover or uncover herself at will. That is a reason why I refer to the sweater fitting close to the neck with a roll collar which can be worn open or closed. Any woman who knows anything about skiing in Europe will admit that one never suffers from cold. To bear this statement out, I would cite those youths who at such high altitudes as 10,000 feet go skiing with absolutely naked torsos without feeling any the worse for it.

The "Why" of Jackets
A point to be remembered when contemplating winter sports clothes is that woollens such as a sweater retain the snow, therefore the moisture, and the ideal snow suit consequently one made of a close woven and waterproof material. It is for this very reason that the jacket figures as an integral part of the outfit. It would be quite an unnecessary item in fine weather. Its role being purely a protective one.

Originality or fantasy permitted in skiing ensembles are restricted to the design on sweaters, cap and scarf, provided always that they are artistic and in good taste. Any color, however loud, passes muster on the snow, but beware of too indulgent a mixture of loud tones. Anyway, why risk looking ridiculous by the use of too wide a range of colors when the same color used in three or four different shades gives such charming decorative results?

A habit which I deplore in many women skiers is that of removing the charming cap they usually start out with. It is generally becoming much more so than a disheveled head.

Variety for Skaters
There is more latitude for novelty in the skating suit, at any rate so far as the skirt is concerned. The whole question consists of the ways in which amplexation can be achieved and there are skirts to suit all tastes—pleated, circular, wrapover, etc. In an attempt to break the monotony of previous years I created a skating costume in black waterproof velvet combined with a black striped vivid pink sweater. This came as a welcome alternative and has been very successful.

Although the skiing outfit, too, necessitates a choice of dark colors, I created for a change one in dark red and very dark green as an alternative to the black, dark greys and browns of previous seasons. With these I combined sweaters in the same color, but two or three shades lighter, always keeping well within the strictly sporting character of the suits themselves.

NEW ASPECT IS LENT SPANISH POLITICAL UPHEAVAL NOW

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, Feb. 1.—Attempted assassination late last eve of the Papal Nuncio as he walked in the gardens of the Royal Palace at Madrid gave a new aspect today to Spain's political upheaval.

Four shots were fired at the Papal "diplomatic representative," believed here to mean the Papal Nuncio, Monsignor Frederico Tedeschini. All of the shots went wild and the assailant escaped.

Monsignor Tedeschini, who was

appointed the Spanish post in 1921, has been on exceedingly friendly terms with King Alfonso XIII and his family and it is believed this friendship may have accounted for his presence in the Garden where he was mistaken for another.

OKLAHOMA LEGISLATORS TURN TO MASS OF EVIDENCE AS YET UNINVESTIGATED

(By Associated Press)—OKLAHOMA CITY, Feb. 1. (P)—Henry S. Johnston's plea of not guilty having been placed before it, the Oklahoma legislature today turned from seeking evidence to be used against the suspended chief executive during his trial before a senate impeachment court to the mass of testimony still untapped by the house investigating committee in its scrutiny of governmental affairs.

By common consent the charges were consolidated although the governor was not required to answer three of them until February 5.

At the conclusion of its brief session the senate court of impeachment set February 11 as the date for the governor's trial on the charges and immediately following its adjournment the house took up again its tangled skeins of testimony. Kelly P. Gison, Tulsa investment man, added to the growing heap of testimony presented to the house sub-committee, investigating the state supreme court when he quoted Charles E. McPherson, Oklahoma City attorney, former state senator and brigadier in the Oklahoma National Guard, as saying he and his partner "won four judges" of the state supreme court.

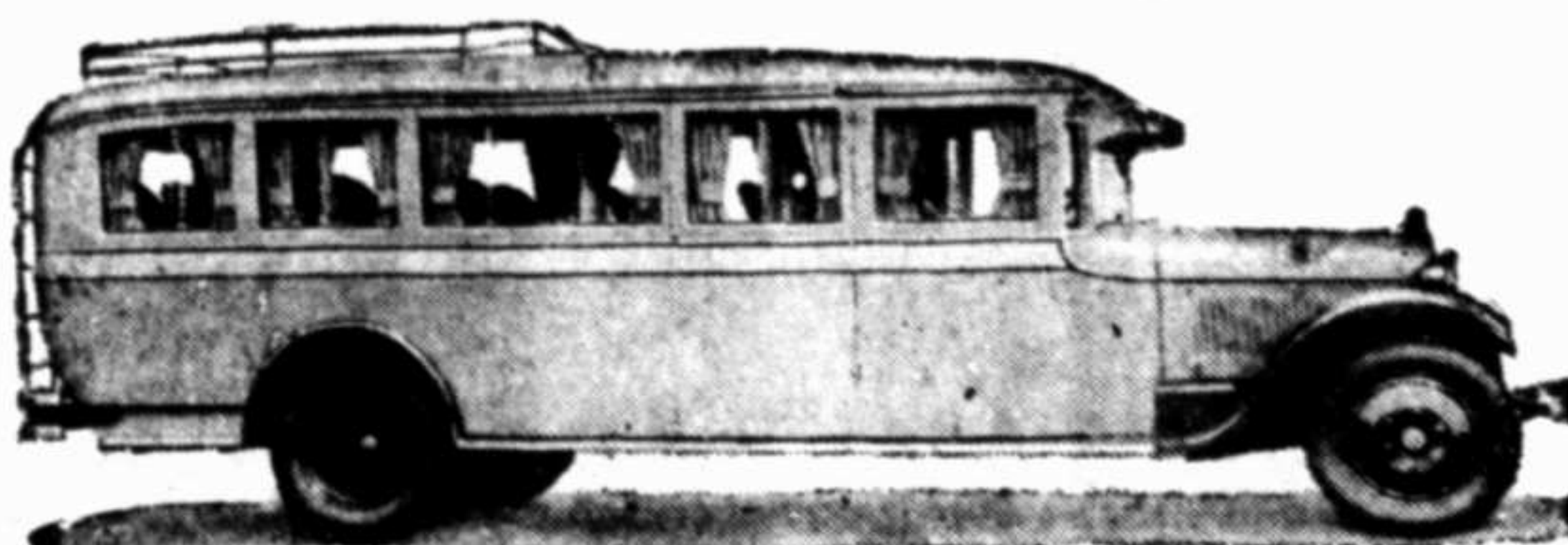

ELDER ROCKEFELLER SUPPORTS SON ENDORSES STAND IN OPPOSING RE-NOMINATION OF STEWART AS STANDARD OIL CHAIRMAN

(By Associated Press)—NEW YORK, Feb. 1.—John D. Rockefeller, sr., today stood shoulder to shoulder with his son, John D. Rockefeller, jr., in the fight to oust Colonel Robert W. Stewart of Chicago from the chairmanship of the Standard Oil company of Indiana.

Support for his son's cause was announced in a statement issued from the Rockefeller offices, at 26 Broadway.

Mr. Stewart, who said he would not believe John D. Rockefeller would desire his removal from the Indiana oil chairmanship until he saw "positive proof of it" was in the city on a secret visit when the statement was issued. He refused to comment on any phase of the controversy.

The elder Rockefeller in the first formal statement he has issued in ten years, said:

"The press has several times reported a statement from Colonel Robert W. Stewart to the effect that John D. Rockefeller, sr., would be pleased by the re-election of Colonel Stewart as a director of the Standard Oil company of Indiana.

A little later after his arrival. After the dedication, Mr. and Mrs. Coolidge are to inspect the singing tower a structure erected at the summit of Iron Mountain, said to be the highest point in the state of Florida. The tower contains a carillon of 61 bells, especially cast and imported.

From the sanctuary, the president is to go to Mr. Bok's winter home after which he will begin the journey back to Washington. He is to be at Mountain Lake a little more than six hours.

Mr. and Mrs. Coolidge began their twenty-four hour journey late yesterday. Snow was falling as they left Washington and it continued to fall until his train was well south of Richmond.

Mr. Rockefeller, sr., has been informed that many people in the west have been misled by this report. For this reason Mr. Rockefeller, sr., thinks it necessary to make this statement:

"Mr. Rockefeller, sr., owns no stock in the Standard Oil company of Indiana. He feels that his son has proceeded only with the earnest desire to do that which will be best for the trust welfare of the Standard Oil company of Indiana and for large corporate interests in general. Mr. Rockefeller, sr., agrees with and does not see how his son could have done otherwise. He has proceeded with deliberation and patience and with the utmost consideration for the feelings of all parties concerned. It has been an unpleasant duty for him, but one which in all good conscience he could not shrink."

The statement was issued after an exchange of telegrams and cables among Mr. Rockefeller, sr., and his son now traveling in Egypt and their associates here.

The public alignment of the father with John D. Rockefeller, jr., in the controversy was seen in financial circles as a factor of tremendous significance for it was predicted the influence of the Elder Rockefeller would swing important blocks of Indiana oil stock into line against Mr. Stewart.

Mr. Stewart met inquiries regarding his plans with the terse statement:

"I expect to remain here a day or two, and to attend to some private business. I have no intention at present of engaging in any controversies or issuing any public statements. I do not care to reveal my program to anybody."

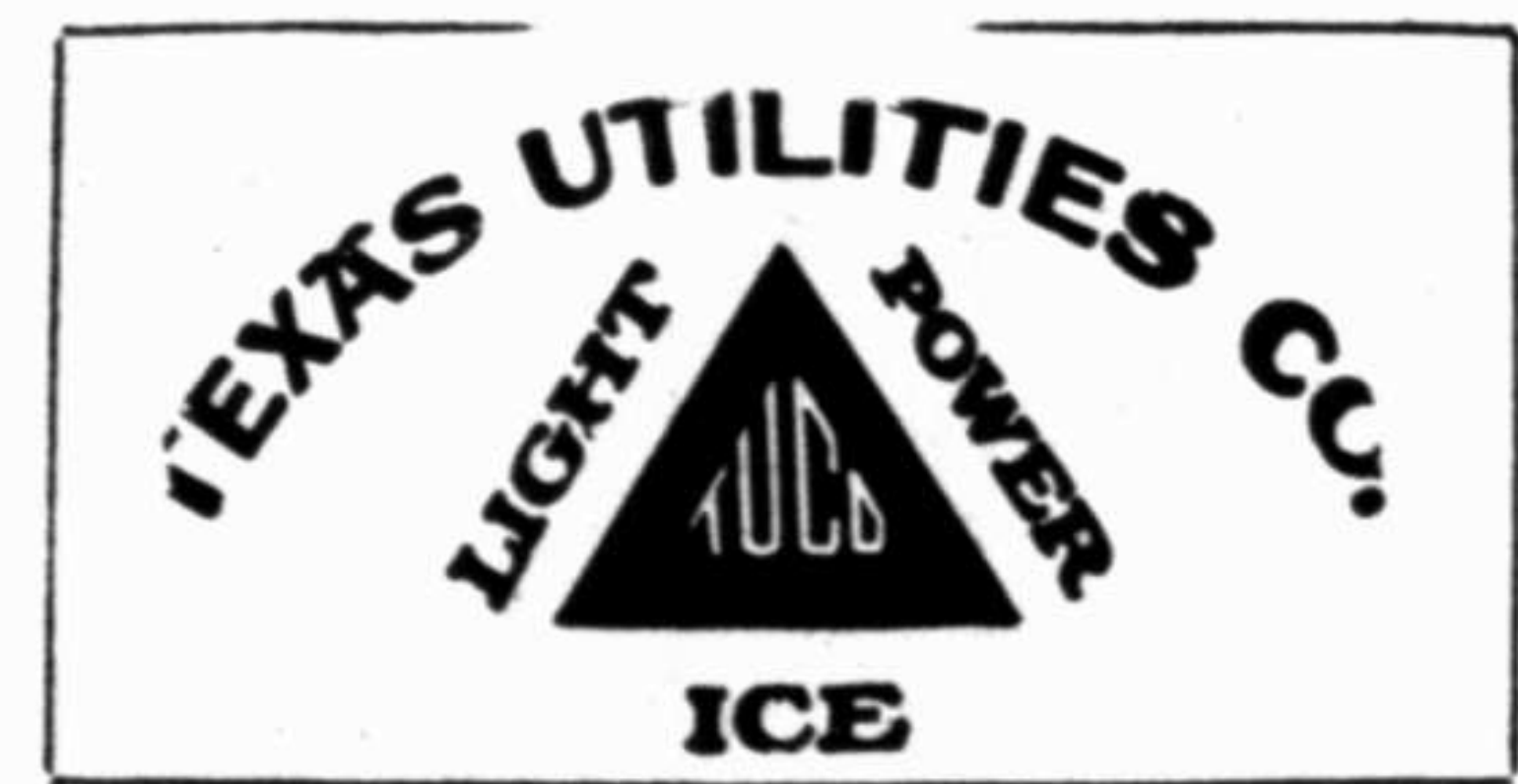

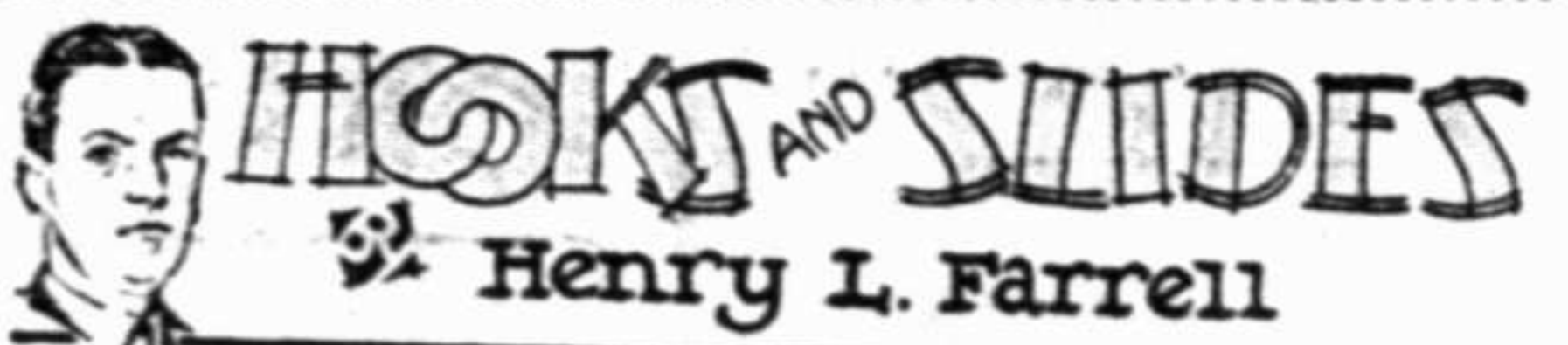

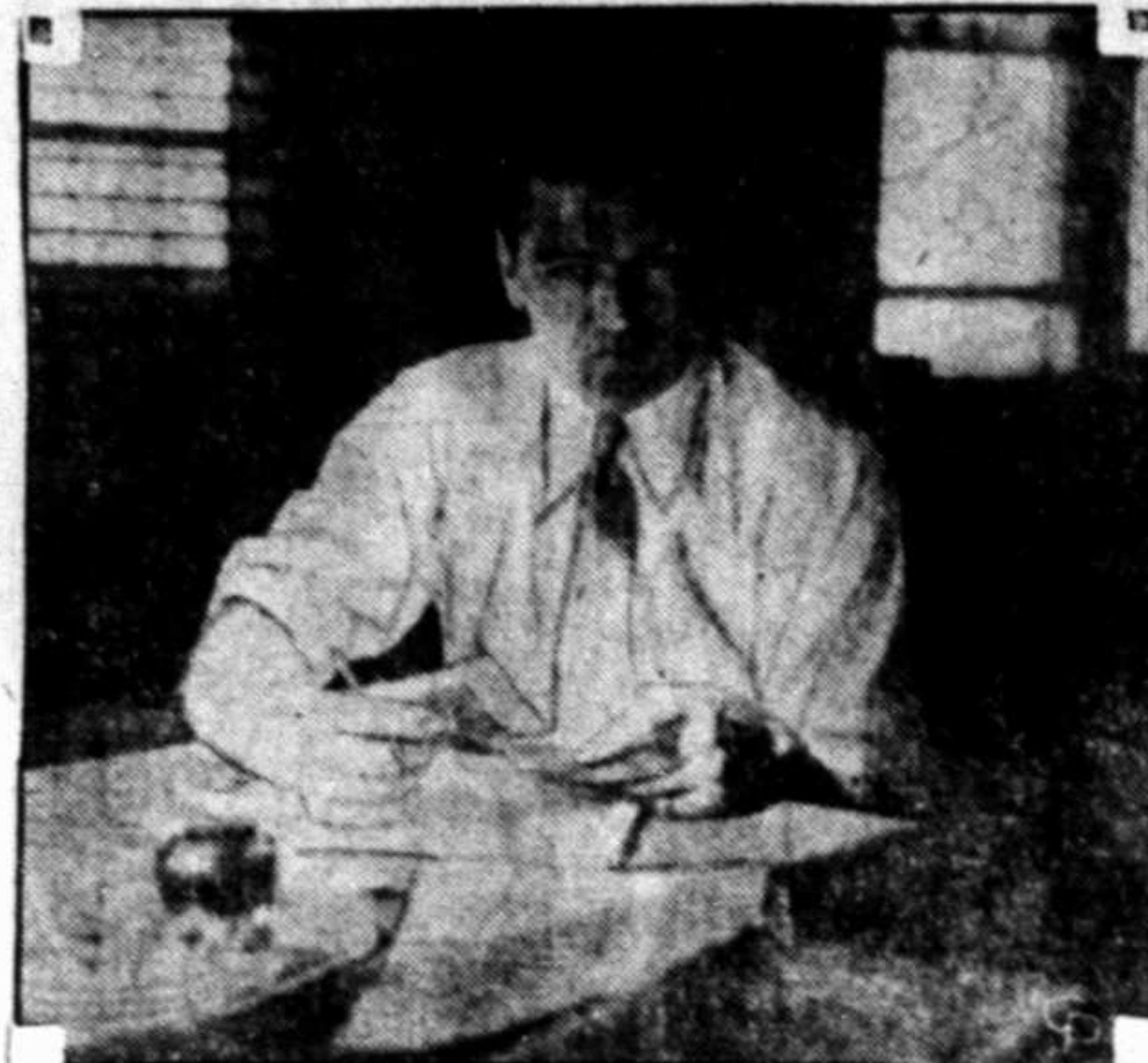

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DRY BILL BACK IN CONFERENCE

PROPOSAL TO INCREASE ENFORCEMENT FUND TO BE DISCUSSED

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—Twice the amended first deficiency bill, carrying with it \$24,000,000 for prohibition enforcement, has gone before the house and twice it has been shunted aside. Supporters of the fund have sought a direct vote on the amendment but after an extended argument yesterday, the measure today was on its way to conference with the senate.

A proposal designed to keep the bill from conference was beaten in the house 240 to 141, and this was taken as a victory for those who believe, as Secretary Mellon believes, that the \$24,000,000 would do more harm than good.

While supporters of the \$24,000,000 ran far behind in the voting they had an opportunity to discuss the fund and prohibition generally, and in turn they were answered for the opposition. Party ranks were broken during the debate, and some wets and dries found themselves in what could be considered enemy camps. Forty-five democrats joined with 194 republicans in voting down the proposal to keep the bill from conference and with them went the only Socialist in Congress, Berger of Wisconsin. Ten republicans sided with 129 democrats in supporting the motion and they had the aid of two Farmer-Labor members, Carrs and Kvale of Minnesota.

During the debate, Secretary Mellon, as is usual when there is an argument over prohibition in congress, was accused of favoring wet interests.

Since most of those who want the \$24,000,000 left in the deficiency bill are democrats, republicans said the former were trying to re-establish themselves with their constituents for supporting Governor Smith in the presidential campaign. The democrats had an answer to this, declaring that since the President-elect would have disposal of the \$24,000,000 republican dries were in the position of refusing to trust Mr. Hoover. They also declared that officials of the prohibition bureau said more funds were needed to enforce the law.

DEAF HEAR

Invention Has Principles Of Broadcasting

CANTON, O., Feb. 1. (AP)—An invention embodying the principle of radio broadcasting and reception brought joy to 20 deaf mutes at the Henry S. Martin school today when, for the first time in their lives they hear their own voices and their teacher's as well.

The device was installed in a school room. The equipment included a broadcasting unit and each student's desk was equipped with ear phones.

As the most practicable financing plan the legislature could adopt. He said the bond issue should be supported by a gasoline tax of four cents.

The state road system now comprises 17,968 miles, fifty percent of which "has not been touched," Gilchrist said.

Representative Walter Beck of Fort Worth told the committee that during the last fiscal year, the counties retained in registration fees an average of \$6.28 for each vehicle and the state received \$7.75.

If the fees were reduced to an average of \$12 per car, with the state getting \$6.62 and the county \$5.38, the revenue to the highway department would amount to \$7,994,000, he said.

Under the Tillotson measure the counties would retain a larger proportion of the fees, reducing the income of the highway department about \$4,000,000 annually, he said.

COST OF WHEAT

\$1.42 An Acre Is Figured As Basis

(Special To The Journal)

CANYON, Feb. 1.—It costs \$1.42 to prepare and seed an acre of wheat in Randall county.

This figure is based upon a study made by County Agent W. H. Upchurch from the files of James Lovell, a wheat grower of this county.

Four hundred acres of wheat was planted with an expenditure of \$69.60 for kerosene, with an additional \$18.15 for gasoline used in starting the tractor and in the Ford which was used on trips to and from the wheat field. Oil and grease for the small car and tractor cost \$30.05.

Mr. Lovell paid \$50.00 for 25 bushels of the seed wheat which he used and \$175.00 for 175 bushels.

In determining the cost of preparing the ground and seeding the wheat Mr. Lovell counted the interest chargeable to 400 acres of land, depreciation of wheat drill, tractor and plow and all incidental operating costs which often make the difference between profit and loss in farming.

Good wheat land in Randall county may be bought for from \$15 to \$40 an acre, depending on the location. With a rapidly developing system of roads, location is becoming less important and desirable land is increasing in price.

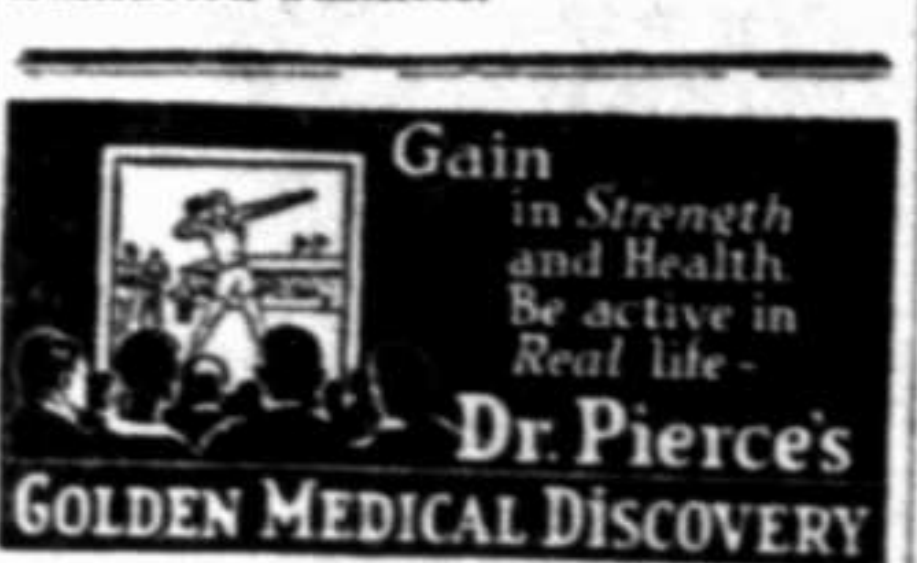
