Dallas Votes On Council-Manager Plan Of Government

DALLAS, Tex., Oct. 11.—Dallas will be governed under the council-manager plan after next May 1. Tabulation of votes in yesterday's municipal election showed today that 39 charter amendments setting up the new plan had passed by a ratio of more than two to one.

Not only will the council-manager plan be adopted under the new charter amendments, but other improvements will be carried out, including civil service for city employees, excepting day laborers and department heads.

The nine members of the council will be elected the first Tuesday in April. Six will be elected by districts and three at large. All members will be voted on by the entire city.

The council will employ the city manager and fix his salary.

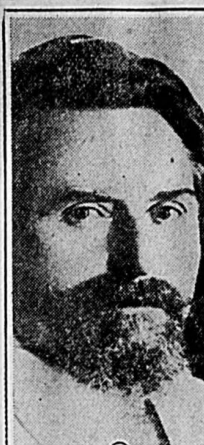
Hal Dean Allen, president of the Senior Class made the announcements.

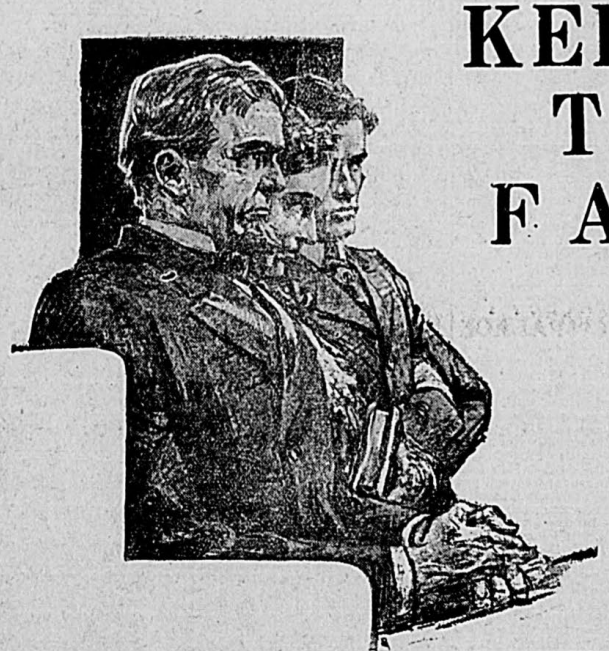
Middleton Gets 99-Year Sentence

OIL NEWS

SAN ANGELO, Tex., Oct. 11.—Another new West Texas oil pool was definitely opened in west central Crane county with the tapping of pay in the Cranfill brothers and Guilan No. 1 J. B. Tubbs yesterday.

In the first 18 hours the well flowed 742 barrels of oil. A heavy showing of gas was also coming from the well at a depth of 1,300 feet.

The wildcat was producing in the first display.

VAN, Tex., Oct. 11.—Production in the Van Zandt county oil field is being held down to 27,500 barrels daily, the known pipe line capacity. Unpressured production both of old wells and new, assigning each a flow in proportion to its potential capacity.

GRAND SALINE, Tex., Oct. 11.—The Van oil field was extended nearly half a mile by the coming in of the Anderson Q. Gortzen and Van Oil Companies Mrs. Ella York No. 1, with an estimated potential production of 65,000 barrels. It was drilled 250 feet in the pay sand, the total depth being 2,932 feet.

SAN ANGELO, Tex., Oct. 10.—Total daily production of seven wells completed in the West Texas permanent basin within the past week was 4,891 barrels. In the preceding week six wells were completed for a yield of 1,392 barrels.

Ward county led in new production, completing one well for 2,683 barrels daily.

SHREVEPORT, La., Oct. 10.—Thirty-seven producers and 60 dry holes or salt water wells had been tapped in the Swolle field, Sabine parish, up to Sept. 1, according to figures furnished by Dr. A. J. Shaw, head of the minerals division of the Louisiana conservation commission.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Oct. 9.—On half-inch choke the Buchanan and LeFevre No. 1 on the Pettus township in Bexar county was flowing at the rate of 1,000 barrels daily today. The well has sand from 3,888 to 3,886 feet.

Humble has completed its No. 15-A Denman in the Darst Creek field, Guadalupe county, as a producer estimated good for 1,000 barrels daily.

GAINESVILLE, Tex., Oct. 9.—Casing has been cemented in the W. B. Hamilton No. 2 Jacobs well in the Bloomfield area, southeast Cooke county, and plug will be drilled this week for testing sand.

LONGVIEW, Tex., Oct. 10.—Gregg county was assured of a second test well for oil today when B. A. Skipper announced that he had secured a contract for drilling on a block of 7,500 acres he had under lease near the Pine Tree church, five miles northwest of here. Drilling will start within the next two or three days. Skipper said. Location will be made on the F. E. Lathrop tract one mile north of Pine Tree. The contract calls for drilling until the Woodbine sand is reached.

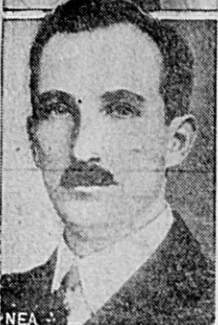

Bishop Cannon Remains Silent About Charges

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—Bishop James Cannon, Jr., expects to remain silent upon charges filed against him by four members of his denomination, but to deny the complaints whenever a properly constituted committee meets to investigate them.

South Texas To Have a Bumper Cotton Crop

AUSTIN, Tex., Oct. 10.—There will be twice as much cotton this year in the territory south and east of a line run from Kleberg to Gillespie county and from there to the Rio Grande, cotton statistics of the U. S. Department of Agriculture reported here today.

The combined production of Grayson, Fannin, Lamar, Red River, Collin, Hunt, Hopkins and Delta counties is expected to equal or exceed last year. In other sections, except for scattered exceptions, the crop will fall short of last year. Northwest production is yet in doubt. The estimated yield for the state is 4,275,000 bales compared with 3,540,000 last year. Last year's crop, however, was the smallest in seven years.

Woman Urges Tinted Paving

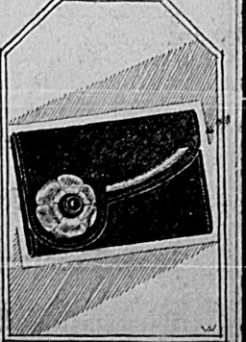
