Sheriff Nabs Man With Marijuana

Acting on information received from the Federal Drug Enforcement Agency last Friday, Sheriff Robert (Bob) Hewes arrested one man in an incident which indicated that local drug-pushers were in the process of resorting to a new tactic of funneling drugs into the Rockport area.

Sheriff Hewes received information from the Federal Drug Enforcement Agency that an unknown quantity of drugs was to be delivered to the Rockport area using a commercial carrier as the source of transportation.

The unknowing commercial carrier in this case was a bus and the package was plainly wrapped and addressed to a fictitious name and address in Rockport.

After receiving the information, Sheriff Hewes, Deputy Mike Weber, city patrolman Gary Langston set up surveillance of the bus station in Rockport and shortly afterwards Hewes

arrested a 21-year-old man who picked up the package by signing the fictitious name.

Edwardo Canales of Aransas Pass was charged by Sheriff Hewes for unlawfully possessing about a pound of marijuana and a \$2,500 bond was placed against Canales.

Sheriff Hewes stated that according to reliable information, bringing drugs into the County has become increasingly difficult for the local-pusher and apparently shipping the drugs into the area was a new method being tried.

Sheriff Hewes also stated that the citizens of the County have certainly shown signs of becoming more involved in the fight against drug abuse in Aransas County and re-emphasizes the point that without the pusher, the youth of this county will be safer in the choice of making their future lives meaningful ones.

Two New Chemical Products Being Evaluated to Combat White Grubs

White grubs attacking lawns in the Rockport area have been particularly noticeable this summer. Most home owners have been treating affected lawns with a chemical called Diazinon. Due to the severe shortage of Diazinon, and growing suspicions that the chemical is not as effective as it was two or three years ago, James A. Deer, Area Entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and Dan Pawlik, County Agricultural Agent for Aransas County, in cooperation with Pearson's Garden Center, are conducting experiments locally using new chemicals at various rates.

A new product called Dursban produced by Dow Chemical Co., and Dasanit, produced by Chemagro Chemical Co., are being evaluated. These two products are available in granular form for the home owner to apply, and it can also be applied as a liquid. Twelve test plots measuring 10 ft. by 10 ft. have been staked off after grub counts were made. Each of the measured areas were then treated with Diazinon, Dursban and Dasanit.

In one week the plots will be examined and the grubs counted to see how many were left alive after treatment at various rates applied. Because Dursban and Dasanit are relatively new on the market the rates have not been completely established. This is one objective of the work being done by Deer and Pawlik.

Numerous species of white grubs, belonging to the genus Phyllophaga, are known from Texas. Recently one species, Phyllophaga crinita (adults are known as May or June beetles), has become well adapted to survive and flourish in Texas turfgrass. When grub numbers become excessive in this environment, their habit of feeding on grass roots can result in severe damage; Bermudagrass and St. Augustine grass are affected. In addition to turfgrass, this insect also causes economic loss to certain agricultural crops especially corn, sorghum and sugarcane.

During the past several years, lawns in Dallas, Fort Worth, Lubbock, Odessa, San Antonio, Corpus Christi and several small urban centers in the lower Rio Grande Valley have experienced grub damage. Some large cities, including Austin, Bryan-College Station, Houston and Tyler have not reported noticeable damage by this insect.

Phyllophaga crinita requires 1 year to complete its life cycle in most sections of Texas (a 2-year cycle is suspected in a significant proportion of the grub populations in the Lubbock area). Adult beetles emerge from the soil once a year to mate. Mated females bore back into the earth and begin laying eggs, which eventually give rise to small larvae (first stage).

These in turn result in large larvae (second and third

stages) that feed voraciously on grass roots. The pupal or resting stage is the last phase of the insect's developmental cycle and occurs just before the adults emerge to initiate the cycle anew.

Marijuana Case Reported Here

Acting on reliable information, Deputy Sheriff Donald Beard, assisted by Constable Buddy McLeister, Deputy Ronnie Valdez and City Patrolman Gary Don Langston, arrested a local 18-year-old youth and charged him with unlawful possession of marijuana in a quantity of less than four ounces.

Beard stated that Daniel Carroll Wright was at present on probation and a motion to revoke probation charge will also be added to the possession of marijuana charge.

If the probation revocation charge is accepted, Wright will be eligible for transfer to the Texas Department of Corrections and serve the term specified in his probation case. At present, Wright is under a \$1,000 bond.

United Fund Campaign Opens With Goal Set at \$11,500

A goal of \$11,500 was set for the 1974-75 Aransas County United Fund, Mayor Walter S. Falk, Jr., was appointed campaign chairman, and the drive was scheduled to start October 1 at a meeting of the Fund's board of directors at Duck Inn

September 26. Eleven agencies will benefit from the drive.

Solicitation will be by mail as it has been for the past several years, according to fund president Bill Ratliff who presided at the planning

meeting.

"We are taking a realistic approach by setting the goal at a lower figure than the amount sought for 1973-74," Mayor Falk said. "We realize that costs have increased all along the line, but in view of results in past campaigns it appeared unlikely that we could raise the total of \$13,180 requested this year by participating agencies. Therefore, we reduced the requests to fall within the \$11,500 goal. We raised \$11,500 in the 1973-74 drive."

"Actually, we hope to exceed our goal and if we do any additional money raised will be prorated among participating agencies", he added.

Agencies participating in the 1974-75 campaign and the amounts allocated each by the fund budget committee are as follows:

American Red Cross \$2,100; Aransas County Emergency Corps, \$500; Aransas County Youth Council, \$337; Boy Scouts, \$2,500; Coastal Bend Association for Mental Health, \$350; Family Counseling Service, \$200; Girl Scouts; Paisano Council, \$1,500 and local unit, \$337.50; Salvation Army, \$2,000; Texas Rehabilitation Hospital, Gonzales, \$500; United Service Organization (U.S.O.), \$125; Texas United Community Service, \$128.

John and Bernita Kinsey who have been Fund directors for many years resigned "to permit full enjoyment of partial retirement." Their resignations were accepted with regret and a letter of appreciation for past services was authorized by the board.

Curtis Goodman and Robert Konvicka were appointed to succeed the Kinseys as directors.

Man Charged With Burglary

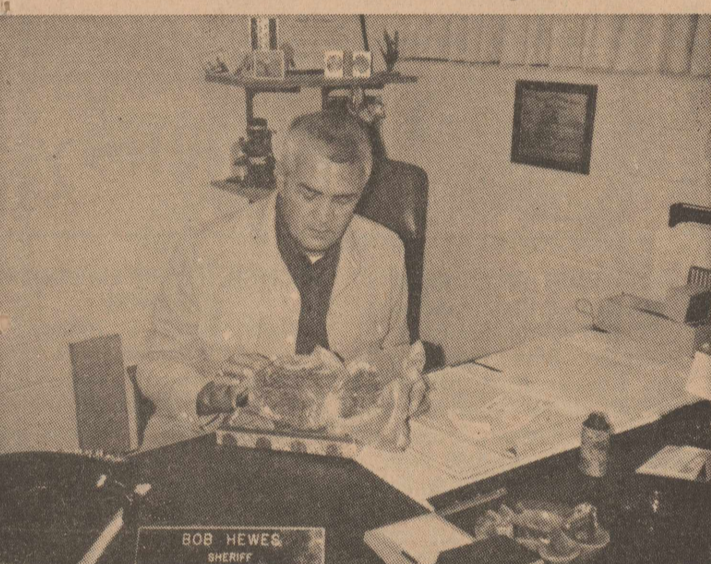
A local 18-year-old man was arrested last week by Sheriff's Investigator Mike Webb and charged with the burglary of a home in Holiday Beach.

County Orders Patrol Car

On September 30 there was a meeting of the Commissioners Court with the following members present: John D. Wendell, County Judge; Erie Eller, Commissioner Precinct No. 1; Wanda Sparks, Commissioner Precinct No. 2; Raymond Owens, Commissioner Precinct No. 3; Charley Hale, Commissioner Precinct No. 4 and Ruby Hart, County Clerk.

The construction of a new shed for the road and bridge trucks and equipment was discussed. It was unanimously decided to ask for bids using the plans and specifications of the present shed.

J.D. Selman, Jr., Dan Pawlik and Karen R. Prukop of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service were present. Pawlik made a report of the activities of the County Agent in Aransas County during the years 1972, 1973 and 1974.

Karen Prukop, Assistant County Extension Agent, reported on the work of her department.

J.D. Selman, Jr. explained the functions of a County Marine Agent.

The Court expressed interest in this matter and Selman, District Extension Agent, will meet with the court again on October 14.

Bids were opened for a sheriff patrol car and a truck for the Road and Bridge Department. Only one bid was received: Commercial Motor Company, patrol car (station wagon), \$4,115.00; and for a diesel truck, \$9,529.19. It was voted to award the bid to the Commercial Motor Company.

Carl Duckworth was present in regard to leasing the recreational building at the radar site for use by Rockport-Fulton Tourist Association. The Court agreed to lease same to the Tourist Association. The County Judge was instructed to contact the County Attorney in regard to making a lease agreement that will be agreeable to the Rockport-Fulton Tourist Association and Aransas County.

A bid was received from George Miller Company to supply all necessary equipment, labor, material and

insurance to sandblast and apply one coat of primer and one coat of gray to all corroded interior steel located inside of the jail house for the sum of \$955.91. The Court unanimously agreed to accept the bid and award the contract to George Miller Company.

John McDavid met with the Court in regard to leasing that portion of land in drainage right-of-way adjoining the Picton-Johnson Estate property along the West line of 54.63 acres in John Smith Survey, A-187. It was voted to lease right-of-way to McDavid for \$1.00 per year and maintenance of fence.

Came on for consideration the matter of an airport contract with Chaparral Aviation Inc. After due consideration the Court decided to reject Chaparral's offer at this time.

Trial by Jury Is Speech Topic

The importance and significance of trial by jury in the American system of justice was explained and illustrated in a motion picture sponsored by Texas Bar Association and presented by Attorney Sam Wilcox at the weekly luncheon meeting of Rotary Club Sept. 25 at Ramada Inn.

The film reviewed earlier methods of determining guilt or innocence of the accused, including forcing the accused to hold hot metal in his hands, use of a ducking chair and personal combat between the accused and the accuser.

Despite current attacks on our system of justice, trial by jury is the best method ever devised to insure that justice is administered, according to the film. A jury trial is more than just a contest of words between lawyers, it was asserted. Lawyers are supposed to collect facts, arrange them in an orderly manner and present them to the judge and jury. It is the judge's responsibility to insure an orderly contest between opposing lawyers and to interpret the law for both sides. And, finally, the decision is left to a jury of citizens, it was explained.

The film reviewed operations of the jury system, starting with selection of a panel of prospective jurors by lottery from all walks of life. After selection, members of the panel of jurors are sworn in and await assignment to specific cases. It was explained that the jury system was discarded in the final years of the Roman empire to be revived later in England. Until rather recently, women were not selected for jury duty. It also was explained that the jury system is more widely used in the United States than in any other country.

The film stressed that jury duty gave ordinary citizens an opportunity to participate in government.

Continuing, the film story explained that selection of a jury for a particular case involved questioning of candidates from the panel by opposing lawyers in an attempt to select an impartial jury for the trial. If a candidate, upon questioning, reveals a prejudice for or against the accused he may be dismissed for cause with approval of the presiding judge. Also, lawyers for each side are permitted a number of so-called pre-emptory challenges which permit dismissal of a prospective juror without obvious cause.

After the jury is selected members are sworn to follow the law and to base their decision on the evidence presented. The judge then outlines duties and responsibilities of the jury.

The prosecution attorney makes the first presentation to the jury, followed by the defense lawyer. Both sides use witnesses in an effort to reconstruct the situation which resulted in the accusation, with the judge ruling on whether specific testimony may be admitted. Following presentation of evidence by both sides, opposing attorneys present their final arguments in an attempt to help members of the jury make up their minds, the film related.

The judge then charges the jury to make its decision on the basis of evidence presented with respect to laws governing the situation. He cautions them that the verdict must be on the basis of existing law, not on what they may think the law should be, according to the film.

"Jurors learn something about our system of justice through serving on a jury", and "common sense of common men creates an uncommonly good system of justice" the bar association-sponsored film reports in conclusion.

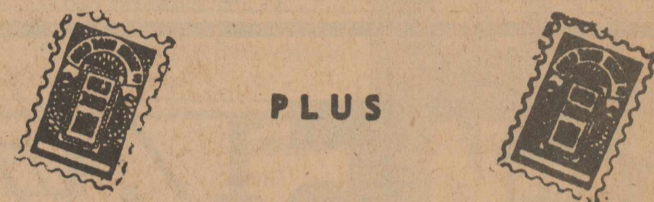

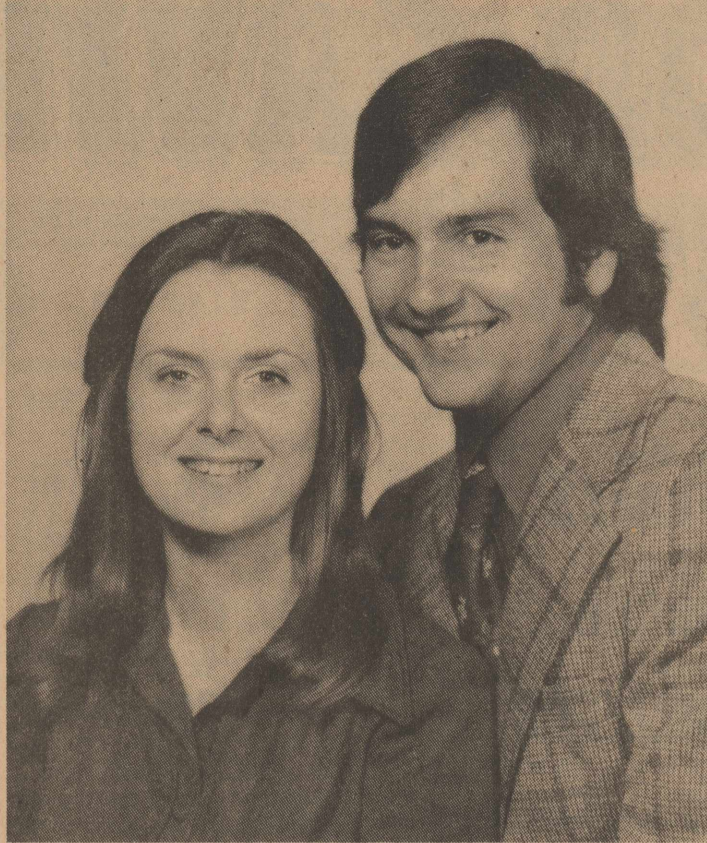

History Society Work Honored

The public was invited to celebrate the publication of "The History of Nueces County," a book prepared by the historical society.

An effort was made by the museum staff to locate all who worked on the book, according to museum director

Aalbert Heine.

Among those who had a part in preparing the book are Dr. W. Armstrong Price of Corpus Christi; the late J.W. Agee, Dr. J.A. Carroll, who shared a Pulitzer prize for his work on George Washington, and Dr. Walter Rundell Jr. Agee, Carroll and Rundell all were Del Mar College history professors.

A congratulatory note has been received from another contributor and editor, Dr. William M. Hager, formerly of the Del Mar faculty and now of San Clemente, Calif.

Others who had a role in

production of the book are Dr. Maurine McElroy and Dr. Edith Parker, both formerly of Del Mar and now living in Austin, Mrs. Jerry Howden, and Harry Adams. Dr. Floy Wise of the University of Corpus Christi was president when the historical society was organized and the book was discussed at the first meeting in December, 1952.

Wise was a teacher of Dr. Richard Marcum, present society president, who was a UCC student at the time. Marcum is responsible for the index and for the section on UCC.

The chapter on "Agriculture, the Second Economy," was left virtually as the late Grady Stiles wrote it. Stiles was farm editor of the Callertimes.

The late Sister Mary Xavier Holworthy of Incarnate Word Academy, when she was president in 1958, assigned chapters as a second attempt was made to get the book out.

Contributors at that time included charter members Dan Kilgore and Mrs. Howell Ward, Dr. Carl Helmecke of the Del Mar history staff, Dr. James Howard of the Del Mar English department, W.N. Bate, Mrs. McElroy and Dr. Parker, Mrs. Gilbert Vettors, Miss Marie Blucher and others.

The final version was begun in 1969 and completed in 1970, immediately following Hurricane Celia. Added to the writing committee -- headed by Mrs. Ward -- were Dr. Eugenia Briscoe, Roger Butler, Robert D. Bluntzer, Sr., Robert Kraakevik, who was vice president, and Miss Margaret Ramage, who was president from 1969 to 72.

ISSUES TO GET FRANK
DISCUSSION

This week I am beginning a series of face-to-face debates with Republican Senator William Brock of Tennessee in cities throughout the country.

The purpose -- to promote by our confrontation a frank discussion among the American people of those issues that should provide the battle lines for the 1974 elections.

I am not a bitterly partisan man, but as Chairman of the Democratic Senatorial Campaign Committee, I do believe the Democratic Party works in the best interests of the people. As Chairman of the Republican Senate campaign Committee, I'm sure Senator Brock feels just as strongly about his political party.

We are both aware that while we cannot escape the impact of Watergate on this country, there are many other crucial issues that have been too long ignored, too long left by the wayside to fester and grow worse.

You, as Texans, know these issues well. You know of inflation and the damage spiraling prices and interest rates have done to your lives. You know of the conflicts in domestic priorities. You have seen our cities grapple with congestion and lack of housing even as the smaller towns and rural areas try to cope with the problems caused when skilled workers leave for the cities. You, as Texans, know these problems, for you share their effects daily with your fellow Americans.

HONEST DISAGREEMENT
GOOD

So Senator Brock and I will debate these issues. We will, I promise you, lock horns in many different cities on many different issues. And it will be the type of honest debate--of open disagreement--almost lost in the months of Watergate, when a political opponent was too often seen as an enemy and a differing opinion as disloyalty.

It is, of course, clear that no one man can hope to speak for the whole of his party. Senator Brock admits there are certain areas where he personally deviates from other members of the Republican Party. He even differs, he says, with some views of President Gerald Ford.

There are also great differences of opinion within the Democratic Party because of the wide diversity in the backgrounds and beliefs of those it attracts. I find myself quite often in disagreement with members of my own party on specific issues.

Still, there are certain broad policies that are identifiably Democratic or Republican. There are certain basic fundamentals which make our parties different in more than just the labels.

FOCUS ON BROAD
PARTY POLICIES

Economic policy is a case in point. The Republican philosophy says that the best way to fight inflation is to pursue a tight monetary policy--driving interest rates up, slowing consumption and, in theory, bringing prices down. But during the past months we have all painfully seen that this approach is not working. Do we, then, continue to pursue this policy or should we explore alternatives before it is too late? It is a ripe issue for debate.

Another debate will center on America's position in the world. What should our role be in relation to Russia and China, our traditional allies, and the emerging, underdeveloped nations with all their wealth of resources. In another debate, we will rein in closer to home and discuss priorities in the domestic arena. What are the major problems on the homefront and how do we solve them?

Then there will be the many issues, big and small, that have concerned us these past and trying months. How can government be more responsive? How can the confidence of a badly disillusioned people be restored? What of Watergate? How can the book be closed on this, once and for all?

The debates will each be an hour long. Tapes will be available for commercial or educational radio, and transcripts for newspapers. All

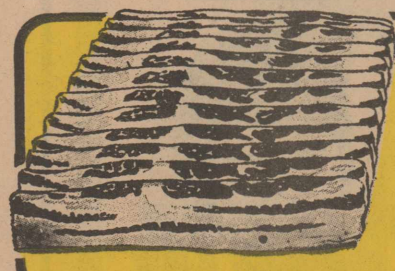

In 1948, Harry Truman said: "It is not the hand that signs the laws that holds the destiny of America. It is the hand," he said, "that casts the ballot."

And, that hand is ours.

Smoke Gets in Your Blood

Smoke gets in your eyes, and your blood, too. A 30-month study of 29,000 blood donors showed that smokers have excess amounts of carbon monoxide in their blood. The researchers from the Medical College of Wisconsin questioned the practice of transfusing blood from smoking donors to some patients.

Tobacco smoking was the single most important factor leading to increased carbon monoxide levels. Other factors were car exhaust, occupation and geographical residence. The study found that carbon monoxide levels correlated directly with the number of cigarettes an individual smoked. A pack-a-day smoker had carbon monoxide levels two to three times higher than did non-smokers.

Unlike oxygen which is breathed in and out again in minutes, carbon monoxide—in the form of carboxyhemoglobin—stays in the blood for hours. Other studies show there are increases in carbon monoxide levels in the blood of nonsmokers who are in the same room with smokers.

With these raised levels of carbon monoxide in their blood, experimental subjects have shown impaired performance on psychomotor tests. These levels of carbon monoxide in the blood create stress for patients who already suffer from heart and lung diseases.

Another study in St. Louis concluded that if smoking were banned in that city it would lower carbon monoxide levels more than would the adoption of a stringent car exhaust control, specifically the installation of catalytic converters.

Americans light up more than 500 billion cigarettes every year. Half the carbon monoxide from this combustion goes directly into the smokers' lungs and bloodstream. The rest goes into the air we all breathe.

COLLEGE STATION—More "veal, baby beef and heavy calf" is being offered in the markets because of the high cost of animal feed—and this trend is likely to continue, Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt reported this week.

In addition, most meat prices are trending upwards, according to the consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A & M University System.

"Chuck roasts are frequently featured at thrifty prices, and it's a good time to buy extra roasts for the freezer," she added.

Pork prices are seasonally high, Mrs. Clyatt noted.

"Pork values, generally, are found on hams, picnics, Boston butt roasts, shoulder steaks and liver."

The specialist cited vegetables as other economical "buys" of the week.

Most economical are squash, cabbage, carrots, dry yellow onions and cooking greens. "Potato prices are down with good selections from the new crop."

"Fruits in good supply include prunes, seedless grapes, nectarines, plums, cantaloupes and watermelons."

CONSUMER WATCH-WORDS: These are okra days. In choosing okra, pick pods that snap easily or puncture on slight pressure. Store okra in the refrigerator, but don't plan on keeping it more than a week.

Texas Organized Crime Prevention Council

EDITOR'S NOTE: In this eighth story on organized crime, Tim James claims that our home-grown hoods may be getting special tutoring from out-of-state syndicate kingpins. James, agent in charge of the Organized Crime Division of the Attorney General's Office, was inter-

viewed with other state law enforcement officials and representatives from the ten Texas Organized Crime Task Forces for the 12-story public education program developed by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

AUSTIN—"If the citizen on the street could look at the day-to-day activities of organized crime in Texas as we look at it, he would go inside and pray," says Tim James, agent in charge of the Organized Crime Division of the Attorney General's office.

"If every person in Texas could sit where I sit, where Colonel Wilson E. Speir (DPS) sits, where Governor Dolph Briscoe sits, and where Attorney General John Hill sits, he or she would make a lifetime career of trying to

eradicate this particular type of cancer," James declared.

"To think that people walking down the street don't realize what's going on in Texas and don't have any idea of what's needed to combat organized crime in terms of legislation, in terms of manpower is frightening."

While most organized crime in Texas is home-grown and home-controlled, James is convinced that is not always the case.

"Mafia with a big M is hard to finger. It's difficult to document and prove such an association."

"They don't carry cards that say, 'I am Mafia.' Yet the late Joe Civello of Dallas just happened to attend the Appalachia Conference some years ago."

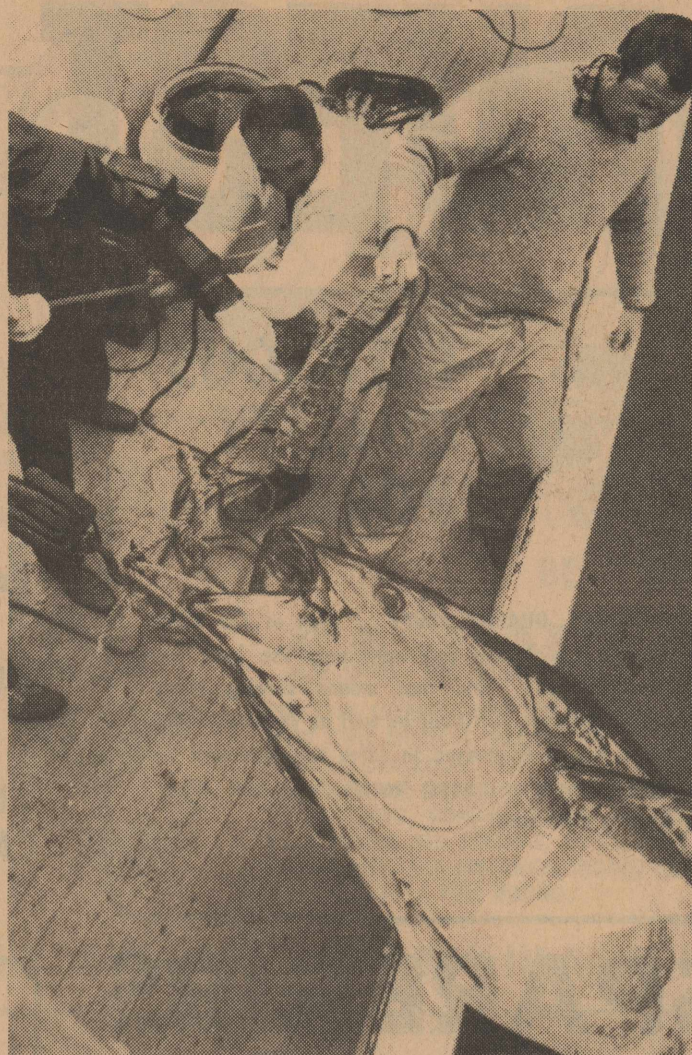
"It is my opinion that a syndicate-related operative is the kingpin behind a lot of questionable activities currently flourishing in Texas. Illegal gambling, narcotics, racketeering and prostitution have got 'mob' written all over them."

James did not identify his "kingpin" by name; however, a notorious Mafia leader does make infrequent business trips to Texas.

Last fall, Dallas police uncovered an organized crime operation dealing in stolen international, interstate and intrastate shipment of goods. They suspect the group's leaders had an indirect link with the mob operator.

James feels one of the syndicate's biggest bankrolls these days comes from narcotics and "San Antonio and Houston are the two principal narcotics problem areas in Texas," he said. "There are millions and millions of dollars being made in narcotics in Houston and San Antonio, and the big boys are there. Freddie Carrasco, a home-grown 'boss,' wasn't in San Antonio for his health; he was there for his pocketbook."

In November, 1973, the Bexar County Grand Jury uncovered evidence that or-

ganized crime is financing not only narcotics in Texas but pornography as well.

The Grand Jury report said, in part:

"...approximately 90 percent of the pornography in the United States appears to be controlled by three groups all operating with the blessing and cooperation of the national crime syndicate."

The proceedings produced testimony that "one of these groups operates two of the three adult bookstores in San Antonio and the majority of all the adult bookstores in Texas."

James feels this court-documented evidence strengthens his opinion that the syndicate is a loose but highly loyal confederation with many layers of responsibility and power.

"There is no identifying tattoo or card carrying status," he said. "You have to make those assumptions by surveillance, by intelligence, by knowing what type of activities these people are involved in."

"Organized crime bosses are very professional, very skilled and they're not getting out front on their deals in Texas. They're going to sit back and

let the money come in to them."

"If you believe organized crime is not operating in Texas, then you shouldn't be able to place a bet. If you can call a bookie and make a large bet on a major sporting proposition, then you have 'syndicate' because bookmaking is one of their major activities. Where the line comes from, where the layoff is, it's a mob-controlled activity."

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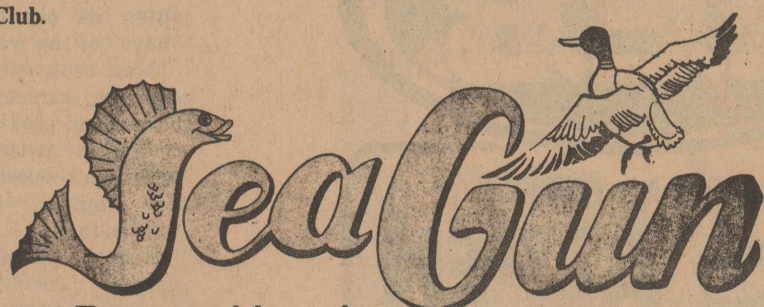
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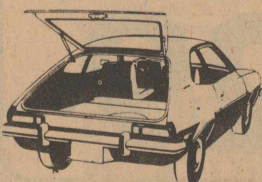
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
