Slow Rain Covers A Large Area, First Rain In Months

A slow falling soaking rain began falling in the Loraine area early Thursday morning and continued throughout the day and into Friday. Every drop of the moisture went into the thirsty ground with a very minimum runoff.

The moisture was heavier in some places than others but a wide section of Texas received some rainfall, the first good rain since early in December. Here in town the volunteer weather observer measured .90 inch in his gauge. Other gauges throughout the area measured from that amount up to 1.30 inches. In the West part of the county Westbrook caught a round 2 inches and Colorado City 1.50 inches.

The moisture will benefit small grain and pasture land as well as to provide moisture for bedding land that has not been bedded.

Cancer Fund Drive Starts Next Monday

Workers for the annual Cancer Fund Drive will begin canvassing the town and community next Monday, April 15, according to Mrs. Alfred Hackfeld, chairman. Mrs. Bob Looney is co-chairman of the Loraine Drive.

Funds needed at the annual drive is divided into six different phases of work in stamping out cancer. 33 cents of the dollar goes for cancer research other parts of the dollar goes for professional education and services, for public education, for service to patients and a small percent is used in the development of the program and for the campaign material etc.

Many cancers can be cured if detected in the early stages. Research has proved that most lung cancers are caused by cigarette smoking, and some skin cancers by frequent overexposure to direct sunlight. These can be prevented by avoiding their causes.

Cancer strikes at any age. It affects children as well as adults. About 46 million Americans now living will eventually have cancer; one-in-four persons, according to present rates.

In 1962 about 275,000 Americans died of cancer. There has been a steady rise in the national cancer death rate.

Treatment in the early stages of cancer is the best and surest way of curing the disease.

ASSISTING IN H-BOMB RESEARCH PROGRAM

Two University of Texas faculty members are assisting in research to channel the H-Bomb's power toward peaceful purposes, under the fellowships from the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation.

One of the two is Dr. William C. Dueterhoeft, Jr., electrical engineering professor. The other is Dr. Eugene V. Ivash, associate professor of physics. They were awarded the first research fellowships under a visiting professor program at General Dynamics' General Atomic Laboratories in San Diego, California.

Dr. and Mrs. Dueterhoeft and their little daughter visited his mother and brother and family, Mrs. Bessie Mahoney and the George Mahoneys as they were en route to California where they will be until September.

Dr. Dueterhoeft taught at the University from 1946-49, and received a doctorate from the California Institute of Technology and returned to the University in 1954. He has been a summer research scientist at Oak Ridge National Laboratory, Tenn.

These two professors are participating in the world's first and largest privately-financed program of controlled fusion research, conducted jointly by General Dynamics and the foundation.
