Permissive Rights Texarkana Lake Granted Fish Com.

Austin.—Permissive rights to 79,400 acres of land surrounding Lake Texarkana, on the Sulphur river, have finally been acquired by the Game and Fish Commission from the Federal Government, it has been announced by the Director of Wildlife Restoration.

Under the license agreement signed on behalf of the Game Commission by H. D. Dodgen, Executive Secretary, and Edward A. Bacon, Deputy Assistant Secretary of the Army, the Commission now can begin a program of wildlife management on the area.

This may include the construction of fences, buildings and signs; the planting of shrubs, plants and grasses. It is thought parts of the licensed area have definite opportunities for upland game and waterfowl management.

The license is for 10 years, but may be revoked by the Secretary of the Army at any time. According to the Director the state will undertake a program to improve habitat around the lake.

Arkansas already has begun a waterfowl program on approximately 9,000 acres of land down the Sulphur River from Lake Texarkana.

Local capital is building Kickapoo Lodge on Highway No. 8, four miles south of Vaughn. The city of Texarkana also has acquired some acreage at the lake and plans recreational facilities.

Red River-Titus Accident Report

Captain Glen Warner, commanding officer, Texas Highway Patrol, Tyler, released the rural traffic accident summary for Red River County for the month of December.

The Highway Patrol investigated a total of five accidents with the following breakdown: 1 property damage, 3 personal injury and one fatal accident. These accidents caused a total property damage of \$2,520.00 with four persons injured and one killed.

In Titus County there were five accidents, four property damage, one personal injury and no fatal accidents. These accidents caused a total property damage of \$2,055.00 with one person injured.

Cold Waves Bring Big Rain Here

An electrical storm and a hard rain, which measured 1.34 inches at Deport, preceded a cold wave to this section late Tuesday evening. This brought the amount of rainfall at Deport to 2.67 inches this year.

According to A. C. Nixon, Deport Government rain gauge, .05 fell Saturday followed by a slow steady downpour Sunday and Sunday night amounting to 1.28 inches.

The two cold blasts out of the north and west, sent the mercury to the mid-30's by Wednesday morning.

The ground was so full of moisture that Sunday's rain put Sulphur out of banks with all three sloughs on either side flowing. There is a big log jam at the railroad bridge over the river on Highway 271 and White Oak was bank full Tuesday.

Two-Year-Old Is Burned Fatally

A 2-year-old boy, Roger Musick, was burned fatally when a can of kerosene exploded Thursday at his home in the Viewpoint community, 10 miles south of Paris.

The child's mother, Mrs. Curtis Musick, was burned seriously and is in a Paris hospital. Three other Musick children escaped with only singed hair in the resulting fire, which damaged the Musick home.

Hunting Season Is About Over

Hunting season came to a close in this area on Thursday, Jan. 16 when the quail season closed.

Due to much rainfall and better cover, quail hunting was better in this area than it has been for a number of years.

Trappers may continue to take coon, possum and skunk.

Two Deport Stores Burglarized Late Tuesday Night

Two Deport businesses, City Drug Store and R. E. Nobles grocery, were entered Tuesday night. Entrance was gained by cutting rear window screens, and breaking window glasses.

Two Dallas youths, formerly of Bogata, were taken into custody by Paris police shortly after the break-in, and on investigation most of the stolen merchandise was recovered. It was reported the pair, enroute to Dallas, had stopped at a Paris cafe, and officers became suspicious of the two and on investigation found the loot in the car.

Reported taken from the City Drug was approximately \$300 worth of merchandise, including watches, electric razors, electric clocks, costume jewelry, cigarette lighters, part of a coin collection of D. E. Glover, and cameras.

Nobles reported approximately \$12 to \$15 in change and a few cigarettes and cigars taken from his store.

Officers notified C. B. Glover about 3 o'clock Wednesday morning that the building had been entered, of the two taken into custody, and recovery of the loot. Nobles discovered his building had been entered upon opening early Wednesday morning.

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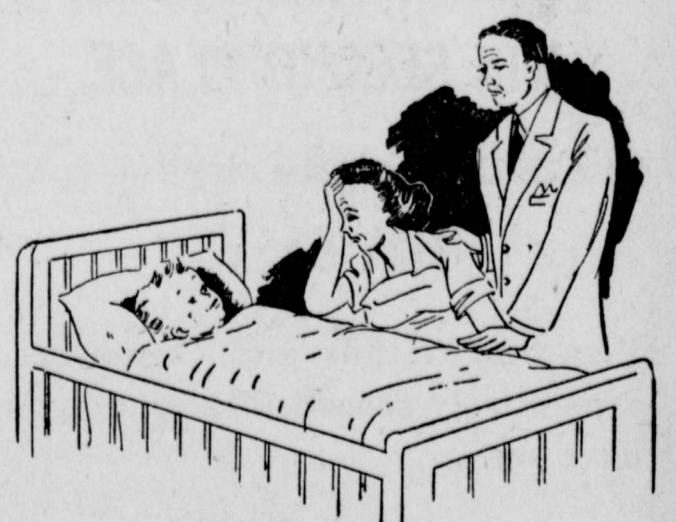

Vote American

A few weeks ago, following a big publicity build-up, which should never have been permitted, this country failed to launch an earth satellite. Some Americans were stunned for a short time. Others kept a proper perspective. Among them was Vice-President Richard Nixon, who issued the most sensible statement on the subject we have read. It will be put down in history as a classic. He said:

"Sure we failed. We have before and we will again. But we need to keep our sense of proportion. We haven't overnight lost our scientific knowhow, our ability to get things done... Let's get away from our weeping walls and act like Americans. We've got work to do. Let's get on with it like Americans."

To get on with it like Americans is going to require some sacrifice upon the part of the individual, business, labor and industry. Russia has shown us some of the results of her harsh materialistic system for the past eleven years, while we have grown soft from socialistic government hand outs that kept a lot of politicians in office, and they continued to tax our people as if we were at war.

President Eisenhower has submitted a 74 billion dollar budget to congress—a record peace time budget. We are for whatever amount of money is necessary to build military strength sufficient to keep Russia from starting a war, but congress positively must cut out the unnecessary appropriations.

The people are not now going to be stampeded into swallowing a lot of socialistic legislation that will cost a lot of money and bankrupt this nation. Russia could whip us by doing just that—without dropping one bomb—in fact they brag that they will do just that.

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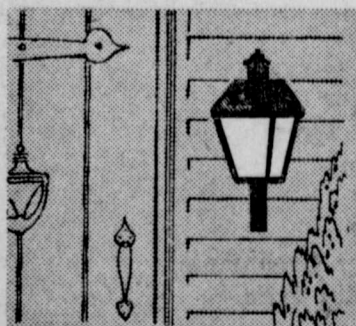

ALCORN WANTS URGENCY FOR SCIENCE, BUT NOT FARM WORK

Editor's note: Achin Alcorn, philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sulphur, has found out about Congress being back in session, his letter this week indicates.

Dear Editor: Now that Congress is back in session, news has been picking up, and one of the things that has interested me is the fact that for the first time in years everybody seems sort of glad that Congress has re-assembled. Up to now, when Congress met, it was sort of like a visit from your in-laws, most people stroked their chins and took a thoughtful, concerned look, wondering what it was going to cost. But with the scientific situation what it is with the Russians pushing ahead, most people are delighted to see Congress in session and are hoping they'll get our defenses in shape.

However, there is one aspect that has me worried. According to an article I read in a newspaper last night, Congress has been declaring that what the trouble with Washington is, it has no "sense of urgency." We've got to have a "sense of urgency" about these guided missiles and man-made moons if we're going to realize our danger and catch up.

What this country needs is a sense of urgency, all right, but it ought to be concentrated on the military and scientific fields, as it's impractical out here on this farm, which is the most un-urgent spot on earth, and likely will stay that way.

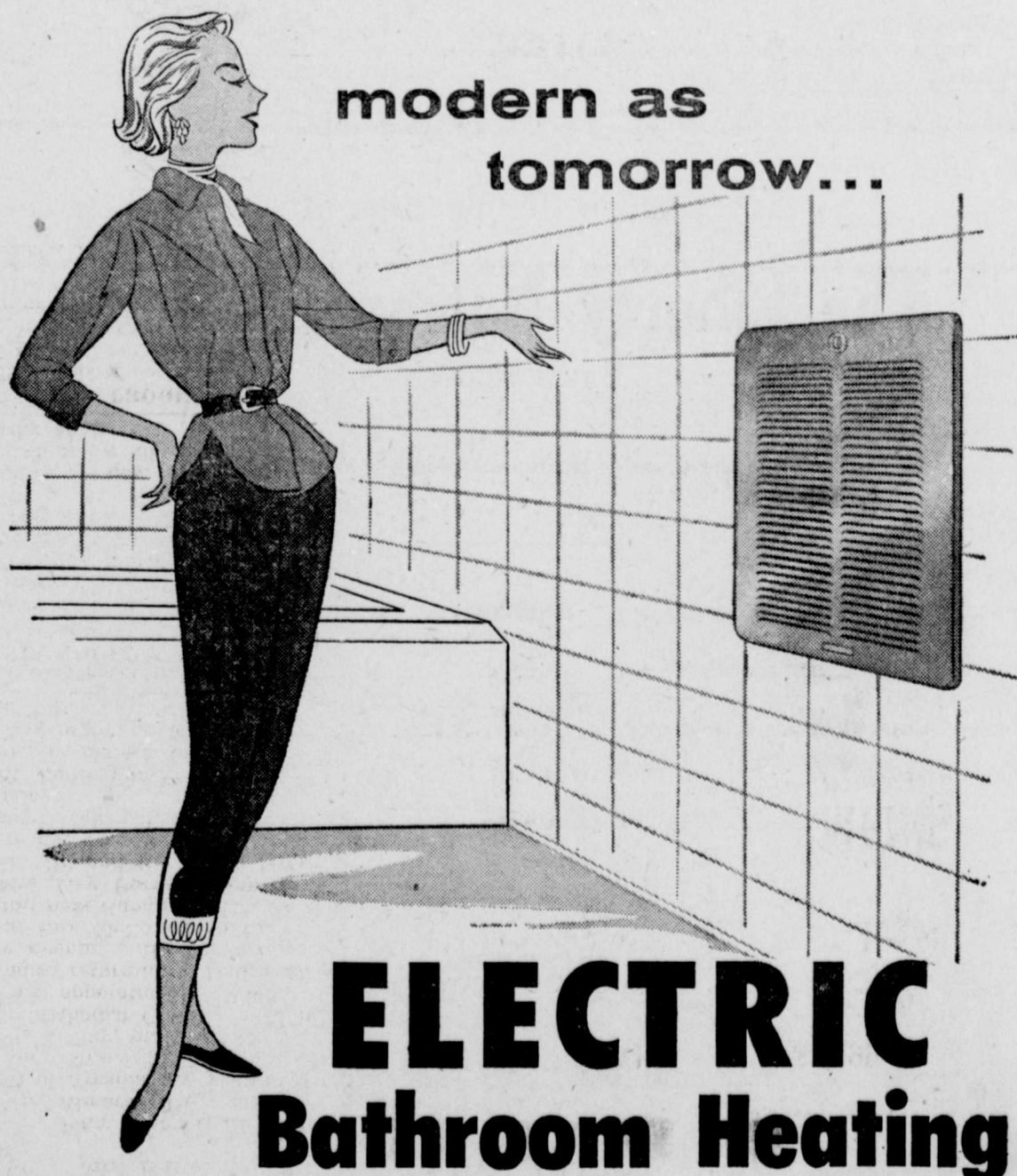
