OLDEST C-CITIAN, 103

Sallie Haltom Rites Saturday

Colorado City's oldest citizen, Miss Sarah Z. Haltom, died in Root Valley Fair Lodge Friday morning after a long illness.

Known to all Colorado City by her familiar title "Aunt Sallie," Miss Haltom was 103 years, one month and 11 days old when she slipped into a coma and died.

Until two weeks ago she had shared the home of her niece, Mrs. Sims Palmer, and Mr. Palmer, 741 Vine St. She came to Colorado City to live in the Palmer home 22 years ago. Until her recent enfeebled condition she was a lively addition to the town.

Hers was the absentee ballot cast in the 1964 Presidential election. She was a member of the Methodist Church and attended First Methodist Church as long as she was able to go. She was an honorary member of the Colorado City Garden Club.

"Aunt Sallie" took pride in her one-hundred-plus birthday. She took special delight in winning the trophy prize as oldest citizen attending the Mitchell County Old-Timer Reunion for several years.

Born in a little cabin in Tarrant County, Dec. 31, 1861, "Aunt Sallie" liked to remember when the city of Ft.

Worth was a small settlement of two stores. When she was a little girl, supplies for Ft. Worth were transported by ox-drawn wagons from Houston.

"Aunt Sallie's" rich store of memories included the War between the States when she was a child, the Reconstruction period, the coming of the railroads to Texas.

Advised by a doctor that she had a "weak heart" when she was a young girl, one of "Aunt Sallie's" favorite satisfactions was counting her birthdays. As a young woman she owned a dress shop in Oklahoma, was postmistress at Floella, Texas, and was a school teacher in Central Texas.

Funeral service for "Aunt Sallie" was conducted in Kiker Chapel at 10 o'clock Saturday morning with Rev. Darris Egger, pastor of First Methodist Church, officiating. Burial was in Falfurrias cemetery under direction of Kiker & Son Funeral Home.

Survivors are three nephews: Ben Elliot, 1135 Hickory St. and Guy Elliot, 729 East 7th St., both of Colorado City; George Elliott of Anson; two nieces, Mrs. Palmer of Colorado City and Mrs. T. E. Robins of Knox City.

Barbie Wings To Hospital To See University Doctors

Baby Leaving On Wednesday

Barbie Vardy is, in that special language used for babies, "Going Bye-Bye" Wednesday! Barbie and her mother Barbara (Mrs. Bobby Vardy) are going to Minneapolis, Minnesota. Barbie will enter the teaching hospital of University of Minnesota Wednesday, Feb. 17, for examination, tests, observation, treatment and possible transplant surgery.

Letter from the surgeon, Dr. Karel Absolon, came Thursday. The anxiously expected letter advanced Barbie's admission date to Feb. 17 instead of March 1, her original admission date.

Wednesday at 6:30 a. m. Mrs. Vardy and the baby Barbie will pick up their reservations on a Trans Texas plane for Dallas. Chamber of Commerce here arranged for flight reservations.

Money for the flight and for temporary expenses for the mother was given in a \$250 check from the March of Dimes in Mitchell County, headed by Bill Erwin this year. Mother and baby leave Abilene at 7 a. m.

Barbie and her mother will land at Love Field, Dallas, at 7:35 a. m. They leave Dallas at 9:45 a. m. aboard a Braniff headed for Minneapolis. At 1:50 Wednesday afternoon Mrs. Vardy and her seriously sick baby Barbie will arrive in Minneapolis.

So begins the second chapter of Barbie Vardy's little story.

At noon, closing time for City National Bank Saturday, a total of \$2,667.30 on deposit in the Barbie Vardy Fund was reported by George Womack.

Womack, vice president of the bank, is in charge of the fund for Barbie in Colorado City. (The total does not include the March of Dimes check.)

Senior Class of Colorado High School deposited a check for \$100 for Barbie Thursday. That brings contributions for Barbie from the high school student body to the \$247 figure.

Good Fellow Class of First Baptist Church gave a check for \$10. Martha Class of First Baptist a contribution of \$21.51. Truck Town has brought in between \$3 and \$5 each day from the jar placed by employees in that cafe where Barbara Vardy worked recently.

Mu Phi Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi expects to add Mayor John Chinn.

Reasons behind the recommendation were as follows:

Courthouse Progresses

Remodeling efforts on the Mitchell County Courthouse are coming steadily along toward completion.

Many courthouse residents are still somewhat displaced and scattered in offices about the city in order to make room for workers and new construction.

Presently workers are engaged in putting up new partitions and various other building and remodeling jobs.

First and second floors will be completely air conditioned and centrally heated. More modern and safer stairways will be installed from first to second to third floors.

At times the noise seems incessant, but most employees agree that the present noise and inconvenience are easier to take with the prospect of having new and modern facilities in the near future.

So for the time being noise and progress go hand in hand in the Mitchell County Courthouse.

PO Interior Gets Paint

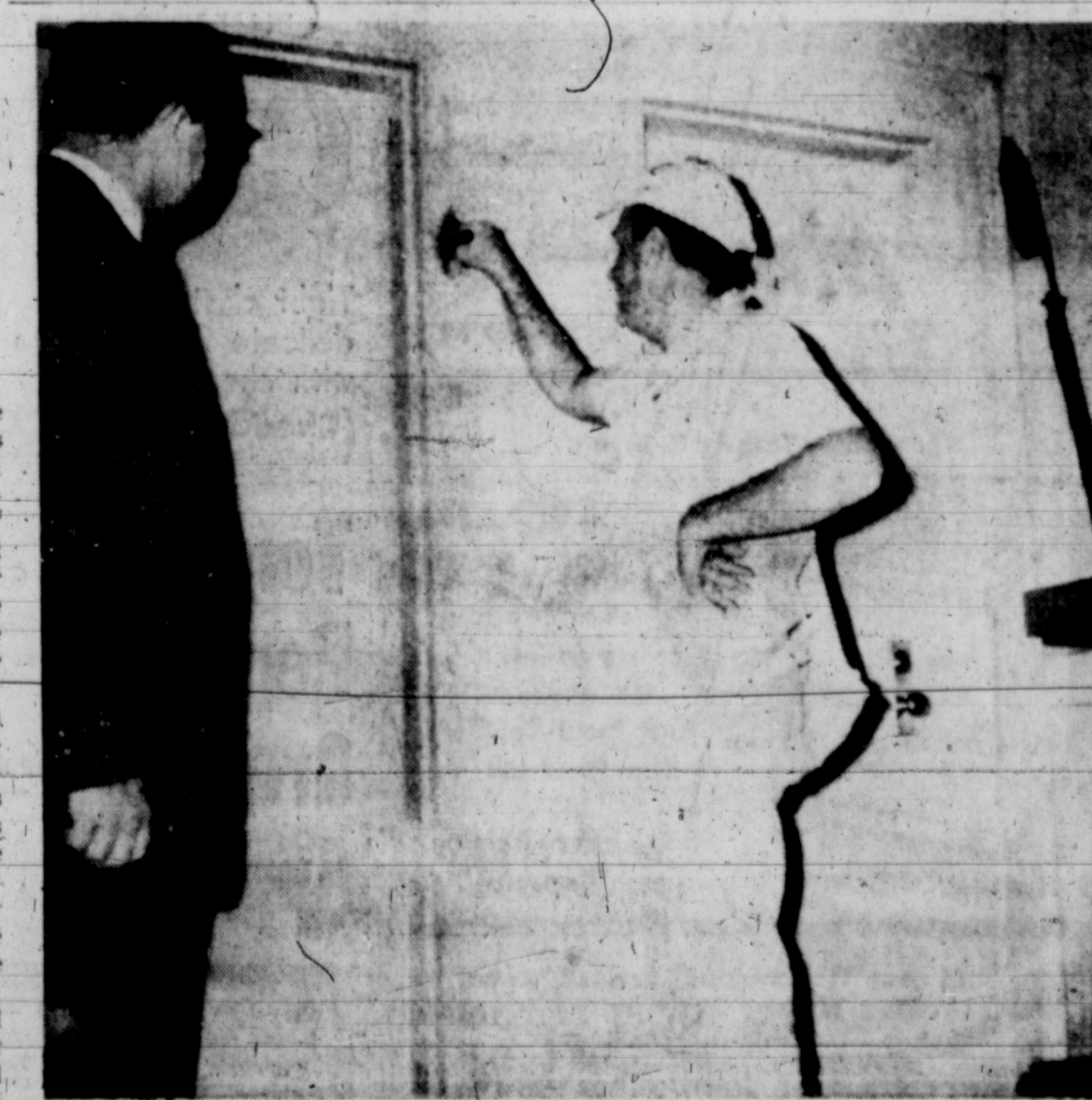
Remodeling work on the Colorado City Post Office is coming along as scheduled according to Postmaster Arlene Morris.

Painters are currently at work on the inside of the building. Plans call for a complete new paint job throughout the inside and outside of the structure.

Work is also progressing on the new air conditioning system being installed by Hardcastle Refrigeration. Skylights have been closed and workers are putting in anchors for the air conditioning ducts. Concrete form on which the air conditioning unit will be mounted is being run on the outside of the building.

In the near future work will begin on an all-new fluorescent lighting system to be installed as part of the remodeling effort.

Howard Hardcastle, project contractor, said the expected completion would be around May 1.

DAILY DIARY of the Barbie Fund could be set to music. It's a symphony... of sympathy... for a little girl baby too sick to live long without heroic measures.

It was Friday, Jan. 24, the first time we met Barbie's mother, Mrs. Bobby J. Vardy, whose first name is Barbara. She sat in the Record office for an interview concerning her baby's birth defect. She is an exceptionally articulate young woman. Her one faint hope was to get Barbie to University of Minnesota Research Hospital, in time.

ONE THING that still echoes in this listener's heart is the sincere way Barbara Vardy said, "And even if they can not save my baby's life, perhaps they can learn something that will help them save some other baby's life... some day."

Another very important thing about Barbara Vardy is the way she insisted that all money in the fund be held in escrow until—and if—she and Barbie could make the trip to Minneapolis.

Barbie and her mother will fly to Minnesota from Abilene Wednesday.

What happens now is in

God's hands. But let us all remember that the fudge, her one little chance, was definitely in human hands. Human hands reaching for a miracle.

SUNDAY, Jan. 24, Barbie's first little story appeared in this paper. That was three weeks ago today. "Of such small things a hope is built," the story read.

Response to the plea for a Barbie Fund began Monday morning, Jan. 25. First report from George Womack of City National Bank gave \$23 as the total.

Because the total needed was so large and the hope in Barbie's case so small even that first \$23 was like a little brand new star shining in the dark.

NOW, on this Valentine Day, Barbie's Fund is headed for the \$4,000 plus mark. Maybe more. It truly is "Heart" Month in C-City.

And that proves something beautiful and grand and magnificent about people. It proves that people, made in the image of God, sometimes carry something of God's compassion in their average hearts.

It was gratifying to find Colorado High and Junior High students coming in with the first large contribution.

All, all of it is wonderful.

Diary of the Barbie Fund—which began as a plaintive lullaby—is now a chorus. A chorus of hundreds of voices wishing Barbie well.

ALL THE WAY from Pennsauken, New Jersey, came a letter signed by Gus A. Harner.

"We do have a few things in common," the letter said in part "one, we both know Dr. Ralph Graham of First Christian Church, and two, we both read the Colorado Record. The third and most important thing is that we are both very interested in Barbie Vardy."

Jaycees in Pennsauken, N. J.

have "voted" unanimously to initiate and support a drive to raise enough money for Barbie's operation," the letter goes on to say.

"I make no promises except that we will try our best and then some. Please send some pictures of Barbie for news releases. Thank you and God bless all our efforts."
