MEETING ON COTTON BOLL WORM PLANNED

Missouri Threatens To Withdraw Embargo Due To Fresh Outbreak of the Pink Boll Worm.

NEW YORK, Feb. 6.—Cotton prices advanced approximately \$2 a bale in the New York Exchange here today, reports from West Texas indicating that the drouth there was unbroken and easy-Liverpool cables being contributing factors to a wave of selling which sent the market to a high of 17.57 for May contracts after several weeks which had shown a steady decline in the price.

SENATE ACTS TO HALT "PROPAGANDA"

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—The Mayfield bill prohibiting the department of agriculture from publishing "predictions with respect to cotton prices" passed the senate today without a recorded vote.

It is an outgrowth of the recent controversy over departmental cotton price forecasts and its application to Senator Robinson, Arkansas, the democratic leader, said that while he doubted that it could be enforced the purpose of its enactment was a proper one.

French Aviators Arrive In Alabama

Costes and LeBrix Make Second Jump In United States; President Will Receive Aviators.

(By Associated Press) MONTGOMERY, Ala., Feb. 6.—Dieudonne Costes and Joseph LeBrix, good will ambassadors of France, landed at Maxwell field, the government airport here, at 4:20 o'clock this afternoon, completing the approximately 200 mile flight from New Orleans in two hours and 45 minutes.

Near the same spot where their fellow countrymen, LaFayette, received the salute of Alabama more than 100 years ago, Costes and LeBrix were given an ovation in the one-time cradle of the confederacy.

The fliers were met at Maxwell field as they landed by the staff of Governor Rife Graves, Mayor William A. Gunter and Major Walter R. Weaver, commandant of Maxwell field. BARCELONA, Spain, Feb. 6.—Work was resumed today at all factories, shops and docks in the Port of Barcelona and throughout the province, where a general strike had been called against the newly imposed income tax.

BLAZING GAS WELL FINALLY PUT OUT

CORPUS CHRISTI, Feb. 6.—Rachal No. 2 blazng gas well was extinguished Monday afternoon after an 18-day battle through the use of 10,000 barrels of water, steam from six boilers, and five nitroglycerin blasts. Tex Thornton of Ansonia, who has been here for more than two weeks fighting the blaze, had expressed little hope of saving the well.

Four of the shots of nitro were of 50 quarts each and the fifth of 80 quarts. The water was supplied from a reservoir constructed near the well for the purpose.

The well is owned by the Sackett company. It blew out January 15 while making 40,000 cubic feet a day. It was ignited by a stone striking against broken casing on January 15.

Fiery Cross Warns Negro Not to Wed Connecticut Girl

Has License To Marry Girl Claiming Ancestors were On Mayflower; Daughter Of Union General.

(By Associated Press) ROCKVILLE, Conn., Feb. 6.—A flaming cross burned on Pillsbury Hill here tonight as Clarence Kellen, negro, was warned first by mail and then by telephone not to marry Beatrice Fuller, 19, Miss Fuller claims to be a direct descendant of a Northern general and says her father's ancestors came to America on the Mayflower.

ROCKVILLE, Conn., Feb. 6.—A marriage license was granted today to Beatrice Fuller, 19, descendant of a union general, claiming paternal ancestors on the Mayflower, and Clarence Kellen, a mulatto, after the five-day notice required by law had expired.

The couple have announced that they plan to be married tomorrow, but have not made known who will officiate.

Miss Fuller's mother, who signed the license, said she did not wholly approve the union but she had consented because she thought it was for the best interests of the couple.

Kellen, whose mother was a Caucasian, served in the United States navy.

Hickman's Own Words Return In Boomerang Form

Alienists Introduce Boy's Statements Showing That He Knew Difference Between Right and Wrong.

ARGUE OVER SKIN WRITING THEORY

Four Alienists of State Testify Concerning The Mental Condition Of Accused Youth.

(By The Associated Press) HALL OF JUSTICE, LOS ANGELES, Feb. 6.—William Edward Hickman's own purported words that he knew before he took Marian Parker from school and killed her that kidnapping and murder were crimes punishable by life imprisonment and death, came back to weigh against him at his sanity trial here today.

They were carried into the court record by Dr. Frank Mikels of Hollywood, an alienist called by the state in its effort to prove that the apparently unworried youth in the prisoner's dock was sane at the time of the crime and consign him to death for its commission.

Not only did he admit knowledge of the consequences of the crimes he was committing, the witness declared, but added this significant remark:

"Don't Fear Punishment"

"I don't fear punishment, but I'd rather not be hung."

All told, the prosecution sent four alienists to the witness box to tell of the actions and reactions of the accused youth, whose mentality was the subject of attack throughout last week by defending lawyers and another group of medical men.

Leaving behind a pitiful note of explanation in which was written "fine" to a life of disappointment, Tom Dowd, 76, died at a local sanitarium here Sunday afternoon as the result of self-administered carbolic acid.

Dowd was found in a dying condition near the Santa Fe tracks northwest of the city light plant Sunday afternoon by a group of small boys; and was immediately rushed to a hospital, where he died a few minutes later.

Blockade Placed By Federals For Mexican States

Begin Concerted Drive On Brigands by Dropping Bombs Over Centers of Rebel Activity.

INTEND TO CURB BANDITS FINALLY

Has Been Scene of Activities On Part of Mexican Troops for Months; Hotbed of Revolt.

(By The Associated Press) MEXICO CITY, Feb. 6.—Federal troops have established a theoretical blockade around the states of Jalisco, Michoacan, Aguascalientes and Colima and have begun aerial bombing of rebel bands in concert with attacks by infantry, cavalry and artillery.

Federal troops are watching every road, trail, highway, and railroad entering these four western Mexican states. They examine every traveler with a view to preventing the entrance of men and materials for rebels.

Two "Douglas" airplanes bought in the United States by the Mexican government and recently delivered, are being used to locate and bomb rebel strongholds in the mountains of this sparsely inhabited region.

For years past in some sections of these states anti-government bands of varying sizes, sometimes called rebels, sometimes called bandits, have been in the field, living by looting towns, villages, and ranches, and robbing railroad trains. They hide themselves in the wild mountain regions where pursuit is most difficult and in some places impossible.

Federal are almost always fighting or pursuing these bands, but the present campaign is upon a more ambitious scale than usual. The federal task is not to locate and engage an organized enemy but to rout out of the many different mountain hiding places numerous guerrilla bands.

It is hoped that the blockade will prevent new men and supplies from reaching them, and by increased garrisons in towns and villages to prevent them from looting. It is expected to starve them out of the mountains eventually and force them into an open fight, meanwhile harassing them with bombs thrown from airplanes whenever they can be located.

Three Banks In Florida Closed

"Run" Made On Third Subsidies When Funds Received From Federal Reserve; Is "Temporary"

MIAMI, Fla., Feb. 6.—Anonymous letters predicting the failure of one bank caused that institution to suspend business here today, resulted indirectly in the temporary closing of two others, and brought about a run on a fourth which called for \$7,000,000 from the Federal Reserve branch bank in Jacksonville to bolster its cash reserves.

The run, determined but orderly started at noon on the First National Bank following announcement that Ernest Amos, state comptroller, had taken charge of the affairs of the Southern Bank and Trust company and ordered the Citizens Bank and the Bank of Allapattah temporarily closed.

Explaining he had taken control at the Southern Bank and Trust company, at the instance of its officials because of withdrawals caused by the circulation of the anonymous letters, Amos said he ordered the other two banks closed through fear they might not be able to weather possible runs. He made a plea for "a cool and collected public."

State Police May Be Both Officers, Relief Force

COLUMBUS, O., Feb. 6.—(AP)—Threatened disorder in the Belmont county mine district may cause Ohio's National guard in the dual role of policemen and relief workers.

For two weeks the guard has been ministering to the destitute children of Southerners and Eastern Ohio, distributing food and clothing to the needy, but today alleged communistic activities in the area, near St. Clairsville, brought the possibility of a movement of troops into the county.

BRECKENRIDGE, Feb. 6.—(AP)—Five hundred men are due to take part in the first of a series of extensive drives by which farmers and ranchmen of Stephens county plan to rid their lands of coyotes.

This initial drive is to take place Tuesday in Precinct 1, originating in the Union Hill community and extending northeastward to cover an area ten miles square and embracing practically the entire precinct.

MASONIC HALL BURNS

Scottish Rite Cathedral At Galveston Ruined

GALVESTON, Feb. 6.—(AP)—While ruins of the Scottish Rite cathedral burned late yesterday with a loss of more than \$300,000, were still smoldering, fire broke out this afternoon in the Masonic temple, home of the Galveston Blue Lodge, and York Rite Masonry, but was promptly extinguished. The fire began in a room on the second floor of the building used for storing brooms and other cleaning equipment and an assortment of odds.

Within a few minutes it was brought under control, damage of the building being negligible.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—(AP)—With George W. Wickham, attorney general in the Taft administration, as its counsel, the senate tomorrow will seek dismissal of the writ of habeas corpus by which Robert W. Stewart, Standard oil magnate, obtained his release Saturday from senate custody on a charge of contempt.

Marshal Asserts Injured Man Was Resisting Arrest

Roy Shirley, 32, Shot In Abdomen and Right Arm by City Marshal Stephens of Lorenzo.

NO STATEMENT IS MADE BY OFFICER

Wounded Man Brought To Local Sanitarium For Treatment; Said to Have Exhibited Pistol.

Roy Shirley, 32, is in the Lubbock sanitarium here in a condition described by physicians as serious but not necessarily critical, as a result of a shooting which took place at Lorenzo last night about 8 o'clock.

Shirley was shot through the abdomen and the right arm by City Marshal Stephens, who said that Shirley was attempting to resist arrest.

The city marshal did not recover the gun which Shirley is said to have had.

According to a statement by T. G. Hendrick, ex-mayor of Lorenzo, Shirley had bought a pistol yesterday and was exhibiting it over the town. "The city marshal heard of it and when he saw Shirley, attempted to arrest him."

Shirley is said to have turned away, and the officer drew his pistol. Then Shirley began running, and the officer fired several times, two of the shots taking effect. One bullet entered "his right side from the back and passed through the body. A .45 calibre pistol was used."

Shirley kept running until he reached his home, and was then brought to Lubbock by his brother, Rex Shirley; his brother-in-law, S.

Radio Board Kept For Another Year

Senate Votes to Retain Commission, Due to End Its Existence On March 15 of This Year.

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—Extension of the life of the radio commission for another year after March 15 was approved today by the Senate as its Interstate Commerce Committee ordered a favorable report on the contested nominations of three members of the commission.

Confirmation of the nominations of O. H. Caldwell, New York; Sam Piskard, Manhattan, Kan., and Harold LaPoint, Salt Lake City, was recommended by the committee, but its report was held up until the Senate amended the radio bill to limit the terms of all commissioners to February 23, 1929.

The bill to extend the commission for another year was sponsored by Senator Watson, republican, Indiana, chairman of the interstate commerce committee. It was amended on motion of Senator Dill, democrat, Washington, to restrict broadcasting licenses to six months.

The deep-set, twinkling eye has as much charm as any other type. And is not an eye with a huge slant, a la Japanese, an attractive thing? Of course too small an eye or too large a one or one that protrudes unduly is not so good. Nothing whatever can be done to alter the original shape of this feature, but in a later article we will consider what cosmetics will do to deepen the shadows and lines around it so as to simulate a change in size and shape.

Adolph Hotelling murdered a little girl under the most fiendish circumstances. He has been sentenced to life imprisonment at hard labor. Ruth Snyder and Henry Judd Gray killed a man rather fiendishly, too. They went to a morgue slab from the electric chair a few days ago. Not much difference in the degree of the crimes, but many people rightly believe that any child murder is always more horrible than any adult murder.

THE RIGHT ADDRESS

Why, then, will the most atrocious murder live in the allotted days while the others died? Just a matter of residence. Mrs. Snyder and Gray were so unlucky as to perform their crime in New York state, a state demanding capital punishment for murderers. Hotelling was lucky enough to live in Michigan, a state which does not demand the criminal's life.

State laws seem a good thing in matters based on state differences, geographical or otherwise. But murder seems about the same thing anywhere and geographical differences hardly temper the crime. Here's one law that I think should be uniform in every state. Either capital punishment for all of us, or capital punishment for none of us.

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Three Changes Made For 1928 Gridiron Rules

Protection For Lateral Pass Is Lifted By Ruling

Return to 1926 Regulation Regarding Lateral Pass And Muffed Punt; Deal Blow to Screen Pass.

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Feb. 6.—Three important changes in the gridiron code for 1928, each designed to correct abuses of confusion growing out of the previous rules rather than to effect a fundamental alteration, were announced today by the National football rules committee, after a secret week-end huddle.

In a nutshell they remove a good share of the protection afforded the lateral or backward pass, do away with the confusing distinction between a muffed or fumbled punt and deal a blow to use of the so-called "screen pass," they provide:

1. That a backward or lateral pass must be tossed at least two yards to be classified as such and that it may be recovered by the defensive side if grounded but not advanced; thus doing away with the protection afforded under the rules that year to hidden ball and other trick passes behind the scrimmage line.

2. That either a muffed or fumble of a punt may be recovered by the kicking side but not advanced beyond the point of recovery.

3. That no player on the side kicking a forward pass and who has crossed the line of scrimmage may interfere with an opponent until the ball has been touched thereby doing away with what the committee believes has been unfair blocking and checking, to screen the pass receiver by players who themselves are not eligible to receive the pass.

1927 Season Best

These were the only changes effected by the rules committee which in its week-end session at the Bayview golf club at Absecon, N. J., rejected such other suggested alterations as return of the goal posts to the actual goal line. The committee went on record as declaring they "had never seen a season of better football" than under the 1927 rules.

Two of the three changes made, those affecting the lateral pass and muffed punt represented a compromise with the opinion of a majority of college football coaches, who at their December meeting went on record as favoring a return to the 1926 code on these points.

Settlement Soon For War Claims

No Objections In Senate Committee To Bill On German and American Claims Due To War.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—Early and favorable action by the senate on the house bill providing for the return of alien property and the settlement of American and German war claims was forecast today by Chairman Smoot of the senate finance committee after that group had ordered the bill favorably reported with only one dissenting vote.

The provisions of the house measure were approved by the committee with minor changes. The compromise agreed to by American and German claimants whereby 80 percent of the alien property would be returned forthwith was adopted by the senate as provided by the house.

The senate committee provided also for making \$40,000,000 immediately available for the payment of any claims of the former ruling family of Germany.

All awards to American claimants by the mixed claims commission on account of death and personal injury and all awards of \$100,000 or less, would be paid in full. Larger awards would receive \$100,000, and with remaining payments prorated until 80 percent of all the awards have been paid.

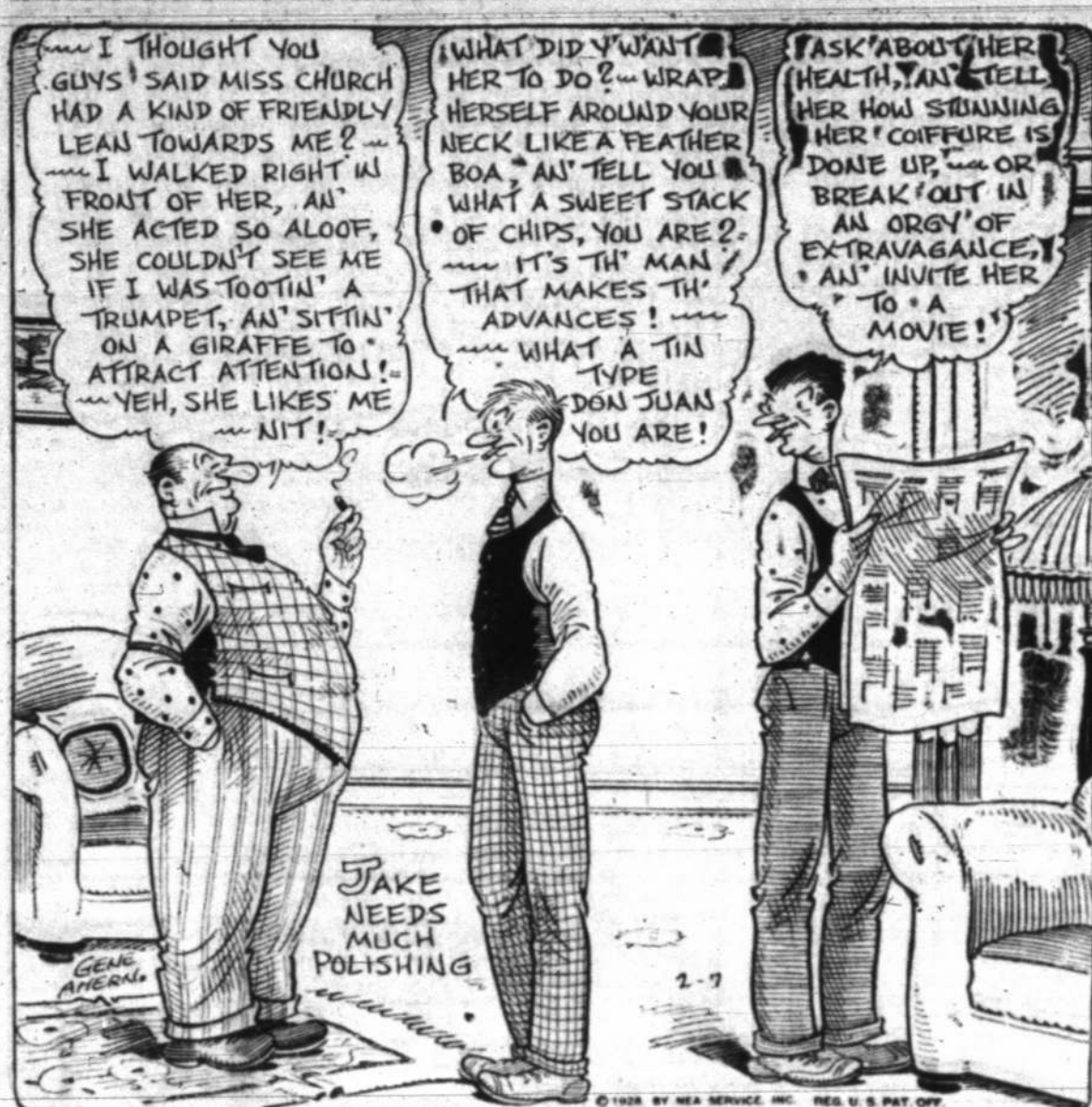

Federal Rule On Busses Opposed

Highway Club Registers a Protest Against Regulation of Motor Vehicles, Common Carriers.

(By Associated Press)
FORT WORTH, Feb. 6.—Declaring federal regulation of motor vehicles operated as common carriers over public highways cannot be adopted or enforced without material injury and damage to the carrier with no corresponding benefit to the public, the highway clubs of Texas today forwarded to Washington exceptions and briefs to the proposed report of Leo J. Flynn, attorney examiner of the interstate commerce commission.

The exceptions and brief will become a part of the report to be submitted when the I. C. C. convenes Wednesday. The highway club excepts to the proposal that the government regulate motor vehicles because such regulations "could not be made applicable generally but that various common carriers would be forced out of business if regulated according to the plans suggested. It is obvious that any such regulation law could only be made applicable to the large and more substantial common carrier organizations, while their smaller competitors and the great mass of contract carriers would be left free to cut rates, run at will and otherwise destroy, by unbridled competition, the substantial organizations which in the last analysis must be depended upon for regulation and adequate service."

What's Doing In West Texas

WELL SHUT IN

ABILENE, Feb. 6.—Due to congestion in pipelines and refineries producers of oil from the Salt basin in Southeastern Howard county where two big wells of the Magnolia Petroleum company and the Owen Sloan Oil company recently were brought in, today shut in all wells.

NO COMPROMISE

SAN ANGELO, Feb. 6.—The Colorado river water controversy failed to advance toward a compromise in San Angelo this week-end between leading figures in a paramount problem which has confronted Texas for the last few months. An explanation of the compromise offered cities along the Colorado

river watershed by the Syndicate Power company was made by Jay Alexander of that organization, who pointed out that the concern had agreed to be satisfied with 580,000 acre feet of water annually instead of the 1,225,000 acre feet first asked.

FILES ANSWER

SAN ANGELO, Feb. 6.—The Reagan county independent school district has filed an answer in federal court here to the suit of the Big Lake Oil company over collection of taxes for the school district and asks for 10 per cent penalty for non-payment and 6 per cent interest on the amount alleged due, until paid.

The school district also denies the Big Lake company's contention that a 15-cent tax rate on the \$100 valuation is invalid and excessive.

TO BUILD GIN

LAMESA, Feb. 6.—Arrangements are being made by the local farm bureau, according to J. M. Peterson,

president, to build at Lamesa an association gin where all the cotton of the Bureau members will be ginned. According to plans, 200 farmers representing 15,000 acres of cotton will gin here. According to M. Mitchell, local manager of the Farm Bureau here, this is 1000 acres more than required for a bureau gin, but he stated that it was believed that 20,000 acres would be ginned.

POSTAL INCOME

BIG SPRING, Feb. 6.—The Merriweather Oil company, Inc., is erecting a steel derrick on the McDowell ranch, 22 miles south of Big Spring. The exact location is on the southwest quarter of section 34, block 34, township 2 south, 750 feet from north line and 750 feet east from west line, also 300 feet northeast of McDowell No. 4, that was drilled in 1922 by the General Oil company.

Contract depth is 3900 feet. Some oil was found in the McDowell No. 4 and geologists are strong in the opinion that it will be found in

paying quantities somewhere in the vicinity of the above location.

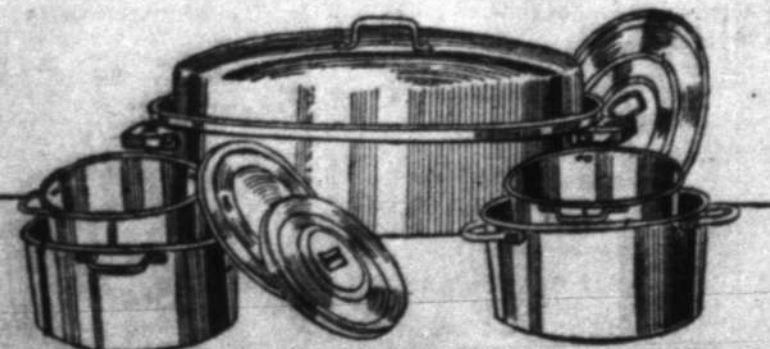

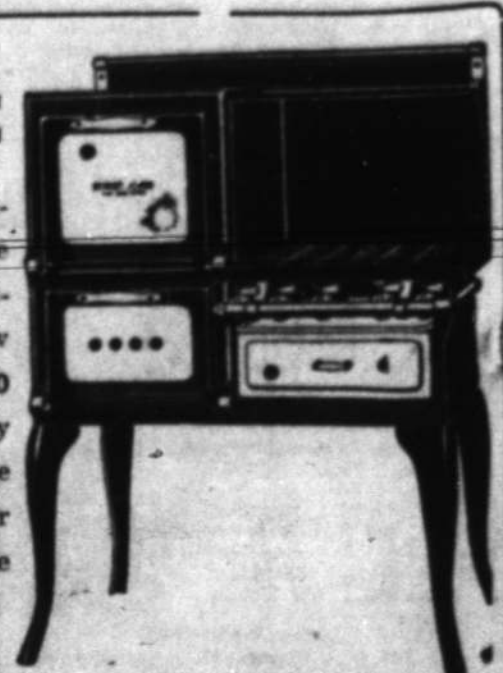
