EIGHT KILLED IN MINE EXPLOSION

Texan Elected National Commander of Legion

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 20.—Alvin M. Owsley, former assistant Attorney General, was elected National Commander of the American Legion at the annual convention in session here this afternoon. Wm. Deegan, of New York, led the capitulation of the defeated candidates, and moved that the vote be made unanimous, and at this stage the Texas band could not restrain itself longer and broke loose.

The Muscle Shoals resolution was passed by a large majority, the convention reversing previous action when that resolution was tabled because some member charged it was fostered by Ford propaganda.

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 20.—Nominating speeches for the next national commander of the American Legion started this morning. The Alabama delegation yielded the privilege of the first speech

to Texas, and Wayne Davis, the Texas commander, offered the name of Alvin Owsley, chairman of the Americanization committee.

The report of the resolutions committee urging Congress to act on the proposal for the sale and operation of the Muscle Shoals nitrate plant, was tabled after it was charged that it was "Ford propaganda."

MAN AND SON VICTIMS OF MOB IN TENNESSEE

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Oct. 20.—Ed Hartley and son, George Hartley, who were recently convicted of manslaughter, were taken from the jail at Camden at midnight last night and shot to death in a vacant lot near the jail. The two men were convicted in connection with the killing of Connie Hartley, Ed Hartley's nephew, in Benton county last February.

MOVE TO MAKE MEXICO SAFE

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 20.—Mexicans, who during the period of disturbances, attack foreigners or their property are to be regarded as traitors and will be dealt with accordingly. This was the provision of a measure submitted to the department of the interior by President Obregon for formal presentation to the chamber of deputies.

Thursday night a large crowd was present at the devotional services and heard Rev. E. J. Fleming, of Kansas City, deliver an inspiring message.

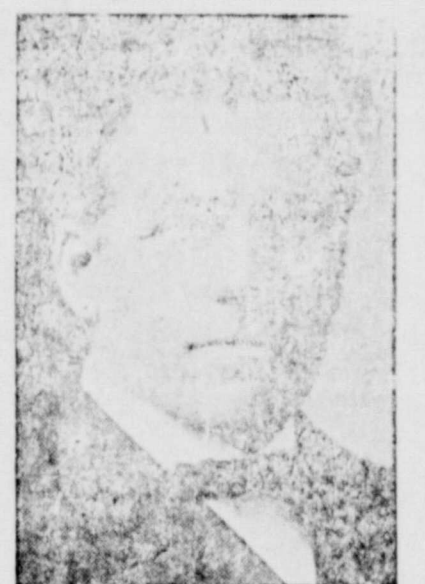

NO HOPE FOR CLIFFORD PARKER

Clifford Parker, mail carrier on Route A, out of Ballinger, is at the point of death, and there is no hope for his recovery, according to reports from the sanitarium. Mr. Parker had to undergo an operation for appendicitis while ill with typhoid fever, and the complication of trouble will claim his life. Reports Friday morning stated that he would probably not live through the day.

DENIES MAYFIELD HAS EXCEEDED LIMIT OF LAW

(By Associated Press)

CORSICANA, Oct. 20.—The plaintiffs tentatively rested their case this morning in the injunction suit brought here to keep Mayfield's name off the ticket. They reserved the right to question Mike McNamara.

D. E. Lyday, one of Mayfield's managers, testified that money for campaign purposes was furnished him only by Mayfield, and that he received money from no other source.

CORSICANA, Oct. 20.—James P. Straughan, of Fort Worth, testified today in the injunction suit seeking to keep Earl Mayfield's name off the official ballot for the general election. Mr. Straughan said that none of the money collected by him was given to Mr. Mayfield or to his campaign managers. He said that all of it was expended by himself for local campaign expenses and that Mayfield or any of his managers had nothing to do with it. The witness told of collecting \$850, which he said that he spent as he saw best for the interest of the campaign. This amount was included in the report of expenses as made by Mayfield's manager, together with other items which the plaintiffs charge swelled the expenses to beyond what the law allows, and it is on this contention that they are attempting to keep Mayfield's name off the ticket.

DALLAS, Oct. 20.—The Court of Civil Appeals here last night certified to the State Supreme Court the questions recently presented it as to whether the plaintiffs in the Corsicana injunction suit were the proper persons to seek such an injunction. The injunction in question restrained the Secretary of State from certifying the name of Earl Mayfield as a candidate for United

BRITISH FORM NEW CABINET

LONDON, Oct. 20.—Andrew Bonar Law appeared to be making rapid progress today in forming a cabinet to replace the fallen coalition government which resigned yesterday. It was announced that Marquis Curzon, Earl of Derby, had agreed to serve under Bonar Law in any capacity. Bonar Law cannot officially announce the formation of a new ministry until he is elected head of the Unionist party to succeed Austen Chamberlain. It is generally conceded that his election will be only a matter of form.

OIL BOOSTERS HOLD MEETING

Quite a number of those who are interested in oil development in this county held a meeting Wednesday afternoon and discussed ways and means for making a thorough test of the Safety First well before abandoning drilling. It was the expressed desire of those present that the hole be drilled at least 3500 feet deep, and if possible, 4000 feet deep, before quitting the test.

A committee is at work soliciting acreage of adjoining land owners, and this acreage will be sold and the funds derived from such sales used in continuing drilling. This was accepted as being the best and most practical way to finance the development. It was stated that those owning land could well afford to assign a block of acreage to the drillers, and those with surplus cash could well afford to buy this acreage. The land is worthless as far as oil development is concerned unless developed, and the land owners will profit should oil be struck in paying quantities, and those who invest in the acreage would realize a big profit with the bringing in of a well.

The well is now down 3170 feet in blue shale, which is declared to be good formation and which tops the lime before boring into the sand of the Breckenridge pool.

Mr. Wilson, who has been on the job as driller for some time, is loath to abandon the well, because he has every confidence in success, and he proposes to continue operations at actual expenses, charging nothing for the use of his tools. It is estimated that the well can be put down to a depth of 4,000 feet, if necessary, at a cost of about \$6,000, or a little less, and this would include the cost of some casing which would have to be purchased.

The acreage owners are knocking their own interest if they refuse to get behind this proposition and test it for all it is worth. It will be a long time before another project can be developed to where this well now stands, and the investment of a few dollars may

bring in an oil well which would jump acreage which is now practically worthless, sky high. It is a proposition the Ballinger people and people of the surrounding country should get behind and see through.

RANKS OF "GRAY" SLOWLY THINNING

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Oct. 20.—The ranks of Confederate veterans in Texas is slowly thinning. This fact is shown by the number of veterans on the pension lists of the state. The number of pensioners at the close of the fiscal year, ending August 31st, totaled 14,862 (or approximately 100 less than the number at the close of the preceding year, according to the annual report of the pension division of the state comptroller's department, just completed. In 1921, there were 14,960 pensioners on the lists.

Texas still claims the honor of having the largest number of Confederate pensioners of any of the Southern states, according to statistics compiled by national headquarters of the United Confederate Veterans, Georgia and Arkansas are the closest competitors with Texas, each of these states having approximately 9,000 pensioners.

Of the nearly 15,000 Texas pensioners, 472 are now in state homes, the annual report shows. Of this number, 97 are in the Women's Confederate home, and 375 in the home for men, both located in Austin. A total of 376 inmates of the state homes are drawing pensions, which amounts to approximately \$17.50 per quarter. Those living outside the

homes received \$25 at the last payment, which is the largest quarterly installment ever received.

Expenditures for Confederate pensions during the past year amounted to \$1,423,378, the annual report shows, while in 1921, expenditures amounted to \$1,422,480. During the past fiscal year, 1,036 Confederate veterans died, while 929 were put on the pension lists. One of the striking facts of the pensioner lists is the increasing number of widows who are taking the places of veterans on the rolls. Statistics of the national department show that more than 8,000 of the Texas pensioners are widows.

Texas began paying her Confederate veterans in 1899, records of the comptroller's department show. The records indicate that

less than 400 veterans were paid pensions in that year by the state.

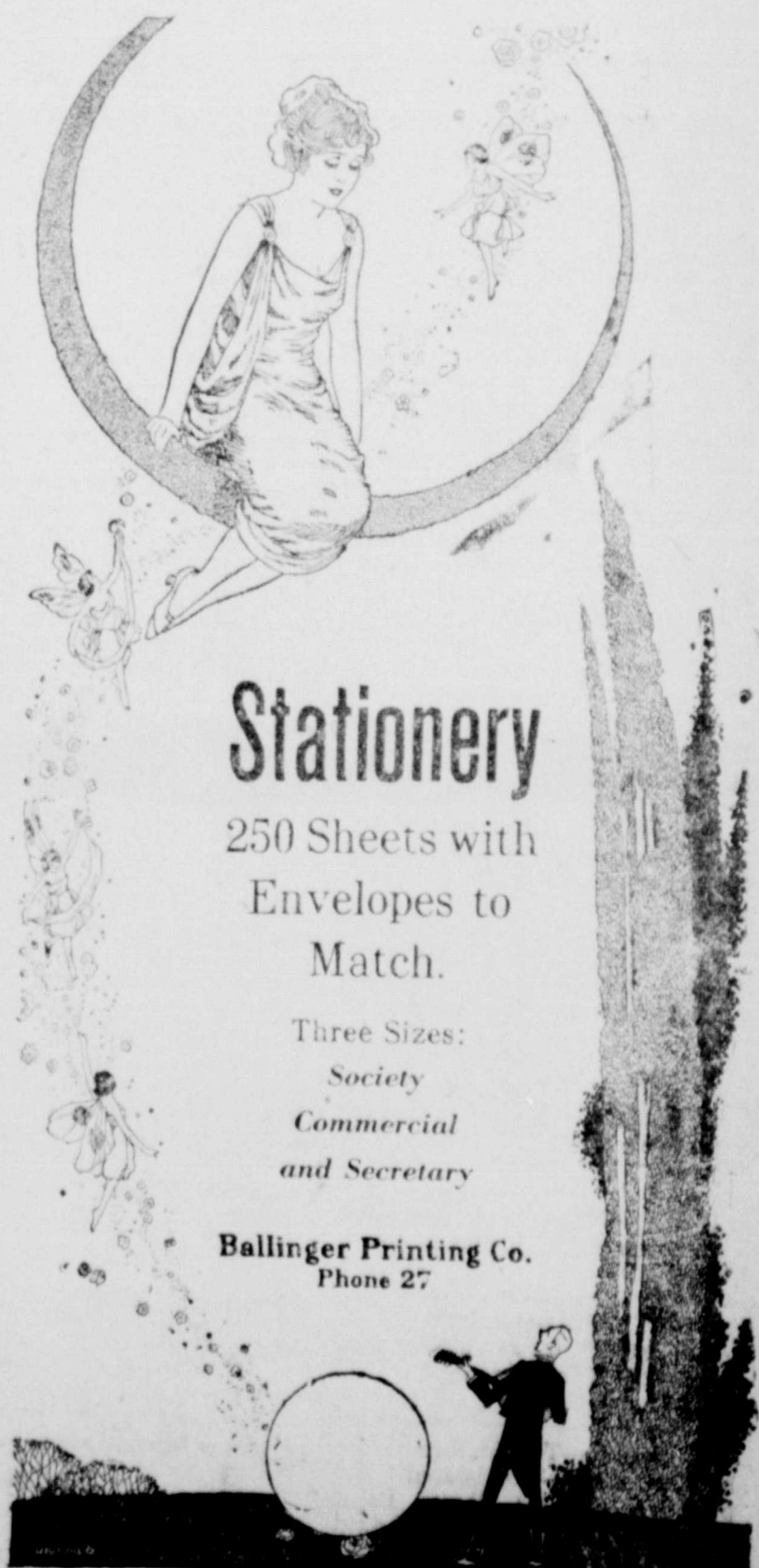
An off-the-face shape, at the right, is made of dark velvet, with a soft crown

SAYS WORTHAM SHOWS CLEAN

C. M. Casey, representing the John T. Wortham Shows, which are showing at San Angelo this week, and scheduled to show in Ballinger next week, came to Ballinger Friday. Mr. Wortham sent Mr. Casey here as soon as his attention was called to the criticism which had been made against the Wortham attractions, and authorized him to make the following statement:

"The John T. Wortham Shows, which will exhibit in Ballinger all next week, are showing at San Angelo, under the management of the San Angelo fair association. The San Angelo Standard of October 19th commended the company attractions. When the protest and condemnation of carnivals in general was brought to Mr. Wortham's notice he produced a copy of the Arkansas City, Kansas, Daily Traveler, dated August 15, containing the following statement:

"Approves Wortham Shows; Ministerial Committee Reports on Attractions—

"At a meeting of the Arkansas City Ministerial Alliance this morning at the study of the United Presbyterian church, a report was made by the committee which had been appointed at a previous meeting to attend the carnival being held here this week. The committee consisted of the president and acting secretary, Rev. D. Everett Smith and Rev. E. F. Muir, who attended the carnival last night.

"The ministerial alliance, after hearing the report from its committee, took the following action:

"Resolved—That we commend to the patronage of our community the John T. Wortham Shows, now being presented in Arkansas City, under the auspices of the American Legion. The entertaining and instructive character of these shows makes attendance not only the enjoyment of wholesome fun, but also of real profit. They will find as others have that they have condemned without cause, and without knowledge of the matter they were talking about. Branding of human beings is not very Christian like

to my idea. Controversy is wasted energy. We will go to Ballinger and show, just as we have been doing all summer, and will abide by the decision of the people there whether or not we have been unjustly condemned."
