'Early Is Discipline' Important P-T-O Here Told by Supt. Siebert

The Eastland Parents-Teachers Organization held its monthly meeting on Oct. 20, 1970. Mrs. Mike Collins, President, presided and introduced Supt. Wendell Siebert who gave a most informative and thought provoking speech on "Your Child and Discipline."

Mr. Siebert, an experienced and highly respected educator, noted that this is one of the worst periods of time in our history for exercising discipline over our children. He said that the first seven grades of school are by all means the most important and stressed that parents do have a battle in this day and time but that one of the most important aspects in discipline is for the parents to take care of their homework as far as the children are concerned. He told those present that as parents, and teachers, they could not know about their finished product until years past.

"We are living in a permissive society," continued Mr. Siebert and he said that our public schools are one of the last defenses to protect today's society and without our public schools we have lost the battle. He related that the three most important things for parents and others to try developing in children are love, mutual respect and a sense of belonging, and he said, "Parents have to set the pattern." He said that child-

ren do not dislike discipline but they respect it and want it.

According to Mr. Siebert, this County within the next few years will qualify for about thirty special education teachers dealing with emotionally disturbed children because such children were not brought up in stable homes with discipline.

Afterwards, the fourth grade classes of Mrs. Green and Mrs. McCain performed with songs and readings, their theme of which was on our American Heritage.

Mrs. McCain's fourth grade class had the most parents present for the meeting. All of the parents and teachers were reminded that the Halloween Carnival will be on Saturday Oct. 21, 1970, from 6 p.m. until 9 p.m.

Also, an urgent request was issued for all parents to assist the home room parents with the booths of the respective classes and with the booth of the P. T. O. at the Halloween Carnival.

Mavericks Best Hamilton, 9-0, In 'Game-to-Be-Remembered' Friday

The Hamilton Bulldogs came to Eastland to play football and went home with the knowledge that they came closer than any other team to defeating the Mighty Mavericks.

The Mavericks proved their grit though and came out of it with a slim 9-0 win for another Conference 8-AA victory. It was the combined ground game of Stand-In Quarterback Ronald McCleskey, the hard-nosed determination of Halfback Howard King and the Magic Toe of James Eidson that put it together for the Mavericks.

The Eastland fans just weren't accustomed to the brand of ball they saw Friday night in Mavericks Stadium, and during the first quarter, when the Mavericks had the ball for only one series that gained four yards, it was a real fingernail biter.

Hamilton took the opening kick and behind the expert call-man-ship of Quarterback Gary Luker and the power-drive of Halfback Bob Gardner, and others of the Bulldog offense, the Bulldogs ground out five big first downs, moving from their own 20-yard line to the Eastland nine.

It was on the fifth first down that Eastland's first-line quarterback Craig Lund received a leg injury in his defensive position, and was destined to wait out the rest of the game on the sidelines. Lund's leg was to have been X-rayed Saturday morning to determine the extent of injury.

Eastland's first chance at

the ball came after a pass fell incomplete from Luker to an intended receiver in the end zone. After the ball went over, McCleskey called on Back Rueben Gaeta three times, but it wasn't enough and a punch sent the ball back to the Bulldogs.

After the second quarter began, Hamilton moved to the Eastland 35 where the ball went over on downs and it was a non-productive effort calling for another Eastland punt. A

near rhubarb occurred when a fast Maverick got credit for a recovery of the Bulldog fumbled punt return. But it was to no avail — on the third down Eastland fumbled and Hamilton got the ball back.

First bright hope for Eastland was seen when Hamilton punted and Gaeta put on a beautiful broken field run to advance the ball to the 47.

And it was from here that Eastland put together its first appearance of the Champion

it is. McCleskey did a lot of keeping and moving himself for yardage and called on King who picked up the first Eastland first down of the evening. And then after two more two-yard gainers, McCleskey zeroed in on Back Randy Rexroat with a perfect pass after a fake handoff to King. This put the ball at the 15 for another first and the first real Eastland threat of the evening deep into the second quarter.

Seven ground yards were put together and McCleskey handed back to Gaeta who tried a pass to Rexroat in the end zone, but the ball fell incomplete.

So on a 4th and 3, Kick James Eidson was called forth with 45 seconds left in the half, and booted the ball to his left and perfectly between the uprights for the first Eastland score.

A beautiful series that reminded fans of other games, came up right after the second half opened and the Magic Ones earned four first downs moving to the Hamilton one-yard line, but alas, it was here too that hopes for more scoring ended as a fumble put the ball into the Bulldog hands. In the long drive McCleskey kept for yardage, called on Back Joe Herrera for more, Rexroat and Gaeta, each took turns on the ground and a pass to End Bob Mace picked up a big 12.

Hamilton was beginning to tire though, and even in spite of a 15-yard penalty against Eastland, wasn't able to keep it moving and Eastland took over on the 25, to pick up a first down and nearly broke Herrera clean free before fumbleitis struck and the ball went over again.

The third period ended 3-0. Hamilton picked up two first downs early in the fourth and nearly broke loose when Gardner found space for 25 big yards.

Eastland conditioning began to show after the exchange when the Mavericks picked up four first downs; one of which was on a nice pass from McCleskey to Eidson for 25 yards.

A five-yard penalty moved the Mavericks back from the one-yard line and it was here that King plowed over from the one yard line after Gaeta had taken a pass to move to the one again. Extra point try failed and the Mavericks had completed their scoring for the evening.

Hamilton earned three more first downs; Mace intercepted himself a pass and Eastland earned another first down before the final gun sounded on the 9-0 final.

Mr. Bradberry states he is

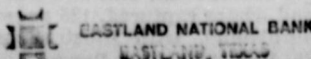
looking forward to meeting farmers and ranchers in the Carbon area and plans on spending time in the field working with customers and prospective customers.

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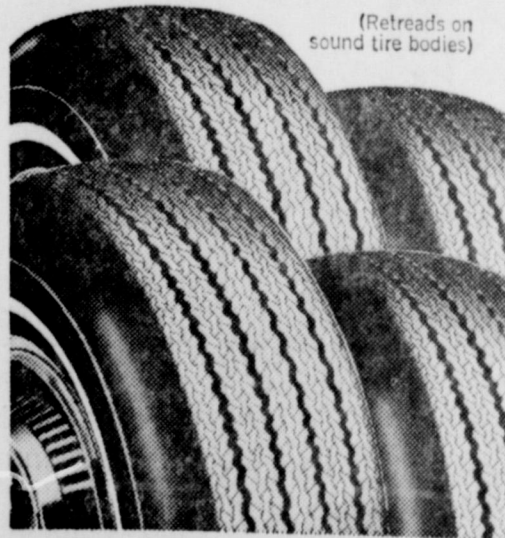

Amendment 3

(Authorizing the legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm, and forest lands based on the capability of the lands to support the raising of livestock or to produce farm and forest crops.)

The proposed amendment to Article VIII, Section 1-d, of the Texas Constitution authorizes the legislature to provide by statute for the establishment of a uniform method of assessing ranch, farm, and forest lands based on the capability of the lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops rather than on the value of such lands and the crops growing on them. The present provision of the Constitution requires no enabling legislation since it prescribes in detail the procedures for designating land for agricultural use and the assessment of such land for tax purposes on the basis only of factors relative to such use.

The proposed section differs from the present section in several respects. The present section is limited to land owned by natural persons while the proposed section contains no such limitation. Also, the present section is applicable to land designated for agricultural use, and agricultural use is defined as "the raising of livestock or growing of crops, fruit, flowers, and other products of the soil under natural conditions as a business venture for profit, which business is the primary occupation and source of income of the owner." The proposed section is applicable to farm, ranch, and forest land, and no reference is made to the primary occupation of the owner. The present section provides that the specified land shall be assessed for tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to agricultural use as defined above. The same basic idea is contained in the new section which provides that the specified land shall be assessed upon the basis of its capability to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops rather than upon the value of such land and the crops growing on them. The present section contains provisions directing a landowner who wishes a special valuation to file a statement with the local tax assessor designating the land and its use and directing the assessor to determine whether the land qualifies and to assess it accordingly. It also provides that no land will qualify unless it has been exclusively used or continuously developed for agricultural use for at least three successive years immediately preceding the assessment date. In addition, it provides for an additional tax in the event the designated land is subsequently sold or diverted to a purpose other than that of agricultural use. Finally, the present section contains a provision stating that the valuation and assessment of any minerals or subsurface rights to minerals shall not come within the provisions of the section. These items have no counterparts in the proposed section, details being left to future enabling legislation.

ARGUMENTS

FOR:
Farm real estate taxes per acre have increased by more than 22 percent, according to data compiled by the Economic Research Service of the United States Department of Agriculture, and there is a need for the tax relief for owners of such property which the proposed amendment would authorize.

(The constitutional amendment approved by the voters in 1966 has not provided tax relief urgently needed by farmers and ranchers who use for agricultural purposes land which has greatly increased in value due to its potential use for other purposes, such as urban development. The proposed amendment would enable the legislature to provide for such relief.)

able the legislature to provide for such relief.

The present system of assessing forest lands for ad valorem tax purposes is inequitable and unrealistic. Timber is not recognized as a "farm product" exempt from taxation as are other growing crops. Timber is accordingly taxed with, and in addition to the land. The result is that tree farmers pay an ad valorem tax each year on their land on the current year's crop (represented by the growth of the trees), and on the crop product in each prior year since the stand of timber was planted. The tree farmer does not recover any portion of these tax payments until the trees are harvested some 20 to 50 years after they are planted. The proposed amendment would authorize the legislature to provide a fairer system of property valuation for taxation of forest lands.

AGAINST:

Enabling legislation for the proposed amendment has not been passed; therefore, the voter has no idea how far the legislature may go in providing property tax considerations to the owners of farm, ranch, and timber lands.
