Fat Years of Plenty—Then What?

The fat years of plenty following the lean ones which have absorbed the whole world during the past, seem now about to make their advent into Cisco, and the United States may expect a time of abundance for a season, as a development from local relief measures, but more fully, as a result of the world's buying in order to prepare for the bitter struggles of war that are facing the nations of Europe and Asia.

We remarked many times during the depression that the quickest relief from existing conditions would be a war in Europe that would put the world's man power to tasks of buying, consuming and working. The Ethiopian war was the little flame that started the feverish preparations now going on day and night in Europe and in the islands of Japan in preparations for the struggle for supremacy, on the part of some, and for existence for others.

Never since preparations for the struggle of the World War has buying been so rampant in the world. The United States, with its vast resources and capacity to turn out and sell the immense amount of war material needed by the feverish nations, is entering a season of prosperity comparable to the flush period of 1919, when every nation, depleted of everything needed by famished and impoverished countries, made so by a devastating all-embracing struggle, were buying from the only country that had it to sell and we were giving our merchandise in turn for the money we had given them, but which we thought we had only loaned.

Already that is approaching again. France has urged that the United States go into a huddle with her and England on the resumption of payments of the war debt. If the U. S. will agree to shelve them down again the nations might agree to start payments again—but of course only for the purpose of wheedling our Uncle Sam out of more loans.

But prosperity is knocking at our doors now, regardless of the fact that it is at the price of sufferings and sacrifices of other people who are being led to the slaughter by their rulers through hatreds and ambitions and we will prosper for a time at least, because nations can find money for wars—they always have and this will be no exception. Already reports show that our trade with foreign countries has grown through the last year by leaps and bounds. It will be greater during the early months of the new year and America will grow fat on the increased trade and employment necessary to carry on this commercial work.

But after we have sold them, even if we are not drawn into the vortex ourselves—a thing that seems very probable because the world is too small now and the intercourse of nations too complex to allow us to escape—a day of reckoning will come. A pay day always comes. God has put that down in his immutable law as an inescapable fact—and then what?

The answer does not need a seer of wisdom to make reply. Another panic, a period of unemployment, a depression, if nothing more serious. No, we are not a pessimist, but always an optimist, but being that does not blind us to the inevitable. So what? The answer for us here in Cisco, as well as over the good old U. S. A., is glean while the gleaming may be done. As Joseph advised Pharaoh to store up for the lean years, thus should we do now. Let's go after the business that will be ours for the asking during 1937 so that when the accounting comes, we will have the reserve to carry us through to the next crest which in a few years will again follow the next depression. But remember, GO AFTER BUSINESS NOW!

WTU to Observe its Silver Anniversary

ABILENE, Dec. 5 — The West Texas Utilities company, soon after declaring preferred stock dividends totaling over \$100,000 announced it will observe its Silver Anniversary this week, observing the Christmas season for the event.

This pioneer utility organization had its origin 25 years ago—1911—at Abilene. It has since expanded to include 160 communities in 49 counties, stretching across Central West Texas from Kimble county on the south to Dallam county in the Panhandle. General offices are in Abilene. District offices are located in McCombs, San Angelo, Ballinger, Cisco, Stamford, Quanah, Childress and Dalhart, as well as in Abilene.

It has provided Cisco with electric power for many years.

to celebrate the birthday. Over 50,000 copies were sent out to customers and stockholders in the 45,000 square-mile territory.

President Price Campbell announced that intensified efforts will be made during the forthcoming years to multiply the uses of electricity, and spread the benefits to more users, declaring that "the greater the benefits, the greater the consumption, and in turn the lower the steps in unit costs of electric service thereby all four interested parties profit (1) this 'Land of Opportunity' West Texas territory (2) the customers, (3) the employees, and (4) the stockholders."

He reminded the quarter million people served by the company that "average rates have been lowered 70 per cent during the last 15 years—never raised." The recent dividend, he said, was declared in the face of government interference and increased taxes amounting the last three years to 1.7 times—nearly twice as much for government tax expenditures as has been paid to all shareholders—owners of the company. This preferred stock di-

vidend was made possible by unusual operating economies and intensive new business efforts of the organization. No earnings are yet possible for the common stockholders and none have been for five years.

While gross revenue remains 30 per cent below 1929's peak figures due to rate reductions and sale of gas property, kilowatt-hour sales have reached a new all time peak during the last 12 months, he announced. Large increased industrial power usage together with some increased domestic service usage was credited with the hike. This dividend, equivalent to quarterly requirements of 1.50 a share, is the first full dividend since July 1933, partly paid then from reserves and the stock is now \$9.50 per share in arrears. Seventy percent of preferred stockholders are West Texans.

BRUCE McDUGALL attended the performance of "Half-Acre in Eden" as the guest of Mike and Joji Bradford. Tickets to each show presented were included in the membership privileges of the Stagecraft Guild, and the Bradford family membership entitled them to two tickets. Mike, with what he hoped was a good pretense of selfishness, suggested to Joji that she use their tickets for McDougall and herself. She retorted that she wouldn't dream of depriving him of the pleasure of seeing the play, and cheerfully took a dollar of his money to buy a third ticket for their guest.

McDougall, left to his own devices, probably would not have attended, but, having arrived and resigned himself to his fate, he had to admit that a workman-like job was on view. As an artist, he found chief interest in the scenery committee's products, and yet, having expected to be bored by an amateur production, he found himself almost as interested in the play as if he had been in a Broadway theater.

Backstage, as the show got under way, temperatures had risen because of the presence in the audience of Lloyd Burtis, one of the most successful New York producers. It was recalled that Mr. Burtis was an old friend of the Hendersons, and the director's mysterious statement concerning an important event on the night of the show seemed to give greater promise. Just what his attendance

could mean to the Guild and the town, both of which, Mrs. Henderson had said, would benefit through the forthcoming surprise, the cast could not fathom, but it spurred them to a finer performance, nevertheless.

The first act was concluded without a hitch, and as sets and costumes were changed and the high school orchestra performed to the satisfaction of admiring parents, Mrs. Henderson, behind the curtain, was deluged with inquiries concerning Burtis and the promised surprise.

But she refused an explanation, and the second act began with the cast very much on edge.

Granny McDougall watched Marion Canfield on the stage, wishing he had not come to see her. Every word and gesture made her more desirable to him, nearer to him, even while he considered her more and more remote.

WHEN the second act curtain fell there was a tide of excited talk through the auditorium. McDougall, as a newcomer, was mystified, and Joan explained that Lloyd Burtis, the producer, had left his seat and, according to a report brought from backstage and thoroughly circulated, was now closeted with several people, and that a surprising and important announcement would soon be forthcoming.

It was a long intermission. The orchestra played four numbers, and the audience was becoming decidedly restless when Mrs. Henderson stepped before the curtain and waited for silence.

She had just emerged, she said, from a conference with Mr. Burtis, from whom she had previously exacted a secret promise in connection with tonight's show. The conference had been attended also by Mr. and Mrs. Frank Osborn, of Bobbs Neck, and Miss Dorothy Osborn, their daughter and a member of the cast.

Mr. Burtis's promise, she could now announce, had been to offer a Broadway opportunity to the player who gave the finest performance in tonight's show. He had required only two acts to make his choice; the offer had been made to the young lady selected, in the presence of her parents, and accepted.

Miss Dorothy Osborn would have her chance on Broadway. Not, of course, as a star, but still it would be a chance.

There was an actual ovation, Frank Osborn and his wife, having waited backstage during the announcement, attempted to return to their seats during the uproar, and called forth an even

greater demonstration, much to their embarrassment. And when the third act curtain went up, Dorothy, who was on the stage alone for a few moments, got such a reception that she was almost in tears, and her recovery, under the circumstances, was evidence of an inherent capability to observe that hallowed injunction of the professional actress, "The show must go on."

HER part in the play was finished after half a dozen minutes of the third act, and she left the stage to another burst of applause. Through the whispered, but nonetheless hearty, congratulations of those clustered in the wings, she made her way to the dressing room she shared with several others. There, alone for a short while, she put her head in her arms and wept.

It was perhaps the greatest emotional moment she would ever know.

She who had lived to womanhood drinking bitterness of her own brewing, found this gift of actual triumph a purely sweet draught. She who had dreamed of success, imagining she could be haughty, disdainful, at its realization, suddenly found the world gracious.

She who had hated her lack of money and persistently charred a gulf between herself and the more fortunate, she who had hated the girls who enjoyed the material things she was denied, had found the congratulations of both cast and audience—her friends and neighbors—too real to admit of envy; they were simply glad for her!

And the warmth of it overwhelmed her so that her veneer of hardness was taken away as, soon, she would wipe off the make-up which had fitted her on the stage a while ago.

She was not long enough alone to have regained her composure when the entire feminine membership of the cast, at the show's conclusion, crowded into the dressing room to renew their congratulations, and, when finally she was dressed and ready to go home, she found waiting for her in the auditorium, making an excited circle about Mr. and Mrs. Osborn, such a group of townspeople that she could not restrain her tears.

Dorothy at last went home with her parents—triumphant, lifted to the stars, and yet strangely humbled, strangely different from the Dorothy Osborn who had come here this evening, in cheap car and cheap clothes, and feeling their cheapness.

UNDER THE DOME AT AUSTIN

AUSTIN, Dec. 3 (U.P.) — Senator Tom DeBerry, Bogota, will become acting governor of Texas this week.

Governor James V. Allred and Lieut. Gov. Walter Woodul plan to attend an interstate parole conference in New Orleans on Dec. 3, 4, and 5.

A president pro tem of the Senate, DeBerry will be chief executive. Other Senators who have had the privilege since Allred became governor are Ken Regan, Pecos; John Redditt, Lufkin; and Wilbourne Collier, Eastland. Senator Roy Anderson, who preceded DeBerry as president pro tem of the Senate, did not have an opportunity to act as governor.

Senator Clint C. Small, father of the big captain of the University of Texas football team, is a gridiron

fan of the first water. He follows the Texas team to see son, Clint, and his teammates play. He accompanied them to Minnesota where the Texans ran up the biggest score against the Minnesota Golden Gophers since 1933.

"They play real football up there," Senator Small said on his return. "When the game started the officials called the captains together and announced: 'We do not consider it holding unless the hands are used. Everything goes.'"

The Senator favors a "rough" game, playing cleanly but hard. "When Clint, as a boy, told me he had an ambition to play on the Texas team I told him never to slow up on his tackles or play anyway but with all his might," Papa Small said.

Apparently an active contest is now being waged between two strong supporters of Governor James V. Allred for the place on the state highway commission which will become vacant on Feb. 15.

Stanford Payne, Del Rio, visited the Governor to discuss it last week. Payne gave the "coming out" party at which Governor Allred, then attorney general, was launched into the race for Chief Executive. It would be difficult for the Governor to displace Payne, who has his heart set on the place, and has sac-

rificed other opportunities to keep himself available for it. It also will be hard for Allred to turn down the friends of George Surkey, Bexar county clerk, who seeks the place. Surkey, recently defeated for county clerk, is brother-in-law of Martin Wright, who, with Mayor Quinn of San Antonio, stood firm for Allred's re-election although many Allred policies were unpopular in San Antonio. Quinn and others also called on the governor last week.

The final draft of a bill to create a state board of welfare will be made at a meeting in Austin on December 2 of the Social Aspects committee of the state planning board. The proposal is to combine three present state activities one organization. The three are the old age assistance commission, the Texas relief commission and the Child Welfare Division of the State Board of Control. The plan will not change control of any of those agencies, for the members of the state Board of Control already have been made old age assistance commissioners and relief commissioners.

Earlier this week the water resources committee of the planning board will go over the draft of another bill. It provides for state control of underground water supplies.

The state now has control of water above ground. Maj. E. A. Wood, director of the planning board, said it was obvious if the state continued to permit permit persons to drill all the wells they wanted for irrigation purposes the underground supply would in time be depleted and the level of the water so lowered that drilling and pumping costs would become prohibitive. There is no intent, he said, to restrict the normal requirements of farms, ranches and communities.

Governor Allred thinks state expense accounts should be more liberal. Especially those of assistant attorneys general.

He recalls that when he was attorney general the state did not have representation at several important cases appealed to the U. S. Supreme court because no one could afford to make the trip. He estimated that it costs an assistant of the legal department more than \$100 of his own funds to represent Texas in Washington during an appeal.

Present travel expense allowed representatives of the attorney general's department is \$3.60 a day besides fare. Governor Allred intends to speak to the appropriations committee of the 45th Legislature about it. He thinks the expense account should be turned in

for all expenditures, and paid with out regard to number of days of allowance for any given period.

Particular cases now being considered elsewhere which Allred believes merit constant attendance of a Texas Legal representative are the E. H. R. Green inheritance case in New York City and the water rights suit being fought in the U. S. Supreme Court between Texas and New Mexico.

The former litigation might mean in excess of \$12,000,000 to the state inheritance fund should Green's legal residence be determined as having been in Texas. This would do much to wipe out an estimated \$18,000,000 general revenue deficit by 1940.

The Texas Highway Commission has authorized State Highway Engineer Gibb Gilchrist to take a representative group of state highway department heads to the meeting of the American Association of Highway Officials to be held in San Francisco Dec. 7-10. The number and naming of individuals was left to Gilchrist, who is president of the national association.

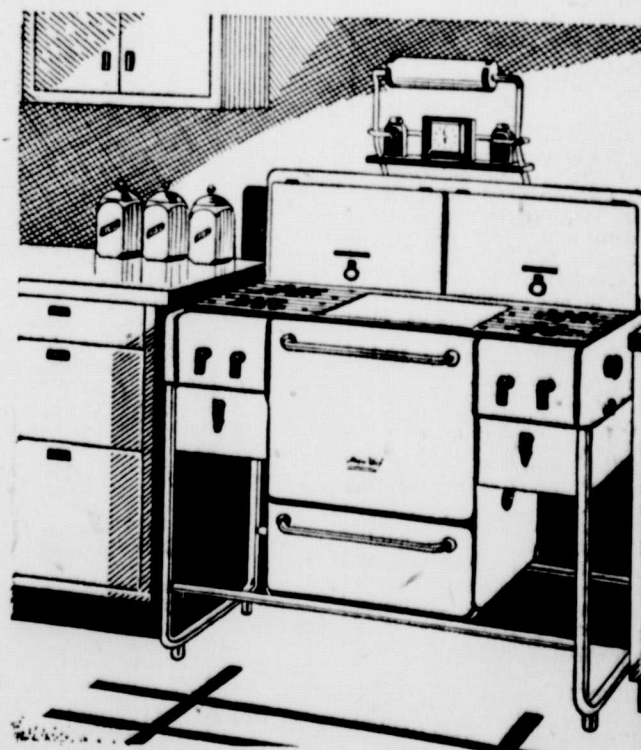

We therefore find the earliest records left by man, that sending of greetings was fundamental and important to the people of the earth. So today it is an important, fundamental, and necessary part of our advanced civilization. As we advance so will man's custom of sending bonds of friendship. It is clearly revealed by today's stupendous demand for cards of all kinds which even the skilled hands of modern artists cannot supply, and today Greeting Cards are the accepted communication a m o n g friends. Our messages of sentiment are consolers of sorrow and bringers of joy in all parts of the land.

World Owes Progress To Casual Inventors

Senator William G. McAdoo's fingers were burned at a picnic when he picked up a metal thermos bottle cap. So he went home and invented a heat-proof cap. The Senator's latest patent covers improvements on the safety razor permitting the blade to be inserted or removed without taking the razor apart.

To such casual inventors the world is indebted for most of the 2,059,187 inventions recognized by the United States Patent Office, writes Aubrey D. McFayden in Modern Mechanix magazine. For every professional inventor there are hundreds of amateur inventors.

Abraham Lincoln was one of these. As a young man he noted the trouble of navigators on shoals in the Ohio River and conceived the idea of attaching buoyant chambers to the sides of the boats. Geo. Washington invented a wine cooler, a seeding plow and other farm devices. Thomas Jefferson produced the folding buggy top, the swivel chair and the modern plowshare.

Samuel L. Clemens, famous as Mark Twain, lost a fortune backing another inventor's type-setting machine but profited from three patents of his own. One was for an adjustable strap for the backs of waistcoats, another for a historical game, and one for a self-pasting scrap book which is still sold in stationery stores.

Dr. Albert Einstein, famed for his theory of relativity, has patented a novel refrigerating system. Cornelius Vanderbilt Jr., the journalist, is the inventor of a pocket shoe-polishing device. His grandfather invented a locomotive firebox which became standard.

Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh and Dr. Alexis Carrel, author of "Man, the Unknown," have invented an artificial heart. Prince Henry of Prussia, brother of the former Kaiser, patented a windshield wiper just three months before the World War.

Princess Elain von der Lippe-Lipski, now living in Washington, invents. Recently three patents were granted to her in a single day. One was an automobile headlight which brightened and dimmed automatically. Another involves use of red and violet rays on surgical wounds.

Charles Ray, the motion picture actor, is the originator of the auto turn and stop lights. Newton D. Baker, Secretary of War under President Wilson, last year patented a suction cleaner for book shelves. Another attorney, Herbert L. Satterlee, brother-in-law of J. P. Morgan and former assistant Secretary of the Navy, has a private laboratory in which he works on x-ray and radio inventions.

In 1939 the patent laws were amended to embrace new forms of plant life. Among the first patents granted under the amended law was one to Harold L. Ickes, now Secretary of the Interior for a dahlia. Two later plant patents have been granted to him.

Mrs. Winifred Hudnut Guglielmi, known professionally as Natacha Rambova, patented a combined coverlet and doll shortly before the death of her famous former husband, Rudolph Valentino. Mrs. Horatio Nelson Slater, famed as a New York society leader, patented twenty inventions including dolls, a military blanket, an automatic ice case for refrigerators and a book cover.

Mrs. Martha J. Coston invented the flare light used by mariners all over the world. Maude Adams, the actress, has given much research and energy attempting to develop motion pictures producible in daylight. Miss Beulah Louise Henry, of New York, has received the souvenir of "Lady Edison" for her fifty inventions ranging from football valves on through a new type of sewing machine.

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
