\$200,000 ALLOWED IN WORM FIGHT

FOUR MARINES ARE KILLED BY SANDINO BAND

NINE OTHERS HURT IN CLASH NEAR OCOTAL IN NICARAGUA

(By The Associated Press)
MANAGUA, Nic., Feb. 29.—Four American marines were killed and nine wounded in an encounter today between American forces and a band of followers of the rebel leader Augusto Sandino.

The names of the Americans killed and wounded had not been received in Managua at noon today and the casualties among the Sandino forces were not known.

The fight took place near Darali between the towns of Yali and Condega, which is in northern Nicaragua, near the American headquarters at Ocotal.

The American forces in the fight were in command of Lieutenant Edward F. O'Day of New Hampshire.

Review Granted In Defamation Case

AUSTIN, Feb. 29 (AP).—Granting a writ of error, the supreme court decided Wednesday to review the civil appellate judgment favoring C. Bruce Ferguson, Harris county tax collector, in his suit against the Houston Press for alleged defamation by printing news stories about the operation of his office.

The civil appeals court upheld the plea on seven of the nine issues, but in reversing the case held that the district court should have left two questions to determination of the jury. They were whether the paper could justly comment on alleged errors in Ferguson's books and on alleged evidence that county officials hired each other's relatives. The press, which won in district court, pleaded truth published under privilege and without malice.

Wife Slayer Dies Of Gunshot Wounds

AMARILLO, Feb. 29 (AP).—A little more than two weeks after he had shot and killed his wife, wounded Miss Vesta Jorgensen of Salt Lake City, Utah, in the ear, and fired a bullet into his own head, James J. Kekahaloa, native Hawaiian musician, died at a hospital here last night.

His daughter, age 14 months, and the body of his wife, formerly Lillian Clayton of Salt Lake City, were taken to the Utah city last week by Miss Jorgensen, where Mrs. Lillian Liddell, mother of the slain woman, resides.

Husband Slaying Case Nearing Jury

PORT WORTH, Feb. 29 (AP).—The case of Lula Wyatt, 50, charged with murder in connection with the slaying of her husband, Ed Wyatt, last November, is expected to go to the jury in criminal court here today.

The state is asking the death penalty and the defense is seeking a suspended sentence.

He's Entitled To Fur-Lined Bathtub

CORSICANA, Feb. 29 (AP).—A combination faucet in a bath tub through which either hot water or liquid could be drawn was discovered here when city and county officers raided a Corsicana residence. G. R. Benfield was arrested and a complaint charging violation of the prohibition laws was filed. He was released on \$1,000 bond.

A 51-2 gallon container was built into the wall of the bath room above the faucet, officers said, and a hidden spring under the window released a board either liquor or hot water, as the operator desired, was located.

The next two weeks will be spent in extra work in shaping the team for the contest which will be entered by the leading agricultural schools of the southwest.

Coach R. C. Mowery, who had excellent success with the team last year, plans to not only bring back the title this year but also to have a majority of the leading men in the contest. The college won second last season and placed the highest scoring man in the contest.

Accused ExBanker Held To Grand Jury

LAREDO, Feb. 29 (AP).—R. M. Martinez, cashier of the First State Bank and Trust company which closed Sunday, today waived preliminary hearing and was bound over for the grand jury. His bond was set at \$10,000. La Bella Jardina, a haberdashery owned by Martinez, his private home and oil and gas lease interests in Webb, Duval, Jim Hogg, Starr and Zapata counties, have been turned over to the bank.

He was charged with defalcation of \$120,000 in bank funds.

LOCAL FIRM IS RULED AGAINST IN INJUNCTION

SHIPPERS CAN SELECT COMPRESS POINT, IS RULING OF COURT

(By The Associated Press)
AMARILLO, Feb. 29.—Shippers of cotton, to be compressed in transit, may designate the point where the cotton is to be compressed and the compress which is to do the work, it was ruled in a decision here today by the seventh district court of civil appeals.

The decision was in an injunction suit brought by the West Texas Compress and Warehouse company of Lubbock, against the Panhandle and Santa Fe Railway, et al. The trial court granted temporary injunction but on a motion of the defendants dissolved the injunction. The court of appeals reversed the judgment of the lower court and granted a permanent injunction.

Charges Discrimination
The compress company alleged that the railroad undertook to prevent it from compressing a certain shipment of cotton although owners of the cotton had expressed a desire for that company to do the work.

The railway company contended that under the rules and regulations of the railroad commission of Texas, it was optional with the carrier where the work should be done, and whether at origin, in transit, or at destination.

The higher court held that it was within the power of the shipper to select the point of compression and the firm to do the work.

Bonds Of Roberts, Lester Forfeited

Bonds of R. B. "Blackie" Lester and George Roberts, former local men, who faced charges of violation of the law in the 95th district court here, have been forfeited due to the failure of the men to appear in court here this week. A telegram from a Dallas physician stated that Roberts was unable to attend because of illness but no word was heard from Lester.

Lester was one of the men wounded in the shooting when Bill Richardson was shot by Sheriff H. L. Johnston and Deputy Vernice Ford in a raid on a booze cache near a local camp.

Roberts was under bonds totalling \$5,000 while Lester's bond was for \$1,500.

Officials said today that it is likely that Roberts' sick excuse will be allowed.

Woman Reveals Details Of Mail Train Robbery And Husband Indicted

CHICAGO, Feb. 29 (AP).—A police officer last night offered to take care of Mrs. Katherine Cleaver's canaries and her dog while she is detained in the Evergreen Park mail train robbery investigation.

Seventeen minutes later she had given him details on which a federal grand jury indicted her husband, Charles (Limpy) Cleaver, William Donovan and Frank (Bozo) Meccia.

"I was kind to her. That's how I got Katherine Cleaver's confession," said Lieut. Michael Naughton.

"She reminded me, as I sat there, of my own mother. I wouldn't want to know she was lying. I told Mrs. Cleaver so. Then she began to cry."

Kindness Brings Story
"You are very kind," she said. Then she told her story.

Lieut. Naughton, police department ace, was called upon for aid after postoffice inspectors who are in charge of the case, reported themselves unable to make headway in their questioning of suspects.

Police, who made the original arrests, insisted they had obtained three confessions, backed by evidence, but the federal men said there were many missing links in the evidence police had turned over to them.

F. N. Davis, a postal inspector, and policeman Mollie Reddy were present when Mrs. Cleaver made her statement to Lieut. Naughton.

Overheard Conversation
Mrs. Cleaver's story was that she overheard Cleaver, Donovan, Meccia and three others, whose names have been withheld, plotting on the night of February 20. The night before

COWMEN FACE GRAVE DANGER

MENACE OF INCREASING PARASITES CITED BY HEAD OF BUREAU

(By The Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Feb. 29.—With the livestock industry undergoing a gradual transition from the open ranges to farms inclosed by fences, a grave danger from the rapidly increasing prevalence of cattle parasites has arisen, in the opinion of Dr. J. R. Mohler, chief of the bureau of animal industry.

Refuting the work of his bureau to the house committee which today reported the agriculture department supply bill, Dr. Mohler declared that unless a comprehensive control program is inaugurated the future food supply of the country may be seriously menaced.

Damage from parasitism to livestock "is so widespread and general that it may prove to be our greatest source of loss," he said.

Loss Many Millions
He estimated the annual loss to hides and wool at \$50,000,000 and in lowered production of meat, milk and horse power the loss ran into many millions more.

"On the wide open ranges animals spread their parasites over a wide area," he explained. "Animals now are more densely stocked on the ranges."

MEASURE PASSED IN HOUSE IS SENT TO SENATE WITH URGENT PLEA FOR IMMEDIATE ACTION

(By The Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Feb. 29.—An appropriation of \$200,000 for immediate use in combatting the pink boll worm in Texas and other southwestern states, was recommended in a measure passed today by the house and sent to the senate.

Chairman Madden of the house appropriations committee explained that funds for this purpose were needed at once. He said that \$568,000 for combatting the boll weevil was carried in the annual agriculture department supply bill reported to the house today but that a part of this money was needed now.

He added that later he would propose an amendment to reduce the \$568,000 by \$200,000 when the bill is called up later this week.

This, he said, would provide funds for immediate use and at the same time not increase the original appropriation proposed for this work.

Agriculture Bill Reported To House

WASHINGTON, Feb. 29 (AP).—Activities ranging from the furnishing of weather data for the fast growing aviation industry to the fight against the Mexican pink boll worm, the Gypsy moth, the European corn borer and the Japanese beetle were provided for today in the appropriation bill for the department of agriculture which was reported to the house.

The bill carried a grand total of \$143,319,349 for the fiscal year beginning next July 1, and standing high in its recommendations was one for the expansion of weather bureau service for aviators.

An appropriation of \$2,709,000 was recommended for the bureau, of which \$25,000 would be for the establishment of additional meteorological stations and service on commercial airways, the committee declaring that this was necessary to properly carry out meteorological service for the benefit of aviators, as contemplated by the air commerce act of 1926. A total of \$77,500,000 was recommended for road

PIONEER CITY RESIDENT DIES

W. M. GEORGE PASSES AFTER SHORT ILLNESS AT HOME HERE

William M. George, 73, pioneer cattleman of Lubbock county, died at 4:20 this morning at his home, 2021 Broadway.

His death came quietly and after an illness of several days. He had suffered with paralysis for several years but no apparent stroke accompanied his death.

Widow, Five Children
He is survived by his widow and five children, two daughters, Mrs. W. F. Johnson of Corpus Christi, and Mrs. Floy McClure of Sulphur, Oklahoma, and three sons, Elton G. George of Tahoka, O. C. George of Matador and J. Raymond George of this city. Several grandchildren also are surviving.

Mr. George has been a resident in Lubbock county for 27 years, moving here from Vernon in 1901 where he lived for several years following his departure from Tennessee, his native state. During most of his time here he had been actively engaged in the cattle business until a few years ago when his health failed him. He was in the mercantile business soon after moving here but later sold his interests. His ranch holdings were mostly in New Mexico.

Born in Tennessee
He was born in the middle Tennessee territory on February 26, 1855. He and Mrs. George had been married 53 years.

Funeral services are to be held tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock at the First Methodist church, with Rev. E. E. White, pastor, in charge. Burial will follow in the Lubbock cemetery with Rix directors in charge of the arrangements.

All of the children are expected to be present for the services tomorrow.

Kenner, of the northern federal district of Oklahoma, alleging conspiracy to defraud the government, attacks on the liberty of the press, intimidation of jurors, and denial of rights of defendants were filed with the speaker of the house today accompanied by an affidavit signed by Henry H. Stroud of Tulsa, Okla.

Clark Recovering From Accident Wounds

Ad Clark, who was seriously injured when his car plunged off of a 60 foot embankment near Crosbytown several days ago, is considerably improved reports from the sanitarium where he is confined stated today and is expected to recover rapidly. He suffered internal injuries in the accident.

MILLIONS OF DOLLARS LOST AND GAINED AS LEAP YEAR DAY RESULT, CLAIM

TENANT GAINS ON YEARLY BASIS WITH LANDLORD LOSER WHILE ANNUAL SALARIED MAN LOSES

NEW YORK, Feb. 29.—The New York World today estimates that millions of dollars will be lost and gained as a result of leap year day today.

For example, the newspaper says, the man who pays a yearly rental of \$1,200 for his apartment is ordinarily spending \$3.29 a day for a year of 365 days. Then along comes leap year and the tenant is \$3.29 to the good. The landlord's loss and the tenant's gain in New York City alone, the World estimates, is \$4,000,000 today.

On the other hand, the man who gets paid for a year of 365 days gives his services free today. For a man on a yearly salary of \$3,600 this would be \$10. The annual payroll of the United States (not including military personnel) amounts to \$798,000,000 says the World, meaning a loss to federal employees of over two million dollars.

There are a few other figures the World gives of losses and gains caused by leap year day. Gain to the United States in the interest free day for use of the money represented by the public debt—\$2,150,000.

The day's interest lost on money owed to this country by foreign powers—\$2,500,000. Amount saved by banks on savings deposits, \$931,000, which will be lost to the 15,000,000 depositors.

Loss to American bondholders, \$8,500,000. Economists whom the World consulted termed the estimated losses and gains illusory.

Wardrobing The Woman of Limited Means

NEW YORK, Feb. 29.—I have heard women say that if one had all the money in the world there would be no clothes problems.

This really is not true. The money of a woman might be counted with the unlimited means, but in the last analysis it is good taste that decides clothes problems and not money.

Of course the woman with only a given amount to spend for her clothes, and that not large, does have restrictions put upon her that the richer woman never feels. But to the woman with limited means who maintains a smart appearance goes much more credit and satisfaction than to the one who can afford anything.

I often have women ask me to help them plan a season's wardrobe that must be built around a few outfits—say three. I maintain a woman can keep up a smart appearance on the number if they are chosen properly.

Basic Rules of Choice

First, certain rules must be followed in choosing the three. They must never be startling in color, they must be of some material, they must be of some design, and they must be of some style.

Second, the three must be of different styles. I would suggest to a woman of limited means these are the two that allow more freedom of choice and are harder to pick.

The first of the three costumes must be of course a daytime dress costume that will serve for luncheon as well for matinee wear and for bridge or any occasion before five in the afternoon.

The Other Two

Second comes an afternoon dress costume. Third the evening gown. This last I omit from the illustrations for there can be little choice here. I should say if one can have only a single evening gown it must be black and this reason it would be lace, undoubtedly.

The daytime costume for springtime is the most important in the wardrobe. I have selected the type shown from among nonchalant sport models, a richly tailored ensemble, and elaborate and intricate combinations of capes and dresses or two-piece ensembles, because it is a stunning creation both in line and fabric because it is so smart and it will ever arouse admiration, but it is not so easily remembered as one of more unique cut.

It is a tweed suit, a hand-woven French tweed, tan in tone with fleckings of coffee brown, and a tiny dash of red that gives it a live cast. It is a wrap-around skirt and a lovely little collarless, cuffless but belted coat.

File belting trims it, binding all the edges and forming a wide banding around the neckline, and fashioning sham pockets. A brown crepe belt matching exactly in color, and brown suede purse and gloves bring out the color of this trimmings.

Under this suit is worn one of the smart knitted blouses with a new neckline and matching cuffs. This is a lighter, tan in tone, with dark bandings. A fox scarf and one of the smart French hats of chocolate straw trimmed with a long graceful cascade feather is also of dark brown.

Colors Are Changeable

Of course, colors should be of brown, antique and hosiery matching.

Change the blouse of this creation—wear a soft bisque satin one and lighter hosiery, gloves and perhaps a jaunty colored scarf instead of the fur and you have a totally different effect. If one wears gray better than brown

Official of the Olympic committee at Chateau de Miravalles, France, and guest of honor at the International Amateur Athletic Federation of America, estimate that a good 70 per cent of the athletes who will represent United States at Amsterdam this summer will be college graduates.

They point to a change in times, the fact that times are more prosperous, that more parents are able to send their sons to college and that many more young fellows are willing to make the sacrifice to become themselves by a foreign trip.

But in the 30 per cent of less of the athletes who will be on the American Olympic team will be found a number of old fellows who have been sticking at the game for years just because they like it.

Quite a number of them will give consent to any of these young college fellows.

There is Captain Matt McGrath of the New York police traffic department, who is one of the best athletes in the world and who has been on nearly every team that Uncle Sam has sent any place. He could throw a hammer with accuracy and he has been known to take on any Finn at tossing the 56 pound weight.

And speaking of men—You should see him in uniform! They made him get out of the police parade last year, also because he and Pat McDonald, lieutenant of traffic and a shot-putter with several records, were the whole parade!

Mike Devanney always calls up around Olympic time from the clothing end of the department where he works in New York and gives this information:

"I'm slacker" every Saturday and Sunday outdoors and every night inside and I'll be on that team, I think. I'm in great shape and even if the young guys think they're better than I do, they don't know any more than I do. They don't know half as much."

Devanney is one of the best street-chasers in the world and one of the cleanest fellows that could be found anywhere for the team. The Olympic squad needs men of his type to influence the younger college boys who, in many cases, are away from home for the first time since something happened to the constitution.

Then Joe Ray, one of the best little milters that ever ran, is coming back. Only one as cocky as Joe would try to come back with a group like Dr. Otto C. Peltzer, Pavo Nurnal and Edwin Wide already in the field. But then, Ray had nerve enough to aspire to the professional prize ring, so now that he has been restored to amateur standing, he may have a chance when he hits the track again.

And what reasons are there that McGrath, Devanney and Ray should not come back?

The hero of the 1920 games—a bigger hero than Nurnal was in 1924—was Alfred G. Hill of Great Britain, a pasteurized 40 years old, who won the 100 meter and the 150 meter championships, the toughest races on the program.

Hill had been in training only three months, but he had good reason for his success. He went out for the village Olympic trials just to encourage the youngsters, but he won himself.

Remember Hill's case when you are inclined to overlook the chaffers of the afore mentioned trio.

COACH LAUDS MODERN SKILL ON DIAMONDS

ATHLETE OF TODAY IS SUPERIOR TO OLD TIMER, IS CLAIM

BRYAN, Texas, Feb. 28.—The baseball player of today hustles harder, keeps in better condition and plays the game more on a scientific basis than did the player of 19 years ago, in the opinion of Bob Countryman of Houston, new baseball coach at Texas A & M college, who has been identified with the national game as a professional since 1914.

Many old-timers contend that the modern player does not try as hard as the ball player of yesterday, but Countryman believes that those who subscribe to that theory are badly mistaken.

Knows Texas Baseball

There perhaps is no other athlete better acquainted with professional baseball in Texas than Countryman, who has played in every league formed in this state in the past 15 years with the exceptions of the West Texas league, the Middle Texas league, the East Texas league and the Texas association. During his baseball career he has twice been sold to major league clubs but unusual circumstances resulted in the cancellation of both deals without his ever wearing the uniform of the big show.

Shipped to Bartlett

When Countryman was unable to report to Boston, the sale was called off. Bob was unable to join the San Antonio club, which was immediately sent to Bartlett in the Middle Texas league.

PARTY'S PLEDGE HELD NECESSARY IN DEMO VOTING

AUSTIN, Feb. 29.—Efforts to advance precinct conventions about instructing delegates and to announce a stand for "dry" presidential candidates failed in the state democratic executive committee meeting here Tuesday, but the committee initiated action designed to prevent anything from the party by voters not satisfied with the nominees.

A further provision that county delegations without proof of adoption of such resolutions be denied seats at the state convention was abandoned after a warm fight was made on it.

KELLOGG ASKS WAR BAN THRU ANOTHER NOTE

U. S. OFFICIAL RENEWS PLEA FOR FRANCH- U. S. TREATY

(By the Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Feb. 29.—Renewing his plea that France join with the United States in laying the groundwork for a treaty prescribing war between the principal powers, Secretary Kellogg has sent another note to France in which he opposes the contention that such a pact would violate her obligations under the League of Nations.

France has maintained "doubt whether, as a member of the League and a party to the Locarno and other treaties guaranteeing neutrality, she could enter into a multilateral treaty outlawing war as an instrument of national policy without running afoul of these obligations, and has suggested instead a treaty along this line only with the United States.

Language Precision
In his latest note, made public yesterday by the state department, Secretary Kellogg argues that the only difference between a bilateral and a multi-lateral treaty to abolish war is "one of degree and not of substance" and declares the United States is indifferent to the precise language to be used in the proposed pact so long as it "clearly and unmistakably sets forth the determination of the parties to abolish war among themselves."

Taking up France's admission that she saw no bar to the conclusion of an unqualified anti-war treaty with the United States alone, the note declares that any government free to conclude such a treaty "should be no less able to become a party to an identical multilateral treaty since it is hardly to be presumed that members of the League of Nations are in a position to do separately something they cannot do together."

Agree Among Selves
"If, however, members of the league of nations cannot without violating the terms of the covenant of the League agree among themselves and with the government of the United States to renounce war as an instrument of their national policy," the note adds, "it seems idle to discuss either bi-lateral or multi-lateral treaties unreservedly renouncing war."

Mr. Kellogg attaches significance to the recent adoption by the Pan-American conference at Havana of a resolution condemning war, pointing out that 17 of the 21 nations represented are members of the league.

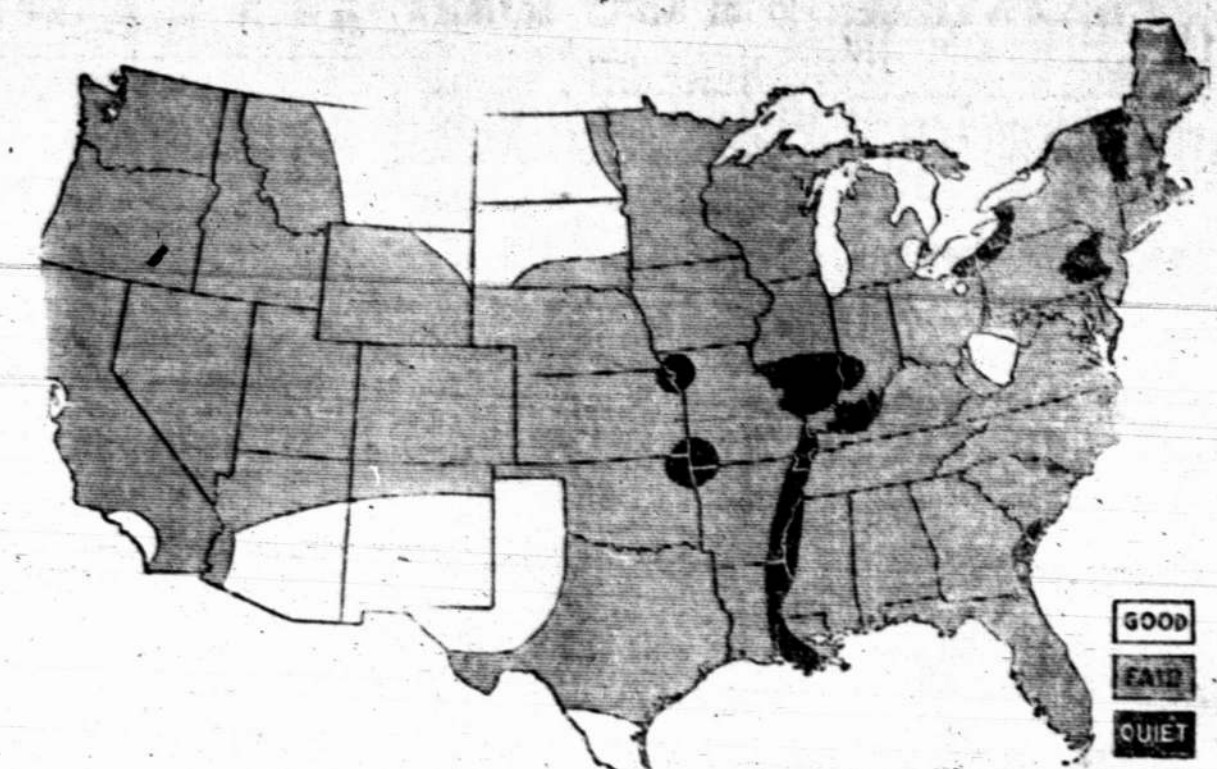

The capacity of the Comal plant at New Braunfels will be increased to 80,000 horsepower.

MOSCOW, Feb. 27.—Old and grizzled veterans who saw service in the army of the czar and youthful Communists marched shoulder to shoulder yesterday past the tomb of Lenin in celebration of the tenth anniversary of the red army.

In the wake of the troops came boys and girls pioneers singing revolutionary hymns and armed workers—men and women carrying rifles and wearing gas masks. Cannon thundered, mammoth bands blared and the multitude cheered.

Communist War Clemency Voroshiloff made a speech of the troops which seemed to be as much for the benefit of the military attaches of foreign countries present. The general idea he conveyed was: You who plot against us see with what you would have to reckon if ever you should try to defy us.

ROME, Feb. 27.—Italian troops, after six days of hard fighting against disaffected tribesmen in the North African colony of Tripoli, have obtained the last watering point held by the rebels.

The colonial ministry, in announcing defeat of the rebel tribesmen, said that the Italian casualties were five officers wounded and two hundred other ranks killed or wounded. The points captured were the Zelligas and the wells and springs of Tergit.

Man Released For Contempt Charges
AUSTIN, Feb. 28.—Release of E. J. Ratliff from a \$100 fine and three day jail sentence imposed in San Antonio for alleged contempt of seventy third district court, was ordered Wednesday by the supreme court, which found that he has been deprived of his liberty and property without due process of law in violation of the federal and state constitutions.

Ratliff was adjudged guilty of violating the terms of a temporary injunction, which forbade him to dispose of certain notes involved in a civil suit against him by Mrs. Clyde Martin. He was sentenced without a hearing on the contempt charges growing out of developments at a hearing of his motion to dissolve the injunction. He claimed he had sold the notes before the injunction was ordered. The court decided that the disposal was afterward.

Extension Sought For Texas Railroad

AUSTIN, Feb. 28.—The St. Louis Brownsville and Mexico railroad Wednesday filed application with the railroad commission for permission to extend its South Texas lines a total of 34 miles.

The company would run one extension 25 miles from a point between Brazoria and Allenhurst northwest to near the Fort Bend Wharton county line and the other 9 miles from near Alago northwest to the Galveston, Houston and Henderson company's line near Dickinson. The last named proposed extension would be entirely in Galveston county.

Attorney General Claud Pollard obtained an injunction in Travis county district court but the appeals court last week dissolved it and reversed the case.

Conferences Monday and Tuesday between Gov. Moody, Mr. Pollard, Game Commissioner Tucker and Humble attorneys did not result in the desired compromise. The state refusing to concede the corporation the right the appeals court held inherent in it.

STRUGGLE OVER NEAR EAST OIL WAS INEVITABLE BETWEEN AMERICAN AND ENGLISH INTERESTS, DUTCHER SAYS

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the eighth of a series of articles on "How Long Will Our Oil Last?"

By RODNEY DUTCHER

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26.—The oil reserves of Persia, Mesopotamia and Turkey have been estimated at nearly six billion barrels, so it was inevitable that British and American petroleum interests should clash in a struggle for control in the Near East.

At one stage of that struggle there was even a serious discussion of the possibility of a war between Britain and the United States.

Competition between the Standard and Anglo-Persian oil companies finally dispelled the war clouds, but not before the world had observed the seriousness of the constant battle for its oil resources.

Mesopotamia and Persia are two different stories. Let's consider the Mesopotamian story first.

Oil Mandates. Undoubtedly with an eye to oil, Great Britain obtained League of Nations mandates in Palestine and Mesopotamia after the war and France took over Syria. Britain had sent more troops into this territory than military necessities warranted and apparently in an effort to obtain French aid they had promised her a barren area in Northeast Mesopotamia which proved to include the rich petroleum fields around Mosul. Chaos for a time governed the region as a result of Anglo-French-Turkish warfare and intrigue, but in 1921 France and Turkey signed a treaty giving the territory to Turkey and its oil to France. This left Britain out in the cold, and very angry.

In the spring of 1921 the British had made their man Pasha, king of the new state of Iraq, Iraq's boundaries were not defined, presumably in the hope that it might be stretched out to include Mosul. Shortly prior to the Lausanne conference of 1922, which was to revise the Turkish peace treaty of Sevres, an Iraqi army, led by Anglo-Indian officers, took over the oil region "to defend and liberate their countrymen from the oppression of the Turks."

Britain and France framed an ultimatum for presentation to the Turks at Lausanne which was supposed to have been agreed to by France's return for British support of Poincaré's occupation of the Ruhr. This would have turned all the Mesopotamian oil over to England. But France suddenly

deserted Britain. The conference broke up and reassembled in April, 1923.

U. S. Protests.

The United States had not been asleep all this time. It woke up, in fact, about the time of the Franco-British San Remo petroleum agreement of 1920, which divided up the oil between Britain and France to the virtual exclusion of the United States. President Wilson had protested this partition and at his direction Ambassador John W. Davis advised the British Foreign Office that the San Remo agreement would result in a grave infringement of the mandate principle.

Authorities saw a "dangerous" situation. Oil was regarded as a potential cause of war.

Serious trouble probably was averted by a deal through which the Anglo-Persian company let Standard Oil in Mesopotamia and Standard let Anglo-Persian in on her concession in the North Persian fields. Everyone began to talk peace and brotherly love again and the League of Nations soon ratified the mandates America had protested.

In the next year, the Persian parliament defied the big powers and broke up the British-American deal by refusing to ratify the Standard concession because of the British participation. The American State Department protested, but obtained no satisfaction.

Second Lausanne Conference.

Thus in April, 1923, the second Lausanne conference found America on hand to protect her oil interests in Mesopotamia, demanding an economic "open door" in all mandates. It apparently found her in a strong position, for Admiral Chester, representing American financiers, had obtained a concession from Turkey which in effect would have given America nearly all Mesopotamian oil in sight. America lined up behind Turkey with France, and against Britain.

The British then promised Turkey everything she wanted except the oil. It was agreed that Constantinople should be evacuated and control of the Dardanelles and Bosphorus restored to the Turks. Some authorities say that Britain worked vigorously in Washington to save the oil, playing on American interest in her foreign debts and the forthcoming Dawes plan conference. An Anglo-American reapportionment resulted. France deserted Turkey rather than to be left holding the bag both in the reparations matter and at the conference and Turkey had to agree to leave open the question of the Mesopotamian frontier. Diplomatic support of the Chester concession passed out of the picture.

Under the Lausanne treaty thus negotiated the League of Nations

finally awarded Mosul to Iraq, which made a cash settlement with Turkey for the oil rights. Last year an agreement was completed for a company to exploit the Mesopotamian fields, by which shares and production are to be split four ways. The Royal Dutch Shell, the Anglo-Persian, a French group and an American group dominated by Standard Oil each have a 25 per cent interest, with the British dominating.

A 90,000-Barrel Gusher. The news late in October that the first well in Mosul had been brought in, proving to be a 90,000-a-day gusher impossible at first to control, was regarded here as a signal for the battle for Mesopotamian oil to start all over again, through all sorts of skulduggery.

Meanwhile, the rich fields of North Persia lie idle. Anglo-Persian long ago gained control of the South Persia fields, but North Persia was a Russian sphere of influence. Before the Russian revolution, the czar's men forced concessions there from Persia and these were sold to Anglo-Persian when the Bolsheviks gained control. Both Russia and Persia repudiated these concessions in 1921 and Anglo-Persian hasn't had a foothold there since. The only outlet for North Persia oil is through Russia and, furthermore, Persia doesn't want British oil men to dominate her whole area and Persia's Russian wants them to near the Caucasus.

NAVY REFUSES TO GIVE UP IN HUNT FOR TRIO

APPARENTLY HOPELESS SEARCH IS ORDERED CONTINUED TODAY

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Feb. 26.—The navy, cognizant of its great losses in recent years in aviation, is conducting the greatest aerial search in its history with the hope of retrieving from an almost certain death three more of its gallant aviators.

With the break of dawn, 22 navy and marine corps planes and two army blimps, were under orders to intensify the search, conducted all day yesterday in vain, for Commander G. E. Ely, Lieutenant Commander Hugo Schmidt, and Lieutenant Rogers Rowshoven, missing since they took off from the Norfolk base at 2 o'clock Monday morning for Annapolis.

The plane, a big Amphibian number 232, was piloted by Ranselou and was taking Elyson, first to qualify as a naval aviator, to Annapolis to visit a 12-year-old daughter critically ill in the naval hospital. It should have made the trip in two hours, naval aviators say.

Hope Still Held In Brooks Search

MELBOURNE, Fla., Feb. 26.—Undismayed by their long unsuccessful questioning searches along the coast today hoped that the waves would cast ashore the body of Harry Brooks, chief pilot of the Ford Motor company, who plunged with his small monoplane into the ocean last Saturday.

Although under ordinary circumstances it was believed that the body would have appeared during yesterday, if it was ever to appear, the theory persisted that some of the reef formations along the irregular beach may have held the body hidden under water and that the breakers would eventually bring it shoreward.

New Hope Is Fired. Hope which had almost dwindled away was fired for a time to new heights yesterday when an object was sighted off shore, apparently a human body.

A seaplane flew over the spot where the object was seen and a buoy was dropped. Boats returning to the spot later, however, could discover no trace of the object, which had appeared to the watchers.

Plans were laid to continue the search until all chance of success had vanished and citizens were planning a public funeral on the beach as a tribute to the pilot.

Paris Paper Lauds War Outlawry Note

PARIS, Feb. 26.—Le Petit Parisien today says that Secretary Kellogg's latest note on the outlawry of war marks genuine progress over the preceding ones and permits the continued hope that one day a formula satisfying all the requirements and duties of the two governments will be found. The opinion of France's most widely circulated newspaper is shared generally by the others.

Pertinax writing in L'Echo de Paris, however, strikes a sardonic note. Secretary Kellogg, he observes, acts as if he hadn't understood our arguments. None so deaf as he who will not hear. The discussion is resumed. It only remains for us to rewrite our note of January 20 and play deafness on our part too.

NARCOTIC WAR MORE INTENSE

DRIVE ON SMUGGLING, SOURCE OF SUPPLY, PLANNED IN U. S.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Feb. 26.—Admittedly up against it in its enforcement of the Harrison narcotic act, the federal narcotic bureau has now started an unrelenting drive against smuggling, which it regards as virtually the only source of supply for illicit drugs.

Although federal officials believe they are holding their own in the battle against the nationwide drug ring, they confess that with the present facilities it will be impossible to wipe out the habit in the United States unless the foreign importations of morphine, cocaine and opium, beyond the legal limit, are shut off entirely.

100,000 Addicts.

A national survey recently completed by the public health service, the bureau says, disclosed 100,000 addicts in the United States using about 420,000 ounces of drugs annually. Eighty five per cent of the drugs are smuggled through New York, it declares, although some slip through other ports and across the Mexican border. The drug ring operates along systematic lines, federal officials explain. The large importers sell the drugs in large quantities to the wholesale dealers for as low as eleven dollars an ounce and it passes through various dealers until the addict is required to pay \$437.50 an ounce, which he purchases in one grain capsules at one dollar each. This enormous profit, they point out, is a constant lure for the dope dealers.

limited areas with a concentration of infective material from which the livestock has no escape.

Producers Lose Ground

While the foot and mouth disease and hog cholera had been almost eradicated, he said, livestock producers are "losing ground" to other industries and diseases yearly. He cited as the most prevalent the sheep liver flukes which are "widening their range in the Pacific, Rocky Mountain and Southern states," the tapeworms, stomach worms and roundworms which must be controlled to put the livestock industry of the south on a safe basis, and anaplasmosis, a blood parasite disease, especially common among cattle in the south and southwest.

Discussing poultry diseases, Dr. Mohler said that the blackhead had

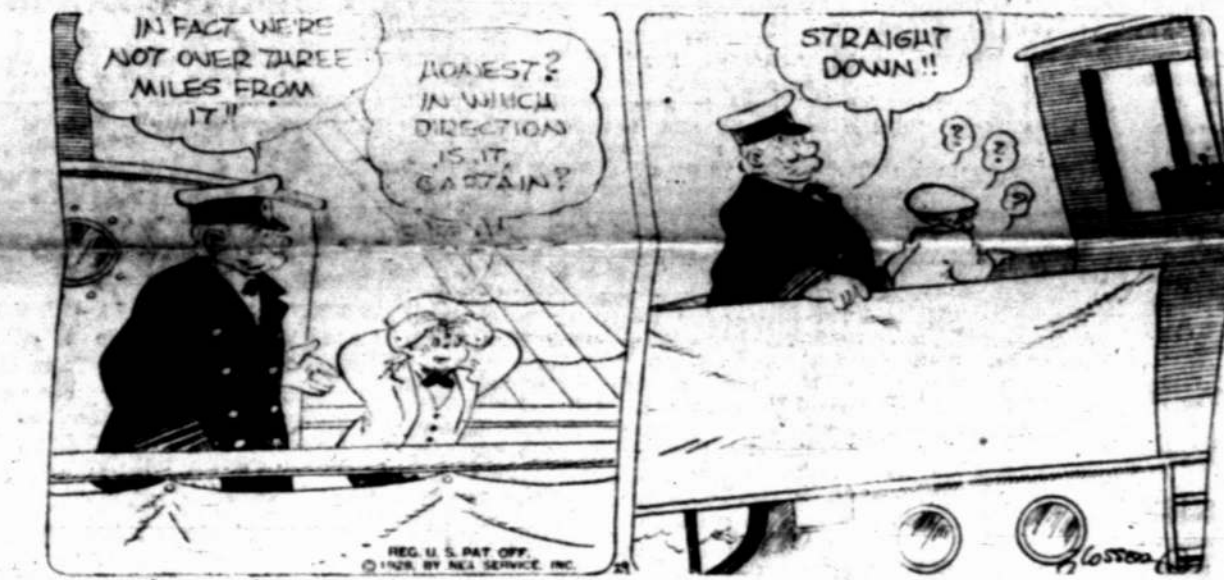
