Honey Grove Downs Rebels

The Honey Grove Warriors combined a potent attack and a tough defense to stop the Rivercrest Rebels 27-0 at Honey Grove Friday night.

Rivercrest took the opening kickoff and Lavene Norman moved them to a first down with a nine yard smash into the line followed by a six yard pass reception. Pattison slashed in from the secondary on the first down play and caught Rebel back Joe Simpson for a ten yard loss. Moss followed with a spectacular pass interception to give Honey Grove their first possession on the Rebel 44 yard line. The Warriors moved to the 5 yard line in seven plays.

A fumbled pitchout turned the ball back to the Rebels on the ten. On first down Gray sped in from his defensive end position and took a pitchout away from the Rebel halfback to give the ball back to the Warriors on the six yard line. Gray then carried to the one and on second down Pattison went up the middle for the touchdown. Moran kicked the extra point and Honey Grove was out front 7-0 in opening period.

The Rebels took the kickoff and moved for three first down in a row starting on their own ten. The Warrior defense dug in at midfield and forced a punt, getting possession on their own 34 yard line. Hohenberger passed to Moss for a 26 yard gain but that was all the offensive the Warriors could muster on this drive.

The Rebels could not move and punted out to the Warrior 20 yard line with Morris returning it to the 41. A first down fumble was grabbed off by Rebel back Troy Brown. Again Honey Grove defense would not give ground.

The fine kick by Roger Weatherall put the Warriors deep in the hole at their own six yard line. Honey Grove then marched 94 yards in eight plays to score again. Extra point try failed so the score held at 13-0. The Warriors made a final drive in the closing seconds of the half but a fumble gave the Rebels possession on the five yard line.

The teams opened the second half swapping the ball back and forth with neither able to muster a sustained drive until late in the third period when Gray for Honey Grove broke for 35 yards and with a 15 yard penalty tacked on, the Warriors were in business at the eleven and line. Hohenberger went over for the touchdown on third down, and the extra point was added to increase the Warriors lead to 20-0.

The final Honey Grove TD came early in the last quarter when Gray outran the Rebels 30 yards to score. Extra point was made to make the final tally: Honey Grove 27, Rivercrest 0.

For the Rebels corner back George Marshall gets the honors for defensive play. The 150 pounder proved to be a deadly tackler and very difficult to block out of a play.

The Rebels return home this week to put their 1-1 record on the line, facing Hallsville at Rivercrest.

Austin. — Gov. Preston Smith has signed into law a \$5.8 billion 1970-71 state budget. This was after vetoing \$4.4 million in miscellaneous spending items. Yet the expenditure set an all-time record.

Earlier, Smith approved a new record \$348.6 billion tax bill which takes effect October 1. (In addition to state revenue, cities will get an estimated \$3 million a year due to extension of the sales tax on beer and liquor. Sales tax rate goes up from 3 to 3.25 per cent.)

Smith also signed other acts of the special session, including legislation creating 28 new Texas district courts. He will name all judges to serve until the next general election. This may be the largest single amount of judicial patronage assigned a Texas governor at one time in state history.

Tax bill as passed by the Legislature provided plenty of revenue to fill the State's needs, but Smith said his vetoes are "justified for the sake of economy perhaps more than for anything else." Many of the items vetoed, he noted, were not part of the original House or Senate appropriations acts, and some were not even requested by agencies.

Governor Smith vetoed the following items as now "unjustified or non-essential": Construction funds totaling \$2.9 million for the Dallas Neuropsychiatric Institute; \$62,717 for the Department of Public Safety sub-district headquarters in McAllen; \$250,000 for the Junction adjunct of Texas A&M; \$160,000 for Texas Maritime Academy Pelican Island Development.

Also an appropriation of \$225,000 for contracts of private lawyers to assist the Attorney General in tort claims cases in 1971; \$172,000 for park land acquisition in Hardeman and/or Motley counties; \$207,500 for acquiring land and development of Port Lavaca Causeway State Park; \$50,000 for drilling a water well at Lyndon B. Johnson State Park in Gillespie County; \$25,000 for Longhorn Cavern State Park; \$29,000 for completion of a master plan for the Red River Authority; \$60,000 for a fish raising facility at Stephen F. Austin College in Nacogdoches, and \$65,000 for environmental pollution control studies at Prairie View Agricultural and Mechanical College.

BARNES FOR SENATE? — Is Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, 31, about to become a candidate for the U. S. Senate against Sen. Ralph W. Yarborough, 66?

Nobody can truthfully claim to know the answer to that, including Barnes himself, who says he has not yet made up his mind.

Yet, Governor Smith opened up new speculation on the subject during the recent Southern Governors Conference at Williamsburg, Ga.

Asked by reporters if he thinks Barnes could beat Yarborough, Smith said he believes that is possible — depending on the kind of races run by each, their financial resources and a lot of imponderables.

Smith didn't claim to know, but the fact he was willing to discuss the prospective race at all was an indicator of the widespread circulation of the Barnes-Yarborough contest rumor.

Smith also told newsmen he feels Yarborough is in the best political position he has enjoyed since he went to Washington more than a decade ago.

WEEK OF PRAYER AT CALVARY CHURCH

Smith will, he emphasized, take no hand in the Senate race no matter who the candidates are.

LEASE SALES SET — A total of 338 tracts of University of Texas lands (111,812 acres) in West Texas will be placed on lease auction, December 16. November 4, some 768 tracts totaling 496,871 acres will be offered in a school land sale.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler said 125 tracts of university land in Hudspeth County will be offered at bonuses of not less than \$1,000 per half section and at annual lease rentals of \$1.50 an acre. This was reduced from former requirements of \$5,000 per quarter section and \$2 per acre. Former requirements will govern other tract leases.

In school land sale, 37 tracts in El Paso County had acceptable bonus reduced to \$5 an acre and annual rental to \$2. Other upland and riverbed tracts will command a \$20 per acre bonus and \$5 per acre annual rental. Those lying under bays, inlets and Gulf of Mexico lands will go at \$25 an acre and a \$5 per acre annual rental. Most of school land is in Gulf Coast submerged areas.

ATTORNEY GEN. SPEAKS — University of Texas cannot strip Dr. James McCrocklin, former Southwest Texas State University president, of his Ph.D. degree, and court action would be necessary to annul it, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin said.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

• Commercial feeding lots "finishing out" cattle for market must provide county tax collectors a list showing the numbers of cattle they need for each owner, on January 1.

• New type liquor wholesalers permit does not discriminate against other permit holders, and is constitutional.

• Harris County commissioners may grant the county sheriff and his deputies the same authority DPS officers have, to remove vehicles from county roads.

• Depository interest earned on special constitutional funds or federal trust funds created for specific purposes should be deposited to the credit of those specific funds rather than the general revenue fund.

• Employees of the House and Senate are not part of the class of elected officials for purposes of membership in the state employees retirement system. Therefore, they are not eligible to make contributions or receive benefits as elected personnel. Only officers of the two houses who are required to take the constitutional oath of office, can be so considered.

SCHOOL DISTRICTS WARNED — More than a dozen Texas school districts have drawn warning of deficiencies from the State Board of Education.

Crosby Independent School District lost its accreditation but can regain it when it meets state requirements.

Alpine received final warnings it may lose accreditation if conditions are not approved.

Also warned were Antelope, Bertram, Bridgeport, Calvert, Hemphill, Masonic Home, Pewitt, Rains, Elvairo, Spur, Thompson and Little Elm.

State Board decided to permit 16-year-olds to enroll in adult basic education programs. New department of special education and special schools organization was approved.

Cotton Harvest Delayed By Rain

The fall season arrived Tuesday with rain falling on the last day of summer. Rain fell Monday morning and again about 3:30 a. m. Tuesday. The latter was heavier than the amount that fell the previous day. Total amount of precipitation was not available at press time.

Harvesting of the cotton crop was delayed by the rains. Three area gins have turned out 1648 bales of cotton for the season up until Wednesday morning. Blackland Prairie had turned out 1026, Home Gin 317 and Cunningham gin 305 bales. Seed price remained at the season's opening figure of \$37 a ton.

Cooper formerly lived on Talco Rt. 1 and attended Talco School.

Smith was found guilty of the Sept. 3, 1968 murder of Cooper at 416 Robison Courts, where Cooper was visiting friends.

Defense attorneys Roscoe Jones and J. Ray Gayle said they would appeal the case. They have 10 days in which to file the appeal with Judge Nunn before formal sentencing of Smith.

Physicals

Back-to-school days are here again. Along with new notebooks, paper, and pencils, you should send your youngster back to school with a thorough physical examination. If done every year, this keeps examinations on a regular basis as they should be, and prepares your child for the busy school year ahead. The physical should include an eye examination and a hearing test. If your child has not received all the necessary immunizations for good health (such as vaccines against polio, measles and tetanus) this is a good time to have him inoculated.



Proper Diet

A mother-to-be should do everything possible to insure her own good health, as well as that of her baby. The first three months of pregnancy can be vital. Each day mother and baby need plenty of protein for building body tissue, calcium for strong bones, plus iron for red blood cells. Protein foods include meat, fish, poultry, milk, eggs, cheeses, breads, and cereals. Calcium and iron are usually supplemented to the diet through vitamins prescribed by the doctor. Remember: see your physician regularly during pregnancy and eat intelligently.



Minor Burns

Cold water can be an effective treatment for minor burns. It relieves pain and reduces the tissue temperature. This lessens the possibility of scarring and promotes faster healing. Severe burns should be cared for by a doctor to insure the prevention of infection, and also in treating the victim for shock.

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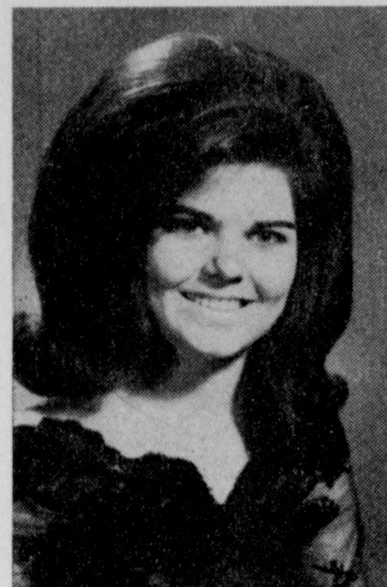

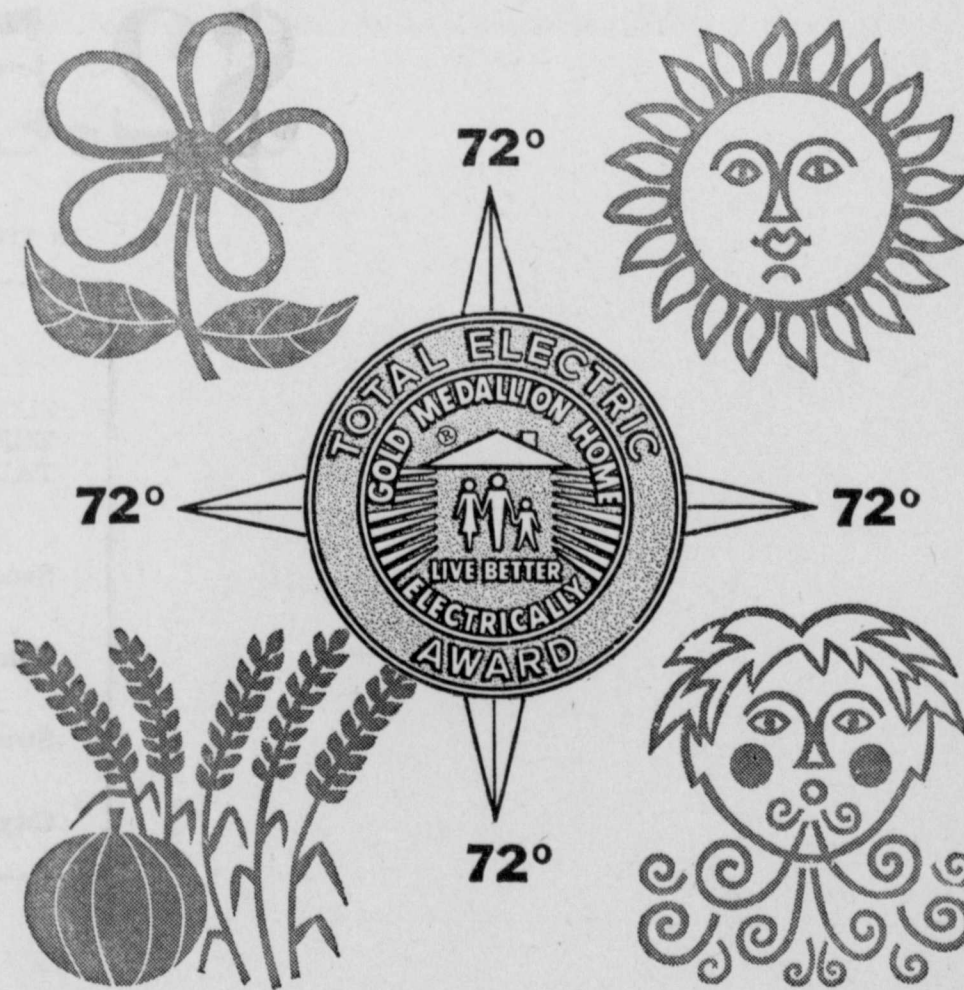
