

Hall's Office Continuing To Serve District

The Washington and Texas congressional offices of the Honorable Sam B. Hall, Jr., who resigned from the House of Representatives to become a Federal Judge, are continuing to serve the people of the First District under the supervision of the

Clerk of the House of Representatives.

The staff of Congressman Hall remains intact to handle casework, to help in handling business with the executive branch of the government and

to provide information on pending legislation.

Benjamin J. Guthrie, Clerk of the House, said that the Washington and the district offices in Marshall, Texarkana and Paris will remain open on a daily basis for the immediate future

to handle congressional business. The office in Jacksonville is open on Fridays only. Under house rules, the Clerk manages the offices when a member dies or resigns. Guthrie said that three House vacancies occurred in the 99th congress.

Guthrie said that an administrator has been appointed to operate the Hall offices, he is Kenneth L. Black, who was administrative assistant to Congressman Hall. The staff members in the various Texas offices remain the same.

Egypt...A Land Of Past And Present All Life Depends On The Nile

The world is different from place to place. There are perhaps as great a difference as can be imagined between North East Texas and Egypt in the Middle East.

It has been a dream all my life to travel to Egypt and see the tombs and temples of the ancient Egyptians, a people who had an advanced civilization before the rest of us came out of our mud huts.

What I was not prepared for was the generosity and friendliness of the modern Egyptian (If the word modern can be applied). Nor was I prepared for the sight of people living and working in exactly the same manner that they lived and worked a thousand years ago.

Over the next few weeks I will try to catalog a few of these sights and sounds for you, and to report on a country and life that is vastly different from our own.

It all began when our good friends, Jayne and Dicky King, were visiting one evening.

Jayne and I tried to talk the boys into going to Egypt...but they absolutely refused. They casually told us "If you want to go so bad, go without us."

When we booked our flight they were a little startled...I don't think they actually thought we would do it.

So we took the seventeen hour flight to Cairo, and looking down from the big jet realized that what had been ocean for so many thousands of miles had turned into desert.

There were miles and miles of sand, sculpted into waves, unbroken by any sign of life or road.

And then, shimmering in the distance like an emerald lay the green, fertile valley that is the Nile

river and the beautiful banks that line each side.

The Nile river is the longest in the world. It is, quite literally, the source of all life in Egypt. Without it there would be no country, no life, no people.

The Egyptians love their river, they have assigned it a prominent place in their past, and in their present.

Before our trip was over we loved it too. For it provided the precious water that causes the crops to grow, the palm trees to bear fruit, the fields to flourish.

Surprisingly, in a country fraught with sand storms and dirt, the river Nile is clean and clear.

In Egypt there are only about three days of rain each year! They depend not at all on these rains, but strictly on the irrigation water from the river.

It is strange to find out that they feel a little sorry for those of us without a dependable river to use...but have to rely on the whims of water from the sky!

Upon the surface of the river float silent Feluccas, sail boats with tall, triangular sail that are shown on the walls of tombs four thousand years old...virtually unchanged from that time.

All life huddles on the edge of the river, drawing sustenance from it.

Cairo, a city of 14 million people, teems upon the banks of the Nile in a

noisy, sprawling celebration of the dependable water.

Later, as we sailed on a ship down the length of the river, we saw children swimming and bathing, adults washing, water buffalo lying in its cool shallows.

Next week we will discuss the city itself, and the amazing traffic conditions!

Thirty-four year old Billy W. Flanagan is a fourth generation East Texan and a native of Mt. Pleasant. He is a graduate of Southern Methodist University School of Business, 1973, and School of Law, 1976. After graduating from law school, Flanagan returned to Mt. Pleasant to practice law with his father, former State Representative and four-term District Attorney, Alford H. Flanagan.

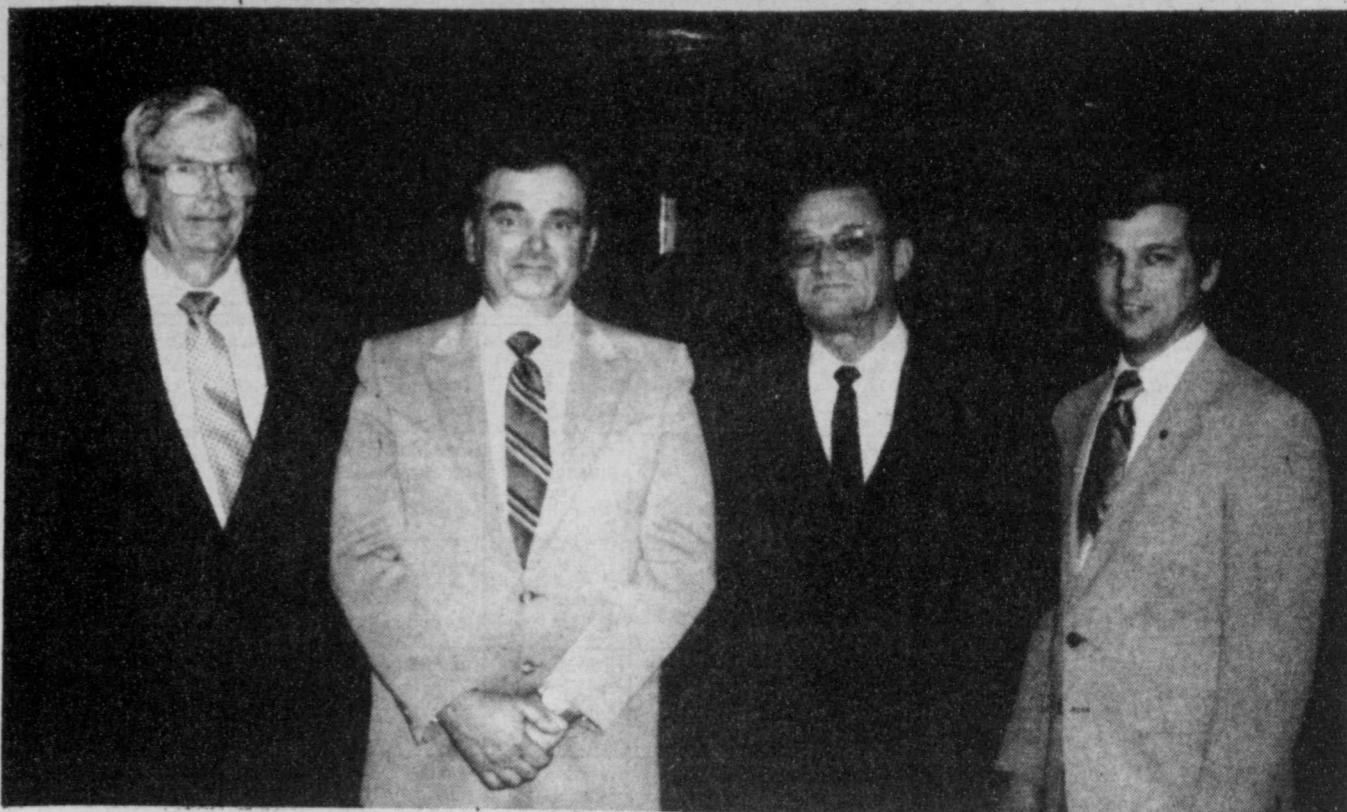

BUDDY'S WORKSHOP

Retouch Appliances To Prevent Rust

What should one use to prevent scratches on the refrigerator from causing rust?

If the refrigerator, or any other kitchen appliance is scratched down to bare metal, it should be touched up without delay. Paint centers and hardware stores should be able to match the paint color with "touch up" kits. If not, match the color in a good enamel. Apply only enough touch up paint or enamel to fill the scratch. Don't brush on, but apply with cotton or soft cloth wrapped around the end of a toothpick or a wooden match.

What causes floor boards to squeak when someone walks over them?

Squeaks are caused by loose boards--rubbing board against board or board against nail. Getting rid of the squeak is as simple as locating the problem board and securing it firmly. You may have to do the job from the basement by driving a wedge into the space between the board and a cross beam. You may be able to make repairs with a good strong glue. Apply glue liberally to the loose board and to a support member, then place a heavy object on the top of the board to establish firm contact. The simplest and strongest repair, however, is a nail but this may not be possible on fine hardwood floors.

Economics of Hay Production

Each year, hay producers are faced with the economics of how much fertilizer, especially nitrogen, should be applied on hay meadows. Wayne Taylor, economist, management for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says that the answer can be calculated by the cost of nitrogen and the value of the hay produced.

With nitrogen selling at 28 cents per pound and the value of hay at \$70 per ton, 254 pounds of nitrogen is optimum. With the same price of nitrogen, but hay valued at \$100 per ton, the optimum amount of nitrogen is 548 pounds per acre.

The cost of producing hay this year in East Texas is also important to the producer. The cost of round bales, figuring 6.6 tons of hay per acre, is almost \$47 per ton or \$28.09 per 1,200 pound roll. These figures include only the variable cost and do not include the fixed costs associated with the hay production.

For square bales, the variable costs per bale is \$1.57 based on 220 bales per acre. Square bales will cost \$52.23 per ton, slightly higher than the cost of putting up round bales. Again, fixed costs are not included.

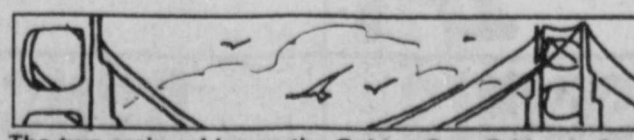

PJC Sponsors Follow Up Program

Watering Time Coming Up

Although we have had abundant rainfall this spring, it could soon be time to begin watering gardens and lawns. With decreasing fresh water supplies, one might consider using graywater. Household wate, or gray water, can be used without hurting the plants if reasonable care is taken. Examples of graywater would be dishwater, bathwater and laundry water. Before going out and watering our tomatoes with household water,

there are a few things we should consider.

If your home has a water softener, your household water contains more sodium that it would otherwise, but it is still usable with some precautions. Over large periods of time, sodium may cause soils to become tighter and resist water penetration. If necessary, you can counteract this by mixing gypsum into the soil surface. If your home does not have a water softener, your bathwater and rinse water from dishes and laundry are all of good quality for irrigation.

Soapy wash water from dishes and laundry will help keep plants alive in an emergency, but you should be aware of certain problems.

Bleaches commonly contain chlorine which can damage plants. One symptom of damage is a bleached appearance of new, expanding leaves. If you planned to irrigate plants with washcycle water, it would be safer not to use bleach.

Some laundry products contain boron. High levels of boron also can be toxic to plants. You won't be able to determine the boron content by reading the label on the container but look at the trade name. If it sounds like boron or borax the product has higher levels of boron and should not be used for irrigation.

Additional rules for irrigating with used water that will reduce the chances of plant damage:

1. If you use wash cycle water, mix it with the rinse cycle water.
2. Watch closely for signs of plant damage. If certain plants show symptoms first, they probably are more sensitive. Irrigate them with better quality water.
3. Don't use wash water for potted plants. With their restricted root zones they are much more subject to damage. You might save cold water from the shower for potted plants or other special uses.
4. Don't pour water directly at the base of tree trunks or shrubs. This may cause crown rot, besides the feeder roots that take up water are located further out.
5. Be sure you apply enough water so the plants get a good drink. If you just wet the surface of the ground around deeper rooted plants, they will get little benefit.
