Wilson Greatest Story Teller Since Lincoln

No man in public life since Lincoln has been more given to storytelling than the president-elect. One of the most effective in the recent campaign was his illustration of how he licked the bosses in New Jersey.

"It did not require courage to fight the bosses," he said, "after the people of New Jersey had instructed me to do it and after the bosses had discovered that I would do what I said I would. It was usually not necessary to do it after saying I intended to do it. It was like Davy Crockett and the coon. You know, when the coon saw Davy had a head on him he said: 'Don't shoot, Mr. Crockett, I'll come down.'"

Wilson also enjoys a good story for the story's sake, and is pretty sure to tell one or two during any general conversation to which he is a party. One of the best he has told recently is on his brother college president, Hadley of Yale.

"President Hadley was playing tennis and the bath tub was full of water waiting for him when Mrs. Hadley found their young son sailing ships on it. She reproved him severely and sent him into the yard. He went out onto the street and happened to meet an old lady, to whom he said:

"The president of Yale will not take his accustomed bath today."

"The old lady was astonished. The boy tipped out again. The president of Yale will not take his accustomed bath today."

"Why not?" she asked. The boy replied: "Because I have the stopper in my pocket."

It is probably safe to assume that if the election had been left to the members of the Denver Press club Wilson would have been chosen unanimously, for on one of his visits to Denver he so endeared himself to the Rocky Mountain newspaper men that they're talking about him yet. The crowd at the Press club reception to greet him was so great there were not seats for all, so the party sat about the floor, Indian fashion, and told stories the chief story teller being the governor of New Jersey.

As the evening progressed the stories got better and better and Wilson and his hosts got friendlier and mellowed. The newspaper boys were alternating their stories with various liquids, carefully handing the governor each time a lemonade or a white soda or something else "soft" and not presuming to offend him by suggesting that he take anything stronger. After consuming three or four such drinks, Wilson glanced about the circle of squatted figures with a mischievous grin and said:

"By birth I am an American, by parentage I am Irish, but by thirst I am Scotch."

The crowd took the hint with a whoop.

When Wilson returned from the trip on a sailing yacht, where he wrote his letter of acceptance of the democratic nomination, he produced the following limerick, prompted by a week on the ocean:

I wish that my room had a Moor,
I don't care so much for a door,
But this walking around
Without touching the ground
Is getting to be such a bore.

The president-elect's full name is Thomas Woodrow Wilson, but he has not used the Thomas since soon after he left college. People who didn't know this were therefore astonished when, at Gary, Ind., as the democratic candidate stepped onto a platform to make a speech, a stout man jumped up, rushed over to him, hammered him on the back and yelled:

"Hello Tommy, how are you?"

"Tommy" was equally surprised, but he jumped the fat man's hand up and down, laughed happily and exclaimed:

"Why, hello, Bob; what are you doing here? My, but I'm glad to see you!"

Bob was an "old, old friend, ex-Governor Glenn of North Carolina."

At one of Governor Wilson's big pre-election meetings I overheard this conversation between two women in the crowd that stormed the candidate as he entered and left the hall.

"Did you get to shake hands with him?"

"Yes, and it was no trouble at all. Did you?"

"You bet. He just reached right out, smiled and shook hands. Why he's just like anybody else."

No incident illustrates more strikingly the prevailing opinion of the personality of Woodrow Wilson and

the actual fact of his unconventional genial nature. When he began his campaign most people pictured him as a reserved, cold-blooded, aristocratic individual. The fact is, he's about as "human" as possible to imagine a man to be.

"It grieves me terribly," he once said to me, "to realize that there are a lot of people who think that, merely because I've been a college professor, I'm a stiff old ass who does not know anything."

One day Wilson was making a speech in Indiana when a switch engine jolted the train a rod or two. Quick as a flash Wilson said with a smile: "I don't like to talk from a shifty platform. I'd rather talk on a platform that stays put—like the platform constructed at Baltimore."

Coming through New England one night the Wilson train stopped and a crowd in the half-lights of the station called for him. He stepped onto the rear platform and some body cried:

"This is Waterbury, governor."

The candidate shot back: "That's all right; my watch is wound up." But President-elect Wilson is not always the genial, good natured man indicated by these stories. His "humanness" is complete. He has a temper. Usually he keeps it pretty well under control, but he's just enough like other folks to lose it sometimes and get plain downright, naturally mad. That happened once or twice during his campaign.

In one city he was halted by a reception committee in the lobby of a hotel, to wait a few minutes until the reception committee of another organization took him in charge. He had been making 10 or 15 speeches all day, traveling for a week on a train, subjecting himself to being crushed by crowds, shaking hands with both hands for hours and otherwise indulging in presidential campaigning of the most tiring sort. Instead of taking him to a quiet corner to wait for the other committee, those in charge had taken him into the lobby, where the crowd made for him. Wilson stepped into a side corridor, through an open door and into a vacant room. A committeeman beat it after him, grabbed his arm, started to drag him out and cried:

"Here, you don't want to stay in the corner this way; you want to come out where the people can see you."

Wilson jerked quickly away from the committeeman, turned upon him, stuck his long jaw forward and snapped out:

"Now, my friend, perhaps I know as much about where I want to go as you do. I'm not such a plain fool as I look. When I came in here I came because I am free, white, and 21, fully capable of managing my own affairs and privileged to do whatever I please without any advice from anybody."

WICHITA COUNTY EXHIBIT
AT THE COTTON PALACE

The Wichita County exhibit at the Cotton Palace at Waco is attracting much attention and is giving the city and county more advertising than the same exhibit did at the Dallas Fair.

A recent issue of the Waco News contained the following comment on the exhibit:

The Wichita county exhibit at the Cotton Palace, showing various products of diversified farming is convincing that Northwest Texas can produce equally as good corn, oats, wheat, milo, maize, kafir, corn, grubs and vegetables as can be grown anywhere in Texas. In this exhibit is shown the premium bale of long-staple cotton which produced more than a bale to the acre. The manufactured products on exhibit from Wichita Falls include brooms, pottery, brick, flour, automobiles, mattresses, etc.

In the background of the exhibit is seen a picture of beautiful Lake Wichita, the largest artificial body of water in the entire southwest, covering an area of 3200 acres and containing abundant water to supply any city in Texas for a period of two years without one drop being added to the supply.

Wichita Falls, the county seat of Wichita county, is located 114 miles west of Fort Worth on the Fort Worth & Denver railroad and 158 miles southwest of Oklahoma City. This little city has been made famous by its enterprising people, who are making of it a manufacturing center which is demonstrated by the fact that at the present time they have in operation

thirty-eight manufacturing plants, including automobiles, window glass, glass bottles, pottery, flour, brick and other things.

Another attractive feature of this exhibit are two hand-painted pictures of Wichita Falls, one in 1889 and the other in 1910, the former portraying but seven meager cabins while the latter shows convincingly that thirty years' growth of this northwestern city has been remarkable. The city now has a population of about 15,000 people, all of whom are natives or adopted boosters.

Near Wichita Falls is located one of the largest, if not the largest, natural gas fields in the world, with ever-increasing single wells supplying the cities of Wichita Falls, Dallas, Fort Worth, Corsicana and all intermediate points. Electric Wichita county has proven to be one of the largest and best oil fields in the southwest, with a daily production of about 20,000 barrels and being extended very rapidly.

From 1900 to 1910 but nine cities in the entire United States with equal or greater population grew as rapidly as Wichita Falls and their claim is that the next ten years will give them the leading place, and if they maintain their co-operation and pull-together spirit none can possibly make more rapid strides than this little city in Northwest Texas.

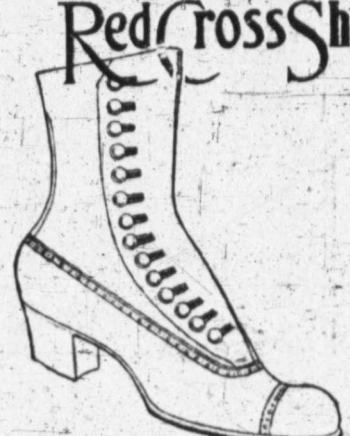

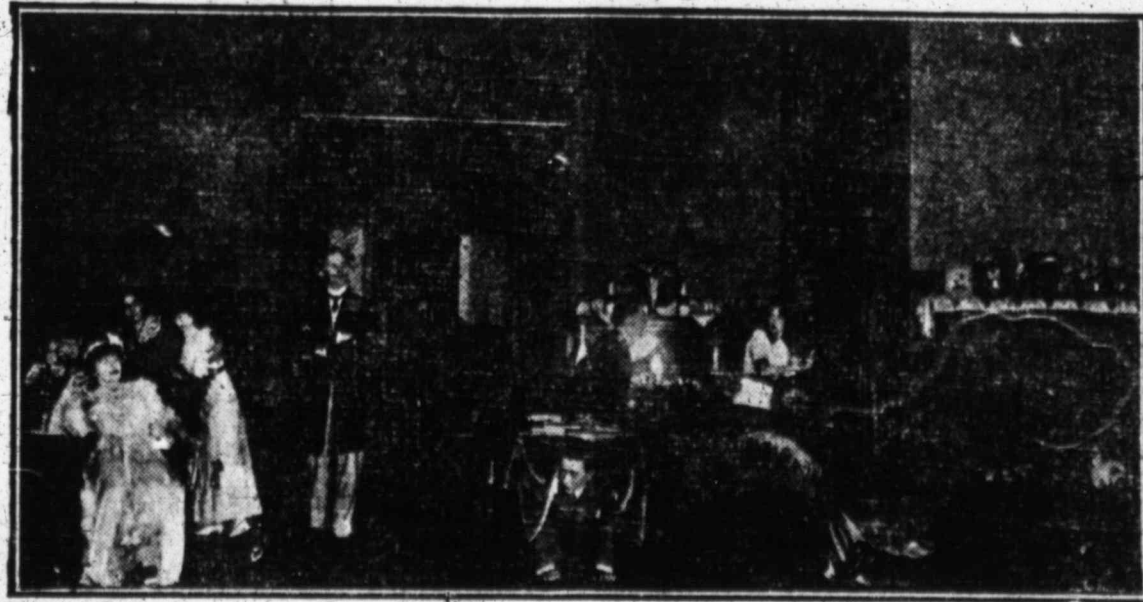

FINE IRISH HIGHWAY

Is That Constructed Through the Wicklow Mountains.

Built by Lord Cornwallis After the Suppression of the Rebellion of 1798, It Passes Through Remarkably Pretty Country.

Dublin.—There is a wonderful Irish road which if it existed almost anywhere else would be far more familiar to tourists than it now is. Motorists are beginning to find it, however, and before long "the Irish Simplon" will be as famous as it deserves to be, for the grandeur of the scenery through which it passes is hardly surpassed in the British Isles.

Every schoolboy has read of the roads constructed by Marshal Wade to facilitate the pacification of the highlands of Scotland after the Jacobite rising of 1715, says the English Queen. Wade employed 5,000 soldiers in the work, who received sixpence a day extra pay and when by facetiously termed his highwaymen. Few if any histories, however, record the fact that similar works were undertaken in Ireland in connection with the suppression of the rebellion of 1798. The most remarkable of these Irish military roads traverses the central line of the Wicklow mountains.

Until the close of the eighteenth century there were only three passes, Wicklow gap, Sally gap and Glenmalur, by which the retreats of the great Wicklow chain could be approached, and each was almost impassable. After defeat in the open field the rebels of '98 retreated to these wild fastnesses, where for several months they defied the efforts of the government to dislodge them.

Sore straits and formidable did this mountain warfare become that the idea of taking a leaf out of Marshal Wade's book suggested itself to the lord lieutenant, Lord Cornwallis. He ordered the construction of what is known as "the Great Military road" in order to lay open the most inaccessible tracts. As it was deemed expedient to station troops at certain strategic points four extensive barracks were erected upon the road.

The main road begins four miles south of Dublin and terminates in the southwest of the County Wicklow. The distance between the two extremities as the crow flies is about 30 miles, but owing to the spiral windings round the contours of the mountains the total distance traversed is much greater. In addition there are



branch roads running up minor valleys and circling hills which sheltered outlaws and desperadoes.

This fine work was executed between the years 1799 and 1801 by regiments of Highland militia. With the exception of the level in one valley called Glenmalur the engineer was not enabled to take advantage of a single vale. As a rule the glens in these mountains run from east to west, while the direction of the road is from north to south; hence the latter keeps for nearly the whole distance a solitary mountain course at the height of 1,000 or 1,700 feet above the sea and but seldom descends to any of the valleys.

The road was most skilfully engineered as regards gradients in order to render it passable for artillery. There are but few parts of it which are not rideable by the cyclist mounted on a machine equipped with three speeds. That the work was effected in the most durable manner is clear from the fact that although very little has been spent on maintenance during the last half century, the road still presents through bogs and morasses a smooth and level surface and a substratum perfectly strong and well rounded.

Up to the hour of going to press the Hon. Jim Smith of New Jersey had failed to send in his congratulatory telegram to President-elect Wilson.

Colonel Roosevelt can now put into execution his threat to write the history of Texas. There will be nothing to disturb him for about four years, at least.

Captain Bill McDonald, it is said, is after one of the U. S. marshalships for Texas. He will confer a favor, no doubt, on many applicants throughout the state by designating which one he is going to land.

Hon. W. H. Atwell, United States District Attorney at Dallas, doesn't believe a Republican should continue in office under a Democratic administration, and will resign before the expiration of his commission.

Let's see! This is the day the Republican National Committee was to meet to select a successor for the Republican vice presidency in order that he may share the honors with President Taft in receiving that measly even dozen electoral votes cast for the late Republican party nominees.

The election is now over, and it is about time we were hearing of what was done with Gen. Diaz, the fellow who started something that looked like a revolt at Vera Cruz, but which turned out to be only a clever trap set by Madero to catch some of his disloyal soldiers.

Col. Cecil Lyon will not have the pleasure of being chief distributor of Federal pie in Texas for the next four years, but it might afford him some comfort to assist in taking away pie from some of the fellows who are indebted to him for their positions. Inasmuch as they showed him the back of their hand at a time Col. Lyon had every good reason to expect their support.

The election returns from the 100th represent active district are somewhat delayed, but sufficient is known to indicate beyond a shadow of a doubt that the Democratic nominees for that office have been triumphantly elected. The Times therefore gives up in utter despair of Col. Bill Edwards of the Henrietta Review finding anything to look real pleasant about for the next two years.

Hortense Ward, lawyer, of Houston, Texas, in a circular letter sent out to the press of the State, says the present laws covering the property rights of married women in Texas are unfair and unjust, and is urging the people to assist in the passage of a resolution adopted by the Texas Bar Association last July that has for its purpose the right of married women to have the exclusive management, control and disposition of their separate property and their own personal earnings, independent of the control or joint action of the husband and to make contracts the same as unmarried women, or women without guardians or husbands. There is little doubt but that the next legislature should give relief in this matter. As a general thing, Texas husbands are better than the present law governing such matters, but it is often the case that a trifling man who has succeeded in marrying a fairly good woman with some property can make it uncomfortable for her, though he may not contribute one cent to her support, and while the burden falls upon her to support not only herself but her husband as well. The laws of this state, as at present, will not permit the wife to make disposition of property in her own name without the consent of the husband.

A HOPEFUL VIEW.

the probability is that the race problem, whatever that is, if let alone by those who have been disposed to meddle with conditions in the South, will gradually disappear and in the course of time will solve itself in a natural way.

Failure of the negroes to keep up with the whites in the matter of increase in population and the constantly improving character of the negroes, tend to lessen friction between members of the two races. According to census returns, increase in population among the negroes is at a very much smaller per cent than among the whites. In 1860, just one year before the breaking out of the Civil War, the negro population of the country was 4,418,430, and in 1910, fifty years later, it was 9,827,863, a gain of 122 per cent, while the increase in population among the whites during the same period was 203 per cent, a difference of 81 per cent in favor of the whites. But great as is this difference, the difference in the rate of increase during the ten years preceding the recent census was still greater. In 1900 the negro population of the United States was 8,333,254, while in 1910 it was 9,827,863, an increase of 11 per cent. During that period the white population increased 22 per cent, just double the rate of increase among the negroes.

At this rate it will not be many years before the preponderance of whites will be so great that the negro race in comparison will be inconsequential. Even in the Southern States, in which there are now large negro populations, the negroes are falling behind the whites so rapidly that within a quarter of a century they may cease to be a problem, even in States like South Carolina and Mississippi, where the negroes outnumber the whites. In South Carolina, according to the last census reports, the negroes outnumber the whites 166,800, and in Mississippi there are about 20,000 more negroes than whites, but during the last thirty years the whites have increased, in South Carolina, 70 per cent, while the negroes have increased only 38 per cent, and in Mississippi the white have increased 61 per cent, while the negroes have fallen 11 per cent short of this increase, which indicates that in these two states, the only ones in which there are now more negroes than whites, the whites will soon equal the negroes in population without taking into account the immigration into these states, which is almost wholly by whites.

Another factor that is solving the negro problem in the South is the progress which is being made by negroes along lines of usefulness. They are becoming home owners, they are adopting skilled occupations and are being educated along practical lines which fit them for responsible positions. The day of the idle, shiftless, gambling negro is going by and the members of the race are fast becoming more useful citizens, due, in a large measure, to the teaching which is being given by Booker Washington and other negro educators. The number of negro farm owners is fast increasing and they are rapidly taking up other industrial pursuits, a course which is improving the race, so while the proportion of negroes in the South is diminishing, those who will be left will be a better class, and the result will be beneficial to the country.—San Antonio Express.

The Guffey has completed two wells on the Bywaters tract. Its No. 2 is rather a small well, probably forty barrels and its No. 1 has not yet been tested.

The Guffey's well on the W. E. Crows is better than at first reported and will probably make 200 barrels. It is understood a number of new locations are to be made in that section at once.

The advance in oil prices, which was announced in the eastern and mid-continent fields recently, has not yet taken effect here.

Texas Oil Suits May Be Delayed.

Austin, Texas, Nov. 12.—Attorney General James D. Walthall has been hampered somewhat by the settlement of the suit between the Standard Oil and H. Clay Pierce interests in New York. He was following the case carefully to get testimony with regard to the alleged oil trust in Texas, and as the settlement of the suit stopped the taking of testimony, Mr. Walthall is no longer getting testimony which is being adduced there.

Before the settlement Mr. Walthall was receiving daily a transcript of the testimony being taken in New York, having made arrangements to get all testimony bearing on the Texas oil companies.

In the New York hearing there was testimony to the effect that bonds of the Magnolia Petroleum Company were handled by Standard Oil officials. The Magnolia Petroleum Company bought out the interests of the Navarro Refining Company and Security Oil Company, which were dissolved and ousted in this State for alleged violations of the anti-trust laws. The Magnolia people bought in the prop-

erty after the court's judgment was entered. Recently officials of the concern were indicted by a Federal grand jury at Dallas for alleged violation of the Sherman anti-trust act. That immediately caused a State investigation to be instituted.

It is not known whether Mr. Walthall will investigate the matter further or whether he will leave that to B. F. Looney, who will succeed him as attorney general within the next sixty days. It is probable that the matter will be left to Mr. Looney. Mr. Walthall is not discussing the anti-trust matters, and it is rather hard to ascertain his position.

In the New York proceedings H. Clay Pierce was seeking to hold control of the Waters-Pierce Oil Company while the Standard Oil Company claimed a majority of the stock and control. The case was settled, the Associated Press dispatches saying that Mr. Pierce gave \$3,000,000 to get the stock in the Waters-Pierce held by the Standard.

Boring for Oil in Denton County

A sixty-five foot derrick was raised on the Madwell place about three and a half miles south of town Saturday afternoon, and with a carload of material, a sixty-five foot derrick was raised for the drilling. C. F. Evans, president of the local company, stated Monday that work would be well under way by the middle of the week.

The company financing the well-drilling project was formed some time in August, after a period of about ten months of prospecting for oil. It is said that the signs are unusually promising, and the stockholders are anxiously awaiting the first positive results of the drilling.—Denton Record-Chronicle.

The Continental Oil Co. has declared a dividend of \$20 a share, payable November 20 to stock of record November 4. This is the second dividend declared by the company since its segregation from the Standard Oil Co. of New Jersey. The first one was \$50 a share, which was paid February 28. The Continental Oil Co. is an Iowa concern with a capital stock of \$300,000.

Suggests Democratic Primary For Postmaster.

Assuming that President Wilson will follow the established custom of allowing Congressmen to name the postmasters in their districts Congressman Beall of the Dallas district has declared he will call a Democratic primary election to decide who shall fill all the postoffices and that he will endorse whoever receives the most votes in said election.

One of the issues in the recent campaign was "Let the people rule" and there can be no doubt but what the Democratic voters who get their mail at our postoffice are better prepared to say who shall serve them than the Representative in Congress or any official at Washington. MODES OF TRAVEL IN CYPRUS

Mules Largely Used, but They Are Frequently Too Independent for Solid Comfort.

Pamagusta.—At the time of the British occupation there was only one road in Cyprus, but in the present day one may travel in comparative comfort over the greater part of the island. The roads have not reached the standard where motoring is a pleasure, and if one occasionally meets a string of camels sitting in the road, or the way is blocked by mules laden with enormous stocks of sweet smelling thyme, it but adds to the general picturesqueness of the scenery. There is one line of railway which stretches a distance of sixty-two miles, from the harbor of Famagusta up to Nicosia, the capital, and beyond to Marpou. Mules are used throughout the country, and the Cyprian mules are very fine specimens. It is the habit

of the Cypriot to load his mule with all the paraphernalia that can possibly be induced to hold together, and then to seat himself on top and guide the animal by hitting it on the head with a stout walking stick or a pointed prod.

The chief disadvantage in riding mules is that the stirrups are not fixed and a sudden pressure on the right foot will send the left knee up to the rider's chin, depositing him suddenly on the ground. Some Cyprian mules have also a habit of planting both feet on the extreme edge of a precipice and stretching out their necks to look at the scene below. All things being considered, the nervous tourist would feel happier upon the mountain ponies, which are strong and surefooted. And from this it will be seen that the means of transit are varied to suit all tastes. Camels, mules, ponies, carriages, motors, railways or coasting ships—what more could heart of visitors desire?

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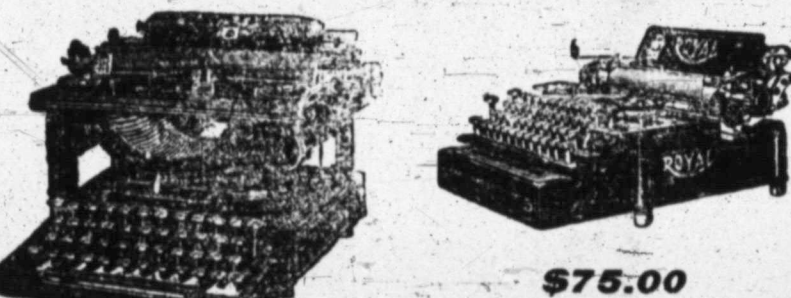
