INDIANS ARRIVE TO HELP BRITISH

LONDON, Sept. 16.—The allies have been reinforced by the first detachment of Indian troops who arrived in France via the Suez Canal and rushed from South France by rail to the battle field in the north.

The troops are assisting the British forces who are initiating the enveloping movement designed to cut off the main right German wing from the remainder of the forces.

The allies today are wading through deep mud, pursuing the retreating Germans whose rear guard is now making a determined stand.

AMERICAN SOLDIERS TO BE WITHDRAWN FROM MEXICO

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16.—By October 15, it is expected that the withdrawal of American troops from Vera Cruz will have been completed. The six army transports now in Hampton Roads will be sent south within the very near future. Ten others now located at Galveston and New Orleans, also, will go to Vera Cruz as soon as all preparations are completed to bring back the Fifth Brigade which is encamped in the Mexican city.

It was learned today that the Texas border troops also will be withdrawn. It is known that the present plans are to this effect.

BERLIN, Sept. 16.—In an official statement handed out today, it was declared the Germans have succeeded in checking the entire allied offensive in France.

It was emphasized that the Germans are now entrenched in their new positions and at a number of points have driven the French and British back on their own support.

It was also stated that the Ger-

mans are driving the Russians back in Prussia. One of the movements of the Germans is to strike at the Russian lines of communication along the Vistula. If the plan is successful, the Russians will be forced to withdraw a large number of their men from Galicia, thus relieving the Austrians to a certain extent and throwing the two armies in that province about equal.

There are now approximately 3,000 saloons in the state.

AUSTRIANS MAKE DENIAL THAT PRYZEMYL HAS BEEN INVESTED OR THAT DANKL SURRENDERED

VIENNA, Sept. 16.—A denial was made at the War Office here that General Dankl's army surrendered to the Russians or that Pryzemyel had been invested by the Czar's forces.

It was announced that the Russians had Dankl almost surrounded but the Austrians managed to cut through and made a junction with the main Austrian army.

It was admitted, however, that the Austrian losses were the greatest in the fight. Fighting still is in progress.

Japanese Drop Bombs on Germans

TOKIO, Sept. 16.—Japanese aviators today dropped several bombs on the German headquarters at Kiau Chau. Some of the explosives were effective, doing much damage to the German headquarters. The wireless station of the Germans on the Shangtung peninsula was put out of commission by the effects of the bombs.

It was officially stated here today that the field operations of the Japanese army are working out nicely, although the movements are hampered considerably by the heavy destructive rains on the peninsula, particularly in the vicinity of Kiau Chau.

60,000 MORE MEN TO AID GERMANY IN BELGIUM

1000 COTTON PICKERS WANTED AT ONCE

The west bound Santa Fe this morning carried another carload of negroes from the Galveston country to the counties west of here where they have been engaged to pick cotton. The price for cotton picking in Coleman and Runnels counties is now about 60c per hundred, and hundreds of negroes and Mexicans are being imported for work in the fields.—Brownwood Bulletin.

By using proper precautions we can go through the school months without an epidemic of some kind, and a badly disturbed school. Without the precaution we run the risk of suffering many times what the cost of precaution cost. We believe that watermelon rinds are too thick in the alleys of Ballinger for the best interest of our health, and the unusually large supply of flies is attributed to this carelessness.

There never was a better time for the farmers of the country to buy a few hogs. They are gold dollars on the market, and home-raised meat is not a bad idea by any means.—Abilene Reporter.

Yes, I told you so. If the farmers had listened to us last spring and planted a few more hogs and not so much cotton this war business would not be such a burden to the South.

Ten carloads of hogs, 44 of them weighing 400 pounds each, were recently purchased by a Fort Worth packing house, slaughtered and sold to the Texas trade. The enterprise of the Texas packing house in going into the markets of the Central West for hogs with which to supply its Texas trade with meat is commendable, but what shall we say of the farmers of Texas who ignore so great an opportunity to raise hogs in sufficient numbers to supply the trade of Texas packing houses? The Texas farmer who has hogs, grain and forage to sell this year is not worrying about how he will finance a holding movement for his cotton crop. There are a few men in Texas who are growing rich raising hogs. Some of these were driven to the experiment by low-priced cotton. Few of them have ever regretted that they engaged in the business.—Houston Post.

We heard a farmer say right out in public—in a crowd, that he could raise feed cheaper in Runnels county than anywhere else in Texas, and was complaining about the low price of maize, and no one had the nerve to deny the statement. That same farmer is paying about thirty-five cents for bacon. The court should take charge of such farmers and appoint a guardian for them at once.

WIRELESS BIG HELP TO GERMAN ARMY IN FIELD

BERLIN, Sept. 16.—Portable wireless telegraph outfits have proved a boon to the German armies in the field. These outfits have eliminated the old field telegraph systems, which were so tedious to lay and which, when strung through a hostile country, were so easily cut and put out of commission. Only along permanently established lines of communication are the lines laid for telegraphic and telephonic purposes.

In other countries the armies have not solved the problem of portable wireless equipments. They are still cumbersome and far from easily handled; they also do not always give the service needed, and are easily put out of commission. The short range equipment carried by the German field forces can be transported by a motorcycle 200 miles a day. Long range equipment can be carried 30 miles in 24 hours by a man and a horse. The short range instruments will send and receive over an average of thirty-five miles, where the country is not hilly. Larger sizes will carry a distance of 180 miles unless the topography of the country interferes.

The instruments can be set up and ready for transmission of messages within fifteen minutes of their arrival at any point. They can be taken down and made ready for transportation in from eight to ten minutes.

To return to the matter of transporting the equipment it might be added that in country where neither horse nor motor propelled vehicle can travel, it is carried by men on specially constructed bamboo "stretchers."

The regular "wireless crew" consists of seven men and two officers. Two look after the horses, five are employed in setting up the equipment or dismantling it and the two officers send and receive messages.

The mast is of aluminum alloy and is built in eight sections each six feet long, provided with slip joints. The mast first is joined together on the ground the guy ropes are attached and the whole raised. The lower joint is formed of a socket bedded in bitumen, which in turn is encased in a metal tube provided with a pointed shoe.

If the ground is too rocky to permit of easy insertion, those members of the crew who are not generating electricity or sending, hold the mast in position by means of the guy ropes.

The aerial is very ingeniously devised. It consists of a number of bronze wire conductors radiating out like the ribs of an inverted umbrella. These are accurately balanced and counterpoised and the radiating wires are attached to insulators fastened near the bottom of the mast.

For sending purposes dry batteries of a special make are supposed to be used, but in case these are not available a small dynamo coupled to a pedaling arrangement, forms part of the outfit.

With a man can easily drive the generator at a speed of 1,300 to 1,400 revolutions per minute, and so provide a current of one ampere at 50 volts, which is amply sufficient for sending purposes.

The weight of dynamo and pedal drive is 99 pounds and it so arranged that it can be carried by one man by means of straps, which fasten across the shoulder.

The transmitter and receiver, the latter of which is of the well-known "head-dress" pattern, are designed so as to be as light as possible, and it might be considered that a certain amount of efficiency has been sacrificed to obtain increased portability and ease in erecting.

It is interesting to note that the wavelength is about 364 meters, with a coupling of eight per cent, unvariable, and the equipment can exclude waves of five per cent variation.

The sending can be carried out with great rapidity, and the transmitting and receiving apparatus, without the mast and aerial, weight only eighty-five pounds.

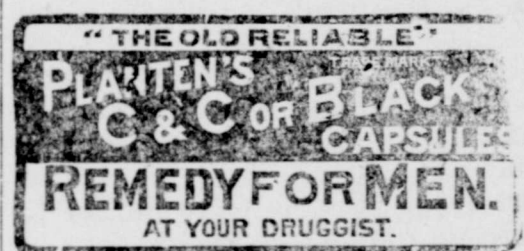

Big Cotton Crop in 1915
the Market Ghost of Today

If the cotton world knew today that the cotton crop for the coming year would be short, the market problem would settle itself in a very few minutes and there would be a clamoring for cotton that would make the buy-a-bale at ten cents move look like child's play. It is a question of money that is holding the price back today. If the men with the money, and there are plenty of them to take the crop and pay the cash, knew that the acreage would be cut next year and a short crop grown, the present crop would be "gobbled" up in short order. The money of the world is slow to go into cotton when the man behind the money knows full well that the farmer will sow his farm down in cotton again next year, produce a big cotton crop and supply the spinners at a mere song, or just whatever the mill man sees fit to offer for the crop.

This big crop ghost is the one thing that is keeping Uncle Sam out of the cotton market. The United States government can't control the cotton market unless they adopt some plan for controlling the acreage. If the government should advance ten cents on cotton today, take the crop off the farmer's hands and keep the demand created a price that would protect the government against a loss, the government would have cotton long after the farmers planted another big crop and dumped it on the market at a less price than the government advances for the present crop.

A conference of the Southern Cotton Association realizes this, and in a meeting recently held at New Orleans, this question was the paramount one before the convention for discussion. The Association will meet again in New Orleans on the 29th of this month, and the question of reducing the acreage will again come up for solution.

J. H. Connell of the Texas Division of the Cotton Association, of Dallas, has offered some timely suggestions, which we publish herewith, and if they are adopted the cotton question will be solved.

There is nothing so important in this cotton situation as the stab born problem of reducing of acreage for next year. It was agreed by those present at the New Orleans convention in August that all holding plans, now so popular must finally come to naught unless the people of the South put down the ghost of a "big cotton crop in 1915." We have championed in every State of the South warehouse plans for storing cotton looking to the financial safety of farmers and business men, including safe and sane currency relief and ways and means for the retirement of 2,000,000 bales of cotton before Nov. 1. But our last condition will be worse than our first should we fail to appreciate at this early day the necessity of a cotton reduction acreage throughout the entire South.

And the smoke and confusion of many conflicting theories and nostrums, both economically and politically a few things stand out and call loudly for attention and action on the part of the people at interior points who are most vitally concerned. These are simple things, but they are fundamental and of primary importance:

1. Hold debt-free cotton in the seed protected from weather with out incurring storage and insurance charges.

2. Assist business men to build galvanized iron warehouses for protecting cotton forced on the market by debt.

3. Urge merchants to accept and hold cotton on account when possible, to be sold later. Seventy-five per cent of the value of such cotton is now acceptable for currency issued by banks.

4. Encourage the "buy-a-bale" movement at 10c a pound, and prevent distressed cotton from reaching the hands of speculators or spinners.

5. Pledging faithfully in writing, by business men as well as farmers, a reduction of 50 per cent in the cotton acreage of 1915 as a matter of good faith to those who hold cotton over. These pledges to be uniform and made of record with the county organization of the Southern Cotton Association.

6. Stress reduction of acreage as a vital factor to those now investing in cotton to be held for one year.

We need not wait on the Texas Legislature or on any other state,

or on Congress, to give value to the present cotton crop, but begin now to subtract our this year's surplus cotton from the crop of 1915, and cotton will sell at 10c within thirty days and reach 12c or better for the bulk of the crop to be sold this season.

Now is the time to plant wheat in our cotton fields, seed land to alfalfa and buy a few stock hogs and slaughterhouse meats. The demand for flour, oats and livestock will be greater than ever known before.

Pledges to reduce the cotton acreage for next year are now being signed in all parts of Texas and the South as a simple, natural remedy for our temporary supply of cotton. Acting under the instructions of the recent New Orleans convention of the Southern Cotton Association, these pledges for reducing acreage in cotton for 1915 were formulated by the executive committees in the several States, adapted especially to the needs and business customs of each State, to be distributed promptly to counties, townships and school and militia districts, to be signed up for a cotton acreage reduction by farmers, merchants and bankers, and county organizations are instructed to report promptly to the State presidents of the Southern Cotton Association on pledges so secured, and these to the general offices of the association.

Every cotton county and cotton State is instructed to send delegates to the New Orleans meeting of the Southern Cotton Association, Sept. 29, for the purpose of agreeing upon a minimum price for this cotton crop.

Cotton meetings are being called over the State for the following dates: Precinct meetings, Friday, Sept. 18; county meetings, Saturday, Sept. 19; State meetings, Dallas, Sept. 22, and the central meeting at New Orleans, Sept. 29.

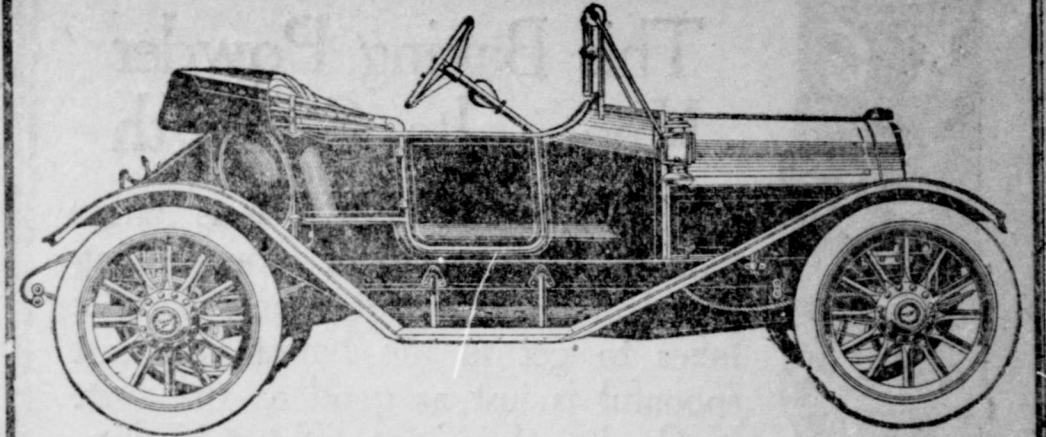

1,000 Cotton Pickers Wanted at Once

county, but when the condition of the crop is taken into consideration 60 cents here is more than 75 and 85 cents where cotton is short. Cotton is good here, and free from grass and weeds, and picking is easy. A farmer reported today that he was picking 1,000 pounds per acre. At 60 cents this figures \$6 per acre for picking, and a good picker can make good wages for going over little land.

The farmers would be glad to raise the price with cotton bringing a better price. Of course all cotton is not turning out 1,000 pounds per acre with first picking, but it is opening very rapidly, and the crop is good.

1,000 pickers could be placed here at once, and kept busy until Christmas. The county will suffer a great loss if the crop is not picked before rain. Some organized effort should be put forth to bring hands here in large numbers. The Y. M. B. L. is doing all they can to get hands by wire and mail methods, but this is slow and not at all satisfactory. Men should be sent to the thickly settled parts of the state at once and hands brought here to save the crop.
