Community Chairmen For Bond Drive Named; Farley Will Give Bond Programs

Overall chairmen of the Seventh War Loan Drive for this county, Ed DuBose, has announced the various community chairmen who will serve in their designated areas during the big campaign. The chairmen and the communities in which they will serve are as follows:

Plans for the drive have already been made, and several affairs to stimulate bond sales have been announced.

Chairman DuBose reports that Cal Farley will be in this city Friday to present several programs here. He will fly from Amarillo, where he has a radio show, and arrive here Friday morning for a 10:30 meeting to be held in the courtroom. This session is for school teachers, officials, and school organizations and Farley will discuss the schools part in the drive. At noon he will address business men in a meeting and in the afternoon Farley will present a program at the Lamesa High School auditorium for the children and others interested in attending. At this time he will put on a show for the group and will be accompanied by the comedian "Stuttering Sam", and possibly other members of his troupe. This will be given as an assembly program for the school.

Announcement that the drive will largely center around the schools of the county has already been made. The drive will begin at those institutions Monday morning, April 9, and on the following Monday the drive will get underway in the entire county.

Prizes will be offered to school children who participate in the campaign. Four \$25.00 war bonds will be awarded, with 2 bonds going to the rural schools of the county, and with 2 allotted to the Lamesa School District.

Two bonds will be given to the boys or girls who sell the largest number of bonds and two will be presented to those selling the largest amount. Other prizes include captured German helmets, mess kits, letters signed by Gen. Eisenhower and Gen. Patton, and these will be given to deserving county school children.

Chairman DuBose states that a concentrated effort will be made to complete the \$750,000 over-all quota with the E bond quota of \$445,000 included, in the early stages of the drive, and asks for your cooperation in the campaign.

Area Well Over The Top Of 1945 Red Cross Quota

Mrs. Sam Allen, Red Cross secretary, reported this week that at the end of the 1945 Red Cross War Fund Drive a total of \$14,460.35 had been collected in this county. This put the county well over the top of their \$12,600 assignment for that campaign.

Certificates of awards have been received by Dr. J. M. Harrington, Red Cross drive chairman, and by the county also, for the success of the campaign here.

The certificate for the county reads, "This certificate of honor awarded Dawson County Chapter by the American National Red Cross for distinguished achievement in 1945 War Fund." The document was signed by A. N. Chester, National chairman and Basil O'Connor, chairman of American Red Cross. Dr. Harrington received a similar award.

Report On Total Vehicle License Purchases Given

Reports received this week from R. W. (Buster) Herndon, tax assessor-collector gives a comparison of last years license purchases with this years sales.

During 1945 a total of \$53,870 was collected for license with 2940 passenger tags registered, 399 commercial tags purchased, 319 farm license purchased and 45 trailer tags purchased. This includes all license listed through mid-night Saturday, March 31.

For the same period last year a total of \$51,000.88 was collected with 2874 passenger, 389 commercial, 394 farm, and 54 trailer license registered.

In connection with the registration of cars, Herndon made this statement, "If drivers have used their automobiles after mid-night of April 1, a 20 per cent penalty will be placed on them when they purchase their new tags. If they have not been used the owner must sign an affidavit to that effect, and a new tag will be sold without penalty."

Stock Show Progressing Successfully; Winners In Horse Division Are Listed

Between 200 and 300 persons were in attendance at the Dawson County Livestock Show, which opened Wednesday, April 4, at the fair grounds, in this city, and from all indications the show is to be a success.

According to a report received today (Thursday) from County Agent T. A. Barfield the entry list is exceedingly good, and approximately 44 Jerseys will be exhibited, as well as 20 beef calves, and 20 head of hogs.

The outstanding feature for the first day of the local event was the exhibition and judging of horses which took place in the ball park on the fair ground at 2 p. m. Wednesday. Approximately 25 horses were entered in the show, with Leon C. Ransom scoring the animals.

The following persons won places in the various classes of the horse show. In class number 64 which was for the quarter horse and thoroughbred saddle stock, and which included 1944 foals, W. K. Crawley's entry placed first with Carroll Baldwin and J. J. Hanley's entries placing second and third respectively.

Class 65 was for 1943 foals and Beachy Barron's animal won first place position, with Tom Barron's entry second, and Dr. J. M. Harrington's entries placing third and fourth.

Saddle type horses over 2 years old comprised class 66 of the show and animals owned by the following persons took places: W. P. Herring, first place; Leonard Breeding, second place; George Hogg, third place; Leonard Breeding, fourth place; Houston Glasson, fifth place; Albert Heath, sixth place; and Earl Barron, seventh place.

Class 67, which was arranged for reining horses over 2 years of age, had three winners, W. P. Herring's entry was placed as first position winner, with Jeff Roney's entry coming second position, and O. P. Crites' horse securing third place.

Class 68 was for the grand champion colt, and Beachy Barron's colt won first in that division, with W. K. Crawley's entry placing second. In class 72, which was for Palomino horses, Leonard Breeding's horse took top honors, with Dr. J. M. Harrington's entry taking second place position.

In the Shetland pony division, Tom Barron Jr., won first place. Today's (Thursday's) program began with the judging of 4-H Club beef calves, followed by the judging of 4-H Club dairy heifers, and beef cattle. Clothing Collections Can Be Left At Judge's Office Now; Drive Committee To Meet

Cattle Brands To Be Re-Recorded Prior To Oct. 1st

County Clerk Howard Humphrey stated Wednesday morning that cattle owners face loss of brands unless marks are re-recorded.

Humphrey explained that article 6899-RCS provides that "All records of marks and brands except of county brands shall become void and of no force and effect on the 1st day of October, 1945, and every person who has cattle, horses, sheep and goats shall have his mark and brand recorded or re-recorded in accordance with article 6899 and article 6898."

He further explained that it also was provided at that time that "The record owner of a brand and mark shall have a preferential right to record such brand and mark for a period of two years from the 1st of October, 1943, but if such preferential right is not exercised within such two years, the same shall be forfeited and such brand and mark shall be subject to registration by any person, and the first person to record the same shall be the owner of it."

The law provided that any brand recorded in accordance with the requirement of the Act shall be considered as the property of the person causing such record to be made, and it shall be subject to sale, assignment, transfer the same as any personal property.

"Any person may record such brand and mark as he may desire to use provided no other person has recorded such brand and mark without regard to whether such person has previously recorded a brand mark. This act shall not apply to any county which shall have recorded all brands and marks within the past five years," stated Humphrey.

He concluded, "Unless the owners of the many brands and marks now on record in the county clerks office exercise their right to record these brands and marks before October, 1945 these brands and marks shall become void, therefore it is very important that you attend to this matter at once by having your mark and brand on records which will mean the immediate identification when livestock has been stolen."

At the present time, the county clerk's office is reported to have on record approximately 1500 old marks and brands.

County Judge Kilmer B. Corbin, chairman for the United National Clothing Collection drive for this county, has announced a meeting of his committee for the campaign which is to be held at 3 p. m., Friday afternoon, April 6, in his office in the courthouse. Chairman Corbin reports that persons having their collections of clothing ready now, can leave them at the county judges office any time prior to the establishing of other points of collections centers.

Dawson County's quota for the drive has been set at 21,000 pounds of clothing. 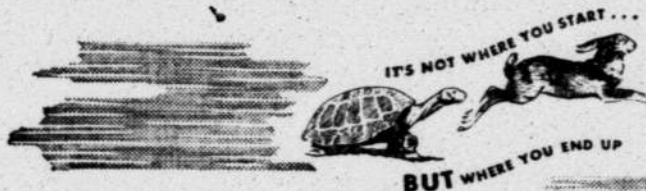

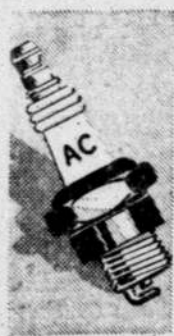

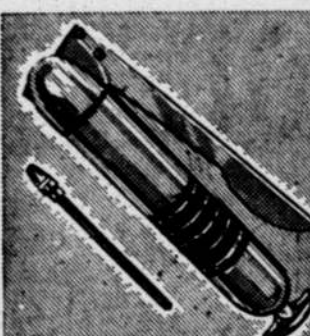

Engineering Feat Performed By Sgt. T. H. Roberts

A 7TH AAF FIGHTER BASE IN THE MARIANAS — When a P-38 fighter plane returned safely from a pre-invasion mission against Iwo Jima, after shooting down two twin-engine Jap bombers, Sergeant Thomas H. Roberts of Lamesa, a 7th AAF sheet metal worker, marked up another engineering feat for his squadron.

Three days earlier, the same P-38 had been turned over to Sergeant Roberts' air service group for salvage.

The airplane's retractable landing apparatus had been seriously damaged—the inboard landing gear bushing was out of line with the out-board bushing. It was said to be damaged "beyond repair."

Sgt. Roberts and other members of the engineering squadron were able to get this P-38 back into the air, having repaired approximately 150 damaged airplanes and even manufactured one fighter plane out of scraps.

Sgt. Roberts' parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Roberts, live on Route B, Lamesa. He was graduated from Lamesa High School, and was employed by the Rohn Aircraft Company in San Diego, California, before entering the Army in September, 1942. He arrived overseas in December, 1943. A brother, Charles, is an armorer with the AAF in the states.

James Chapman Writes Of The Lingayen Attack

Editor's Note: Below is printed a letter from James Vinson Chapman who was recently promoted to Ship-fitter 3-C in the United States Navy. Seaman Chapman is stationed on the Philippines, having been overseas since May, 1944. He entered service on March 17, receiving his boot training in San Diego, California. His wife and children, Ronald Ross, 13; Don, 9; Doyle 7; Billy, 5; and Keith, 8 months, reside in this city at 905 North Second Street. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Chapman of 211 South Second Street in Lamesa. The following is a letter written to his wife and sons:

Tuesday, January 23.
Dear Lenna and boys,
I worked at first one thing and another today, but did nothing very hard. I just ate supper and cleaned up. I don't think I will get any mail today—don't know for sure.
One of the boys is working his knife over and making so much racket I can't think. Someone is always making something back here after work time. We have a little of everything to work with. I don't have a watch tonight, so hope to get a good night's sleep.
I got the Xmas card Don sent. I thought that I had written you. I guess that I get about all my mail. Sometimes it is a long time getting to me.
Well honey I was in the Lingayen attack. Our convoy was attacked several times by enemy planes. Our ship wasn't damaged in any way although we saw some shrapnel fall in 50 feet of me. I saw enemy planes shot down by our Carrier base planes. I saw some planes crash in sight of our ship. Our ship got some target practice,

but one good thing, we weren't by ourselves. We had plenty of help. The beach is a right pretty place, and is pretty level country for a long way in. Our ship was commended for having done a good job.
I am not writing this to scare you, just to let you know some of the things we go through.

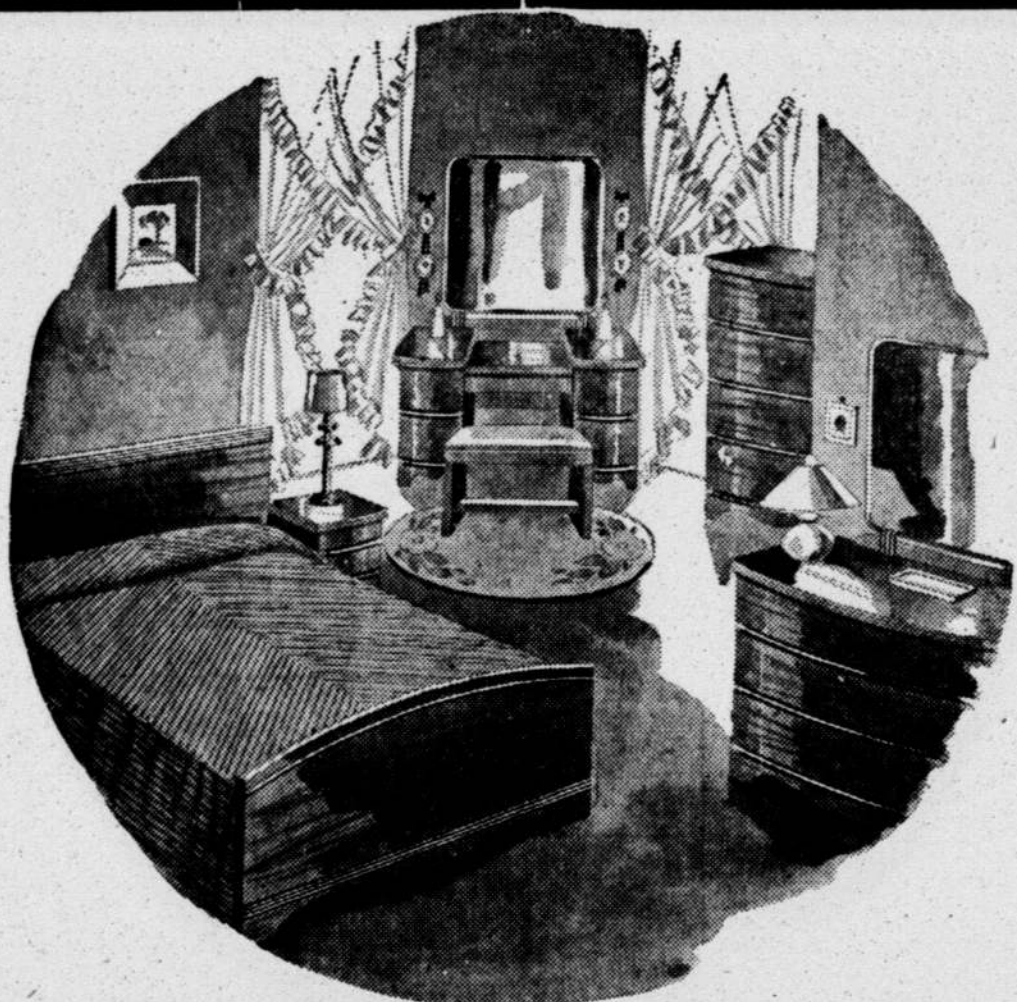

IWO JIMA—To the Marines of the Second Battalion, 27th Regiment, enemy mortars, artillery and machine guns didn't count when they had wounded men to help.

Claude E. Lauderdale, 23, of Route 1, Ackerly, became a specialist at the hazardous work of helping wounded men during the battalion's drive up the west coast of the island.

There probably will never be an accurate count of the number of men in its line companies who lost or risked their lives on missions of mercy.

Time and again, they crawled out of their foxholes and shelters during enemy barrages to drag back

comrades who were cut down by flying fragments. Many times, Lauderdale defied enemy shells and snipers to treat wounded Marines, and get stretcher bearers to evacuate them. Sometimes, the enemy rifle and machine gun fire was so persistent it was necessary to lay down smoke screens to get to the wounded.

Lauderdale was a combat veteran before he landed on Iwo with the third wave of assault troops. He fought with a Marine Parachute battalion on Choiseul and Vella La Vella in the Solomon Islands.
