TAMPA MAN CONFESSES TO SIX MURDERS

BERLIN OPENS FESTIVITIES FOR BELLANCA FLYERS

TWO AMERICAN FLYERS ARRIVE IN OWN PLANE

CROWD CHEERS WILDLY AND ATTEMPTS BREAK THROUGH POLICE

(By The Associated Press) TAMPELHOFFER AIR FIELD, Tampa, June 7.—Charles Chamblin and Charles Levine brought their trans-Atlantic monoplane down on Tempelhof field at 5:51 o'clock this afternoon, completing their interrupted flight from Roosevelt field, New York.

They flew here from Kiltbas, Brandenburg province, 70 miles southeast of the capital beginning the short hop at 4:15 p. m.

It was at Kiltbas, a little village near Kottbus, that the Columbia came to rest in a marshy field yesterday while the flyers were attempting to reach Berlin from Copenhagen, where their great trans-Atlantic flight from New York was first broken.

American Flag Displayed

The Columbia was first sighted from the field shortly before 5:30 p. m., and there arose a great roar of welcome from the assembled thousands. As the monoplane circled the field, the American flag was run up the main flagstaff of the airfield.

After having made his initial appearance, the pilot swung over Berlin proper in order to give the people a full view of the machine. He then came to catch a glimpse of the crowd that had conquered the Atlantic when he looked back for the field to come down.

Welcomed to Embassy

Chancellor Jacob G. Shurman, presiding Chamberlain on his arrival at Tempelhof field, hailed him as a messenger of good will and friendship from the American people to the German people and then invited him and Mr. Levine to the embassy at the American embassy.

TEXAN URGES WORLD PEACE

Rotary Head Addresses International Meeting In Ostend, Belgium

(By Associated Press) OSTEND, Belgium, June 7.—Effects of Rotary International for international peace were discussed here Monday by Harry H. Rogers, of San Antonio, Texas, president of the organization in an address before the eighteenth annual convention.

Mr. Rogers said in part: "It is peculiarly fitting that this convention should be held in this most beautiful city and in the most interesting historic country.

Peace is stressed

"For some years we have been stressing the 8th Object of Rotary, with its ultimate goal—International Peace—what country has stood out more prominently than this as an advocate of peace? What people are more devoted to its pursuit than this people? So, happily we go to gather here as apostles of good will, fellowship and friendship to begin anew the Rotary tradition which will send us home to our various countries and clubs with a renewed program of Rotary."

"Six years ago the convention was held at Edinburgh, Scotland, and when we realized the extent to which Rotary has grown since that time who dares to prophesy what the next few years have in store for us in the matter of extension, especially in Europe."

"At Edinburgh there were but seven countries in Rotary, with a total of 975 clubs. At that time there were but 35 clubs in the British Isles, and but two on the continent of Europe, Madrid, Spain, with 12 members, and Paris, France, with 16 members. Today there are 40 countries in Rotary with 2,593 clubs. Now there are 251 clubs in the British Isles and 77 clubs on the continent of Europe, with 2,593 Rotary members."

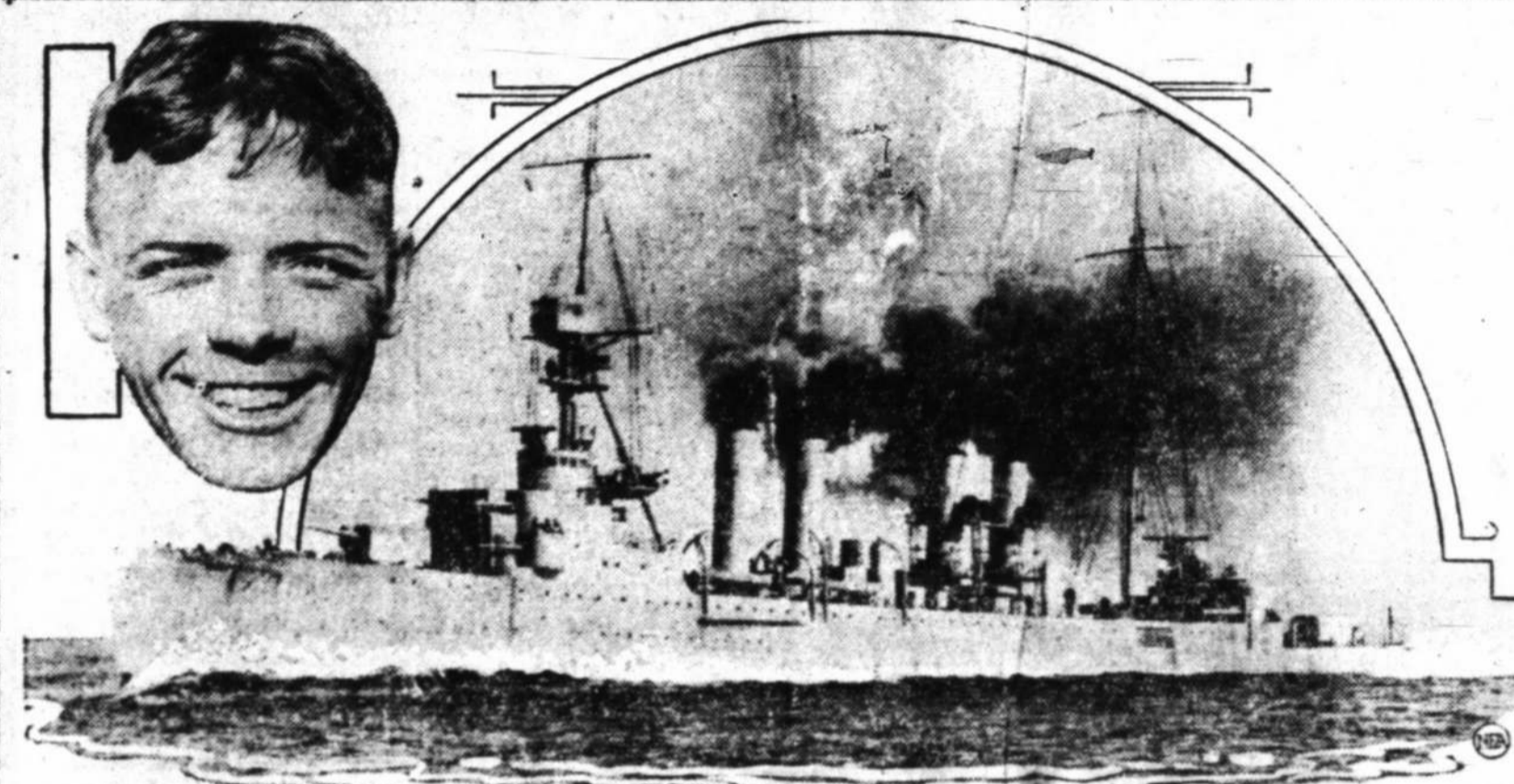

CAMPAIGN FOR VOTES STARTS

First Move To Carry Four Amendments To State Constitution Taken

(By The Associated Press) AUSTIN, June 7.—First moves to establish a working organization to support the four constitutional amendments to be submitted to popular vote in August, were taken at a meeting of legislators, judges, business men, lawyers and others here last night.

Former Attorney General W. A. Keeling was elected chairman of an executive committee to organize a working plan with speaker of the house, H. L. Bobbitt, general chairman.

Moody To Take Stump

Governor Dan Moody told the meeting he expects to take the stump for three of the four amendments and vote for all of them.

One he will not speak for is to remove limitations on the governor's and state officials' salaries. A new law can be passed, relieving the pay.

Amendments will speak for are the Stevenson resolution to divide state tax sources with a view of lightening the ad valorem burden, the resolution for a full nine man supreme court and the proposal to abolish the fee system for county officials, held invalid by the United States supreme court.

Legislature Buries Civil Service, Highway and Prison Measures and Prepares To Adjourn Late Tonight

Kimes Flaunts Law Again But Escapes

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, June 7.—With graves dug for the state civil service, highway and prison legislation, its three main objects, besides appropriations, the special session of the legislature went into its final day's work Tuesday to ratify conference committee agreements on senate and house differences.

Since the adjournment is expected some time late tonight although it is due Tuesday noon.

Rules Suspended

The senate considered local bills today under suspension of rules declared by Lieutenant Governor Barry Miller to have otherwise-ordered measures.

A conference agreement on the \$2,162,544.88.29 school aid bill for the biennium was ratified by the senate shortly before Monday night after a one-man filibuster by Senator Joe Moore, holding out for several hours against a measure written in by conferees.

The senate also adopted the conference report of \$8,116,254.88.29 agreement with the house on the educational appropriation. Senator Berkeley of Alpine held the floor until early this morning objecting to elimination of a dormitory from the Sul Ross teachers college budget.

Prison Bill Tabled

Deadlocked on the confining theories of prison location, the senate late yesterday tabled on the table both the administration plan and the plan of Representative Satterwhite, carried by the house, as an amendment to the administration bill. Senator Fairchild of Lufkin led the attack on Governor Moody's plan of locating the new prison. Moody is to be appointed with plenary power to make prison property sales deemed advisable for concentration of relocation. The senate was considering the substitute carrying Satterwhite's idea that the legislature should approve sales of the Brazos river bottom prison farms below Houston, where he wants the system concentrated. His bill allowed free sale of other properties, however. Senator Wood of (Turn to Page 8, Column 4, Please)

BLAMES ONE OF COMPANIONS IN THREE DEATHS

FULL CONFESSION TO AXE MURDERS SAID MADE BY LEVINS

(By The Associated Press) TAMPA, Fla., June 7.—B. F. Levins, confessed slayer of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Merrill and three of their children, has also admitted it was he who killed Bee Rowell and three members of the Rowell household here last summer, officials announced.

Levins, a fisherman, implicated Leonard Thompson, who was arrested with him in connection with the Merrill case, ten days ago. Thompson was taken yesterday from the Hillsborough county jail to a place of safe keeping in an unnamed county, to prevent a recurrence of rioting that followed Levins' confession in the Merrill case, in which five men were killed and upward of two score injured.

Makes Confession

In a "full confession," police said, Levins assumed responsibility for the deaths of six persons but charged Thompson with clubbing to death the three Merrill children. Levins said he killed C. H. Alexander with an axe last June, following an argument "over a woman," then, to "cover up," he killed Bee Rowell, in whose home Alexander and daughter, Mrs. Caroline Rowell, and her mother, Mrs. Rowell's mother, 94, and Eva Rowell, 15, leaving Tampa immediately. Levins said he traveled about from place to place, working as a laborer, until he returned here recently.

Thompson Blamed

He met Thompson, he said, after returning to Tampa and persuaded him to murder Edward Rowell, a brother of Bee, in order that there might be no one to testify against him in the event he ever was charged with the murders. Moore, Moore's son, Edward Rowell had moved to another home and Levins was unaware, he declared, that the Merrells were living in the home on the night the two men went there together. Five members of the Merrell family were clubbed to death in the attack that night. Three children who were away from home occurred.

O. E. Parkhill, states attorney, has announced that the grand jury, in session, will concern itself with the case throughout the present term.

Counselor H. E. Arthur Schopp, field of the embassy came to Vera Cruz to bid the ambassador good bye, while the Mexican authorities gave him all the facilities of the port for embarking.

Overflow Of Flood Until July Is Seen

NEW ORLEANS, June 7. (By Associated Press) Flood waters now coming down the Mississippi river will prolong the overflow in the Texas and Arkansas delta basins of Louisiana well into July and it now appears that the lower areas will not be clear of flood waters by the end of July, the weather bureau said today in a special flood bulletin.

Floodwaters a probable rise in the upper portion of a full nine main river in the vicinity of the Texas basin, and winter quarters crevasses on Mississippi river, the bureau said, however, that lands from which water has already receded will not be overflowed by the flood now in sight.

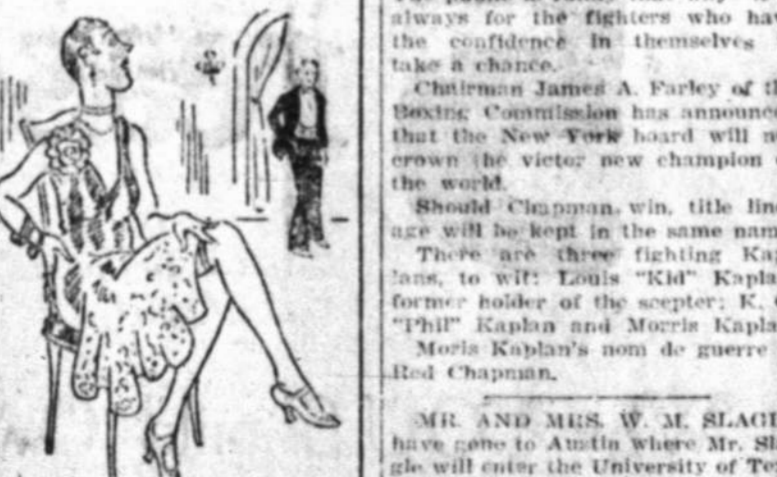

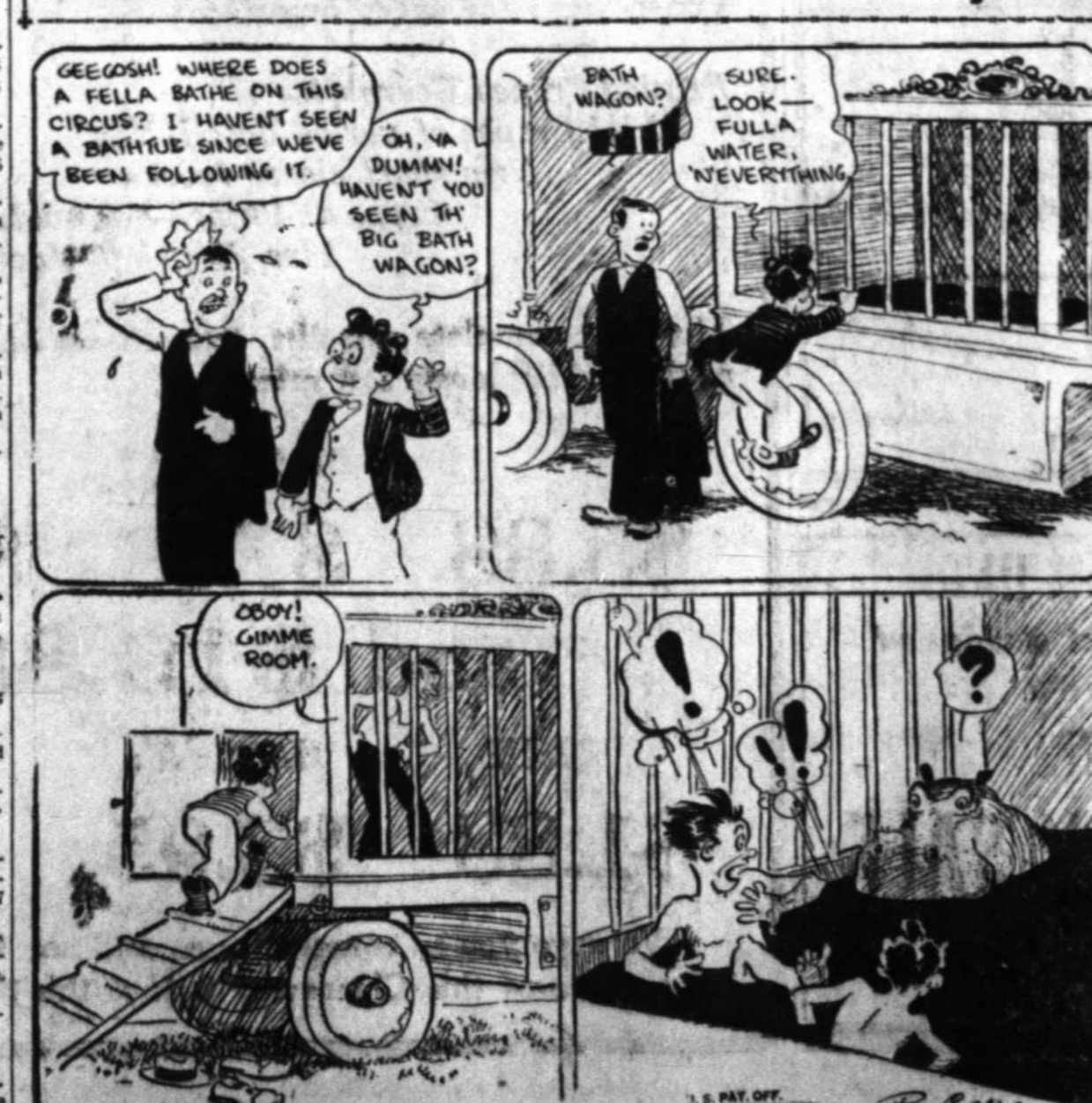

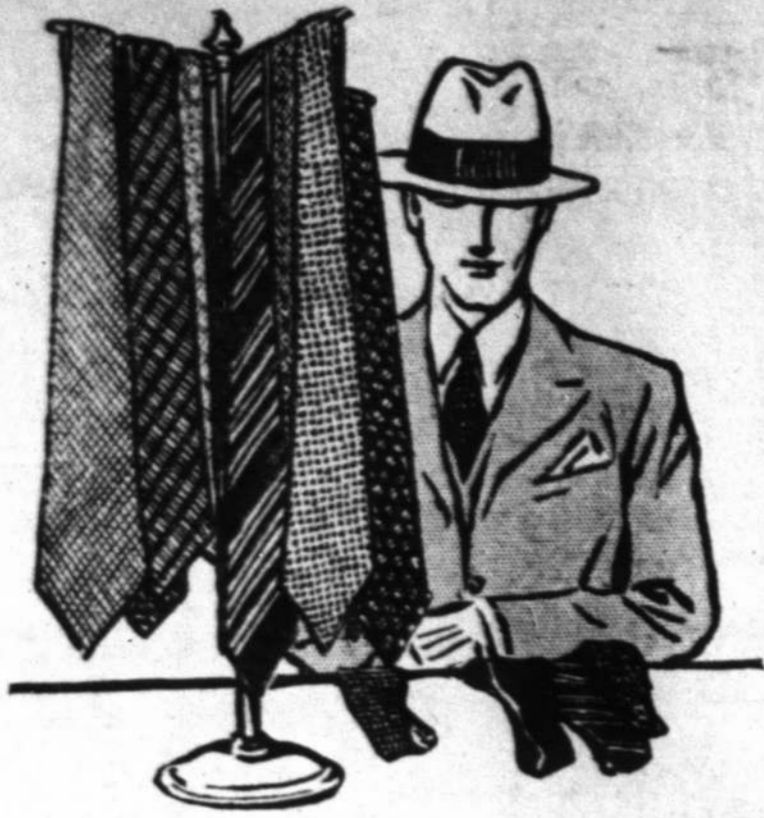
