No Confirmation On AIDS

The Texas Department of Health announced Friday, July 31st that it has found no evidence to support claims by former HIV/AIDS case management worker Dona Spence that 13 students within the Ark-Tex Council of Governments region were HIV positive.

The region takes in nine counties. Dr. Charles Bell, chief of the department's HIV and sexually transmitted disease control division has publically stated that all 138 case

files from Ms. Spence have been reviewed and that only ten people named were HIV positive or had AIDS.

All of these are over school age, and would not have been in school at the time the furor broke.

Bell stated that if the names in the files are real names then none of these individuals were born in Texas, are licensed to drive an automobile in Texas, have died in Texas or were listed on area school enrollment ros-

ters", Bell said.

He did say that it's possible that "all 20 of these people gave her made up names and birth date," leaving the possibility for error in the review.

In February a nation-wide furor broke when Spence claimed that 20 of her HIV-positive clients were under the age of 20 and that 13 of them were students.

Dona Spence resigned February 25, 1992 after the uproar her claims created.

Rivercrest Installing Satellite System To Help In Educating

There's something new at Rivercrest High School.

A new satellite dish has been set up at the high school campus. According to Superintendent Wade, the new Cyberlink T-Star system will provide expanded curriculum for students by providing courses to them that have not been available in the past.

The system provides channels like the Discovery Channel and other

educational channels.

There will be a teacher in-service program and staff development programs.

There will also be a two way communication system.

Superintendent Wade reports that there will be four drops (connection) provided through-out the school. The library will be the main drop but some classrooms will also have drops.

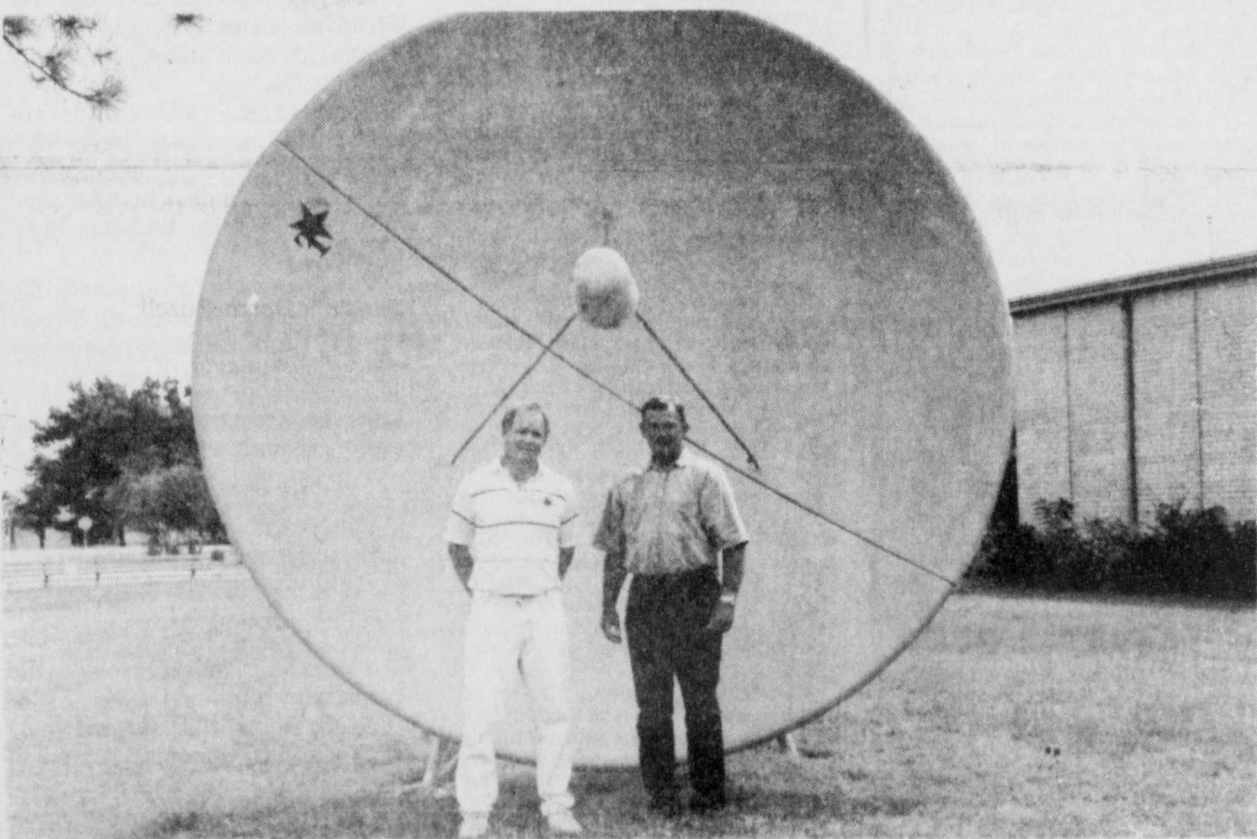
The system at Rivercrest is one of

approximately eighty provided by grants from T.E.A. of Austin, Texas.

The school also has plans for a new computer system with a teaching station, a large screen television and C D Ranius, which is equal to a complete set of encyclopedias.

Teachers can use this system in the classroom, and it can be used for co-ordinated presentations.

Installation of the new system is currently in progress.

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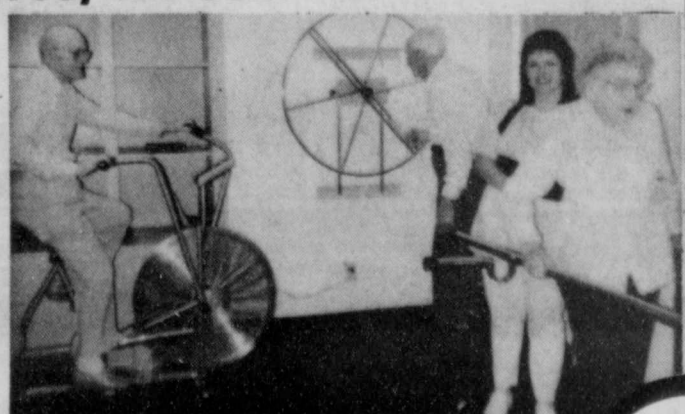
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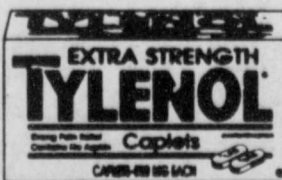
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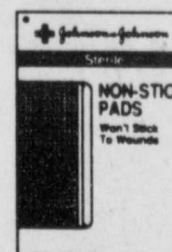
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Jerry Dodd Graduates from Air Force

An aerial demonstration by the USAF Thunderbird Team was canceled because of the rain and low visibility.

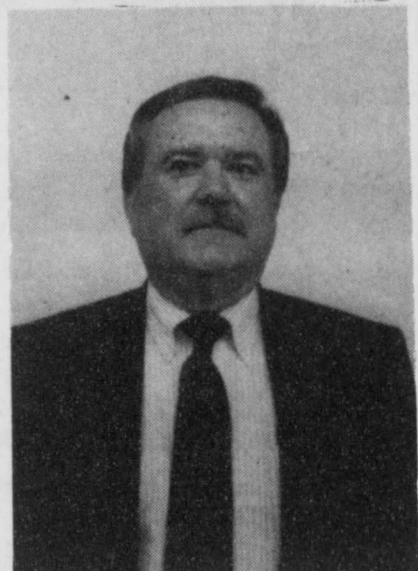
