TWELVE WERE SOLD TO LUBBOCK BOOSTERS YESTERDAY

TIME EXTENDED

SANTA FE WILL CLOSE WAITING LIST TONIGHT

"Another day has passed and still the special train to Amarillo has not been cinched," G. P. Kuykendall chairman of the ticket selling committee for the West Texas Chamber of Commerce convention stated last night. "We have secured another extension of time to turn in the money for the train and will try to sell eleven tickets Wednesday which will cinch the train."

The committee were at work yesterday after a rest on Sunday and Monday. Twelve tickets were sold with eleven remaining unsold. Any person who has been missed by the committee, anyone who has changed his mind about going or anyone who can buy a ticket and send someone else is urged to call Kuykendall or the Chamber of Commerce in order that the train may be secured.

The last tickets are the hardest Kuykendall said last night. The city has been combed by the committee working up the delegation and eleven tickets are yet unsold. The time is short and Santa Fe officials must know definitely tonight in order to get the train here by Sunday night.

Eleven tickets, fifteen dollars each, including official regalia and pennants are left. They must be sold today, according to the ticket selling force. Lubbock has gone too far now to let the train slip, Kuykendall said. That would mean that a good percent of those signed up for the train would not go to Amarillo and Lubbock would be stranded here without a chance to make the showing West Texas is expecting following announcements in the state papers that Lubbock is being backed by the South Plains for the 1927 convention.

U. S. Gets Millions On Foreign Debts

WASHINGTON, June 15.—The Treasury department Tuesday received \$77,783,127 in installments on foreign debt funding settlements from Great Britain, Italy, Belgium and others.

Great Britain led with a payment of \$67,950,000 in government bonds.

NEW LONDON, Conn., June 15.—Work of blowing the water out of the hull of the sunken submarine S-51 and the ballast tanks and pontoons that will be used to raise her, started Tuesday. It is believed at least a score of bodies are still in the hull.

STATE ASSUMES ROAD CONTRACTS

TAKES OVER MAINTENANCE IN 21 COUNTIES OF TEXAS

AUSTIN, June 15.—The state highway department took over all maintenance work in twenty-one counties Tuesday with the expiration of contracts in the counties. Three counties, Orange, Freestone and Jefferson, still have contracts held by private companies which do not expire until July or August. As soon as these contracts expire the highway department will also take over the maintenance in them.

The counties in which contracts expired Tuesday are: Harris, Galveston, Limestone, Bowie, Bragg, Cass, Franklin, Harrison, Hopkins, Houston, Johnson, Leon, Montgomery, Morris, Rains, San Jacinto, Titus, Upshur, Van Zandt and Walker.

Bombs Seattle Salvation Army

SEATTLE, Wash., June 15.—A tall, wild-eyed, long-haired man was being sought by police Tuesday as the person who last night threw a bomb into the Salvation Army social center building during the night and partly wrecked the quarters.

Although 40 persons were in the structure no one was hurt beyond the extent of a few bruises.

YACHT FIRED ON

NEWPORT R. I., June 15.—The yacht Ahola, owned by Arthur Curtis James, which was to have carried the crown prince and princess of Sweden from New Haven to Newport, was fired upon while off Watch Island Tuesday.

It is believed that the shots were fired by a patrol cutter mistaking the Ahola for a rum runner.

Jack Walton Back In Politics Again

OKLAHOMA CITY, June 15.—"Iron" Jack Walton has entered Oklahoma's senatorial race.

The former governor who lost his job via the impeachment route after he had placed most of the state under martial law, thereby creating a virtual "war," has filed his name as candidate for the democratic senatorship now held by Senator John W. Harrell.

BRIAND'S NINTH CABINET QUILTS

PERET STARTS IT; VETERAN REFUSES TO TAKE JOB AGAIN

PARIS, June 15.—Premier Aristide Briand's ninth cabinet has passed into history and with its passing France has been brought face to face with a financial situation so fraught with danger that few statesmen are willing to risk their political lives in formation of a new government.

The financial situation, however, over the Briand ministry through its three tempestuous months of life, has brought on the resignation Tuesday first, of Raoul Peret, minister of finance, and later the collapse of the cabinet. The entire ministry joined in a communique which said:

"After having examined the situation due to the resignation of Finance Peret the cabinet has decided unanimously that it is impossible merely to propose with the naming of a successor to him. It has been decided to offer our resignation in a body so that the president will have full liberty to take the sort of action which is demanded."

The entire cabinet signed a letter to resignation to the president. Following its acceptance, Briand, pressed from many sides to form another government, indicated that he would not accept the task under any circumstances.

At 6:30 o'clock this evening they will be honored with a banquet at Cheri Casa where republicans from throughout the South Plains will also be guests of local businessmen.

At the banquet music will be furnished by the Tech Tornadoes. At eight o'clock this evening a republican rally will be held at the court house, when members of the party will be heard.

The party is composed of Hon. R. B. Creager, of Brownsville; Orville Bellington, of Wichita Falls; T. P. Lee, of Houston; Col. Holmes of Amarillo; Hon. Eugene Nolte, of Seguin; Dr. L. F. Thompson, of San Antonio, and Leonard Withington.

Silliman Evans, of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, is accompanying the party on their tour of West Texas.

Plainview Man Falls 53 Feet; Breaks Both Legs; Grabs Rope, Saves Life

PLAINVIEW, Texas, June 15.—Falling 53 feet from a broken ladder as he was descending from work on the new Harvey Queen mill here at 6 p. m. today, D. Browning, 40, labor foreman, caught a rope as he fell, and although the rope jerked loose from his hands when it tightened at the end of 25 feet, it pulled him into an upright position and he lit on his feet. Both legs were broken, one foot jerked nearly off, and he suffered internal injuries and a broken rib, but he never lost consciousness, and physicians who X-

rayed his wounds at the Plainview hospital said that while he was seriously hurt, he might recover. Browning, a married man whose family live here, was able to tell of his experience, although suffering agony. The rope which he caught as he fell ran free through a pulley until it reached a knot at the end, which caught in the pulley and jerked the rope taut. This broke the man's fall to some extent, as well as pulling him upright. The foot which was pulled nearly loose was left attached to his body by one ligament only.

MAGEE JURY IS COMPLETED

ONLY THREE OF TWELVE CAN SPEAK ENGLISH

LAS VEGAS, N. M., June 15.—A jury to try Carl C. Magee, militant Albuquerque editor, on a charge of manslaughter was chosen and sworn in here late Tuesday.

Six of the jurors are farmers; two railroad men, two builders, one ranchman and one oil man. Three are English speaking while the remainder are of Spanish extraction, speaking only their native tongue.

The regular panel of 24 was exhausted and it was necessary to draw two veniremen from an emergency panel before 12 men acceptable to the defense and prosecution were selected to pass on the case.

Immediately after the jury was sworn in, they were placed in custody of the sheriff and will be returned to the court house Wednesday morning when the state will begin to present its case.

Commons Back Baldwin's Policy

LONDON, June 15.—The house of commons, by a vote of 299 to 138 voted confidence Tuesday night in the government's policy for handling the coal strike.

The vote followed a declaration by Premier Baldwin for an eight-hour day for British miners, with no reduction in pay. He was interrupted by laborite members who shouted threats of an appeal for a general election.

It is up to you, Mr. Fan, to see that the Hubbers go to Denver to defend their already established honors.

Within the next few days another drive will be staged in which the baseball association hopes that the matter will be settled and the entrance to the Denver Post Tournament may be sent in. HUNDREDS OF CHILDREN IN THEATRE SAVED BY QUICK WORK

BOERGER, Texas, June 15.—Fire starting in a theatre here Tuesday afternoon threatened to destroy Boerger and Dixon Creek and Whittenberg, two nearby oil towns. The use of dynamite on buildings in the path of the flames prevented the spread of flames after damage estimated at \$250,000 had been done. Lack of water and high wind made the use of dynamite imperative.

Several hundred children were in the theatre in which the fire started. Quick work by the ushers and chaperones of the tots saved their lives.

PARRISH WILL CAST DECIDING VOTE IN GAS FRANCHISE TIE IN CITY COMMISSION THIS MORNING

At a meeting of the Lubbock city commission this morning, Mayor Parrish will say whether under certain conditions a group of eastern capitalists shall be granted a franchise to sell natural gas to the people of Lubbock, or whether the proposal made by these capitalists through their representative, A. J. McMahan, to run a pipe line from the Panhandle field shall be rejected.

Mayor Parrish has just secured from Mayor Lee Bivins and disinterested businessmen of Amarillo some valuable information on the project, having spent Monday at Amarillo where he made a thorough study of their natural gas business and the contract entered into by the city of Amarillo with the gas company furnishing gas to the consumers there.

Klett Studies
E. L. Klett, city attorney, also went to Amarillo to make a thorough study of the franchise granted the gas company there in order to better prepare himself for looking after the legal phases of any agreement that might be made with any company here.

Amarillo Mayor Speaks
Mayor Lee Bivins of Amarillo, in discussing the gas situation with the Lubbock men, stated that in his opinion Lubbock would make a mistake by giving a franchise over to any promoter, but on the other hand should certainly grant a franchise to any substantial group having ability to finance the pipe line project, even should the price of sixty seven and a half cents be paid for the service.

Mr. McMahan returned to Lubbock late last night after a business trip east and will attend the meeting with the city commission this morning prepared to represent his group in whatever business might be brought up.

While Mayor Parrish was slow about discussing the proposition yesterday, he told the Avalanche that if certain changes in McMahan's initial proposal can be agreed upon, he will break the tie in the city commission by favoring the franchise.

Because these provisions spoken about by the mayor are not known and the representative of the gas line company has refused to state that any changes in the proposal as first presented will be acceptable.

the gas situation will not be defined until Mayor Parrish has taken action on the proposition this morning at the meeting of the city commission.

The old building which formerly housed Judge Roy Bean's combination bar room and justice of the peace office was badly scorched by the flames but was saved from destruction, Bean dealt out "cow man justice" in the '90's over the territory stretching between the Pecos and Rio Grande rivers.

The fund was founded by Charles Garland who gave up a million dollar inheritance because he disapproved of unearned wealth.

Brazilian Emperor Assisted Bell in Securing First Public Approval

June 5, 1876, was an important day in the history of the telephone.

Alexander Graham Bell, the young inventor, had the infant telephone on display in an obscure corner of one of the buildings at the Philadelphia Centennial Exhibition.

He was hopeful that the distinguished group of scientists making a tour of inspection that afternoon in company with the Emperor Dom Pedro would inspect the telephone.

It was late; the afternoon was hot and the judges were about to pass by the telephone booth without interest.

The scientists were suddenly surprised to see Dom Pedro step forward and grasp Bell. He remembered him as the pale young teacher of deaf mutes whose classes he had visited in Boston.

THE TELEPHONE TALK

Bell asked him to try the telephone. Dom Pedro put the receiver to his ear while Bell went to the transmitter. Suddenly Dom Pedro cried "My God, it talks."

With one accord the now interested scientists gathered about the table and experimented with the instruments until far into the night, and next day the telephone was moved to the place of honor in the judges' pavilion.

The telephone above is the type used in 1896, just before it became of age. At this time nation-wide service was but a dream of the future as there were only 400,000 telephones in the United States and conversations could not be held at distances of more than 1,000 miles.

CITIZENS IN A RIOT

Least a news item from Perth Amboy, N. J., may have escaped your attention we take this occasion to relate that on Monday of last week a meeting in the city hall of that place was broken up in a riot when one thousand irate citizens battled with twenty policemen. This does not read like America, but it is, and moreover, the citizens seem to have had good cause for their bitter resentment against officials. It was centered around a report from an auditing committee, which showed laxness in city affairs, culminating in the news that the taxpayers would have to make good a deficit of \$181,000 in the city treasury and also pay a \$150,000 paving bill. News dispatches say that sharp words brought on an uproar, during which chairs were broken, windows smashed and the crowd struggled into the street where the fighting continued. Police were called, and using clubs freely restored order in about a half hour. Other communities can learn a lesson from the disturbance at Perth Amboy before it is too late. The New Jersey officials as far as we can judge at this distance, evidently took the bit in their teeth and proceeded with improvements and the expenditure of public money regardless of the state of the treasury. They evidently acted without regard to the wishes of many citizens, and probably without giving the ones who have the bill to pay any opportunity of expression. Public officials who do things because they have the power, without regard to the well founded morality which leaves to the citizens and taxpayers the decision as to bonded indebtedness, may think they are smart, and may get by very often, but in the long run it is a dangerous practice and should be stopped. We write this editorial without having in mind any official of Lubbock and without any desire to renew any old issues that cluster around this theme. Nevertheless we write it for public officials, as well as others, to read, and we hope that those charged with the responsibility of government in the parts will not attempt to do what the New Jersey officials evidently did, and we do not believe they will. However, we hear criticism of the public officials in many ways. Reports are of no value, however, unless there is something from both sides of the subject. We hear reports from one side and it sounds bad, but take a look at the other side of the question, if you will, and there may be something there that will be of interest to you.

We are sure that a lot of little things are done by public officials that may not be an exact tracking of the laws, and if this did not exist, there would be but a few of the people of this city, that were not out on bond or in jail. We believe in officials performing the duties of their offices, but they must also use common ordinary horse sense while they are at it, but at the same time they should stay very close to the letter of the law and then there will be no room for a question mark.

FACTORIES FOR SOUTH AND WEST

The building boom is always breaking out in some new form. Here is a very interesting development. Engineers representing many of the largest manufacturing concerns in the country say there is going to be a remarkable growth, during the next year or two, in the construction of industrial plants in the South and West. These plants will represent, for the most part, not new industries but industries already established in other sections. Manufacturers, in improving their business methods, are not content with increasing efficiency and cutting down overhead in their present plants. They seek also to cut down the cost of distribution. Thus they tend more and more to build branch factories or independent units in distant sections, to serve that territory. This means a more wholesome distribution of industry throughout the country, and by the same token a better distribution of prosperity, benefiting consumers and producers alike. It is made possible by the rapidly increasing distribution of electrical power, and is one of the things justifying ambitious plans for "super power" systems covering the continent.

"AROUND THE WORLD"

John Goldstrom, latest contestant for the globe-circling record, is said to have failed. Having to wait for a slow trans-Siberian train, he missed the only boat that would have brought him across the Pacific in time to win the race. He has broken certain minor records, but the round-the-world record of John Henry Mears 35 days, 21 hours and 35 minutes, will stand for the present, as it has stood already for 13 years. Perhaps it doesn't matter. The public, formerly ex-

cited about such ventures, has been rather passive about this. People are used to speed nowadays, and actual records seem of less importance, because it is always a foregone conclusion that somebody else will break them before long. Besides, the public is better aware than it used to be that there is considerable sham in these "races around the world". They are not what they seem. The earth, as all our geographers say, is about 25,000 miles around, and none of these speed-record seekers travel anywhere near that far. They avoid belting the earth by going as far north as possible, following parallels far shorter than the equator. It is something like drawing a circular pencil mark around an apple near the stem and saying that line is drawn "around the apple." By the same procedure followed by these record-makers, a polar explorer might fly on a circular course around the North Pole, a hundred miles from the Pole, making a total flight of a little over 300 miles, and then say he had "flown around the world". That could be done in two hours.

AN UNFEELING LAW

Congress should immediately repeal the recent law which fines air mail pilots when they are late with their cargoes. Because of this idiotic ruling one pilot is dead and three were lost in the opening of the Minneapolis-Chicago air mail link because they took off in high winds in order to avoid the fines if they were late. How such an utterly foolish law ever got through Congress is a mystery indeed. Aviation has not yet reached the stage where it is an exact science and the development of the air service is very hazardous. The pilots have a dangerous duty to perform and should be allowed to use some discretion where their lives and valuable mail is concerned without having their already small pay made smaller by the payment of fines. Delays are bound to occur from time to time. When fog holds up an incoming liner a day, the line is not fined for the delay; when snow and storms delay the mail trains, the engineers are not fined because the mail is late. Yet in the air service, the most uncertain and the most hazardous of the various branches of the mail service, the pilots are liable to fine if they do not maintain schedule. Immediate steps should be taken for the repeal of this law. The citizens of the United States want to see the air service developed but not at the cost of any more lives than can be helped under normal conditions. Public sentiment should demand that this measure be repealed.

COLLEGE DEVELOPMENT

A news dispatch from New Haven, Conn., the other day carried the glad tidings that when Yale men study least their grades are highest. That was the headline summary of the facts. Further conclusions may be drawn from the statistics published in the story. Freshmen study an average of 23.3 hours a week and get an average grade of 75.3; sophomores average 20.8 hours of study and a 76.4 grade; the junior average is 19.5 hours of study and a grade of 78.3; seniors average 18.3 hours of study and an 80.5 grade. This suggests several things. Apparently poor students and lazy ones are weeded out early in the course. Apparently, too, the students that remain learn how to study more effectively and develop a better grasp of the subject matter in hand. Perhaps the courses offered to upper classes are of greater interest and inspire keener enthusiasm than those for freshmen. If the statistics do mean these things, it is an excellent sign. Undoubtedly many other schools would show a similar tendency. It ought to indicate that college years are years of intellectual growth, as they should be, rather than years wholly devoted to merry-making and idling as some of the harsher critics maintain.

BETTER TABLE MANNERS

Women, it must be admitted, are fairly competent critics of manners—especially masculine manners. Women restaurant owners and managers then, must be qualified to pass judgement on masculine table manners. And what do they say? They say that men's table manners are improving. This is highly important from every angle, because men are eating in public more than ever before, say the lady restaurateurs, and it would be all the more dreadful if their manners were bad. This very situation tends to cure the evil. Eating in public "stimulates a desire to eat in a refined manner," explains one of the ladies. Besides, the women are eating in public, too, and "wives won't stand for letting their husbands make any mistakes at the table these days." Which, as a million men will testify, is only too true.

A GREAT WET VICTORY

The "great victory" for the wets in Pennsylvania, widely broadcast through the nation is recorded as follows: Vare, wet, 596,928 votes; Pepper, dry 515,502; Pinchot, dry 339,127.

We see small comfort for the wets in the figures. They by no means indicate that Pennsylvania would not approve the the prohibition amendment in a popular referendum.

This is the kind of stuff that the reading public has crammed down their throat by the wet news services, and the big newspapers and magazine writers. If there is a wet majority in the above our knowledge of arithmetic is mighty bum. The way we have figured out the situation in Pennsylvania is that there are 254,701 more dry votes than wets. In the recent senatorial contest in that state, still the newspapers come forth in glaring headlines and say to their readers that Pennsylvania is wet, and would endorse a wet platform.

A plurality vote is not a true reflection of the sentiment of the voting strength of the people, and should not be taken as such. We think straw votes on the prohibition question is one of the curses of the nation. They are never a true reflection of the real sentiment of the people in the matter, and in most every case broadcasts a wrong impression.

WORLD TOPICS

THE TIPPING CUSTOM

While many attempts have been made to eradicate the practice, even by the passage of laws, the tipping habit persists, through lack of courage on the part of the public. Originally, no doubt, the custom of giving tips to servants was inspired by kindly motives, but it has long since become a species of petty graft. Many employers of low-class help pay miserably small wages with the knowledge that tips from customers will supply the deficiency. Employers accept the small wage with the same understanding. Consequently the public pays in the aggregate vast sums for which no service whatever is rendered.

The effect of the tipping system is wholly bad, as those who accept the gratuities must lose somewhat in self respect, while those who pay them do so simply because it is expected and they do not wish to appear stingy.

One restaurant noticed recently displayed a sign which read: "We pay our waiters living wages and do not permit them to accept tips. That sign inevitably caused patrons to hold a higher opinion of the proprietor and his waiters.

Charles Edward Russell, an American writer and author who has severely criticized British rule in India, has been refused permission to land in England. The real reason advanced for this action is said to be fear that Mr. Russell intended to visit the Irish Free State where he might stir up trouble.

THIRTY YEARS OF MOVIES

Today, it is said, there are over 20,000 moving picture theatres in the United States and a proportionate number in Canada, with a seating capacity of 20,000,000 and a weekly attendance of more than 130,000,000. At least 800 photographs are produced every year, with twice as many "short subjects." The total number of feet of film produced is said to be close to 1,250,000,000.

The number of persons employed in the industry and the number of shareholders in producing companies run up into large figures.

All this represents the development of only 30 years. The first movies, consisting of jumpy, flickering images, were shown on a canvas sheet in a New York music hall on April 27, 1896.

Most of the people familiar with screen plays now never knew, or have forgotten, what the early pictures were like. There really has been tremendous improvement on the artistic side as well as the mechanical and financial. It is hard to imagine what another 30 years of similar advancement may achieve.

IMPROVEMENT IN RUSSIA

A group of conservative members of the British parliament, representing a conservative government, would not be expected to flatter Soviet Russia. Such a group, after investigating conditions in Russia for its party, presents a report that surveys many persons in England and America, because its conclusions on the whole are rather favorable.

The British investigators find many things still to criticize in Russia. They tell frankly of the autocracy, the violent methods, political interference with the courts, bitter injustice to the former upper classes, untenable economic ideal and other objectionable features of the Soviet

government. At the same time they give the other side.

A government which has an annual budget of \$2,000,000,000 for the next fiscal year, and confidently expects to meet it, cannot be so incompetent as we have pictured. The national debt is only a quarter of a billion dollars—about one and a half months' normal revenue. That must be made possible by conservative handling of national finances, no less than by repudiation of the old regime's foreign debts.

"Confidence is inspired," says this British report, "by the fact that not a single for 25 trade commitments has not been punctually honored."

Russia welcomes big business. The Russian government, they say, is stable.

There are only 1,000,000 unemployed in Russia, they find, and nearly so many as in England. They seek more trade with Russia, for the benefit of their own workers and business interests, while trying to stop Soviet propaganda in their own country and obtain Soviet recognition of Russian debt to British citizens.

Trade is a mighty solvent. A good export market opens for many firms. So it may be that conservative America, one of these times, will deal as charitably with Russia as our British friends are doing.

THE BIG FAIR

The Sesquicentennial exposition at Philadelphia, emblematic of the great Centennial half a century ago—opened on Memorial Day only three-fourths complete, but it opened on time. Philadelphia should be given all credit for this promptness, and for the fact that it is straining every effort to make its exhibition a finished and impressive whole as quickly as possible. Amends are being made for past delay.

As it stands, the exhibition is said to be already a good, big show. Unquestionably it deserves the patronage of the nation. Philadelphia, one of our chief national cities, should and will be the Mecca this summer of such a tourist trek as none of our eastern cities have ever seen. The motor tourists will see to that, if the railroad tourists do not.

The absence of representatives from Brazil and Spain at the 40th session of the League of Nations Council, is taken to mean that both nations intend to withdraw from the League and leave the reorganization committee a free hand in the matter of admitting Germany, inasmuch as the reorganization program contemplated leaving both nations out of permanent representation on the council their resignation ought to make things easier for the September session.

It is said that because of smuggling activities from Canada, the Adirondacks roads in the vicinity of President Coolidge's summer residence are to be patrolled by officers armed with sawed-off shot guns—not to stop the smuggling, but so the President may not be disturbed.

Mr. Mellon believes that the government could save 400 or 500 tons of paper by reducing the size of our bills. If Mr. Mellon can devise a way to keep the purchasing power from shrinking, most of the bill not object if the size is reduced to that of a postage stamp. The economical principal involved might be applied with good results to many other governmental expenditures.

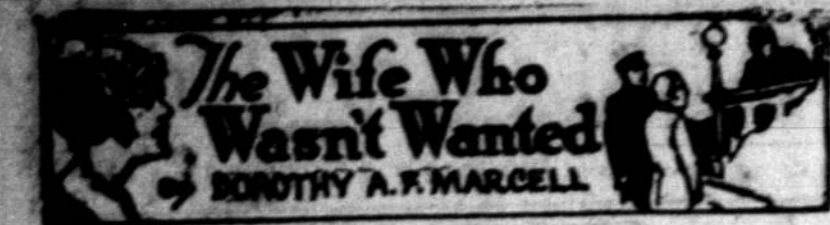

LOOK THROUGH TELESCOPE AND SEE COLUMBUS DISCOVER AMERICA; SO GERMAN PROFESSOR PREDICTS

BERLIN, June 14.—The day may not be far distant when we shall be able to look into a telescope and see, reflected by remote planets, the storming of the Paris bastille, Columbus personally guiding his ship to America, Caesar jauntily crossing the Rubicon or even cave men munching their elephant steaks.
Moreover, this does not mean that we shall see imitations or reproductions of these events—but that we shall see the events themselves, a hundred, a thousand, perhaps even a million years after they have happened.

This astounding possibility is suggested by the Berlin professor, Dr. W. Andersen, in a recent article in the distinguished "Frankfurter Zeitung."

Professor Andersen reveals the possibility of applying to human sight the same radio electrical methods which have enabled us to broadcast sounds in tiny ether waves. Dr. Andersen reasons as follows:
A ray of light needs eight minutes to travel from the sun to the earth, should some creature, situated on the sun, look down upon the earth, he would witness happenings which had actually occurred eight minutes previously.

If it were possible to find a mirror-like surface like a crystal object or molten metal on some heavenly body, with the aid of some immensely magnifying super-telescope, we could then see what had happened on the earth as long ago as the time required for a ray of light to travel to this heavenly body and back to the earth.
Thus, if astronomers could apply this method to the star Polaris, whence light travels to the earth in 75 years, we could witness what was happening on our own globe 150 years earlier.

Since stars are situated at all conceivable distances from the earth, we would be enabled to see the whole panorama of human history disclosed before our eyes. It would be as though history were a film and we were suddenly able to turn the reel backwards, as far back, perhaps as the stone age.
Sitting in their observatory, then, astronomers might easily see Miles Standish arriving at Plymouth in the "Mayflower" (though how many of our best "Mayflower families" might shudder at the thought that their ancestors would not be found aboard.) We might see Lincoln, delivering his speech at Gettysburg, Hannibal crossing the Alps, Henry VIII divorcing his wife, Tutankhamen rolling dice against a pyramid, or even Adam, gnawing at the core of the tempting apple.

Dr. Andersen being a professor of the manner born, envisages other more academic potentialities in this astronomical invention.
"We could settle disputes," he declares, "which have puzzled the brains of historians for a thousand years. Ancient errors regarding the primitive beginnings of Egyptian or Babylonian civilization could be rectified, since the past would no longer hold its secrets.
"Since certain planets are known to be more than one million light years removed from us, we could be enabled to see with our own eyes events which actually occurred two million years ago."

The principle upon which Prof. Andersen bases his amazing theory is relatively simple.
"If we wish to discover something extremely small," he says, "and if we were able to arrive at an electrical procedure for this purpose, we could achieve a power of magnifying which we have hitherto not even ventured to dream.
"The perception and audibility of tiny radio waves is an example of what is possible in this direction. Thus, if we succeed some day in transforming our telescopic sight into 'seeing by electricity,' we may attain results which today baffle our imaginations."

HEAVY FIELD PIECES OF BATTERY C, 131ST FIELD ARTILLERY TO BE USED IN SERVICE PRACTICE HERE JUNE 20TH

Captain M. M. Mitchell, commander of Battery C, 131st Field Artillery stationed here, has just received permission from the command of the Eighth Corps Area to fire 100 rounds of service ammunition from the French 75's which are regular equipment owned by the battery here.

The firing will take place Sunday, June 20th, beginning promptly at ten o'clock, the guns to be located in the Yellowhouse canyon on the Johnston ranch on the Slaton-Idalou road.

Boy Scouts from Lubbock will have charge of directing the crowds of spectators to see that none of them get in the territory where the shells will be exploded, the spectators to be given positions at the rim of the canyon overlooking the location of the guns and where they will also see the effect the exploding shells will have on the targets.

Firing will continue during three and a half hours, Major Wm. G. Kinsolving and Captain Alpha Brumage of the Eighth Corps Area to be among the distinguished representatives of the army who will witness the work of the local battery.

Those who wish to see the big guns in action, and it is expected that many will, are asked to be especially careful in approaching the grounds that they place their cars according to directions of the Boy Scouts and battery men who will be stationed in the vicinity to give them necessary information.

Lubbock, Slaton and Idalou people are expected to witness the work of the battery men.

On July 7th the officers and men of Battery C, 131st Field Artillery, under command of Captain Mitchell will train for Palacios, Texas, where they will spend two weeks in intensive training preparatory to do actual service in case of war.

Seventy five men and four officers will make the trip, which will be an enjoyed one due to the splendid location of the camp and the entertainment features provided.

Mexico Slaughters Its Infected Cattle To End Epidemic

WASHINGTON, June 15.—Destruction of cattle infected with the foot-and-mouth disease has been vigorously undertaken by the Mexican government in an effort to stamp out the disease in the southern section of that country, the United States Department of Agriculture announced recently. The full text of the department's statement follows:

Mexican authorities are active in suppressing the recent outbreak of foot-and-mouth disease among livestock in the southern part of that country, according to information received by the U. S. Department of Agriculture through the State Department. Dr. S. O. Fladness, Agricultural Commissioner for the United States at Mexico City, describes the plans of procedure in eradication as similar to those successfully used in the past by veterinary officials of the United States.

Exposed Stock Slaughtered.—Slaughtering of all infected and exposed stock in Yucatan is in progress. Near Yucatan, in northern Campeche and also in southern Tabasco, the infected herds have been slaughtered. A number of infected herds in northern Tabasco, however, still remain to be destroyed. In that region disposal of carcasses by burial is practically impossible owing to the nature of the land, but Mexican officials recently left for Houston, Texas, to purchase equipment for disposal by burning the method used successfully in the last Texas outbreak.

Mexican authorities also have assured United States officials that movement of all dangerous products from the infected region is absolutely prohibited. Dr. Fladness, who has had experience in eradicating foot-and-mouth disease, is co-operating with the Mexican officials in suppressing the malady in that country, thus reducing the menace to the animal industry of the United States.

HOUSE AUTHORIZES PAYMENT FOR SLAUGHTERED CATTLE

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 15.—A payment of \$3,415.90 for cattle slaughtered because of the prevalence of foot-and-mouth disease would be authorized by House bill 8085, passed by the House on June 11.

The benefactor would be Henry S. Royce, of Tacoma, Washington, whose cattle were slaughtered on the order of the Bureau of Animal Industry, United States Department of Agriculture.

W. M. Harris, of Tahoka, who sold his telephone exchange at that place to Mr. Kneeland, will be district manager of the new company, which will embrace eight exchanges.

While in Seagraves Mr. Harris stated that the local exchange would be improved shortly or as soon as the new company got lined up.

Mrs. B. L. Waters, who has been in charge of the switchboard in Seagraves, will remain with the new company, which will be good news to her many friends. She will be assisted as heretofore by Mrs. Nolan Barton.

With the many improvements anticipated in the system at this place, many new telephones will be installed and party lines built to the various communities surrounding Seagraves.

Veteran Hospitals May Be Closed

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 15.—Hearings on House bill 7745 and 11205 to dispose of certain hospital properties in Arkansas and Illinois now under the Veterans Bureau, were held before the House Committee on World War Veterans on June 14.

Representative Gorman, of Chicago, Ill. (Rep.), author of House bill 7745, pointed out the disadvantages of having a government institution of that character located in a village like Broadview, Illinois, which he said was a very poor town and had no modern conveniences.

The tract of land owned by the Government, Mr. Gorman said, comprised about 220 acres, located in the village of Broadview, Illinois, and lies south of the railroad tracks and right of way of the Illinois Central Railroad. It is known as the Edward Hipes Junior Memorial Hospital.

The committee deferred final action, pending drafting of an amendment to the bill, by a special subcommittee, so as to prohibit maintenance of a nuisance on the property in controversy if sold.

Representative Rawson, of Clarksville, Arkansas, (House bill 11205) would convey to the Big Rock Stone Company of Little Rock, Arkansas, a portion of the reservation of the United States Veterans' Hospital Number 78 near Little Rock. It was referred by the committee to the medical authorities of the Veterans' Bureau for opinion as to the advisability of the proposed sale as affecting patients of the hospital by the company's blasting works.

47 GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS ENGAGED IN RADIO WORK

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 15.—Forty-seven government officials in the various departments deal with radio in one way or another, the Government Radio Directory, revised to May 1, reveals. The directory has recently been issued by the Department of Commerce and the Inter-department Radio Advisory Committee.

LITTLEFIELD, June 15.—Hon. J. T. Robinson, land commissioner for the State of Texas, paid his first visit to Littlefield yesterday. Mr. Robinson stated that he had formerly visited every county in the state except a very few counties in this immediate vicinity, and he is now making a personal tour of inspection over these formerly unvisited counties.

COUNTY AGENT WATCHES WORK OF LOCUST ON 700 ACRE FIELD

David F. Eaton, county agent, went to Abernathy yesterday to witness the work of an army of locusts that have just attacked a 700-acre cotton field on the Cone & Wilson farm two miles west of Abernathy, of which S. E. Cone of Lubbock is one of the owners.

After a close inspection of the work done by the insects and after examining the specimens, Mr. Eaton said they belong to the cicada family of locusts, and due to the fact that the cotton was especially thick it is believed they will cause their destructive work before the crop is materially damaged.

The locusts are commonly known as the 17-year locust, due to the fact that they come in cycles of 17 years, disappearing after only a few days' work.

No other appearances of the insects in this section had been reported late yesterday.

REGULATIONS ARE AMENDED FOR COTTON CLASSIFICATION

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 15.—W. M. Jardine, Secretary of Agriculture, has amended certain regulations under the Cotton Standards Act to make them more nearly conform to similar regulations under the Cotton Futures Act, it was announced at the Department of Agriculture, June 11.

The amendments provide for the review of classification by the same board which made the original classification, instead of by the board at Washington, except in cases where the interested parties request action by the board at Washington or where the Secretary may designate the board of review.

ROTARY MEET GETS UNDER WAY

SECOND DAY FINDS LARGE CROWDS AT ALL MEETINGS

DENVER, Colo., June 15.—The second day of the Denver convention of Rotary International brought forth the united spirit of the institution in its understanding of ethical policies in business affairs and the extension of such policies into the commercial and social life of the thirty-five countries in which Rotary is so well established. Overflowing audiences have crowded the city auditorium at all meetings of the regular convention program, and special meetings have attracted delegates far beyond expectations of the convention managers. The city is thronged with Rotarians and Rotary-ans, the latter intently attending the convention sessions with their husbands and hosts. Speeches of the day have been given by earnest officials of Rotary who have developed their investigations along lines of the international extension of clubs.

With a clear vision of the trend of service as an utilitarian ideal, derived from an extensive journey among Rotary clubs on the continent, Donald A. Adams, retiring president, defined the practical fields into which Rotary could put its natural power of manhood. He took the new viewpoint that there is in Rotary unused power of citizenship which can be developed for the benefit of the communities in which clubs are active. "We must not say, 'here is integrity, let us put that into Rotary,' nor 'here is friendship, let us put that into Rotary,' for both integrity and friendship are in our organization and the association of our members, and we have left the necessity and opportunity to use both of these forces simply because they are part of the power of manhood and citizenship."

President Adams placed the issue fairly before the convention in his opening address when he said, "If you could have heard a prominent engineer of Italy speak on the ethical content of Rotary, you would understand why I say that Rotary is in safe hands in those foreign countries. I am sure that the extension of Rotary, now already begun among foreign speaking peoples, will continue, because the understanding of the American ideals will be translated into their native habits as well as into their native tongues."

Ladies of the twelve Spanish speaking countries which are represented at the convention were entertained, with the ladies of all other countries, at a superb reception with fancy dances by young women of Denver, at the auditorium Tuesday afternoon. About three thousand

were present, and the intermixture of so many ladies of Rotary from all parts of the world made of the event a beginning of rare friendships. Ladies from nearly every country in Asia, Europe and South America appeared in native costume and a number of them addressed the audience of Rotary-ans.

Throngs of Rotarians and guests have visited the many places where musical programs have been given. The city auditorium has been the scene of great choral singing by the thousands in the audiences, and an evening of organ recital, choral singing, municipal band music, led by a Rotarian conductor, and solo singing has formed an evening musical jubilee attended by about seven thousand. During the hours when the convention is not in session the streets and lobbies of the hotels are thronged with moving groups, many dancing and singing to the music of bands brought by the various clubs, the Stark Band of 47 pieces from Orange, Texas, coming from that city in busses especially built for their transportation, and playing throughout the day for the entertainment of the Denverites and Rotarians. The band consists of Boy Scouts of the first class.

Meetings of special groups of business men are taking place in various halls, the Governor of the state having opened the senate chamber and house of representatives for the use of some of these groups. At these meetings past international presidents and other members of the official family have presided. Important results of research along lines of sociological investigation in boys' work and crippled children's work as well as of play grounds and the guidance of the underprivileged boy have been reported.

SECRETARY JARINE FAVORS BILL FOR REGULATION OF MILK

WASHINGTON, June 15.—William M. Jardine, Secretary of Agriculture, in a letter to the House Committee on Agriculture, advocating the bill which the committee has reported for regulating the importation of milk and cream into the United States, said he is in favor of any measure designed to protect the public health.

He declared the growing interest and concern of the Federal and State Governments to leave no stone unturned to insure a pure and wholesome milk supply for the United States is evidenced by the fact that during the current fiscal year more than fifteen millions of dollars is being expended for eradication of Bovine tuberculosis, to which must be added the cost sustained by the owners of herds tested. A material increase is anticipated, he said, in State expenditures for this work.

Retailers Report Business Is Good

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 15.—

Announcement was made by the Federal Reserve Board June 9 that total sales in May of 543 retail stores, which made preliminary reports to the Federal reserve system from all sections of the country, were 7.3 per cent larger than in May, 1925. Weather conditions were generally favorable for retail trade in May than in earlier months of this year and the increase in sales over the corresponding month of last year was larger than for any previous month of this year except March, the month in which a large volume of Easter trading was done.

Increases in sales occurred in all Federal reserve districts except the Minneapolis district, where sales were slightly smaller, but the most substantial improvements were in the Richmond, Atlanta, Chicago and St. Paul Federal reserve districts. More than 70 per cent of the total number of stores reporting from the country as a whole showed larger sales than a year ago.

Sales of two mail order houses 14.2 per cent larger than in May, 1925, and sales of five and ten cent chain stores (five chains) were 11.5 per cent larger.

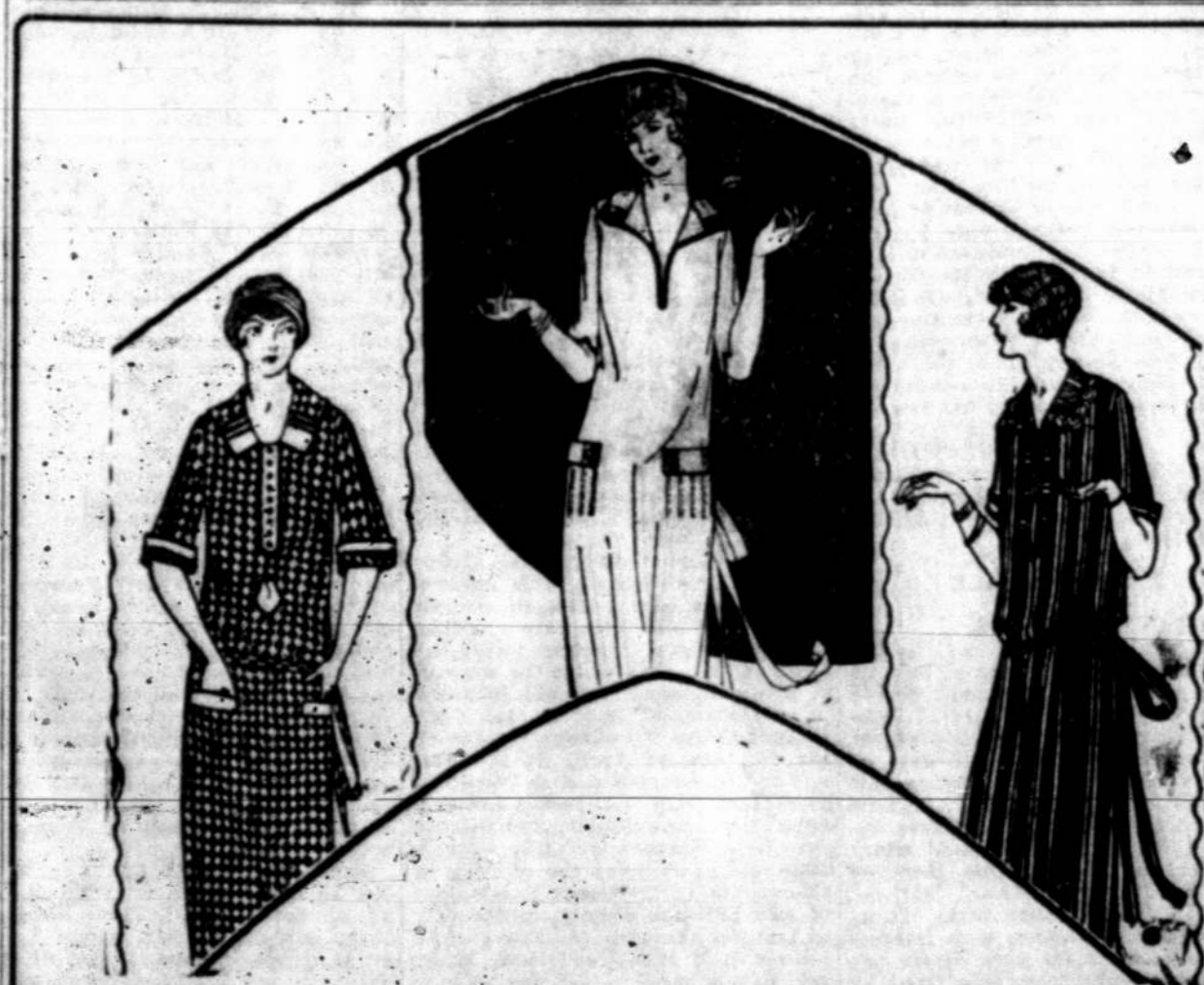

NEW YORK, June 15.—Stocks were called upon to absorb more profit taking Tuesday but it was accomplished fairly easily as the market's absorptive power has not been severely tested since the inauguration of the recovery a few weeks ago.

The fact that the stock averages reflect a recovery of approximately half of the lost occasioned in the March break induced some profit taking as traders evidently felt that some reaction might be expected on technical grounds. This liquidation was further increased by short selling, although this was not of a serious nature.

Oil stocks and especially stocks were strong and active although it is a matter of comment that the petroleum group seems to lack an aggressive leader. The market had hoped that Harland might assume this position, this hope being based on the fact that Morgan stocks had served as the rallying points for the rest of the market when the recovery movement was in its initial stage.

Ward Baking B was one of the leaders in the specialty group, adding 2 1/2 points to the previous day's gain, although the issue is still some 5 points below the high grade made prior to the collapse of the Ward merger plans. Freeport Texas, up 1 3/8 and Du Pont up 1 1/2, were other leaders among the specialty group.

Merchandisers were more irregular. Woolworth lost 2 3/8 points while Montgomery Ward was down more than one point, these issues meeting with profit taking after yesterday's sharp advances.

Some significance was attached to the fact that selling ran its course during the early hours and that signs of a resumption of the broad general advances were more evident after the first three hours had passed.

Apparently loans for stock market purposes have reached at settling point for the time being as the stock market has not made for a correction.

KANSAS CITY LIVE STOCK.

KANSAS CITY, June 15.—Cattle supplies were in excess of a moderate demand and a good percentage of the arrivals were steers and yearlings of choice to good quality. Trade was slow in opening. The kinds best suited were about steady and all others were weak to 25 cents lower. Most steers sold around \$7.50 to \$10. The top on yearlings was \$10.35. Fat yearlings ranged around \$9 to \$10.

Stockers and feeders were more plentiful and some very desirable animals were shown. The bulk of sales on both stockers and feeders ranged around \$6 to \$8.25.

Total receipts of hogs at the five western markets were materially heavier than last week and prices at all points were lower. The market here was quoted at steady to ten cents lower.

Fat pigs were weak to 25 cents lower with sales around \$15 to \$15.50. Top fat hogs brought \$14.40. Heavies sold around \$13.85 to \$14.15 mediums \$13.95 to \$14.20; lights \$14 to \$14.40.

RULES IN KANSAS

BINDERS AND HEADERS DRONE OVER HUGE FIELDS OF WHEAT

By United News.

KANSAS CITY, Kan., June 15.—Out in Kansas where the wheat crop is the very essence of existence there is much rejoicing these days for the god of the harvest is holding forth.

Droning monotonously thousands of beetle like binders and headers are crawling over the vast rolling prairies, wresting the riches from millions of golden stalks and fretting the landscape into an epic of the season.

A bumper crop! With its eyes on the cold facts, the state board of agriculture estimates that these endless tracts will yield this year more than 133,000,000 bushels of wheat.

To the Kansas farmer, standing in the doorway of his little farm house and listening to the swish of the waves of the wheat sea, comes the thrill of knowing that material prosperity has come to him, a fat bank account, comfort, happiness.

Except that science has perfected wheat so now that ten heads and a hundred kernels grow where formerly were produced only one head and ten kernels, the whispered message of the bumper crop is essentially the same as in centuries past.

Now wheat is listed at \$1.55 a bu.

she land there are indications that the price will rise rather than slump. It means that at least two hundred million dollars will pour into the wheat coffers of Kansas this year.

There is no labor shortage evidenced this far and the railroads are making every effort to make it possible for the farmer to move his enormous crop.

The wheat map of Kansas is largely confined to the Western half of the state and the areas of normal excellence can be divided into south central and west central parts of this half. The best wheat last year was produced in the northwest corner of the state, but this year it seems it will be produced from the south central section.

Agricultural authorities who study the wheat crop year
